WHEREAS, Stimm then developed a prototype and had it tested at the Calspan Corporation testing center in Cheektowaga. The results confirmed his hypothesis; and

WHEREAS, Kean was known for developing a new wind turbine that had been deemed more cost efficient and more versatile than traditional wind turbines; and

WHEREAS, Kean bestowed discipline and emphasized hard work; and

WHEREAS, today, March 3, 2024, community leaders and family members gather here to participate and honor *Kean Stimm*, a 100-year-old World War II Veteran, engineer, and inventor and

WHEREAS, this Honorable Body celebrates *Kean Stimm* who is idolized by many for the person he is, for serving in World War II and for sharing his gifts with the community over his 100 years of life, spirit and joy.



WHEREAS, New York State law allows employers of tipped workers at restaurants, hotels and other businesses to pay less than the regular minimum wage if gratuities at least cover the difference; and

WHEREAS, sometimes, employees work at one of these establishments work in roles for which gratuities are typically given and other roles, for which gratuities are not typically offered, in the same day; and

WHEREAS, some employers pay the same rate to such employees who work in different roles throughout the day, which is often the sub-minimum wage rate; and

WHEREAS, New York State Senate Bill S. 8200 and Assembly Bill A. 3041 seek to prevent employers from taking the tip credit for the times during the day that an employee is not working in roles that are typically tipped; and

WHEREAS, an example of such a scenario may be if a wait staff employee, who receives tips when directly serving customers, spends part of a slow day preparing food, an activity that is not currently typically tipped and not eligible for the tip credit; and

WHEREAS, this situation is burdensome for restaurant employers, because of the time keeping difficulties in evaluating and tracking whether and employee is serving in a tip credit eligible occupation or a non-eligible task throughout the day; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the confusion caused by such a rule, operations would become less efficient, and therefore more costly, for restaurant owners, who would then pass these unnecessary expenses on to customers.

WHEREAS, New York State law allows employers of tipped workers at restaurants, hotels and other businesses to pay less than the regular minimum wage if gratuities at least cover the difference; and

WHEREAS, in Erie County, an employer of an employee who is normally tipped can pay employees 66% of the minimum wage if the amount of tips received would bring that employee to, or in excess of, minimum wage; and

WHEREAS, the average restaurant worker in New York State makes between \$18 and \$24 per hour after tips; and

WHEREAS, New York State Senate Bill S. 5567 and Assembly Bill A. 1710 would eliminate the tipping credit for employers, which would raise the floor compensation for restaurant and other hospitality industry workers who typically receive tips to the minimum wage, plus the amount of tips received; and

WHEREAS, because the costs for industry employers will increase, prices will either rise for customers or costs will have to be cut, such as by hiring less service staff; and

WHEREAS, in inflationary times for customers and in an industry that is still recovering from draconian mandates imposed upon them during COVID, it is not advisable to increase the minimum wage for certain employers who are already guaranteed at least the minimum wage.

Dear Honorable Members:

The Erie County Clerk's Office ("Clerk's Office") has conducted a secondary analysis of the Mortgage Tax Audit released on February 5, 2024. This analysis was based on a meeting with the Erie County Comptroller's Office ("Comptroller's Office") auditing team on March 7, 2024, and the working papers provided by the Comptroller in full on March 11, 2024 in response to the Clerk's Office's FOIL request. The Clerk's Office again thanks the Comptroller's Office for the recommendations to improve government operations.

Conclusions

While explained in more detail below, these are the conclusions of the Clerk's Office analysis:

- There is no missing taxpayer money, only money that was not distributed to the tax districts due to a combination of clerical and technical error.
- Any money that was not distributed to municipalities and agencies is in the process of being redistributed.
- A review of the Basic Tax collection and distribution was performed by the Clerk's Office which shows substantial compliance over the past four (4) years.
- There are at least seven (7) false "Findings" in the Comptroller's Office Mortgage Tax Audit.
- Because of the significant errors and mischaracterizations in the Mortgage Tax Audit, the Comptroller's Office should remove it from its website and note it has been taken down pursuant to the Erie County Charter and Section 9.68 of the Generally Accepted Government Auditing Standards ("GAGAS").

<u>2020 – 2024 Basic Tax Review</u>

"Basic Tax" is the portion of the mortgage tax collected by the Clerk's Office that is apportioned to the tax districts.

While the Mortgage Tax Audit reviewed a sample size of transactions and distributions from 2022, the Clerk's Office endeavored to get a more complete picture of the Basic Tax collection and reviewed Basic Tax for 2020, 2021, 2022, 2023, and 2024. The analysis confirmed that the Clerk's Office was substantially compliant in its distribution of Basic Tax since 2020, and was 100% accurate in 2023 and the first quarter of 2024. As a result of the analysis, certain municipalities will be receiving an additional distribution to correct any shortages from 2020-2022, which resulted from a combination of clerical and technical error. Letters to the municipalities regarding the additional distribution have already been sent.

Attached as **Exhibit A** are charts outlining the compliance of the Clerk's Office for mortgage tax distribution for the years 2020-2024. Attached as **Exhibit B** is a table detailing the additional amounts to be distributed to the tax districts.

February 2024 Mortgage Tax Audit Inaccuracies:

- Audit p.13, Finding #1: "Mortgage Tax Revenue Calculated on Five Transactions Did Not Reconcile to the Fees Established in NewVision."
 - False. The auditors concluded there were variances that did not reconcile because the mortgages tested were closed in other counties, not Erie. The auditors acknowledged at the March 7, 2024 meeting that they were not aware of these apportioned mortgages being in their sample that was tested. All amounts were properly distributed.
- Audit p.15, Finding #1: "The MT-4 Reported Incorrect Amounts Totaling \$156,340.04."
 - False. 12 of the 14 cases cited are confirmed to have no variances or transaction issues at all. All payments were made properly, and a simple technical issue prevented these from being displayed on the MT-4, which is the form required by New York State for mortgages recorded.
- Audit p.17, Finding #2: "A Variance of \$17,660.79 between the Hold Report and Release Report Indicates that the Variance Amount was Not Distributed."
 - False. All funds were properly distributed, despite any issue with reconciling reports. Issues in comparing reports alone does not indicate the presence of distribution errors to the tax districts and/or state agencies.

- Audit p.18, Finding #3: "Seven Mortgages That Received State Determinations Were Incorrectly Reported on the MT-4 and Not Distributed to Tax Districts, SONYMA or NFTA."
 - False. All funds were properly distributed, despite any issue with reconciling reports. Issues in comparing reports alone does not indicate the presence of distribution errors to the tax districts and/or state agencies.
- Audit p.19, Finding #4: "Five Mortgages Apportioned by New York State were Released and Distributed Incorrectly."
 - False. We confirmed based on our Basic Tax Summary-C reports that there were no double payments made. The auditors could have confirmed this with the raw data they had but failed to do so.
- Audit p.21, Finding #6: "Mortgage Tax Revenue in the Amount of \$29,654.00 was Unaccounted For."
 - False. The mortgage in question was recorded on November 22, 2022. The Clerk's Office received the State Apportionment on December 27, 2022, when Erie County was under a State of Emergency due to the blizzard. The mortgage was properly released on January 4, 2023. The auditors, through no fault of their own, did not have the correct Hold Report to reflect the mortgage was properly released, but the Finding is false regardless.
- Audit, p.22, Finding #7: "Five Mortgages Apportioned by New York State Were Not Placed on Hold in NewVision."
 - False. All five mortgages were properly listed on their respective Hold Reports and were properly released. The auditors, through no fault of their own, did not have the correct Hold Report to reflect the mortgages were properly on hold, but the Finding is false regardless. As acknowledged in the Audit, there was no issue with the release and distribution of these mortgages.

Attached as **Exhibit C** is a summary of the most important improvements already implemented by the Clerk's Office over the past year to policies and workflow.

Working Paper Access Delay and March 7, 2024 Audit Review Meeting:

• The March 7, 2024 meeting was requested by the Clerk's Office to get clarity on the evidence used by the auditors to support the findings the Mortgage Tax Audit. The Clerk's Office requested the working papers even before the release of the Mortgage Tax Audit, but had not yet received complete, legible copies.

- The Comptroller's Office auditors acknowledged at the March 7, 2024 meeting that the SharePoint file they sent to the Clerk's Office, purported to be the complete working papers and supporting documentation, could not be viewed properly or printed legibly. The auditors also acknowledged the file did not contain the source files of the documents used in arriving at the findings. Hence, their original claim that they sent the complete working papers was false because the file was incomplete and the Clerk's Office still could not verify their work. The Clerk's Office submitted a FOIL request for these papers, and they were received in full on March 11, 2024.
- The auditors acknowledged they received mortgage tax policies and documents from the administrator that they later accused of theft in their August 2023 Analysis of the Clerk's Office, and who was released for work performance issues and finally arrested on March 15, 2024. However, the auditors continued to rely on that documentation in performing their testing, which was received from someone they publicly accused of wrongdoing. The reports provided by the former administrator were not the correct reports needed for an accurate analysis of mortgage tax distribution.
- The auditors acknowledged at the March 7, 2024 meeting that some of the reports they were provided by the former administrator did not reconcile. The auditors acknowledged that the inability of the reports to reconcile, on its own, did not indicate that any money was missing or was not properly distributed.
- Both sides agreed the March 7, 2024 meeting was beneficial. However, the auditors suggested that this review should have occurred at the Exit Conference on January 31, 2024. In response, the Clerk's Office noted that the auditors made it clear that the Audit was being released with or without an Exit Conference occurring (in an email dated January 24, 2024). The time constraints placed on the Clerk's Office made it impossible to perform an in-depth analysis prior to the Exit Conference and the forced release of the Audit by the Comptroller's Office.

<u>The Comptroller's Office Should Take Down The Mortgage Tax Audit</u> <u>Pursuant to The County Charter and GAGAS</u>:

Section 1802(2) of the Erie County Charter starts the following under the "Powers and duties" of the Comptroller:

Section 1802. Powers and duties. The Comptroller shall:

2. Maintain the official accounting records for all receipts and disbursements of the County, including liabilities, fund balances, encumbrances, expenditures, appropriations, revenues and estimated revenues and prescribe approved methods of accounting for County officers and administrative units in accordance with standards and policies prescribed by the New York State Comptroller and the governmental accounting standards board.

The Comptroller's Office attests in the Mortgage Tax Audit, published online on February 5, 2024, that it was conducted in accordance with Generally Accepted Government Auditing Standards ("GAGAS"), which is established by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board referenced in the Erie County Charter.

Section 9.68 of GAGAS states the following:

Requirement: Discovery of Insufficient Evidence after Report Release

9.68 If, after the report is issued, the auditors discover that they did not have sufficient, appropriate evidence to support the reported findings or conclusions, they should communicate in the same manner as that used to originally distribute the report to those charged with governance, the appropriate officials of the audited entity, the appropriate officials of the entities requiring or arranging for the audits, and other known users, so that they do not continue to rely on the findings or conclusions that were not supported. If the report was previously posted to the auditors' publicly accessible website, the auditors should remove the report and post a public notification that the report was removed. The auditors should then determine whether to perform the additional audit work necessary to either reissue the report, including any revised findings or conclusions, or repost the original report if the additional audit work does not result in a change in findings or conclusions.

As noted above, at least seven (7) findings of the Mortgage Tax Audit are false and/or significantly inaccurate.

In addition, when factoring in other findings that are moot and/or directed at the Comptroller's Office, 17 of the 30 total findings in the Mortgage Tax Audit are inaccurate and/or irrelevant.

Notably, and as has been widely publicized, one of the Mortgage Tax Audit findings related to an intercepted check to SONYMA that was stolen through no fault of the Erie County Clerk's Office. The Erie County Clerk's Office requested that the finding related to the intercepted check not be published due to there being an ongoing investigation. The funds from the intercepted check were in fact recovered in full by law enforcement in early March 2024.

Based on the numerous errors and misleading findings in the Mortgage Tax Audit, and in accordance with Section 9.68 of GAGAS and the Erie County Charter, the Comptroller's Office should take down the Mortgage Tax Audit from its website and publish a notification that the Mortgage Tax Audit has been removed.






MONEY OWED TO TAX DISTRICTS 2020: \$7,934.52




MONEY OWED TO TAX DISTRICTS 2021: \$68,611.73



MONEY OWED TO TAX DISTRICTS 2022: \$23,735.42







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Exhibit "C": Enhancements to Clerk's Office Policies and Workflow

- A new Deputy County Clerk Finance has been hired with a CPA and extensive experience in forensic accounting.
- Two new financial department employees have been hired to assist the Deputy County Clerk Finance.
- The Deputy County Clerk Finance is no longer the sole individual who prepares monthly payments and reports.
- At least two individuals in management must verify all payments that are sent out.
- Copies of all checks received by the Clerk's Office are made by cashiers and included in the daily deposit reporting.
- Fees collected for recording documents and other services offered by the Clerk's Office have been verified with statutory authority, including the New York Civil Practice Law and Rules ("CPLR") and assembled in the Clerk's Office Schedule of Fees.
- Refunds for Court filings have been streamlined and given increased oversight with the use of the Converge software system.
- Escrow agreements are in the process of being dismantled in favor of a cart-based online image-purchasing system.
- Updated written procedures for financial duties and payment distribution.
- Regarding issuance of payments, the Clerk's Office now:
 - o views images of all checks paid out of Clerk's Office bank accounts;
 - o requires "return receipts" on large checks sent through the mail when possible;
 - requests the ability to perform wire transfers in lieu of sending paper checks; and
 - reviews images of all cashed checks in the online bank statements.
- Regarding mortgage tax accounting, the Clerk's Office has now:
 - Added nightly automation to prevent possible mortgage recording errors;
 - Improved procedure to track apportionments made to other counties;
 - Updated the Basic Tax Summary-C report to alert managers of possible recording errors;
 - Updated Release Report to display additional information so all tax apportionments can be more easily identified;
 - Made procedural changes to the apportionment hold & release processes that include multiple reports and multiple levels of oversight;
 - Additional training provided to administration, finance department, and clerical staff for better understanding of the mortgage tax process and
 - Created scripts to audit Taxes Collected vs. Taxes Apportioned to identify any variances.

Finally, with the conclusion of the second audit, the Clerk's Office will be issuing a Request for Proposals ("RFP") for new recordkeeping software.



SUMMARY

The resolution requests the temporary creation of jobs in the non-competitive class that mirror vacant, encumbered, competitive class positions. The resolution also prohibits Departments from back-filling the vacant, encumbered, competitive class positions with new employees.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The resolution is budget neutral. Many new positions are being created to allow for this movement of employees to non-competitive class positions while there is a temporary encumbrance on the competitive class position. We are required to "fully-fund" all created positions within the budget in order to ensure its balance, however the existing competitive class positions that mirror these new positions are required to remain vacant and as a result would have no net new cost to the County, achieved as vacancy savings. To achieve budget neutrality and not negatively impact departments while still creating these positions, in consultation with the Division of Budget and Management, a negative appropriation will be made in each department's personnel services budget in Account #504995 – HELP Personnel Reserve equal to the increased salary and benefits costs associated with each "mirror" position that will remain vacant. In the same way that a "turnover" account appreciates anticipated vacancy savings, this account will allow these new positions to remain budget neutral as is intended. For the Department of Social Services and Division of Youth Services, these positions will be created retroactively to 1/27/24, which is the date at which these individual positions were qualified for the HELP program to allow for the probationary period. For Senior Services, positions will be created retroactively to 4/1/24 to align with grant periods.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Erie County is participating in the New York State Hiring for Emergency Limited Placement (HELP) Program, as described later in this memo. In order to fully enjoy the benefits of the program without taking away the civil service rights of some current employees, we are requesting the Legislature authorize the creation of non-competitive class positions that mirror vacant, encumbered competitive class positions.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Erie County is participating in the HELP Program, a strategic initiative designed to expedite the hiring of diverse, qualified candidates into permanent positions without the traditional civil service examination requirements. The HELP Program specifically targets direct care, health, and safety titles that are crucial for the well-being and safety of the public. Traditionally, these positions necessitated that job candidates undergo and succeed in competitive examinations to qualify for employment. However, under the HELP Program, this requirement is temporarily lifted, allowing for non-competitive appointments. Candidates must still meet the minimum qualifications for the positions they apply for, ensuring that the standards for these critical positions are maintained.

At the program's conclusion, employees who were hired under the HELP Program will transition into the competitive class without the need for further examination, securing their positions on a permanent basis. This approach not only addresses immediate staffing needs but also provides a pathway for employees to continue their careers within the civil service system, ensuring stability and continuity in critical public services.

Built into the Civil Service system is the imperative to promote from within. Upon promotion, employees are required to serve a probationary period in the promotional job title. If a probationary employee in a promotional position fails to successfully complete their probation, civil service rules provide them with the right to return to their previous position. However, if Erie County were to delete the competitive class position to which the employee encumbers to add a non-competitive position, they would not have a position to return to if they failed probation in the promotional title.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Failure to approve this resolution will not allow County Departments to take full advantage of the HELP program. This will prolong staffing shortages, and not allow Departments to fill the positions that the Legislature authorized them to fill.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The Division of Budget and Management and the Department of Personnel will work jointly to create the non-competitive positions in the Departments of Social Services and Senior Services and Division of Youth Services.

A RESOLUTION SUBMITTED BY THE PERSONNEL DEPARTMENT

WHEREAS, in response to significant challenges in filling many regularly competitive class positions throughout local governments, the New York State Department of Civil Service created the Hiring Emergency Limited Placement Program (HELP Program); and

WHEREAS, the HELP Program is temporary and designed to alleviate such critical staffing needs for local governments in direct care and health and safety positions through the creation and filling of identical positions on a non-competitive classification basis; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Departments of Personnel, Social Services, and Senior Services have identified several health and safety positions that would result in the basic health, safety, and daily needs of residents unmet; and

WHEREAS, New York State Civil Service requires the civil service jurisdiction to meet three criteria before allowing job titles to be allowed into the Program:

- <u>Criteria 1</u>: The job title must be critical, direct care, health, or safety. Employees in these titles provide services or care directly to clients, consumers, patients, or the public.
- <u>Criteria 2</u>: A severe shortage of candidates exists, evidenced by an inability to attract sufficient qualified candidates to fill vacancies despite extensive and exhaustive recruitment efforts.
- <u>Criteria 3</u>: Titles are filled via open-competitive examination only. Titles that can be filled via promotion examination cannot participate in this Program.

WHEREAS, the Erie County Personnel Commissioner, as the Personnel Officer for the civil service jurisdiction of Erie County, has successfully held the required public hearing, submitted and received approval from the New York State Civil Service Commission for several identified titles to be created and filled under the purview of the guidelines and requirements, as set forth by the New York State HELP Program; and

WHEREAS, the requirements of the service of the County of Erie within the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Personnel of the County of Erie, have necessitated the following additions, including: Juvenile Justice Counselors (HELP); Caseworkers (HELP); Caseworkers-Spanish Speaking (HELP); Caseworkers-Arabic Speaking (HELP); Caseworkers-Bengali Speaking (HELP), Child Support Investigators (HELP); Child Support Investigators-Spanish Speaking (HELP); Youth Detention Workers (HELP); Detention Home Intake Workers (HELP); Caseworkers-Karen Speaking (HELP); Social Welfare Examiners (HELP); Social Welfare Examiners-Spanish Speaking (HELP); Social Welfare Examiners-Arabic Speaking (HELP); Social Welfare Examiners-Somali Speaking (HELP), Detention Security Facility Guards (HELP), Case Managers - Senior Services (HELP) to the list of non-competitive class positions, appearing in the Appendices to the Rules for the Classified Service of the County of Erie; and WHEREAS, the above noted positions were approved for participation in the HELP program granted for Erie County on January 27, 2024; and

WHEREAS, several current existing positions in the related competitive class titles are encumbered by permanent competitive class employees; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Personnel Department cannot reclassify encumbered competitive class positions into the non-competitive class because the employee encumbering the position, frequently serving as a provisional employee or in a mandatory probationary term in a promotional position, has the right to return to that position under civil service law; and

WHEREAS, to fully execute the filling of these necessary positions within the noncompetitive classification, without affecting or altering the existing civil service rights of current permanent competitive class individuals serving Erie County's constituents in other capacities, it is thereby necessary to create additional positions specifically designated under the HELP Program; and

WHEREAS, it is understood that these approved, designated, and allocated positions may only exist under the time limitations specified by the New York State Help Program for one year from the date of approval or the cessation of the Program by the New York State Civil Service Municipal Services Division.

Legislative authorization is sought to transfer available NYS Pretrial funds from deferred revenue to the appropriate accounts to add an additional Probation Assistant (group 7).

None. The New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) awarded the Probation Department \$1,996,994 in October of 2022 and \$1,942,018 in January of 2024 for the purpose of reimbursing the county for costs associated with providing pretrial services.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION/BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In 2020 New York State enacted Bail Reform legislation, that among other things, changed the nature of pretrial service delivery across the state. In Erie County, pretrial services are provided by the Probation Department. Since implementation, the number of defendants' court ordered to the pretrial Release Under Supervision (RUS) program has increased from 520 offenders in 2019 to 974 in 2023 or 87%.

Recognizing the impact of this, the NYS DCJS has awarded the county funds to offset the costs associated with the provision of certified pretrial services, including but not limited to screening, assessments, supervision, and reporting required under this new legislation. Unlike other awards, the entirety of the initial award was received in October 2022 with

the second award for a similar amount received in January 2024. Legislative authority is required to appropriate these funds.

Currently, Probation has identified a need that is essential to meet existing pretrial service requirements.

Duties required of the position required by Law or Contract: NYS DCJS award

Position classification: Probation Assistant CSEA job group 7 step 5

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

The Probation Department will be hampered in the performance of its duties. The Pretrial Release Under Supervision cases have steadily increased since 2020. The total number of individuals released pretrial to the program's supervision. are estimated at 1,300 cases for 2024. This upward trend is expected to continue. Currently there are six Probation Officers who supervise individuals released to the pretrial program. The addition of a Probation Assistant will enable more manageable workloads.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The Erie County Probation Department will work with the Division of Budget and Management, and the Department of Personnel to implement this request.



SUMMARY

It is recommended that the Legislature approve the attached resolution prepared by the Department of Environment and Planning (DEP) to authorize the County Executive to execute a five-year contract to accept \$5,218,834 in United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) grant funding for the Community Forestry Partnership Project, as well as establish budgets in DEP, the Department of Parks, Recreation and Forestry (Parks), and the Sheriff's Office, fund six staff positions, amend a grant budget in Parks, and execute contracts with five grant sub-awardees.

The project is broken into several components:

- A county-wide Community Forest Management Plan will be completed with a consultant to define existing tree canopy cover, heat island areas, and community tree programs; examine County operations and recommend actions to improve tree canopy; coordinate with the project sub-awardees to engage the community on the development of the Plan; identify priority areas for tree programs; and provide recommendations for tree plantings, tree maintenance, shared service opportunities, and strategies regarding tree resilience.
- A new tree nursery on County land operated by Parks that will provide workforce development opportunities for incarcerated individuals from the Erie County Correctional Facility in a partnership with the Sheriff's Office and provide low- or no-cost trees to community forestry projects;
- Sub-awardee Buffalo Freedom Gardens, Inc. will create a Food Forest at JFK Recreation Center to teach residents how to grow and harvest fruits, nuts, and edible plants, provide fruit trees to residents in Buffalo and conduct additional community engagement activities;
- Sub-awardee Cornell Cooperative Extension of Erie County will conduct multifaceted education and workforce development activities including the creation of a certificate course at SUNY Erie Community College and community engagement activities throughout the County with a focus on disadvantaged communities regarding the Community Forest Management Plan;
- Sub-awardee Monarch of Infinite Possibilities, LLC will conduct community engagement activities with churches on the East Side of Buffalo;
- Sub-awardee Town of Tonawanda will expand an existing tree nursery, develop a comprehensive maintenance program for street trees and park trees, and conduct community engagement activities within the Town;

• Sub-awardee BRRAlliance, Inc., also known as the Black Rock Riverside Alliance, will create two fruit orchards, create a community arboretum along two bike paths in the City of Buffalo, and conduct community engagement activities.

The projects will focus on bringing the benefits of trees and tree canopy to federally designated disadvantaged communities, with the exception of the Community Forest Management Plan, which will be county-wide with a focus on disadvantaged communities.

The County staff funded by the new grant budget consist of: eed

- 1) Correction Officer (JG-11, B100 #14128), fully funded, a new position in the Sheriff's Office;
- 2) Parks Maintenance Worker II (JG-5, B100 #14154), partially funded, a new position in Parks;
- 3) Parks Maintenance Worker I (JG-3, B100 #14155), partially funded, a new position in Parks;
- 4) Junior Environmental Compliance Specialist (JG-7, B100 #14172), partially funded, a transfer of an existing position in DEP;
- 5) Principal Environmental Compliance Specialist (JG-14, B100 #14171), partially funded, which is a new position that replaces an existing JG-12 position in DEP.

The balance of funding for the partially funded positions will be from existing budgets.

In addition to the positions funded by the new grant budget, an existing Senior Environmental Compliance Specialist in Parks will be partially funded by amending an existing Parks grant budget (164BUFRIVERRAP2324).

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The requested staff positions and program expenses will be funded by the USDA grant or by existing budgets. Therefore, there will be no fiscal impact on the County. Details for each position are described in Table 1.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The project addresses several key priorities from the Erie County Community Climate Action Plan (CCAP) and will increase climate resiliency and protect vulnerable residents in disadvantaged communities while mitigating climate pollution. The resulting community trees and tree canopy will mitigate extreme heat, improve air quality, absorb stormwater runoff, increase property values, and provide additional health, social, and environmental benefits. Finally, the project will support workforce development, including for incarcerated individuals.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Community trees are trees in neighborhoods, business districts and recreation areas. Community trees provide many benefits including removing carbon from the atmosphere and improving air quality, providing shade, and protecting vulnerable residents from extreme heat, absorbing stormwater, and increasing property values.

Lack of greenspace and trees in disadvantaged communities is a well-known and long-standing problem in Erie County and is partly a biproduct of redlining and disinvestment in low-income communities and communities of color. In 2022, Erie County completed a Climate Vulnerability Assessment that identified extreme heat and flooding as key climate threats disproportionately affecting vulnerable populations in disadvantaged communities. It also described how these hazards are exacerbated by the lack of tree canopy, especially in urban areas subject to heat island effects. The Erie County Legislature recently adopted the CCAP, and several recommendations from this plan focused on the lack of trees in disadvantaged communities and the need for programs that provide the benefits of trees.

In the spring of 2023, the USDA Forest Service Community and Urban Forestry Program issued a grant solicitation for tree programs, with a focus on disadvantaged communities. DEP convened a proposal team that included five community partner organizations who were already stakeholder participants helping to develop the CCAP. The resulting grant application was submitted to USDA, and Erie County was one of a small number of communities to receive a full award. This proposed project will be led by DEP in partnership with Parks and the Sheriff's Office and the five sub-awardees.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Erie County would forfeit the USDA grant funding and the community would not receive the benefits of the tree project.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

A contract with the USDA will be executed, budgets and five positions will be created in DEP, Parks, and the Sheriff's Office, an existing grants budget will be amended in Parks, and subaward agreements will be executed with the five sub-awardees.

WHERAS, in 2022, Erie County completed a Climate Vulnerability Assessment that identified extreme heat and flooding as climate threats disproportionately impacting disadvantaged communities; and

WHEREAS, earlier this year the Erie County Legislature adopted the Erie County Community Climate Action Plan that recommends prioritizing community forestry programs to increase tree canopy and the benefits of trees in disadvantaged communities in January 2024 (COMM 2E-19); and

WHEREAS, Erie County has been awarded a \$5,218,834 grant from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) to

- i. develop a county-wide Community Forest Management Plan;
- ii. develop a tree nursery led by the Department of Parks, Recreation and Forestry (Parks) in partnership with the Sheriff's Office on County property, providing workforce development opportunity to incarcerated individuals at the Erie County Correctional Facility as well as free and low-cost trees to municipalities and community organizations;
- iii. develop several nurseries, orchards, and tree planting projects in disadvantaged communities; and
- iv. conduct community outreach, education, and workforce development activities including certificate courses at SUNY Erie Community College; and

WHEREAS, the USDA award specifies five sub-awardees who are necessary to perform the project tasks: Buffalo Freedom Gardens, Inc., Cornell Cooperative Extension of Erie County, Monarch of Infinite Possibilities, LLC, the Town of Tonawanda, and the BRRAlliance, Inc. (also known as the Black Rock Riverside Alliance); and

WHEREAS, the project will partially or fully fund the following positions in a new grant budget, with the balance of funding from other existing budgets:

- i. Correction Officer (JG-11), a new position in the Sheriff's Office;
- ii. Parks Maintenance Worker II (JG-5), a new position in Parks;
- iii. Parks Maintenance Worker I (JG-3), a new position in Parks;
- iv. Junior Environmental Compliance Specialist (JG-7), a transfer of an existing position in DEP;

v. Principal Environmental Compliance Specialist (JG-14), which replaces an existing grant-funded JG-12 position in DEP; and

WHEREAS, to support the project, it is necessary to amend an existing grant budget (164BUFRIVERRAP2224, Funds Center 16400, Fund 281) to provide additional funding for an existing position in Parks; and

WHEREAS, to proceed with the project it is necessary to execute a contract with the USDA, adopt new grant budgets for the project within DEP, Parks and the Sheriff's Office, create four positions within the new grant budgets, transfer one position to the new DEP grant budget, and amend an existing grant budget in Parks.

SUMMARY

The Erie County Department of Public Works-Division of Highways sought proposals from qualified organizations for Rental Equipment to meet the equipment needs of the Highways Maintenance Districts and Admar Supply Company, Inc. was chosen through the RFP selection process.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Throughout the term of the agreement, Erie County will rent loaders with loader buckets and other equipment for the Highway Districts to perform necessary work to maintain and improve roadways.

There are costs for the rental, as well as the rental/training of additional specialized equipment, throughout the various seasons or for unique emergency situations, along with the purchase of any necessary specialized equipment/accessories for utilized equipment.

Authorization is requested for the transfer of any funds over 10,000 from various accounts within DPW, Division of Highways Budget, Fund 210, Funds Center 1231010 to Account 545000 – Rental Charges, as needed, to cover the rental/training charges each year throughout the two-year agreement with the option of an additional two years of engagement.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

To date the Department has benefitted from the ability to rent various pieces of equipment including but not limited to front loaders, motor graders and paving equipment to complete necessary projects and support operations in the Highways Maintenance Districts. Access to rental equipment as a resource during winter operations and during construction season has provided the department with reliable, up to date equipment to handle different types of projects and by doing so reduces our dependency on outside contractors, which will lead to reduced spending while allowing us to effectively manage cash flow.

The original contract was authorized by your Honorable Body in COMM 12E-8 (2023) on June 22, 2023, and included funding for the first year of the two-year contract. This amendment adds additional funding to the original contract for the second year of the contract. This contract addresses emergency conditions, conditions received from the New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT) or county inspections, district maintenance reports, or citizen reports on bridges and culverts throughout Erie County, as well as the design services for Locally Administered Federal Aid Maintenance Projects.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

CHA Consultants, Inc.'s contract will be increased in the amount of \$375,000. Funds are available in the following Projects in Fund 420, Funds Center 123:

B.21158 – 2021 Federal Aid Bridge Preservation Design	\$175,000
B.22056 – 2022 Federal Aid Bridge Preservation Design	\$100,000

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Erie County receives notices of NYSDOT bridge inspection and county large culvert inspection reports, as well as notifications from maintenance districts or citizens, of various bridge and culvert conditions which may limit or restrict public access. DPW-Division of Highways is required to provide immediate response to sufficiently address bridge conditions, culverts or provide recommendations for rectifying the conditions.

The County also has multiple bridge maintenance projects which are eligible for Federal Aid for construction, but not for the design phase. These projects, included in the original RFQ/P, require the County to fund Design at 100% before any Federal or State Agreements can be authorized for the Construction phase of the projects.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The County has 297 bridges averaging approximately 50 years in age and 482 small bridges, in addition to an un-enumerated inventory of maintenance culverts. Age, natural elements, and use have precipitated the deterioration of many County bridges and culverts thereby accounting for the numerous conditions affecting long-term preservation.

The County has 5 upcoming approved Federal Aid Maintenance Projects on the State Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). These projects will need to be designed before they can be let for construction, therefore additional design funding is needed for these projects.

CHA has provided design services on multiple bridges which have been flagged by NYSDOT or other inspections. They are also currently working on the design for the Emery Road Culvert, which if not repaired could result in damage to the roadway. Additional design funding is needed to ensure as-needed engineering services can be continued without interruption.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If conditions are not responded to in a reasonable time frame, access by the traveling public on the County bridges will be limited through load postings or closures based upon the severity of the condition. Negative action will suspend long term preservation measures and the loss of future federal aid monies for preservation of the County's bridges.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The County Executive will amend the contract to CHA Consultants, Inc. for the 2023-2024 On Call/Emergency Services contract to increase the funding by \$375,000.

These are to be utilized for eligible communications equipment, installation, and maintenance expenses. As a result of existing threats to homeland security, the federal government through various State agencies has allocated funds to be utilized to improve the ability of local governments to develop, enhance, strengthen, and advance interoperable and emergency communications.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

The Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Services would be unable to supplement the increasing cost of interfacing with existing and updated networks, as well as updating critical equipment such as communication towers and high priority public safety channels, some of which is no longer supported by the manufacturer.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Services will work with the Division of Budget and Management to amend the 2024 Adopted Budget amounts.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION/BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Recent Homeland Security assessments suggest that domestic violent extremism threats are on the rise and present one of the great risks to the health and well-being of people living in Erie County. This threat was made real by the racially-motivated Tops shooting on May 14, 2022. Unfortunately, Homeland Security assessments suggest that these threats are increasing rather than decreasing. An imperative component of both prevention and response efforts must involve behavioral health professionals (BHPs), such as social workers, mental health counselors, and psychologists. However, little evidence suggests that these professionals have received basic training on how to recognize or respond to risks of violent extremism among the populations they serve. Thus, the goal of this project is to conduct a needs assessment to determine the current level of violent extremism knowledge and preparedness among Erie County BHPs with the goal of preparing future trainings to fill the knowledge gap.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Without Legislative approval, the needs will not be assessed nor the training provided, the knowledge gap will not be addressed.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Services will establish a contract with The Research Foundation for SUNY on behalf of the University at Buffalo, to support the consulting provided in 2024.

ECDOH is seeking the creation of three positions, two upgrades for current employees, equipment for the department, and repairs to facilities. By accepting these funds, Erie County would be eligible for additional funds of up to \$5,000,000 for future public health emergencies.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Positive. The funding covers all the costs of the positions and upgrades for four years, equipment for the department, and repairs for Health facilities. Equipment includes new computers for the Jesse Nash Health Clinic and Youth Detention, refrigerated trailer for the Medical's Examiner's Office, PCR testing equipment for the Public Health Lab, office furniture for Environmental Health, and XRF lead detectors. These new positions and upgraded positions will be paid through Department of Health, Fund 281, 127SPHI2227 grant, up to 11/30/2027. REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Per the CDC, "Funding from this grant will help ensure that every U.S. community has the people, services, and systems needed to promote and protect health" and the grant "provides maximum flexibility so recipients can address their most pressing needs." ECDOH reviewed its operations with its division directors and realized some of areas that services can be maintained or even approved with no additional cost to Erie County.

For the positions: the Environmental Chemist position will handle environmental toxicology samples; the Accountant position will assist Health accounting in managing grant funds and medical billing; the Junior Administrative Assistant position will be tasked with administrative tasks related to EMS, ambulance service, and ambulance academy. SUMMARY

ECDOH is seeking authorization to accept \$1,922,200 a year for 5 years (\$9,611,000 total) to develop and implement a Rental Registry program for Erie County. The program, passed by New York State in its 2024 budget, was created to identify and remediate lead hazards in rental housing before children are harmed by lead poisoning. This is to be done by local health departments by requiring periodic inspections for lead hazards and provide effective enforcement mechanisms for compliance.

The rental registry would cover residential dwellings with two or more rental units built prior to 1980 in zip codes of concern. It is estimated that Erie County has about 45,000 rental units in these zip codes. The first year of funding is for program development and implementation including the hiring of staff, purchasing of equipment, lead safety certification training, and conducting outreach to landlords.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Positive. Funding is provided for 5 years to hire the necessary staff for development, implementation, and maintaining a Rental Registry as mandated by New York State. Positions to be created are as follows:

Erie County has a high prevalence of children with elevated blood lead levels. In addition, Erie County has an extraordinary number of rental units constructed prior to 1980. Lead-based paint remains a primary source of lead poisoning in children under six years of age. SUMMARY

ECDOH has received a grant award in the amount of \$4,162,750 from the New York State Office of Homes and Community Renewal with the Housing Trust Fund Corporation for the Leading in Lead Prevention Pilot Program that will remediate lead hazards in rental units in 14 zip codes of concern in Erie County. ECDOH will partner with Belmont Housing Resources for WNY to conduct inspections, prepare rehabilitation plans, initiate rehabilitation with local and insured contractors, and conduct interim and final inspections. The grant allows for up to \$34,000 in rehabilitation costs per unit. This grant will compliment other services and programs currently used by ECDOH to help with lead hazards in housing such as the Healthy Homes funded by HUD.

The zip codes of concern are: 14201, 14204, 14206, 14207, 14208, 14210, 14211, 14212, 14213, 14214, 14215, 14216, 14220, and 14225.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

None.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Erie County is above the NYS average for incidence rate for lead poisoning due to several factors such as having 8 of the highest zip codes of concerns for lead hazards, age of housing stock, deferred maintenance of units, and lack of resources for remediation of property owners and tenants. This program will address many of the factors mentioned.

ECDOH will work with Belmont Housing of WNY to execute this program and prioritize units occupied by children and/or pregnant people who have elevated blood lead levels or live in a unit where lead hazards have been detected, and units occupied by families at or below eighty percent of the area median income.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

ECDOH will not be able to work with Belmont Housing of WNY to remediate lead hazards in zip codes of concern. Lead poisoning incidence rate will continue to be above the NYS average which could lead to preventable damage to children's brains and nervous system.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The Erie County Department of Health will work with the County Attorney's Office and Division of Budget and Management to execute the resolution.

SUMMARY

ECDOH is seeking to contract with NextGen Healthcare for its necessary electronic medical records (EMR) system. The EMR system allows staff and providers to improve our ability to deliver, document, and access data that will improve the overall delivery of services to patients using clinic services. This contract with NextGen will significantly improve communication between providers regarding treatment, scheduling of tests, and ordering of medications. The NextGen system allows for follow-up where information is readily accessible to all clinical staff. This EMR system will also improve the registration process and alert our clerks to missing information that is vital to our data collection, fee schedules, and various demographics.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The proposal includes costs of \$136,111 per year plus \$20,864.95 for implementation. This proposal costs less than the current vendor at the clinic, who submitted a proposal for \$186,066.27 per year. Funds are available in the Health Division's 2024 Adopted Budget (Fund, 110, Funds Center 12710) Account 516020 - Professional Services Contracts & Fees.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

We are seeking approval of this resolution so that we can provide our clinical staff and providers with a more comprehensive records system that will impact the quality of care provided to our patients. Reports along with data collection are an integral part of patient care and necessary for many NYS grants the clinic receives.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

NextGen is reputable and respected provider of innovative healthcare technology and data solutions. Their systems allow providers to deliver whole-person health and value-based care. Their highly integrated and interoperable solutions increase clinical quality and productivity and will help our clinic to deliver better healthcare outcomes. The system also helps to advance improved provider and patient communication and satisfaction through analytics, outreach, and interoperability.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

The current system is out of date and does not provide the necessary data collection and analytics that are needed to provide quality healthcare for our patients. Erie County Annual Climate Action Update - 2023

Key Takeaways

Since last year's report, Erie County has made substantial progress implementing the initiatives outlined in the *Erie County Climate Action and Sustainability Plan for Internal Operations* (CASP), including the successful implementation of several large projects. This report gives an overview of the progress on these initiatives. The most recent greenhouse gas (GHG) inventory of Erie County's government operations, which captures 2022 emissions, shows a decrease of 34.2% compared to the 2005 baseline.

Much of 2023 was focused on completing the development of the County's equity-centered *Community Climate Action Plan* (CCAP) to expand on earlier community climate planning efforts. The actions outlined in the CCAP are directed at reducing climate pollution and protecting our residents and economy from the impacts of climate change. The CCAP was finalized and released at the end of 2023 and was adopted by the Erie County Legislature in January 2024. Already, the County is seeing the fruits of this effort, with the development of complex multi-partner grant applications and grant awards to implement CCAP actions.

Background

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The CASP was completed in 2019 and focuses on internal strategies to reduce GHG emissions. This plan was developed by the Erie County Green Team, a committee with representatives from all Erie County Departments serving under the County Executive, as well as representatives from the offices of other County elected officials. Since the release of the CASP, the Green Team has continued to meet quarterly, with its Transportation, Energy, and Waste Committees also meeting quarterly.

The CASP set aggressive internal operations greenhouse gas (GHG) emission reduction targets, including a 50% reduction from the baseline of 2005 by 2025, and an 80% reduction by 2040. The 2022 internal operations GHG inventory is included in this report.

In 2018 the County also committed to procure all electricity for County operations from renewable sources by 2030. This has become more challenging because of statewide delays in the development of renewable energy, and electric transmission infrastructure bottleneck, which have slowed renewable energy development in Western New York. As of now, the cost to purchase NYS Renewable Energy Credits (REC) to achieve this this goal would exceed \$800K per year, and those RECs would mostly be from projects outside of Western New York. Therefore, rather than purchasing RECs, the County is focusing on energy conservation and reducing climate pollution directly from its operations.

To better address community-wide climate action, in 2021 Erie County established the Community Climate Change Task Force (C3TF), a committee of its Environmental Management Council, as the official advisory board on the issue. The C3TF includes representatives from community-based organizations, not-for-profits, colleges, municipalities, business representatives, NFTA, National Grid, the Greater Buffalo Niagara Transportation Council, the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library, the Buffalo Museum of Science, and the WNY. Youth Climate Council. Over several years the C3TF supported the development of the equity focused CCAP, which involved broad community involvement, 100 active volunteers, 10 topic-based workgroups, hundreds of community engagement activities, and extensive public input. This CCAP is broadly consistent with the New York State climate plan and goals. The resulting plan can be downloaded at www.erie.gov/climateaction.

2022 Greenhouse Gas Inventory for Internal Operations




Figure 1. Erie County Internal Operations GHG Emissions by Source

The 2022 GHG inventory for the County's internal operations shows a 34.2% reduction in GHG emissions compared to the 2005 baseline (Figure 1). This year the inventory was updated to use US Environmental Protection Agency eGrid emission factors for electricity use for all inventory years, which is consistent with government operations inventory protocols, and is the method used by almost all local and county governments in New York State. The emissions reduction is a slight increase from the 2020 and 2021 inventories and reflects a higher level of onsite work and commuting emissions by Erie County staff as the COVID pandemic subsided. Since 2014 the County's largest emission reductions are from reduced emissions from employee commuting, elimination of a district heating system in 2016, reduced electricity use, and availability of greener electricity in upstate New York as coal power was replaced by natural gas generated electricity and renewable energy.

The County has implemented many energy conservation, waste reduction, and renewable energy projects, which have resulted in GHG emission reductions. Those projects are described below and in the attached tables. It is important to note that key projects, including the Energy Performance Contract, were only partially implemented by the end of 2022. Thus, they are not fully captured by the 2022 GHG inventory.

The County set a goal of 50% greenhouse gas reduction by 2025. Additional building performance savings, including from the Energy Performance Contract and fleet savings from purchase of electric vehicles, will help move us toward that goal, but it will be challenging to achieve this near-term goal. Deeper reductions later this decade will be achieved as the state implements its Clean Energy Standard for renewable energy in the grid, and as electric vehicles become more available.

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Progress on Initiatives

Tables with updates on initiatives in the CASP are attached. Below are several significant projects and achievements that were accomplished over the past year.

Energy Performance Contract – The first phase of a large Energy Performance Contract was completed in 2022 and the second phase is being completed in the spring of 2024. These projects have involved more than 100 projects at 40 buildings, and have significantly improved energy efficiency, made the buildings healthier for staff and the public, and reduced climate pollution. Examples of projects include the installation of energy-efficient heating and cooling systems, high-tech digital controls for building equipment, and power-saving LED fixtures. The second phase of the project included retrofitting the 120,000 square foot Board of Elections building with air source heat pumps – the largest municipal heat pump project ever undertaken in upstate New York. The energy savings are projected to save the County over \$400,000 per year and GHG emissions from County buildings will be reduced by over 13%. Energy cost savings are guaranteed by the contractor.

Electric Vehicles - In 2023, Erie County purchased its first EV pickup truck – a Ford 150 Lightning which is being used by the Sheriff's Office for the composting program. This is the County's 9^{th} EV vehicle. In 2024 the County will work with a specialist to systematically assess opportunities to transition to EVs and charging infrastructure needs.

Building Electrification – In 2023, DPW completed the conversion of the Sprague Brook Park Casino to a ground source heat pump heating system. This is the first ground source heat pump installed at a County property. With this project the County will have almost eliminated the use of expensive and polluting propane and fuel oil from its buildings.

<u>Climate Action Fund</u> – This fund, established in the 2020 budget, reinvests half of the cost savings achieved through energy conservation and waste reduction projects into additional sustainability initiatives. Due to how the Energy Performance Contract is structured, the fund does not include the savings from those projects. The fund is overseen by the Core Green Team, the steering committee of the Green Team, which includes representatives from DPW, DEP, Parks, Social Services, and Budget. The fund is utilized to implement action items identified in the CASP, as well as other projects identified by the Green Team. Whenever possible the fund is used to leverage additional funding through grants and rebates. In 2023, the Climate Action Fund supported the purchase of an electric golf course mower for the Parks Department, electric vehicle charging projects, an electric cart for Sheriff's personnel, EV chargers for County buildings, the Sprague Brook Park Casino ground source heat pump project, a solid waste study, and a temporary junior staff to support the CCAP project.

DSM Initiatives - The Division of Sewerage Management has several projects in progress which will reduce GHG emissions. For example, a high-level biosolids master plan study is in progress with a draft report expected in the first half of 2024. Improvements continue regarding optimizing biosolids dewatering/stabilization. Construction of the anaerobic digester improvements at the Lackawanna Water Resource Recovery Facility (WRRF) continues and is expected to be completed by mid-2024. Various energy efficiency projects are ongoing, ranging from minor changes such as LED lighting conversions to major upgrades such as the replacement of the blowers at the Big Sister Creek WRRF which is estimated to decrease the electrical load for this equipment by over 990,000 kWh annually.

<u>State and National Recognition</u> – Erie County is one of only four counties to receive Silver Certification, currently the highest level, in NYSDEC's Climate Smart Communities program by demonstrating the

COMM. 7D-1 Page 4 of 10 extensive work being done across the County to reduce GHG emissions and prepare for the changing climate. Erie County also received the most points of any large county or city in the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority's (NYSERDA) Clean Energy Communities program. This achievement resulted in the County receiving a \$250K grant award from NYSERDA for additional energy conservation projects. In 2023, the American Planning Association's New York Upstate Chapter recognized the County for Public Outreach for its CCAP. Finally, also in 2023, GObike Buffalo recognized Erie County as the year's Most Bike Friendly Employer.

<u>Commuter Committee</u> – In 2023, the County convened a Commuter Committee as a committee of the Green Team. This committee works on reducing single occupancy vehicle commuting via rideshare, bicycling, walking, and transit use. The committee meets quarterly.

<u>Unprecedented Grant Funding</u> – The County's climate planning efforts are leveraging unprecedented climate grant applications and awards. The County was awarded a \$5.2M USDA Forest Service grant for community forestry initiatives in disadvantaged communities that will result in many benefits including improving our resilience to extreme heat. This grant involves six community partners, addresses seven CCAP actions, and was resulted from the CCAP development. In 2023 the County also worked with partners to submit two federal grant applications – one for more than \$20M to install rooftop solar on low-income residences and another for \$40M that will fund Lake Erie and Niagara River coastal resiliency projects. Awards have not yet been announced for these grants.

Conclusion

With the increasing availability of federal and state funding for climate initiatives, and the conclusion of the CCAP, we have entered an exciting time. However, as we can see in headlines every day, the impacts from climate change are increasing and we have much work ahead of us. Thanks to the efforts of many in our community, the leadership of the County Executive Mark Poloncarz, the support of the Erie County Legislature, and the hard work of County staff from many departments substantial progress has been made on this critical work.

What's Next in 2024

In the next year our focus will include developing an Extreme Temperature Plan and rolling out the Erie County Low Income Program for Sustainable Energy. We will commence work on the USDA Forest Service Community Tree Project. The County will also complete the Board of Elections Building electrification project, begin a green roof and solar energy project for the Central Library and install rooftop solar on the Rath County Building. We also will be continuing to aggressively pursue additional federal and state funding for actions identified in the CCAP.

DEP's 2024 Budget includes a \$500K Climate Resilience Fund that will pilot climate resilience strategies at community heating and cooling centers. This project will address vulnerabilities that became apparent during the 2022 Blizzard and will coordinate with an ongoing Extreme Temperature Planning Project

As we continue this work, our guiding principles remain the same: to do our part as a community to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, strengthen Erie County's economy and create good jobs as we transition to clean energy, and above all protect businesses and residents from the impacts of climate change, especially those who are most vulnerable.

AFFIRMATION IN SUPPORT OF APPLICATION FOR LEAVE TO SERVE LATE NOTICE OF CLAIM

Respondents.

BRITTANYLEE PENBERTHY, ESQ., being duly sworn pursuant to CPLR § 2106, deposes and says that:

1. I am an attorney admitted to practice in the Courts of the State of New York. I am a partner with the law firm Penberthy Law Group LLP, attorneys for the Petitioner, PHYLLIS E. JACKSON, Administratrix of the estate of LEDRISE N. CURRY in this application. As such, I am familiar the facts and circumstances of this claim, except those stated upon information and belief, and as to those, I am informed and believe them to be true. Statements of legal authorities are made upon information and belief.

2. I submit this affirmation in support of Petitioner's motion for leave to serve a late Notice of Claim. <u>See</u> Proposed Notice of Claim ["PNOC"], annexed hereto as **Exhibit A**.

3. Upon information and belief, and as set forth in Petitioner's affidavit, decedent LEDRISE N. CURRY suffered an untimely death on or about December 26, 2022, after suffering an asthma attack that could not be timely responded to by emergency personnel due to the aftermath of the Buffalo blizzard of December 2022.

4. Upon information and belief, decedent's 13-year-old son was at the home at the time of decedent's asthma attack and promptly contacted 911, however, their street was still filled with too much snow for personnel to timely respond.

5. General Municipal Law § 50-e mandates that Notices of Claim, as a condition precedent to a tort or personal injury suit against a municipality, must be served within 90 days after the claim arose.

6. However, Petitioner was only appointed administrator of the estate on January 2, 2024.

7. Under the statutory calculation of 1 year and 90 days, Petitioner has until at least March

25, 2024 to file any causes of action arising from an incident of December 26, 2022.

8. Leave to serve a late Notice of Claim should be granted in this case.

9. Even when the time period to serve a late Notice of Claim has passed, "[a]n injured person who has failed to serve a timely notice of claim may, pursuant to General Municipal Law § 50-e
(5), apply for permission to serve a late notice" (<u>Matter of Felice v Eastport/South Manor Cent.</u>
Sch. Dist., 50 AD3d 138, 139 [2d Dept 2008]).

10. As further explained by the Appellate Division, Second Department, interpreting General Municipal Law § 50-e[5]:

Among the "facts and circumstances" a court must consider in determining an application for permission to serve a late notice of claim are the actual knowledge of the public corporation of the "essential facts constituting the claim" and the prejudice to the public corporation from a claimant's failure to serve a timely notice of claim

(<u>id</u>. at 139).

11. Additionally, General Municipal Law § 50-e[5] provides that the Court shall also consider whether the claimant was physically incapacitated in determining whether to grant an extension.

12. No single factor under General Municipal Law § 50-e[5] is dispositive (<u>Cicio v City of</u> <u>New York</u>, 98 AD2d 38, 39 [1st Dept 1983] ["In a series of cases, this court has emphatically rejected such arguments, holding that the statutory amendments to subdivision 5 of section 50-e of the General Municipal Law are to be liberally construed and that the absence of an acceptable excuse is not necessarily fatal. Rather, all relevant factors are to be considered, including the prejudice to the municipality and whether it obtained actual knowledge within the 90-day statutory period **or shortly thereafter**"] [emphasis added]).

13. Here, upon information and belief, and as stated in Petitioner's Affidavit, after she was only recently appointed administrator of the estate of her daughter, decedent LEDRISE N. CURRY, which resulted in a delay in obtaining counsel relative to this claim (see Client Aff.).

14. Therefore, under General Municipal Law § 50-e[5], Petitioner's inability to proceed until her appointment should be considered in Petitioner's favor.

15. Upon information and belief, importantly, the facts that this incident were both highly publicized, and also complained about in the timely Notice of Claim served by the family of a similarly situated decedent, Gloria Mawazo, individually and on behalf of Abdul Sharifu. Thus, both the County of Erie and City of Buffalo almost certainly had actual notice of the facts constituting the claim.

16. Moreover, upon information and belief, given the recency of the claim and the extensive efforts having been purportedly put forth by both Respondents to ensure proper emergency preparedness responses going forward, Respondents are in custody of ample opportunity to investigate the instant claim, and there is no conceivable prejudice to the Respondents in permitting Claimant to serve a late Notice of Claim relative to any claim.

WHEREFORE, for the reasons set forth above, and as set forth in the Affidavit of Petitioner, it is respectfully requested on behalf of Petitioner that leave be granted permitting Petitioner to serve the proposed Notice of Claim, together with any such other and further relief as the Court may deem just and proper.

1. Plaintiffs bring this action for compensatory damages, punitive damages, attorneys' fees pursuant to 42 U.S.C. §§ 1983 and 1988, and other damages that this Court deems just and proper, for violations of their Constitutionally protected civil rights.

2. At issue in this litigation are two separate removals of Nevaeh from Mr. Staley's home effected by an Erie County Child Protective Services ("CPS") caseworker, and the actions of law enforcement officers which have violated Mr. Staley's constitutional rights to be free from: (1) false arrest; (2) unreasonable searches and seizures; (3) malicious



I hereby certify that at a meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Concord held at the Town Hall in the Town of Concord on the 14th day of March, 2024, a Resolution was adopted of which the following is a true copy.

Council Member Drake moved the adoption of Resolution 3, seconded by Council Member Krzemien:

WHEREAS, approximately twelve million people live in the Lake Erie watershed, including seventeen areas with more than 50,000 residents, an area shared between the United States and Canada, and Lake Erie provides drinking water for approximately 11 million of the inhabitants of this region, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Concord, a town situated in Erie County and in the Lake Erie watershed, recognizes and values the importance of Lake Erie and continues to work diligently to safeguard and improve its own stewardship of Lake Erie and the Lake Erie Watershed, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Concord has great concern that New York State and/or any authority, agency, commission, or department thereof might allow private and/or public entities to construct, place, position, and/or install, with or without permanent bases, pylons, piers, or similar structures, one or more wind turbines in the waters of Lake Erie, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Concord has great concern that the fresh water of Lake Erie along with the overall health of Lake Erie, the wildlife that depends on Lake Erie, the wildlife that traverses Lake Erie, and the continuing restoration of Lake Erie will be placed at risk if wind turbines are constructed in the waters of Lake Erie, and

WHEREAS, NY State has passed the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (the Climate Act) calling for 70 percent of electricity in the state to be produced by renewable resources by 2030, and 100 percent of the state's electricity be generated by renewable resources by 2040; and

WHEREAS, wind energy has been designated by the Climate Act as an essential form of renewable energy; and

WHEREAS, there are a number of commercial wind energy facilities operating in Western New York, with more in the planning and permitting stages; and

WHEREAS, NY State's power grid manager New York Independent Systems Operator (NYISO) has determined the Western New York zone of grid to be 89 percent free of carbon emissions in the generation of electricity; and

WHEREAS, NYISO has described the lack of electricity transmission facilities capable of transmitting electricity from Western New York to downstate grid zones which are 90 percent dependent on fossil fuels for generating electricity; and

WHEREAS, the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority determined in 2022 that this is not the right time to consider constructing offshore wind facilities in Lake Erie; and

WHEREAS, the offshore wind industry is experiencing global difficulties related to inflation and supply line shortages as evidenced by the recent NY State Public Service Commission decision denying industry requests for higher power delivery rates: and

WHEREAS, the long-planned Lake Erie offshore wind energy project known as Icebreaker Wind near Cleveland, Ohio, has recently been suspended, and

WHEREAS, questions concerning offshore wind energy facilities in fresh water bodies remain unanswered such as these which are not included in the NYSERDA reports of 2011 and 2022:

+ What assurances that toxic industrial wastes in the lake bed will not be disturbed to endanger safe drinking water and enter the food chain of Lake Erie's fish and bird species?

+ How would the placement of offshore wind turbines in Lake Erie affect the migratory pathways and behavior of economically important game fish?

+ What would be the impact on tourism of placing wind turbines in Lake Erie?

+ Specifically, how would offshore wind turbines in Lake Erie contribute to the emissions reduction goals of the Climate Act?

+ How would the radar interference created by offshore wind turbines in Lake Erie affect the safety of shipping, recreational boating, search and rescue operations and international border security?

+ How would microplastics and toxic chemicals like BPA and PFAS emitted by wind turbines impact water quality and the ecology of Lake Erie?

+ How much oil and other petroleum products are contained within each offshore wind turbine and how would oil spills from wind turbines be mediated, and other maintenance performed during annual periods of ice coverage on Lake Erie?

+ How would noise and vibrations emitted by wind turbines impact the quiet enjoyment of Lake Erie by fishers, boaters and nearshore residents and visitors?

+ What are the effects of vibrations emitted by wind turbines on the organisms living in the lake bed?

+ How would the blinking red lights atop each offshore wind turbines be reconciled with increased interest in preventing light pollution in dark skies?

+ What would be the impact of placing offshore wind turbines in Lake Erie's migratory flyways of birds, bats and butterflies?

+ What are the cumulative impacts of placing offshore wind turbines in Lake Erie given the

already large concentration of onshore wind turbines along the Ontario shoreline and the elevations overlooking the lake in Chautauqua County?

+ What restrictions or no-go zones would be imposed on fishers and boaters in Lake Erie?

+ How would the Public Trust Doctrine which serves to protect the interests of all Western New Yorkers in a healthy Lake Erie be honored in the context of primary financial benefits to the offshore wind industry?

+ How would offshore wind turbines impact historic sites such as shipwrecks and lighthouses?

+ Would the rights of the Seneca Nation of Indians to administer water quality standards on the Cattaraugus Reservation be a consideration in placing offshore wind turbines in Lake Erie?

+ Would the high costs of offshore wind energy in Lake Erie be explained to Town of Concord electricity ratepayers in terms of monthly increases to their utility bills?

+ How would property values along the lake shore be impacted by viewsheds including offshore wind turbines and their industrial support and maintenance activities?

Conclusion: Some of these questions cannot be answered, or would be cost prohibitive to address. There are many documented examples of negative impacts of wind turbines on both terrestrial and aquatic environments. There are alternatives such as small modular nuclear and hydropower, which deserve significant consideration as possible future sources of power and do not negatively affect Lake Erie or other large bodies of water.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: The Town of Concord opposes, at this time, any efforts to introduce offshore wind turbines in the waters of Lake Erie, and calls for a moratorium on the development and/or construction of any wind turbines in the waters of Lake Erie.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Clerk shall forward a certified copy of this Town Board Resolution to Honorable Governor Kathy Hochul, Honorable United States Congressman Nicholas Langworthy, Honorable Senate Majority Leader Andrea Steward-Cousins, Honorable Senate Minority Leader Robert Ortt, Honorable Speaker of the Assembly Carl E. Heastie, Honorable Majority Leader of the Assembly Crystal Peoples-Stokes, Honorable Minority Leader of the Assembly William A. Barclay, Honorable New York State Senator Patrick Gallivan, Honorable New York State Senator George Borrello, Honorable New York State Assemblyman Andrew W. 



Executive Summary

The Erie County Charter requires a Citizens Salary Review Commission (CSRC) to review the salaries of all elected officials of Erie County, except for the District Attorney, every even year, and report its recommendations to the County executive and the County Legislature. The CSRC is comprised of nine representatives.

The 2024 CSRC convened several meetings between December 8, 2023, and April 2, 2024. The CSCR also met with representatives of the majority and minority in the County Legislature and countywide elected officials during this timeframe. Time was set aside for the public to participate at the end of each meeting and/or email their opinions. A dedicated website contained previous CSRC reports as well as the minutes and all other matters pertaining to the current review.

Current salaries (2024 adopted Erie County Budget) are County Executive \$139,392, County Sheriff \$101,811, County Clerk \$90,129, County Comptroller \$107,160, County Legislator \$42,588, County Legislature Chair \$52,588, and Majority and Minority Leader \$47,588. The County Legislature voted to increase the salaries of the County Executive, the County Sheriff, and the County Comptroller based on the 2018 CSRC recommendations. The Legislature also included a COLA for the four countywide elected positions. The 2018 CSRC did not recommend a salary increase for Legislators, who have not received a salary increase since 1996, and the Legislature declined to override the CSRC's recommendations.

The 2024 CSRC took a multipronged approach to both data collection and choice of analyses. Nine analyses were conducted based on several different factors: 1) comparable counties (the basis of the 2018 CSRC's analysis), 2) the Legislature's duties, its role in Erie County's governance, and workload comparison/size with comparable counties 3) Earnings considering average annual economic growth, 4) internal equity, 5) external equity, 6), fringe benefits, 7) complexity of countywide elected officeholders' duties, 8) impact of staggered elections, and 9) cost of living adjustments. While each of these analyses influenced the salary recommendations, the CSRC members who voted for salary increases expressed that comparable counties, Legislature's duties/workload, internal equity, earning considering annual economic growth, and external equity were the most important factors informing their recommendations.

The salary recommendation to the County Legislature are as follows:

- 1. The County Executive position have a salary of \$175,000.
- 2. The County Sheriff position have a salary of \$150,000.
- 3. The County Comptroller position have a salary of \$140,000.
- 4. The County Clerk position have a salary of \$130,000.
- 5. The members of the Erie County Legislature have a salary of \$65,000.
- 6. The Majority and Minority Leaders of the Erie County Legislature have a stipend of \$5,000 (no change).
- 7. The Legislative Chair of the Erie County Legislature have a stipend of \$10,000 (no change).
- 8. Remove Existing Cost of Living Adjustment ("COLA").

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Duties and Composition of the Erie County Citizens Salary Review Commission

Duties

The Erie County Citizens Salary Review Commission (CSRC) was established in 1986 as Article 22-B (now Article 22-A) of the Erie County Charter. Section 22-A-02: Beginning on July 1, 1986, the commission will review the salaries of all elected officials of the county of Erie, except for the District Attorney, and report its recommendations to the County Executive and the County Legislature by September 1st of that year. The committee will provide ample opportunity for public input prior to making its recommendations to the County Executive and County Legislature. Such a review of salaries must occur during every even year starting with 1986.¹

Composition

The commission consists of nine members representative of taxpayer, civic, labor, business, professional, financial and minority groups in the county of Erie. Five (5) members of the commission are appointed by the County Executive. Two (2) members of the commission are appointed by the Legislature's Majority, one (1) member is appointed by the Legislature's Minority and one (1) member is appointed by the County Comptroller.² Appendix A: The 2024 Commission contains a list of the 2024 appointees.

Article 22 – Other County Boards, Offices, Institutions and Functions³ Section 2205. Advisory Boards specifies that:

- members shall serve three-year terms and may serve no more than two consecutive terms; those who have served two consecutive terms shall be eligible again after a two-year absence.
- each advisory board shall elected one of is members to serve a two-year term as chair; no chair may serve more than two consecutive terms
- advisory boards shall meet at least four times per year

The 2024 Salary Review Process



The 2024 CSRC adopted a Public Participation Policy, which was posted to the ECSR webpage. (See Box 1 for this policy.) Meetings were advertised on the Erie County website with a separate page dedicated to the "2024 Citizens Salary Review Commission."⁴

Time was allotted at the end of each meeting for public comment. The public could also comment via email. There were no public comments.

The CSRC's meetings were available to the public in-person or via videoconferencing through Erie County's Webex platform, with a recurring link posted to the 2024 CSRC webpage.

Meetings

Eleven meetings were scheduled of the 2024 CSRC, but ten were convened due to inclement weather. These meetings are detailed in Table 1.

Role of the County Legislature in the Process

Beyond the appointment of three (3) total members to the commission, the Legislature's role is as follows (As set forth in Section 202.3 of the Erie County Charter).

The Erie County Legislature is hereby prohibited from changing the salary of any county elected official, excluding the District Attorney, except in accordance with the following procedure:

- Prior to acting upon the Citizens Salary Review Commission's biennial report, the County Legislature shall hold at least one public hearing to solicit public input on said commission's recommendations.
- Notices of all such public hearings shall be published at least once in the official newspaper or newspapers of the county and in such other newspapers as the County Legislature may direct. At least five days but not more than ten days shall elapse between the first publication of such notice and the date specified for the hearing.
- The County Legislature shall have one year from the date said recommendations are submitted to adopt, modify, or reject the recommendations of the citizens salary review commission.
- Any salaries approved by the County Legislature in excess of those recommended by the Citizens Salary Review Commission shall be approved by a vote of at least two thirds of all the members of the County Legislature.
- The County Legislature shall specifically establish the effective date of any adjustments in the salaries of elected county officials. No increase in the salary of an elected official shall be permitted for any fiscal year in which there is an increase in the real property full value tax rate over the real property full tax rate of the previous fiscal year.
- The County Legislature's review of salaries as set forth above shall occur during every even year starting with 1986. No increase in the salary of any county elected official shall take effect until the current term of office of the elected official that is to receive an increase in salary has ended. Background to this Report

The Challenge

The members of the Commission took seriously their responsibility to represent the taxpayers in their deliberations, emphasizing both the importance of citizen "watchdogs" as provided in the Erie County Charter, but also their role in ensuring Erie County elected officials should be compensated fairly.⁵ As the summary of the meetings indicates (see Table 1) indicates, the Commission was divided as to 1) the analyses that should be adopted to recommend salaries, 2) whether county legislators should be considered full-time or part-time county employees, 3) whether there should be an attempt to bring elected officials' salaries closer to their deputies, a recurring debate in each seated CSRC (see previous CSRC reports as well as Monroe County's most recent salary commission's report),⁶ 4) whether cost of living adjustments should be considered, and 5) whether other NYS counties are comparable to Erie County. Differences among the CSRC members were never completely overcome, with compromises made while agreeing to the 2024 salary recommendations.

Data Collection

The Commission sought to triangulate both the data collection and data analysis to ensure we considered the issue of salary levels from various perspectives.⁷ Based on internal deliberations, consultations with legislators, and a content analysis of the salary issue as reported by the media, the Commission agreed the salary analysis would need to be realistic and evidence based. We also agreed our analyses would be informed by respect for the citizen-taxpayers of Erie County and the cost of living in Erie County.

- Salaries of elected officials in other NYS counties (NYSAC, websites, reports, and calls to counties)
- Salaries of elected officials in the Big Four and Big Five counties (NYSAC, websites, reports, and calls to counties)
- Salaries of elected officials in the City of Buffalo

- Population, median income, and median real estate values for other NYS counties (NYSAC)

- Number of legislators, size of legislatures' budgets, staff size in comparable counties
- Interviews with Erie County elected officials (provided by Erie County Department of Budget & Management)

- 6. What data analysis do you need to make an informed decision on our recommendations?
- 7. Would raises be more acceptable to the legislature if step increases were recommended?

Commission Deliberations

Table 1 lists the date of each meeting and summarizes the major topic of each meeting. The meeting minutes provided the source for the "Topic" column, which are available on the Erie County Salary Commission website. Table 1illustrates that the CSRC members expressed a wide variety of opinions as to whether salary increases were justified, whether the Legislators are part- or full-time employees, which countries are comparable (if any), whether annual growth rates should be considered, the workload of the Legislators (e.g. the extent to which the legislative staff are the "workhorses" of the Legislature, if the civil servants should earn more than the elected officials to whom they report, and the public's likely reaction to salary increases.

Analyses

This section documents the nine analyses the CSCR members considered in their deliberations. Analysis #1 focused on identifying and comparing counties in NYS with Erie County based on several factors. Analysis #2 studied the Erie County Legislature in terms of workload, comparable counties, the distinct role of the Legislature in a charter county, and the role salaries may play in the decision to run for Legislator. Analysis #3 considered earnings with respect to average annual economic growth, taking as the starting point 1996 (the last time the Legislature agreed to increase all salaries). Analysis #4 compared internal equity (the pay of an employee relative to the pay that the other employees of the same organization are receiving). Analysis #5 was based on external equity comparisons, particularly with respect to salaries of elected officials in the City of Buffalo. Analysis #6 analyzed fringe benefits. Analysis #7 weighed the complexity of the job duties of the four countywide elected officials and relied mainly on

interviews with these officials for data collection. Analysis #8 touched on a concern that staggered elections can create a disequilibrium even after salary increases have been adopted. Finally, Analysis #9 analyzed longitudinal cost living data.

Analysis #1: Comparable Counties

The 2018 CSRC grounded its salary recommendations in an analysis of comparative counties.¹⁰ The 2024 CSRC undertook several comparative analyses.

The idea of a comparative analysis of salaries of elected officials is informed by the idea that NYS counties were created by State legislative acts and are administrative units of the State. Counties are governed by Article IX of the State Constitution, the Municipal Home Rule Law and the Statute of Local Governments. While originally conceived of and treated by Albany as handmaidens of the State, the NYS Constitution was amended in 1935 to authorize the NYS Legislature to enact alternative forms of county government. (Discussed further in Analysis #2, below.) This legislation, originally proposed by Governor Alfred E. Smith, resulted from a recognition by Albany that counties should play a more important role in regional governance as NYS had become increasingly diverse and complex. The movement towards enhanced regional governance culminated in NYS voters approving alternative forms of county government in November 1958, permitting those counties outside of NYC to prepare, adopt, and amend their charters.¹¹ New York's 57¹² counties located outside of the City of New York "carry out local functions specified by the State of New York. These functions, which include maintaining records, enforcing state laws, conducting elections for the state, and providing economic assistance through social services programs...reflect the role of the county as a regional government...and the structure of New York's counties is fairly similar ... "13

Importantly, Analysis #1 is grounded in the notion that NYS counties are more alike to one another than they are to the municipalities located within the respective counties or as Deputy Budget Director Mark Cornell clarified when asked to weigh in on the comparability question, "Erie County is probably more similar to an unlike-size county in New York State than it is to a like-sized county in another state." Therefore, in this view, the duties for which elected officials in Erie County are responsible are more like duties of other NYS counties than they are to, for example, elected officials in the City of Buffalo.

But given comparability, which counties are MOST comparable? There were several views on this point: 1) "charter counties" are more comparable regional governmental entities, 2) the Big Five (Albany, Erie, Monroe, Onondaga, and Westchester Counties) and the Big Four (excludes Westchester County), and Monroe County as Erie's most comparable county. The Big Five are often grouped together because each has a core urban area surrounded by suburban and rural areas. Population size, median income, and median real estate values are also considered relevant, and explains why some analysts do not think Westchester County is comparable to the Big Four. Median family income and median real estate prices are powerful indicators of cost of living; specifically, wages should be related to prices in the local area, and housing is generally the largest expense in a family's budget. Housing costs vary considerably across counties and wages should reflect such disparities. Government salaries for elected officials should not only be consistent with the taxpayers' ability to pay and standard of living (median family income), but also the ability of an elected official to maintain a reasonable standard of living (e.g. carry a mortgage for which median real estate value serves as a proxy).

Individual analyses follow.

1a. Focus on the Charter Counties

Table 2 provides key indicators for NYS's charter counties. As some students of NYS government have commented, "One of the main features of charter counties is in the establishment of a distinction between the legislative and executive branches because only adoption by the county of a charter permits it to establish a county administrator (typically 'executive') with powers independent of the legislative body."¹⁴ Erie County is one of 23 "charter counties" (defined by an elected executive or appointed administrative official), and one of just 18 counties with a county executive elected in county-wide general elections.¹⁵ All the counties with higher populations have opted for the charter organization.

The 2018 CSRC had relied heavily on a more conservative analysis to arrive at its recommendations. In that analysis, counties that were within one standard deviation of the mean in median income and media real estate value were compared as the basis for salary recommendations, regardless of population size. Several of the 2024 CSRC members objected to this analysis, arguing that despite similarities in governance structure, other factors were more relevant, **especially population size**, median income and real estate values, size of the county budget, and mix of urban/suburban/rural (including size of the county's primate city). As Table 2 indicates, Erie County is one standard deviation above the county population mean when

1b. Focus on the Big Four and Big Five Counties

Based on the findings in 1a., the analysis shifted to the "Big Five" upstate counties: Albany (Albany), Erie (Buffalo), Monroe (Rochester), Onondaga (Syracuse) and Westchester (Yonkers). The "Big Four" excludes Westchester County due to its higher median income and median real estate values. Table 3 indicates that even when comparing salaries with the Big Four and Big Five, Erie County's countywide elected officials have lower salaries than each of the other four counties. A careful analysis reveals that Erie County comparative lower salaries are responsible for pulling down the average salaries in comparable counties!

1d. Monroe County is the most comparable NYS county to Erie County

Several CSRC members expressed their opinion that Monroe is the most similar county to Erie County in terms of geography (urban, suburban, rural), median family income, and median real estate value. Table 4 reports salaries for Monroe County elected officials.¹⁶

Table 4 shows that Monroe County's countywide elected officials receive higher compensation than Erie County despite the former's lower population and smaller budget.

1e. Population and Budget Size Suggest Erie County is Not Strictly Comparable Erie County has the highest population of the Big Four and is ranked second among the Big Five. It also has the largest county budget of the Big Four. (See Table 5.)

Many of the CSRC members took the position that Erie County is much more complex to govern than Albany, Onondaga, and even Monroe County. Therefore, they argued that Erie County's salaries should be higher than the other Big Four.

Analysis #2: The Erie County Legislature

Of the 18 counties with the county executive system,¹⁷ only two have fewer legislators than Erie County (Montgomery, 9 legislators: population 49,258 and Putnam, 9 legislators: population 99,323).

2a. Legislators' workload

The Commission spent a great deal of time discussing the composition, workload, and duties of the legislature (summarized in Table 1).

Responsibilities of Erie County Legislators

<u>Article 2</u> of the County Charter specifies the duties of county legislators. Nowhere in the charter is it specified whether the post is considered full-time or part-time. Box 4 summarizes Erie County Legislators' duties.

Box 4 Erie County Legislators' Duties

The County Legislature shall have, but not by way of limitation, the following powers and duties:

1. To make appropriations, levy taxes and incur indebtedness.

2. To exercise all powers of local legislation in relation to enacting, amending, repealing or rescinding local laws, legalizing acts, ordinances or resolutions, subject to veto by the County Executive in such instances as are specifically provided in this Charter.

3. By local law to adopt, amend and repeal an administrative code which shall set forth the details of administration of the County government in harmony with the provisions of this Charter and may contain revisions, simplifications, consolidations, codifications and restatements of special laws, local laws, ordinances, resolutions, rules and regulations consistent with this Charter.

4. By local law to create, alter, combine or abolish County administrative units not headed by elective officers.

5. To adopt by resolution all necessary rules and regulations for its conduct and procedure.

6. To fix the compensation of all officers and employees paid from County funds, except members of the judiciary.

7. To fix the amount of bonds of officers and employees paid from County funds.

8. To make such studies and investigations as it deems to be in the best interest of the County, and in connection therewith to obtain professional and technical advice, appoint temporary advisory boards of citizens, subpoena witnesses, administer oaths and require the production of books, papers and other evidence, deemed necessary or material to the study or inquiry.

9. To determine and make provision for any matter of County government not otherwise provided for, including any matter involved in the transition to this charter form of government.

10. To award contracts submitted to it for approval on bids or otherwise and to determine whether acceptance of any bid or award of any proposed contract will best promote the public interest. In the awarding of contracts, the first consideration shall be given to the best promotion of the public interest.

Subsection j. Added by Local Law No. 7 1978.

11. To confirm each appointment of the County Executive of heads of every department, division or other administrative unit not administered by another elective official, pursuant to Article III of this Charter.

Several Commissioners expressed the opinion that the workload of Erie County Legislators is much higher than that of Legislators in comparable counties. Table 6 compares the Erie County legislative workload and costs with the 10 counties with the highest population. Erie County Legislature is an outlier with just 11 members and the highest constituency ratio (86,476 members per legislative district). This analysis suggests that the higher constituency numbers must be recognized as a factor in compensation (e.g., travel time, constituency service, complexity of district issues, committee workload). While Erie County has the fourth largest population, it has the lowest number of Legislators (Column C) and the highest number of residents per Legislator (Column D). Despite having the fifth highest salary per legislator, Erie County incurs the lowest combined costs of Legislators (column F). Finally, Column G projects what the true cost of a Legislator for each of the ten counties if they all had the same number as Erie County (Column F divided by 11), indicating that the cost/per Legislator is lowest in Erie County (Column G).

New York State has also recognized the increased responsibilities of County Legislatures as regional governance has taken on more importance in quality-of-life issues and the delivery of services: "The heightened responsibility of members of county legislative bodies is indicated by the fact that the budgets they must consider and adopt each year range from tens of millions of dollars in small counties to hundreds of millions in large counties. Several counties have budgets in excess of one billion dollars, and Nassau County's budget exceeds three billion dollars."¹⁸

2b. Separation of powers in NYS charter counties

As pointed out above, Erie County is a charter county. The implication is that a strong legislature is needed to check the power of an independent executive. The importance of a professional body with expertise to check the power of the executive branch was a topic of conversation throughout the Commission's deliberations. So, too, in the past several years the Legislature has been called upon to provide more oversight of the Erie County Sheriff's Office, adding another layer of complexity to the Legislature's responsibilities. Some Commission members who advocated for higher compensation for County Legislators expressed the idea that the while the comparable county analysis offers a sensible range, Erie County is *sui generis*

among New York State counties due to its size, housing the second largest city in New York State, its location as the westernmost city in the State, and the more conservative political leanings of its residents as compared to New York City. Some CSRC members suggested that Erie County is the only local government entity capable of exercising regional governance on the Niagara Frontier and can act as a countervailing power to Albany. It was further expressed that Erie County is in a better position than any other county in Upstate New York to tackle problems that Albany has been reluctant to take up or has simply ignored. In this laboratory of democracy view, Erie County has the "gravitas" based on the factors noted above to provide a counterweight to Albany for other upstate counties facing similar challenges. Regional governance requires both a strong executive and a strong legislature. In this view, elected officials from both branches need adequate compensation to ensure the highest level of professionalism and skill for effective regional governance in Western New York.

2c. The ability to run for Erie County legislator open to more residents of Erie County Some CSRC members pointed out that a base salary of \$42,588 is inadequate to attract individuals to run for this office. Interviews with Legislators suggested that those individuals who run their own business, practice law, or are in otherwise more "flexible" occupations are the only individuals who can afford to serve as County Legislators. The idea of calculating a time series minimum wage was rejected as not realistic for a county legislator. Accordingly, Census Bureau data for all local government in Erie County were downloaded and an average calculated. The data are the average annual wage by county 2022, the last full year of data. The top portion of the table shows average wages for all government employees. The bottom section shows the average salary for all industries by county. As Table 7 indicates, if Legislators' salaries had kept up with increments for local government employees in Erie County, their 2023 salary should be \$64,354 (the average salary for local government employees).

Therefore, this salary should represent the "expected average wage" in local government in Erie County. Several Commissioners expressed the idea that a County Legislator should be

compensated, at a minimum, at the mid-level salary range for local government because they are responsible for writing and passing legislation, reviewing, and passing the executive budget, and reviewing and approving contracts. Also, in line with a local government middle manager, they are responsible for supervising staff. Finally, given the median household income for Erie County is \$68,014 (see Table 2), the mid-60s was accepted by many CSRC members as a realistic salary range.

2d. Benefits for Erie County legislators

Some Commissioners expressed the importance of comparable benefits. Erie County Legislators are considered full-time for purposes of eligibility for the NYS retirement system and health care coverage. The Erie County budget specifically includes Erie County Legislatures as full-time employees. Monroe County legislators, on the other hand, are not eligible for retiree healthcare and pension credits earned by county legislator are on a part-time basis.¹⁹ This seemed to be a fundamental difference between Erie County and its most comparable NYS county.

2e. Size of Legislature budget

Due to the difficulty of finding comparable information on the size of legislative staffs, the Commission employed budgets as a "proxy" for Legislative staff. Table 8 indicates the Total Legislature Budget. A great deal of Erie County's total legislature budget is devoted to staff costs rather than legislative salaries. To some Commission members this indicated that Legislators have staff as "workhorses," but other members objected to the idea of staff being empowered with knowledge that elected officials should have to make informed decisions. Erie County may be relying excessively on legislative staff to compensate for lower salaries and the resulting necessity to retain outside employment.

Analysis #3: Earnings Considering Average Annual Economic Growth Another line of inquiry involved cost of living adjustments. US Census Bureau data were downloaded. The base year was 1996 because that represents the last year the Erie County Legislature approved salary increases for all elected officials. Table 9 contains year to year calculations of what Erie County elected officials' salaries would be if the average annual increase had been applied since 1996.

Two sets of calculations are presented: for local government and for private industry. So, for example, using local government annual increments, the Erie County Executive should be earning \$191,504 per annum and the Legislature (base) should be earning \$78,992. (See Table 7, above, for the average annual growth rate.)

Analysis #4: Internal Equity - Salaries of Non-Elected County Officials

Internal equity is the pay of an employee relative to the pay that the other employees of the same organization are receiving. It is the assurance that the employer pays salaries which are commensurate to each job's internal value. The concern is that underpaying elected officials may lead to a situation where either only unqualified or wealthy individuals will run for these offices or will succumb to the temptation to take on additional part-time employment.²⁰ In addition, underpaying for these influential roles may create an environment ripe for corruption to compensate for the lack of fair pay. For this analysis, the compensation of elected officials is compared to the compensation paid to others in the same or similar departments. The responsibilities of each job are compared and measured against the compensation differences to determine fairness. Furthermore, subordinates can increase their income beyond their base salary upwards of 50 percent through other compensation not afforded to elected officials such as overtime, shift differential, and lineup pay. Table 10 documents the disparity in internal equity across within the relevant elected offices.

There are scores of officials with a base salary higher than that of elected officials' salaries. Examples include the Under Sheriff at \$170,723 (compared to the Sheriff at \$101,811); the First Deputy County Clerk at \$138,613 (compared to the County Clerk at \$90,129); the Deputy Comptroller at \$153,970 (compared to the County Comptroller at \$107,160); and the Deputy County Executive at \$188,000 (compared to the County Executive at \$139,932).

While it may not be practical to use internal equity as a basis from which to recommend salaries, nevertheless, the Commission – as have other citizen salary review commissions— determined it is still useful to be aware of the sometimes quite large disparities in salary between elected

officials and their immediate subordinates.²¹ One drawback of using internal equity as a basis for salary determinations is that elected officials are often not career county employees, where their deputies often are. Furthermore, the salaries of deputies can drop substantially when an individual retires from the position and an employee with fewer years in county employment takes their place. How, then, do we determine what is the comparable internal equity?

Commission members also took note of Table 11, which indicates that despite salary increases for some countywide elected officials, there are now more employees exceeding those of the countywide elected officials than in 2018. The disparity between the Clerk and the Sheriff, on one hand, and their division employees has increased substantially, and especially with respect to the Clerk.

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These internal salary disparities generated a great deal of discussion among the Commissioners, as it has in all previous CSRCs. Some Commissioners expressed the opinion that deputies should not earn more than the elected official to whom they report. Other Commissioners suggested that effective and efficient government required an (experienced) professional civil service. In this latter view, the continuity required for an experienced civil service will inevitably produce salaries higher than elected officials.

Analysis #5: External Equity - Salaries of Elected Officials in the City of Buffalo and Comparable County Positions

External compensation equity is the pay of an employee relative to the pay of employees of other organizations. Commissioners discussed compensation in other municipalities, especially in the City of Buffalo. Table 12 contains comparative salaries for the City of Buffalo and Erie County, Budget Year 2024. The Commission also discussed salaries in other municipalities located in Erie County, noting that some police chiefs earn a higher salary than the Erie County Sheriff.

Some CSRC members tended to lean toward the comparability of the City of Buffalo and Erie County elected officials, while others thought the responsibilities of municipalities, especially New York's second largest city, are unique and require more local leadership than NYS counties. The idea expressed by some members is that as administrative units of the State, a good deal of the county's work is the "pass through" function for many State (and federal) programs, particularly social safety net programs as well as enforcing/implementing NYS law.

Analysis #6: Fringe Benefits

The CSRC also undertook an analysis of fringe benefits. Data were downloaded from the US Bureau of Labor Statistics (2010 to 2023, Quarter 3). For the Year 2023, Quarter 3, benefits constituted 56.3% of the wages for public sector workers (as compared to 44.7% for all workers). These benefits also include all "mandatory" benefits such as Social Security and health insurance. It was determined that benefits were comparable to the larger public sector.

Analysis #7: Complexity of Countywide Elected Officeholders' Duties

We have discussed the Legislature (see above). Individual interviews were conducted by Commission members with each of the countywide officeholders Some Commission members expressed interest in salary recommendations that would bridge the salary gap among the four countywide elected officials. Particularly, some CSRC members expressed an interest in closing the salary gap between the county executive and sheriff and some members thought there was an excessive salary gap between the comptroller and the clerk.


Analysis #8: Consideration of Staggering of Elections

The CSRC members discussed the effect of the Erie County Charter, which prohibits salary increases approved by the Erie County Legislature from taking effect until the next election. While there was some discussion of equalization of raises to take account of the election cycle, consensus began to emerge that it not only added a layer of complexity to the salary recommendations, but that given Erie County is required to seat a salary commission every even year, the next salary commission should consider this issue.

Analysis #9 Cost of Living Adjustments

According to the US Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, "the Consumer Price Index (CPI) is a measure of the average change over time in the prices paid by urban consumers for a market basket of consumer goods and services."²² The CPI and variations in this index are commonly used for "escalation" (inflation) calculations. If no action is taken on the current salary recommendations implemented since 2018, the salaries will increase (or stay the same) as projected in Figure 1. Various percentages were proffered from a range of 5-15 percent, with 3 percent selected based on current economic growth projections.

Summary of Salary Comparisons Based on the Various Analyses

Table 13 summarizes the findings of the various statistical analyses for the reader's convenience. As can be seen, salaries based on comparative counties (Analysis #1 & Analysis #2) are (generally) quite modest compared to the Average Annual Economic Growth (Analysis #3), internal equity (Analysis # 4), and external equity (Analysis #5). The only outlier are salaries of the Erie Couty Legislators. The combined quantitative and qualitative data discussed in Analysis #2 reveals circumstances that suggest Erie County Legislators are underpaid.

Salary Recommendations

The majority of the 2024 ECSR members were guided by a combination of the following quantitative and qualitative analyses:

- Comparative counties, especially the Big Four
- Erie County budget size & population
- Legislative responsibility in charter counties (home rule), particularly in budget, contract oversight, and constituency work
- Uniqueness of Erie County's location in NYS and its potential for exercising regional governance as a countervailing power and trendsetter with respect to NYS Legislature and statewide elected offices.
- Census-based annual growth rates for local government employees in Erie County since 1996
- Disparities in internal and external salary equity
 - 1. The County Executive position have a salary of \$175,000.
 - 2. The County Sheriff position have a salary of \$150,000.
 - 3. The County Comptroller position have a salary of \$140,000.
 - 4. The County Clerk position have a salary of \$130,000.
 - 5. The members of the Erie County Legislature have a salary of \$65,000.
 - 6. The Majority and Minority Leaders of the Erie County Legislature have a stipend of \$5,000 (no change).
 - 7. The Legislative Chair of the Erie County Legislature have a stipend of \$10,000 (no change).
 - 8. Remove Current Cost of Living Adjustment ("COLA").

Conclusions

The 2024 Erie County Citizen Salary Review Commission considered many factors in arriving at its salary recommendations. The Commission employed a mixed methods approach for collecting data by utilizing both qualitative (interviews, analysis of NYS charter county responsibilities in home rule and separation of powers, urban/suburban/rural) and quantitative data (population, median income, median real estate value, budget size, comparable salaries in other counties and the City of Buffalo, and annual average growth rates). The majority of the Commission member agreed there was not one-size-fits-all methodology for achieving a balance between possible resentment of some Erie County residents for salary increases for elected officials and the crucial importance of ensuring that regional governance in Western New York attracts the best and the brightest to ensure Erie County is well governed into the future.

2. C. (1) <u>Adoption of Revised Operating and Capital Budgets, Niagara</u> <u>Frontier Transportation Authority and Niagara Frontier Transit</u> <u>Metro System, Inc., Fiscal Year 2024-2025</u>

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Staff recommends the Board adopt the revised Operating and Capital Budgets for the Niagara Frontier Transportation Authority (NFTA) and Niagara Frontier Transit Metro System, Inc. (Metro) for the Fiscal Year ending March 31, 2025.

INFORMATION: On December 14, 2023, the Board adopted the budgets for FY 2024-2025. Staff is presenting a revised balanced budget based on current information with the assumptions noted below.

Operating Assistance is decreasing \$17,159,936 due to \$18.9 million, or 9.0%, lower than budgeted New York State operating assistance, reflecting the Governor's executive budget for FYE 2025, \$1 million, or 100%, lower than budgeted NFIA Seneca proceeds based on the expiration of the long-term gaming compact on December 31, 2023, and decreases in sales tax (\$0.5 million, or 1.8%) and mortgage tax (\$0.2 million, or 2.0%) revenues based on recent trends. These decreases have been partially offset by FTA COVID-19 relief funds increasing \$2.4 million, or 4.1%, which are earmarked by Metro for ongoing erosion of passenger fares and mandated capital projects.

Operating expenses are decreasing \$6,390,669, or 2.3%, primarily the result of adjustments to personnel services, transit fuel/ power, and general business expenses.

Non-operating/capital items are decreasing \$10,769,267, or 11.7%, primarily due to a decrease in NFTA/Metro capital spending of \$14,540,617, or 17.9%, due to the loss of dedicated rail capital funding.

"**RESOLVED**, that the Revised Operating and Capital Budgets of the NFTA and Metro attached hereto for FYE ending March 31, 2025, be, and hereby are, adopted."
