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- C. Legislative Bills for Discussion and Possible Action
- 1) [HB 2561 city water provider; requirements; service](#) (Kolodin) / [HB 2441 S/E city water provider; requirements; service](#) (Griffin)
 - a. **Summary:** This is the bill that would have required counties to enter into an intergovernmental agreement with a city to temporarily provide water to residents in unincorporated areas of the county if the city is no longer willing/able to provide water to the residents through a standpipe. Representative Kolodin and other members have been working on a bipartisan solution that would create a separate state entity (standpipe district) that would contract with the city in question to provide water for up to 3 years, if the impacted area is in a county with 750K or more people. In addition, there is discuss regarding making changes within [A.R.S. 11-831 Review of Land Divisions; Definitions](#). It still allows for either the county or the Department of Real Estate to enforce the, but it moves away from acting in concert to avoiding subdivision laws by pursuing a common plan or design. Counties would have the authority to deny a lot split if the county finds that the spit is being carried out in an attempt to avoid subdivision laws by conspiring to develop 6 or more contiguous plots within a 10-year period.

- 2) [HB 2617 carrying of firearms; constables](#) (Bliss)
 - a. **Summary:** permits a constable, while on or off duty, to carry a firearm if the constable is AZPOST certified, or if the constable completes firearms training, undergoes a psychological exam and either possesses a concealed weapon permit or completes a background check approved by AZPOST.
- 3) [HB 2618 decommissioning; solar and wind; standards](#) (Griffin)
 - a. **Summary:** An amendment adopted in the Senate's Natural Resources, Energy, and Water Committee – that still must be officially adopted in the Committee of the Whole -
- 4) [SB 1307 constables; salaries](#) (Gowan)
 - a. **Summary:** CSA staff provided a proposal that modified the existing statutory ranges based on guidance from the LPC and asked to remove the addition of service *attempts* to the threshold for minimally productive precincts. Initial committee amendment set ceiling of 16K tier at \$80,000 but sponsor has indicated that it will be lowered to \$75,000 with a floor amendment in the House. The BOS would retain flexibility within the salary ranges. Salaries would go into effect for most precincts Jan. 1, 2027.

D. Legislative Bill Updates

- 1) [HB 2019 licensing; permitting; criteria; clarity](#) (Grantham)
 - a. **Summary:** As amended by the Senate, requires a county to “specify in clear and unambiguous language the criteria for granting” any license or permit “for any free speech or assembly activity or any activity that changes the use, appearance or density of a structure or land.”
- 2) [HB 2194 drug overdose fatality review teams](#) (Nguyen)
 - a. **Summary:** An emergency measure to reestablish the Drug Overdose Fatality Review Team (Review Team) with the Arizona Department of Health Services (ADHS) that self-repealed on January 1, 2023.
- 3) [HB 2808 public records; time frame](#) (Carbone)
 - a. **Summary:** The bill was held in Senate Government it would have required all public records requests (PPR) to have an estimated time frame for a public records request to be completed within 5 days and established fines not to exceed \$5,000 for failure for each occurrence it is determined the public body failed to comply.
- 4) [SB 1029 felony murder; fentanyl; sentencing](#) (Kern) [House Strike-Everything](#)
 - a. **Summary:** The initial bill as drafted would have made it first-degree murder for causing the death of any person during the course of or immediate flight from an offense involving the possession for sale, manufacture or transportation of fentanyl. The bill was struck in the House Appropriations Committee with a requirement for the Arizona Department of Revenue to provide a report by August 31st of each year on the previous fiscal years marijuana tax collection data.
- 5) [SB 1162 home-based businesses; restrictions; prohibition](#) (Kaiser) [Veto Letter](#)
 - a. **Summary:** Makes changes to the home-based business restrictions for counties and adds restrictions on cities and towns. Prohibits a county from applying for a rezoning for commercial use, install or equip fire sprinklers, or obtain a business license. Makes it a judicial question on if the county regulation compliance with the section. Defines no-impact home-based business that provide lawful goods or services, employes no more than 3 individuals that are

not residents of the dwelling, does not generate on-street parking or create a substantial increase in traffic, occurs inside the dwelling, not visible to the street.

- 6) [SB1410 violations of state law; schools](#) (Wadsack) [House Strike-Everything](#)
- a. **Summary:** The underlying bill expands the scope of the 1487 process, by which legislators can currently refer county and municipal ordinances, regulations, orders, and other official actions to the Attorney General for investigation. The strike-everything amendment regarding parent complaints for schools and school districts that have violated any part of the parent's or student's rights.
