### A. JOINT RESOLUTION

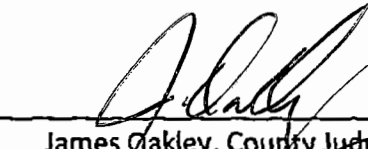

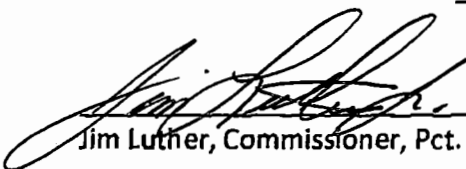
**AND WHEREAS**, the Commissioners Court of Burnet County, Texas desires to give authorization for said Contract,

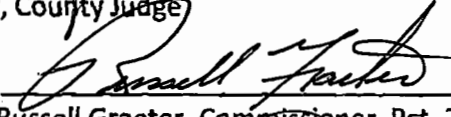
**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF BURNET COUNTY, TEXAS, THAT:**

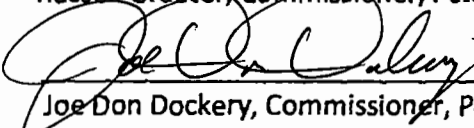

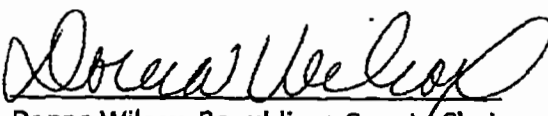

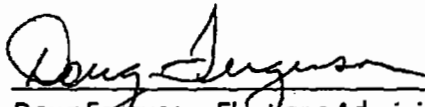

## B. ESTIMATED VOTER TURNOUT

The Elections Administrator estimated voter turnout for the March 6, 2018 Joint Primary using the formula provided in the Texas Administrative Code, Title 1, Chapter 81, Subchapter G. 4 for voting precincts 1, 3, 5, 6, 7, 8, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 and 18

5 for voting precincts 2, 4, 9, 17 and 20

6 for voting precinct 19.

Standby poll workers for both parties will be trained for Election Day precincts that request an additional clerk, subject to state limitations for a joint primary election.

Number of voting booths per joint-voting precinct:

2 for voting precincts 6, 11, 13, 14, 15, and 16

3 for voting precincts 1, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 10, 12, 13, 17 and 18

4 for voting precincts 2, 9, 19 and 20.

Spare voting booths will be available for Election Day precincts that request an additional machine, subject to state limitations for a joint primary election.
