Chandler Fire serves a community of over 269,000 residents in the Phoenix metropolitan area. The City of Chandler is considered a hub for innovation and technology in the Southwest, with companies such as Intel, Waymo, Wells Fargo, Bank of America, Paypal, Orbital ATK, Microchip, and NXP located within its borders. The State considers these companies to be critical infrastructure because a major disaster or terrorist event at one of these companies would threaten national security by creating political and economic effects at the local, regional and national levels. Additional critical infrastructure within the city includes water treatment facilities, Chandler Municipal Airport, Salt River Project transmission lines, Kinder Morgan Pipeline, and Chandler Regional Medical Center - a level 1 trauma facility.

Describe your financial need and how consistent it is with the intent of the AFG Program. The City of Chandler is currently facing several substantial financial and economic challenges. The first of these sources is the tremendous rising cost of water treatment, distribution, and wastewater collection for the city. According to the Arizona Department of Water Resources, Arizona has been in a state of drought since the mid-1990s. To ensure the long-term availability of clean water to its citizens, Chandler has budgeted over \$50,423,800 in capital projects in the next year alone to build and improve on its existing water and wastewater infrastructure. The second challenge that the city faces lies with the Arizona Public Safety Retirement System (PSPRS). This system has remained critically underfunded and will ultimately become unsustainable without substantial structural changes. In FY 2018-19, to help stabilize the PSPRS, the City of Chandler committed to making additional annual payments of \$5,000,000 for the next 11 fiscal years and is planning to increase its contributions by over 6.5% each year to pay down unfunded liabilities. In an effort to address these challenges, the city has been significantly reducing the annual budget of many of its departments. Chandler Fire's overall budget has contracted from \$53,159,915 in Fiscal Year (FY) 2017-18 to \$46,762,299 in FY 2021-22. This decrease represents an overall reduction of \$6,397,616 (12.03%) in funds. In that time, key detrimental cuts to the Department include a \$920,728 (20.46%) decrease to Department's administrative services and a \$468,375 (19.68%) decrease to the Department's health and medical services division. Unfortunately, this decrease in department budget coincides with a substantial increase in call volume and response times in the city's growing northern section. In an effort to mitigate these rapidly rising response times, the city is rebuilding one of its fire stations from the ground up to double its capacity and allow for an additional fire engine to be housed there. This

new station will help bring down response times in the area but will incur a substantial capital expense. Estimates for the station rebuild put the cost of the project at about \$8.5 million. The COVID-19 pandemic has also presented tremendous budgetary challenges to the Department. Since the beginning of the pandemic, the Chandler Fire Department has spent over \$200,000 on additional PPE and gear to ensure the safety of its firefighters. The Department has also accrued an additional \$569,123 in overtime due to COVID-related absences. These additional costs were not budgeted and had to be covered out of the Department's existing operations budget. To respond to these budget challenges, Chandler Fire has deemed it necessary to take two of its low acuity response units out of service for much of FY 2020-21. The firefighters that typically staffed these units were then used to provide sick leave coverage and lower department overtime costs. In addition, the Department has done a complete overhaul of its supply and materials distribution system and placed strict limits on station usage for materials like firefighting foam, medical supplies, and station supplies. The Chandler Fire Department brought a cancer screening program decision package for consideration in the FY 2021-22 City Budget. Unfortunately, this decision package was ultimately removed due to the high costs associated with the Department's Fire Academy and Paramedic schools occurring in FY 2021-22. Both the Fire Academy and the Paramedic school are required to occur in Fiscal Year 2021-22 to meet the minimum unit staffing requirements mandated by the Regional Phoenix Automatic Aid Agreement, and they could not be shifted to a later date. Due to these budget constraints, it will not be feasible for Chandler Fire to obtain City funding for this cancer screening program in the foreseeable future.

Over the course of the last five years, the Chandler Fire department has seen a substantial increase in the number of calls that it receives. In FY 2014/15 the department received 22,785 calls, and by FY 2020/21, this number had increased by over 15.4% to 26,293 calls. Much of this increased call volume can be attributed to the rapid growth and urbanization of the northern portion of the city. In an effort to mitigate these rapidly rising response times, the city is rebuilding one of its fire stations from the ground up to double its capacity and allow for an additional fire engine to

be housed there. This new station will help bring down response times in the area but will incur a substantial capital expense. Estimates for the station rebuild put the cost of the project at about \$8.5 million.

Please describe your organization and/or community that you serve. **The City of Chandler is located within Maricopa County and is one of many prominent suburbs in the Phoenix, Arizona, Metropolitan Statistical**

Area. It is partially bordered to the north and west by Tempe, to the north by Mesa, to the west by Phoenix, to the south by the Gila River Indian Community, and to the east by Gilbert. As of November 2021, the population of Chandler was estimated to be 269,123. The topography of the city is flat, and it has a total land area of 64.94 square miles. Chandler was founded in 1912 and later incorporated in 1920. On June 22, 1937, the first meeting of the Chandler Fire Department (CFD) was held. Initially staffed by volunteers, CFD's first paid Fire Chief was hired in 1953. In 1975, CFD added advanced emergency medical care by training three firefighters as paramedics. Since that time, CFD has evolved into an internationally accredited agency that operates 11 fire stations, a regional training facility, a fire administration building, and a mechanical maintenance facility. Presently, CFD provides fire, emergency medical, hazardous material, and technical rescue services to its residents and those of neighboring cities (under automatic and mutual aid agreements). In total, CFD responded to 25,964 emergency incidents in FY20-21, 73% of which were medical in nature. Currently, there are 238 sworn and civilian employees within the organization. All station personnel are EMT certified, and 122 of them are paramedics. Additional certifications held by Chandler firefighters include Hazmat, technical rescue, wildland firefighting, child passenger safety technician, and bilingual specializations.
