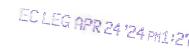

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature does hereby acknowledge the conscientious, difficult, and dedicated service our Correctional Officers and Correctional Employees perform for the people of Erie County and does further extend to those good public servants its gratitude for jobs well done; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature does hereby declare the week of May 5 to 11, 2024 to be Correctional Officers Week in Erie County.

LOCAL LAW TO BE ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE IN THE COUNTY OF ERIE LOCAL LAW INTRO. – NO. __2-1___ - 2024 LOCAL LAW – NO. _____ - 2024

A LOCAL LAW requiring transparent, searchable databases for expenditures accessible and available to the public.

SECTION 1. Title

This law shall be entitled and known as "The Tax Dollar Disclosure Act."

SECTION 2. Legislative Intent

The Erie County Legislature recognizes that taxpayers should have easy access to details on how the county is spending their tax dollars and what performance results are achieved for those expenditures. It is the intent of the Legislature, therefore, to direct the Erie County Comptroller to create and maintain a searchable budget database website detailing where, for what purpose, and what results are achieved for all taxpayer investments in county government.

SECTION 3. Definitions

AGENCY

A county department, division, office, bureau, board, commission, committee, or unit. This includes individual county agencies and programs, as well as those programs and activities that cross agency lines. "County agency" includes all elective offices in Erie County government.

AUDIT OR REPORT

Shall include any audit or report issued by the state, county, legislature, legislative committee, comptroller or executive body relating to the entity or recipient of funds or the budget program/activity or agency.

COMPTROLLER

The Erie County Comptroller.

ENTITY/AND OR RECIPIENTS

- A. a corporation,
- B. an association,

- C. a union,
- D. a limited liability company,
- E. a limited liability partnership,
- F. any other legal business entity including non-profits,
- G. grantees,
- H. contractors, and
- I. a county, city, or other local government entity.
- J. "Entity/and or recipients" does not include an individual recipient of public assistance.

FUNDING SOURCE

The account from which the expenditure is appropriated, inclusive of all budgeted accounts.

FUNDING ACTION OR EXPENDITURE

Shall include details on the type of spending (grant, contract, appropriations, etc.). This includes tax exemptions or credits. Where possible, a hyperlink to the actual expenditure document (in a format that is, at a minimum, as searchable as a searchable PDF format) shall be provided.

LEGISLATURE

The Erie County Legislature.

SEARCHABLE BUDGET DATABASE WEBSITE

A website that allows the public, at no cost, to:

- A. Search and aggregate information for the following:
 - 1. the name and principal location or residence of the entity/and or recipients of funds,
 - 2. the amount of funds expended,
 - 3. the funding or expending agency,
 - 4. the funding source of the revenue expended,
 - 5. the budget program/activity of the expenditure,

- 6. a descriptive purpose for the funding action or expenditure,
- 7. the expected performance outcome for the funding action or expenditure,
- 8. the past performance outcomes achieved for the funding action or expenditure,
- 9. any audit or report relating to the entity or recipient of funds or the budget program/activity or agency,
- 10. and any other relevant information specified by the Comptroller.
- B. Programmatically search and access all data in a serialized machine-readable format (such as XML) via a web-services application programming interface.

SECTION 4. Searchable Budget Database Website Created

By October 1, 2024, the Comptroller shall develop and make publicly available a single, searchable budget database website including the required data for the most recent county budget. The website shall be given a unique and simplified website address. Each county agency that maintains a generally accessible Internet site or for which a generally accessible Internet site is maintained shall include a link on the front page of the agency's Internet site to the budget database website.

SECTION 5. Updates

The Comptroller shall provide guidance to agency heads to ensure compliance with this section. The searchable budget database website shall be updated as new data becomes available, if feasible, but no later than 30 days upon receipt of data from the agency.

The Comptroller shall ensure that all data added to the searchable budget database website remains accessible to the public for a minimum of six years.

SECTION 6. Compliance with the Act

The Comptroller shall not be considered in compliance with this act if the data required for the searchable budget database website is not available in a searchable and aggregate manner and/or the public is redirected to other government websites, unless each of those sites has information from all agencies and each category of information required can be searched electronically by field in a single search.

SECTION 7. Severability

If any part or provision of this chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision or application directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remainder of this chapter or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances. The County of Erie hereby declares that it would have passed this chapter or the remainder thereof had such invalid application or invalid provision been apparent.

SECTION 8. Repealer

All ordinances, local laws, and parts thereof inconsistent with this chapter are hereby repealed; provided, however, that such repeal shall not affect or impair any act done or right accruing, accrued, or acquired, or penalty, charge, liability, forfeiture, or punishment incurred or owing prior to the time such repeal takes effect, but the same may be enjoyed, asserted, collected, enforced, prosecuted, or inflicted as fully and to the same extent as if such repeal had not been effected. All actions and proceedings, civil or criminal, commenced under or by virtue of any provision of any County of Erie local law, ordinance or resolution so repealed, and pending immediately prior to the taking effect of such repeal, may be prosecuted and defended to final effect in the same manner as they might if such provisions were not so repealed.

SECTION 9. Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect on October 1, 2024.

A LOCAL LAW requiring meetings of Erie County Boards and Advisory Committees to provide access to information to the public.

SECTION 1. Title

This law shall be entitled and known as "The Meetings Transparency Act."

SECTION 2. Legislative Intent

The Erie County Legislature recognizes that taxpayers should have easy access to details discussed and acted upon at public meetings. The Erie County Legislature prepares an agenda which it posts prior to session, streams and has available for replay video of the meeting and posts the minutes of meeting for review. Readily available technology should be used to increase access to similar discussions and actions of commissions and boards.

SECTION 3. Definitions

BOARD

Any government board, commission, council, committee, advisory committee, panel or similar group that is created pursuant to the Erie County Charter, Code or Local Law.

SECTION 4. Meeting Minutes

Boards shall keep written minutes summarizing all official actions, discussions, public comments, and votes taken at each meeting.

Draft minutes shall be made available to the public within 10 business days after each meeting.

Minutes shall be officially approved at the board's next public meeting and a final version posted publicly online within 5 business days after approval. The minutes also must be submitted to the Clerk of the Legislature to be included in the official record.

SECTION 5. Notice and Agendas

Boards shall give public notice at least 7 calendar days prior to any regular meeting by prominently posting the date, time, location, and agenda on the general Erie County website, as well as the website of the Erie County Legislature.

For special or emergency meetings, notice should be provided as soon as is practicable.

Meeting agendas shall include a list of topics to be discussed, a list of invited speakers, and indicate if any votes or official actions are anticipated.

SECTION 6. Broadcast and Recording of Meetings

To the extent feasible, boards should also provide a live stream of meetings for public viewing. Erie County is required to make appropriate accommodation for each board to make this possible. If a live stream is not possible, meetings should at minimum be video recorded and the recording should be posted on the general Erie County website.

SECTION 7. Public Access to Records

Boards shall maintain information to be posted on Erie County's website providing access to board member information, past meeting minutes, agendas, recordings, reports, resolutions, and other official documents.

Upon public request, boards shall provide copies or electronic access to such records in a timely manner as allowable by public records laws.

SECTION 8. Public Comment

Boards should provide reasonable opportunities for public comment at each meeting.

Any restrictions on public comment shall be viewpoint-neutral and clearly stated in the board's policies.

SECTION 9. Compliance

Originating governmental bodies shall establish procedures to monitor and ensure compliance with this law.

SECTION 10. Severability

If any part or provision of this chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision or application directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remainder of this chapter or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances. The County of Erie hereby declares that it would have passed this chapter or the remainder thereof had such invalid application or invalid provision been apparent.

SECTION 11. Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect on September 1, 2024.

LOCAL LAW INTRO. NO. 4-1 -2024

LOCAL LAW NO. -2024

A Local Law amending Local Law 1-1959, constituting the Erie County Charter, as amended, in relation to the repeal and replacement of Section 2516 for the purpose of authorizing the Erie County Legislature, when required by the state, to extend the County's current imposition of the state authorized 1% and 0.75% sales and compensating use tax by majority vote.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT

The intent of this legislation is to authorize the Erie County Legislature, when required by the state, to extend the County's current imposition of the state authorized 1% and 0.75% sales and compensating use tax upon the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole number of the membership of the County Legislature without the necessity of a referendum.

Section 2. REQUIRING MAJORITY VOTE FOR SALES TAX EXTENSION

Erie County Local Law number one of nineteen hundred fifty-nine, as amended, constituting the Erie County Charter, is hereby amended as follows:

Article 25, Section 2516 of the Erie County Charter is hereby repealed in its entirety and replaced with a new Section 2516 to read as follows:

Section 2516. Imposing and increasing County taxes, fees and charges. No new form of county tax shall be imposed, and no other fee or charge of the County shall be established or increased except by a resolution approved by: (a) the affirmative vote of two thirds of the whole number of the membership of the County Legislature, or, (b) the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole number of the membership of the County Legislature submitting a proposition for such imposition, establishment or increase to a mandatory referendum to be held pursuant to article three of New York State County law or article three of New York State Municipal Home Rule law as applicable. Notwithstanding the provisions above or any other provision of local legislation, so long as local action is required by the state to extend the County's 1% and 0.75% sales and use tax authorized by New York State Tax law Article 29 Section 1210, such action shall be taken upon the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole number of the membership of the County Legislature without the necessity of a referendum.

Section 3. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Local Law shall take effect after receiving an affirmative vote of a majority of the qualified

electors of the County of Erie in a manner consistent with the provisions of New York State Municipal Home Rule Law Section 3 and upon its subsequent filing with the New York Secretary of State.

Section 4. SEVERABILITY

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this Local Law or the application thereof, to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity or circumstance, shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional such order of judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this Local Law or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or order shall be rendered.

WHEREAS, for comparison purposes, this is significantly higher than a similar ticket at zoos within driving distance, including: Erie Zoo (\$12); Toronto Zoo (\$19.75 USD); Seneca Park Zoo (\$12); Pittsburgh Zoo (\$18); and, the Central Park Zoo (\$19.95); and

WHEREAS, while the Buffalo Zoo recently announced a "Zoo for All" program with the laudable goal of increasing access to the Zoo, the sharp increase in prices for a Zoo experience may have the unfortunate result of creating a "Zoo for Few," as middle-class residents are priced out of an institution that receives significant public funding; and

WHERAS, when the Erie County Legislature increased funding to the Buffalo Zoo again this year, it was not the intent that the Buffalo Zoo would drastically increase admission prices.

This resolution is requesting authorization for the County Executive to enter into an Agreement with the firm of DiDonato Associates Engineering and Architecture, P.C. for providing professional design services for the Erie County Department of Parks, Recreation and Forestry (Parks) Seneca Bluffs Natural Habitat Park Green Infrastructure Parking Lot Design Project. The Department of Public Works (DPW) received professional Engineering design services proposals for the project on February 20, 2024.

This project involves professional design services to enhance the front end of the park by creating green infrastructure features that will work to minimize stormwater runoff and the spread of pollutants into the neighboring Buffalo River. DiDonato Associates Engineering and Architecture, P.C. will provide all services for civil engineering and site disciplines as it pertains to the scope of work at hand as a prime consultant with proposed subconsultants in full compliance with all the latest editions of the New York State Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Codes.

The firm selected has submitted evidence that they have the necessary expertise, experience, and manpower to provide the necessary professional engineering services for the project.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Funds for the project are currently available in Project A.22024 – Seneca Bluffs GIGP Project, Fund 410, Funds Center 164, for an amount not to exceed \$210,000 inclusive of design contingencies.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The Seneca Bluffs Natural Habitat Park Green Infrastructure Parking Lot Design Project's goal is to enhance the front end of the park by creating green infrastructure features that will work to minimize stormwater runoff and the spread of pollutants into the neighboring Buffalo River. Funding for the project is provided by the NYS Environmental Facilities Corporation Green Innovation Grant Program.

DiDonato Associates Engineering and Architecture, P.C design will focus on the following: streetscape along Seneca Street with native trees, shrubs and plantings utilizing green infrastructure practices; and utilization of captured rain water to be reused on other portions of the site; to incorporate permeable/green infrastructure surfaces in the parking area as well as adequate space for loading and unloading kayak or other non-motorized watercraft; rain gardens, pollinator gardens and/or meadows with grass frontage areas with signage as appropriate to educate the public to habitat features.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Seneca Bluffs Natural Habitat Park is approximately 20 acres of natural habitat and passive use park land. Over 3,500 linear feet of shoreline has been restored and native vegetation installed to promote fish and wildlife habitat. A significant portion of the habitat park will remain green space with existing trails, gardens, native trees, plants and shrubbery throughout. This project will focus on the front of the park off Seneca Street, most specifically the parking lot area to provide green infrastructure improvements.

DiDonato's design will comply with today's codes and standards related to all disciplines (civil and site) along with incorporating site design to include utility work, pathways, parking lot, landscaping, etc. required for ADA compliancy as well as Green Infrastructure improvements.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If the consulting contract is not approved, a capital project will not be completed at the Seneca Bluffs Natural Habitat Park and poor environmental conditions will continue to pollute the Buffalo River and surrounding areas.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Upon Legislative approval, the County Executive will execute an Agreement with DiDonato Associates Engineering and Architecture, P.C. for the project.

Additionally, After the establishment of \$8,568,000 in new designations re-appropriated into the 2024 Budget, this resolution would add \$9,857,826 to the County's Unassigned Fund Balance for a 2023 ending balance of \$146,329,530, or approximately 11% of the 2023 General Fund Budget.

SUMMARY

The attached resolution authorizes budget balancing amendments that are necessary to close the County's books and prepare financial statements for review by the County's independent auditors at Drescher & Malecki, LLP for the 2023 fiscal year.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The resolution requires no additional funding. Appropriation accounts with available balances are used to transfer budget to accounts where budget has been exceeded. Revenue budget increases are included where appropriate.

After completing budget balancing entries and consideration of various existing 2023 funds reservations for carry-forward into 2024 (and the effectuation of COMM 6D-10 (2024) which recognized a \$15.2M portion of unanticipated 2023 sales tax revenue and re-appropriated it for pay-as-you-go capital project conversion), the County will realize a \$18,425,826 budgetary surplus, ending the year 1.05% favorable as compared to budget. key positive variations contributing to this year-end surplus include: Social Service operating efficiencies (\$35.6 million), interest earnings (\$20.7 million), gross non-Social Services salary & fringe savings (\$15.6 million), sales tax receipts (\$14 million after COMM 6D-10 (2024)), Board of Elections operating efficiencies (\$4.7 million) delinquent property tax collections (\$3.2 million), etc.

After the establishment of \$8,568,000 in re-appropriations as new designations into the 2024 Budget (also detailed in the recommendations section) sought as part of this resolution, \$9,857,826 will be added to the County's Unassigned Fund Balance for a 2023 ending balance of \$146,329,530, which is equivalent to approximately 11% of the 2023 General Fund Budget.

Although the Erie County Charter and Code require an Undesignated Fund Balance to be at least 5% of the County's annual operating budget, other municipal financial best practices, including GFOA, suggest as much as 15% be held. As a measure of fiscal responsibility, this Administration believes it prudent to maintain Unassigned Fund Balance at the 11% level achieved last year as part of the 2022 Year-End Budget Balancing Amendments and Designations Resolution (COMM 8E-1 (2023).

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Numerous fiscal issues previously identified during 2023, especially within personal services accounts, require budgetary "clean-up" adjustments. This resolution requests authorization to decrease appropriations where available, in order to increase appropriations that are currently indicating a budget shortfall. The Budget Balancing Amendments are a routine annual action.

The budget adjustments were identified in cooperation with the Erie County Comptroller's Office and in consultation with departmental accountants based on year-end financial reports. Approval of this resolution will facilitate the year-end closing activity for the Comptroller's Office and will allow for the timely completion of 2023 financial statements by our independent auditors.

Also included in the resolution is authorization to re-appropriate 2023 funds into 2024. These items all exist as funds reservations and are broken into 3 categories:

First, is \$46,293,000 in remaining pay-as-you-go funding for the new stadium appropriated as part of 2021 Year-End Budget Balancing Amendments and Designations Resolution (COMM 8E-1 (2022)) and 2022 Year-End Budget Balancing Amendments and Designations Resolution (COMM 8E-1 (2023)).

Second, is \$75,603,138 directly related to delayed and additional Intergovernmental Transfer (IGT) Payments to Erie County Medical Center Corporation which are expected but have yet to be required as noted below:

WHEREAS, key positive variations contributing to this year-end surplus include: Social Service operating efficiencies (\$35.6 million), interest earnings (\$20.7 million), gross non-Social Services salary & fringe savings (\$15.6 million), sales tax receipts (\$14 million after the recognition of \$15.2 million for pay-as-you-go capital project conversion via COMM 6D-10 (2024)), Board of Elections operating efficiencies (\$4.7 million) delinquent property tax collections (\$3.2 million), etc.; and

WHEREAS, after the establishment of \$8.6 million in re-appropriations are made into the 2024 Budget, \$9.9 million will be committed to Unassigned Fund Balance for a final 2023 balance of \$146.3 million or approximately eleven (11%) percent of the County's 2023 Adopted General Fund Budget; and

WHEREAS, although the Erie County Charter and Code require an Undesignated Fund Balance to be at least five (5%) percent of the County's annual operating budget, other municipal financial best practices suggest as much as fifteen (15%) percent.

WHEREAs, as a measure of fiscal responsibility, this Administration believes it prudent to ensure Unassigned Fund Balance remains at the 11% level reached last year during the 2022 budget balancing process.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature hereby authorizes the Director of the Division of Budget and Management to adjust the 2023 Budget in order to facilitate the completion of 2023 financial statements, based on the following schedule:

I am writing to you requesting that you ask for a meeting with Supt. Michael Phillips in regard to the recent revelation that an inmate passed away from water intoxication. While in custody of the Erie County Sheriff's Office last year, William Hager consumed enough water to cause his own death. That is troubling to me and I would like the Erie County Corrections Specialists Advisory Board ("the Board") to investigate this death.

I also received a report from the Commission of Corrections on another death in the prison that occurred in 2021. That death involved an incarcerated individual by the name of James Ellis who passed away from stomach cancer, but never received the proper care for it. I have attached a redacted version of the report to this letter. The COC makes several recommendations for Correctional Health, the Medical Examiner, and the Chair of Legislature. The Board is in an excellent position to expand upon those recommendations and work with the Sheriff and the Legislature to develop improvements to prevent future similar situations from occurring.

In addition to those, I would like the Board to discuss with the Sheriff's office all deaths that have occurred in jails in the last 48 months and develop any recommendations they see fit to address the conditions that led to each of those deaths.

Please let me know how my staff and I can be helpful in meeting this request.

SUMMARY

The Parks Department is seeking authorization to create fifteen (15) Park Attendant positions to serve as the basis for the County Executive's new initiative, Erie Corps. Erie Corps, inspired by President Franklin Roosevelt's New Deal initiative Civilian Conservation Corps, is designed to supply 18 to 22 year old residents of Erie County, who live below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level, an opportunity for paid vocational training leading to a career in environmental and conservation efforts. The positions will serve as an opportunity for those that complete Summer Youth Employment and have training costs covered by the Workforce Investment Board (WIB).

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Positions to be created are as follows:

Park Attendant (JG 33) - fifteen total

Annualized Salary (each position) \$12,768 Salary for Balance of Year (total for all 15) \$191,520

Funding Source Grant Funded

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Erie Corp is an opportunity to provide youth residents an opportunity with training covered by DSS Summer Youth Employment and WIB funding that could lead to a career in environmental and conservation efforts.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Dear Honorable Members and County Executive Poloncarz:

My office has prepared an Interim Financial Report ("Report") of the County of Erie, New York ("County") as of and for the three-month period ended March 31, 2024 (first quarter 2024). The Report, enclosed for your review, consists of the following elements:

- Financial Statements
- Investment Report
- Cash Flow Statement
- Property Tax and Sales Tax Summary
- Debt Schedules
- Miscellaneous Financial Data (including data on short and long-term bonded indebtedness, property tax rates and constitutional taxing power)

Our office provides the following observations and comments for your consideration:

Sales Tax

After growth in sales tax revenue in 2022 and 2023, sales tax revenue growth in 2024 is slowing dramatically. Currently, our sales tax revenue is not meeting 2024 Budget estimates. The Office of the New York State Comptroller recently issued an analysis reporting that all Upstate New York counties have seen such decreases.

On April 24, 2024, New York State Comptroller Thomas DiNapoli reported that local government sales tax collections increased 1.86% in the first quarter of 2024 compared to the first quarter of 2023. His report noted that this growth was largely driven by New York City and its "resurgent hospitality industry", with several upstate regions experiencing a year-over-year decline for the quarter.

DiNapoli reported that "first quarter collections for the counties and cities in the rest of the state, in aggregate, were virtually flat (-0.03%), year over year. This marked the first time that quarterly collections have not grown since the first quarter of 2021." According to DiNapoli, Erie County was tied for the third steepest decline in sales tax at (negative) -6.4% for the period (see https://www.osc.nv.gov/files/local-government/publications/pdf/2024-sales-tax-first-quarter.pdf

and https://www.osc.ny.gov/press/releases/2024/04/dinapoli-local-sales-tax-collections-16-first-quarter).

Part of the County's loss of sales tax revenue in the first quarter was attributable to your mutual decision in July 2023 to temporarily eliminate all sales taxes on residential energy (natural gas, electricity, propane, heating oil, etc.) purchases for the months of December 2023 and January and February 2024. However, that moratorium ended in February. Comptroller DiNapoli's report still showed a substantial decline in sales tax revenue for Erie County in March 2024 compared to March 2023.

The former and current Erie County Budget Directors have each warned of the trend of declining sales tax revenue in Budget Monitoring Reports ("BMR") starting with the September 2023 BMR. The latest document, a two-page letter issued by the current Budget Director on April 19, 2024, expresses even greater concern about the sales tax trend for 2024 and the potential for precautionary gap-closing measures later in 2024. We disagree slightly with the administration, which suggested that the decrease in sales tax revenue is due mainly to the home heating fuel moratorium. The drop in sales tax revenue exceeds that which was estimated or projected from the home heating fuel moratorium. Something else, perhaps a decrease in consumer confidence, is also occurring which is leading to less sales tax revenue in 2024. Again, in this, Erie County is not alone, as Comptroller DiNapoli's report indicates.

Actual sales tax revenues in 2024 are not meeting budget. For the first quarter of the year, the County has only received 21.2% of the budgeted sales tax revenue, or \$135,334,184. At the same time in 2023, the County received 25.2% of sales tax revenue or \$147,313,096 and was meeting budget. In 2024, the County adopted a budget with a \$55.8 million increase in sales tax revenue for the year, so a further trend of less sales tax revenue in future 2024 quarters will compound the problem.

Real Property Taxes

Through the three-month period ended March 31, 2024, the County has received 79.2% of the \$423,464,041 in property tax that was levied and is collectible for County purposes. This contrasts with 79.6% at the same point in 2023. Taxes remaining to be collected are at \$82,282,666 for 2024, compared to \$85,183,787 for the first quarter of 2023.

Borrowing

Due to our strong cash position, our office continues to project that the County will not need to issue a Revenue Anticipation Note (RAN) in 2024 (similar to 2021, 2022 and 2023). However, our available cash continues to decrease as funds are expended including those related to the American Rescue Plan.

Investments

Our office has continued to aggressively invest available cash in a variety of ways, through purchasing US Treasury Bills and our accounts at NYCLASS, Citizens Bank, JP Morgan Chase, and KeyBank. For instance, through April 17, 2023, we have purchased \$8.1 billion worth of Treasury Bills since March 2022. The County also earns interest earnings on our operating accounts at M&T Bank, which is the County's lead banking partner. For the first three months of 2024, our office made 410 investments generating \$8,241,398 in total interest earnings; this compares favorably to the same period in 2023 with \$5,739,977 in total interest earnings.

Conclusion

The financial statements and other information contained in this Report have been compiled largely from the official accounting records maintained in the County's SAP system. The Financial Statements from Erie County Medical Center Corporation, Erie Community College, the Erie County Tobacco Securitization Corporation, the Buffalo and Erie County Industrial Land Development Corporation, Inc. and the Erie County Fiscal Stability Authority are not included because financial information for the aforementioned entities is maintained separately from the County.

Information contained in this Report has not been reviewed by the County's independent auditor; therefore, no opinion on this Report is expressed.

NONMAJOR GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

SPECIAL REVENUE FUNDS

These funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources that are legally restricted to expenditures for specific purposes. These funds include the Road, Sewer, Downtown Mall, E-911, Grants, Community Development, and Pharmaceutical Litigation Settlements Fund.

Road Fund

Used to account for all revenues and expenditures related to the maintenance of County roads and bridges, snow removal, construction and reconstruction of County roads not required to be recorded in a Capital Projects Fund.

Sewer Fund

Used to account for the activities of the various sewer districts currently in operation within the County.

Downtown Fund

Used to account for revenues raised through a special district charge levy and the subsequent expenditure of these monies for the operation and maintenance of a downtown pedestrian/transit mall.

E-911 Fund

Used to account for revenues raised through a telephone access line surcharge and the subsequent expenditure of these monies for the establishment and maintenance of an enhanced 911 emergency telephone system.

Grants Fund

Used to account for federal and state operating grants (except the Community Development Block Grant) earmarked for specific programs, so that grantor accounting and reporting requirements can be satisfied.

Community Development Fund

Used to assist participating municipalities in the development of locally approved community or economic development activities that are eligible under federal program regulations.

Pharmaceutical Litigation Settlements Fund

Used to account for the County's receipt and spending of pharmaceutical litigation settlement funds from national, state and County litigation against pharmaceutical companies. The County started receiving revenue from the Office of the New York State Attorney General in 2022. Much of the settlement funding is restricted and has to be spent on specific public health measures to combat opioid abuse. The Fund reports separate breakdowns for the usages of restricted funds and unrestricted funds.

DEBT SERVICE FUND

The Debt Service Fund is used to account for current payments of principal and interest on general obligation long-term debt, and for financial resources that have been accumulated to make future principal and interest payments on general long term indebtedness.

NONMAJOR GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS (Continued)

CAPITAL PROJECTS FUNDS

Capital Projects Funds are used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities.

General Government Buildings, Equipment and Improvements Fund

Used to account for capital projects administered by the Department of Public Works involving the acquisition, construction, or reconstruction of major or permanent facilities having a relatively long useful life and equipment purchased from the proceeds of long-term debt.

Highways, Roads, Bridges and Equipment Fund

Utilized to account for capital projects administered by the Department of Public Works for the construction or reconstruction of County roads and bridges and the acquisition of equipment not accounted for in the Road Fund.

Sewers, Facilities, Equipment and Improvements Fund

Used to account for capital projects relating to the construction and acquisition of sewer facilities and equipment by the operating sewer districts.

Tobacco Proceeds Fund

Used to account for the net proceeds from the County's securitization of its share of the 1998 Master Settlement Agreement with the tobacco industry that will be used to fund capital projects that otherwise would have been supported by operating funds or the issuance of bonds.

Special Capital Projects Fund

Utilized to account for capital projects administered by departments other than Public Works that are primarily for the acquisition or construction of buildings, improvements and equipment.

INVESTMENT REPORT

Investment Report

January 1, 2024 through March 31, 2024

In accordance with the Comptroller's Investment Guidelines, the Investment Report for the first three months of 2024 is hereby submitted. The primary objectives of the investment program, as set out in established guidelines, are as follows in order of importance:

- compliance with legal requirements
- safeguarding of principal
- ensuring sufficient liquidity
- obtaining a reasonable rate of return

Our cash management program offers the County a good return on its investments without assuming unnecessary risks. A total of 410 investments were made during the first three months, resulting in \$8,241,398 in total interest earnings for all funds. The average yield for the first three months was 4.24%. For comparison, during the first three months of 2023, 400 investments were effectuated which generated \$5,739,977 in total interest earnings for all funds at an average yield of 3.00%.

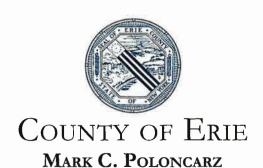

SUMMARY

It is recommended that the Legislature authorize the County Executive to enter into a one-year, no cost, amendment to extend the term of a contract with the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services, referred to as Distribution No. 11. This Honorable Body originally approved execution of this agreement under COMM. 3E-13 (2022). In addition, the resolution requests authorization to extend subcontracts with the Erie County Bar Association's Aid to Indigent Prisoners Society ("Erie County Bar Association") and the Legal Aid Bureau of Buffalo ("Legal Aid") to deliver the services required through the grant.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no fiscal implications on the operating budget. All services will be fully reimbursed through New York State.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Legislative approval is required for the County Executive to enter into an amendment to the contract with New York State, as well as extend the subcontracts with the Erie County Bar Association and Legal Aid.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services has made \$2,910,255 available to Erie County to improve the quality of representation provided to indigent defendants. Erie County will utilize the funds to improve services through the Erie County Bar Association and the Legal Aid, who contract with Erie County to provide mandated indigent defense services. These two agencies have provided said services for the County under contract for many years.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Failure to approve this resolution will serve to hinder the improvement of State mandated indigent legal services in Erie County.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Contracts will be executed after final review by the Department of Law as to form.

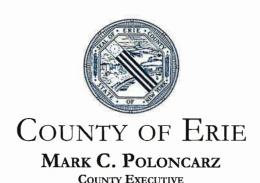

SUMMARY

This resolution is requesting authorization for the County Executive to enter into a contract with the lowest responsible bidders for Buffalo and Erie County Central Library Emergency Egress & Systems Renovations. General and Electrical Construction bids were received by the Department of Public Works on February 29, 2024.

The safety and security of patrons who visit the Library and the staff who work there is an absolute priority. Keeping the Library's levels of security up to date is critical to patron/staff welfare and the operation of the entire facility. Replacement of the doors is required not only because of their age and physical condition, but also for the ability of the doors to work properly with the lockdown system in which the doors will automatically lock when the designated buttons are pressed. The Central Library currently has no protection from outside threats attempting to breach the library through glass windows and doors. Bullet resistant film acts as a barrier between the external environment and the interior of the library, significantly slowing down anyone attempting to enter the library with a firearm or other weapon while allowing security to respond faster and allowing other staff and patrons to escape with more time.

This resolution is requesting authorization for the County Executive to enter into a contract with the lowest responsible bidder for Buffalo and Erie County Central Library Loading Dock Improvements project. General Construction bids were received by the Department of Public Works on February 27, 2024.

The condition of the Central Library's Loading Dock has begun to deteriorate to the point that there are multiple areas of cracking and crumbling concrete. The trench drain that runs the length of the dock has partially collapsed, with several grates that cover the drain no longer in place. These openings have been covered with heavy steel plates, which often shift and require several people to move back in place. Replacing the loading dock surface, diamond plated steel covers, and the trench drain will avoid more costly repairs in the future.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The loading dock, which is original to the building, has never been repaired in its lifetime. It is showing signs of significant wear and tear and the deteriorated trench drain is a concern not only for individuals who walk over it but also to the trucks that drive over it and the staff required to move the steel plates back into place when they shift.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

A loading dock restoration will ensure proper drainage throughout the space and prevent the deterioration of concrete that could damage library vehicles. A restoration of crumbling concrete would allow library employees a safer environment when loading and unloading supplies and materials.

The bid opening for the Buffalo Erie County Central Library Loading Dock Improvements project occurred on February 27, 2024. General Construction bids were received and opened.

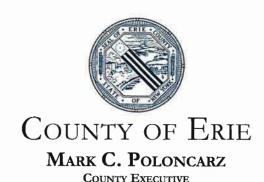

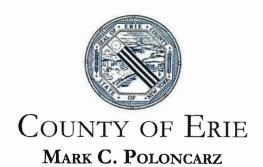

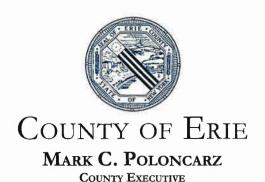

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There will be no impact on the County's General Fund. The Town of Cheektowaga would pay Erie County Sewer District No. 1 rent of \$500.00 per year plus the cost of special assessments levied on the demised premises for five (5) years.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The Town of Cheektowaga has requested to continue the lease the land surrounding the Erie County Sewer District No. 1 Overflow Retention Facility on Cayuga Creek Road for an open green space preserve.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The County of Erie/Erie County Sewer District No. 1 previously purchased approximately 55 acres of land in the Town of Cheektowaga and constructed an Overflow Retention Facility (ORF) on a small part of the property. The remainder of the land owned by the County services as a buffer. In 1995, the land surrounding the ORF was leased to the Town of Cheektowaga for the use as open green space. In 2000, additional property was added to the lease and the lease was extended. In 2014 the lease was extended again. 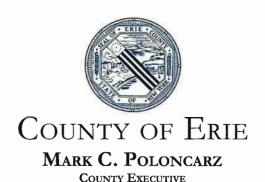

The senior management in the Division is continuously evaluating responsibilities and functions and will make recommendations when changes are possible, warranted, and beneficial. The proposed restructuring of engineering and administrative personnel ensures that the key functions of the Division are met in a manner that realizes maximum efficiency of the available workforce.

The proposed changes presented in the enclosed resolution represent the next step in this reorganization. In general, due to difficulties in retention and recruitment the Division believes it is warranted to modify its staffing plan with additional positions that align with its professional engineering track. Further changes are warranted to better support the Division's succession planning efforts. Various positions, generally administrative in nature, will be deleted or converted to other titles to further enhance effectiveness. The net effect is a decrease in the number of positions within the Division of Sewerage Management.

The timing for these potential changes is beneficial as it would be ahead of the 2025 budget discussions to be held with the Erie County Sewer District Boards of Managers in June 2024.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

The Division will not realize the expected operational efficiencies.

Required changes will be coordinated with the Personnel Department. Position additions and deletions, title changes, and job postings will be implemented over time according to Erie County policies and procedures and prevailing collective bargaining agreements.

Evergreen Health is requesting \$1.5 million in funding for their proposed new construction of a 40,000 SF 3-story health care and community support center. Erie County Department of Environment & Planning will act as lead sponsor and administer the grant if awarded, which will require a minimum 10% match from Erie County.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

A request for funding for this project will be requested within the Erie County 2025 Capital Budget. Erie County will contribute the needed 10% match for the program to facilitate this important regional capital project totaling \$150,000 (One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars).

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Evergreen Health Services provides critical services to residents throughout Erie County and by supporting the construction of this new facility, their reach will be expanded to serve more individuals. This project will also create new employment opportunities within Erie County.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Erie County Department of Environment & Planning has received notification by Empire State Development Corporation that this project is eligible for the requested funding. FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The funding sources, previously approved in the Division of Highways Capital Budgets, includes, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2021, 2022 and 2023 bonded, federal aid, and pay-as-you-go projects, as well as 2024 pay-as-you-go and consolidated bond funds listed in the attached Exhibit A, in an amount not to exceed \$49,263,422.00 will be subject to the expedited contract approval process. B.17017, B.18015, B.19008, B.19011, B.19012, B.21152, B.22002, B.22003, B.22004, B.22006, B.22050, B.23002, B.23009, B.23010, B.23050, B.23054, B.24001, B.24002, B.24012, B.24050

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Every effort should be made to expedite highway rehabilitation projects to take advantage of the favorable weather to improve the condition of roads and bridges. In previous years and 2023 your Honorable Body approved of this expedited pre-approved contract process.

The process will begin with the Department of Public Works utilizing approved bidding procedures. Starting with the advertisement and award of all 2024 highway construction projects pursuant to applicable Local and New York State public bidding laws. Contract awards will be reviewed by the Comptroller's Office to verify that the source of funds allows for the expedited pre-approved contract process. Contracts will then be forwarded to the County Executive for signature. The Comptroller's Office will issue vendor payments upon completion and approval of the appropriate invoices and backup documentation by DPW.

The summer construction season in Western New York has a relatively small window of opportunity. The Department of Public Works' goal is to improve as many roads and bridges as possible during that time and keep the public safe. Granting pre-approval of contracts to begin work, after following all proper bidding procedures starting with the advertisement and award of all 2024 highway construction projects pursuant to applicable Local and New York State public bidding laws will help expedite the commencement of construction.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Highway rehabilitation and reconstruction projects will be delayed, and work will commence later

than desired. In addition, opportunities to take advantage of lower pricing by contractors will be lost.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Upon approval of this resolution, the County Executive will be authorized to commence the 2024 Public Works construction, construction engineering services, design, and testing projects. The County Executive shall execute 2024 construction contracts to the lowest responsible bidders, as well as the design and testing contracts to firms designated by the Commissioner of Public Works. The Comptroller's Office shall then appropriate and release payments as necessary for the projects.

WHEREAS, the County of Erie desires to advance the Construction phase of Federal Aid Projects by making a commitment for the Federal and non-Federal share of the costs of the project and execute New York State and local fed aid agreements to obtain Federal and State reimbursement funds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature hereby pre-authorizes the County Executive or Deputy County Executive to enter in to contracts for 2024 highway division construction, construction engineering services, design, and testing contracts as designated by the Commissioner of Public Works for projects listed in Exhibit A and any other necessary projects added to the 2024 road list by the Commissioner of Public Works; and be it further

RESOLVED, that pre-approval is contingent upon the advertisement and award of all 2024 highway construction projects pursuant to applicable Local and New York State public bidding laws; and be it further

Date: May 3, 2024

Summary of Recommended Action

The attached resolution requests authorization for the County of Erie to enter into contract and receive funding in the amount of \$125,000.00 from the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services to be allocated to the Special Operations Division of the Erie County Sheriff's Office.

Fiscal Implications of Proposal

No impact on County Tax Dollars. Funds will provide for specialized training and equipment to enhance the explosive device operational capabilities of the Erie County Sheriff's Office Bomb Squad.

Reasons for Recommendation

Erie County must remain committed to Homeland Security and continue to protect the residents of New York State from terrorist attacks. Use of these funds will allow the Sheriff's Office to maintain a professionally trained and equipped bomb squad. The equipment purchased will further enhance the explosive device response capabilities of the unit.

Consequence of Negative Action

The County will forfeit \$125,000.00 in funding that would allow the Sheriff's Office to purchase specialized equipment that it otherwise would be unable to obtain and to receive the advanced training required to remain certified bomb technicians. This equipment and training are vital to the protection of Erie County residents from terrorist attacks involving explosive devices.

Certified copies of this resolution will be forwarded to the County Executive, the County Attorney, the Division of Budget and Management, the Erie County Comptroller's Office and the Erie County Sheriff's Office.

WHEREAS, the US Department of Homeland Security through the NYS Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services has awarded \$125,000.00 to the Erie County Sheriff's Office in funding specifically allocated to agencies with established Bomb Squads Units; and

WHEREAS, authorization is required from the Erie County Legislature for the County Executive to enter into contract and accept \$125,000.00 in federal resources to provide funds for specialized training and equipment to protect the residents of Erie County and the State of New York from terrorist attacks involving explosive devices; and

WHEREAS, at the time of the grant application the Erie County Sheriff's Office must submit a specific list of training modules and the NYSDHSES approved consultants; and

WHEREAS, the NYSDHSES must approve the training vendors prior to the award of the grant; and

What is the Brownfield Cleanup Program?

New York's Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP) is designed to encourage private-sector cleanups of brownfields and to promote their redevelopment as a means to revitalize economically blighted communities. The BCP is an alternative to "greenfield" (land not previously developed or contaminated) development and is intended to remove some of the barriers to, and provide tax incentives for, the redevelopment of brownfields. Since its inception (2003), the BCP has catalyzed the cleanup of more than 500 contaminated sites statewide and incentivized redevelopment. There are more than 550 active sites in the BCP.

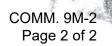

Article XXIII

Permitting, Inspection and Enforcement of Retail Tobacco Product Businesses, Retail Vapor Product Businesses and Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Businesses

General Provisions

Section

- 1.1 Introduction. There exists within the County of Erie businesses that are retail merchants of tobacco, vapor products and smoking paraphernalia. The smoking industry is a closely regulated business and vaping is a new branch of that industry, these businesses are required to follow all laws, codes and regulations within New York State, including but not limited to NYS Public Health Law Articles 13-E (Regulation of Smoking and Vaping in Certain Public Areas) and Article 13-F (Regulation of Tobacco Products, Herbal Cigarettes and Smoking Paraphernalia; Distribution to Minors). Through years of inspections it has been determined that these businesses need to be regulated at the local level to ensure compliance. Therefore, the establishment of a permit and local code is needed to keep these harmful products out of the hands of individuals under 21 years of age and to eliminate the sale of all prohibited products to the residents and visitors of Erie County.
- 1.2 **Purposes.** It is hereby declared that the purpose of this Article is to protect, preserve and promote the health and well-being of the people by minimizing and/or eliminating the exposure to second hand smoke, minimizing and or eliminating the sale of tobacco and vapor products and smoking paraphernalia to those under 21 years of age and minimizing and/or eliminating the sale of prohibited tobacco and vapor products.
- 1.3 Title. This article shall be known and cited as the Erie County Sanitary Code Article XXIII.
- 1.4 Application and Scope.
 - (a) **Application.** The requirements of this article shall:
 - (1) When adopted by the appropriate local authority, apply within Erie County.
 - (2) Apply to all Retail Tobacco Product Businesses, Retail Vapor Product Businesses and/or Smoking Paraphernalia Businesses. (including any wholesale activities taking place within the same building)
 - (3) The Erie County Commissioner of Health may direct enforcement of this article on any Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Business

and/or Smoking Paraphernalia Business that poses a danger or hazard to public health and safety.

(b) Scope.

- (1) It is intended that the application of the provisions of this Article be consistent with the provisions of all Federal, State and local laws, codes, rules and regulations: provided, however, that where the provisions of this Article are more restrictive, they shall govern, and where the provisions of such applicable Federal, State, or local laws, codes, rules and regulations are more restrictive, they shall govern.
- (2) If any provisions of this Article are held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions which shall be given effect without the invalid provision.

1.5 Definitions

- (a) ADULT ONLY ESTABLISHMENT means a retail business where the operator ensures or has a reasonable basis to believe (by checking the identification) that no person under the age of 21 years old is permitted entrance.
- (b) APPLICANT means a person seeking a Tobacco, Vapor or Smoking Paraphernalia Retail Permit.
- (c) DEPARTMENT means the Erie County Department of Health (ECDOH).
- (d) ELECTRONIC CIGARETTE or E-CIGARETTE means an electronic device that delivers vapor which is inhaled by an individual user, and shall include any refill, cartridge and any other component of such device.
- (e) LEGAL AGE means a person that is 21 years of age or older.
- (f) PERSON means an individual, firm, company, corporation, partnership, sole proprietor, limited partnership or association.
- (g) PROHIBITED PRODUCT means any tobacco or vapor product defined in Federal regulations, New York State Public Health Law Article 13-F or any local law or code as prohibited for sale.
- (h) RENEWED RETAIL TOBACCO PRODUCT BUSINESS PERMIT means a Retail Tobacco Product Business Permit issued to an Applicant for the same location at which the Applicant possessed a valid Retail Tobacco Product Business Permit during the previous year.

- (i) RENEWED SMOKING PARAPHERNALIA PRODUCT BUSINESS means a Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business Permit issued to an Applicant for the same location at which the Applicant possessed a valid Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business Permit during the previous year.
- (j) RENEWED RETAIL VAPOR PRODUCT BUSINESS PERMIT means a Retail Vapor Product Business Permit issued to an Applicant for the same location at which the Applicant possessed a valid Retail Vapor Product Business Permit during the previous year.
- (k) RETAIL SMOKING PARAPHERNALIA BUSINESS means a sole proprietorship, Limited Liability Company, corporation, partnership or other enterprise in which the retail sale any pipe, hookah, rolling papers, electronic cigarette, vaporizer or any other device, equipment or apparatus designed for the inhalation of tobacco, nicotine or cannabis occurs within the business.
- (I) RETAIL TOBACCO PRODUCT BUSINESS means a sole proprietorship, limited liability company, corporation, partnership or other enterprise in which the retail sale of tobacco products occurs within the business.
- (m) RETAIL VAPOR PRODUCT BUSINESS means a sole proprietorship, limited liability company, corporation, partnership or other enterprise in which the retail sale of vapor products and accessories occurs within the business.
- (n) SCHOOL means any public or private school (pre-school, nursery school, elementary school or secondary school) as defined by New York State Education Department and/or New York State Public Health Law Article 13-F and/or New York State Public Health Law Article 13-E
- (o) SCHOOL GROUNDS mean any building, structure, and surrounding outdoor grounds contained within a public or private pre-school, nursery school, elementary school or secondary school's legally defined property boundaries as registered in a County Clerk's office, and any vehicles used to transport children or school personnel.
- (p) SMOKING means the burning of a lighted cigarette, cigar, pipe or any other matter or substance which contains tobacco or cannabis as defined in section 222.00 of the penal law, or cannabinoid hemp as defined in section three of the cannabis law.
- (q) SMOKING PARAPHERNALIA means any pipe, hookah, rolling papers, electronic cigarette, vaporizer or any other device, equipment or apparatus designed for the inhalation of tobacco, nicotine or cannabis.
- (r) SMOKING PARAPHERNALIA RETAILER means a person possessing a Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Permit from the Department to sell Smoking Paraphernalia.

- (s) TOBACCO BUSINESS means a sole proprietorship, limited liability company, corporation, partnership or other enterprise in which the primary activity is the sale, manufacture or promotion of tobacco, tobacco products and accessories, either wholesale or retail, and in which the sale, manufacture or promotion of other products is merely incidental.
- (t) TOBACCO PRODUCT means one or more cigarettes or cigars, bidis, chewing tobacco, powdered tobacco, nicotine water or any other tobacco products.
- (u) TOBACCO PRODUCT RETAILER means a person possessing a Retail Tobacco Permit from the Department to sell Tobacco Products.
- (v) VAPING means the use of an electronic cigarette.
- (w) VAPOR PRODUCT means any non-combustible liquid or gel, regardless of the presence of nicotine therein, that is manufactured into a finished product for use in an electronic cigarette, including any device that contains such non-combustible liquid or gel.
- (x) VAPOR PRODUCT RETAILER means a person possessing a Retail Vapor Product Permit from the Department to sell Vapor Products.

1.6 **Inspection**

- (1) The Erie County Commissioner of Health or their designated representative may without hindrance or fee, make inspections to determine compliance with the provisions of this Article and NYS Public Health Law Article 13-E and/or Article 13-F.
- (2) For purpose of making such inspections, the Department is hereby authorized to enter, examine and survey all retail/wholesale areas of the business, all storage areas of the business and any office areas of the business. Except for emergencies, or where authorized by other law such inspections shall be made during the operating hours of the business.
- (3) The owner and/or the operator shall give the Erie County Commissioner of Health or their designated representative access to the retail areas, storage areas and/or office areas of the business, or parts thereof for the purpose of such an inspection.

2.0 Retail Tobacco Product Business, Vapor Product Businesses and Smoking Paraphernalia Business: Permit to Operate

- (a) No person shall operate a Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Business and/or Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business or cause or allow the same to be operated, without a permit from the Department.
- (b) Application for a permit shall be made on a form specified by the Department, by the person to the Department at least 30 business days prior to initial operation, the expiration of an existing permit or upon any change in name, ownership or person.
- (c) The Department shall issue a permit if the Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Business and/or Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business conforms or will conform at the time of operation to the requirements of this Article and will not present a danger to the health and safety of the employees and the general public. An applicant's past history of compliance or non-compliance will be a consideration in evaluating the previously mentioned criteria.
- (d) A permit may be denied, revoked or suspended by the Department if the Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Business and/or Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business is maintained or operated in violation of the New York State Public Health Law, this Article or other applicable laws, rules or codes. Before denial, suspension or revocation of a permit or after receipt of a notice of violation, the person shall have the right to an office conference to appeal the decision to the Department, except when a public health hazard exists, a permit may be temporarily suspended pending a hearing. A permit will also be revoked upon request of the person or upon abandonment of the operation. Following the revocation, an application shall be filed for a new permit and a satisfactory inspection be performed before resumption of operation.
- (e) A permit for a Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Business and/or Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business shall be issued for a period of not more than one (1) year from the date of issuance. A permit shall not be transferrable or assignable and shall expire upon a change of the person of the Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Business and/or Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business or upon the date specified by the Department.
- (f) The permit requires that at least one employee be currently certified as taken the NYS Tobacco Sales Training Program administered by a New York State Department Of Health approved entity during all operating hours. Proof of certification MUST be kept on site or with the certified individual and must be presented to the Department when

requested. Failure to have a certified individual present during operating hours will result in immediate closure of the establishment until such time a certified individual is available and present at the establishment. Noncompliance will be considered a violation of this Article.

- (g) The Department shall be allowed entry, as specified in Section 1.6 of this Article, for the purpose of inspection.
- (h) The permit issued for the operation of a Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Business and/or Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business shall be posted in a conspicuous place in public view.
- (i) The Department may establish procedures for the exchange of information with other State and local governmental agencies having responsibilities for making health and safety inspections of buildings, including Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Business and/or Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business as defined in this Article, and/or Federal, State, County or Local Law enforcement agencies and may utilize the information provided by any such agency in making a determination regarding the issuance, denial or revocation of a permit required by this article.

2.1 Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Businesses and Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business: Permit Fee

(a) A fee, established by the Erie County Legislature, per permit year shall be submitted with the application/re-application for any Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Businesses and/or Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business. A permit fee shall be required for each business type.

3.0 **Enforcement**

- (a) Permits and Placarding
 - (1) The Department shall order any facility operating without a permit as required in Section 2.0 to close, and remain closed until a valid permit for operation of the business is obtained.
 - (2) The enforcement procedures delineated in the NYS Public Health Law, the Erie County Sanitary Code or otherwise provided by law shall be used as applicable. Where a public health hazard, as determined by the Commissioner of Health, is found, the Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Business and/or Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business shall be placarded to prohibit operation until the public health hazard is corrected, in order to protect

public health and safety. When a placard is used, it shall be conspicuously posted at each entrance of the Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Business and/or Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business. The placard shall state the authority for its placement and indicate that concealment, mutilation, alteration or removal of it by any person without permission of the Department shall constitute a violation of the Erie County Sanitary Code and NYS Public Health Law.

- (3) As soon as possible, but no more than 15 business days after placarding the Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Business and/or Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business, the person shall be provided with an opportunity to be heard and present evidence that continued operation of the business does not constitute a danger to the public.
- (4) The Department shall inspect the Retail Tobacco Product Business, Retail Vapor Product Business and/or Retail Smoking Paraphernalia Business within two business days of the notification that the hazard has been eliminated. The placards will be removed after the Department verifies that the hazard has been eliminated.
- (5) For serious, repeated or persistent violations of the requirements of this Article, or for interference with the Commissioner of Health or their designated representative in the performance of their duties, the permit may be revoked after notice and an opportunity for a hearing has been provided.

(b) Public Health Hazards

For purposes of this Article, any of the following are public health hazards which require immediate correction or remedial action and which require the Department to order immediate correction or to immediately institute action as provided in Section 3.0 (a) of this article.

- (1) the offering for sale and/or sale of any prohibited product
- (2) the sale of any age restricted product to an individual under the age of 21 years
- (3) the denial of access for inspection according to Section 1.6 of this article
- (4) the failure to provide proof of a valid registration/license/permit from any required Federal, State or Local Agency

(5) any other condition the Commissioner of Health deems a public health hazard

(c) Violations

- (1) Evidence of a violation of this Article discovered during such inspection shall not be used against the violator in either a criminal or civil proceeding except under the following conditions:
 - (i) Written notice of said violation shall be left with or mailed to the business and/or person responsible for correction of such violation or in the alternative, such notice shall be posted in a conspicuous place upon the structures, equipment, exterior property, premises or parts thereof where the violation is discovered.

(d) Fines and Surcharge

(1) Fines

(i) In addition to any other applicable penalty provided for by law, the Commissioner of Health may impose a civil penalty for a violation of this article in an amount not to exceed that set forth in NYS Public Health Law Article 13-E and /or Article 13-F, or as stated in the Erie County Sanitary Code. The fine for offering or selling a prohibited flavored vapor product, first offense, shall be no less than \$100 for each product offered or sold, a second and subsequent offense shall have a fine of not less than \$250-\$1000 for each product offered or sold.

(2) Surcharge

(i) The Department will assess, in addition to the NYS surcharge, a surcharge of \$200 for every violation, to be used to conduct inspections or provide education on this Article and NYS Public Health Law Articles 13-E and 13-F.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Erie County Industrial Development Agency (ECIDA), a business-type activity, as of and for the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise ECIDA's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of ECIDA as of December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the changes in its financial position and cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

Basis For Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of ECIDA, and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with GAAP, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about ECIDA's ability to continue as a going concern for one year beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS and Government Auditing Standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or
 error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include
 examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that
 are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the
 effectiveness of ECIDA's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting
 estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that
 raise substantial doubt about ECIDA's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of
 time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Required Supplementary Information

GAAP requires that management's discussion and analysis be presented to supplement the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with GAAS, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements that collectively comprise ECIDA's basic financial statements. The accompanying supplementary information as listed in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. In our opinion, the accompanying supplementary information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Nonaccounting Information

Management's Discussion and Analysis (unaudited)

December 31, 2023

Erie County Industrial Development Agency (ECIDA) is a public benefit corporation that provides tax incentives, financing programs, international trade assistance, land development, and other economic development services to the City of Buffalo (the City) and Erie County, New York (the County). In accomplishing its mission, ECIDA does not receive any operational funding from Federal, State, County, or local sources. Instead, ECIDA relies primarily upon administrative fees charged to those businesses that utilize its products and services.

As a public benefit corporation, ECIDA is required to comply with accounting standards issued by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). Under GASB Statement No. 34, Basic Financial Statements - Management's Discussion and Analysis - for State and Local Governments, ECIDA is required to present management's discussion and analysis (MD&A) to assist readers in understanding ECIDA's financial performance.

In compliance with GASB Statement No. 34, we present the attached overview and analysis of the financial activities of ECIDA as of and for the years ended December 31, 2023, 2022, and 2021. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with ECIDA's audited financial statements.

Basic Overview of the Financial Statements

Included in this report are the following financial statements:

- 1) Balance Sheets The balance sheets show the reader what ECIDA owns (assets and deferred outflows of resources) and what ECIDA owes (liabilities and deferred inflows of resources). ECIDA's assets and deferred outflows of resources less liabilities and deferred inflows of resources (net position) can be one way to measure ECIDA's financial position. Over time, increases or decreases in ECIDA's net position are an indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating.
- 2) Statements of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position This statement reports ECIDA's operating and nonoperating revenues by major source along with operating and nonoperating expenses. The difference between total revenues and expenses can be one way to measure ECIDA's operating results for the year.
- 3) Statements of Cash Flows This statement reports ECIDA's cash flows from operating, capital and related financing, and investing activities.

Financial Highlights

- ECIDA's net position decreased by 2% from \$20,638,000 in 2022 to \$20,140,000 in 2023.
- ECIDA experienced a decrease in net position of \$498,000 in 2023 compared to \$228,000 in 2022.
- Administrative fees, a key source of revenue for ECIDA, increased 6% from \$1,656,000 in 2022 to \$1,750,000 in 2023.
- Operating expenses increased 4% from \$2,946,000 in 2022 to \$3,077,000 in 2023.

Receivables and other assets include grants receivable, affiliate receivables, leases receivable, prepaid expenses, and venture capital investments. The increase of \$8,767,000 is the result of significant increases in grants receivable and affiliate receivables. ECIDA was awarded three new grants totaling \$4,420,000 in 2023. Affiliate receivables increased from \$644,000 to \$4,869,000 due to funds borrowed by the Buffalo & Erie County Industrial Land Development Corporation (ILDC) for development costs that will be reimbursed through grant agreements. The decrease from 2021 to 2022 was the result of cash received from grant agreements, building leases, and affiliates.

Restricted cash consists primarily of funds held on behalf of others including the Erie County Regional Redevelopment Fund, Buffalo Brownfields Redevelopment Fund, and PILOT Increment Financing (PIF) funds. The \$253,000 or 3% increase from 2022 is primarily due to PILOT and PIF receipts of \$1,836,000 and interest of \$223,000 exceeding required disbursements to municipalities of \$662,000 and eligible project funds of \$1,199,000. Restricted cash also includes \$261,000 for the Railway Trust Fund, which increased \$54,000 from 2022. The \$654,000, or 7%, increase in 2022 over 2021 was due to receipts in excess of required disbursements to municipalities.

The \$4,783,000 increase in other liabilities is due to increases in unearned revenue of \$4,121,000, lease payable of \$395,000, and accounts payable of \$268,000. Unearned revenue is offset by grants receivable and is recognized as special project revenue as eligible activities are performed. ECIDA's office space lease expired during 2023 and a new lease is in effect through July 2027. The lease payable is the present value of lease payments through the end of the lease. The decrease from 2021 to 2022 was due to decreases in accounts payable, unearned revenue, and leases payable.

ECIDA has capitalized the present value of future lease receipts as a lease receivable and deferred inflow of resources. The lease receivable is reduced as cash is received and the deferred inflow of resources is recognized as rental income over the term of the lease contract. The \$181,000 or 28% increase in deferred inflows of resources related to leases is due to a new lease agreement signed in 2023 to extend Buffalo Urban Development Corporation's sublease for a portion of ECIDA's office lease through July 2027.

Revenue Analysis

Administrative fees are primarily collected from the issuance of various forms of tax abatements and tax-exempt financing. Fees for tax abatement are based on the amount of project investment. ECIDA relies on these fees to cover its operating costs; however, the amount of fees collected in any given year is largely dependent upon the local economic climate and the timing between project approval and project commencement. Administrative fees increased \$94,000 or 6% in 2023 primarily due to an increase in the value of induced projects. Administrative fees were collected related to 22 different projects in 2023, down from 25 in 2022. In 2021, administrative fees were collected related to 31 projects.

Affiliate management fees represent salaries and overhead costs charged to ECIDA affiliates for services that ECIDA's employees provide to these organizations. ECIDA's affiliates include Buffalo & Erie County Regional Development Corporation (RDC), a lending corporation, and ILDC, a land development corporation. Affiliate management fees decreased \$179,000 in 2023 due to a decrease in chargeable hours.

Rental and other income is primarily comprised of rental income for building leases and rental income from the Port Terminal Facility.

Expense Analysis

Salaries and benefits increased \$36,000, or 2%, in 2023 due to employee raises and a new employee hired in December 2023. In 2022, salaries and benefits increased \$94,000 from 2021 due to employee raises and performance incentives.

General and administrative expenses increased \$107,000 from \$687,000 in 2022 to \$794,000 in 2023 primarily due to refunds of \$176,000 for previously recognized administrative fee revenue. The final project budget or incentive package was below initial estimates and the fee due to ECIDA was reduced accordingly. In 2022, general and administrative expenses increased \$123,000 primarily due to an \$89,000 refund for previously recognized administrative fee revenue.

Net special project grants decreased from net income of \$70,000 in 2022 to a net loss of \$337,000 in 2023. In 2023, grant expenses exceeded grant revenues due to carrying costs related to ILDC properties of \$210,000 and other grants from the Agency's Urban Development Action Grant (UDAG) fund. In 2022, grant revenues mostly equaled grant expenses as ECIDA passed through Erie County funds of \$385,000 to ILDC and \$198,000 of CARES Act funds to RDC.

Net nonoperating revenue increased \$316,000 in 2023 due to higher interest income earned on ECIDA's deposit accounts. Interest income of \$412,000 was offset by \$8,000 of interest expense related to ECIDA's office lease. In 2022, net nonoperating revenue increased \$48,000.

Budget Analysis

ECIDA prepares an annual budget which was presented and approved by the Board of Directors on October 26, 2022. The following table presents an analysis of ECIDA's performance compared to the approved 2023 budget.

Budget to Actual Analysis

Overall, ECIDA's decrease in net position for 2023 was below the budgeted decrease by \$439,000. Administrative fees were 3% less than the budgeted amount due mainly to timing of tax incentive project closings. Total operating expenses were \$118,000 over budget mostly due to administrative fee refunds discussed previously. Net special project grants had a positive variance of \$451,000. Nonoperating revenue includes interest income on cash deposits and was \$398,000 greater than expected.

Economic Factors Impacting ECIDA

ECIDA relies extensively upon administrative fees to generate the majority of its annual revenue. As a result of current uncertain economic conditions and potential legislative/board actions, ECIDA's ability to generate the administrative fees necessary to support operations may be limited in the future.

Notes to Financial Statements

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

Nature of Organization

Erie County Industrial Development Agency (ECIDA) was created in 1970 by an act of the Legislature of the State of New York (the State) for the purpose of encouraging financially sound companies to establish themselves and prosper in Erie County (the County).

ECIDA has related party relationships with Buffalo and Erie County Industrial Land Development Corporation (ILDC) and Buffalo and Erie County Regional Development Corporation (RDC). All three entities are managed by the same personnel and RDC currently shares a common board with ECIDA. These entities share the same mission, which is to provide the resources that encourage investment, innovation, workforce development, and international trade resulting in a successful business climate focused on growth, economic stability, job creation, and job retention for businesses and individuals which improves the quality of life for the residents of the region.

Basis of Presentation

The financial statements of ECIDA have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles.

Financial Reporting Entity

In evaluating how to define ECIDA for financial reporting purposes, management has considered all potential component units. The decision to include a potential component unit in ECIDA's reporting entity is based on accounting standards which consider legal standing, fiscal dependency, and financial accountability. Based on the application of these criteria, there are no additional entities included in ECIDA's financial statements.

Measurement Focus

ECIDA reports as a special-purpose government engaged in business-type activities. Business-type activities are those that are financed in whole or in part by fees charged to external parties for goods or services. ECIDA's financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred.

ECIDA's policy for defining operating activities in the statements of revenues, expenses, and changes in net position are those that generally result from exchange transactions such as payments received for services and payments made to purchase those goods or services. Certain other transactions are reported as nonoperating activities and include interest income, interest expense, and grants resulting from nonexchange transactions. Grants are recognized as receivable and unearned revenue at the time awarded and as revenue when all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been satisfied. ECIDA receives special project grants from various Federal, State, and County sources.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash

Cash management is governed by State laws and as established by ECIDA's written policies. Cash resources must be deposited in FDIC-insured commercial banks or trust companies located within the State. Policies permit management to use demand accounts and certificates of deposit for daily operating funds. Investments are limited to obligations of the United States Treasury and its Agencies, repurchase agreements, and obligations of the State or its localities.

Collateral is required for demand and time deposits and certificates of deposit not covered by Federal Deposit Insurance. Obligations that may be pledged as collateral include obligations of the United States and its agencies and obligations of the State and its municipalities and school districts.

Custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of a bank failure, ECIDA's deposits may not be returned to it. At December 31, 2023 and 2022, ECIDA's bank deposits were fully collateralized by FDIC coverage and securities held by the pledging institution's agent in ECIDA's name.

Loans Receivable

Loans receivable are stated at the principal amount outstanding, net of an allowance for uncollectible loans. The allowance method is used to compute the provision for uncollectible loans.

Determination of the balance of the allowance for uncollectible loans is based on an analysis of the loan portfolio and reflects an amount that, in management's judgment, is adequate to provide for potential loan losses. Loans are written off when, in management's judgment, no legal recourse is available to collect the amount owed.

ECIDA previously provided a loan to a manufacturing company that would be forgiven as the company met certain criteria. At December 31, 2023 and 2022, the entire loan is reserved with \$100,000 installments forgiven annually through 2026 as the borrower satisfies the loan requirements.

Capital Assets

Capital assets are recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided over estimated useful lives using the straight-line method. Maintenance and repairs are expensed as incurred; significant improvements are capitalized.

Rental Property:

In 1989, ECIDA developed a public warehouse and transshipment facility (the Port Terminal Facility) at the Gateway Metroport facility in the City of Lackawanna. The Port Terminal Facility provides enclosed storage facilities and materials handling services for the trans-shipment of goods by water, rail, and truck. The facility is owned by ECIDA and is operated by Gateway Trade Center, Inc. Port Terminal Facility rental property assets are fully depreciated. ECIDA receives a percentage of annual Excess Cash Flow, as defined, from the operations at the Port Terminal Facility.

ECIDA also owns its former office space at 143 Genesee Street. This property is recorded at cost and leased to a third party (Note 7).

Other Assets

Other assets include venture capital investments made by ECIDA in order to spur local economic growth. Venture capital investments are recorded at the lesser of cost or fair market value as determined by management's estimates based on available financial information.

Net Position

Net position consists of the following components:

- Net investment in capital assets consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, reduced by outstanding balances of any related debt obligations attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.
- Restricted consists of restricted assets reduced by related liabilities. Restrictions are imposed by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Urban Development Action Grant (UDAG) program.
- Unrestricted the net amount of assets, deferred outflows
 of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources
 that are not included in the determination of net
 investment in capital assets or the restricted component of
 net position and therefore are available for general use by
 ECIDA.

Tax Incentive Transactions

ECIDA maintains an economic development incentive program to provide sales, property, and/or mortgage recording tax benefits for qualified construction, renovation, or expansion projects or other economic development activities within Erie County. Under this program, ECIDA may take title to or a leasehold interest in the real and/or personal property involved in the project for the term of the incentive period. ECIDA simultaneously leases the property under a lease agreement to the company undertaking the project (lessee). ECIDA receives administrative fees from the lessee for providing these tax incentives which are recognized according to the terms of the fee agreement.

ECIDA is an issuer of tax-exempt bond financing for qualified manufacturers and low-income housing projects which meet the definition of conduit debt obligations. These bonds are obligations of the borrower and secured by the assets they finance. ECIDA receives bond issuance fees from the borrower for providing this service which is recognized according to the terms of the fee agreement. ECIDA also has a shared services agreement with ILDC under which administrative and staffing services are provided to ILDC in connection with its bond issuances to nonprofit organizations in exchange for the related bond issuance fees received by ILDC. At December 31, 2023 and 2022, previously issued bonds have an aggregate outstanding balance of \$574,130,953 and \$540,645,622, none of which is recognized as a liability of ECIDA.

ECIDA received \$10,000 and \$105,000 in administrative fees from ILDC in 2023 and 2022.

2. Special Project Grants:

Bethlehem Shoreline Enhancement — ECIDA received a grant from New York State Department of State in the amount of \$122,825 in June 2020 to support the construction and administration of Shoreline Trail enhancements on the former Bethlehem Steel property.

Bethlehem Water and Sewer Design — ECIDA received a grant from Erie County in the amount of \$700,000 in July 2020 to support the design, engineering, and construction administration of water and sewer utility extensions and upgrades on the former Bethlehem Steel property.

Bethlehem Railroad Relocation — ECIDA received a grant from Erie County in the amount of \$600,000 in June 2023 to support the relocation of rail infrastructure at the former Bethlehem Steel Property.

Buffalo Southern Railroad — ECIDA received a \$1,703,553 grant from New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT) in January 2023 and a \$250,000 grant from Erie County in July 2023 to support the restoration of five bridges and seven miles of track on the Buffalo Southern Railroad.

DL&W Lancaster Industrial Track Improvement – ECIDA received a \$1,616,470 grant from NYSDOT in April 2023 and a \$250,000 grant from Erie County in September 2023 to support the restoration of the DL&W Lancaster Industrial Track.

5. Related Party Transactions:

ECIDA historically allocated a portion of personnel and rental costs to its affiliates, RDC and ILDC. In 2023, ECIDA chose to discontinue allocation of personnel and overhead costs to ILDC unless a corresponding revenue source is identified. ECIDA earned \$286,799 and \$465,692 in affiliate management fees for the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022. Management fees and receivables by affiliate are as follows:

In 2023, ECIDA provided ILDC with \$4,477,770 to temporarily finance various projects. These funds are expected to be repaid when ILDC receives reimbursement from grant sources.

In 2023 and 2022, Erie County provided \$129,000 and \$385,000, respectively, to ECIDA as a subrecipient of Community Development Block Grant funds. These funds were then transferred to ILDC for its Erie County BDF loan program. These amounts are included in special project grant revenues and expenses in the accompanying statements of revenues, expenses, and changes in net position.

6. Leases:

ECIDA, as lessee, entered into a non-cancelable lease for office space through July 31, 2027 and recognized a right-to-use lease asset at the present value of \$532,728 using a discount rate of 5%. The lease requires annual minimum payments of \$159,307 and utility charges that are determined on an annual basis. Principal and interest due in 2024 total \$136,321 and \$22,986, respectively.

ECIDA entered into a sublease agreement with Buffalo Urban Development Corporation for a portion of their office space through July 31, 2027. ECIDA recognized \$24,291 and \$23,153 in gross rental income, including interest at 5.0%, in 2023 and 2022. Annual receipts are expected to total \$21,046, plus utilities, through 2027.

ECIDA, as lessor, has entered into a non-cancelable lease for its former office through July 31, 2027. ECIDA recognized \$231,700 and \$220,386 in gross rental income, including interest at 5.0%, in 2022 and 2021. Annual receipts are expected to total \$230,856, plus utilities, through 2027.

7. Pension:

ECIDA maintains a defined contribution simplified employee pension (SEP) plan covering all of its employees. Employees are eligible to participate six months after employment, with employer contributions vesting immediately. During 2023 and 2022, ECIDA made discretionary contributions of 12% of eligible employees' salaries. ECIDA's expense for contributing to the plan for the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022 amounted to \$177,368 and \$162,663 respectively. Employees are also permitted to participate in the New York State Deferred Compensation Plan but ECIDA does not make contributions to this plan.

8. Risk Management:

ECIDA purchases commercial insurance for various risks of loss due to torts, theft, damage, injuries to employees, and natural disasters in addition to insurance purchased to indemnify directors and officers. Settled claims resulting from these risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three years.

9. Commitments and Contingencies:

Grants

ECIDA receives financial assistance from federal, state, and local agencies in the form of grants and fiduciary agreements. Managing these funds generally requires compliance with the terms and conditions specified in the agreements and may be subject to audit by the grantor agencies. Disallowed claims resulting from such audits could become a liability of ECIDA. Based on prior experience, management expects any such amounts to be immaterial.

Litigation

ECIDA is subject to claims and lawsuits that arise in the ordinary course of business. In the opinion of management, these claims and lawsuits will not have a material adverse effect upon the financial position of ECIDA.

The Board of Directors

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of Erie County Industrial Development Agency (ECIDA), a business-type activity, as of and for the year December 31, 2023, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise ECIDA's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated March 21, 2024.

Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered ECIDA's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of ECIDA's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of ECIDA's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that have not been identified.

Report on Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether ECIDA's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of ECIDA's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering ECIDA's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.
