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Remembering Joan K Bozer - Former Erie County Legislator

- WHEREAS, the late *Joan K. Bozer* has diligently and went above and beyond to serve our residents throughout Erie County; and
- WHEREAS, she attended a junior college and did office work, then earned a bachelor's degree in history and government from Empire State College later in life; and
- **WHEREAS**, before getting actively involved in politics, Joan was president of the League of Women Voters; and
- WHEREAS, during her 9 terms as Erie County Legislator, starting in the 1970s, Bozar fought to preserve the old U.S. Post Office building by turning it into the City Campus for SUNY Erie Community College; and
- WHEREAS, she spent much of the rest of her life working to preserve and enhance that beauty; and
- WHEREAS, Joan played a key role in founding a nonprofit dedicated to preserving Buffalo's parks; and
- WHEREAS, in 1980, Bozer helped found the Friends of Olmsted Parks, which later became the Buffalo Olmsted Parks Conservancy; and
- WHEREAS, she was also among the organizers who founded the Western New York Sustainable Energy Association in 1990; and
- WHEREAS, in 2014, she received the Lifetime Achievement Award from Preservation Buffalo Niagara; and
- WHEREAS, in 2021, Bozer was honored with the dedication of the menagerie's giraffe in her name at Canalside inside of the Buffalo Heritage Carousel; and
- WHEREAS, Bozer's efforts sparked a turning point in Buffalo's treatment of its historic assets, city preservation advocates; and

WHEREAS, Joan's distinguished career, background and years of service as a public servant has made her a formidable icon in local government; and

WHEREAS, she has always been so understanding and compassionate on the side of people who are going through hardships of any kind; and

WHEREAS, because of her years of service, SUNY Erie will be naming their new Atrium after Joan, a woman worthy of such praise and public recognition; and

WHEREAS, this Honorable Body desires to acknowledge and recognize individuals such as the late *Joan K. Bozer* who enhance, represent, and change our community by way of action.

Celebrating the 150th Anniversary of the Village of East Aurora

WHEREAS, the Village of East Aurora, New York, is located just 25 miles outside of downtown Buffalo, in the Town of Aurora, and is considered by many to be one of the crown jewel communities in Erie County; and

WHEREAS as the Village of East Aurora celebrates its one-hundred-and-fiftieth anniversary in the year 2024, it is fitting to recognize the village and its residents on the occasion of this monumental milestone; and

WHEREAS, in the early 1800s, the state of New York began to allow local town hamlets with high populations to incorporate as villages to provide better governmental services, such as sidewalks, street lamps, police departments; and

WHEREAS, in 1836, the Village of Auroraville was incorporated in what is now the present-day eastern end of the Village of East Aurora, later being named the Village of Willink in 1849 after Wilhelm Willink of the Holland Land Company; and

WHEREAS, by 1874, residents voted to change the name from Willink to East Aurora, officially incorporating the village on June 2, 1874; and

WHEREAS, from being home to iconic businesses like Fisher-Price, Vidler's 5 and 10 Store, and the Bar-Bill Tavern to historic assets such as the Millard Fillmore House and the Roycroft Campus, throughout its one hundred and fifty-year history, the Village of East Aurora has played a significant role in the cultural fabric of Western New York; and,

WHEREAS, the Village of East Aurora has evolved greatly over its one hundred and fifty years to be a thriving community for residents, businesses, and visitors alike to enjoy while successfully preserving its historical assets and maintaining its unique charm.

Acknowledging and Recognizing Cleveland Hill School Fire Memorial Day

WHEREAS, on March 31, 1954 a devastating fire occurred at the Cleveland Hill School, as the school's furnace exploded, causing a massive fire in the wooden annex of the building; and

WHEREAS, the wooden annex only had two exits, which were both engulfed in flames, and windows were inaccessible due to heavy, multiple coats of paint on them that made the windows impossible to open; and

WHEREAS, the fire resulted in the loss of 15 school children that day, which had a major emotional toll on the school district and all of Erie County and New York State; and

WHEREAS, in the months and years after the fire, State lawmakers worked to significantly enhance and improve school building codes and fire safety measures with the hopes of preventing another fire like the 1954 Cleveland Hill incident; and

WHEREAS, legislation was introduced to ban building schools from wood, to make sure that every classroom space had adequate escape routes, to require fire extinguishers be placed in all schools, and to mandate fire drills for all students; and

WHEREAS, to this day, there has not been another public school fire in this country, due to the improved fire safety regulations that were implemented following the devasting Cleveland Hill School Fire.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT



SUMMARY

This Department of Public Works is seeking authorization for the County Executive to enter into an agreement with the firm of Labella Associates for architectural/engineering services to provide a project design report to build a New EMS Support Facility (Ambulance HQ) in the Town of Aurora. County owned property was identified as the proposed construction site located at 586 Olean Rd., East Aroura, NY 14051.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

An amount not to exceed \$110,000 is available within the Division of Buildings and Grounds Budget, Fund 410, Funds Center 122, Capital Project A.23073 – 2023 EMS Ambulance Building.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

In 2023, the County launched an ambulance service to expand coverage, particularly in the southern townships. A central headquarters is needed to house the emergency vehicles and provide support facilities for EMS personnel.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Erie County established ambulance service to provide supplemental emergency medical support and ambulance transport, particularly in the Southern rural communities of the county. The ambulance service is intended to fill the gaps in coverage, address transit times, and assist local EMTs and paramedics.

A new EMS support Facility (Ambulance HQ) is needed to station the emergency vehicles and provide support facilities for EMS personnel and equipment. County owned property located at 586 Olean Rd., East Aurora, NY 14051 was identified as a proposed construction site. Professional design services are required to evaluate the suitability of the site for construction, provide a project design report inclusive of environmental assessment, pre-design/ programming, and construction estimate. Construction of the headquarters will further provide the rural residents of southern Erie County with access to fast, efficient, life-saving emergency medical response and transport where needed.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If the ambulance headquarters is not built, ambulance service will not be effectively provided to meet the needs of the southern townships. The effect on residents is longer wait times for an ambulance in these underserved communities.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The County Executive will enter into an Agreement with the engineering firm of Labella Associates so that design work can proceed.

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE REVIEW

The proposed legislation has been reviewed by the Comptroller's Office and is related to an authorized capital project for which there are sufficient appropriations for the action proposed.



WHEREAS, Erie County, New York lies along the shore of Lake Erie, the 12th largest lake in the world; and

WHEREAS, Lake Erie is the shallowest, warmest and most biologically productive of the five Great Lakes; and

WHEREAS, more fish are produced each year for human consumption from Lake Erie than the total from the other four Great Lakes combined; and

WHEREAS, Lake Erie is fed by a drainage basin that is 22,720 square miles and is an important source of drinking water for approximately 11 million people; and

WHEREAS, Lake Erie is the source of water for Niagara Falls, a tourist attraction known for its natural beauty and a major source of hydroelectric power, supplying one-quarter of the power used in New York State and Ontario; and

WHEREAS, Erie County understands the importance of Lake Erie to health, tourism, industry, recreation and quality of life; and

WHEREAS, the installation of windmills on Lake Erie could negatively impact the quality of life for residents in Erie County; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County legislature is concerned that New York State and/or a body created under the auspices of the State might allow private and/or public entities build or direct to be placed wind turbines in the water of Lake Erie; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Legislature is concerned about the impact of such structures on human and wildlife habitats that depend on Lake Erie; and

Summary of Recommended Action

The Erie County Sheriff's Office is requesting authorization to purchase a Blast and Ballistic Resistant Bomb Squad/SWAT Response Vehicle from Roshel, Inc. for \$320,000.

Fiscal Implications of the Proposal

Sufficient funding was previously transferred into Erie County Sheriff's Office account 561440, Motor Vehicles (COMM. 17E-13 (2023)) for the purchase of a BearCat from Lenco. This purchase order will be cancelled.

Reasons for Recommendation

SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDED ACTION/BACKGROUND

By request of the Erie County Legislature, the Erie County Comptroller's Office has developed a resolution which would require County departments that have been formally audited by the Comptroller's Office to complete a Corrective Action Plan within 60 days after the formal issuance of the audit.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

None.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

County departments that have been audited by the Comptroller's Office have never been required to address audit findings or to implement changes or reforms recommended by audits. This has led to a situation in which departments can ignore audit findings and continue the same practices and actions which have been flagged as deficient or problematic.

By resolving to require a Corrective Action Plan, Erie County can establish a systematic approach to address the findings of future Comptroller audits. This will facilitate a structured process for identifying responsible parties, setting realistic timelines for implementation, and monitoring progress toward resolution. Moreover, a resolution of this nature will underscore the County's commitment to fiscal responsibility and judicious use of taxpayer funds. It will demonstrate to residents and businesses that their interests are safeguarded through a proactive and accountable approach to resolving financial discrepancies.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Comptroller audits will continue to be issued and departments may continue to not address findings or correct deficiencies or problems.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Departments subject to audits will be required and directed to file Corrective Action Plans with the Legislature within 60 days after the issuance of audits.

A RESOLUTION SUBMITTED BY THE COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE

Re: Mandating Corrective Action Plans Following County Comptroller Audits

WHEREAS, Erie County is a municipal corporation primarily funded by taxpayers and bears a responsibility to ensure that such funds are being used to further legitimate governmental purposes for the benefit of the public; and

WHEREAS, among other obligations and mandates, the Erie County Comptroller is the municipal officer responsible for auditing agencies and departments of Erie County to ensure that taxpayer funds are being used for their intended purpose and that internal controls and procedures are designed and operating to prevent theft, loss, and shrinkage; and

WHEREAS, over the years, the Erie County Comptroller's Office has issued audits with findings and recommendations, many of which have been frequently agreed to by the auditees, but never followed up on, or implemented by the auditee after the audit ended; and

WHEREAS, the New York State Comptroller's Office requires local government auditees to develop, submit and implement a Corrective Action Plan to that office following the completion of a State Comptroller's audit; and

WHEREAS, there is no requirement in the Erie County Charter, Administrative Code, applicable State law or policy which requires an audited entity to devise a Corrective Action Plan in response to an Erie County Comptroller audit report, or to take any ameliorative action whatsoever; and

WHEREAS, this raises the potential that auditees could ignore or decline to acknowledge major audit findings and implement recommendations, thereby leaving serious deficiencies in place.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature hereby determines that the ability of an auditee to ignore significant findings and/or material weaknesses contained in audit reports issued by the Erie County Comptroller is a disservice to the taxpayers of Erie County; and

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature hereby states that effective upon passage of this resolution, all auditees who are audited by the Erie County Comptroller's Office shall be required to submit a Corrective Action Plan to the Erie County Legislature within 60 days following the issuance of a formal audit report by the Comptroller's Office; and be it further

RESOLVED, that a Corrective Action Plan shall separately address each significant finding, material weakness, and recommendation contained in the audit report and detail the auditee's action steps to address the findings and implement the recommendations; and

RESOLVED, that certified copies of this resolution be transmitted to the Erie County Comptroller, County Executive, County Clerk, County Sheriff, District Attorney, Commissioners of Elections, Director of the Buffalo and Erie County Public Library, and the heads/commissioners of each executive department.

RESOLUTION NO. _____, 2024 BOND RESOLUTION DATED _____, 2024

BOND RESOLUTION OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF ERIE, NEW YORK (THE "COUNTY"), AUTHORIZING VARIOUS CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROJECTS THAT WERE INCLUDED IN THE COUNTY'S 2024 CAPITAL BUDGET (COLLECTIVELY, THE "PROJECTS"), STATING THE TOTAL ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF THE PROJECTS TO BE \$79,525,000, APPROPRIATING SUCH AMOUNT THEREFOR (INCLUDING THE EXPENDITURE OF \$15,842,385 OF STATE AND FEDERAL AID), AND AUTHORIZING THE USE OF \$7,500,000 OF AVAILABLE FUNDS OF THE COUNTY THE ISSUANCE OF UP TO \$56,182,615 OF BONDS OR OTHER OBLIGATIONS OF THE COUNTY (THE "OBLIGATIONS") TO FINANCE THE BALANCE OF THE MAXIMUM ESITMATED COST OF SUCH PROJECTS, ADDRESSING CERTAIN RELATED MATTERS, AND FURTHER AUTHORIZING ANY AMOUNTS RECEIVED FROM THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND/OR THE STATE OF NEW YORK OR ANY OTHER SOURCE FOR THE PROJECTS TO BE EXPENDED TOWARDS THE COST OF CERTAIN OF THE PROJECTS AS INDICATED HEREIN, OR TOWARDS THE REDEMPTION OF ANY OF THE OBLIGATIONS ISSUED THEREFOR, OR TO BE BUDGETED AS AN OFFSET TO THE TAXES FOR PAYMENT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON SUCH OBLIGATIONS.

> (Introduced) February 15, 2024 (Adopted) ______, 2024

WHEREAS, the County Legislature (the "Legislature") of the County of Erie (the "County"), a municipal corporation of the State of New York (the "State") has been in the process of planning various capital improvements projects (collectively, the "Projects") that are listed on the schedule/listing of such Projects that is attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof (the "Schedule"); and

WHEREAS, such planning has been undertaken, together with appropriate environmental compliance determination proceedings under the State Environmental Quality Review Act, by the County's Energy and Environment Committee (the "Committee") and/or the County's Department of Environment & Planning (the "Department"), and has included such administrative actions as are necessary or required by the State or any federal agency with respect to assessing the potential environmental impacts of the Projects and ensuring the safety and security of persons and property in the County with respect to the Projects; and

WHEREAS, the New Road project environmental review documents have been attached to this resolution, have been approved and adopted herein, and are incorporated herein by reference; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature, in accordance with the recommendations of the Committee and the Department, has determined: (A) that the Projects are in the public interest of the County and should be undertaken, (B) that there should be expended toward certain of the Projects \$15,842,385 of State and Federal aid, as noted on the Schedule; (C) that the County intends to spend \$7,500,000 of available funds of the County toward the cost of certain projects as noted on the schedule; and (D) that there should be issued up to \$56,182,615 of bonds, notes, or other obligations of the County (collectively, the "Obligations"), to finance the balance of the estimated maximum cost of the Projects, as noted on the schedule;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, by the Legislature (by the favorable vote of not less than two-thirds of all the members of the Legislature) as follows:

SECTION 1. The County is hereby authorized to undertake the Projects that are listed in column A of the Schedule, each as more fully described in column I of the schedule. To the extent that the details set forth in this resolution are inconsistent with any details set forth in the duly adopted 2024 Capital Budget of the County (the "Budget"), the Budget shall be deemed to be, and hereby is, amended. For each of the specific objects or purposes or classes of objects or purposes as specified in column B of the Schedule, the respective estimated maximum costs, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and to the financing thereof, are set forth in column C of the Schedule, and the respective amounts are hereby appropriated therefor in accordance with the Budget.

SECTION 2. The plan of financing for the Projects includes the expenditure of \$15,842,385 in State and Federal aid that has been or is expected to be received for certain of the Projects (as detailed on the Schedule), along with the issuance of up to \$56,182,615 of Obligations to finance the balance of the aggregate estimated maximum cost of the Projects, and the levy and collection of taxes on all the taxable real property in the County to pay the principal of such Obligations and the interest thereon as the same shall become due and payable. Any amounts received by the County from the United States of America and/or from the State of New York or other sources for the Projects are hereby authorized to be expended towards the cost of the Projects or the redemption of any Obligations issued therefor, or to be budgeted as an offset to the taxes for payment of the principal of and interest on such Obligations.

SECTION 3. The respective periods of probable usefulness for the specific objects or purposes, classes of objects or purposes and combinations of objects or purposes for which the \$56,182,615 of Obligations herein authorized are to be issued, within the limitations of §11.00 of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York (the "Law"), are set forth in column G of the Schedule. Obligations (including, without limitation, serial bonds of the County) in amounts up to the respective maximum principal amounts set forth in column D of the Schedule are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Law to finance the various objects or purposes that are listed on the Schedule.

SECTION 4. The temporary use of available funds of the County, not immediately required for the purpose or purposes for which the same were borrowed, raised or otherwise created, is hereby authorized and (to the extent that such use has already occurred) is hereby ratified, pursuant to Section 165.10 of the Local Finance Law, for the purpose or purposes described in this resolution. The County intends to finance, and the County Comptroller, as the chief fiscal officer of the County (the "Comptroller") is hereby authorized to advance, such amounts as are necessary to pay the costs of the respective specific objects or purposes or classes of objects or purposes described in Section 1 hereof, prior to the issuance of the Obligations, out of any available funds of the County on an interim basis. The County reasonably expects to reimburse any such expenditures (to the extent made after the date hereof or within 60 days prior to the earlier of (A) the date hereof or (B) any earlier expression by the County of its intent to reimburse expenditures for the applicable Project(s) or any earlier iteration thereof) with the proceeds of the Obligations, to the extent consistent with the financing plan for such Project(s) as stated herein. This resolution shall constitute the declaration (or reaffirmation) of the County's "official intent" to reimburse the expenditures authorized in this resolution with the proceeds of the Obligations, as required by United States Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2.

SECTION 5. Each of the Obligations shall contain the recital of validity prescribed by §52.00 of the Law and the Obligations shall be general obligations of the County, payable as to both principal and interest by a general tax upon all the taxable real property within the County without limitation as to rate or amount (subject to certain statutory limitations imposed by Chapter 97 of the 2011 Laws of New York). The faith and credit of the County are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year in the County budget sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the Obligations becoming due and payable in such year and, to the extent not paid from other sources or charges, there shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of the County a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such Obligations.

SECTION 6. Subject to the provisions of this Resolution and of the Law, and pursuant to the provisions of §21.00 relative to the issuance of bonds having substantially level or declining annual debt service, §30.00 relative to the authorization of the issuance of bond anticipation notes or the renewals thereof, and of §§50.00, 56.00 to 60.00, 62.00, 62.10, 63.00, 164.00 and 168.00 of the Law, the powers and duties of the Legislature relative to authorizing the issuance of Obligations in the form of notes, or the renewals thereof, relative to providing for substantially level or declining annual debt service, relative to prescribing the final amounts, terms, form and contents and as to the procedures for the sale and issuance of the Obligations, and relative to executing any agreements for credit enhancement, are hereby delegated to the Comptroller. Without in any way limiting the scope of the foregoing delegation of powers, the Comptroller, to the extent permitted by Section 58.00(f) of the Local Finance Law, is hereby specifically authorized to accept bids for the Obligations that are submitted in electronic format. In the absence or unavailability of the Comptroller, the Deputy County Comptroller is hereby specifically authorized to exercise the powers delegated to the Comptroller in this resolution.

SECTION 7. When this resolution takes effect, the Clerk of the Legislature shall cause the same (or a summary thereof) to be published, together with a notice in substantially the form prescribed by Section 81.00 of the Law, in the *Buffalo Challenger* and the *Lancaster Bee*, which

are newspapers having general circulation in the County and published in the County. The validity of the Obligations may thereafter be contested only if the Obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which the County is not authorized to expend money, or the provisions of law which should have been complied with at the date of the publication of this resolution (or a summary thereof) are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within 20 days after the date of such publication, or if the Obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution of the State of New York.

SECTION 8. Prior to the issuance of any Obligations, the County (acting through the Committee and the Department and, to the extent necessary or appropriate, the Legislature) has or will have complied (to the extent not accomplished already) with any applicable provisions prescribed in Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law, all regulations promulgated thereunder by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, and all applicable federal laws and regulations in connection with the environmental quality review process relating to the Projects (collectively, the "Environmental Compliance Proceedings"). The New Road project's compliance with the applicable provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act is hereby confirmed on the basis of the attached New Road project environmental documents. In the event that any of such Environmental Compliance Proceedings are not completed or require amendment or modification subsequent to the date of adoption of this resolution, the Legislature will re-adopt, amend or modify this resolution prior to the issuance of the relevant Obligations, to the extent required and acting upon the advice of counsel. It is hereby determined by the Legislature, on the basis of the Environmental Compliance Proceedings and the findings of the Committee and/or the Department, that to the extent that the Environmental Compliance Proceedings may apply to the Projects, the Projects (when assessed either individually or in the aggregate) will not result in a significant adverse impact on the environment. As to the New Road project, the Legislature declares itself Lead Agency and accepts all responsibilities associated with that designation. The Legislature finds that the New Road project is an Unlisted Action pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act. Further, with respect to the New Road project, based upon a thorough review and examination of the known facts relating to such project and its careful review of all potentially adverse environmental impacts, and the entire record and proceedings, including the Environmental Information, relating to such project, the Legislature finds that such project will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment and that a Draft Environmental Impact Statement will not be prepared. And further, with respect to the New Road project, the attached Negative Declaration, which is hereby incorporated by reference, is issued and adopted for the reasons stated in the determination of non-significance.

SECTION 9. The County intends to issue the Obligations to finance a portion of the maximum cost of the Projects. The Comptroller is hereby authorized to covenant, in the name and on behalf of the County and for the benefit of the holders and beneficial owners of the Obligations, that the County will not make any use of the proceeds of the Obligations, or any funds reasonably expected to be used to pay the principal of or interest on the Obligations or any other funds of the County, and will not make any use of the facilities to be financed with the proceeds of the Obligations that would cause the interest on the Obligations to become subject to federal income taxation under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code") or subject the County to any penalties under Section 148 of the Code, and that the County will not take any action or omit to take any action with respect to the Obligations, the proceeds thereof or any facilities to be financed thereby if such action or omission would cause the interest on the Obligations to become

subject to federal income taxation under the Code or subject the County to any penalties under Section 148 of the Code.

SECTION 10. For the benefit of the holders and beneficial owners from time to time of the Obligations, the County agrees, in accordance with and as an obligated person with respect to the Obligations under Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities Exchange Commission pursuant to the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 (the "Rule"), to provide or cause to be provided such financial information and operating data, financial statements and notices, in such manner, as may be required for purposes of the Rule. In order to describe and specify certain terms of the County's continuing disclosure agreement for that purpose, and thereby to implement that agreement, including provisions for enforcement, amendment and termination thereof, the Comptroller is authorized and directed to sign and deliver, in the name and on behalf of the County, the commitment authorized by subsection 6(c) of the Rule (the "Commitment") to be placed on file with the Clerk to the Legislature, which shall constitute the continuing disclosure agreement made by the County for the benefit of holders and beneficial owners of the Obligations in accordance with the Rule, with any changes or amendments that are not inconsistent with this Resolution and not substantially adverse to the County and that are approved by the Comptroller on behalf of the County, all of which shall be conclusively evidenced by the signing of the Commitment or amendments thereto. The agreement formed, collectively, by this paragraph and the Commitment, shall constitute the County's continuing disclosure agreement for purposes of the Rule, and its performance shall be subject to the availability of funds and their annual appropriation to meet costs the County would be required to incur to perform thereunder. The County Comptroller is further authorized and directed to establish procedures in order to ensure compliance by the County with its various continuing disclosure agreements, including the timely provision of information and notices. Prior to making any filing in accordance with the agreement or providing notice of the occurrence of any material event, the Comptroller shall consult with, as appropriate, the County Attorney and the County's bond counsel, the County's municipal advisor, or another qualified independent special counsel to the County. The Comptroller, acting in the name and on behalf of the County, shall be entitled to rely upon any legal advice provided by the County Attorney or such bond counsel or other special counsel in determining whether a filing should be made.

SECTION 11. The Comptroller is hereby specifically authorized to act, on the advice of bond counsel at the time of the issuance of the Obligations, to designate such Obligations, if applicable, as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" in accordance with Section 265(b)(3) of the Code.

SECTION 12. The Comptroller is further authorized to call in and redeem any outstanding Obligations that were issued pursuant to this bond resolution(at such times and in such amounts and maturities as may be deemed appropriate after consultation with the County officials and the County's municipal advisor), to approval any related notice of redemption, and to take such actions and execute such documents as may be necessary to effectuate any such call(s) for redemption pursuant to Section 53.00 of the Law, with the understanding that no such call(s) for redemption will be made unless such notice of redemption shall have first been filed with the Clerk of the Legislature.

SECTION 13. This bond resolution shall take effect immediately upon approval by the County Executive



These agencies will provide in-home care to eligible older adults for the period of April 1, 2024, through March 31, 2027. Contracting with these agencies will allow the Department of Senior Services to continue to provide much needed homecare to existing clients on the program and allow for the growth of the program to expand to additional eligible older adults to receive assistance.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

No additional County funds are required. Aggregate budgetary appropriations totaling \$2,860,149 are available in various Departmental grants (163III-E2024, 163III-EARP2124, 163EISEP2425, 163CSE2425, 163UNMETNEED2425) via Home Care services account (516026). Homecare appropriations for subsequent contract years are to be determined by amounts available in each of those year's County budgets.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Providing Home Care services allows older adults to remain in their homes longer, delays costly placement in long-term care facilities, reduces social isolation and maintains a sense of dignity and purpose to the clients. Home Care aides are often in short supply and staff turnover is high. Contracting with numerous agencies increases the Department's ability to obtain aides for as many clients as possible.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

The Department of Senior Services would be unable to provide Home Care services to eligible older adults in Erie County.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Contracts with the thirteen Home Care agencies will be executed, and home care services will continue to be provided to the community.

Re: Authorization to Establish Legionella Testing Fee

SUMMARY

ECDOH's Public Health Lab would like to begin offering Legionella testing as a new service. The testing fee would be \$175, compared to about \$250 for private labs. The Lab can use current equipment with some modifications to offer this new service and the fee would cover staff and supplies to do the testing.

This service is in high demand because all owners of cooling towers in New York State are required to register, maintain, sample, disinfect and notify local health departments and the public of elevated levels of Legionella.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Positive. This is new revenue that would cover the staff and supplies needed for the Public Health Lab to offer a new service.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Legionella is a bacteria that can cause Legionnaires' disease and other flu-like infections. The most common source of Legionnaires' disease outbreaks are cooling towers because of the widespread circulation. New York State. All owners of cooling towers in New York State are required to register, maintain, sample, disinfect and notify local health departments and the public of elevated levels of Legionella. Due to these requirements, Legionella testing is in high demand. The Lab can offer this testing for less than private labs and help meet demand using existing equipment.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

ECDOH will not be able to offer this new service that is in high demand.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

ECDOH will work with Budget and Management and Office of the Comptroller to establish and collect the fee for Legionella testing.

WHEREAS, after several Legionnaires' disease outbreaks, New York State requires all owners of cooling towers in New York State are required to register, maintain, sample, disinfect and notify local health departments and the public of elevated levels of Legionella; and

WHEREAS, these requirements have created high demand for Legionella testing to prevent a future outbreak; and

WHEREAS, the Lab is able to offer Legionella testing to help with demand with current equipment for a \$175 fee to cover staff and supplies; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature hereby authorizes the Department of Health's Public Health Lab to create a Legionella Testing fee for \$175; and be it further

RESOLVED, that certified copies of this resolution will be forwarded to the Erie County Executive's Office, Comptroller's Office, Department of Health, and Division of Budget and Management.

SUMMARY

The accompanying resolution requests execution of an amendment to the On Call Term agreement with Greenman Pedersen Inc. (GPI) referenced above for land surveying services. There are outstanding right of way issues in various locations around Erie County, which require Land Survey services to resolve. GPI was selected through the County's RFP consultant selection process to provide On-Call General Civil Engineering and Land Surveying Services. This selection was approved by your Honorable Body via COMM. 2E-21 (February 2, 2023).

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The sum of \$45,865 is requested for a contract Amendment for ongoing right of way issues. Funding is available in Fund 420, Fund Center 123, Capital Project B.18051 – 2018 Capital Right of Way.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

There are land issues, which arise within the operations of a highway division. These issues require the acquisition and transference of lands, acquisition of maintenance easements, etc. The Department of Public Works Division of Highways works with the County Attorney's office to resolve these issues. However, legal descriptions and maps are required to complete these tasks. The County does not have in its employ a licensed land surveyor, which is required to prepare the necessary documents for the County Attorney's office. The above-referenced contract allows for these land surveying services.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

At present, there are several issues the Division of Highways needs to resolve. They involve sections of county roadway which are not within the highway right of way. These property transactions are not related to specific highway projects.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If the use of these available funds is not approved these right of way transactions will remain unresolved and the County could face consequences from other landowners.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Available funds will be added to the existing term contract with GPI, and the required land surveying and mapping will take place.

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE REVIEW

The proposed legislation has been reviewed by the Office of the Comptroller and is related to an authorized capital project for which there are sufficient appropriations for the action proposed.



SUMMARY

This Department of Public Works is seeking authorization for the County Executive to enter into an agreement with the firm of Labella Associates for architectural/engineering services to provide a project design report to build a New EMS Support Facility (Ambulance HQ) in the Town of Aurora. County owned property was identified as the proposed construction site located at 586 Olean Rd., East Aroura, NY 14051.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

An amount not to exceed \$110,000 is available within the Division of Buildings and Grounds Budget, Fund 410, Funds Center 122, Capital Project A.23073 – 2023 EMS Ambulance Building.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

In 2023, the County launched an ambulance service to expand coverage, particularly in the southern townships. A central headquarters is needed to house the emergency vehicles and provide support facilities for EMS personnel.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Erie County established ambulance service to provide supplemental emergency medical support and ambulance transport, particularly in the Southern rural communities of the county. The ambulance service is intended to fill the gaps in coverage, address transit times, and assist local EMTs and paramedics.

A new EMS support Facility (Ambulance HQ) is needed to station the emergency vehicles and provide support facilities for EMS personnel and equipment. County owned property located at 586 Olean Rd., East Aurora, NY 14051 was identified as a proposed construction site. Professional design services are required to evaluate the suitability of the site for construction, provide a project design report inclusive of environmental assessment, pre-design/ programming, and construction estimate. Construction of the headquarters will further provide the rural residents of southern Erie County with access to fast, efficient, life-saving emergency medical response and transport where needed.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If the ambulance headquarters is not built, ambulance service will not be effectively provided to meet the needs of the southern townships. The effect on residents is longer wait times for an ambulance in these underserved communities.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The County Executive will enter into an Agreement with the engineering firm of Labella Associates so that design work can proceed.

The proposed legislation has been reviewed by the Comptroller's Office and is related to an authorized capital project for which there are sufficient appropriations for the action proposed.



SUMMARY

The Department of Public Works (DPW) advertised for an Erie County On-Call Hazardous Material Consultant for assistance in projects Countywide as requested by DPW. Watts Architects and Engineers was selected to provide said consulting services and \$75,000 funding was provided for the Term Agreement per COMM 13E-10 (2022). Due to project workload, an additional \$75,000 for to a total contract value of \$150,000 per COMM 19E-4 (2023). This resolution seeks to increase the contract with an additional \$46,763 for a total contract value of \$196,763.

At this time, The Department of Public Works (DPW) is seeking approval for additional funding for this Term Agreement as there have been unforeseen conditions on existing projects related to Hazardous Materials requiring additional services through the term agreement beyond what could have been anticipated.

Air sampling and asbestos abatement monitoring is required for all abatement projects in County owned facilities in accordance with all applicable local, state, and federal standards including Code Rule 56.

The Commissioner of Public Works is, therefore, recommending that the Erie County Legislature authorize the County Executive to approve the Additional Funding request.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Sufficient funding exists for this contract amendment within the existing capital projects (Fund 410, Funds Center 122) as follows:

A.23005 - DPW (Buildings and Grounds) - Preservation of County Buildings	\$24,000
and Facilities A.22052 - DPW (Buildings and Grounds) – Preservation of County Buildings	\$22,763

Consultant billing would be on an hourly basis according to the approved rate schedule per their proposal unless an agreed upon work scope and fee can be determined prior to beginning any services.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The County does not have the capability internally to perform these services and the County has several older buildings within their inventory that contain hazardous materials. The original amount provided for the Term Agreement is almost depleted.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The environmental consulting services necessary include hazardous materials design and/or sample testing and air monitoring on various County projects to maintain compliance with federal regulations. These services are necessary to implement new asbestos abatement programs and to continue previously initiated asbestos abatement programs.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If the additional funding is not approved, the County will not have the ability to have suspect materials sampled and tested in a timely manner. Furthermore, full compliance with State and Federal standards for abatement and monitoring hazardous materials, including NYS Department of Labor Code Rule 56, would be put in jeopardy.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Upon legislative approval, additional funding will be provided for the term contract with Watts Architecture and Engineering.



SUMMARY

The Department of Public Works is seeking authorization to enter into an agreement with the New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT) for the engineering design and Right of Way Incidentals phases of the above referenced federal aid project.

Additionally, the Department is requesting authorization to execute an agreement between the County of Erie and the design firm of Bergmann Associates in the amount of \$830,600 for engineering design services, and to establish a project contingency of \$71,400, for a total project design cost not to exceed \$902,000. Bergmann Associates was selected using the Procedures for Locally Administered Federal Aid Projects (PLAFAP) guidelines.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The total cost of the engineering design and Right of Way incidentals phase with a project contingency for this project is currently estimated at \$902,000. The NYSDOT Agreement is in the amount of \$902,000 and funding is available in B.23005 – 2023 Federal Aid – Road Design. The budget needs to be adjusted for federal and non-federal monies and an allocation of a local share in the amounts listed below;

B.23005 – 2023 Federal Aid Road Design

Federal Aid Revenue \$721,600 Marchiselli Revenue \$135,300 Local Share \$45,100 \$902,000

The negotiated agreement between Erie County and Bergmann Associates, as the project design engineer, for engineering design services plus a project contingency will not exceed the total budget of \$902,000. Should the agreement receive any additional federal or non-federal reimbursements in the future, the capital project budget would be adjusted to reflect that increase.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The Rehabilitation of Abbott Road project is eligible as a Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Project which allows the County of Erie to utilize available county funds to leverage federal and New York State funds towards the improvement of its infrastructure on a federal aid eligible highway. Bergmann Associates is recommended as project design engineers because of their expertise, experience, and manpower to provide the County of Erie with the service required. Erie County is eligible for reimbursement, from federal funds and NYS Marchiselli

funds, under this Agreement with NYSDOT.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The crash rate at the Abbott Road and Ridge Road intersection exceeds the statewide average for similar intersections. The existing Abbott Road pavement section is showing signs of distress with longitudinal cracking. The road has received numerous patches due to pavement failures and utility repairs, and the existing drainage system needs repairs. The project objective is to mitigate high crash rates, to correct identified pavement deficiencies, to extend the useful life of the pavement, and to maintain a structurally sound road.

The Project meets eligibility requirements for the federal STBG and is approved by the NYSDOT in their current Capital Program to be funded with federal aid and NYS Marchiselli funds.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

This action is required to ensure project advancement and financing through the Locally Administered Federal Aid Program using STBG funds to pay for the design costs of the road rehabilitation. Negative action would halt design and result in continued deterioration of the road surface, decreased rideability, increased maintenance responsibilities and cost, as well as jeopardize existing and future reimbursement funding available through this program.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The Highway Division will proceed with execution of agreements in accordance with the federal and NYSDOT guidelines. Upon the Erie County Legislature's approval, the County Executive will execute agreements between Bergmann Associates and the County and the State and Local agreement between Erie County and New York State.

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE REVIEW

The proposed legislation has been reviewed by the Office of the Comptroller and is related to an authorized capital project for which there are sufficient appropriations for the action proposed.





SUMMARY

The resolution authorizes the County Executive to execute a PILOT Agreement with Perry Homes I Housing Development Fund Company, Inc., Perry Homes I LLC, and the City of Buffalo.

The owner is seeking a PILOT from the City of Buffalo and Erie County consistent with the PILOT Policy adopted by the Erie County Legislature on December 16, 1999.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

In accordance with the PILOT policy, the proposed PILOT payment for the Perry Homes I project shall be based on a payment of \$161,134 in year 1 and would escalate by 3% each year for an additional fifteen-year term. The County would receive twenty-five percent (25%) of each annual payment, and the City of Buffalo would receive seventy-five percent (75%) of each annual payment. The payment Schedule A lists the payments for the 15 years of the Agreement.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The City of Buffalo supports the PILOT and on March 5, 2024, the Common Council of the City of Buffalo approved the Perry Homes I PILOT Agreement. The project conforms to the provisions of Article XI of the New York Private Housing Finance Law.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The residential project is located at 339 Perry Street & 448 South Park Avenue in the City of Buffalo, zip code 14204. The project consists of the demolition of blighted buildings and the new construction of 27 buildings comprised of 24 townhouse and stacked flat residential buildings and 3 mid-rise buildings totaling 405 units. All units in the project will be low-income and will include 284 units with rental vouchers, 48 units at 50% area median income and 73 units at 60% area median income. The total development cost is projected to be \$246,333,007.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Without the PILOT, it would not be economically feasible for Perry Homes I Housing Development Fund Company, Inc. and/or Perry Homes I LLC to operate the project as it is currently structured.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The County Executive or Deputy County Executive will enter into a PILOT Agreement with the noted parties.

SUMMARY

It is recommended that the Legislature authorize the County to enter into a contract with the newly-incorporated Buffalo Niagara Film Commission, Inc. ("BNFC") to accept funding in the amount of \$321,287.00 for the continuance of operations of film and television development in Erie County. At the request of Erie County, BNFC incorporated as its own 501c3 non-profit corporation as of December 2023. In prior years, BNFC funding was provided to a grant administrator, most recently the SUNY Research Foundation at Buffalo State University. This resolution requests recognition and authorization to instead contract with this newly incorporated entity.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

This appropriation would be funded by \$321,287.00 in approved and adopted funds in the 2024 Erie County Budget - Fund 110, Funds Center 1331010, Account 518055 – Buffalo Niagara Film Commission.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Legislative approval is required for the County to enter into contract with outside entities, including the newly incorporated Buffalo Niagara Film Commission, Inc.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic and subsequent WGA and SAG-AFTRA strikes, the Buffalo-Niagara region had seen a truly burgeoning film industry. With the conclusion of the COVID pandemic and resolution of strikes, Erie County seeks to maintain our support of BNFC and their instrumental role in attracting film and television production to our region. This resolution is a proper good-governance and procedural request to authorize contracting with the newly incorporated non-profit 501c3 entity, as opposed to a third-party grant administrator, as was done in previous years.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Failure to approve this resolution will place the continued operation of BNFC, and therefore, film and television production in Erie County, in serious jeopardy.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL



The Erie County Division of Budget and Management is requesting authorization create a part-time position of Senior Executive Assistant - CE effective April 20, 2024.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

This new part-time position will be Job Group 18, Step F on the MC-01 pay scale. The only fringe benefits associated with this position would be the mandatory contributions related to the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (FICA) of 7.65% or \$4,192 for the remainder of 2024. Sufficient funding exists with the Division's 2024 Adopted Budget (Fund 110, Funds Center 10210) Account 516020 – Professional Services, Contracts & Fees, which was originally appropriated to allow the retiring Budget Director to assist in training as a fee-for-service contractor.

Position: Senior Executive Assistant - CE

Annualized Salary: \$79,153

Salary for Balance of Year: \$54,798 Funding Source: 100% County Share

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The current Budget Director is retiring after 39 years of county service (12 years of which have been as Budget Director) as of April 5, 2024. As part of the transition process, the current Budget Director had agreed to return in a reduced role to assist with training and special projects and funds were set aside as part of the 2024 Adopted Budget. However, it was recently determined that the best way to take advantage of his vast amount of knowledge was as a part-time employee vs a fee-for-service contractor as originally anticipated.

Subject: Timelines-Borden Road and New Road

Please see the attached information regarding Borden Road and New Road and potential timelines contingent on approval of the Consolidated Bond Resolution on Thursday, March 21st, 2024:

Borden Phase II- from French to Strasmer (Cheektowaga) includes pavement rehabilitation, new enclosed drainage and curb and gutters.

New Road Phase I- from Dodge to Smith. This project is for full reconstruction, including shoulder widening, enclosed drainage, mill and overlay.

The Department of Public Works would be able to advertise by April 4th. After a three week bidding period, bids would be opened on April 25th and anticipate legislature approval for May 23rd session. It is important to note that the later in the season we bid the less likely we are to have the top tier contractors bidding our projects.

The contract would be executed pending EEO approval and required signatures before the contractor could then begin submitting shop drawings for catch basins/drainage structures. This would take at least two weeks for shop drawing approvals.

Catch basin/Drainage structures could begin fabrication mid-June.

Our Engineering department indicated fabrication could take up to 90 days. The exact timeline for completion of structure fabrication is a variable outside of the department's control. The longer we have to wait to begin submitting drawings for fabrication the longer it could take as other municipalities are already submitting their orders.

Depending on the completion of the required structures this could put **project** mobilization and drainage work beginning in September.
*If fabrication timelines are shorter the start could be end of July, early August.

The delay of this timeline would push the project completion date resulting in a delay to the following year which would also delay Phase III of Borden Road (West Seneca) an additional year and New Road Phase II -Smith to Tonawanda Creek.

Dear Honorable Members,

In accordance with Erie County Local Law No. 2-2015 which established the Erie County Conditional Release Commission, the Commission shall present an annual report to the Erie County Legislature, on its findings and actions on submitted applications.

As the Commissioner of the Erie County Probation Department who serves as an ex officio member of the Erie County Conditional Release Commission, this annual report is being submitted for your review on behalf of the Commission.

In 2021, all five members of the Erie County Conditional Release Commission (CRC) were appointed/re-appointed by the Erie County Executive upon advice and consent of this Honorable Body and this membership remains intact. The current Commission members include Karima Amin, Dixie Farr, William Crowe, Robert Lonski and Penny Wolfgang. The terms of all Commission members will expire on December 31, 2025.

During the initial four-year period (2016-2019) of the Erie County Conditional Release Program, applications for conditional release from inmates at the Erie County Correctional Facility averaged 56 annually. However, in 2020 the Conditional Release Program only received 18 applications, in 2021 the program received 20 applications, in 2022 it received 26 applications, and last year it received 43 applications. It is significant to note though that according to the Erie County Sheriffs Office, in 2018 the average number of sentenced inmates at the Erie County Correctional Facility was 183 while in 2023 it was 145. This was an increase in the 2022 number of 98.

Below is an overview of the findings and actions on applications submitted in 2021, 2022, and 2023:

** Note, two applications received in 2021 were granted release by the Conditional Release Commission in early 2022.

As noted in the above table, a significant percentage of the conditional release applications are determined ineligible for release primarily as a result of the applicant's legal history. Per NY Corrections Law §273, prior criminal convictions for several listed offenses inclusive of domestic violence offenses preclude eligibility for conditional release.

From program inception through December 31, 2023 the Erie County Probation Department has received 334 applications for conditional release consideration. The department has screened out 213 applications due to release ineligibility, 26 inmates withdrew their applications during the screening process while the Erie County Conditional Release Commission has interviewed and considered for release a total of 89 inmates. During this same period, 48 inmates who were interviewed/considered by the Conditional Release Commission were denied release while 41 were granted release. Of those individuals conditionally released from the Erie County Correctional Facility, 23 (or 56%) have successfully completed the program while four individuals remain active in the program.

The Erie County Probation Department continues on-going contact with personnel within the Erie County Correctional Facility in an effort to re-enforce program availability and ensure program information is readily available for inmates within the facility. Additionally, efforts have been initiated to increase communication lines between the Erie County Probation Department and both Erie County Correctional Facility and Project Blue staff that are located within the facility.

Rybczynski, Town Clerk of the Town of Hamburg, Erie County, New York, do hereby certify that at a Regular Meeting of the Town Board of the aforesaid Town on the 26th day of February 2024, at the Hamburg Town Hall, 6100 South Park Avenue, Hamburg, New York, the following resolution was adopted, every member present voting therefore, to wit:

On the motion of Councilmember Farrell Lorentz, seconded unanimously (Hoak, Bogulski, Comerford, Kozub) the following resolution was:

WHEREAS, approximately twelve million people live in the Lake Erie watershed, including seventeen metropolitan areas with more than 50,000 residents, an area shared between the United States and Canada, and Lake Erie provides drinking water for approximately 11 million of the inhabitants of this region, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Hamburg, a town situated in Erie County and in the Lake Erie watershed, recognizes and values the importance of Lake Erie and continues to work diligently to safeguard and improve its own stewardship of Lake Erie and the Lake Erie Watershed, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Hamburg has great concern that New York State and/or any authority, agency, commission, or department thereof might allow private and/or public entities to construct, place, position, and/or install, with or without permanent bases, pylons, piers, or similar structures, one or more wind turbines in the waters of Lake Erie, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Hamburg has great concern that the fresh water of Lake Erie along with the overall health of Lake Erie, the wildlife that depends on Lake Erie, the wildlife that traverses Lake Erie, and the continuing restoration of Lake Erie will be placed at risk if wind turbines are constructed in the waters of Lake Erie, and

WHEREAS, New York State has passed the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (the Climate Act) calling for 70 percent of electricity in the state to be produced by renewable resources by 2030, and 100 percent of the state's electricity be generated by renewable resources by 2040; and

WHEREAS, wind energy has been designated by the Climate Act as an essential form of renewable energy and there are a number of commercial wind energy facilities operating in Western New York, with more in the planning and permitting stages; and

WHEREAS, New York State's power grid manager New York Independent Systems Operator (NYISO) has determined the Western New York zone of grid to be 89 percent free of carbon emissions in the generation of electricity, and

WHEREAS, NYISO has described the lack of electricity transmission facilities capable of transmitting electricity from Western New York to downstate grid zones which are 90 percent dependent on fossil fuels for generating electricity, and

WHEREAS, the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority determined in 2022 that it's not the right time to consider constructing offshore wind facilities in Lake Erie, and

WHEREAS, the offshore wind industry is experiencing global difficulties related to inflation and supply line shortages as evidenced by the recent New York State Public Service Commission decision denying industry requests for higher power delivery rates, and

WHEREAS, the long planned Lake Erie offshore wind energy project known as Icebreaker Wind near Cleveland, Ohio, has recently been suspended, and

WHEREAS, questions concerning offshore wind energy facilities in fresh water bodies remain unanswered such as these which are not included in the NYSERDA reports of 2011 and 2022 and including:

- + What assurances are there that toxic industrial wastes in the lake bed will not be disturbed to endanger safe drinking water and enter the food chain of Lake Erie's fish and bird species?
- + How would the placement of offshore wind turbines in Lake Erie affect the migratory pathways and behavior of economically important game fish?
- + What would be the impact on tourism of placing wind turbines in Lake Erie?
- + Specifically how would offshore wind turbines in Lake Erie contribute to the emissions reduction goals of the Climate Act?
- + How would the radar interference created by offshore wind turbines in Lake Erie affect the safety of shipping, recreational boating, search and rescue operations, and international border security?
- + How would microplastics and toxic chemicals like BPA and PFAS emitted by wind turbines impact water quality and the ecology of Lake Erie?

- + How much oil and other petroleum products are contained within each offshore wind turbine and how would oil spills from wind turbines be mediated, and other maintenance performed during annual periods of ice coverage on Lake Erie?
- + How would noise and vibrations emitted by wind turbines impact the quiet enjoyment of Lake Erie by fishers, boaters and nearshore residents and visitors?
- + What are the effects of vibrations emitted by turbines on organisms living in the lake bed?
- + How would the blinking red lights atop each offshore wind turbine be reconciled with increased interest in preventing light pollution in dark skies?
- + What would be the impact of placing offshore wind turbines in Lake Erie's migratory flyways of birds, bats and butterflies?
- + What are the cumulative impacts of placing offshore wind turbines in Lake Erie given the already large concentration of onshore wind turbines along the Ontario shoreline and the elevations overlooking the lake in Chautauqua County?
- + What restrictions or no-go zones would be imposed on fishers and boaters in Lake Erie?
- + How would the Public Trust Doctrine which serves to protect the interests of all Western New Yorkers in a healthy Lake Erie be honored in the context of primary financial benefits to the offshore wind industry?
- + How would offshore wind turbines impact historic sites such as shipwrecks and lighthouses?
- + Would the rights of the Seneca Nation of Indians to administer water quality standards on the Cattaraugus Reservation be a consideration in placing offshore wind turbines in Lake Erie?
- + Would the high costs of offshore wind energy in Lake Erie be explained to Town of Hamburg electricity ratepayers in terms of monthly increases to their utility b and
- + How would property values along the lake shore be impacted by viewsheds including offshore wind turbines and their industrial support and maintenance activities?, and

WHEREAS, some of these questions cannot be answered, or would be cost prohibitive to address, and there are many documented examples of negative impacts of wind turbines on aquatic environments, and

WHEREAS, there are other alternatives which deserve significant consideration as possible future sources of power which do not negatively affect Lake Erie or other large bodies of water, and

WHEREAS, deep concern on the addition of Wind Turbines in Lake Erie has been expressed by elected officials throughout the region including Congressman Nicholas A. Langworthy, who has introduced legislation, H.R. 426, the Lakes Before Turbines Act, which would protect our environment and local economies from ill-conceived wind energy projects on these waters,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Hamburg Town Board declares that the Town of Hamburg opposes any efforts to introduce offshore wind turbines in the waters of Lake Erie, and calls for

a moratorium on the development and/or construction of any wind turbines in the waters of Lake Erie, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Clerk shall forward a certified copy of this Town Board resolution to Honorable Governor Kathy Hochul, Honorable United States Congressman Nicholas Langworthy, Honorable Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins, Honorable Senate Minority Leader Rob Ortt, Honorable Speaker of the Assembly Carl E. Heastie, Honorable Majority Leader of the Assembly Crystal People-Stokes, Honorable Minority Leader of the Assembly William A. Barclay, Honorable New York State Senator Patrick Gallivan, Honorable New York State Senator George Borrello, Honorable New York State Assemblyman Andrew W.
