

Recognizing the Angola Public Library's 100th Anniversary

WHEREAS, the Angola Public Library has been a cornerstone of knowledge, culture, and community engagement in the Village of Angola for the past 100 years; and

WHEREAS, the Angola Public Library's origins date back to the Angola Library Association, formed prior to 1880, with its first collection of books housed in a jewelry store at the corner of Main and Lake Streets; and

WHEREAS, the growth of the library was driven by passionate community members, including the Lotus Club, a group of women who helped develop a lending system that eventually led to the formation of the Angola Book Club; and

WHEREAS, in 1921, the Village of Angola provided a dedicated room in the Village Hall for the library, which by then housed over 1,500 volumes and circulated nearly 9,900 books per year, serving as a beacon of knowledge for residents; and

WHEREAS, in 1925, the library was granted a provisional charter by the State of New York, formally establishing the **Angola Public Library**, and in 1950, an absolute charter was granted, securing its place as a public institution dedicated to the community; and

WHEREAS, the Angola Public Library has evolved over the decades, with key milestones such as joining the Buffalo and Erie County Public Library System in 1947, moving to the Old Town Hall in 1949, and eventually relocating to its current home at 34 N. Main Street in 1971; and

WHEREAS, the Angola Public Library underwent significant growth and improvements, including the addition of an 1,100 square foot expansion in 1996, and transitioning to a computerized system in 1992, which enhanced its ability to serve the growing needs of the residents of Angola, Evans, Brant, Farnham; and



LL INTRO. 2-1 (2024)

LOCAL LAW TO BE ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE IN THE COUNTY OF ERIE LOCAL LAW INTRO. – NO. __2-1___ - 2024 LOCAL LAW – NO. _____ - 2024

A LOCAL LAW requiring transparent, searchable databases for expenditures accessible and available to the public.

SECTION 1. Title

This law shall be entitled and known as "The Tax Dollar Disclosure Act."

SECTION 2. Legislative Intent

The Erie County Legislature recognizes that taxpayers should have easy access to details on how the county is spending their tax dollars and what performance results are achieved for those expenditures. It is the intent of the Legislature, therefore, to direct the Erie County Comptroller to create and maintain a searchable budget database website detailing where, for what purpose, and what results are achieved for all taxpayer investments in county government.

SECTION 3. Definitions

AGENCY

A county department, division, office, bureau, board, commission, committee, or unit. This includes individual county agencies and programs, as well as those programs and activities that cross agency lines. "County agency" includes all elective offices in Erie County government.

AUDIT OR REPORT

Shall include any audit or report issued by the state, county, legislature, legislative committee, comptroller or executive body relating to the entity or recipient of funds or the budget program/activity or agency.

COMPTROLLER

The Erie County Comptroller.

ENTITY/AND OR RECIPIENTS

- A. a corporation,
- B. an association,

- C. a union,
- D. a limited liability company,
- E. a limited liability partnership,
- F. any other legal business entity including non-profits,
- G. grantees,
- H. contractors, and
- I. a county, city, or other local government entity.
- J. "Entity/and or recipients" does not include an individual recipient of public assistance.

FUNDING SOURCE

The account from which the expenditure is appropriated, inclusive of all budgeted accounts.

FUNDING ACTION OR EXPENDITURE

Shall include details on the type of spending (grant, contract, appropriations, etc.). This includes tax exemptions or credits. Where possible, a hyperlink to the actual expenditure document (in a format that is, at a minimum, as searchable as a searchable PDF format) shall be provided.

LEGISLATURE

The Erie County Legislature.

SEARCHABLE BUDGET DATABASE WEBSITE

A website that allows the public, at no cost, to:

- A. Search and aggregate information for the following:
 - 1. the name and principal location or residence of the entity/and or recipients of funds,
 - 2. the amount of funds expended,
 - 3. the funding or expending agency,
 - 4. the funding source of the revenue expended,
 - 5. the budget program/activity of the expenditure,

- 6. a descriptive purpose for the funding action or expenditure,
- 7. the expected performance outcome for the funding action or expenditure,
- 8. the past performance outcomes achieved for the funding action or expenditure,
- 9. any audit or report relating to the entity or recipient of funds or the budget program/activity or agency,
- 10. and any other relevant information specified by the Comptroller.
- B. Programmatically search and access all data in a serialized machine-readable format (such as XML) via a web-services application programming interface.

SECTION 4. Searchable Budget Database Website Created

By October 1, 2024, the Comptroller shall develop and make publicly available a single, searchable budget database website including the required data for the most recent county budget. The website shall be given a unique and simplified website address. Each county agency that maintains a generally accessible Internet site or for which a generally accessible Internet site is maintained shall include a link on the front page of the agency's Internet site to the budget database website.

SECTION 5. Updates

The Comptroller shall provide guidance to agency heads to ensure compliance with this section. The searchable budget database website shall be updated as new data becomes available, if feasible, but no later than 30 days upon receipt of data from the agency.

The Comptroller shall ensure that all data added to the searchable budget database website remains accessible to the public for a minimum of six years.

SECTION 6. Compliance with the Act

The Comptroller shall not be considered in compliance with this act if the data required for the searchable budget database website is not available in a searchable and aggregate manner and/or the public is redirected to other government websites, unless each of those sites has information from all agencies and each category of information required can be searched electronically by field in a single search.

SECTION 7. Severability

If any part or provision of this chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision or application directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remainder of this chapter or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances. The County of Erie hereby declares that it would have passed this chapter or the remainder thereof had such invalid application or invalid provision been apparent.

SECTION 8. Repealer

All ordinances, local laws, and parts thereof inconsistent with this chapter are hereby repealed; provided, however, that such repeal shall not affect or impair any act done or right accruing, accrued, or acquired, or penalty, charge, liability, forfeiture, or punishment incurred or owing prior to the time such repeal takes effect, but the same may be enjoyed, asserted, collected, enforced, prosecuted, or inflicted as fully and to the same extent as if such repeal had not been effected. All actions and proceedings, civil or criminal, commenced under or by virtue of any provision of any County of Erie local law, ordinance or resolution so repealed, and pending immediately prior to the taking effect of such repeal, may be prosecuted and defended to final effect in the same manner as they might if such provisions were not so repealed.

SECTION 9. Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect on October 1, 2024.

LOCAL LAW TO BE ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE IN THE COUNTY OF ERIE LOCAL LAW INTRO. – NO. _______ - 2024 LOCAL LAW – NO. ______ - 2024

A LOCAL LAW requiring meetings of Erie County Boards and Advisory Committees to provide access to information to the public.

SECTION 1. Title

This law shall be entitled and known as "The Meetings Transparency Act."

SECTION 2. Legislative Intent

The Erie County Legislature recognizes that taxpayers should have easy access to details discussed and acted upon at public meetings. The Erie County Legislature prepares an agenda which it posts prior to session, streams and has available for replay video of the meeting and posts the minutes of meeting for review. Readily available technology should be used to increase access to similar discussions and actions of commissions and boards.

SECTION 3. Definitions

BOARD

Any government board, commission, council, committee, advisory committee, panel or similar group that is created pursuant to the Erie County Charter, Code or Local Law.

SECTION 4. Meeting Minutes

Boards shall keep written minutes summarizing all official actions, discussions, public comments, and votes taken at each meeting.

Draft minutes shall be made available to the public within 10 business days after each meeting.

Minutes shall be officially approved at the board's next public meeting and a final version posted publicly online within 5 business days after approval. The minutes also must be submitted to the Clerk of the Legislature to be included in the official record.

SECTION 5. Notice and Agendas

Boards shall give public notice at least 7 calendar days prior to any regular meeting by prominently posting the date, time, location, and agenda on the general Erie County website, as well as the website of the Erie County Legislature.

For special or emergency meetings, notice should be provided as soon as is practicable.

Meeting agendas shall include a list of topics to be discussed, a list of invited speakers, and indicate if any votes or official actions are anticipated.

SECTION 6. Broadcast and Recording of Meetings

To the extent feasible, boards should also provide a live stream of meetings for public viewing. Erie County is required to make appropriate accommodation for each board to make this possible. If a live stream is not possible, meetings should at minimum be video recorded and the recording should be posted on the general Erie County website.

SECTION 7. Public Access to Records

Boards shall maintain information to be posted on Erie County's website providing access to board member information, past meeting minutes, agendas, recordings, reports, resolutions, and other official documents.

Upon public request, boards shall provide copies or electronic access to such records in a timely manner as allowable by public records laws.

SECTION 8. Public Comment

Boards should provide reasonable opportunities for public comment at each meeting.

Any restrictions on public comment shall be viewpoint-neutral and clearly stated in the board's policies.

SECTION 9. Compliance

Originating governmental bodies shall establish procedures to monitor and ensure compliance with this law.

SECTION 10. Severability

If any part or provision of this chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision or application directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remainder of this chapter or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances. The County of Erie hereby declares that it would have passed this chapter or the remainder thereof had such invalid application or invalid provision been apparent.

SECTION 11. Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect on September 1, 2024.

COUNTY OF ERIE

LOCAL LAW INTRO. NO. 5-2-2024

LOCAL LAW NO. -2024

A Local Law amending Local Law 1-1959, constituting the Erie County Charter, as amended, in relation to the amending of Section 202.2 for the purpose of setting the terms of legislative office to four (4) years and limiting the number of terms for that can be held to three (3) four-year terms for all elected officials.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT

The intent of this legislation is to amend the terms of office for the Erie County of Legislature to a term of four (4) years and to limit the number of terms for all elected officials that can be served to three (3) four-year terms.

Section 2. CHANGING THE TERM OF LEGISLATIVE OFFICE AND LIMITING THE NUMBER OF TERMS FOR ALL ELECTED OFFICIALS

Erie County Local Law number one of nineteen hundred fifty-nine, as amended, constituting the Erie County Charter, is hereby amended as follows:

Article 2, Section 202.2. Election and terms of office. County legislators shall first be elected at the general election in the year nineteen hundred sixty-seven and shall assume office on January first, nineteen hundred sixty-eight. All elected County legislators shall hold their respective offices for a term of two years: provided, that legislators elected in the year two thousand twenty-six and in subsequent years shall hold their offices for four years. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County legislator if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof.

Article 3, Section 301. The County Executive; election; term; qualifications. The executive branch of County government shall be administered by the County Executive who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election and shall be for four years, except that the term of the County Executive elected in nineteen hundred sixty shall be for three years. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County Executive if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or

her office and shall hold no other public office, except as provided in section three hundred seven hereof.

Article 18, Section 1801. Election; Comptroller's Act repealed. There shall be a County Comptroller who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election and shall be for four years. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County Comptroller if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office. The Erie County Comptroller's Act, being chapter four hundred twenty three of the laws of nineteen hundred thirty-nine as amended, is hereby repealed, as of January first, nineteen hundred sixty-one.

Article 19, Section 1901. Election. There shall be a County Clerk who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election, and shall be for four years except as otherwise provided in this Charter. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County Clerk if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office.

Article 20, Section 2001. Election. There shall be a District Attorney who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election, and shall be for four years except as otherwise provided in this Charter. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as District Attorney if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office.

Article 21, Section 2101. Election. There shall be a Sheriff who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election and shall be for four years except as otherwise provided in this Charter. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as Sheriff if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of

the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office.

Section 3. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Local Law shall take effect the first day of the first fiscal year after receiving an affirmative vote of a majority of the qualified electors of the County of Erie in a manner consistent with the provisions of New York State Municipal Home Rule Law Article 3 and upon its subsequent filing with the New York Secretary of State.

Section 4. SEVERABILITY

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this Local Law or the application thereof, to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity or circumstance, shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional such order of judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this Local Law or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or order shall be rendered.

THE ERIE COUNTY LANGUAGE ACCESS ACT

A Local Law mandating the development of County Agency-specific language access plans, practices and training in the County of Erie.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the County of Erie as follows:

Section 1. Legislative Intent and Findings

The County recognizes that a large percentage of its inhabitants speak languages other than English and that the well-being and safety of the County as a whole is put in jeopardy if the people of the County are unable to access County services or effectively communicate with County agencies.

This Legislature also finds and determines that language can be a substantial barrier for residents seeking to access government information, programs and services. This Legislature finds that Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits agencies receiving federal funds from discriminating against persons on the basis of race, color or national origin. This Legislature determines that Presidential Executive Order 13166 (August 11, 2000) requires federally funded agencies to act to ensure that individuals with limited English proficiency have access to programs and services.

This Legislature concludes that it is in the best interest of all County residents to ensure and improve language access to County programs and services.

Section 2. Definitions

As used in this law, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

- A. *County Agency*: Any agency, department, division or office of Erie County government which provides programs and/or services to the public or programs and/or services made available to individuals in the custody of the Erie County Sheriff.
- B. *Designated Countywide Languages*: The top six limited English proficiency languages spoken by the population of Erie County as determined by the Language Access Advisory Board for the purpose of translation for a Locally Covered Entity.

- C. *Direct Public Services*: Services administered by a County Agency directly to program beneficiaries and/or participants, including any services administered by an agency directly to individuals in the custody of the Erie County Sheriff.
- D. Head of a County Agency: The highest-ranking public officer in the County Agency with administrative authority over the provision of programs and/or services, or their designee.
- E. *Interpretation*: An oral (spoken) or signed communication of a message from one language to another, in real time by a qualified human interpreter competent in both languages, keeping in mind cultural context, without adding, omitting, or changing the message's original meaning.
- F. Language Access Services: The service of interpretation, translation, or other communication method to a person with Limited English Proficiency.
- G. *Limited English Proficiency*: Persons for whom English is not their primary language and have difficulty communicating effectively in English.
- H. Locally Covered Entity: A County Agency, as defined in this section, in which the Head of the County Agency has declared that the agency is not covered by State or Federal language access requirements.
- I. State or Federally Covered Entity: A County Agency, as defined in this section, that is subject to State or Federal language access requirements because it is a recipient of State or Federal funds either directly or as a passthrough; or, it is subject to State or Federal laws that requires the provision of language access.
- J. *Translation:* The written rendition of a text in one language to a written text in another language, completed by a human translator competent in both languages.
- K. *Unforeseeable Life-Threatening Emergency:* An emergency that threatens the life of a client, which is not commonly included in the scope of the County Agency's normal provision of Direct Public Services.
- L. *Vital Documents*: Those documents most commonly distributed to the public and individuals that contain or elicit important and necessary information regarding the provision of Direct Public Services, as determined by the Head of the County Agency.

Section 3. Applicability

A. For the purpose of this Local Law the Head of each County Agency shall declare if their agency is either a State or Federally Covered Entity or a Locally Covered Entity.

- B. County Agencies that are declared to be a State or Federally Covered Entity shall not be subject to Section 6 of this act.
- C. County Agencies that are declared to be a Locally Covered Entity shall be subject to the requirements all sections of this Local Law.
- D. All requirements applicable to Locally Covered Entity under Section 6 of this act shall also be applicable to any contractor hired to perform Direct Public Services in the place of the County Agency.

Section 4. Compliance Documentation and Reporting

- A. Each County Agency shall be responsible for the creation and maintenance of compliance documentation as set forth in this Section, including:
 - 1. A written declaration by the Head of each County Agency shall be made to the Language Access Advisory Board by the last day in November for the next fiscal year. This written declaration shall include:
 - a. All direct public services covered by the declaration.
 - b. The applicability declaration category selected by the Head of the County Agency from Section 2(A) above.
 - c. A brief explanation of the laws and regulations that are applicable to the County Agency.
 - d. Specific Dates of the biennial review cycle to be used by the County Agency.
 - 2. A written Annual Report on Language Access shall be made to the Language Access Advisory Board by the last day in January each year providing data on the year prior. This Annual Report shall include:
 - a. Data on the types of services provided and the language in which they were provided, including geographic and demographic data if available.
 - b. Estimates of the number of individuals served for each language.
 - 3. A written Language Access Plan shall be submitted to the Language Access Advisory Board by the last day in November each year. This written plan shall include at minimum:

- a. A needs assessment considering the following factors:
 - i. the number or proportion of LEP persons in the eligible service population;
 - ii. the frequency with which LEP individuals come into contact with the agency, if such data exists. If no relevant data has been collected, such agency must exclude this factor from consideration;
 - iii. the importance of the benefit, service, information, or encounter to the LEP person (including the consequences of lack of language services or inadequate interpretation or translation); and
 - iv. the resources available to the agency and the costs of providing various types of language services.
 - v. The languages commonly encountered and served by the County Agency.
- b. The designation of a language access coordinator by name, title, and contact information;
- c. A list of language access services and resources, communications aids and accommodations for the disabled provided by the County Agency and a brief description of how they are provided;
- d. A description of the uniform training plan for agency employees, including annual training on the language access policies and the provision of language assistance services as well as providing a procedure that allows employees to report issues and problems implementing the language access plan;
- e. A description of the process for tracking and reporting agency language access data including the number and type of requests for language access services, what languages service requests are for, how each request was fulfilled, the number of complaints received by the agency regarding language access, and how complaints were resolved.
- B. Each County Agency shall conduct reviews of their Language Access Plans on a biennial basis as set by the Head of the County Agency.
- C. Each County Agency shall publish in a prominent place on the County's website:

- 1. The Language Access Plan of the county agency.
- 2. The name, title and contact information of the language access coordinator.
- 3. Translated notices in multiple languages informing the public that language access services are available free of charge, where programmatically applicable.
- D. Any additional documentation required by future resolutions of the Erie County Legislature, unless barred by laws restricting the disclosure of that information.

Section 5. Language Access Requirements for a State or Federally Covered Entity

- A. Each County Agency that declares itself a State or Federally Covered Entity under Section 3 above shall follow the applicable requirements and standards set forth in State and Federal Law
- B. A County Agency that declares itself a State or Federally Covered Entity under Section 3 above and complies with the requirements of Section 4 by submitting a written declaration, language access plan, and annual report, shall not be subject to Section 6 of this act.
 - 1. In its written declaration under Section 4(A)(1)(b), the County Agency should reference the State or Federal Law that covers the County Agency's language access requirements.
- C. 365 days after this law is filed with the Secretary of State, a State or Federally Covered Entity under this act shall be required to meet a minimum service standard of providing competent and timely interpretation services to individuals in their primary or preferred language. Competent interpretation shall mean a spoken or signed, real-time communication in which the qualified human interpreter is fluent in both the source and target language and is trained as an interpreter. The interpreter shall know relevant terminology and provide accurate interpretations by choosing equivalent expressions that convey the best matching and meaning to the source language and capture, to the greatest extent possible, all nuances intended in the source material. Priority shall be given to providing in-person interpreters where programmatically possible.

Section 6. Language Access Requirements for a Locally Covered Entity

- A. Each County Agency that declares itself a Locally Covered Entity under Section 3 above shall provide language access services for all direct public services it administers.
- B. Language Access Services shall include, but not be limited to:

- 1. Providing competent and timely interpretation services to individuals in their primary or preferred language. Competent interpretation shall mean a spoken or signed, real-time communication in which the qualified human interpreter is fluent in both the source and target language and is trained as an interpreter. The interpreter shall know relevant terminology and provide accurate interpretations by choosing equivalent expressions that convey the best matching and meaning to the source language and capture, to the greatest extent possible, all nuances intended in the source material. This interpretation services requirement shall commence 365 days after this law is filed with the Secretary of State.
- 2. Identifying and translating vital documents provided to the public, including but not limited to, forms, program signage and instructions provided to or completed by program participants and beneficiaries in each designated countywide language:
 - a. Existing vital documents must be translated within 365 days of the publication date of the Designated Countywide Languages to each County Agency. A County Agency will translate existing vital documents into any newly designated languages within 365 days of the publication date of the Designated Countywide Languages to each County Agency.
 - b. New vital documents, produced after the publication date of the Designated Countywide Languages to each County Agency, must be translated as soon as is practicable but no later than 120 days after the English version is released to the public
 - c. Emergency communications must be translated immediately, or no more than 5 days following the release of the English version.
- 3. Translation of pre-recorded informational messages on agency phone lines that provide vital public information in English, including emergency alerts and public service announcements.
- 4. Posting of multilingual signage in conspicuous locations about the availability of free interpretation services. Where practicable, the same information should be communicated via pre-recorded announcements in each designated countywide language on the public address system in public waiting areas.
- 5. Accommodations for communication access for disabled members of the public shall be available upon request including, but not limited to:
 - a. American Sign Language Interpretation via an on-site interpreter or Video Remote Interpreter (VRI).

- b. Communication Access Realtime Translation for individuals who are deaf, hard of hearing or have hearing loss.
- c. All other communications access accommodations as required by the application of the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- C. Language Access Services provided by the County Agency must meet or exceed the following quality standards:
 - Translation or interpretation via online applications, artificial intelligence, or machine interpretation software shall only be used after a County Agency has attempted to secure qualified translators or interpreters via booking on-site personnel, human reviewed translation processes, or telephone or video call services.
 - 2. Family members, other clients, and any other member of the public who is not a qualified interpreter, shall not be used for interpretation with respect to the provision of services or benefits, except in the case of an unforeseeable lifethreatening emergency.
 - 3. Minors shall not be used for interpretation with respect to the provision of services or benefits, except in the case of an unforeseeable life-threatening emergency.
 - 4. All language access services must be provided by qualified human interpreters and translators competent in both languages, keeping in mind cultural context, without adding, omitting, or changing the message's original meaning.
 - 5. All language access services must be provided at no cost to the person seeking services from the County Agency.

Section 7. Amending Article 17 of the Erie County Charter

Erie County Local Law No. 1-1959, constituting the Erie County Charter, as amended, is hereby amended at Article 17 to add a new Section 1708 to read as follows:

Section 1708. Language Access Advisory Board. There shall be a Language Access Advisory Board to advise on matters relating to LEP individuals and language access. The Board shall consist of eleven (11) members including:

1. County Executive, or their designee;

- 2. County Clerk, or their designee;
- 3. County Comptroller, or their designee;
- 4. District Attorney, or their designee;
- 5. Sheriff, or their designee;
- 6. Six community members appointed by the County Executive. All six community member appointments will be subject to confirmation by the County Legislature.

Community Members. Community members appointed to the board shall be reflective of the diversity of the County's limited English proficient communities, disability communities in need of communications access, representatives from community organizations and faith-based organizations serving either LEP or disabled communities in need of communications access.

Board Membership for Six Community Member Seats. These members of the Board shall be appointed for a term of three years. No member may serve more than two terms, except that those members who are initially appointed to complete the unexpired term of a member may also be eligible to serve two subsequent terms of three years each. The Board shall annually designate one member to serve as Board chairperson. In the event of a vacancy occasioned other than by expiration of the term of office of the chairperson, the Board shall appoint a successor to that office from the Board's membership. Board seats occupied by an Elected Official, or their designee, are not subject to term limits.

The Advisory Board shall be empaneled within ninety days following the effective date of this act. A quorum shall consist of a majority of the members of the Advisory Board entitled to vote on the matter under consideration. Approval of any matter shall require the affirmative vote of a majority of the members voting thereon. The Advisory Board shall adopt by-laws for the management and regulation of its affairs.

The Board shall:

- Designate the top six languages LEP individuals speak in Erie County as the Countywide Languages for translation and issue notices to all County Agencies by the last day in February on a biennial basis. This process shall consider a wide variety of data sources, including but not limited to data collected by the U.S Census and American Community Survey, public schools, local interpreting agencies, federal refugee resettlement programs and County Agencies to determine which language groups are most in need of language services.
- 2. Advise County Agencies in developing and implementing their Language Access Plan.

- 3. Review Agency Language Access Plans and provide written evaluation of the implementation of those plans.
- 4. Create a mechanism to interact with public regarding proper language access plan implementation.
- 5. Collect and review annual reports from County Agency language access coordinators.
- 6. Submit a comprehensive annual report based on County Agency compliance submissions, publish findings on the data collected and additional policy recommendations to the Erie County Legislature no later than the last day in June each year.

Section 8. Right to Privacy

The need for/use of language services by an individual contacting the County shall not be deemed by any County employee as a basis for inquiring into information related to an individual's immigration status or other personal attributes. No County employee shall inquire about or disclose confidential information, including, but not limited to, immigration status, unless such inquiry or disclosure is required by law.

Section 9. Effective Date

A. This Local Law shall take effect 180 days after it is filed with the Secretary of State.

Section 10. Severability

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law or the application thereof to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, or business shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this law, or in its specific application.

COUNTY CLERK

WHEREAS, the Eric County Clerk is responsible for recording, filing, and maintaining a central repository of legal documents, court filings, and records affecting property titles, including land and real estate transactions, in its Registrar Division; and

WHEREAS, NewVision Systems Corporation ("NewVision") has been the provider of recordkeeping software services in the Eric County Clerk's Office since 2004; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Comptroller released an audit in June 2023 of the Erie County Clerk's Office, Registrar Division Operating Budget Revenues (23COMM. 14E-28); and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Comptroller found in the June 2023 Audit that numerous "errors were detected in NewVision system reports that could not be explained", and advised the Erie County Clerk's Office to "assess NewVision and the system's ability to meet the specific needs of the Clerk's Office in providing adequate and reliable financial reporting"; and

WHEREAS, it was noted in the June 2023 Audit that "NewVision does not interface with the County's accounting software system (SAP), and the company which administers NewVision, Catalis, LLC, has not created a translation tool which would facilitate the transfer of financial data from NewVision to SAP"; and

WHEREAS, the Eric County Comptroller further recommended in the June 2023 Audit that, if the current software system could not be updated to ensure accurate financial information, the system should be replaced with "a system capable of providing financial data consistent with the Clerk's obligations under§ 1904 of the Eric County Administrative Code"; and

WHEREAS, the current software provider acknowledged the presence of "system error" and "visual bugs" in its response to the findings by the Erie County Comptroller's Office published by the Erie County Clerk's Office in September 2023 (23COMM. 18E-1); and

WHEREAS, following the June 2023 Audit, the Erie County Clerk's Office met with an adjacent county clerk's office and potential software vendors to discuss both improvements to the existing software and the feasibility of acquiring new software; and

WHEREAS, the Eric County Comptroller released an audit in February 2024 of the Eric County Clerk's Office, Registrar Division Mortgage Tax Collection and Distribution (24COMM. 4E-6); and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Comptroller again found issues with the current recordkeeping software, noting that "reports generated by the Clerk's NewVision Cashiering System are routinely inconsistent and show discrepancies in the financial information being reported"; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Clerk's Office is grateful to the Erie County Comptroller's Office for the long-overdue audits that highlighted the need for new software; and

WHEREAS, it is incontrovertible that the current recordkeeping software no longer meets the myriad needs of the Erie County Clerk's Office nor the taxpayers of Erie County; and

WHEREAS, the current recordkeeping software is set to be phased out in the next 2-3 years, making a transition to new software not only essential to perform the duties of the Erie County Clerk's Office but unavoidable; and

WHEREAS, transitioning all of the recordkeeping duties from one system to another could take as long as eight months to one year; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Clerk's Office advised this Honorable Body of the need and potential costs of new software via correspondence filed March 4, 2024 (24Comm. 5E-35); and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Clerk's Office consulted with the Division of Information and Support Services ("DISS") on drafting a Request for Proposals ("RFP") for new software, and obtained approval from DISS on the content for such an RFP; and

WHEREAS, on April 10, 2024, the Erie County Clerk's Office issued RFP #2024-023VF seeking proposers for recordkeeping software services, published online through the Erie County Division of Purchase and posted on other government bidding sites; and

WHEREAS, a selection committee, including a member of DISS, received, reviewed, and scored the two (2) proposals that were submitted in response to the RFP and unanimously determined that Tyler Technologies, Inc. submitted the best proposal and that their organization was the most technically qualified and best-positioned to perform the services requested; and

WHEREAS, the software provided by Tyler Technologies is expected to increase the efficiency and productivity of the Clerk's Office with integrated solutions such as eRecording, Bi- directional support with the Unified Court System, Intelligent OCR indexing, self-serving public access, and POS payment processing, in addition to featuring robust financial reporting, fee management, and automated data extracts that make it possible for the Clerk's Office to achieve GAAP compliance; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Clerk's Office held a meeting with representatives of Tyler Technologies and representatives of the Erie County Legislature and the Erie County Comptroller on July 24, 2024 to further discuss the software integration process; and

WHEREAS, the Administration and the Erie County Comptroller's Office have communicated their support of this new software system and Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Division of Budget & Management confirmed sufficient funding exists to cover the \$600,000 initial payment (inclusive of a one-time service fee, one -time hardware fee, estimated on-site training expenses and an annual software-as-as-service fee) within the Clerk's Office Registrar Division's 2024 Budget (Fund 110, Funds Center 11310) Account 516020 - Professional Services, Contracts & Fees; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Clerk's Office has reported a significant surplus of funds every year since 2018, with the most recent surplus in 2023 totaling approximately \$2,387,636.00.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature hereby authorizes the recognition of \$600,000 in previously unbudgeted interest earnings revenue in Countywide Budget Accounts - Comptroller (Fund 110, Funds Center 17000) Account 445030 - Interest & Earnings General Investments Revenue and the appropriation of a like amount of funding into the Clerk's Office Registrar Division (Fund 110, Funds Center 11310) Account 516020 - Professional Services, Contracts & Fees as follows:

WHEREAS, in conjunction with the design consultant, a project has been identified at the Wendt Beach Park to bury a portion of the existing sewer line under the creek and remove the culvert which will minimize the back up of debris/water which also creates excessive water on Shell Road and negatively impacts the residents; and

WHEREAS, execution of the proposed project to install a new sanitary sewer system at the facility will correct the existing erosion concerns as well as support the future restoration of the Mansion and Stables; and

WHEREAS, if this project is not approved, there is a significant possibility that debris could sever the sewer line between the culvert and the bank discharging raw sewage directly into Lake Erie as the connection from the park to the Erie County Sewer on Shell Road would no longer be connected; and

WHEREAS, the County and SUNY Erie have proposed that SUNY Erie will hire a full-time employee that will spend approximately 60% of his/her time on legal matters involving SUNY Erie, and approximately 40% of his/her time on legal matters involving the Erie County Department of Law; and

WHEREAS, there is currently a full-time employee in the Erie County Department of Law who is SUNY Erie's primary point of contact, and who would serve in an Interim role of SUNY Erie's Executive Director of Legal Affairs, and would be a shared employee with the County under this shared employee agreement. The annual salary for the position will be \$160,000, of which SUNY Erie would pay \$100,000 of the salary annually, plus fringes, and the County would reimburse SUNY Erie \$60,000 of the salary annually; and

WHEREAS, on August 29, 2024, SUNY Erie's Board of Trustees authorized its President and/or her staff to negotiate and execute a written agreement with the County as to the terms and conditions of the shared employee arrangement.

WHEREAS, under state law, if allowed by local option, property that (1) is owned by persons 65 years of age or older, or by certain other persons whose income does not exceed the maximum established by local option, (2) is used exclusively for residential purposes, and (3) has been owned by at least one of its owners for a minimum of 12 consecutive months prior to application for exemption or for a period of time considered to be the equivalent of 12 consecutive months is partially exempt from general municipal taxes; and

WHEREAS, on July 7, 1970, the Erie County Legislature approved Item 16, a resolution opting into state legislation creating a property tax exemption for Erie County tax purposes for the Senior Citizen Real Property Tax Exemption; and

WHEREAS, periodically since July 1970, the maximum income level exemption has been reviewed and updated by the Erie County Legislature; and

WHEREAS, in August 2022, New York State increased the income limits for the senior citizen property tax exemption to provide greater relief for older Americans across the State; and

WHEREAS, because the Senior Citizen Real Property Tax Exemption has not been reviewed or revised since February 2022, it is necessary to review and revise the County's exemption threshold based on maximum income eligibility for senior citizens.

Dear Chairwoman Baskin:

In accordance with the obligations of the Erie County Attorney set forth in subsection 3, Section 204 of Article 2 of the Erie County Charter, this legal opinion concerns Local Law Intro No. 6-1 2024 (6-1).

Preemption

Under New York state law, preemption occurs when a local law directly conflicts with a state statute, or where a state statute expressly states that local laws on a given subject matter are preempted. Preemption can also occur where the State Legislature has assumed full regulatory responsibility in a field related to the proposed local law.

Here, 6-1 does not present any direct conflicts with state statute and since the State Legislature has not taken specific action to assume sole regulatory authority on this topic, 6-1 does not present a preemption issue of concern.

Grammar

The stated purpose of 6-1 is to mandate the development of County Agency-specific language access plans, practices and training in the County of Erie. We find the grammar and usage of 6-1 to be sufficient in order to achieve the stated purpose.

Ambiguities

While every hypothetical circumstance or eventuality cannot be addressed in the scope of this opinion, 6-1 does not present any facial ambiguities that would frustrate its implementation and enforcement.

SUSPENSION

Conclusion

We find that Local Law Intro. 6-1 2024 is sufficient as to form.

Summary of Recommended Action

This award will fund a collaboration between the Erie County Sheriff's Office, Peaceprints of WNY and the Osborne Association.

This collaboration will mirror the Osborne Association's "Kinship" program in New York City. Under this program, financial resources and support are provided to incarcerated individuals upon reentry for the purpose of accessing safe and stable housing, reunification with loved ones and emotional and financial stability. It is the goal for 40 incarcerated individuals to participate in this program over the lifetime of this grant.

The collaboration will work as follows: the Erie County Sheriff's Office will oversee this grant. Peaceprints of WNY will identify individuals who may be eligible for this program during its Project Blue intake process. The Osborne Association will then administer the program.

Fiscal Implications of Proposal

This proposal has no impact on county tax dollars.

Reason for Recommendation

The Erie County Sheriff's Office is committed to doing its part to reduce recidivism. Often times, for various reasons, incarcerated individuals struggle when reentering society. One of those barriers is a lack of stable housing. This grant and partnership aim to address that.

Consequences of Negative Action

The Erie County Sheriff's Office will forfeit \$1,000,000.00 in federal funding.

I am in receipt of your letter regarding my Deputy Comptroller for Audit, Mary Hosler.

As you know, the State Comptroller's Audit of the Town of Evans resulted in a dispute concerning a \$6,000 payment to Mary. I am confident that this matter will be resolved at some point by the town. In the interim, I have no desire to meddle in the State audit or be drawn into the ongoing internecine warfare that has characterized Evans' politics for more than a decade.

I am, however, amused by your contention that Mary might not be the right person to carry the "massive responsibility of overseeing the taxpayer watchdog functions" of my office. Mary has been an exemplary Audit Deputy. Allow me to refresh your memory:

- 1. Mary supervised the talented team of auditors that uncovered the embezzlement of \$320,159.33 by one of the County Clerk's top deputies;
- 2. Mary and her team also discovered a \$326,456.16 counterfeit check drawn on the County Clerk's account;
- 3. Mary and her auditors found another \$1,133,648.20 for recovery from indigent legal services. That's a seven figure sum nothing short of remarkable.

I trust that you have read the complete reports and share my relief that Mary and her team have identified this money so that it can be recovered for the taxpayers. I would challenge you to cite an example of another audit deputy who has had a more productive and impactful two years than Mary Hosler.

CERTIFICATE OF DETERMINATION OF THE COUNTY COMPTROLLER RELATIVE TO THE TERMS, FORM AND DETAILS OF THE SALE AND ISSUANCE OF \$110,945,000 PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT SERIAL BONDS, SERIES 2024B (BUFFALO BILLS STADIUM PROJECT) OF THE COUNTY OF ERIE, NEW YORK, AND PROVIDING FOR THEIR PRIVATE SALE.

I, KEVIN R. HARDWICK, the County Comptroller of the County of Erie, New York (the "County"), HEREBY CERTIFY that pursuant to the powers and duties delegated to me as the chief fiscal officer of the County pursuant to a Bond Resolution that was duly adopted by the County Legislature and is referred to in the attached Appendix A which is hereby made a part hereof, and subject to the limitations prescribed in the Bond Resolution, I have made the following determinations:

- 1. Authorization, Principal Amount, Maturity Schedule, Issue Date and Designation: (a) Bonds of the County (the "Bonds") in the respective principal amounts as set forth in the attached Appendix A, for such purpose as set forth in such Appendix, shall be issued pursuant to a bond resolution that was duly adopted by the County Legislature, on May 4, 2023 as set forth in such Appendix, and shall mature in the respective principal amounts on September 15 in each of the years as set forth in such Appendix.
- (b) All of the serial bonds hereinabove referred to in Appendix A (the "Bonds") shall be in the aggregate principal amount of \$110,945,000, and shall be designated "PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT SERIAL BONDS, SERIES 2024B (BUFFALO BILLS STADIUM PROJECT)." The Bonds shall be dated October 8, 2024 and shall mature, with substantially level or declining annual debt service, on September 15 in various years, as set forth in Appendix A.

- 2. <u>Issue Date</u>. The Bonds shall be dated their date of delivery. The date of each Bond shall appear on the face thereof under the caption "Date of Original Issue," and each Bond shall bear interest from such date.
- Interest Rate, Dates and Medium of Payment. The Bonds shall bear interest from their date at the rate(s) per annum as set forth in Section 1 hereof, payable March 15, 2025, September 15, 2025 and semi-annually thereafter on each March 15 and September 15 to maturity (or earlier redemption, if applicable), payable in any coin or currency of the United States of America which at the time of payment is legal tender for the payment of public and private debts. Interest thereon will be payable by wire transfer or in clearinghouse funds by the Fiscal Agent, on each interest payment date, to the registered owners thereof (at their addresses as they appear on the registration books of the County maintained by the Fiscal Agent or at such other address as may be furnished in writing by any of such registered owners to the Fiscal Agent) at the record date/time for the Bonds, which is the last business day of the month preceding each interest payment date, at the close of business.
- Bonds Subject to Prior Redemption. The Bonds maturing on or before September 15, 2034 will not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. The Bonds maturing on or after September 15, 2035 will be subject to redemption prior to maturity at the option of the County on any date on or after September 15, 2034, in whole or in part, and if in part in any order of their maturity and in any amount within a maturity (selected by lot within a maturity), at the price equal to 100% of the par amount of the Bonds to be redeemed, plus accrued interest to the date of redemption. The County may select the maturities of the Bonds to be redeemed prior to maturity and the amount to be redeemed of each maturity selected, as the County shall determine to be in the best interest of the County at the time of such redemption. If less than all of the Bonds

of any maturity are to be redeemed prior to maturity, the selection of the book-entry interests within each Bond maturity to be redeemed will be done in accordance with procedures established by The Depository Trust Company ("DTC") which will act as securities depository for the Bonds. If the Bonds are not registered in book-entry form, any redemption of less than all of a maturity of the Bonds shall be allocated (in the amounts of \$5,000 or any whole multiple) among the registered owners of such maturity of the Bonds then outstanding as nearly as practicable in proportion to the principal amounts of such maturity of the Bonds owned by each registered owner. This will be calculated based on the following formula:

(principal to be redeemed) x (principal amount owned by owner) (principal amount outstanding)

So long as DTC or a successor securities depository is the sole registered owner of the Bonds, the County will cause notice of redemption to be given only to DTC as registered owner. Notice of such call for redemption shall be given by mailing such notice to the registered owner not less than thirty (30) days, nor more than sixty (60) days, prior to such date. Notice of redemption having been given as aforesaid, the Bonds so called for redemption shall, on the date of redemption set forth in such call for redemption, become due and payable, together with interest to such redemption date, and interest shall cease to be paid thereon after such redemption date.

5. <u>Denominations, Numbers and Letters</u>. The Bonds maturing in each year shall be issued as fully registered bonds in denominations of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof not exceeding the aggregate principal amount of Bonds maturing in such year.

The Bonds shall be lettered R, and shall be numbered one (1) consecutively upward in the order of their issuance. All of the Bonds shall be transferable and exchangeable as provided herein.

Book Entry System. The Bonds when issued shall be (i) registered in the 6. name of Cede & Co., as nominee of DTC and (ii) deposited with DTC to be held in trust until maturity. Only one Bond will be initially issued for each maturity in the aggregate principal amount of such maturity. DTC is an automated depository for securities and clearinghouse for securities transactions, and will be responsible for establishing and maintaining a book-entry system for recording the ownership interests of its participants, which include certain banks, trust companies and securities dealers, and the transfers of the interests among its participants. The DTC participants will be responsible for establishing and maintaining records with respect to the beneficial ownership interests of individual purchasers in the Bonds. Individual purchases of beneficial ownership interests in the Bonds may only be made through book entries (without certificates issued by the County) made on the books and records of DTC (or a successor depository) and its participants, in the denominations of \$5,000 or integral multiples thereof. Beneficial owners of the Bonds will not receive certificates representing their interest in the Bonds. Principal of and interest on the Bonds will be payable by the County or its agent by wire transfer or in clearinghouse funds to DTC or its nominee as registered owner of the Bonds pursuant to the Blanket Letter of Representations between the County and DTC. Transfer of principal and interest payments to participants of DTC will be the responsibility of DTC; transfer of principal and interest payments to beneficial owners by participants of DTC will be the responsibility of such participants and other nominees of beneficial owners. The County will not be responsible or liable for payments by DTC to its participants or by DTC participants to beneficial owners or for maintaining, supervising or reviewing the records maintained by DTC, its participants or persons acting through such participants.

- 7. <u>Discontinuance of Book Entry System</u>. In the event that (a) DTC determines to discontinue providing its service with respect to the Bonds by giving notice to the County and discharging its responsibilities with respect thereto under applicable law, and the County fails to appoint a successor securities depository for the Bonds, or (b) the County determines to discontinue the system of book-entry transfers through DTC (or a successor securities depository), then bond certificates shall be delivered to each of the beneficial owners upon registration of the Bonds held in such beneficial owners' names. After such registration the beneficial owners shall become the registered owners of the Bonds. In such event, the County Comptroller of the County shall execute a Supplemental Certificate of Determination which will set forth the terms, form and details of issuance of such bond certificates.
- 8. <u>Fiscal Agent</u>. U.S. Bank Trust Company, National Association, New York, New York is hereby appointed as the Fiscal Agent for the Bonds pursuant to, and to act in accordance with, applicable provisions of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-a of the Consolidated Laws of the State of New York.
- 9. <u>Execution of Bonds</u>. The Bonds shall be executed in the name of the County by the manual signature of the County Comptroller, and shall have the corporate seal of the County, or a facsimile thereof, affixed, impressed, imprinted, engraved or otherwise reproduced thereon.
- 10. Transfer of Bonds. Each Bond shall be transferable only upon the books of the County which shall be kept for such purpose at the office of the Fiscal Agent, by the registered owner thereof in person or by its attorney duly authorized in writing, upon surrender thereof together with a written instrument of transfer or exchange satisfactory to the Fiscal Agent duly executed by the registered owner or its duly authorized attorney. Upon transfer of any such Bond,

the County shall issue in the name of the transferee or the registered owner a new Bond or Bonds of the same aggregate principal amount and maturity as the surrendered Bond. The Fiscal Agent may deem and treat the person in whose name any Bond shall be registered upon the books of the County as the absolute owner of such Bond, whether such Bond shall be overdue or not, for the purpose of receiving payment of, or on account of, the principal of and interest on such Bond and for all other purposes, and all such payments so made to any such registered owner or upon its order shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such Bond to the extent of the sum or sums so paid, and neither the County nor the Fiscal Agent shall be affected by any notice to the contrary.

which the privilege of exchanging or transferring Bonds is exercised, the County shall execute and deliver Bonds in accordance with the provisions hereof. All Bonds surrendered in any such exchanges or transfers shall forthwith be cancelled by the Fiscal Agent. For every such exchange or transfer of bonds, the Fiscal Agent may make a charge sufficient to reimburse the County for any tax, fee or other governmental charge required to be paid with respect to such exchange or transfer, and may charge a sum sufficient to pay the cost of preparing each new bond issued upon such exchange or transfer, which sum or sums shall be paid by the person requesting such exchange or transfer as a condition precedent to the exercise of the privilege of making such exchange or transfer. The County shall not be obliged to make any such exchange or transfer of Bonds between the close of business on the last business day of the month preceding an interest payment date and such interest payment date.

- 12. <u>Sale of Bonds.</u> The Bonds are hereby sold at private sale to Jefferies LLC, ("Jefferies"), as the book-running senior manager, with co-managers Ramirez & Co., Inc., TD Securities (USA) LLC, Raymond James & Associates, Inc. and J.P. Morgan Securities LLC, all of New York, New York, as the Underwriters listed in the Contract of Purchase dated September 25, 2024 between the Underwriters and the County, for the purchase price of \$125,199,094.82 plus accrued interest, if any, from the date of the Bonds (October 8, 2024) to the date of delivery of and payment for the Bonds. The aggregate initial offering price for the Bonds will be \$125,454,545.40 plus accrued interest, if any. Pursuant to Section 54.50 of the Local Finance Law, constituting Chapter 33-A of the Consolidated Laws for the State of New York, as amended, the terms and conditions of such sale are subject to the approval of the State Comptroller. Delivery of the Bonds to the purchasers thereof shall be effected on or about October 8, 2024, upon (i) receipt by the County of the purchase price of the Bonds and (ii) deposit of the Bonds with DTC to be held in trust until maturity.
- 13. <u>Form of Bonds</u>. The Bonds shall be in substantially the form set forth in Appendix B hereto.
- 14. SEC Rule 15c2-12. In order to assist the Underwriters of the Bonds in complying with Rule 15c2-12 promulgated by the Securities and Exchange Commission, and as part of the County's contractual obligation arising from its acceptance of the Underwriters' proposal, at the time of the delivery of the Bonds the County will provide an executed copy of its "Undertaking to Provide Continuing Disclosure" in substantially the form set forth in Appendix C hereto. The Undertaking will constitute a written agreement or contract of the County for the benefit of holders of and owners of beneficial interests in the Bonds, to provide to the Electronic Municipal Market Access ("EMMA") System implemented by the Municipal Securities

Rulemaking Board established pursuant to Section 15B(b)(1) of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, or any successor thereto or to the functions of such Board contemplated by the Undertaking, the annual financial information and timely notice of the occurrence of certain events, as enumerated in the Rule 15c2-12.

"EMMA" shall mean the Electronic Municipal Markets Access System maintained by the MSRB.

"Financial Obligation" shall mean a (i) debt obligation; (ii) derivative instrument entered into in connection with, or pledged as security or a source of payment for, an existing or planned debt obligation; or (iii) guarantee of (i) or (ii). The term "financial obligation" shall not include municipal securities as to which a final official statement has been provided to the MSRB consistent with Rule 15c2-12.

"GAAP" shall mean generally accepted accounting principles as in effect from time to time in the United States.

"Holder" shall mean any registered owner of the Bonds and any beneficial owner of Bonds within the meaning of Rule 13d-3 under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended (the "Exchange Act").

"MSRB" shall mean the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board established in accordance with the provisions of Section 15B(b)(1) of the Exchange Act.

"Rule 15c2-12" shall mean Rule 15c2-12 under the Exchange Act, as amended through the date of this Undertaking.

 - (i) to the EMMA System, no later than 270 days after the end of each fiscal year, commencing with the fiscal year ending December 31, 2024, the Annual Information relating to such fiscal year, together with audited financial statements of the County for such fiscal year if audited financial statements are then available; provided, however, that if audited financial statements are not then available, unaudited financial statements shall be provided with the Annual Information, and audited financial statements, if any, shall be delivered to EMMA within thirty (30) days after they become available and in no event later than 360 days after the end of each fiscal year; and
 - (ii) Pursuant to the provisions of this Section 2, the County shall give, or cause to be given, notice of the occurrence of any of the following events with respect to the

Bonds to the MSRB through its EMMA System not later than then (10) business days following the occurrence of such an event:

- (1) principal and interest payment delinquencies;
- (2) non-payment related defaults, if material;
- (3) unscheduled draws on debt service reserves reflecting financial difficulties;
- (4) in the case of credit enhancement, if any, provided in connection with the issuance of the Bonds, unscheduled draws on credit enhancements reflecting financial difficulties;
- (5) substitution of credit or liquidity providers, or their failure to perform;
- (6) adverse tax opinions, the issuance by the Internal Revenue Service of proposed or final determinations of taxability, Notices of Proposed Issue (IRS Form 5701 TEB) or other material notices or determinations with respect to the tax status of the Bonds, or other material events affecting the tax status of the Bonds;
- (7) modifications to rights of Holders of the Bonds, if material;
- (8) bond calls, if material, and tender offers;
- (9) defeasances;
- (10) release, substitution, or sale of property securing repayment of the Bonds;
- (11) rating changes;
- (12) bankruptcy, insolvency, receivership or similar event of the County;
- (13) the consummation of a merger, consolidation, or acquisition involving the County or the sale of all or substantially all of the assets of the County, other than in the ordinary course of business, the entry into a definitive agreement to undertake such an action or the termination of a definitive agreement relating to any such actions, other than pursuant to its terms, if material;
- (14) appointment of a successor or additional trustee or the change of name of a trustee, if material;
- incurrence of a financial obligation of the County, if material, or agreement to covenants, events of default, remedies, priority rights, or other similar terms of a financial obligation of the County, any of which affect security holders, if material; and

- (16) default, event of acceleration, termination event, modification of terms, or other similar events under the terms of a financial obligation of the County, any of which reflect financial difficulties.
- (iii) to EMMA, in a timely manner, notice of a failure to provide by the date set forth in Section 2(a)(i) hereof any Annual Information required by Section 3 hereof.
- (b) Nothing herein shall be deemed to prevent the County from disseminating any other information in addition to that required hereby in the manner set forth herein or in any other manner. If the County disseminates any such additional information, the County shall have no obligation to update such information or include it in any future materials disseminated hereunder.
- (c) Nothing herein shall be deemed to prevent the County from providing notice of the occurrence of certain other events, in addition to those listed above, if the County determines that any such other event is material with respect to the Bonds; but the County does not undertake to commit to provide any such notice of the occurrence of any material event except those events listed above.
- (d) Each notice of a listed event hereunder shall indicate that it is a notice of a listed event and shall include the CUSIP number of the County or the CUSIP numbers of the Bonds.
- Section 3. <u>Annual Information</u>. (a) The required Annual Information shall consist of the financial information and operating data for the preceding fiscal year, in a form generally consistent with the information contained or cross-referenced in the County's final official statement relating to the Bonds under the headings: "Indebtedness of the County", "County Finances", "Revenue Sources and Expenditures", "Economic Conditions", "Pharmaceutical Settlement" and "Litigation".
- (b) All or any portion of the Annual Information may be incorporated in the Annual Information by cross reference to any other documents which have been filed the MSRB.
- (c) Annual Information for any fiscal year containing any modified operating data or financial information (as contemplated by Section 7(e) hereof) for such fiscal year shall explain, in narrative form, the' reasons for such modification and the effect of such modification on the Annual Information being provided for such fiscal year. If a change in accounting principles is included in any such modification, such Annual Information shall present a comparison between the financial statements or information prepared on the basis of the modified accounting principles and those prepared on the basis of the former accounting principles.
- Section 4. <u>Financial Statements</u>. The County's annual financial statements for each fiscal year shall be prepared in accordance with GAAP as in effect from time to time. Such financial statements shall be audited by an independent accounting firm.
- Section 5. Remedies. If the County shall fail to comply with any provision of this Undertaking, then any Holder of Bonds may enforce, for the equal benefit and protection of all Holders similarly situated, by mandamus or other suit or proceeding at law or in equity, this Undertaking against the County and any of the officers, agents and employees of the County, and may compel the County or any such officers, agents or employees to perform and carry out their

duties under this Undertaking; provided that the sole and exclusive remedy for breach of this Undertaking shall be an action to compel specific performance of the obligations of the County hereunder and no person or entity shall be entitled to recover monetary damages hereunder under any circumstances. Failure to comply with any provision of this Undertaking shall not constitute an event of default on the Bonds.

- Section 6. <u>Parties in Interest</u>. This Undertaking is executed and delivered solely for the benefit of the Holders. No other person shall have any right to enforce the provisions hereof or any other rights hereunder.
- Section 7. <u>Amendments</u>. Without the consent of any Holders of Bonds, the County at any time and from time to time may enter into any amendments or changes to this Undertaking for any of the following purposes:
 - (a) to comply with or conform to any changes in Rule 15c2-12 (whether required or optional);
 - (b) to add a dissemination agent for the information required to be provided hereby and to make any necessary or desirable provisions with respect thereto;
 - (c) to evidence the succession of another person to the County and the assumption of any such successor of the duties of the County hereunder;
 - (d) to add to the duties of the County for the benefit of the Holders, or to surrender any right or power herein conferred upon the County;
 - (e) to modify the contents, presentation and format of the Annual Information from time to time to conform to changes in accounting or disclosure principles or practices and legal requirements followed by or applicable to the County or to reflect changes in the identity, nature or status of the County or in the business, structure or operations of the County or any mergers, consolidations, acquisitions or dispositions made by or affecting any such person; provided that any such modifications shall comply with the requirements of Rule 15c2-12 or Rule 15c2-12 as in effect at the time of such modification; or
 - (f) to cure any ambiguity, to correct or supplement any provision hereof which may be inconsistent with any other provision hereof, or to make any other provisions with respect to matters or questions arising under this Undertaking which, in each case, comply with Rule 15c2-12 or Rule 15c2-12 as in effect at the time of such amendment or change; provided that no such action pursuant to this Section 7 shall adversely affect the interests of the Holders in any material respect. In making such determination, the County may rely upon an opinion of nationally recognized bond counsel.
- Section 8. <u>Termination</u>. This Undertaking shall remain in full force and effect until such time as all principal, redemption premiums, if any, and interest on the Bonds shall have been paid in full or the Bonds shall have otherwise been paid or legally defeased pursuant to their terms. Upon any such legal defeasance, the County shall provide notice of such defeasance to EMMA or the MSRB. Such notice shall state whether the Bonds have been defeased to maturity or to redemption and the timing of such maturity or redemption.

- Section 9. <u>Undertaking to Constitute Written Agreement or Contract</u>. This Undertaking shall constitute the written agreement or contract for the benefit of Holders of Bonds, as contemplated under Rule 15c2-12.
- Section 10. <u>Governing Law</u>. This Undertaking shall be governed by the laws of the State of New York determined without regard to principles of conflict of law.





MEMORANDUM

To: Honorable Members of the Erie County Legislature

Proposed Increase and Improvement of Facilities (2024)

Date: October 4, 2024

SUMMARY

The Erie County Legislature is requested to approve the attached resolution relating to the proposed Increase and Improvement of Facilities in Erie County Sewer District No. 3 (the "Sewer District"). This resolution must be passed by a simple majority vote of your Honorable Body.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Approving this resolution will have no effect on Erie County's general fund.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Pursuant to the New York State County Law, Article 5A, Section 268, an Increase and Improvement of Facilities requires a public hearing on the proposed project. The Erie County Legislature approved a resolution on July 25, 2024 pursuant to Legislative Comm. 13E-5 (2024) calling for such a public hearing, and the required legal notice publication steps were then taken. The public hearing was held on September 9, 2024, and no objections or concerns were raised regarding the proposed Increase and Improvement of Facilities. The next step is for the Legislature to adopt the attached resolution that approves the project in concept and authorizes the submission of an application to the New York State Comptroller's Office (in order to obtain that office's required approval of the proposed project, its plan of financing, and the impact of the project on a typical property in the Sewer District). Such approval is necessary pursuant to the County Law.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Currently there is a need for new/updated bonding authorization to make needed improvements at the Southtowns Advanced Wastewater Treatment Facility, existing pumping stations, and the sanitary sewer collection system. These existing facilities in many cases have reached or exceeded the end of their useful life and are in need of replacement or upgrade.

On April 17, 2024 the Sewer District's Board of Managers approved a Sewer Agency Report recommending the Increase and Improvement of Facilities pursuant to Article 5A of the County Law to fund the necessary improvements (the "Report"). The Report was filed with Your Honorable Body pursuant to Legislative Comm. 13E-4 (2024) and was the subject of the public hearing referred to above. Included in the Report was a draft of the application to be submitted to the New York State Comptroller's Office.

CONSEQUENCES OF A NEGATIVE ACTION

If the enclosed resolution is not approved by Your Honorable Body, the District may not proceed with the Southtowns AWTF expansion. This could jeopardize the Sewer District's ability to properly serve its customers, protect public health and the environment, and meet applicable regulatory responsibilities.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The Erie County Division of Sewerage Management will submit an application regarding the project to the New York State Comptroller's Office, in order to obtain the required approval. Upon receipt of such approval, a bond resolution (to allow for the future financing of the work) will be proposed and submitted for consideration by the Erie County Legislature.

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A RESOLUTION APPROVING AN INCREASE AND IMPROVEMENT OF THE FACILITIES OF THE ERIE COUNTY SEWER DISTRICT NO. 3 IN THE COUNTY OF ERIE, NEW YORK.

WHEREAS, the County Legislature of the County of Erie, New York (herein called the "County Legislature" and the "County," respectively), on behalf of the Erie County Sewer District No. 3 in the County (the "District") and pursuant to proceedings heretofore had and taken in accordance with the provisions of Article 5-A of the County Law, including approving orders of the State Comptroller, has established the District; and

WHEREAS, the County identified the need to undertake a substantial sewer system capital improvements project to the Southtowns Advanced Wastewater Treatment Facility, and

WHEREAS, on July 20, 2023 the County Legislature adopted a certain bond resolution entitled:

BOND RESOLUTION OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE COUNTY OF ERIE, NEW YORK (THE "COUNTY"), AUTHORIZING THE INCREASE AND IMPROVEMENT OF THE FACILITIES OF ERIE COUNTY SEWER DISTRICT NO. 3 (THE "PROJECT"), STATING THE TOTAL ESTIMATED MAXIMUM COST OF THE PROJECT TO BE \$100,000,000. APPROPRIATING SUCH AMOUNT THEREFOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF UP TO \$100,000,000 OF BONDS OR OTHER OBLIGATIONS OF THE COUNTY (COLLECTIVELY, THE "OBLIGATIONS") TO FINANCE SUCH APPROPRIATION; AND FURTHER AUTHORIZING ANY AMOUNTS RECEIVED FROM THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND/OR THE STATE OF NEW YORK OR ANY OTHER SOURCE FOR THE PROJECT TO BE EXPENDED TOWARDS THE COST OF THE PROJECT AS INDICATED HEREIN, OR TOWARDS THE REDEMPTION OF ANY OF THE OBLIGATIONS ISSUED THEREFOR, OR TO BE BUDGETED AS AN OFFSET TO THE TAXES FOR PAYMENT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF AND INTEREST ON THE OBLIGATIONS.

WHEREAS, the cost of such project has increased due to major inflationary pressures, material and labor shortages as well as an overall increase in the cost of the project due to these factors; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Managers of the District has duly directed that there be prepared an updated map, plan and report and revised estimate of cost (as so revised and updated, the "Report" and the "Estimate" respectively and, collectively, the "Report and Estimate") by the County Engineers (i.e., the Erie County Department of Environment and Planning) relating to a proposed increase and improvement of the facilities of the District, which Report and Estimate have been approved by the Board of Managers of the District on April 17, 2024, and subsequent thereto the Report and Estimate were filed with the County Legislature pursuant to Section 268 of the County Law; and

WHEREAS, the Report and Estimate describe a proposed increase and improvement of the facilities of the District, generally consisting of improvements to the Southtowns Advanced Wastewater Treatment Facility, existing pumping stations, and the sanitary sewer collection system; as more fully described in the Report and Estimate (collectively, "Improvements" or the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, such Project will generally consist of substantial improvements to the Southtowns Advanced Wastewater Treatment Facility, such work being currently anticipated to include, but not necessarily be limited to, disinfection and effluent pumping improvements, ORF and outfall modifications, bioclarifier and aeration/UNOX system improvements including the rehabilitation of existing tanks, solids handling improvements, electrical improvements, equipment replacements and upgrades to backup power generator(s), IT infrastructure and HVAC system improvements, as well as other upgrades that are identified in the additional facility needs evaluation and as more fully identified in (or contemplated by) the Report, with the foregoing to include all necessary site work, equipment, apparatus and other improvements and costs incidental thereto and in connection with the financing thereof; and

WHEREAS, the increased maximum estimated cost of the Project is \$215,000,000, and unless paid for from other sources or charges, such cost will be apportioned among the benefitted real properties in the District in accordance with charges based on usage and/or special assessments based on units, assessed value and/or footage, as these or other applicable cost apportionment standards may be specified in the District's Benefit and User Charge formulas (as those currently exist or as they may be amended from time to time in accordance with the County's sewer rents local law and the rules and procedures adopted by the Board of Managers of the District); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the County Law the consent of the State Comptroller is required prior to the construction and development of the Project in the District because the cost thereof to the Typical Property (as defined in the County Law) is estimated to exceed the Average Estimated Cost to the Typical Property for similar types of projects, as computed by the State Comptroller, with such cost being estimated to be \$221; and

WHEREAS, the County Legislature has given due consideration to the impact that the Project may have on the environment and, on the basis of such consideration, the County Legislature found that no substantial adverse environmental impact will be caused thereby; and

WHEREAS, the County Legislature and the County have complied in every respect with all applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations regarding environmental

matters, including compliance with the New York State Environmental Quality Review Act, comprising Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law and, in connection therewith, duly issued a negative declaration and/or other applicable documentation concerning the project, which has been filed in the office of the County Clerk; and

WHEREAS, the County Legislature adopted Resolution No. 113-2024 on July 25, 2024, calling a meeting of the County Legislature for the purpose of holding a public hearing on the proposed Project in accordance with the Report and Estimate (the "Public Hearing"); and

WHEREAS, such Resolution No. 113-2024 authorized and directed the Clerk of the County Legislature to publish the notice of the Public Hearing; and

WHEREAS, the Public Hearing was duly held at County Hall, in Buffalo, New York, on September 9, 2024, at 2:00 o'clock P.M., Prevailing Time; and

WHEREAS, notice of the Public Hearing was duly published and filed in the manner provided by law and proof thereof was submitted to the County Legislature;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNTY LEGISLATURE

OF THE COUNTY OF ERIE, NEW YORK, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Upon the evidence given at the Public Hearing, it is hereby found and determined that it is in the public interest to proceed with the Project and its proposed plan of financing, all as more fully described in the preambles hereto, and the Project is hereby authorized in concept (subject to the County's obtaining the required approval of the New York State Comptroller) at an increased maximum estimated cost of \$215,000,000.

Section 2. It is hereby found and determined that the parcels and lots of the District shall be benefited by the Project.

Section 3. It is hereby found and determined that the maximum estimated cost of the Project is \$215,000,000, and unless paid for from other sources or charges, such cost to be to be apportioned among the benefitted real properties in the District in accordance with charges based on usage and/or special assessments based on units, assessed value and/or footage, as these or other applicable cost apportionment standards may be specified in the District's Benefit and User Charge formulas (as those currently exist or as they may be amended from time to time in accordance with the County's sewer rents local law and the rules and procedures adopted by the Board of Managers of the District).

Section 4. It is hereby found and determined that the cost of the Project shall be financed by the issuance of serial bonds of the County (to be issued pursuant to one or more bond resolutions that are to be adopted by the Legislature in the future) in an amount not to exceed \$215,000,000, and with the balance of the cost of the Project to be annually apportioned within the District as described previously herein.

Section 5. It is hereby found and determined that this resolution shall constitute the declaration (or reaffirmation) of the County's "official intent" to reimburse (to the extent permitted) expenditures toward the Project with the proceeds of bonds, notes or other obligations, as required by United States Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2.

Section 6. It is hereby found and determined that the County Legislature has directed that an application for approval be prepared and submitted to the New York State Comptroller's office, believes the contents of the application to be accurate, has determined that the Project (and its proposed plan of financing) for which approval is being sought is in the public interest and will not constitute an undue burden on the properties which will bear the cost thereof, and if the cost of the proposed improvements is to be assessed in whole or in part against a benefited area, that all real property to be so assessed will be benefited by the proposed improvements and that no benefited property has been excluded. The Legislature understands that the attached application has been presented and approved in substantially complete and final form, but nevertheless authorizes and approves, in advance, such non-material modifications, amendments or revisions as may, in the opinion of the County Attorney and the County's bond counsel, be deemed appropriate.

Section 7. It is hereby directed that within ten (10) days after adoption of this Resolution, the Clerk of the County Legislature shall record with the Clerk of the County a copy of this Resolution, certified by the Clerk of the County Legislature.

Section 8. It is hereby directed that this resolution shall take effect immediately.



REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The Division of Sewer Management need repairs performed on their utility within the corridor of the Highways Division, Abbott Willet rehabilitation contract. Completing these repairs within the confines of the highways contract is a timely and efficient manner to complete this work with little or no additional hinderance to the travelling public. The coordination of these repairs benefit the County taxpayer by having the onsite Contractor make the repair.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

During the course of the Highway Division's rehabilitation of Abbott and Willett roads, the Division of Sewer Management discovered some required and necessary repairs to their structures along the sewers on these two roads. A request was forwarded to D&H Excavating of their ability to complete these repairs with their construction contract. It was determined the repairs could be completed within a not to exceed amount of \$70,000.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Without approval, the County will be unable to make these repairs and those sanitary structures within the road will continue to deteriorate and compromise the newly rehabilitate roadway. This compromised roadway affects rideability and safety of the users of these roads.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Upon Legislative approval, the County Executive will be permitted to execute change order to the contract and repairs will proceed.

SUMMARY

The Department of Public Works (DPW) is seeking authorization for the County Executive to enter into a contract with the design firm CPL Architecture, Engineering and Planning Team (CPL) and establish a project contingency. This contract and contingency are for the Rehabilitation of Dodge Road , from Hopkins Road to Transit Road in the Town of Amherst. The scope of this project is to replace storm drainage and rehabilitate the pavement.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Funds for the project are currently available from the approved Capital Budget, Funds Center 122, Fund 410, as follows:

The contract with CPL for design engineering services in the amount of \$518,124, with a project contingency in the amount of \$51,876 will not exceed the total budget of \$570,000.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

This project is necessary to advance the design of Dodge Road rehabilitation in a timely fashion. It is desired to execute a contract with CPL, utilizing existing funding. CPL is the recommended design engineers because of their expertise, experience, and manpower to provide the County of Erie with the services required.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Dodge Road, between Hopkins Road and Transit Road, is showing signs of significant pavement distress and has drainage issues. Failing drainage structures and poor pipe conditions indicate the need to replace the drainage system in this area. This portion of Dodge Road has a Road Score of 5 out of 10 (2023), along with a daily traffic count of 10,900 vehicles. The project objectives are to correct identified pavement deficiencies thus extending the useful life of the pavement, replace the stormwater drainage in the area, creating a structurally sound roadway.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If this project is not completed, there will be continued deterioration of the road surface, drainage issues and failures, decreased rideability and increased maintenance responsibilities.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Upon Legislative approval, the County Executive will enter into a contract with the design firm, CPL. Once the contract is executed, design work will begin immediately thereafter.

SUMMARY

The Department of Public Works (DPW) is seeking authorization for the County Executive to amend the 2022 On-Call General Civil Engineering and Land Survey Services Term Agreements with Greenman-Pedersen, Inc. (GPI) and DiDonato Associates Engineers and Architects (DiDonato). The original contracts were authorized by your Honorable Body in COMM 2E-21 (2023) on February 2, 2023, and included the initial funding for the three-year contract. This amendment adds additional funding to the original contracts. These contracts involve providing general civil engineering and land surveying services for problems or issues of a relative immediate nature that are of limited size or scope during the second-year term.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The authorization requested is a not-to-exceed amount of \$400,000 inclusive of both contracts. Funds for the project are currently available from the approved Capital Budget, Funds Center 123, Fund 420, SAP Project B.22011 - 2022 On Call General.

Tasks would be negotiated and assigned with the understanding that the aggregate costs of assigned tasks cannot exceed the above amount.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

There are many instances where general civil engineering and land survey services are required for problem or issues of a relatively immediate nature and of limited size or scope. Examples would include but are not limited to: define/ establishment of highway right of way boundaries, drainage issues, design of ADA compliant features for minor building or highway reconstruction, site utility issues and failures etc.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The On-Call Term Agreements allow the County to address the needs of its physical infrastructure more efficiently by shortening the time to address developing problems, problems which require professional assistance of limited size or scope and emergency and disaster related issues.

The funding in the original contracts has nearly been exhausted. This amendment for additional funding allows the contracts to continue and professional services provided during the three period of the contracts.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Without approval, the County will be unable to address new issues and assign tasks, as there is insufficient funding remaining. Urgent and/or arising issues may be delayed. Project assignments would have to go through the formal RFP, selection, approval and contracting process which can take weeks and limits the County's ability to react to and solve problems that arise.

Upon Legislative approval, the County Executive will be permitted to amend the contracts with GPI and DiDonato.

SUMMARY

The Department of Public Works is requesting authorization to increase the Construction Contingency by \$100,000.00 Rath Building Elevator Modernization project, previously approved by your Honorable Body via Comm. 4E-8 on March 3, 2022. The project site is located at 95 Franklin St., Buffalo, NY 14202.

The increase is necessary to address unforeseen conditions encountered during the execution of the project to address necessary safety concerns for operation of the elevator(s).

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Funds for the project are currently available from the approved Capital Budget, Funds Center 122, Fund 410, as follows:

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Additional Contingency funds are needed address unforeseen conditions encountered during execution of the project; it was determined that major components be replaced in freight elevators 9 and 13 for reliability, safety, and code compliance. Elevator 9 needed a new elevator drive machine, elevator 13 required pre-engineered platform rated for proper load, and both freight elevator shafts require structural repairs from corrosion and deterioration of masonry. The freight elevators have never been upgraded since the building opened in 1967.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Elevators 9 and 13 are essential for the operation of the County building to accept deliveries and move large, heavy payloads throughout the building for all departments. These elevators have not been upgraded since the building opened in 1967 and structural components have since deteriorated. Having these elevators out of service for a long period of time would be a detriment to the operations of the Rath Building. The Contingency Fund increase will allow the Elevator Modernization project to be completed.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If additional contingency for the project are not approved, the Rath building will not have safe, reliable, code compliant freight elevators for building operations.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Upon Legislative approval, the Construction Contingency will be increased.

WHEREAS, unforeseen conditions were encountered during the project that exposed deteriorated machine components and structural elements of freight elevators 9 & 13; and

WHEREAS, these freight elevators are designed to carry heavier loads than passenger elevators; and

WHEREAS, the unforeseen conditions must be addressed to ensure the safe, reliable conveyance of heavy materials in the building; and

WHEREAS, the unforeseen conditions made it necessary for the Construction Contingency Fund to be increased to address the concerns.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature hereby authorizes the Department of Public Works to increase the current construction contingency fund by \$100,000 with authorization for the County Executive to approve change orders in an amount not to exceed the Contingency fund; and be it further

SUMMARY

The accompanying resolution requests authority for the County Executive to enter into an agreement with Lightspeed Commerce Inc. for their Tee Time Software System. Lightspeed Commerce Inc. was selected through the County's RFP selection process to provide tee time software for the Golf Courses.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The estimated cost of the tee time software system is \$15,000. Funding is available in the Parks Operating Budget, Fund 110, Fund Center 16410, Account 516020 - Professional Services Contracts and Fees.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION/BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The current tee time software interface is difficult for patrons to navigate and provides suboptimal customer service to patrons and administrators. The Department of Parks, Recreation &
Forestry receives many complaints about the current software. To make tee time services more
user-friendly for both golfers and administrators, as well as to obtain a system which provides
more accessible, real-time, and usable data on golf course usage, the Department of Parks,
Recreation & Forestry was interested in exploring other tee time software options from vendors
who specialize in this specific type of product and service. The Department of Parks, Recreation
& Forestry is seeking to modernize its offerings and services to better serve our loyal and
growing body of golfers and patrons.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

The current tee time system used is outdated and not user friendly, which results in many complaints from the golfers when they are trying to book a tee time.



SUMMARY

The accompanying resolution requests authority for the County Executive to enter into a contract with P&A Group for Third Party Administration Services. This contract will cover the administration of Health Flexible Savings Accounts (HFSA), Dependent Care Assistant Accounts, Adoption Assistance Account, Parking and Transit Accounts, Health Reimbursement Accounts (HRA), COBRA Administration, and Retiree Billing Services. The agreed-upon pricing for these services is as follows:

• Health Flexible Spending Accounts: \$2.50 Price per Participant per Month (PPPM)

• Dependent Care Assistant Accounts: \$2.50 PPPM

Adoption Assistance Account: \$2.50 PPPM

• Parking and Transit Accounts: \$2.50 PPPM

• Health Reimbursement Accounts: \$2.50 PPPM

• Retiree Billing: \$3.75 PPPM

• COBRA Administration: \$0.39 per eligible employee per month.

P&A Group was selected through an open request for proposals (RFP) in accordance with County policy. The term of this contract will be for three (3) years, with an option for two (2) one-year extensions.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The contract costs are allocated per participant per month, based on the services utilized with funds available in the 2025 Personnel Budget Professional Services. The exact spending will depend on the number of participants enrolled in each of the services during the contract period. The effect of flexible spending accounts for taxpayers is net positive as Erie County saves on payroll taxes (specifically FICA taxes) because employee contributions to the accounts are pretax.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The services covered under this contract are either in the County's fiscal interests to continue to perform or are mandated by contract or law to provide. Specifically, COBRA Administration, Health Savings Accounts (HSA), Dependent Care and Health Flexible Spending Accounts (FSA), Parking, Health Reimbursement Accounts (HRA), and Retiree Billing Services are essential components of the County's employee benefits program, ensuring compliance with federal regulations, collective bargaining agreements, and other contractual obligations.

Administering these services requires specialized knowledge and expertise, particularly in areas such as COBRA compliance and the management of tax-advantaged accounts. Given the complexity and regulatory requirements involved, performing these services in-house would not be economically feasible or efficient. The County would face significant challenges in maintaining compliance, managing risks, and delivering the necessary level of service without incurring prohibitive costs.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Flexible Spending Accounts (FSAs) are employer-sponsored benefit programs that allow employees to set aside pre-tax dollars to cover eligible expenses. Health Care FSAs cover medical, dental, and vision expenses not reimbursed by insurance. Dependent Care FSAs are used for childcare or eldercare expenses incurred while the employee is at work. Adoption Assistance FSAs provide tax-free reimbursement for qualified adoption expenses, such as legal fees and adoption agency costs. Parking and Transit FSAs allow employees to use pre-tax funds to pay for eligible parking and transportation expenses related to commuting to work. Each type of FSA reduces taxable income and offers tax savings on specific types of expenses.

A Health Reimbursement Arrangement (HRA) is an employer-funded plan that reimburses employees for qualified medical expenses not covered by their health insurance. In several agreements with its collective bargaining units, Erie County has agreed to provide employees who retire with the county fifty percent of the monetary value of the lick leave they accrued to their credit at the hourly rate of pay in effect at the time of their retirement. The first cohort of employees who are qualified for this benefit can retire in 2025.

COBRA Administration under this contract involves managing the continuation of health insurance benefits for eligible employees and their dependents who experience a qualifying event, such as termination of employment (other than for gross misconduct), reduction in work hours, divorce, or the death of the covered employee.

Retiree Billing Services a new contracted service, is the administration of monthly billing and collection services for retirees' premiums for healthcare, dental, and other benefits in which the County is contractually obligated to provide. This includes managing enrollments, terminations, and changes in coverage, ensuring accurate and timely billing and collections, and providing customer support to address retirees' questions and concerns.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If the proposed contract with P&A Group is not approved, the County will face significant operational and compliance challenges. The absence of a third-party administrator for these critical employee benefit programs would place a substantial burden on County resources. The County would need to develop internal capabilities to administer these services, requiring substantial investment in personnel, training, and technology. This would likely result in inefficiencies, higher administrative costs, and a heightened risk of non-compliance with federal regulations, such as COBRA requirements, which could lead to legal liabilities and penalties.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Erie County will enter into contract with P&A Group effective January 1, 2025.

WHEREAS, the contract costs are allocated per participant per month based on the services utilized via available funding in the 2025 Personnel Budget Professional Services, with flexible spending accounts generating net savings for Erie County due to payroll tax (FICA) reductions; and

WHEREAS, failure to authorize this contract would result in significant operational challenges, including the need to develop costly internal capabilities to manage these services, potential inefficiencies, and the risk of non-compliance with federal regulation.

The Erie County Sheriff's Office and Health Department's Division of Emergency Medical Services is seeking authorization to create a part time Regional Medical Director position within the Division of Police Services. This position will provide the medical expertise necessary related to public health emergency planning and response, ambulance service delivery, Medical Emergency Radio System (MERS), EMT education, and operational medical services provided by the Erie County Sheriff's Office, and directing and supervising professional and technical personnel and medical volunteers in these services and others as needed.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The requested position will be created within the Sheriff's Office Division of Police Services (Fund 110, Funds Center 11510) with 50% of the cost paid via an interdepartmental billing with the Health Department Division of Emergency Medical Services (Fund 110, Funds Center 12720) beginning in 2025. SUMMARY

The Erie County Board of Elections has received three grant awards in the total amount of \$1,308,468.39 from the New York State Board of Elections. These funds are for operating costs related to the General Election to be held in November of 2024, costs related to providing prepaid postage on absentee and early vote by mail ballots, and costs related to the purchase of electronic poll books.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The County will be reimbursed with up to \$229,251.82 of state funds for eligible operating costs related to the General Election to be held in November of 2024, \$714,809.51 for eligible costs related to the costs of pre-paid return postage and outgoing postage on absentee ballots and early vote by mail ballots, and \$364,407.06 for eligible costs related to the purchase of electronic poll books. The County will receive 100% reimbursement for eligible expenses. No local share is required.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION & BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Presidential election years historically have higher voter turnout than non-presidential elections. This results in higher operating costs to boards of elections. New York State has anticipated this increased expense to local boards and authorized the 2024 General Election grant for only this years' election expenses. In 2023, the state legislature enacted early voting by mail ballots thereby increasing postage costs to local boards of elections. Additionally, Erie County began using electronic poll books to assist with the voting process in 2019. The Electronic Poll Book grant is necessary in order to maintain the program.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Failure to approve this request to accept the New York State grants will result in a loss of \$1,308,468.39 in funding that may be used to provide services and items including, but not limited to, election supplies, postage, equipment, and security costs.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The Erie County Board of Elections will work with the Division of Budget and Management and the Office of the Comptroller to accept the additional funding. The Division of Purchase will aid in the ordering of any materials and contracts necessary for the administration of the grants.

Robert Free opened the meeting by everyone joining virtually introducing themselves.

Public Hearing for Proposed New Sanitary Code, Article XXIII

- Tom Muscarella explained that we are here to introduce a new article to the Sanitary Code for permitting inspection and enforcement of retail tobacco, retail vapor and retail smoking.
- Jennifer Delaney spoke briefly that we had this public hearing, part two, because we needed to adjust the definition within the proposed tobacco of paraphernalia, as we had left out an important word to being inclusive of all facilities versus not being inclusive. That was the only change that was made.
- Tom Muscarella gave an update on offering training courses for the tobacco vendor employees. It is not a simple process, there would be a couple levels of software.
 There are other entities that teach this that are certified in New York State and several of them have online options. That could potentially be a solution.

Public Hearing was adjourned.

- Rob Free will send an email to all board members for a vote on the acceptance of the changes made to the sanitary code pertaining to tobacco, vapor and paraphernalia permitting and to accept the March 19th minutes.

II. FOOD POLICY COUNCIL

Collette McDonald, Coordinator for Food & Policy Council presented the Food Policy Updates

- FPC Sponsored the Erie County Local Government Food System Summit, May 21, 2024. The FPC, Department of Environment and Planning, Office of Health Equity, Rural Outreach Center, Cornell Cooperative Extension of Erie County, and UB Food Lab collaborated to host a Local Food Summit geared towards local government officials to examine food systems and offer examples of how food system change can be implemented into their work.
- 2024to help guide the next local food summit, hopefully next year.
- Collette mentioned that they have recently submitted to the Deputy County
 Executive, an updated list of suggested items for emergency food boxes. The FPC
 also submitted a grant proposal to be used for the "Find Fresh Erie County: project.
- Plans are being made to hold the summit annually and fill vacant seats in the council.

III. COMMISSIONER'S UPDATE

• Dr. Gale Burstein gave an update in that we continue to see increases in our Opiod related overdose deaths and our total overdose deaths. Through our pharmaceutical settlement fund's we've been able to be in contact with a media company called Impact about fentanyl and cocaine, and harm reduction and getting Narcan. In the meantime they did research, key informant interviews and focus groups to get more information about the community at risk and what their knowledge, attitudes and perceptions are. They sent us pilots of their bigger media campaign, we provided them with feedback. Now their scouting out locations to do shoots of individuals for the billboards and TV ads. They also have a set of demographic profiles of people in Erie County to be in those ads.

- NYS Health Department passed a law to create a registry for homes built before 1980 in areas they consider high risk for lead. These are homes that are not single, they all have to be inspected once a year. This will be a huge endeavor, it will be about 30,000 homes a year that need inspected. We will need to hire a lot of staff. The state was hoping we could rely on local municipal partners to do this work. Our local municipal partner is the City of Buffalo which has been all over the news that they're not doing housing and home safety inspections so we can't rely on them. Jen Delaney and Tom Muscarella are doing a great job in trying to build the program.
- We will be starting our summer health summer season of monitoring the beaches for fecal contamination.
- We also anticipate having a very high rate of food festivals which will keep Environmental Health very busy.
- It will be a very robust tick season. State Health Department sent out some information to Health Care Providers warning them that we're already seeing tick related disease in New York State. We will get messages out warning people about lyme disease caused by of tick bites.
- The Family Planning Clinic is getting busier. We're offering medication abortions so
 patients are coming in asking for these services. We want to make sure we can
 meet the reproductive health needs of the community.
- We're seeing a huge increase in chlamydia cases. I'm trying to educate the clinics in the city of Buffalo that provide any type of sexual health services about this. I am also talking to the colleges and universities about this in their student health.
- The Medical Examiner's Office renovation should be done this fall and will have an open house.
- A New Office of Health Equity report that includes a lot of focus groups and key informant interviews to people in the community that are difficult to reach.
- We will be participating in the Pride Day Parade dispensing Narcan.

Annual Report of Activities for 2023

Executive Summary: The Erie County Board of Ethics provides an Annual Report of Activities to the Erie County Legislature and County Executive. The report identifies the legislative authority, powers and duties of the Board, membership and frequency of meetings.

The Board received complaints about alleged ethical violations, requests for disclosure under FOIL and requests for opinions or actions. These included requests to investigate the conduct of elected officials, the right of individuals to hold elective offices as well as being employed by the County, as well as some issues outside the jurisdiction of the Board.

The Board also was asked for or provided opinions on potential conflicts of interest of current or future employees. The Board answered questions concerning completing the Annual Financial Disclosure Form. Board also received and reviewed all Annual Financial Disclosure Forms. The Board contacted filers with incomplete forms and sought additional information to clarify initial submissions. The Board also sent follow-up letters to specific individuals identifying potential conflicts of interest.

The 2023 Financial Disclosure Forms (for calendar year 2023) included edits and explanations to clarify information requested and reduce errors and the need for follow-ups. http://www2.erie.gov/ethics/sites/www2.erie.gov.ethics/files/uploads/Financial-Disclosure-Form.pdf

The Erie County Board of Ethics is an independent administrative unit of Erie County. The Board's powers and duties are derived from the updated Code of Ethics County Law (2-2018) and New York State Municipal Law Article 18. Section 10 (d) of the Code provides that "the Board shall be the repository for completed annual statements of financial disclosure required by this local law." Erie County employees who are elected officials or in policy-making positions or able to make County policy are required to complete an Annual Statement of Financial Disclosure for the County of Erie by May 15. Those who must file also include members of administrative boards, chairs of county political parties, and candidates for elective offices. The Board of Elections was again notified of this need.

The Erie County Board of Ethics was established and exists pursuant to the provisions of Article 19 of the Erie County Code, as amended. The Board is charged with enforcing and implementing the provisions of the Erie County Code of the Ethics, Local Law No. 2-2018 (hereafter 'Code') pursuant to operating procedures that govern the Board. The Board shall have the power and duty to:

- A. Initiate and receive complaints of violations of any of the provisions of the Code;
- B. Conduct investigations, inquiries and hearings concerning any matter covered by the Code;
- C. Subpoena persons or documents and, by a majority vote, issue subpoenas to the fullest extent authorized by law;
- D. Determine whether to investigate and whether to act upon any particular complaint;
- E. Request the assistance of other appropriate agencies in conducting investigations;
- F. Consult with County agencies, officials and employees on matters involving ethical conduct which are specific to the County of Erie Board of Ethics;
- G. Recommend such legislative action as it may deem appropriate to effectuate the policies within the Code;
- H. Promulgate rules and regulations for the conduct of Board of Ethics activities, including procedural rules consistent with the requirements of due process of law;

- I. Prescribe forms for the disclosure and registration of information as provided in the Code;
- J. Render advisory opinions with respect to the provisions of the Code;
- K. Advise any individual whose acts are the subject of a complaint to the board and consult with such individual early in the process;
- L. Accept and consider complaints of violations of the Code, and offer recommendations with respect to remedies for violation of that chapter; and
- M. Provide an annual report to the Erie County Legislature and the County Executive with respect to the actions of the Ethics Board during the preceding calendar year.

The Board met nine times during 2023. All meetings were posted with the Ethics Board Minutes as well on the Board's website. The following were significant issues dealt with by the Board during 2023:

1. Recommendations to the Legislature:

- a. The Board again recommends that the Legislature amend the Code of Ethics to include issues of nepotism. Model language is included from the 2014, City of Lockport Code of Ethics that added the following: § 18-15 Nepotism. Except as otherwise required by law: A. Effective *****, no municipal officer or employee, either individually or as a member of a board, may participate in any decision specifically to appoint, hire, promote, discipline or discharge a relative for any position at, for or within the municipality or a municipal board. Effective *****, no municipal officer or employee may supervise a relative in the performance of the relative's official powers or duties. This request has been outstanding for years without resolution by the County.
- b. The Board again recommends that, at the time of appointment or election, elected officials, affected employees and board members should be notified of the requirement to file Annual Financial Disclosures with the Board for the year they are elected or appointed.
- c. The law requires that candidates for County offices are required to file timely Financial Disclosure with the Board of Ethics. The Board of Ethics is required to request a list of candidates for elected office from the Board of Elections. The Board again recommends that the Legislature clarify which agency is required to notify candidates of the filing requirement. This Board has notified the Board of Elections with respect to this requirement.
- d. The Board again requests that electronic signatures on Financial Disclosures be allowed to facilitate electronic submission of the form, thus reducing time, storage issues, and costs.
- 2. Communications: The Erie County Board of Ethics website http://www2.erie.gov/ethics/ and email erieethicsboard@gmail.com continued to be updated to improve public communication directly to and from the Board. The Chief Ethics Officer coordinates Website updates, including meeting schedules, reports, agenda, minutes, updated Rules and Regulations and the current Financial Disclosure Form. When possible, drafts of monthly minutes are posted two weeks following meetings. Email requests are forwarded to the Chair who responds between meetings, when practicable. A new Website was formatted on April, 2021: https://www3.erie.gov/ethics/

a. Website updated with 2023 meeting minutes, future meeting dates in 2024, draft agenda and updated Annual Report, Rules & Regulations, and Financial Disclosure Forms. A link to meeting recordings by Legislature staff is established on the Board website (http://www2.erie.gov/legislature/index.php?q=erie-county-board-ethics).

b. Communications were received requesting advice on completion of the Disclosure Form. There were also complaints about alleged ethical violations, requests for copies of

disclosures under FOIL and requests for opinions or actions.

c. The Annual Report of Activities for 2022 was submitted in August 2023 to the Legislature and County Executive http://www2.erie.gov/ethics/sites/www2.erie.gov.ethics/files/uploads/2016%20Annual%2 oReport%20Board%20of%20Ethics%20PDF.pdf.

d. FOIL requests for Financial Disclosure Forms were received and answered. Requests were primarily disclosures of elected officials and candidates for elective offices. All those whose Financial Disclosures were released under FOIL are required to receive notice when their information is disclosed. Many FOIL requests that asked for electronic copies of Financial Disclosures were unable to be honored, because many forms are submitted by hard copy and original signatures. Some information related to minors is redacted. The Board may reconsider these requests for electronic copies as more forms are submitted electronically. No fees were waived for production of copies.

e. An issue was raised with respect to the County Executive driving during a ban on driving in a blizzard. The Board concluded that the driving was in connection with his official

position.

f. If a FOIL request is made in the future, the Board will identify the person making the request and what documents are being requested. We will also send a copy of the Board's response to the subject of the complaint. If the request is for a history of complaints, both the cover letter and the information request will include the disclaimer that a complaint is not evidence of an ethics violation. We will redact phone numbers from any documents provided. Our minutes will identify the complainant and the subject of the complaint.

g. The Board also received links to copies of the Legislature Submissions Pursuant to Erie County Code of Ethics, Disclosure of Family Members Employed by any governmental

agencies.

h. The Board submitted a formal request to the County Executive for a Chief Ethics Officer position to manage executive functions such as answering inquiries, following up disclosures, working with departments and Boards and outlining and writing investigations for the Board. The responsibilities of the Board have expanded in the years since the revision of the Local Law. Members of the volunteer Board do not have, nor can they be expected to spend, the time required to manage these expanded duties in the timely manner. All but one of the Board members is employed in a full-time capacity in positions outside of County government.

3. Complaints and requests for investigations:

a. The Board addressed an inquiry received with respect to potential conflicts of interest with the Supervisor of the Town of Evans also holding office as a Deputy County Comptroller. An investigation was undertaken and information with respect to the duties was forwarded to the Personnel Office.

b. A question was raised with respect to the Town Clerk of the Town of West Seneca also acting

as the head of the Town Democratic Party.

c. A request was received by a resident with respect to the timely posting of minutes and agendas. The Chief Ethics Officer examined the situation and worked with the Personnel Office to ensure a more timely posting of same. The actual location of the meeting will now be posted on the door entering the building.

d. The Chief Ethics Officer in concert with the County Attorney's Office developed a PowerPoint presentation for County employees on ethics for training purposes.

e. Some complaints and requests for investigations were outside the authority of the Board of Ethics. All complainants were given information on other venues available to pursue their complaints.

- f. Reviews with respect to the Stadium Inclusion Task Force and issues involving the interrelationships between Peaceprints of WNY, and the Erie County Corrections Specialist Advisory Board were undertaken.
- g. A request was made to examine a complaint of a conflict of interest involving the County Executive by a political opponent. The consensus of the majority of the Board was that the Board lacked the jurisdiction to undertake the review.
- h. A request was made to review the definition of spouse and relative with respect to the Code.
- i. An initial request was made by the outgoing Supervisor of the Town of Cheektowaga for ethics training for the Town Board of Ethics, but was not followed up by the new Town Supervisor.
- j. An inquiry was made with respect to the Town of Alden, but the matter was referred to the Town Ethics Board.
- k. The Board provides continued advice to county department on various issues.
- 4. Financial Disclosures Letters were sent to department heads on February 2023 requesting lists of employees and board members required to file 2022 Financial Disclosures.
 - a. Only minor updates to the 2022 Financial Disclosure Form were made to the form for purposes of clarification and to reduce errors. All forms must be hand signed. The Board reviewed the current barriers to use of electronic signatures on the forms (See recommendations to the Legislature above.). Scanned forms would be sent to a secure email address and faxed forms would be sent to a secure line.
 - b. Departments and Boards submitted lists of those required to file disclosures for 2022. The Board of Elections also provided names of possible candidates for elective offices as required by Ethics Law 2018 section 4c.
 - c. Financial Disclosure Forms were printed and distributed by mail or by personal service on April 2023, as required by law.
 - d. All 325 of the required financial disclosures were received after sending delinquent letters to less than ten filers, imposing a penalty of \$2000 which could be waived upon receipt of their Financial Disclosures. All penalties were waived after timely submissions.
 - e. The Board as a whole reviewed all 325 of the individual disclosure forms for completeness and possible ethical violations.
 - f. Twenty-four disclosures required follow-up contacts by Chair or the Support Staff, as authorized by the Board. Follow-up communications were routinely required in instance of missed questions, missed pages, unclear abbreviations and unclear descriptions of membership on Boards. The Chair sent five letters cautioning against potential conflicts of interest. These five letters to elected officials or Board members cautioned them about avoiding conflicts of interest and informing them about any necessary recusals and requirements to report these potential conflicts to the Clerk of Legislature and the County Attorney. (The Board utilizes templates to request additional information, to warn of potential conflicts of interest, or to notify individuals that they had violated county law by accepting gifts in excess of allowable amounts. Copies are also sent to the department heads and the District Attorney, when appropriate.)
 - g. After all reviews, the Board noted ways to reduce errors and increase accuracy and made recommendations for improvement to the Financial Disclosure Form for the following year.
 - h. The Financial Disclosure Form is in pre-fillable format on the website but still requires actual signatures. In the future, the Board request that the county create an

online Form able to accept an electronic signature. An electronic submission (fillable PDF) with proper signature provisions would substantially reduce paperwork, storage, and printing costs.

5. Erie County Board of Ethics Rules & Regulations

a. The Board maintained the policy on confidentiality of identities of complainants, subjects of complaints and results of investigations as effected by public information (i.e., news). Where parties to a complaint or request for investigation have disclosed their role in the matter in public (i.e. public meetings or in public media) the Board may also chose to discloses the names and issues at Board meetings which it determined to do. "Section 6.13 Policy of Confidentiality Investigations and consideration by the Board of potential violations of the Ethics Code shall be conducted confidentially and shall not be disclosed to the public, except as necessary to carry out the powers and duties of the Board. The final determination of the Board on an Investigation shall be made available to the public with such deletions as may be necessary to prevent disclosures of any information the Board determines to be confidential, in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act, as amended." Ethics Board Policy and Procedures.

6. Other Issues:

a. Since 2019 the Erie County Personnel Department requires completion of an Annual Erie County Code of Ethics Employee Disclosure Forms for all employees. The Personnel Department sends employees this financial disclosure for those not required to file the Annual Form from the Board of Ethics. This has created some confusion. Although this is not within the purview of the Board, the Board of Ethics continues to recommend that these completed disclosure forms be reviewed by Departments before filing in personnel folders.
