COMMISSIONER WEIGHT pointed out the Minutes need to be corrected to reflect "National *Register*" instead of "National Registry".

Action Agenda Item No. 1 Motion and Vote

COMMISSIONER WEIGHT moved to approve Action Agenda Item 1, of the January 31, 2022, Historic Preservation Commission Meeting, with correction; Seconded by COMMISSIONER SABA.

Motion carried unanimously (4-0).

2. Recommendation for Chandler to become a Certified Local Government (CLG)

DEREK HORN, DEVELOPMENT SERVICES DIRECTOR presented details regarding Historic Preservation Commission recommending City Council approve Chandler to become a Certified Local Government (CGL).

COMMISSIONER SABA stated there are many positives to becoming a CLG and asked if there are any downsides the Commission should be aware of.

DEREK HORN, DEVELOPMENT SERVICES DIRECTOR replied, there will be some reporting and grants that will take some staff working, but we do not have any discernible downsides.

COMMISSIONER WEIGHT thanked staff and expressed his appreciation for their work on this. He stated this is a great opportunity and mentioned the City does not have to pursue grant funds but having the option available is tremendous. He pointed out Chandler is the largest city in Arizona that is not a CLG and further stated the importance of Chandler obtaining status and recognition. He asked if the Historic Preservation Commission could be notified of the date this is going before City Council.

DEREK HORN, DEVELOPMENT SERVICES DIRECTOR responded this to go before the City Council in March and staff will inform the Commission of the date and time.

COMMISSIONER FINBRAATEN echoed the words of Commissioner Weight and stated she has seen the advantages from becoming a CLG and gave examples of different projects and ways grants from becoming a CLG could assist a city with funding.

Action Agenda Item No. 2 Motion and Vote

Move Historic Preservation Commission recommend City Council approve Chandler to become a Certified Local Government (CLG)

Finding no additional costs beyond minimal staff time investment and noted benefits, staff recommends Historic Preservation Commission recommend City Council approve Chandler to become a Certified Local Government (CLG).

COMMISSIONER SABA moved to approve Action Agenda Item 2 of the January 31, 2022, Historic Preservation Commission Meeting; Seconded by COMMISSIONER FINBRAATEN.

Motion carried unanimously (4-0).

3. PLH21-0093 CELONI HOSPITALITY LLC, DBA RECREO

SUSAN FIALA, SENIOR CITY PLANNER presented details regarding the request architectural plan review approval for new signage to the building located at 28 South San Marcos Place.

COMMISSIONER SABA stated the design is interesting and exciting. He asked if the image on the presentation is shown to scale. He further stated, when looking at the front of the building its hard to envision how close the sign would be to the windows.

NELS KREIPKE, CELONI HOSPITALITY LLC explained his inspiration for the project are his childhood daydreams of recess. He explained Recreo is Spanish for recess and the restaurant is filled with elements to trigger ideas of playtime, playground, and recess. He stated the elements include wall of etch-a-sketches, a wall of kickballs, images of playgrounds, a bar with swing seats, and a school bus on the patio. He further stated the logo itself is a VW Bug made into a weeble wobble or rocker. He expressed the importance of a first impression and how the sign, along with other elements would create a unique impactful impression. He further stated, uniqueness is something he tries to bring to Chandler, especially in the downtown area. He explained the image is close to scale and he measured the car himself. He further explained the details of the sign and stated they recently discovered the letters need to be 21 inches instead of 16 inches, so 6 inches longer than previously requested. He mentioned one of the reasons for the elements they have chosen are to make great images for social media posts. He explained the influence of posts on social media and the positive impact of tagging downtown Chandler on posts and pictures.

COMMISSIONER FINBRAATEN asked how the sign will be attached in a way that does not harm the building.

NELS KREIPKE, CELONI HOSPITALITY LLC stated he has owned this building for twenty-six years and the last thing he wants to do is cause harm. He explained there will be four bolts that will go through to a back steel plate welded to the car and through the wall and platted inside and a hole for the power source. He further stated the infliction caused by the sign will not be substantial and will certainly be repairable.

COMMISSIONER FINBRAATEN asked how much the vehicle weighs and noted due to the vehicle's design most of the weight would be carried in the back.

NELS KREIPKE, CELONI HOSPITALITY LLC stated he did not know the exact weight of the VW Bug, but it was shockingly light once all the unwanted parts were removed.

COMMISSIONER FINBRAATEN agreed that the VW Bug is light weight as they are a simpler car and stated when she thinks of the early twentieth century vehicles, she thinks of the Model T.

NELS KREIPKE, CELONI HOSPITALITY LLC stated he has been doing historic preservation for a while and his personal opinion can be different from other experts, but he believes the building should stand out because of its age and everything does not have to be held to that age. He explained it does not bother him from a historic preservation standpoint to do this and he would like to preserve the 1912 area of this building as much as possible. He further explained the fact that the car is from a different time tells a more interesting story and lets the 1912 architecture stand on its own.

COMMISSIONER SABA stated he had a similar reaction as Commissioner Finbraaten, but it helps when you think of it as a sign. He further stated we have a lot of different style signs on our buildings downtown and when he thought of it as a sign, it wasn't detracting.

COMMISSIONER FINBRAATEN stated Arizona is very eclectic and her difficulty with the sign is that is more 1950's stye.

NELS KREIPKE, CELONI HOSPITALITY LLC stated he agrees with Commissioner Saba. He further stated this sign will create the same if not more excitement as the signs for The Uncommon and Tipsy Egg. He mentioned social media has picked up on The Uncommon and Tipsy Egg and it has generated a lot of excitement.

COMMISSIONER FINBRAATEN stated she appreciates the Applicant generating excitement for downtown Chandler especially since there is a difficulty in getting people out again.

COMMISSIONER WEIGHT asked if other locations were considered for the vehicle element, such as, inside the building or near the newer more modern elements like the shipping container. He asked if that would be possible or if it had to be on the front of the building. He asked for assurance that the basic historic integrity of the building can be retained. He explained he is open to the concept of adding exciting elements, so long as there is assurance they can be reversed and the historic integrity is kept.

NELS KREIPKE, CELONI HOSPITALITY LLC agreed with Commissioner Weight and explained he does not want to do anything that would real damage to the front of the building or its historic nature. He stated that was the intent of going with a raceway, to reduce the number of holes and penetrations to the brick. He mentioned an example where a raceway was not used, he stated on the Thomas Building there is great frustration anytime a sign is removed since it leaves about forty holes. He explained the intent of using the raceway is to minimize damage and it will not touch the stucco or damage the brick, due to its placement on the overhang.

VICE CHAIRMAN VELASQUEZ confirmed the Applicant had a structural engineer on his team. He stated the magenta was a bit alarming at first, but not as shocking when considering the storyline and the transcending of time. He mentioned the year of the vehicle, 1967, is almost halfway between 1912 and 2022, and he liked the transition through time. He further stated he liked the bold elements and pointed out how momentum that can build from a social media presence.

NELS KREIPKE, CELONI HOSPITALITY LLC stated his intention is to elevate in every project he brings to downtown Chandler. He explained when he travels he tries to find the next big thing, then build upon it, and bring it to Chandler. He pointed out the need to be competitive and these elements are imperative to complete against other places.

VICE CHAIRMAN VELASQUEZ asked if these signs needed to be changed in ten years, would it structurally be an easy fix.

NELS KREIPKE, CELONI HOSPITALITY LLC answered absolutely, we do not want to damage these buildings.

COMMISSIONER SABA asked where the sign was located on the shipping container.

NELS KREIPKE, CELONI HOSPITALITY LLC responded it is sitting on the westernmost edge on top of a steel beam. He explained, it acts as a screen wall to the bathroom pipes and this idea was actually taken from Overstreet.

COMMISSIONER FINBRAATEN asked if the size of the numbers or letters will be modified to match the size of the letters on the front.

NELS KREIPKE, CELONI HOSPITALITY LLC stated the modification is not necessary on the backside as the neon style is different. He presented the corresponding image and stated the back scale is correct and the front letter will need to be tweaked. He further stated for scale the Commission can envision San Tan Brewery's sign who has letters that are 21 inches.

VICE CHAIRMAN VELASQUEZ asked if the sign in the back is lit and asked to clarify the request regarding the back sign.

NELS KREIPKE, CELONI HOSPITALITY LLC stated the back sign is to be lit in between the letters and explained the difference between the neon signs proposed on the front and back.

SUSAN FIALA, SENIOR CITY PLANNER clarified the proposed is for no neon on the back sign.

NELS KREIPKE, CELONI HOSPITALITY LLC advised the Commission that business owners are working with the Downtown Chandler Community Partnership (DCCP) to activate the alleyways.

He stated everyone is working to cleaning up the alley to make them more pedestrian friendly so Hidden House and the Stanley can connect to Downtown. He pointed out the additional elements in the back will complement what the DCCP is working on.

COMMISSIONER WEIGHT asked if the modification of the front sign to 21 inches meets staff's recommendation for approval.

SUSAN FIALA, SENIOR CITY PLANNER stated the increase to 21 inches would add up to 14 square feet total for signage, which is a minor increase and is still below the allowed square footage. She clarified staff does not have any issues as the square footage as it is not above the limit.

Proposed Motion:

Move Historic Preservation Commission recommend City Council adopt Resolution No. 5598 to establish the Southside Village Historic Conservation District in the area generally bounded by Arizona Avenue, Folley Street, Pecos Road and Delaware Street as recommended by staff.

Background/Discussion

In the fall of 2020 the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 4936 which established a historic preservation program for the City of Chandler. The ordinance includes four types of historic designations. One of these is Historic Conservation District. The purpose of this district is to designate an area with one or more historic properties and/or is associated with significant events and persons from the City's past. The main goals are encouraging preservation of the remaining architectural resources of the district along with recognizing its heritage and the contributions of its citizens to the community. A Historic Conservation District is honorific. It does not apply any additional land use entitlements or regulations.

The proposed Southside Village Historic Conservation District is generally bounded by Folley Street on the north, Pecos Road on the south, the Union Pacific Railroad tracks on the east, and Arizona Avenue on the west. This community dates back over 100 years and was Chandler's original African American and Latino community. In 2021 residents of the Southside Village partnered with Chandler 4 Change to establish the Southside Village Historic Conservation District. A request has been submitted by Village residents to designate the area between Folley Street on the north, Pecos Road on the south, the Union Pacific Railroad tracks on the east, and Arizona Avenue on the west.

The neighborhood was established more than a century ago, and its residents contributed significantly to the advancement of Chandler. It was home to many of the City's African American and Latino citizens. The historical significance of the Village is fundamentally due to the people who lived in the area. The neighborhood has fostered community leaders, attorneys, authors, social activists, politicians, doctors, entrepreneurs, and celebrities as well as other hard-working and industrious individuals. Some descendants of the first residents still live in Southside Village.

Some of the Village's residents and contributions include:

- Coy Payne, the first African American mayor in the state of Arizona;
- Zora Folley, a noted heavyweight champion who fought Muhammed Ali;
- Emma Arbuckle, a community activist who brought the first public housing project to Chandler;
- Nathan Johnson Harris, Chandler's first African American resident who worked as Dr. Chandler's chauffer and later established the Harris Barbeque Pit;
- Raul Navarrete, Chandler's first, and only so far, Latino mayor;
- Glen Lavon Woods, the first African American woman to sit on the Chandler Planning and Zoning Commission;
- Jeanette Woods-Decker, first African American judge from Southside Village;

The Village contains original houses built by its residents in the 1910's and 1920's along with others built later. Some early homes had dirt floors and did not have indoor plumbing. The Village also had facilities that served the community: grocery stores, restaurants, gas stations, a school, churches, a dance hall, and a roller rink. Many of the historic structures still exist. These include:

- Light and Life Church;
- Mt. Olive Missionary Baptist Church;
- Grace Memorial Church of God in Christ;
- Winn School (currently the Salvation Army);
- Roller Rink (Youth Club)
- Folly House
- Payne House
- Harris's Barbeque

Southside Village has provided leadership and support to the successful history and development of the City of Chandler. Attached is a narrative written by the residents that documents the history of the neighborhood, its development, culture, residents, commercial buildings, churches and housing. The resident application for Southside Village Historic Conservation District presents the opportunity to recognize the contributions of its citizens, past and present, and to encourage the preservation of its remaining architectural heritage.

Public/Neighborhood Outreach


- A neighborhood event was held in Harris Park on April 23, 2022, for Village residents and the Chandler community to gather, learn more about the proposed district, and sign petitions supporting creation of the Conservation District. Over 300 individuals, including property owners, residents, and individuals who attend worship services or otherwise have connections, interest, and/or interact with the neighborhood signed petitions indicating support.
- 41 property owners in the district support the district by petition. The City owns 42 parcels and also supports the resolution. There are about 220 parcels in the proposed district.
- This request was noticed in accordance with the Chandler Zoning Code.
- Two signs were posted at visible locations in the district that provide information about the district and public hearings schedules.
- Staff received one e-mail from a property owner who had questions about the district.
- As of the writing of this memo, staff is unaware of any opposition to this request.




Vicinity Maps Southside Village Historic Neighborhood Map Resolution 5598 Southside Village Conservation District Narrative Petitions

RESOLUTION NO. 5598

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CHANDLER, ARIZONA, DESIGNATING THE SOUTHSIDE VILLAGE NEIGHBORHOOD AS A HISTORIC CONSERVATION DISTRICT TO HONOR THE HISTORY AND HERITAGE OF SOUTHSIDE VILLAGE, LOCATED IN THE SOUTHEAST QUADRANT OF ARIZONA AVENUE AND FRYE ROAD BOUNDED BY ARIZONA AVENUE TO THE UNION PACIFIC RAILROAD TRACKS AND BY FRYE ROAD TO PECOS ROAD.

WHEREAS, on November 2, 2020, the Chandler City Council adopted Ordinance 4936, creating a historic preservation program and allowing the Chandler City Council to adopt historic designations for properties; and

WHEREAS, the Historic Conservation District is one such designation that serves to recognize the history of a given district and encourage preservation of remaining historic context; and

WHEREAS, a group of Southside Village residents applied for a Historic Conservation District to be established in their community; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on June 30, 2022, by the Historic Preservation Commission to consider public input regarding the proposed Historic Conservation District; and

WHEREAS, the Chandler City Council recognizes the importance of honoring and encouraging the preservation of historic resources; and

WHEREAS, the Chandler City Council recognizes the Southside Village neighborhood as a place of historic importance to the City of Chandler.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Chandler, Arizona, as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> Designates the Southside Village neighborhood of Chandler as a Historic Conservation District. A map depicting the territory contained in the Southside Village Historic Conservation District is attached as Exhibit A to this Resolution.

The Southside Village Conservation District Narrative

The people of the neighborhood referred to as "Southside Village" are submitting this request to become a Historical Conservation District in Chandler. Southside Village encompasses the area south of Folley Street to Pecos Road and west side of Washington Street to the east side of Delaware Street beginning in the 400-block going south, with some exceptions such as including the Light and Life Church and excluding the 300 block of Washington and Delaware Streets. It includes the area that is labeled "Historical South Chandler Neighborhood" on City of Chandler maps. This neighborhood was formed more than a century ago. During this time, the residents have significantly contributed to the advancement of Chandler. The rich history of the neighborhood should be preserved for future generations. This narrative is but a summary of it.

Chandler Economy

The early economy of Chandler was based mainly on agriculture. The original residents of Southside Village provided much of the farm labor necessary for the cotton industry to flourish. In addition to being hard working and industrious individuals, the early residents formed a strong community that supported each other. When discussing possible names for this district, Southside Village was agreed upon because the neighborhood residents referred to the area as "Southside" and because "Village" has the connotation of being collaborative and supportive. People in the neighborhood looked out for each other and worked together to uplift one another. Residents of Southside Village became doctors, lawyers, authors, teachers, celebrities, politicians, entrepreneurs, social activists, and good-hearted, hard-working people.

The buildings in this community reflect historically significant architecture with properties dating back to 1920 and includes 67 residential properties that are at least fifty years old.

The Neighborhood

The Southside Village was not originally considered part of the City of Chandler. It was called the Winn Addition or Southside. In addition, it has been known as Mexican Town, The Barrio, South Chandler, and Historic South Chandler Neighborhood. The Winn Addition was initially established by Dr. A. J. Chandler in 1912. Because of strict zoning practices in Chandler, the area was set aside for people of color and those without sufficient resources to live elsewhere. It originally consisted of one hundred lots. Most of the lots were sold to Hispanic laborers.

The historical significance of the neighborhood is due to the industrious residents who built their lives on those one hundred lots. The community that rose from the desert south of the City of Chandler became key to the success of the entire region.

Southside Village Boundaries – Not including Frye Road, Steelyard Olympus Apartments, or Arizona Avenue. It includes the area specified on City of Chandler maps called South Chandler Historic Neighborhood.

Statistics by Historical Consideration – This designation has to do with analysis from Chandler4Change (C4C) based on city and county records.

Of the 127 single family homes, 67 or 53% of the homes are 50 years old or older. There are also three homes that were built before 1972 with modification sometime during the 1970s and potentially could be considered historical. Although not all homes that are of the 50 years and older are architecturally significant, many would have that designation.

Of the 127 single family homes, 67 seem to be owner occupied. Thirty-six of these owneroccupied residences are in the potential historical home designation. The result is 54% of the potentially historical homes are expected to be owner-occupied. For some of the other potentially historical single-family homes, the owner lives in the neighborhood. All of the churches were built before 1972 but some have undergone architectural changes.

Historical Location

In 1910, Chandler was growing and needed more farm laborers. Although people came to Chandler for a variety of reasons, many people of Mexican descent moved to Chandler seeking a better life and to escape Mexico's violent revolution. Sharecroppers economically shackled throughout the South were encouraged to escape their economic slavery and come to Chandler. There were people from this neighborhood who would go to locations in Oklahoma and Texas to encourage people to move to Chandler. They would transport the families to Chandler in their truck. Many times, new arrivals would live in Eleven-Mile Corner area on farms in tents before later deciding to move to Chandler.

In 1912, there were strict zoning and segregation laws forcing poor and minority residents to live in the cheaper neighborhoods south of Chandler's downtown. The Winn Addition neighborhood was specifically set aside by Dr. A.J. Chandler for poor people and people of color. This resulted in one hundred residential lots which were originally inhabited by people of Mexican descent, but they were joined by African Americans during the 1920s as part of the Great Migration. In addition, the Great Dust Bowl in the 1930s drove even more people of color to Chandler.

The Winn Addition was established without any water rights. The lots were sold for \$25 each. The original streets were Hidalgo, Saragosa, and Morelos. Hidalgo Street is east of the petition neighborhood. In 1940 the Kesler Addition added Kesler Lane, up to Pecos Road. In 1946, the Dobson Addition added the land north of Fairview Road and south of Frye Road. Street names were changed over time. For example, Frye Road was originally called Denver Street and unofficially, Ice House Road. Streets were dirt and were not maintained as part of Chandler until 1953, when the area officially became part of the city of Chandler. At that time, the

neighborhood residents petitioned to be included in the City of Chandler due to unsanitary conditions. The Chandler Town Superintendent reported that the lack of City services could cause an epidemic, and therefore, recommended annexing this area.

Because the neighborhood didn't have any water rights, local residents had three options to obtain water. They could buy water from the Bosewell Cotton Gin or Arizona Edison Company Ice Plant, or collect water from the irrigation canal. After the successful efforts of Pluarco Garcia to petition the City of Chandler in 1934 to lay water and sewer pipes, the community was able to purchase clean water from the Pecos Valley. In order to make a compelling proposal, Mr. Garcia, President of the Latin American Club, Chandler Chapter, offered to provide four hundred workers to do the job, if the city would approve the sewer and water project, thereby significantly reducing the cost of the project to the city.

Many laborers were employed by local farms such as Goodyear, Goodson, Bogle, Dobson, and Boswell. Other employers included San Marcos Hotel, Sante Fe Railroad, Spreckels Sugar Company (1964), and Harry Winston Minerals of Arizona, United Mobile Homes, Pima Valve, and Rogers Corporation (1967).

The Southside Village founding families included the Arbuckle, Benites, Cardenas, Duenas, Escandon, Folley, Harris, Jones, Navarrete, Payne, Rodriguez, Rubio, Soto, Turner, Woods and other families. Descendants of these founding families still live in the area today. Many of these families have been recognized for their contributions to Chandler with their names attached to City landmarks. Some examples are Folley Park, Folley Street, N. J. Harris Park, Emma Arbuckle Park, and the Coy Payne Gymnasium at Chandler High School.

The historical significance of Southside Village is fundamentally due to the people who lived in the area. In addition to the important impact their labor had on the success and growth of Chandler, the community they built despite racial, economic, and educational obstacles contributed to the wider Chandler community. Residents living in Southside Village submitted a petition to the Chandler School Board in June 1929 requesting a school be built for their children in their neighborhood. Unfortunately, the African American students were not allowed to attend this neighborhood school because of segregation until 1949. Prior to that time, the African American students were bussed to Goodyear (also known as Ocotillo School) many miles to the south. Desegregation was accomplished through the efforts of Carlanthe Turner and Emma Arbuckle. Over the years, people in this neighborhood petitioned for more sanitary conditions on several occasions when health conditions warranted improvement, such as the efforts of Glen LaVon Woods relocating a cow pen that was too close to the neighborhood and causing significant issues with flies and diseases.

Many neighborhood locations contributed to the strength of the community. These places provided necessities and entertainment. Since the people of this neighborhood were not allowed to be respected patrons of other establishments in Chandler, the community developed their own resources, providing grocery stores, restaurants, taverns, and other forms of entertainment. Some of these locations may not have been intended for enjoyment but became an important part of the community life, such as the Ice House. Saragosa and Morelos Streets evolved to be the hub of the community commerce. Although not all the following locations may be historically significant to the city, many were culturally significant to the lives of the people at the time.

Southside Village Culture

Southside Village community was made up of business leaders, community leaders, and positive mentors who encouraged the virtues of honesty and hard work. Initially, many people came to Eleven Mile Corner to work on farms and were housed on the farms in tents. As people became more affluent, they were able to move to Chandler. People also saw business opportunities in Chandler to start businesses that supported the local farms. Some people also decided that working in construction, working on the San Marcos Hotel was a desirable employment choices or supporting the grounds maintenance.

Southside Village Churches

The churches were a considerable influence in the neighborhood and helped to build and strengthen the community. Many of the churches started with tents before building more permanent structures. The churches were pivotal spiritual and social entities. They were a source of strength for many people who suffered terrible hardships. The churches that were significant to the people of Southside Village are listed below, some with historical significance in the neighborhood.

Southside Village Housing

Many people built their own homes by the sweat of their own labor. Some homes started as very simple and were later enhanced to include more rooms and more modern conveniences. Some people purchased homes from the Gila River Internment Camp after it was no longer

used to keep Japanese detainees. The houses from the internment camp were sold cheaply, but the cost of moving them to Southside Village was much more significant.

The neighborhood community was one that fostered cooperation and friendship. People looked out for each other's children and helped each other in time of need. There are numerous stories of people cooking for others during time of loss. There were stories of people being nursed to health by Dr. Buckle or Dr. Arbuckle. Emma Arbuckle did not have a doctor's license but was always ready to help those in need. She had a lot of home remedies and knew how to help others. There were stories from those growing up about neighbors who would report to parents when children misbehaved because they believed in the old adage of "it takes a village to raise a child." There were long-lasting close friendships between families from all ethnic backgrounds.

People and Their Contributions to Chandler

This neighborhood has fostered lawyers, authors, social activists, politicians, doctors, entrepreneurs, and celebrities, along with a host of good, industrious individuals. There were many firsts that originated in the neighborhood which propelled Chandler forward to be a better place to live for everyone. The conditions of segregation meant that people of color were not allowed in a variety of locations including restaurants, grocery stores, entertainment locations such movie theaters, roller-skating rinks, dance halls, and swimming pools. In some places even if they were allowed to go, the indignation was so extreme that it was not worth the effort. The community had to develop its own entertainment and in doing so, developed a sense of pride.

People of Mexican descent originally settled the neighborhood. Some of the first residents were Miguel Fernando and Rita Echevarria Benites. They relocated to the area in 1912. In 1928, the adobe Light and Life Church was built for the local LatinX people. It still stands today. The first and only LatinX mayor, Raul Navarrete, came from this neighborhood. There is also immense pride in those that helped build the adobe St. Mary's Catholic Church on Chandler Blvd, which is now located on Galveston.

The first documented African American to come to Chandler was N.J. Harris. He came to Chandler to be Dr. A.J. Chandler's chauffer. After he retired, Mr. Harris converted the decommissioned first water tower in the area into the BBQ Pit/Harris' Barbeque which his daughter, Alberta Harris Jacko, ran as the longest running Black Female-owned business in Chandler. She also provided lodging for farm workers and food for those down on their luck. The BBQ Pit still stands.

Many of these leaders' contribution was much more involved that what they did on the above list. People talked about how Billy Woods and Lefty Soto were so influential in their efforts of guiding the young people. Billy would teach the young men skills that would help them to get jobs. Billy would sometimes take the boys to the fields to work, paying them for their efforts. In doing so they learned the skills to work in the field, but they also learned the value of hard work. Billy would also spare with Zora Folley on Sunday. Children would complain that another neighbor would see them doing something they shouldn't be doing and report to their parents. All these factors helped this neighborhood be a real community, a village.

Architecturally Distinct

The original houses were built by the owners in the 1910s and 1920s, as well as later. The early homes definitely didn't have indoor plumbing and frequently had dirt floors. The larger part of the growth of this area took place between 1930s to 1950s. This was when Chandler was thriving and growing and needed more farm workers. However, as farm equipment became more automated in the late 1950s and 1960s, fewer workers were needed on the farms, so people turned to other jobs. Many of the older homes have maintained the Mid-century architecture, especially on Saragosa and Morelas Streets. Some of the homes in this area were buildings used in the Japanese internment camps. Most, if not all, of the internment camp housing has been replaced with newer and better built homes.

Summary

In summary, Southside Village has provided leadership and support to the successful history of the City of Chandler. This neighborhood has contributed to the development of Chandler and was essential to its growth. It is a distinctive community full of not only remarkable people and places, but has shown a culture that supports a very positive, warm, and inviting nature. The architecture in the neighborhood, obviously, displays elements of Chandler's heritage and are significant parts of Chandler's history. The neighborhood would like to be recognized for its important contributions and its distinctive nature that it would like to retain. The Southside Village should be designated a City of Chandler Historical Conservation District.

The area between Arizona Avenue to the east side of Delaware Street and from Frye Road to Pecos Road is historically, culturally, and architecturally significant to Chandler and played a significant role of the early development of Chandler.

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

Proposed Motion:

Move Historic Preservation Commission approve PLH22-0033 Maple House, architectural plan review for a new commercial building subject to conditions as recommended by Planning staff.

Background/Discussion

Staff have been working with the applicant for the last year to come up with a proposal that is both consistent with the mid-century characteristic of downtown and feasible from a build-out standpoint. The proposed structure takes inspiration from the home that existed previously onsite before its demolition due to structural concerns in early spring of this year. The use of an offset cascading roofline is reminiscent of the mid-century home previously onsite and the use of standing seam metal keeps a human scale while not over complicating the exterior finish. The scale of the proposed structure is similar to that of the previous structure and of surrounding structures still extant, contributing to its conformance to and compatibility with the CCD. The site is designed as to feel quasi-residential and somewhat private, while still maintaining view-sheds into the site, much like the Hidden House. Finding that the proposed materials and scale conform to mid-century architecture, staff recommends approval with conditions.

National Register of Historic Places:

The subject building is not on the National Register.




Upon finding the proposed exterior signs to complement the existing Early Twentieth Century Commercial style of architecture, Planning staff recommends the Historic Preservation Committee approve PLH22-0033 Maple House, located at 198 W. Boston Street, subject to the following conditions.


- 1. Development shall be in substantial conformance with Exhibit A, kept on file in the City of Chandler Planning Division, in File No. PLH22-033 Maple House.
- 2. The perimeter walls shall be enhanced as to have appropriately spaced, substantial columns of a differing material and the height of the perimeter wall shall be varied, ranging from 6' in height to 3' in height, as approved by the Zoning Administrator.

ACCESSIBILITY GENERAL NOTES: SITE PLAN GENERAL NOTES:

- Accessible entrances to the bldg. shall be identified by the international symbol of accessibility

- M. Accessible routes shall serve as exits or connect to areas of rescue assistance.
- N. No item shall protrude more than 4" from surface of wall along an accessible way between 27" and 80" a.f.f.


