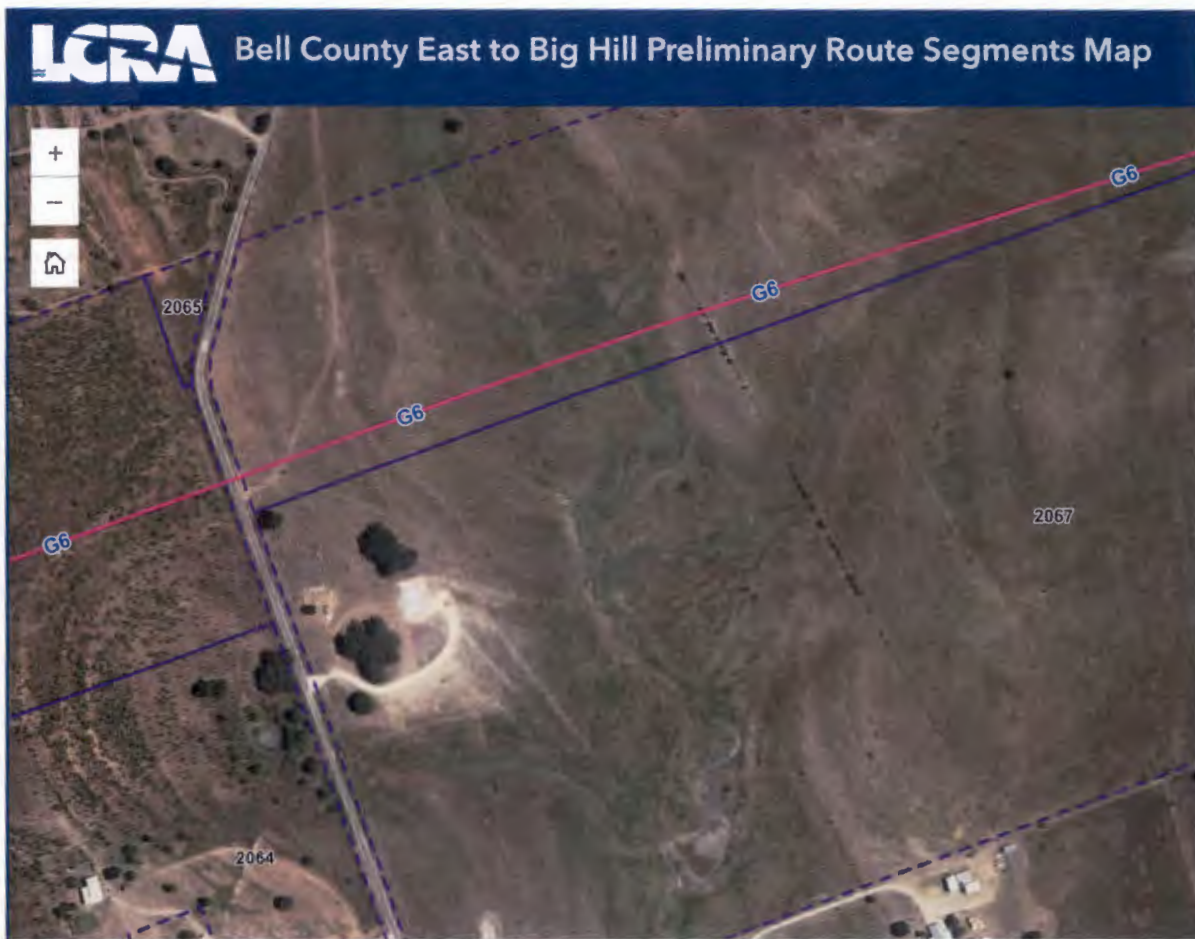

We are officers of the Glimp Family Trust and landowners in Burnet County with longstanding ties to the area. We write to oppose the proposed G-6, 765-kV transmission line. One of the proposed routes for this project cuts directly across our ranch, on CR 207 outside of Burnet. This proposal is devastating, and we urge you to help stop this project.

First, we want to tell you about the history of our ranch, which was purchased in the early 1900s. Four generations of our family have lived on this land, worked here, raised children, lived out their lives, actively contributing to their community. Thomas and Josie Glimp bought the land originally beginning in 1902; in 1941, Josie sold 307 acres of the family farm to her son, G.A. Glimp, and his wife, Anne Mae Glimp, who carried on the family business, raising Delaine Merino sheep, growing crops (cotton, oats, and corn), planting an orchard, and raising their own children, Hudson and Lela. G.A. built the main house, every barn, and every fence on the place himself. Hudson—who passed away in 2022—and Shirlie bought the ranch from G.A. and Anne Mae in 1972 and have worked to continue improving the farm and to uphold their legacy of caring for the land, as the Glimps have done for over a century. David and his sister, Ammie Busby, are the fourth generation of Glimps to own this property. The proposed power line is not just a multi-billion-dollar boondoggle, but also a scar across our land.

As taxpayers, we are deeply concerned about the fact that the project is moving forward without explicit legislative approval. It is also upsetting that there are almost no serious opportunities for input from the people who will be impacted by the project and that there has been only limited study of the impacts on rural Texans, utility ratepayers, and on taxpayers. Others no doubt will discuss the technical issues and will point out all the better options available to the PUC that parallel existing rights of way, or, better yet, that would build power generation facilities near the Permian Basin where the demand is greatest. Leaving aside the technical issues, the project will not serve the local communities through which the lines pass. A recent study predicts that utility bills for Texans will go up significantly. Again, these decisions are being made without legislative approval, with limited opportunity to study the impact of this project, and with almost no opportunity for serious public input. To us, the most important and heart-breaking issue is that the project potentially involves the state taking our land, violating our property rights just because unelected members of ERCOT and the PUC decide to do so. That's not right and the damage to our land will be irreparable.

We urge you to do something to stop this ill-advised project. Please intervene with the PUC to ensure a fair, lawful, and thorough review. Please reach out to all the relevant oversight bodies to protect the interests of private property owners and small farmers and ranchers in Texas. Help create opportunities for real, extended, and deliberate input by Texas citizens into this process.

Surely there are better solutions to meeting increasing energy demands in the state, solutions that don't involve the destruction of generations of history and that don't violate the rights of small ranchers and property owners.

Thank you for your attention to this critical matter. We are available to discuss our concerns further or to provide additional information. We sincerely hope you will stand with us in ensuring a just outcome.

RE: Public Comment Regarding Burnet County Intervention in Bell County East to Big Hill Transmission Project

My name is Ammie Busby, and I am the daughter of Shirlie Glimp, my sweet mom who I am so proud of, and who just spoke in opposition to the Bell County East to Big Hill transmission line proposed to cross Burnet County.

My portion of the Glimp Family Trust was deeded to me by my mother after my father passed, so I could fulfill my dream of building a home on the land I've loved my entire life and also to honor my father and my grandparents by continuing to care for the land that they dedicated their lives to. I'll spare you the family history and simply say that I, too, stand deeply in opposition to this line.

While I share my concerns with you, I want to point out that I've provided you each with two items:

1. A letter from my brother, David Glimp, who could not attend this meeting; and
2. A map showing that if the G6 route is chosen, everything my mother described in her speech will occur right outside the kitchen window of my brand-new little dream home. My house will be uninhabitable, and the land I've hoped to be a good steward of will be devastated and devalued. This is the harsh reality of eminent domain that many Burnet County residents now face.

To continue, I am concerned that while House Bill 5066 opened the door for this project, the specifics of how our increasing power needs are being met—including the use of three 765-kV lines, more than twice the magnitude of any currently in Texas—are being advanced at the commission level, not voted on by the Legislature. Which means they're not subject to direct review by representatives who could advocate for the landowners they serve.

It's also discouraging that opportunities for meaningful landowner input were early, limited, and easy to miss, and that Oncor's lack of response shows little regard for the feedback provided.

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I'm further troubled that the state's overall energy expansion plan is estimated to cost nearly \$33 billion, with those costs passed directly to ratepayers—many of whom, like me, will see no direct benefit. It's hard to accept that I could lose my home and my land for a project I'll then have to help pay for, while no power is even delivered to my community.

To close, I have three requests:

1. Please intervene with the PUC to ensure a fair, lawful, and thorough review of this project.
2. Please continue engaging with oversight bodies to protect private property owners and small farmers and ranchers.
3. Please send mailers to all Burnet County residents explaining the impact on their taxes, electric bills, and safety—before it's too late for them to have any meaningful opposition to the project.

Thank you for your time, and for your prior resolution opposing this line. Your leadership has already gained attention from multiple news outlets. You have standing, credibility, and a microphone we do not, and we're counting on you to continue standing with your constituents in Burnet County.

RE: Public Comment Regarding Burnet County Intervention in Bell County East to Big Hill Transmission Project

My name is Shirlie Glimp. The G6 route of the proposed 765 Kv high voltage line goes directly across my land, and within 500 feet of my daughter's brand new home. My late husband, Hudson Glimp, was born and raised in Burnet County, and was the third generation of Glimps to own this land that has been in our family for over a century. My children are the 4th generation.

I am here to express my strong opposition to Oncor building their 765 Kv high voltage power line on our property. If I understand this correctly... if Oncor decides on the G6 route, they will send a letter with an offer to buy an easement on our land and if we refuse to accept that offer they can use eminent domain which allows them to take my land anyway!

Without my permission, they will have it surveyed, and the spots marked to put 3 or 4 towers across my land. These towers are between 140 and 190 feet tall, and at their top they span 142 feet wide. In order to build these ugly towers, they will send in huge trucks and equipment to grate a path across my ranch, across the pasture land that my husband's family farmed for over a hundred years. They will cut through fences my father in law built, taking out trees and wildlife habitats and plants and everything in their path. They will dig gigantic holes to pour loads and loads of cement to make the pads for the towers to sit on. Then, they will bring even more trucks with the parts for the tower and more equipment to set up these towers. Then there will be truckloads of wire and equipment to put that in place. There will be so much more damage done to our land than just the approximately 2-3 hundred feet of easement that they are proposing. This project will require me to allow countless people on my property that I don't know, and I will not get to say who or when from the time they start building and moving forward forever, as they will come back year after year after year to do maintenance on the lines and in the easement.

These towers will stand for generations. Once they go up they will change everything... including how the land looks, how it is used, how safe my family feels there, and what my land is worth. These towers will be a constant reminder that our property isn't fully ours any more. Please help us keep Oncor off our land and out of Burnet County.
