DARSY SMITH, Planner, presented the following presentation.

- Location: Northeast corner of Ocotillo Road and the Union Pacific Railroad
- Surrounding Land Uses:
 - o North: Vacant land in Maricopa County
 - o South: Ocotillo Road then Residential
 - o East: Vacant land for a light industrial park
 - o West: The Union Pacific Railroad
- Background
 - o Subject site is approximately 22.19 acres
 - o In 2022, Dominion purchased the site with intent to build affordable housing and senior living
 - o In late 2022, due to opposition, Maricopa County indefinitely continued the rezoning case to work with the City of Chandler on an acceptable proposal
- Background
 - o In 2025, Evergreen purchased site, and recorded a pre-annexation agreement stating that the property will be zoned in the County, and annexed/ developed in the City
 - o In November 2025, Maricopa approved rezoning of property to General Industrial (IND-2) Zoning District with an IUPD overlay within Maricopa County
 - o Initial City Zoning will be Planned Industrial district (I-1)/ Planned Area Development (PAD) restricting permitted uses for the two parcels
- Request
 - o Per the pre-annexation agreement, planning staff is reviewing plans for a light-industrial development
 - o Per the agreement, after receiving plan approval and prior to construction the property is to be annexed
- General Plan Designation of Employment
 - o Chandler Airpark Area Plan Designation of Industrial
 - o The City of Chandler will provide water and wastewater to the subject property
 - o The developer has been in contact with various City departments through the review of the proposed industrial development

MAYOR HARTKE asked how much was budgeted for trap neuter return (TNR) support.

JOHN POMBIER, City Manager, replied that \$30,000 of this next fiscal year's budget was allocated for trap neuter return support, which is the same as the current fiscal year.

MAYOR HARTKE asked if there were additional funds contributed to the allocation for this item in the current year.

MR. POMBIER said yes, there were a few additional programs through the year contributing to a total amount of \$50,000 for the current fiscal year.

MAYOR HARTKE noted comment cards were received regarding this item and would be included as part of the record.

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MAYOR HARTKE invited speakers for item 20.

JENNIFER MCTIGHE, 1426 N. Comanche Dr., Chandler, AZ, shared that she is the director of a local kitten rescue organization. In the past year she has trapped over 75 community cats with support from Chandler's trap, neuter, return program. There are an estimated 75-100 cats remaining in the neighborhood that have not been neutered; without intervention the feral cat population continues to grow. Neighbors are working together to address this issue through the TNR program, but without continued financial support, the burden shifts from organizations to their volunteers. She encouraged continued support for Chandler's TNR funding.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked about the cost of the procedure.

MS. MCTIGHE said the current cost is \$65 per procedure.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked if this cost has increased since the city's initial funding amount.

MS. MCTIGHE stated she did not have that information. She shared that without city funding; a procedure would cost around \$100.

COUNCILMEMBER ELLIS asked if education efforts are a part of the organization's focus.

MS. MCTIGHE said yes, education includes how to deal with feral kittens, feral cat deterrents, colony care, and involvement in the TNR program. Prevention is an important part of the program.

SUE HARRINGTON, 671 N. Madrid Ln., Chandler, AZ, shared that the TNR program is vital to the Chandler community which is impacted by outdoor cats. She shared that the program was created to control the overpopulation of feral cats, and estimates suggest that there are over 500,000 outdoor cats in Maricopa County. Continual funding is important to address the cycle of feral cats. She requested Council consider an increase in funding the program.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked if Ms. Harrington is a volunteer.

MS. HARRINGTON said she is a volunteer.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked if funds go directly to TNR efforts, without compensation for volunteers.

MS. HARRINGTON said that is correct. Volunteers often fund TNR efforts personally.

TIA HAYES, 881 N. Layman St., Chandler, AZ shared information about Maryland, Texas, and New Jersey state legislature efforts to fund TNR programs. She shared that these laws establish a uniform and humane framework for community cats and establishes a statewide TNR program and policy with continual funding. She shared support for continuing TNR funding in Chandler.

MICHON JAVELOSA, 255 N. Colorado St., Chandler, AZ, shared she works with the organization Saving One Life which is supported by Chandler funding for TNR. She shared that every instance of TNR involves work from Chandler community members who care about helping cats and their neighborhoods. Since January 1, 2026, the program has helped 600 cats. Many volunteers spend their time and money to support the program. City funds make an impact on this program as the value returned to the community exceeds the dollars invested. She invited Council to participate in a TNR ride along for a firsthand experience of the program. She requested the city continue and expand funding for TNR programs.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked about the costs of TNR currently compared to previous years.

MS. JAVELOSA said the current cost is \$65 per procedure, with costs up to \$125 at walk in clinics. The cost used to be around \$25-\$35 per procedure 10-15 years ago. Costs have increased over time.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked if the availability of veterinary services is a challenge.

MS. JAVELOSA said yes.

VICE MAYOR ENCINAS asked if there is a specific geographic area in Chandler with feral cats.

MS. JAVELOSA explained that the concentration of feral cats tends to cluster around lower socioeconomic regions, Downtown Chandler, trailer parks, apartment complexes, and high density areas.

VICE MAYOR ENCINAS asked about communication with property management and owners.

MS. JAVELOSA shared that the organization works to combat myths and misinformation about TNR. The organization works with HOA managers and property management to demonstrate what community cat management can look like and how it can have a positive effect on nuisance behaviors.

KATHRYN MARTINEZ, 3850 W. Whitten St., Chandler, AZ, shared that volunteers who work with TNR programs also put in hours fostering cats and supporting the cause in other ways. She shared that the TNR program grants residents relief providing answers on how to manage community cats. Residents have shared the program has outlined a humane and organized path to care for colonies and work towards solutions. This program has helped reduce neighborhood conflict due to resident buy in and involvement. She requested Council continue and expand TNR funding.

CARRIE NEIDORF, Gilbert, AZ, shared she is the executive director of Saving One Life, the vendor partner for the community cat program in Chandler. She expressed this program is not about sterilization, but about community partnership to find a humane and responsible solution for feral cats. Saving One Life provides education and outreach to residents about humane community cat management. The organization helps build long-term solutions and addresses the root cause of overpopulation. City funding is amplified by extensive volunteer labor and nonprofit support. The city pays for direct services which include surgeries and traps, other costs are underwritten by Saving One Life or by volunteers.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO shared that he planned to request funds in the amount of \$20,000 additional dollars through the Council budget amendment process. He asked City Manager that with Council approval tonight, an additional \$20,000 could be allocated for this program. He stated that the previous fiscal year, the total amount budgeted for the program was \$68,000.

MR. POMBIER stated that he believed the current fiscal year total allocation to this program is \$47,000.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO requested an additional \$20,000 could be allocated for this program in addition to his future budget amendment request for a total of \$70,000. He shared that if not addressed, feral cat populations can have a large impact on neighborhoods. He supported funding this program to address cat populations. He inquired about federal grants to support these programs.

COUNCILMEMBER ELLIS supported looking into federal funding to support these programs.

MAYOR HARTKE said he supports looking into more options beyond a budget amendment and federal grants.

COUNCILMEMBER ELLIS asked if funding for this project is from ongoing dollars or grant funds.

LEAH POWELL, Deputy City Manager, explained that funding is ongoing general fund dollars. There have not been any grant funds received to fund TNR programs at the city. The city used to use the neighborhood grant program and neighborhood assistance program to fund TNR efforts in particular neighborhoods. In that case, each neighborhood would apply for funds. In order to streamline efforts, the city put out a request for proposal seeking a provider, which was granted to Saving One Life. Saving One Life now administers that program rather than individual neighborhoods through the neighborhood grant program.

COUNCILMEMBER ELLIS said she wished to find money through other resources rather than making an amendment to Item 20 for the tentative budget adoption.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO clarified that his request would be to advocate for \$20,000 in additional funding through the budget amendment process. He asked if the city would then look into federal funding for this program.

MS. POWELL explained that previously federal funds have not been used for TNR efforts in Chandler. She shared that some federal funds such as Community Development Block Grant funds cannot be used for this purpose. Staff can investigate other federal grant funding options.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO requested staff research federal grant fund opportunities for TNR.

MAYOR HARTKE requested staff follow up. Mayor Hartke thanked staff for their work on the FY 2026-27 Budget and 2027-2036 CIP.

Action Agenda Item 20 Motion and Vote

Vice Mayor Encinas moved to pass and adopt Resolution No. 6006, adopting the FY 2026-27 Tentative Budget and 2027-2036 Tentative CIP and giving notice of the dates and times for hearing taxpayers for final adoption of the budget, and for setting the tax levies and tax rates; Seconded by Councilmember Ellis.

Motion carried unanimously (6-0), Councilmember Hawkins absent excused.

Action Agenda Item 14

14. Renewal of Fixed Camera Automated License Plate Reader (ALPR) Solution
Move City Council approve the renewal of fixed camera automated license plate reader (ALPR) solutions, from Flock Group, Inc., utilizing the City of Tempe Contract No. T21-119-01, in an amount not to exceed \$153,400.

MAYOR HARTKE requested a presentation on Item 14.

BRYAN CHAPMAN, Police Chief, commented that the department shared a formal presentation on Monday, May 18 at the City Council Study Session. Any follow up questions from that presentation were answered and distributed to Council through the City Manager's Office.

MAYOR HARTKE noted that a question brought up in previous discussion was regarding automated license plate readers (ALPR) in an area around Galveston elementary school. He asked about the policy of including these cameras in those areas.

CHIEF CHAPMAN explained that the automated license plate readers are not placed in neighborhoods they are placed at intersections and thoroughfares. The readers do not track the movement of people; they are focused on the movement of traffic.

MAYOR HARTKE shared that some comments received referenced Flock cameras placed in the area close to Galveston elementary school. He asked for an explanation of the placement of the cameras in that area.

CHIEF CHAPMAN stated that Council has been provided locations of all the cameras within the city. He said he is not aware of any cameras at the Galveston elementary school specifically. That would not align with the policy where cameras are placed specifically in high vehicle density traffic and on major thoroughfares and intersections.

MAYOR HARTKE asked if any other staff could provide an answer regarding the location of cameras placed around Galveston elementary school.

MICHELLE DENTON, Police Communications Technology Senior Manager, answered that the closest cameras in that vicinity are located at McQueen and Arizona Avenue on the major thoroughfares.

MAYOR HARTKE stated that previously gunshot detection devices were also located in that vicinity. He asked if there are any other items located in that area related to Flock cameras.

MS. DENTON explained that the gunshot detection devices have been removed, there are no other items in that area.

MAYOR HARTKE asked to confirm there are no cameras at Galveston School or anywhere off of Hamilton Street or in the vicinity related to the items being discussed tonight.

MS. DENTON confirmed.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked where does collected data go.

CHIEF CHAPMAN answered that the Chandler Police Department owns all the information, it is retained through the city. Flock does not retain the data. Flock is a vendor that provides cameras for their technology. The department takes the information, houses it, and then purges it.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked where does the data go when it leaves or gets here. He referred to the cloud system in Flock.

KATIE DAUPHINAIS, Flock Safety, stated that Chandler owns 100% of their data. The data is captured on the camera, encrypted, and then moved to encrypted cloud storage. All data is purged after 30 days.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked where the location of the cloud storage facility is.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said the cloud storage is an Amazon Web Services (AWS) cloud platform. The AWS cloud services Flock uses are to the highest levels of compliance such as Criminal Justice Information Services (CJIS), System and Organization Controls 2 (SOC2), and National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) certified. The cloud is typically where higher security clearance data is stored in the AWS system.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked about a hypothetical where an Attorney General were to request information captured to Flock, would that information be made immediately available.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said any access to data captured by Flock would need to be requested through the formal process through the courts. If there was a warrant served, Flock would notify the city of the warrant.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked how Flock protects the 4th Amendment rights of citizens.

MS. DAUPHINAIS explained that numerous courts across the country have unanimously agreed that ALPR technology does not violate 4th Amendment rights. The most recent case was located in Richmond, Virginia where the court unanimously agreed that ALPR technology does not violate the 4th Amendment. She said she could share additional information with Council regarding recent court cases.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked what kind of data is captured.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said ALPR technology takes a picture of a public license plate on a public roadway at certain points in time. It does not track movement.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked about Flock Safety data protections, to ensure that the data collected is not used for financial gain.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said Flock does not own the data of the City of Chandler and Flock does not sell the city's data. This is written in Flock and Chandler's contract.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked if Flock Safety conducts studies or research on data collected through Flock for any purpose.

MS. DAUPHINAIS clarified that Councilmember Harris was asking about improving the ability of Flock cameras such as clearer photos.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS said yes.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said yes, Flock Safety works to continuously improve their product to make sure it is a more effective tool for law enforcement to use. Flock also emphasizes that this is a tool for law enforcement to use, human judgement needs to be exercised in any use of the tool. She said that she cannot share the specifics of how improvement of the products is conducted.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS shared that he researched another product in Flock Safety, the Drone as First Responder, which has 2,000 feet of zoom capability and it can cover 50 square miles. He asked how that program works and if facial recognition is used in collecting this data.

MS. DAUPHINAIS explained that the Drone as First Responder (DFR) program is a forward-facing camera that does not collect information en route to a scene. It does not use any facial recognition technology. There must be a human drone operator to operate the system, it does not fly with AI software.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS shared concerns with the range and capabilities of Flock's DFR technology.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said the City of Chandler does not use Flock Safety's DFR products. She can share more information about the technology, but it is not used in Chandler.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked about who has oversight over Chandler's ALPR program.

JOHN POMBIER, City Manager, said that City Council has oversight into city actions. If it is a policy issue, Council sets the policy direction that is executed by the City Manager, and city staff follows. The City Manager has the purview to set operating decisions, but City Council retains oversight into the City Manager's actions. The City Council is the oversight body for the organization.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS spoke about the Flock company having a nationwide system containing license plates and being scanned into a system. He stated that investigations by civil rights and technology groups show agencies routinely running large numbers of broad open-ended searches. He said that in some cities, federal agencies have used Flock data despite local promises to limit that kind of cooperation. Once a resident's movement is entered into the ecosystem and it is difficult to maintain who can look at these records and for what purpose. He shared concerns with the misuse and abuse of Flock in other cities which harms communities. He said his concern is with community trust and local control, he shared support for tools that keep neighborhoods safe, but powerful technology without strong guardrails affects marginalized communities. If residents believe they are being tracked, it undermines trust in the Police Department and Council. He requested to pause the renewal of the ALPR from Flock, consider how it is used currently by using the audit tools, and survey how Chandler's data is shared with other agencies. He suggested developing a citywide surveillance and governance ordinance to set policy and Council oversight over this subject. He proposed Council form a committee of residents and staff to review any proposed acquisition, renewal, or expansion of surveillance tools and report out to Council.

CHIEF CHAPMAN shared that the Police Department is guided by policy, training, and systems of accountability. Any technology used by the city is vetted through the city's IT Department, they ensure there are appropriate safeguards and that the vendor meets stringent criteria for data safety. He stated that he shares monthly reports with the City Manager's Office regarding the operation of the Real Time Operation Center, where Flock is utilized. He said this information could be requested through a public record request for transparency and emphasized the importance of transparency. Flock ALPR captures vehicle information, not information on people. The Police Department is sensitive to the data collected and what it is used for. The department is consistent with best practices in policing across the state and across the nation. There are internal safeguards around misuse of the data and the systems. If it is misused, the employee would be terminated because it is a violation of public trust and internal credibility. Flock is a technology vendor in the City of Chandler where technology is being leveraged daily to improve efficiency and timeliness. The City of Chandler has leveraged the ALPR software to fight crime successfully, while upholding practices of accountability and transparency.

MAYOR HARTKE asked in response to Councilmember Harris' proposal to pause the renewal of the contract with Flock, how would the Police Department be affected.

CHIEF CHAPMAN said the department is waiting on Council action to move forward with the renewal of the contract. The Police Department is utilizing and operating Flock software under the assumption of the previous contract.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked when Council first voted on the contract with Flock.

MS. DENTON said there are two contracts with Flock, this agenda item is to merge them. The first contract expired in March 2026, the second one goes through March 2027.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked when did Council first approve the first contract.

MS. DENTON said Council unanimously approved the first contract for 14 Flock cameras in March 2023.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked when Council voted on the second contract.

MS. DENTON said the second contract for 26 Flock cameras was approved by Council unanimously in May 2025.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO clarified that item 14 was in regard to renewing the first contract for 14 Flock cameras initially approved in March 2023, which expired in March 2026.

MS. DENTON said that was correct and item 14 would also merge the two contracts for administrative purposes. The only one out of contract is the first 14 Flock cameras.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO clarified that if item 14 is not approved by Council, then there is still an active Flock contract for 24 Flock cameras that will expire in March 2027.

MS. DENTON confirmed.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked what is Flock's business model.

MS. DAUPHINAIS explained that Flock works with agencies and private companies and other organizations to provide technology such as ALPR that cities use. Cities contract with Flock so that Flock can monitor who has the data and work with them to facilitate the data. More specific information can be provided through Flock's business team.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked what kind of entities Flock has contracts with.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said public entities such as cities, towns, counties. She said she is not aware of any contracts that Flock has with the federal government. The city can determine what kind of access other agencies, such as federal law enforcement agencies, have with Chandler's data. Federal agencies would not have any backdoor access to the city's data if that is what the contract contains. An agency requesting the city's data would go through a secure process.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked to confirm that the only way another agency can get data through Flock is through a secure request or to have that information provided to them.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said yes.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO noted that alleged data privacy violations in other municipalities must have violated the municipalities' privacy protocol. He gave a hypothetical statement and noted that if an agency were to request data and that data was not allowed to be shared through Flock, an independent actor within the city organization could choose to share that data with the outside agency, but that person doing so would constitute a violation of the city's protocol.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said yes and reaffirmed that Flock does not make decisions or share information on who gets Chandler's data. Chandler can determine who information is shared with

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO said there could potentially be breaches of data security through independent data sharing of bad actors.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said Flock cannot guarantee 100% data security because of the possibility of threats. Flock takes threats of data breaches seriously. Flock maintains the highest level of government security clearances through CJIS and SOC2 compliance. Flock also works with contractors such as Bishop Fox, a private offensive security firm that conducts penetrative testing on Flock software to simulate real-world attacks and then work on prevention. Flock continuously improves their product to ensure minimized threat to data security.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked who audits Flock systems to ensure that contract standards and data security are upheld.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said in terms of maintaining the levels of security clearances, there is an annual database audit to ensure the security is to the highest standard. In order to keep the certifications to have the highest level security clearances, Flock must maintain that level of security to house that data.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked if that is conducted internally or externally.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said she would follow up with that information.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO requested the follow-up information addressing trust and data security, as many of the public's concerns reflected security.

MS. DAUPHINAIS stated that Flock has never had a breach in their data and takes the threat very seriously because of the types of information maintained. Flock continuously works to improve their security measures and ensure they follow the highest standards.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked Chief Chapman about the audits within the Chandler Police Department for data collected through Flock.

CHIEF CHAPMAN said the data is audited through internal mechanisms consisting of the commanders, managers, and internal affairs team.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked if there is an audit system.

CHIEF CHAPMAN said yes, every thirty days.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked if it is a robust system and what would occur if a breach were found.

CHIEF CHAPMAN said there is a robust audit system, if there is a breach of information, specifically if an individual were utilizing this information for personal gain or sharing it outside of the norms of established city protocol, the discipline process would commence immediately, and their employment would be terminated.

MAYOR HARTKE requested follow up information from a question asked at the Study Session which was does the City of Chandler Police Department have any agreement with the U.S. Marshals Service.

CHIEF CHAPMAN said the city does not have an agreement with the U.S. Marshals Service. There are city detectives serving on a U.S. Marshals task force who have access to Chandler Flock data.

MAYOR HARTKE asked to confirm that those individuals are City of Chandler employees.

CHIEF CHAPMAN confirmed that those individuals are City of Chandler employees, not federal employees. He shared that there are data sharing agreements with the Wickenburg, Arizona and Tombstone, Arizona U.S. Marshals Offices, but not the federal U.S. Marshals Service. City of Chandler detectives serve on a U.S. Marshals taskforce and have access to the City of Chandler Flock data.

MAYOR HARTKE asked for information regarding what entities the city shares Flock data with.

CHIEF CHAPMAN said the city does not have any sharing agreements with any federal entity. The city only maintains sharing agreements with local and state entities in the state of Arizona.

MS. DENTON affirmed that was correct.

MAYOR HARTKE mentioned that a previous presentation shared that this data is only able to be requested and accessed as part of an official investigation. The data is not able to be randomly searched on its own.

CHIEF CHAPMAN said that is correct and consistent with Chandler's criminal justice information systems. Everything is trackable and able to be audited; there must be a law enforcement cause to justify searching in the system.

MAYOR HARTKE commented that the City of Chandler owns the city's Flock data, and federal agencies including the U.S. Marshals Service, FBI, or any other do not have access to the data.

CHIEF CHAPMAN said that was correct. The exception is the City of Chandler detectives serving on the U.S. Marshals task force who are able to view the City of Chandler data. If a federal request for Chandler data was received, the request would go through the City Manager's Office for review before being granted to another agency. However, if a search warrant is served upon the premises for that information, the department is required to comply with the court order. Upon those two specific instances, data could be released to another agency.

COUNCILMEMBER POSTON requested an explanation of how an outside agency could search a national database to then make a request for Chandler's Flock data.

MS. DENTON said this is part of the agreements that Chandler has with state and local law enforcement agencies. If they request access to Chandler data, it can be approved and then released to them or denied. If a request is approved, then there is essentially an interagency agreement saying that Chandler will share data with them so when they query the data, they can see what is there.

COUNCILMEMBER POSTON asked when another state agency performs a query of Chandler data, is it specific to the case or is it more general access.

MS. DENTON explained there are required query fields that must be completed by the other agency to show the specific investigation being searched for.

COUNCILMEMBER POSTON asked if another agency in Arizona makes that request, they must have an active case number for example and other required fields completed before they are granted the information they are searching for.

MS. DENTON said that is correct.

COUNCILMEMBER POSTON asked if typically, a search is done for one item at a time.

MS. DENTON said yes.

COUNCILMEMBER POSTON noted how many complaints regarding Flock have been submitted during the active time of use since adoption in March 2023.

CHIEF CHAPMAN replied that he is not aware of any complaint about the misuse of lock technology in the City of Chandler.

COUNCILMEMBER POSTON asked City Manager if any complaints regarding Flock have been submitted during the active time of use since adoption in March 2023.

MR. POMBIER said he is not aware of any actual complaints made over the misuse of Flock data in the last three years under the contract.

MAYOR HARTKE asked if there have been any cases of discipline issues or misuse of Flock internally within the Chandler Police Department in the last three years.

CHIEF CHAPMAN said he is not aware of any instances of discipline issues or misuse of Flock internally within the Chandler Police Department in the last three years. He will confirm and provide that follow up to Council. Chief Chapman shared that when license plate data is collected from Flock, the plate data is run through a different system called National Crime Information Center (NCIC). This database then generates information such as the owner of the vehicle and any other information collected. The owner's information is not captured through Flock and never passes through Flock. The NCIC information contains additional information. Flock only captures license plate information and vehicle information; not driver data or owner data.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked when the data leaves Chandler from the system it goes into Flock's data storage cloud system.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said that is correct. Data is stored through the AWS cloud service.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked how does Chandler guarantee that the cloud storage is secure and how is it audited.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said when the data leaves Chandler, it is still owned by Chandler.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS clarified that he was asking about where the cloud was located and how it was maintained.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said it is an AWS cloud service. She is not able to share location information. Data is encrypted through every transit process when it gets through there. The AWS service is at the highest standard of cloud security through encryption. Engineers in the system monitor sensitive data and continuously audit that sensitive data to ensure its compliance with security standards.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked if he would be able to personally audit the data center or AWS cloud storage to ensure information security.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said she is unsure of the logistics of how that would happen, she can provide a more technical answer with information from Flock's Chief Security Officer.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS shared concerns with the level of security of Flock data in AWS systems as he is not able to provide oversight into that service. He stated he is concerned with residents' privacy and wants to be accountable to public trust.

COUNCILMEMBER POSTON mentioned one of Councilmember Harris' suggestions was to draft a citywide surveillance and governance ordinance to set policy and Council oversight over this subject and proposed Council form a committee of residents and staff to review any proposed acquisition, renewal, or expansion of surveillance tools and report out to Council. She asked what that would entail. She then asked about the auditing performed on AWS services, outside of the once a year certification for privacy standards, are there other opportunities to audit that data and perform third party oversight.

MS. DAUPHINAIS asked to clarify Councilmember Poston's question.

COUNCILMEMBER POSTON said she understood that the city's internal processes regarding appropriate use of data were very strict. She asked if there is any similar regulation through Flock.

MS. DAUPHINAIS explained that once the encrypted data reached the AWS cloud service it is automatically deleted after 30 days. She suggested that more specific information could be provided from Flock's Chief Information Officer.

COUNCILMEMBER POSTON said Chandler data is deleted every 30 days, and Chandler maintains ongoing oversight of its data. She requested more information on assurances that Chandler's data is not accessed inappropriately or being breached elsewhere.

MS. DAUPHINAIS stated as part of the city's contract with Flock, if any clause of the contract such as data use is breached, then there is an option to terminate the contract.

COUNCILMEMBER POSTON asked during the yearly audit how information about any potential misuse was found and collected.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said if there is any misuse of data, everything is logged and able to be audited. That information is able to be shared.

COUNCILMEMBER POSTON asked if sharing the Flock audit information could be a standard practice for Chandler, such as receiving an audit report for certain intervals of time. This could pair with Chandler's internal audit report.

MS. DAUPHINAIS asked for clarification.

COUNCILMEMBER POSTON said Chandler's retention policy for Flock data is 30 days, data is deleted automatically after 30 days. There is also a policy where police staff review and ensure data is accessed appropriately. She asked if there is a Flock policy to ensure data is accessed appropriately that could be shared to address these privacy concerns.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said that information could be provided. If any changes were to be made to the renewal contract, it would need to go through Flock and the city's legal review.

COUNCILMEMBER POSTON said she was interested in hearing more about that process.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said she would follow up with that information.

MR. POMBIER explained that this contract is through a cooperative contract with the City of Tempe. As part of the process, Tempe asks these questions of the contractors. He said there is a quarterly third-party audit of Flock data. This information is sourced from the Tempe cooperative contract.

COUNCILMEMBER ELLIS said her focus was on the safety of Chandler. She shared firsthand experience how use of ALPR cameras can help solve cases and bring justice. She emphasized city accountability for the use of Flock data, and stated Council will act to ensure responsibility and accountability of its use.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked about the quarterly audit performed as part of the cooperative contract and asked for information regarding what is audited, how is it audited, and who is doing it, and how can Council receive information about audits.

MS. DAUPHINAIS shared that the quarterly review is conducted by managers and IT officials within the Flock system who look at role-based authorization and MFA authorization to see who accesses certain data that would be used for customer service or product improvement. This is directly with an agency on a quarterly basis.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked if it was possible to have cities do those audits on a quarterly basis.

MS. DAUPHINAIS clarified if the question was to partner with Flock to conduct audits or have access to the audits.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO said it could be a third-party audit paid for by both Flock and the city.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said this could be further discussed with Flock legal team to manage contract negotiations.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO said he believes Chandler's police officers are doing the right job, he wants to confirm with data that Flock is doing the right job. Service providers in Chandler are audited or regulated to ensure that the service delivered to the city is of a certain quality or security.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said Flock is committed to having its Chief Information and Security Officer work with Council to accommodate questions.

MAYOR HARTKE asked Chief Chapman for any follow up.

CHIEF CHAPMAN suggested at the recommendation of Council, a City Council Executive Session could be scheduled with Flock security experts to ensure everyone has a clear understanding of questions asked.

MAYOR HARTKE agreed.

COUNCILMEMBER ELLIS asked what the next step of scheduling that meeting will be.

MAYOR HARTKE said he is willing to set an Executive Session to discuss further.

MAYOR HARTKE invited speakers to share public comments.

CADEN CARLSON, 160 W. Manor St., Chandler, AZ emphasized Chandler's community values. He shared that he had concerns with surveillance data without oversight and suggested investing directly in the Chandler community would be a better use of the contract funds.

TRAVIS GUNVILLE, Chandler, AZ, shared concerns about how Flock data could be subpoenaed after its retention of 30 days had been met. He supported public safety, but shared information about mass data collection and surveillance. Mr. Gunville spoke about the possibility of misuse of data and technology. He requested that the contract not be renewed to uphold privacy and civil liberties.

HARRISON REDMOND, 741 S. Stanley Pl., Chandler, AZ, shared information that some other Arizona cities such as Flagstaff, Sedona, and South Tucson, along with other localities have walked

away from Flock. He referenced the ALPR system generated 3,508 alerts for critical issues as referenced in the agenda item memo but noted that the memo did not include arrest or conviction statistics. He spoke about investigations finding ICE accessed Flock systems or accessing Flock data. He emphasized community safety is built on trust transparency and fiscal responsibility.

SANTINA HUITRON, 515 W. Knox Rd., Chandler, AZ, shared concerns about using cameras for public safety, they infringe on the right to privacy in public spaces and when put in the wrong hands can be used for harm. She shared concerns with the lack of information about Flock. She requested funds be invested in the community, while making the community a safer place to live.

ALDO SOBERÓN, 4100 S. Pinelake Way, Chandler, AZ, requested Flock be removed from Chandler, sharing concerns about surveillance and public trust.

MIGUEL ANDRE RUBIO, 1952 E. Canyon Way, Chandler, AZ, said renewing the contract is not a public safety decision, but a concern of privacy, transparency, and taxpayer risk. He asked questions about what Chandler employees can search in Flock data, outside agency access, and case success. Mr. Rubio shared concerns about legal exposure by using the Flock system and risk management. He requested the contract with Flock not continue.

CARLOS FERNANDEZ, 1519 W. 7th Pl., Mesa, AZ, emphasized the importance of investing in the local community rather than supporting surveillance systems. He requested Council vote no.

LUTHER JOHNSON, 33 N. Comanche Dr. #20, Chandler, AZ, thanked Council for their questions about the Flock contract and advocating for community concerns about safety and access to data. He requested Council discontinue the contract.

ROHITH CHANDRASHAKER, 800 W. Oakland St., Chandler, AZ, shared concerns with Flock statements and addressed issues brought up by communities across the country. He stated that audit procedures could be obscured through incomplete query fields. He requested Council vote no.

CASSIDY CROSSEN, 1413 E. Gail Dr., Chandler, AZ, spoke about privacy concerns and noted that automated systems have an error rate and are not perfect due to camera errors or not editing the database.

ABHIK CHWDHURY, 6160 W. Park Ave., Chandler, AZ, shared first-hand experience with building AI camera systems and the importance of responsible data stewardship and autonomy and control over software systems.

JASON BONDELLI, 635 S. Ellis Rd., Chandler, AZ, said that residents were not given a choice to opt into the Flock data collection system. He requested that the contract renewal funds be used to improve the lives of people in this community. He requested Council discontinue the contract.

AMELIA NGUYEN, 200 W. Jasper Pl., Gilbert, AZ, shared concerns with Flock's claims about the efficacy of the ALPR product. She shared safety concerns with the presence of cameras on Chandler streets, and requested Council vote no.

BRADEN PETERS, 11566 E. Sylvan Ave., Mesa, AZ, spoke against renewing the Flock contract due to violation of privacy rights, and data control concerns. He supported using funds to invest in community crime prevention with youth and school programs.

MICHAEL OEI, 1817 N. Dobson Rd. Apt 2035, Chandler, AZ, requested Council vote no on renewing this contract. He shared concerns with Tempe's original contract that Chandler is using for this item.

BILL WINSBERG, 2370 W. Indigo Dr., Chandler, AZ, requested more information on statistics provided by the Chandler Police Department regarding the use and efficacy of Flock.

SYDNEY PARKER, 10220 E. Olla Dr., Mesa, AZ, requested Council oppose the renewal contract with Flock due to concerns about protecting children's privacy.

DANA DURAN, 4023 W. San Miguel Ave., Phoenix, AZ, shared concerns about Flock and ICE.

MARK JIANG, 3404 E. Birchwood Pl., Phoenix, AZ, noted that high school students are more concerned about education, substance use, mental health, water sustainability, or better school facilities. He requested Council vote no on further funding to Flock.

ERIN RACZYNSKI, 1583 W. Chicago St., Chandler, AZ, thanked Council for the robust discussion of this item. She shared that City Council is responsible for the oversight of this contract and data sharing. She requested Council continue their research into related information.

MARK CAMARENA, 4023 W. San Miguel Ave., Phoenix, AZ, requested Council vote no on this item due to privacy concerns.

ELISABETH NIMAN, 237 W. Alamosa Dr., Chandler, AZ, asked Council to end contracts with Flock and remove all cameras.

ORION HOLLIN, 4023 W. San Migue Ave., Chandler, AZ, shared concerns with legal cases involving Flock and the expansion of Flock sharing agreements. He requested Council vote no.

NATHAN TAYLORTAFT, 695 E. Sheffield Ave., Chandler, AZ pointed out locations of Flock cameras in Chandler. He requested Council not renew the city's contract with Flock.

JANE DANGEL, 4446 E. Longview Ave., Phoenix, AZ noted that cities nationwide are voting to end their contract with Flock. She requested Council discontinue its contract with Flock as it poses a threat to the safety of Chandler residents.

NOAH JAMES MARKHAM, Tempe, AZ spoke in support of Flock cameras and shared success from other Arizona cities.

ISABEL NEACATO, 7138 S. Poplar St., Tempe, AZ shared concerns with the surveillance of Flock cameras. She requested Council vote against the renewal of the contract.

HAYDEN NGUYEN, 200 W. Jasper Dr., Gilbert, AZ, requested Council find public safety solutions that preserve residents' right to privacy, and to invest in the community.

NORBERT KAHLERT, 4505 E. Glenhaven Dr., Phoenix, AZ, shared opposition to the renewal of Chandler's ALPR contract with Flock.

KELSEY ANDERSON, 4561 E. Karsten Dr., Chandler, AZ, spoke against renewing the Flock contract and requested funds be reinvested into the community for the benefit of Chandler residents.

ERIC SANDOVAL, 1595 E. University Dr., Tempe, AZ, urged Council to vote no on the renewal of the Flock contract. He cited concerns with surveillance and affordability.

JANITA SESNIAK, Chandler, AZ, emphasized the importance of public safety for Chandler residents. She shared concerns with Flock technology and requested Council vote no.

BEN ABERCROMBIE, 220 N. 12th St., Phoenix, AZ, shared concerns with claims Flock will bolster crime prevention, sharing information about the error rate and false profiling. He requested Council end the city's contracts with Flock and dedicate the funds to community use.

MARGIE GOMEZ, 3161 S. Rosemary Dr., Chandler, AZ, requested Council vote no on renewing the Flock contract due to privacy violations.

BRITTANY DENCHFIELD, 1717 S. Dorsey St., Tempe, AZ, shared concerns about Flock surveillance and children at schools. She said investing this money into education, creative, and social outlets in public community spaces is a proven way to reduce crime.

SHAYNE STRONG, 2396 E. Hawken Way, Chandler, AZ, supported public safety but shared issues with Flock products violating privacy rights. He urged Council to vote no.

REID NIMMER, 1210 N. Tercera St., Chandler, AZ asked questions about where Flock data collected in Chandler goes and its security. He urged Council to cancel any contracts with Flock.

JUDITH COBURN, representing Kai Newkirk, Democratic candidate for U.S. House representing Arizona's 4th Congressional District, requested Council vote no to renewing the Flock contract.

REBECCA NICHOLS, 4540 W. Flint St., Chandler, AZ, asked questions about accessing Flock records through public records requests, retention of cloud storage, and data integrity.

KRISTOPHER REIN, Chandler, AZ, shared concerns about the number of successful arrests made as a result of Flock use and its effectiveness. He requested Council vote no on this item.

LATONDRA MADISON, Chandler, AZ, asked Council to consider if Chandler Police Department can continue their work effectively without Flock.

MAYOR HARTKE asked if there are City of Chandler cameras in the center of the square mile or if there are different cameras present in the Galveston Elementary School area. He asked for more information.

CHIEF CHAPMAN said during the public comment period he searched through the logistics point of contact and said there is a Flock camera on Galveston. This was one of the original 14 cameras put in as a pilot program in the area to address ongoing crime in the Galveston neighborhood at the previous direction of the City Manager's Office. The camera has been on a list for a month for it to be removed and repurposed. He reported that since the start of the meeting, the camera has been removed from the area.

MAYOR HARTKE asked for a further explanation of what happens when there is an alert through Flock.

MS. DENTON explained that there will be times when a vehicle passes multiple cameras, the Police Department is not in contact with every vehicle that triggers an alert.

MAYOR HARTKE clarified that Flock alerts would not be separate incidents, they could be repeat alerts for the same vehicle.

MS. DENTON said there are alerts in the system that do not hit a threshold to alert the operators. Some alerts the department does not take action on.

MAYOR HARTKE asked for clarification on what happens to Flock data after 30 days when it hits retention and is deleted.

MS. DAUPHINAIS confirmed with the Flock technical team and shared AWS hard deletes the data which is under Flock's retention policy with the AWS cloud software, vetted through Flock's audits and monitoring.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO said comments tonight mentioned that cities across the nation have been moving away from using Flock and asked for thoughts on why communities are not using Flock anymore.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said Flock is committed to building public trust with cities and councils. Flock is committed to showing that Flock is the most transparent and safest product for councils, agencies, and cities to use.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked if Flock's business competitors have similar processes.

MS. DAUPHINAIS said she does not have that information.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked about a recent report from the Police Department about 678 stolen license plates, and 8 were recovered. He asked for more information.

MS. DENTON answered that these are stolen license plates that register an alert. The Real Time Operations Center will see the alert and direct officers to stop the vehicle and make an arrest if needed.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO said the stolen license plate information did not have to be initiated by Chandler Police.

MS. DENTON said that was correct, information about stolen license plates would be from the national database. It could be a stolen license plate out of any city, because the alert would compare Chandler's database to the national CJIS database.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO said the Flock camera helped find eight stolen license plates out of the alerts received.

MS. DENTON said yes.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked about stolen vehicles, there were 556 alerts and 16 recoveries made.

MS. DENTON said when an alert comes in on a stolen vehicle, the operations center will locate the vehicle on the camera, direct officers to the area and take action as needed.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO said that does not mean it started from Chandler.

MS. DENTON said that is correct.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked for information on the 94 arrest warrant alerts and eight warrants cleared.

MS. DENTON explained that any law enforcement officer nationwide can enter a warrant into the national database, if the warrant is attached to a vehicle, it will trigger an alert. The operations center will verify the information and send officers as appropriate.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked about the 22 missing or endangered person alerts, with nine recoveries.

MS. DENTON explained that the category included missing or endangered persons such as children, the elderly, or people with dementia. They have met the criteria for a police report, and it is entered into the national database. If they are affiliated with a vehicle, it will create an alert, then the operations center will verify it and send officers as appropriate.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked about the data of 273 active investigative alerts and 39 arrests.

MS. DENTON said these are investigative leads or suspects that are in active investigations.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked to confirm the number of 39 arrests.

MS. DENTON confirmed 39 arrests were made.

COUNCILMEMBER ORLANDO asked if the 273 active investigation alerts were initiated by Chandler Police.

MS. DENTON said she would confirm the information but believed they were for Chandler Police investigations.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked if there is a current city ordinance that addresses these concerns.

MR. POMBIER said no.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS asked for every camera to be deactivated until Council can reconvene for further discussion.

COUNCILMEMBER HARRIS made a motion to table discussion on item 14.

The motion failed for lack of a second.

COUNCILMEMBER ELLIS said she confirmed that the next step will be to schedule an executive session about the subject.

Council recessed at 9:48 p.m.

Council reconvened at 9:54 p.m. with all members present except Councilmember Hawkins, absent excused.

MAYOR HARTKE said Council does not have all the information they need to make a decision on this item. There will be an opportunity to do some more fact finding to get more information and have a better understanding of where cameras are and data storage.

Dear Mayor Hartke and Members of the City Council,

I am submitting this written comment for the official public record to register my strong opposition to the renewal of the \$153,400 contract with Flock Safety via the proposed motion on tonight's agenda.

In any local commerce decision involving high-value infrastructure, requesting and reviewing multiple detailed proposals before committing is standard due diligence. The City of Chandler owes its taxpayers that exact same level of analytical rigor. Rubber-stamping a mass surveillance system based on emotional anecdotes rather than hard data and localized competitive bidding is a failure of fiduciary and operational responsibility.

Before this council approves any further expenditure on this system, the following critical liabilities must be addressed on the public record:

1. The "One Good Catch" Fallacy vs. Systemic False-Positive Risks

The Chandler Police Department's memorandum highlights isolated success stories and notes that from October through December 2025, the ALPR system generated 3,508 alerts. While the apprehension of legitimate fugitives is a positive outcome, public policy cannot be governed by the numerator alone while hiding the denominator. The council must demand the aggregate error rate of those 3,508 automated alerts. When automated systems misidentify a plate or rely on stale database inputs, the immediate result is a high-risk, guns-drawn traffic stop of an innocent citizen. The physical danger and legal liability of a single wrongful, high-stress stop of a Chandler family far outweighs the unvetted utility of an automated network.

2. More Than a License Plate Reader: AI Behavioral Profiling

The marketing of this technology as a simple "license plate reader" is flatly contradicted by the city's own memorandum, which admits that the Flock platform offers enhanced search capabilities allowing users to search by "vehicle color, make, model, and other identifiable features." This represents an AI-driven behavioral tracking network that catalogs unique vehicle markings, bumper stickers, and roof racks to map the daily travel patterns of local drivers. Furthermore, while Flock states they do not sell data to commercial data brokers, their infrastructure operates as a government-facing data broker. By default, Flock facilitates the distribution of Chandler residents' movements to a nationwide network of over 7,000 law enforcement and private entities, monetizing localized tracking by selling network access on a massive scale.

3. Weaponization for Personal Stalking and Political Espionage

Centralizing highly specific tracking data builds an infrastructure ripe for weaponization, creating immediate liability for both internal and external abuse:

- **The Public Records Loophole:** Under the Arizona Public Records Law (A.R.S. § 39-121 et seq.), automated municipal database logs are generally subject to public inspection. Because Flock and law enforcement argue that license plates are in plain view on public roads with no expectation of privacy, any individual, political opponent, or private investigator can legally submit a public records request for the system audit logs of specific license plates. If this contract is renewed, anyone can identify the license plates of city officials or council members and map out a detailed history of your

personal movements. The city cannot logically claim that regular citizens have zero expectation of privacy from this system while simultaneously shielding its own officials' daily movements from public disclosure.

- **Insider Misconduct:** Audits of centralized law enforcement databases nationwide consistently reveal instances of personnel accessing surveillance tools to stalk romantic partners, spy on neighbors, or gather intelligence on political adversaries. Without foolproof access controls and independent, transparent logging, this system remains an unchecked tool for personal and political espionage.

4. Bypass of Local Competitive Bidding via the Tempe Loophole

Chandler's Purchasing Procedures legally require a formal solicitation and local competitive bidding for contracts exceeding \$100,000 to ensure fiscal responsibility. The council's memorandum reveals that the city is completely bypassing this requirement by piggybacking on City of Tempe Contract No. T21-119-01. Utilizing an outside jurisdiction's contract as a cooperative purchasing agreement allows the city to award a six-figure, sole-source contract to Flock Safety while completely avoiding a localized Request for Proposal (RFP). Outsourcing our fiscal due diligence to Tempe is an unacceptable avoidance of municipal oversight.

5. The TALON Network and Unaudited Data Propagation

Flock Safety repeatedly assures municipalities that data is deleted after 30 days and that "only the city" has access. This is technically inaccurate. The system is built around the national TALON network. If a local camera pings against an out-of-state database, that record propagates outward. A 30-day local deletion policy is functionally useless if Chandler residents' vehicular movements are being stored indefinitely on external servers that do not honor our local retention limits. Chandler must conduct a full, independent technical audit of its backend sharing configurations before committing to a renewal.

6. Severe Cybersecurity Vulnerabilities

We are paying a premium for a software service that has demonstrated catastrophic security hygiene. Recent investigations by *404 Media* revealed that the administrative interfaces for dozens of Flock cameras were left entirely unencrypted and easily accessible via simple commercial search engines, requiring no username or password. Mass accumulation of behavioral data creates a highly lucrative target, and by centralizing this data, the city is absorbing massive liability for the inevitable data breach.

7. Lack of Geographic Transparency

The public has been kept completely in the dark about the physical footprint of this network. The city has not provided a transparent public map showing exactly where these 40 cameras are deployed. Without a public geographic overlay, the residents of Chandler have no way to verify if this surveillance dragnet is being deployed equitably across the city, or if it is disproportionately targeting specific neighborhoods. We cannot fund a system that operates in the shadows.

Conclusion and Call for Operational Accountability

A vendor that exploits procurement loopholes, overshares sensitive citizen data by default, and demonstrates fundamentally poor cybersecurity infrastructure does not merit an automatic, unscrutinized contract renewal from this municipal body. Moving forward with a system that has documented global vulnerabilities without independent verification is a severe gamble with taxpayer resources and resident safety.

Therefore, I formally request that the City Council vote NO on the Flock Safety contract renewal tonight. At a bare minimum, I urge you to table this motion until a true, localized Request for Proposal is conducted, an independent technical audit of the data-sharing configuration is finalized, a rigorous cybersecurity review is completed, and a transparent

geographic justification report is made fully available for public inspection. Our community deserves safety built on ironclad transparency, absolute administrative accountability, and strict adherence to fiscal and constitutional due diligence.

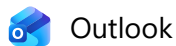

I am writing to express my opposition to Flock, and to urge you to not renew the city's contract with the company. Flock and other Automated License Plate Reader (ALPR) cameras take and analyze pictures of all passing vehicles, identifying a multitude of information that I would consider mass surveillance. This means Flock documents millions of cars under the guise of fighting crime, without a warrant. A key part of my concern is this mass surveillance of the public without consent. Flock also does not have good security. 404 Media has reported that "a security researcher found Flock accounts for sale on a Russian cybercrime forum". Additionally, "using a commercial search engine" someone "very easily found the administration interfaces for dozens of Flock Safety cameras... None of the data or video footage was encrypted. There was no username or password required." This is not a secure way for police to track crime. It's a mass surveillance system that has been and will be accessed by the wrong people.

Not only am I opposed to mass surveillance and security issues, but the locations of the cameras themselves are problematic too. The city currently has forty Flock cameras. Nine of those are within one square mile, which also happens to be the only area of Chandler where over 60% of the population is Hispanic, based on data from census tracts. One of those is pointed directly at Galveston Elementary School, in the middle of a neighborhood. On Monday night it was mentioned that the Flock cameras are not placed in residential areas, which is clearly false, and that demographics do not play a role in placement, which doesn't seem to be true. This means both the placement of Flock cameras is an issue, and that those pushing this contract aren't being fully honest, which is extremely concerning when involving a powerful surveillance system such as this one.

I urge you to not renew the city's contract with Flock.

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Flock Cameras in Chandler

Dear Chandler City Mayor and Council Members,

I saw Steven Sarabia's story on AZ Family last night — “Chandler to make decision on Flock cameras contract” — and I was genuinely surprised to hear the Chief of the Chandler Police Department say that these cameras are not much of a privacy concern. As a resident, I strongly disagree, and I believe the Council deserves to hear from community members who see the risks differently.

I am writing as a Chandler resident to express my strong support for removing — and fully discontinuing — the Flock Safety license-plate reader cameras and any similar mass-surveillance systems. While I understand the intention behind these tools, the privacy implications and the documented sharing of Flock-collected data far beyond our local community raise serious concerns about civil liberties and resident safety.

Flock's readers capture the movements of everyday residents who are not suspected of any wrongdoing. This creates a detailed record of where we drive, when, and how often. Such information can reveal sensitive personal patterns — medical visits, religious attendance, political activities, and family routines. This level of surveillance is incompatible with the expectations of privacy that Americans expect and Chandler residents deserve.

It is also important to note that other Arizona cities have already reconsidered or ended their relationships with Flock. Tempe is currently moving away from the system, and both Sedona and Flagstaff have ended their contracts. These decisions should prompt Chandler to ask why neighboring cities — with similar public-safety goals — have determined that Flock's risks outweigh its benefits. Their actions suggest that concerns about privacy risks, cost effectiveness, and data-sharing are not hypothetical; they are real enough for entire municipalities to walk away.

Another critical question is whether Flock cameras meaningfully solve crime in proportion to their financial cost. Residents deserve transparency about how many cases these cameras actually help resolve — and whether those numbers justify the ongoing expense. Even more importantly, we must consider the potential cost of a privacy breach or misuse of data. One incident of improper access, targeting, or federal overreach could shatter a Chandler resident's life. No budget line item can quantify that kind of harm.

Flock's system functions as a dragnet — collecting data on everyone, not just suspects. That is not what our country is supposed to be about. We have individual rights, freedoms, and an inalienable expectation of what we can expect from our government. If police need information about a specific vehicle connected to a specific crime, the proper method is the same one required for any other search: a targeted, warrant-based request that respects constitutional protections. Mass surveillance should never be the default. If a camera must be used, it should be tied to a specific, warrant-based request — not a blanket collection of everyone's movements.

Additionally, reports have shown that Flock data has already been accessed by federal agencies. Even if this sharing is described as “optional,” the reality is that once the data exists, it can be requested, shared, or repurposed in ways residents never consented to. This undermines local control and opens the door to surveillance practices that extend far beyond public safety. The Chandler Police Department should be equally concerned about this threat to residents' rights and the erosion of trust it creates.

I respectfully urge the Council to prioritize the civil liberties of Chandler residents and discontinue the use of Flock cameras. Public safety should never come at the cost of mass data collection on innocent people. Removing these cameras would demonstrate a commitment to transparency, community trust, and the protection of our constitutional rights.

Thank you for your time and consideration. I hope you will take meaningful action to safeguard the privacy of the people you represent.

Flock Safety's data sharing with federal agencies is complex; while Flock states customer communities control federal access and federal agencies are not permitted statewide lookups by default, **Flock's default agreements and past actions allowed federal agencies, including ICE and U.S. Border Patrol, to access license plate reader data for investigative purposes**, sometimes without explicit consent or through indirect channels.

How Flock Safety Shares Data

- **Customer Control vs. Default**

Agreements: Flock Safety emphasizes that its customer communities, typically local law enforcement, control federal agencies' access to their camera systems and data. However, the company's data sharing agreements with police departments have granted Flock the license to share license plate data with federal and local agencies for investigative purposes, even if a local department attempts to restrict data sharing. This means that while data access might be controlled locally, the data can still reach federal hands.

- **Federal Pilot Programs and Pauses**
Flock Safety engaged in limited pilot programs with federal agencies like

Customs and Border Protection (CBP) and Homeland Security Investigation

Instances of Federal Access

- **ICE and Border Patrol:** Audit logs have confirmed that federal agencies, particularly Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and U.S. Border Patrol, have accessed Flock camera data. For example, audit logs from the Denver Police Department showed over 1,400 searches on behalf of ICE between January 2024 and mid-April 2025. In Washington state, at least eight law enforcement agencies directly shared their ALPR data with U.S. Border Patrol in 2025, and Border Patrol accessed data from ten

more departments without their explicit agreement.

- **"Backdoor" and Unauthorized Access**

Reports indicate that federal immigration enforcement has gained access to Floc cameras through both direct sharing and "backdoor" access to networks not explicitly authorized for federal search. There have also been allegations from local officials, such as in Mountain View, that federal agencies accessed Floc camera data without the city's consent, citing an internal audit that revealed

- **Indirect Access via Local Police:** Even

when federal agencies don't have direct access, they can obtain information

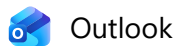
having local police departments conduct searches on their behalf. Documents revealed that Flock's template user agreement allows it to disclose data to law enforcement nationwide and federal agencies for "investigative purposes" regardless of local police department restrictions.

Concerns and Regulations

- **Privacy Concerns:** Civil liberties organizations like the ACLU have raised significant concerns about Flock's data sharing practices, particularly regarding the potential for widespread surveillance and the use of this data for immigration enforcement. They highlight that even

direct federal access is restricted, the data can still be shared broadly.

- **Legislative Efforts:** In some regions Washington State, there are efforts to regulate Flock cameras and similar automatic license plate reader (ALPR) systems through legislation, aiming to restrict data sharing with federal agencies, particularly for immigration enforcement.

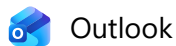

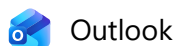

The convenience of law enforcement should not override citizen's right to privacy, including under the 4th amendment. In *Carpenter v United States*, the Supreme Court decided that warrantless cell phone tracking created a trail of personal movements that were akin to constant surveillance. The government has bypassed that decision by buying our location data from third party data brokers. Flock ALPRs further expand the surveillance dragnet, while adding in additional data privacy, abuse, and slippery slope concerns. The security on the devices is worse than nonexistent, journalists regularly do pieces to camera through them, and then extract the footage to make a point. The data is shared with a menagerie of outside agencies, often in violation of local law. Too many police officers have stalked exes using these databases. And Flock's collusion with police departments indicates that Chandler will soon be on the hook for their street microphones, pedestrian trackers and constantly hovering drones to look through windows (I wish that was a joke). If we wanted to actually reduce crime while keeping privacy, we could make the process actually transparent and use modern cryptographic techniques, like Google did during their pandemic-era contact tracing. But if Chandler is considering expanding its partnership with a dishonest and controversial startup like Flock, they should open information on the pilot program to the public and prompt actual community dialogue, instead of jamming it with 20 other items. Without real transparency, I oppose.

It does not mention the mounting evidence that Flocks systems are fundamentally insecure and that its data is being misused in ways that directly threaten the privacy and civil rights of Chandler residents. -----The cameras are not secure. -----In December 2025, independent researchers discovered that at least 60 of Flocks Condor cameras were left live-streaming to the open internet, no password required. Anyone could watch the feeds, download 30 days of archived video, and even manipulate camera settings. ----- The data is being misused at scale. Flock's own customers have used the system for purposes that go far beyond what was sold to the public. ----- These systems are not benefiting residents of Chandler and violates the trust and safety of everyone.

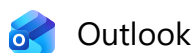

Many residents are already concerned about increasing surveillance, infrastructure strain, and decisions being made without meaningful community input. Approving a citywide camera network at this moment risks further damaging public trust between residents and local government. I encourage the council to prioritize transparency, community engagement, and targeted public safety measures that do not involve widespread monitoring of everyday residents. 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Dear Mayor & Council members,

It was odd to watch city council members and private citizens complain and worry about privacy concerns regarding FLOCK data, while the very reason we mandate license plates on vehicles goes largely unmentioned – despite license plates being tied to far more personal data.

Yet here we are, worrying about a system that (more often than not) reports the location of vehicles tied to individuals who may be trying to evade the consequences of their actions – information that is already linked to their license plate through state-mandated laws.

OD Harris’s “victim acting” for the audience is nothing more than an attempt to bolster his reasons for hiding his embarrassing military history and to justify him and his wife pulling down signage he doesn’t agree with. I get it – we all do. Those most opposed to FLOCK are likely people who have had negative interactions with police or the courts as a result of their own actions.

The recovery of stolen vehicles and the rescue of missing children benefit Chandler residents in ways many opponents either don’t wish to admit or aren’t capable of realizing. These individuals often aren’t particularly community-minded, yet they expect their “bubble” of privacy to follow them when they leave their property.

In the U.S. and most other jurisdictions, you generally have no reasonable expectation of privacy in public spaces. If you are in plain view – on a sidewalk, in a park, driving on public streets, or inside an open store – anyone can legally observe or photograph you without your permission.

Living in a community where law and order are actively enforced is far more desirable than the alternative. The City of Chandler should renew the FLOCK contract to keep law-abiding citizens safe.

Many more citizens are watching this issue than those who showed up in person to speak against it. Unfortunately, the ones who do appear are often anti-government conspiracists.

Supporting the continuation of the FLOCK contract will help keep Chandler safer and more prosperous by enabling quicker recovery of stolen vehicles (which helps reduce insurance rates) and by confronting individuals who knowingly use incorrect plates to cheat other taxpayers. The rescue of missing children and vulnerable persons should matter to all of us, not just those directly affected.

Nothing protects law enforcement officers more effectively than being notified in advance that a vehicle with a specific plate number is associated with an individual who is armed and dangerous.

What goes unmentioned – or is simply unknown – by those opposing FLOCK is the fact that most of them carry a cell phone that continuously gathers far more personal data (location, time, movements, etc.) which is held by private companies profiting from their data. Where is the outrage over that?

As an 11 year Chandler resident and young working professional, I am writing to firmly oppose the adoption of Flock Security cameras in our city. These systems conduct indiscriminate, continuous surveillance of law-abiding residents tracking the movements of every driver who passes a camera, regardless of any suspicion of wrongdoing. The Electronic Frontier Foundation documented that law enforcement agencies used Flock's network to track protesters exercising their First Amendment rights and to conduct discriminatory searches, demonstrating how easily this technology is misused. My data security concerns are equally serious; U.S. Senators wrote to the FTC in 2025 citing Flock's failure to require basic multi-factor authentication, which allowed unauthorized federal agents to access local Flock accounts using shared passwords our private location data deserves better protection than that. During that time, I have seen, firsthand, how technology, in both my agency and the City of Chandler, has enhanced crime fighting and helped create the safe environment we enjoy in the East Valley.

In recent years, Real Time Crime Centers (RTCC) and use of Flock Camera systems have been an absolute game changer in our ability to rapidly locate crime suspects, missing people, and stolen vehicles. While I have no part of our agency's contact with Flock, I can tell you that daily, RTCC locates wanted and missing people and stolen vehicles. That information is dispatched directly to Patrol in real time movement and enables officers to quickly locate them. With the rapid location of suspects, missing persons and stolen vehicles, it saves our agency countless hours of investigative time, stops crime sprees, brings rapid justice to victims, and returns missing loved ones. 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Dear Mayor Hartke and Members of the Chandler City Council,

I am writing to formally state my opposition to the city's proposed contract extension with Flock. The overwhelming consensus of Chandler residents at the May 21 meeting was entirely clear: we, the citizens of Chandler, do not want Flock surveillance in our city.

I want to commend Councilmember OD Harris for being the only member of that body who actually listened to the room, demanded real oversight, and fought to turn these cameras off while this decision is pending. Thank you, sir!

The fact that the rest of this council voted to keep these 40 invasive surveillance cameras rolling through the summer without an active, approved contract is an insult to Chandler residents.

We have valid, deep concerns about outsourcing public safety and surveillance to a private, venture-backed corporation. Private tech companies answer to investors and profit margins, not the Constitution or the citizens of Chandler. Neighboring cities like Flagstaff had the wisdom to end their Flock contracts over private data handling, and Tempe is actively exploring alternatives. These are warrant-less dragnets, and without a strict and independent oversight framework, you have no business keeping this system here.

Flock's Automated License Plate Readers are invasive, AI-driven surveillance cameras that log a vehicle's location, time, and daily travel patterns. More than just reading a plate, this system extracts physical traits, including the vehicle's make, model, and color, to turn the car into a searchable database profile. These cameras continuously scoop up data on thousands of Chandler drivers who are not suspected of any crime.

This week's vote to table this decision until mid-July was a transparent stalling tactic.

Dear Mayor and Councilmembers,

I am a Chandler resident and adamantly opposed to Chandler renewing their contract with Flock. On Monday night at the study session, Michelle Denton, the Chandler Police Department's communications technology manager told you that demographic information wasn't considered when placing the location for Flock cameras and that they are not placed in residential neighborhoods. This information is not accurate. It is extremely concerning that the information you are being provided, on which to base your decision is not truthful. Of the 40 cameras that are in Chandler, 9 of them are within 1 square mile of each other, which also happens to be the only area in Chandler where over 60% of the population is Hispanic. Additionally, 4 of these 9 cameras are facing inwards towards the neighborhood, including located at Hamilton/Galveston which is facing Galveston Elementary School. I have attached some photos and a graphic so that you can see where some of these cameras are located and the direction they are facing.

The map I am including was created by a family member. Each point represents a Flock camera. While all 40 locations have not been verified, the 9 in the red box have been verified by me. I am including the entire map to convey the demographic information. The red color on the map indicates where over 30% of the population is Hispanic (based on census data). The darker red color that has 9 Flock cameras is an area where over 60% of the population is Hispanic. (The blue color indicates

commercial areas). The fourth camera, of these 9, that is in the residential neighborhood and not depicted in a photo, is located at Galveston near McQueen road and is facing the the street adjacent to an apartment complex.

To be clear, I do not support the use of Flock cameras and do not wish for you to renew this contract, regardless of where they are located. I think it's incredibly important for you to have a better picture of what we (and the cameras) are looking at here.

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Dear Mayor Hartke and Chandler City Council,

My name is Mica Stewart. I grew up in Chandler, attended ASU, and have lived in the East Valley for 19 years now. This community is my home in every meaningful sense. I'm writing to ask you and the City Council to vote against renewing the contract with Flock Safety.

I come to this issue from two perspectives that I believe are directly relevant. My education and first career was as a software engineer, and I now serve as a social worker and disability advocate. Both of those experiences give me serious cause for concern, and I want to share them with you as plainly and respectfully as I can.

As a former software engineer, I have serious concerns with Flock's security and their handling of previous security issues. Last year, an independent researcher and technologist named Benn Jordan conducted a thorough, documented investigation into Flock Safety's camera systems and published his findings publicly. He identified significant security vulnerabilities in the Flock platform that could expose the data Flock collects to unauthorized access by bad actors. These vulnerabilities were egregious; even a mildly technical civilian could replicate the exploit that he used to gain root access to Flock devices.

What was equally troubling was Flock's response. Instead of seriously addressing the findings and committing to transparent action, Flock was dismissive. That is not the behavior of a vendor a city should trust with a major surveillance network. As someone who has spent time in software development, I know that security vulnerabilities happen, but these particular vulnerabilities were severe, preventable, and minimized by the responsible party. I believe this should be a red flag for any city considering a long-term contractual relationship.

My deeper concern is ethical. As a disability advocate and social worker, I work regularly with vulnerable populations who will be most affected by privacy violations.

The record on Flock and ICE is already documented and deeply troubling. According to reporting tracked by the Immigration Policy Tracking Project, ICE agents were able to access Flock camera data through local law enforcement partners, without a formal

contract with Flock, resulting in more than 4,000 immigration-related lookups conducted on the federal government's behalf. When a local department conducts a Flock search, they can access not just their own cameras, but those in other states or across the country. This means that by contracting with Flock, Chandler would be plugging its residents into a national surveillance network whose reach extends far beyond what any local policy can control.

Flock's own CEO later acknowledged the company had conducted unofficial pilots with DHS agencies including CBP and HSI. The company did pause those pilots in August 2025 after public backlash, but the fact remains that these pilots did take place and they took place without the consent of the cities and citizens affected. Good intentions and policy language are not sufficient safeguards when the underlying infrastructure can be accessed through side channels that bypass local oversight entirely. In short, I may trust you not to look up my every movement, but I cannot trust Flock or the third parties that wish to use it.

The core of my concern is that surveillance technology does not stay within the boundaries its original architects intended once deployed. It creates an infrastructure for future surveillance and begs to be used and expanded. And the communities that end up most exposed are always the most vulnerable ones: immigrants, people with disabilities, the homeless, people who depend on the ability to travel and exist in public without being tracked. I recognize that public safety is one of the most important responsibilities your office carries. I'm not asking you to be indifferent to crime or to the legitimate tools that help address it. I'm asking you to weigh those benefits against the genuine and documented risk that a surveillance network operated by a third-party vendor, connected to a national data-sharing infrastructure with known security gaps, will eventually be used in ways that harm the very residents of Chandler it was meant to protect.

Chandler has always been a community that takes pride in being innovative and forward-thinking. I believe that same forward-thinking spirit should extend to how we approach civil liberties and our digital infrastructure. The right decision here is to decline this renewal and to invest instead in public safety approaches that don't require handing our neighbors' data to a third party with demonstrated accountability problems.

Hello Mayor and Council,

I sent in a public comment regarding the lack of transparency in Chandler's ALPR expansion yesterday, that was before I had the chance to watch the study session. I appreciate the questions that you asked Flock and the police. The issue is that these are the **wrong parties to ask**, as they are incentivised to offer favorable answers and assurances, even if they conflict with publicly known information. My rebuttals and sources are below, and I would suggest that future inquiries of this kind involve third party security experts.

Flock lied to the council when they said that Flock employees never accessed data or video feeds. According to Jason Hunyar, in just the city of Dunwoody, Flock **employees have been caught** watching live traffic feeds, restroom entrances, public pools, and kid's gymnastics rooms in a Jewish community center.

Flock lied and Chandler police misled the council with claims that ICE cooperation is limited and that federal agencies are siloed. They then mix that with cell location, Palantir social and web spying, and many other sources. Some are under audit for feeding information to ICE. Flock misled the council when they said they have never been breached or hacked. A hack is not necessary when there is no security. According to Jon Gaines, Flock hardware and software are riddled with negligent security failures, leaving footage out in the open on remotely accessible ALPRs and through multiple exposed banks of video feeds. These holes also allowed **anyone to plant or delete evidence if desired**. Several required no technical skills to exploit.

Flock misled the council by saying that audits would keep people honest. After cops were caught seaching on behalf of ICE, Flock replaced search reason fields with a drop down with only 'acceptable' potential reasons. Police departments are also being instructed to keep search trails '**as vague as possible**'. With audits neutered, officers that use ALPR for stalking (16 already) will evade discipline more easily. The public records process is also a barrier, with stacks of hard copies and million dollar fees getting in the way of resident visibility.

Hi Councilmember Poston,

After watching the 5/18 study session re: Flock contract renewal, I wanted to send you information that contradicts what Flock representatives said in answer to your question regarding employee access. They claimed Flock employees need security clearance and a troubleshooting related reason to access sensitive data. This is not true.

Dunwoody, GA resident Jason Hunyar investigated the use of Flock systems by his city. Even though the company had no LPR contract, they had managed to tie both the city's traffic cameras and privately owned security cameras into one system. They, along with local PD, looked inside gyms, pools, playgrounds, women's restroom entrances, and kid's gymnastics rooms in a Jewish community center. These were not engineers or security employees, but unidentified users, and salespeople.

In response to the instant controversy in Dunwoody, Flock argued that the live views were initiated as part of sales presentations to customers, and that they would stop picking on the town specifically as a marketing example. The fact that company employees can pull up this range of diverse video streams for prospective customers on demand ruins the assurances they gave you this Monday. And I do wonder why some of the logs appear to show employees lingering on library, pool, and gymnastics cameras for several hours. Residents were less charitable than either Jason or myself, calling the employees "Little Epsteins".

Flock tries to spin this episode as a positive, saying that their access logs provided necessary transparency. The reality is that the company has had a mountain of security scandals and they always respond by removing or neutering the means that made past embarrassments possible. The "sales demos" at the expense of regular people and children no doubt continue, just without public knowledge.

I've sent the mayorandcouncil address a larger email on 7 other points, but I know those take a few days to get forwarded over, so I wanted you to get specific info ahead of Thursday's vote.

I wanted to provide you with an update on your inquiry below regarding Flock.

The City Council voted to table the discussion of the Flock contract extension and will consider that item at a future meeting, tentatively scheduled for July 16. Chandler began using Flock's automated license plate readers as a pilot program in March 2024. Since then, agreements have been reached with Flock to operate up to 40 automated license plate readers in Chandler. This technology assists police identify and recover stolen vehicles and stolen license plates, locate vehicles associated with missing and endangered children and adults and locate vehicles associated with active warrants tied to serious offenses.

Additionally, you should be hearing from Chandler PD to address your concerns.

With less cats:

- People may be less likely to poison the few that are in a neighborhood.
- We see fewer dead cats on our roads.
- Less property destruction.
- Fewer wildlife such as birds and lizards are killed. Remember lizards eat things such as mosquitoes and flies.

You should also consider the impact to our vets and vet techs. These fields already have a staffing shortage, and I can tell you the suffering these amazing souls see come through their doors affects their mental health greatly. Most in the field are there because of their love, compassion, and commitment to these animals. Some are leaving because they can't handle the continued heartbreak, especially in the emergency clinics. We need to consider the uptick of injured/sick feral cat cases they will potentially see come in with not funding TNR in Chandler.

My name is Tia Hoyes and have been involved in the Rescue Community for 15 years.

During my tenure, I have acquired 16 colonies in Chandler. I am the Caregiver for approximately 140 free roaming homeless cats. Many of these cats have been abandoned and I have gotten some into rescue. I have helped 300-400 animals get off the streets.

Many cannot go into homes. That is where the City Of Chandler TNR program comes in! 90% of the cats in the colonies I supervise have been spay or neutered.

I have used the program to help an elderly veteran with 40 cats that are living on his property. Some of the friendly cats were adopted! He was so very thankful. (\$2000 of grant money for TNR)

People in the community have noticed a reduction in the cat population and are very thankful also. Most Chandler residents are unaware of the program, so I am sure to explain and ask if they would like to participate. They are grateful to have the ability to help the animals.

The grant has helped so much to keep the population down and we are all very appreciative. It would be impossible for volunteers to afford the surgeries for all of these animals. We pay for the food out of our own pocket.

Without the help of this grant, I would have spent \$7000+ to sterilize all of these animals, plus the \$2000 mentioned above. That is a total of \$9000.

My name is Eric Liquori, and I manage the homeless/feral colony at the back of the Festiva Court housing subdivision at the corner of Hamilton and Knox in Chandler.

I care for approximately two dozen homeless and feral cats, providing food, water, medical care, and TNR to prevent the colony's population from getting out of control.

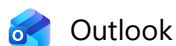
Thanks to the grants available for TNR services, we've been able to compassionately prevent numerous cats from breeding and causing the colony population to grow out of control.

Because we can maintain a fairly steady population, we are able to prevent overcrowding, fighting, territory stress, and nuisance behavior that would otherwise affect homeowners in proximity of the colony.

Avoiding uncontrolled growth of the kitten, and subsequently adult, population means we are able to properly feed and care for the remaining feline residents resulting in healthier animals that behave more predictably and less aggressively. Put simply, fewer cats are competing for available space, food, water and attention. The adult cats in the colony are not forced to wander into adjacent properties desperately hunting for food and water, and we are also very happy to see fewer casualties in the colony territory – nobody wants to walk the neighborhood, or walk their dog, and see injured or deceased animals that result from improper care or lack of resources. We are able to maintain what is a very nice neighborhood, while acting compassionately towards our wild feline neighbors.

We read and hear daily about cities across the country that attempt to deal with social issues reactively – nothing is done until the problem has grown out of control, and then panic measures are put into place, oftentimes with questionable if not negligible results. Grant programs such as the one in question here are what make Chandler such an admirable and livable place to raise a family – rather than wait for problems to plague a community, these grants help us act proactively and humanely, to eliminate problems before they grow. Grant programs such as this are what make Chandler a forward-thinking community, and a city our family is very proud to call home.

As colony manager, our family pays for almost all of the food and medical care provided out of our own pockets. We are happy to do this – it's the right thing to do, it's the humane thing to do, it's what compassionate, progressive people do. But covering the cost of veterinary costs of TNR on top of food and healthcare would be difficult if not prohibitive. Having access to these grants, for TNR services, helps relieve the financial strain so that we all, as a community, help keep Chandler a great place to live.

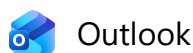
