B. Legislative Bills for Discussion and Possible Action

1) Bills for POSSIBLE ACTION

- a) [HB 2706](#): mental health; intensive treatment orders (*Hernandez C*)

**Summary:** Creates a construct whereby a court that finds, by “*clear and convincing evidence*,” that a patient is “*seriously mentally ill*” or “*chronically resistant to treatment*” may enter an order for “*intensive treatment services*.”

Specifies that this order must include a “*written intensive treatment services plan*” prepared by staff familiar with the patient’s case history and must be inclusive of (a) an “*intensive case manager*,” whose role involves in-person contact with the individual at a regular frequency and includes regular firsthand assessments to assess adherence to the treatment plan, (b) residential placement, (c) medically necessary nonemergency transportation, and (d) other treatment services.

Permits the court to order periodic compliance hearings and permits the court to return the individual to inpatient treatment in cases of noncompliance. Contains statute that defines how an individual can be “*chronically resistant to treatment*.”

**Prior Disposition:** The LPC took a position of **OPPOSITION** at the **March 14<sup>th</sup> LPC**.

**Update:** After a stakeholder meeting involving several counties that were responsive to the related request for feedback, staff learned that the vast majority of the costs – such as the “*intensive case manager*,” residential placement, transportation, and the unspecified other services - that the bill would create would fall on the state, via the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System, and not the counties. There would be some increase in throughput for the local Superior Court and county defense staff.

- b) **SB 1257**: impaired persons; court-ordered stabilization (*Leach*)

**Summary:** **SB 1257** creates a construct whereby the admitting officer of an evaluation agency, on the emergency admission of an individual who is an “impaired person,” can petition for the individual to be entered into “court-ordered stabilization” (COS) at the evaluation agency for no more than five calendar days. Contains a definition of the term “impaired person,” – someone who, as a result of intoxication, withdrawal, or substance-abuse related symptoms, has impaired judgement causing them to be incapable of making or communicating rational decisions regarding their safety, health, or needs – and specifies that a petition for COS

**Prior Disposition:** The Board took a position of **OPPOSITION** at the **March 20<sup>th</sup> Board of Directors**.

**Update:** In the bill’s recent hearing, proponents outlined a coming floor amendment that would substantially narrow the bill’s potential impact to only the county that has expressed interest in the tool.

## 2) Bills for UPDATES

- a) **HB 2104**: emissions; voluntary vehicle repair; timeline (*Griffin*) & **HB 2105**: violation; unlawful open burning; enforcement (*Griffin*)

**Summary:**

- **HB 2105** is the bill that, among other items (*including other measures requested by the Department of Environmental Quality*), contained the three-year extension for the *Waste Tire Fee Fund*. This bill, once it passed the House, was never assigned to committee.
- **HB 2104** is a bill that, when amended in *Senate Natural Resources* on March 25<sup>th</sup>, took on the provision extending the *Waste Tire Fee Fund* for three years.

**Prior Disposition:** The LPC had previously **SUPPORTED** the strike-everything amendment that became HB 2105 (*specifically, because of the extension of the Waste Tire Fee Fund*).

**Update:** As HB 2105 was never successfully assigned, the *Waste Tire Fee Fund* continuation was amended onto HB 2104. CSA staff testified in **SUPPORT** of the bill when it was heard in *Senate Natural Resources*.

- b) **SB 1227**: **NOW**: ACJC; continuation revision (*Bolick*) & **SB 1223**: ACJC; continuation (*Kavanagh*)

**Summary:**

- **SB 1223** was the initial “clean” continuation bill for the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission, which extended the agency by eight years. It was never heard in a first-chamber committee.
- After a number of intermediary bills, which either canceled the ACJC or changed its composition entirely, the **strike-everything amendment to SB 1227** in the March 26<sup>th</sup> Judiciary Committee will extend the Commission by two years, make minor changes to membership, and requires in-person attendance by commissioners.

**Prior Disposition:** The LPC took a position of **SUPPORT** on **SB 1223**.

**Update:** SB 1227 has been struck with the “cleanest” continuation that the Commission is likely to get. As such, CSA staff signed in **SUPPORTING** the bill.

- c) **HB 2704**: tax; distribution; county stadium district (*Weninger*)  
**Prior Disposition:** The LPC previously took a position of **OPPOSITION**, noting concerns with the change in the TPT distribution mechanisms and the lack of a sunset.  
**Update:** The bill underwent a [significant amendment](#) when it passed out of the Senate's Finance Committee on March 24<sup>th</sup>.
  
- d) **HB 2433**: county treasurers; continuing education (*Gress*)  
**Prior Disposition:** The LPC previously **OPPOSED HB 2433**.  
**Update:** The bill died in the Senate's Regulatory Affairs and Government Efficiency (RAGE) Committee on March 12<sup>th</sup>. The sponsor and proponents of the bill recently agreed to [several amendments](#) to address concerns brought forward by the Association. The bill will be brought back for reconsideration on March 26<sup>th</sup>.
  
- e) **HB 2927**: public meetings; records; requirements; penalties (*Carbone*)  
**Prior Disposition:** The LPC **OPPOSED HB 2927** on February 14<sup>th</sup>. On April 11<sup>th</sup>, the Association staff shifted the position to **NEUTRAL** to reflect the significant amendments made to the bill  
**Update:** The bill will undergo another [significant amendment](#) in Senate Government on *March 26<sup>th</sup>*.
  
- f) **HB 2928**: accessory dwelling units; requirements (*Carbone*)  
**Prior Disposition:** The LPC **OPPOSED HB 2927** on February 14<sup>th</sup>. On March 5<sup>th</sup>, the Association staff shifted the position to **NEUTRAL** to reflect the significant amendments made to the bill  
**Update:** The Association has engaged in conversations with the sponsor and proponents on another potential amendment.
