      - 1. [SB 1100: Maricopa County; division; new counties](#) (*Hoffman*)  
**Summary:** Redraws the boundaries of Maricopa County and absorbs portions of the county into surrounding Gila, Pinal, Yavapai, Yuma, and La Paz Counties. Effective December 31, 2025.

      - 2. [SB 1101: Maricopa County; new counties; division](#) (*Hoffman*)  
**Summary:** Divides the current Maricopa County into four new counties: Amended Maricopa County, Hohokam County, Mogollon County and O'odham County. Provides for a transition period of no more than three years, a process for the election of county officers and creates an intercounty oversight and accountability board. Requires

the new counties to enter into intergovernmental agreements to manage special districts that cross county boundaries and permits counties to enter into a shared use agreement for shared capital assets. Requires the new counties to enter into an intergovernmental agreement for the continued operation of community colleges. Effective December 31, 2025.

3. [SCR 1004: prohibit tax; monitoring; vehicle mileage \(Hoffman\)](#)  
**Summary:** Via a voter referral that amends Arizona's Constitution, prohibits a political subdivision from (a) imposing a tax or fee on any person based on their miles traveled in a motor vehicle, or (b) enact any rule or law to monitor or limit the vehicle miles traveled by a person.
4. [HB 2043: harassment; intent; defense \(Kolodin\)](#)  
**Summary:** States that it is a defense to a prosecution of "harassment" if (a) the person at whom the conduct is directed is a public officer or employee, and (b) the acts complained of constituted criticism of that individual. States that the specific "harassment" involved can be either (a) communication or (b) "continuing to follow someone around in a public place."
5. [HB 2222: settlement agreements; report; approval \(Marshall\)](#)  
**Summary:** 90 days before entering into a settlement worth \$500,000 or more, requires a county to submit a settlement agreement report to various state leaders. Prior to entering into a settlement agreement that is \$1 million or more, requires the county to submit the proposed agreement to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee (JLBC). Permits the JLBC to review the proposed settlement and recommend that the county amend it. Specifies that if a county does not submit a proposed settlement (of \$1,000,000 or more) to the JLBC before entering into it, the agreement is not legally binding. Specifies that "legally binding contracts entered into by a county are a matter of statewide concern. Defines "settlement agreement" as "a consent decree, an agreement, or any other legally binding document or representation that resolves a threatened or pending lawsuit between a county and another party by requiring a county to take legally binding action." Excepts construction contract disputes, the settlement of disputes arising for actions by the State Land Department, agreements made to resolve construction contract claims, and the settlement of a civil litigation lawsuit from these requirements. Contains mirrored language for cities and towns. Requires the Attorney General to submit a settlement agreement to various state leaders at least 30 days before entering into one.
6. [HB 2606: appropriation; local border support \(Nguyen\)](#)  
**Summary:** Appropriates \$50 million from the state's general fund in FY 2026 to the Department of Public Safety (DPS) for local border support. Directs DPS to use the monies to fund local law enforcement officer positions, as well as provide grants for prosecution and detention linked to border-related crimes and capital equipment.

c) **Elections**

1. **HB 2017:** voting centers ban; precinct size (Keshel)

**Summary:** Prohibits a precinct from containing more than 1,000 registered voters. Prohibits a county's Board of Supervisors from establishing voting centers. Prohibits a county's Board of Supervisors from establishing emergency voting centers. Repeals statute permitting a County Recorder to establish on-site early voting locations.

2. [HCR 2002: voting centers; precinct voting \(Keshel\)](#)

**Summary:** Identical to **HB 2017**, but in the form of an **HCR**.

d) **County Treasurers**

1. [HB 2368: auditor general; records; financial institutions \(Gress\)](#)

**Summary:** In statute authorizing the Auditor General (AudG) and its authorized representatives to examine records, specifies that: **(a)** the AudG and their authorized representatives **shall** **"HAVE ACCESS TO FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS' OR FINANCIAL ENTERPRISES' INFORMATION, ACCOUNTS, BOOKS, RECORDS, STATEMENTS, REPORTS, COMMUNICATIONS, TRANSACTIONS OR ANY OTHER INFORMATION RELATING TO ANY STATE AGENCY, BOARD, COMMISSION, DEPARTMENT, INSTITUTION, PROGRAM, ADVISORY COUNCIL OR COMMITTEE OR POLITICAL SUBDIVISION OF THE STATE,"** **(b)** the financial institution/enterprise must produce the information in the form and at the time prescribed, and that the institution/enterprise must certify all information provided, and **(c)** the audited entity is responsible for any associated costs or fees, and that the financial institution/enterprise is not liable to the audited entity for the production of its records.

2. [HB 2369: auditor general; county treasurer; review \(Gress\)](#)

**Summary:** In statute outlining the Auditor General's (AudG's) powers and duties, amends statute to include performing **"PROCEDURAL REVIEWS OF COUNTY TREASURERS' OFFICES,"** including: **(a)** evaluating compliance with the AudG-prescribed Uniform System of Accounting for County Treasurers, as well as administrative and accounting internal controls **((ai) directs the AudG to provide the results of the procedural review, along with recommendations, in writing to the County Treasurer, County Board of Supervisors (County Board), and Joint Legislative Audit Committee (JLAC)).** **(b)** within a one-year period of the completion of the aforementioned review, permits the AudG to request from a County Treasurer a written status report on the correction of deficiencies and the implementation of recommendations **((bi) requires the AudG, within the same one-year period, to review the County Treasurer's progress in implementing recommendations and provide a status report to the JLAC and the County Board;** **(bii) requires the County Treasurer to participate in any hearing scheduled during this review period by the JLAC or any other designated committee),** and **(c)** permits the AudG to review progress after the one-year period if there are deficiencies uncorrected or recommendations unimplemented.

3. [HB 2433: county treasurers; continuing education \(Gress\)](#)

**Summary:** Within the first year of their term or appointment, requires a County Treasurer and Chief Deputy County Treasurer to complete at least ten hours of continuing education annually. One of these hours

must be devoted to the subject of waste, fraud, and abuse. Specifies that the provider of the continuing education must be approved by the County Board of Supervisors and can include governmental entities, financial institutions, or coursework from an accredited college or university. Requires the Board to cover all fees and costs associated with the education. Specifies that the continuing education must cover topics related to a Treasurer's powers and duties, including: (a) investment strategies, (b) waste, fraud, and abuse detection and prevention, (c) cash management, (d) cybersecurity, (e) internal auditing and compliance, and (f) generally accepted accounting principles. Requires the County Treasurers and their Chief Deputies to submit evidence of compliance to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors by December 31 of each year. States that failure to comply may result in a civil penalty of \$50/hour of continuing education not completed, levied by the Board.

Finally, doubles the amount of annual tax credits made available from \$4 million to \$10 million.

- a. [SB 1199: jury; termination of parental rights \(Payne\)](#)  
**Summary:** In a proceeding to terminate parental rights, requires a trial by jury if a parent files a relevant written request prior to – or at the time of – the initial termination hearing.
- b. [HB 2049: administrative decisions; security proceedings; hearings \(Kolodin\)](#)  
**Summary:** Gives a defendant the right to a trial by jury "*in any agency action in which a judgment or order is prayed for that seeks payment from the other party.*"
- c. [HB 2061: administrative proceedings; jury trials \(Fink\)](#)  
**Summary:** Specifies, "notwithstanding any other law," that a person shall be allowed to exercise a "trial by jury" in any administrative proceeding (which may be exercised by filing a "notice of removal of the proceeding" in the Superior or Justice Court). Defines "administrative proceeding" as a proceeding that meets all of the following: (a) involves either an amount in excess of \$20 or a significant liberty, (b) is a proceeding initiated by the government against a person, and

(c) the proceeding is not currently before the Arizona Supreme Court, the Arizona Court of Appeals, the Superior Court, a Justice Court, or a Municipal Court. Additionally, specifies that a "administrative proceeding" includes a disciplinary proceeding against a sworn peace officer where (a) the individual seeking to exercise the right is the sworn peace officer, and (b) the proceeding potentially results in a suspension of greater than one month or termination.

- c. [HB 2061: administrative proceedings; jury trials \(Fink\)](#)  
**Summary:** Specifies, "notwithstanding any other law," that a person shall be allowed to exercise a "trial by jury" in any administrative proceeding (which may be exercised by filing a "notice of removal of the proceeding" in the Superior or Justice Court). Defines "administrative proceeding" as a proceeding that meets all of the following: (a) involves either an amount in excess of \$20 or a significant liberty, (b) is a proceeding initiated by the government against a person, and

(c) the proceeding is not currently before the Arizona Supreme Court, the Arizona Court of Appeals, the Superior Court, a Justice Court, or a Municipal Court. Additionally, specifies that a "administrative proceeding" includes a disciplinary proceeding against a sworn peace officer where (a) the individual seeking to exercise the right is the sworn peace officer, and (b) the proceeding potentially results in a suspension of greater than one month or termination.

- d. [HB 2152: right to jury; domestic relations \(Keshe\)](#)  
**Summary:** Specifies, in any proceeding for dissolution of marriage or determination of legal decision-making or parenting time, either party may demand a jury trial.

2) **Bills for UPDATES**

- a) [HB 2113: flags; public property; prohibition \(Kupper\)](#)  
**Summary:** Prohibits all but approved flags from being displayed on public property in Arizona and lists the flags that are permitted on public property. Stipulates that this legislation applies only to those who are elected, appointed, or employed publicly.
