WHEREAS, C. Douglas Kohler, esteemed teacher at Clarence Middle School and Erie County Historian, has achieved the distinguished honor of a New York Emmy Award for his work as a historical consultant and scriptwriter for WNED-TV's Compact History series, winning in the Informational/Instructional - Short or Long Form Content category; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Kohler's contributions to the Emmy-winning episode, "Battling for Fossils? LL INTRO. 2-1 (2024)

LOCAL LAW TO BE ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE IN THE COUNTY OF ERIE LOCAL LAW INTRO. – NO. __2-1___ - 2024 LOCAL LAW – NO. _____ - 2024

A LOCAL LAW requiring transparent, searchable databases for expenditures accessible and available to the public.

SECTION 1. Title

This law shall be entitled and known as "The Tax Dollar Disclosure Act."

SECTION 2. Legislative Intent

The Erie County Legislature recognizes that taxpayers should have easy access to details on how the county is spending their tax dollars and what performance results are achieved for those expenditures. It is the intent of the Legislature, therefore, to direct the Erie County Comptroller to create and maintain a searchable budget database website detailing where, for what purpose, and what results are achieved for all taxpayer investments in county government.

SECTION 3. Definitions

AGENCY

A county department, division, office, bureau, board, commission, committee, or unit. This includes individual county agencies and programs, as well as those programs and activities that cross agency lines. "County agency" includes all elective offices in Erie County government.

AUDIT OR REPORT

Shall include any audit or report issued by the state, county, legislature, legislative committee, comptroller or executive body relating to the entity or recipient of funds or the budget program/activity or agency.

COMPTROLLER

The Erie County Comptroller.

ENTITY/AND OR RECIPIENTS

- A. a corporation,
- B. an association,

- C. a union,
- D. a limited liability company,
- E. a limited liability partnership,
- F. any other legal business entity including non-profits,
- G. grantees,
- H. contractors, and
- I. a county, city, or other local government entity.
- J. "Entity/and or recipients" does not include an individual recipient of public assistance.

FUNDING SOURCE

The account from which the expenditure is appropriated, inclusive of all budgeted accounts.

FUNDING ACTION OR EXPENDITURE

Shall include details on the type of spending (grant, contract, appropriations, etc.). This includes tax exemptions or credits. Where possible, a hyperlink to the actual expenditure document (in a format that is, at a minimum, as searchable as a searchable PDF format) shall be provided.

LEGISLATURE

The Erie County Legislature.

SEARCHABLE BUDGET DATABASE WEBSITE

A website that allows the public, at no cost, to:

- A. Search and aggregate information for the following:
 - 1. the name and principal location or residence of the entity/and or recipients of funds,
 - 2. the amount of funds expended,
 - 3. the funding or expending agency,
 - 4. the funding source of the revenue expended,
 - 5. the budget program/activity of the expenditure,

- 6. a descriptive purpose for the funding action or expenditure,
- 7. the expected performance outcome for the funding action or expenditure,
- 8. the past performance outcomes achieved for the funding action or expenditure,
- 9. any audit or report relating to the entity or recipient of funds or the budget program/activity or agency,
- 10. and any other relevant information specified by the Comptroller.
- B. Programmatically search and access all data in a serialized machine-readable format (such as XML) via a web-services application programming interface.

SECTION 4. Searchable Budget Database Website Created

By October 1, 2024, the Comptroller shall develop and make publicly available a single, searchable budget database website including the required data for the most recent county budget. The website shall be given a unique and simplified website address. Each county agency that maintains a generally accessible Internet site or for which a generally accessible Internet site is maintained shall include a link on the front page of the agency's Internet site to the budget database website.

SECTION 5. Updates

The Comptroller shall provide guidance to agency heads to ensure compliance with this section. The searchable budget database website shall be updated as new data becomes available, if feasible, but no later than 30 days upon receipt of data from the agency.

The Comptroller shall ensure that all data added to the searchable budget database website remains accessible to the public for a minimum of six years.

SECTION 6. Compliance with the Act

The Comptroller shall not be considered in compliance with this act if the data required for the searchable budget database website is not available in a searchable and aggregate manner and/or the public is redirected to other government websites, unless each of those sites has information from all agencies and each category of information required can be searched electronically by field in a single search.

SECTION 7. Severability

If any part or provision of this chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision or application directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remainder of this chapter or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances. The County of Erie hereby declares that it would have passed this chapter or the remainder thereof had such invalid application or invalid provision been apparent.

SECTION 8. Repealer

All ordinances, local laws, and parts thereof inconsistent with this chapter are hereby repealed; provided, however, that such repeal shall not affect or impair any act done or right accruing, accrued, or acquired, or penalty, charge, liability, forfeiture, or punishment incurred or owing prior to the time such repeal takes effect, but the same may be enjoyed, asserted, collected, enforced, prosecuted, or inflicted as fully and to the same extent as if such repeal had not been effected. All actions and proceedings, civil or criminal, commenced under or by virtue of any provision of any County of Erie local law, ordinance or resolution so repealed, and pending immediately prior to the taking effect of such repeal, may be prosecuted and defended to final effect in the same manner as they might if such provisions were not so repealed.

SECTION 9. Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect on October 1, 2024.

LOCAL LAW TO BE ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE IN THE COUNTY OF ERIE LOCAL LAW INTRO. – NO. _______ - 2024 LOCAL LAW – NO. ______ - 2024

A LOCAL LAW requiring meetings of Erie County Boards and Advisory Committees to provide access to information to the public.

SECTION 1. Title

This law shall be entitled and known as "The Meetings Transparency Act."

SECTION 2. Legislative Intent

The Erie County Legislature recognizes that taxpayers should have easy access to details discussed and acted upon at public meetings. The Erie County Legislature prepares an agenda which it posts prior to session, streams and has available for replay video of the meeting and posts the minutes of meeting for review. Readily available technology should be used to increase access to similar discussions and actions of commissions and boards.

SECTION 3. Definitions

BOARD

Any government board, commission, council, committee, advisory committee, panel or similar group that is created pursuant to the Erie County Charter, Code or Local Law.

SECTION 4. Meeting Minutes

Boards shall keep written minutes summarizing all official actions, discussions, public comments, and votes taken at each meeting.

Draft minutes shall be made available to the public within 10 business days after each meeting.

Minutes shall be officially approved at the board's next public meeting and a final version posted publicly online within 5 business days after approval. The minutes also must be submitted to the Clerk of the Legislature to be included in the official record.

SECTION 5. Notice and Agendas

Boards shall give public notice at least 7 calendar days prior to any regular meeting by prominently posting the date, time, location, and agenda on the general Erie County website, as well as the website of the Erie County Legislature.

For special or emergency meetings, notice should be provided as soon as is practicable.

Meeting agendas shall include a list of topics to be discussed, a list of invited speakers, and indicate if any votes or official actions are anticipated.

SECTION 6. Broadcast and Recording of Meetings

To the extent feasible, boards should also provide a live stream of meetings for public viewing. Erie County is required to make appropriate accommodation for each board to make this possible. If a live stream is not possible, meetings should at minimum be video recorded and the recording should be posted on the general Erie County website.

SECTION 7. Public Access to Records

Boards shall maintain information to be posted on Erie County's website providing access to board member information, past meeting minutes, agendas, recordings, reports, resolutions, and other official documents.

Upon public request, boards shall provide copies or electronic access to such records in a timely manner as allowable by public records laws.

SECTION 8. Public Comment

Boards should provide reasonable opportunities for public comment at each meeting.

Any restrictions on public comment shall be viewpoint-neutral and clearly stated in the board's policies.

SECTION 9. Compliance

Originating governmental bodies shall establish procedures to monitor and ensure compliance with this law.

SECTION 10. Severability

If any part or provision of this chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision or application directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remainder of this chapter or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances. The County of Erie hereby declares that it would have passed this chapter or the remainder thereof had such invalid application or invalid provision been apparent.

SECTION 11. Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect on September 1, 2024.

LOCAL LAW INTRO. NO. 5-2-2024

LOCAL LAW NO. -2024

A Local Law amending Local Law 1-1959, constituting the Erie County Charter, as amended, in relation to the amending of Section 202.2 for the purpose of setting the terms of legislative office to four (4) years and limiting the number of terms for that can be held to three (3) four-year terms for all elected officials.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT

The intent of this legislation is to amend the terms of office for the Erie County of Legislature to a term of four (4) years and to limit the number of terms for all elected officials that can be served to three (3) four-year terms.

Section 2. CHANGING THE TERM OF LEGISLATIVE OFFICE AND LIMITING THE NUMBER OF TERMS FOR ALL ELECTED OFFICIALS

Erie County Local Law number one of nineteen hundred fifty-nine, as amended, constituting the Erie County Charter, is hereby amended as follows:

Article 2, Section 202.2. Election and terms of office. County legislators shall first be elected at the general election in the year nineteen hundred sixty-seven and shall assume office on January first, nineteen hundred sixty-eight. All elected County legislators shall hold their respective offices for a term of two years: provided, that legislators elected in the year two thousand twenty-six and in subsequent years shall hold their offices for four years. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County legislator if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof.

Article 3, Section 301. The County Executive; election; term; qualifications. The executive branch of County government shall be administered by the County Executive who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election and shall be for four years, except that the term of the County Executive elected in nineteen hundred sixty shall be for three years. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County Executive if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or

her office and shall hold no other public office, except as provided in section three hundred seven hereof.

Article 18, Section 1801. Election; Comptroller's Act repealed. There shall be a County Comptroller who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election and shall be for four years. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County Comptroller if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office. The Erie County Comptroller's Act, being chapter four hundred twenty three of the laws of nineteen hundred thirty-nine as amended, is hereby repealed, as of January first, nineteen hundred sixty-one.

Article 19, Section 1901. Election. There shall be a County Clerk who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election, and shall be for four years except as otherwise provided in this Charter. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County Clerk if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office.

Article 20, Section 2001. Election. There shall be a District Attorney who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election, and shall be for four years except as otherwise provided in this Charter. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as District Attorney if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office.

Article 21, Section 2101. Election. There shall be a Sheriff who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election and shall be for four years except as otherwise provided in this Charter. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as Sheriff if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of

the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office.

Section 3. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Local Law shall take effect the first day of the first fiscal year after receiving an affirmative vote of a majority of the qualified electors of the County of Erie in a manner consistent with the provisions of New York State Municipal Home Rule Law Article 3 and upon its subsequent filing with the New York Secretary of State.

Section 4. SEVERABILITY

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this Local Law or the application thereof, to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity or circumstance, shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional such order of judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this Local Law or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or order shall be rendered.

LOCAL LAW INTRO. NO. 7-1 -2024

LOCAL LAW NO. -2024

A Local Law, named the "STUNT Law", requiring Erie County to expand penalties for speed contests, stunt behavior, and other reckless driving behaviors that endanger Erie County residents.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Title.

This Local Law shall be known as the "STUNT Law: Safeguarding Traffic, Unlawful Racing, and Noise Transgressions."

Section 2. Legislative Purpose and Intent.

This Legislature recognizes that speeding has been a significant factor in numerous motor vehicle fatalities over the past decades, with motor vehicle accidents being one of the leading causes of death for individuals aged 1 to 54.

The Legislature acknowledges the rise in popularity of illegal vehicle sideshows, demonstrations, and contests; often shared on social media, which pose a great risk to participants and spectators, leading to severe physical injuries and even death.

Moreover, illegal vehicle sideshows, contests, street racing, and related stunt behavior not only endanger lives and property but also create excessive noise during night hours, causing disturbances for residents in neighboring areas.

The current penalties for these illegal activities are insufficient in deterring individuals from participating in them.

Therefore, the purpose of this Local Law is to protect Erie County residents by expanding and strengthening laws and penalties related to unlawful speed contests, sideshows, and related stunt behavior.

Section 3. Definitions.

As used in this Local Law, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

"Burnout" – To spin a vehicle's wheel(s) while keeping the vehicle stationary, causing the tires to heat up and emit smoke.

- "Drifting" The intentional oversteering of a vehicle with loss of traction while maintaining control, resulting in a controlled skid or power slide through a turn.
- "Doughnut" A maneuver performed by rotating the rear or front of a vehicle around the opposite set of wheels, creating a circular skid mark pattern on the road surface.
- "Revving" To rapidly increase the engine speed while a vehicle is stationary or in neutral, producing loud noise and/or causing the vehicle to jerk or lurch.
- "Sideshow" An event in which vehicles gather and engage in reckless behavior, such as performing stunts, burnouts, doughnuts/wheelies, drifting, and/or other dangerous maneuvers.
- "Street Racing" The act of racing or competing with one or more vehicles on a public highway, street, or road, whether prearranged or spontaneous.
- "Stunt Behavior" Performing any maneuver with a vehicle that is not part of normal driving or exceeds the safe limits of the vehicle; including but not limited to stunts, revving, burnout, drifting, doughnuts, acrobatic maneuvers, jumps, and other similar actions.
- "Wheelie" -- Raising a vehicle to the degree that one or more wheels lose contact with the ground.

Section 4. Prohibitions.

- (A) No person shall knowingly participate in, engage in, organize, facilitate, coordinate, plan, aid, or abet any street race, sideshow, contest, exhibition, or stunt behavior involving vehicles upon any public highway, street, sidewalk, public parking lot or area, or any other public property within Erie County.
- (B) No person shall knowingly obstruct or attempt to obstruct any public highway, street, or road with a motor vehicle, or any other object used as a blockade for the purpose of permitting any such race, sideshow, contest, exhibition, or stunt behavior.

Section 5. Enforcement and Penalties for Offenses.

(A) Any person who violates any provision of this article shall be guilty of a violation, punishable by a fine not exceeding \$500 for a first offense, and a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or by imprisonment for a period not exceeding 15 days, or both, for each subsequent offense.

(B) Any person who causes physical injury to another person or damage to real or personal property while violating any provision of this article shall be liable for the payment of restitution, as determined by a court of competent jurisdiction.

Section 6. Severability.

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of the local law which shall remain in full force and effect except as limited by such order or judgment.

Section 7. SEQRA Compliance.

This County Legislature determines that this local law constitutes a "Type II action" pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA), and that no further action under SEQRA is required.

Section 8. Effective Date.

This local law shall take effect immediately following its filing with the Office of the Secretary of State.

The Isle View Enhancement Project is primarily focused on the renewal and enhancement of Isle View Park, and its connections to both the Shoreline Trail and adjacent upland areas. The Project will include the following:

- 1. Construct a multi-use ramp connection with overlook between Isle View Park and River Road.
- 2. Northern entrance improvements, including realignment of park entrance road, new signage, relocation of parking, new pedestrian connections, and miscellaneous entranceway improvements and amenities.
- 3. Replacement of dilapidated benches and installation of new picnic tables.
- 4. Installation of new inclusive playground equipment.
- 5. Selective asphalt repair and parking lot repaving.
- 6. Repair of waterside overlooks.
- 7. Demolition of existing River Dogs building and construction of new park pavilion.
- 8. Miscellaneous landscape improvements, including the addition of rain gardens.

Reasons Supporting this Determination:

The County has identified the relevant areas of environmental concern and has taken a hard look at each of the identified areas as required by SEQRA. The County compared the Action with the criteria for determining significance identified in 6 NYCRR § 617.7(c)(1) and in accordance with 6 NYCRR § 617.7(c)(2) and (3). The County has completed Parts 2 and 3 of the Full Environmental Assessment Form ("FEAF"), and, as indicated below in the discussion of each criterion specified in 6 NYCRR § 617.7(c)(1), the Action will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment.

Re: Designation of Tourism Promotion Agency for 2024-2025

WHEREAS, the development, expansion and promotion of tourist travel to Erie County are of great benefit to the citizens of Erie County; and

WHEREAS, tourism spending in Erie County is reflected in bed and sales tax collections, as well as spurring a positive economic impact on amateur and professional sporting events, shopping, arts and culture and the hospitality industry; and

WHEREAS, this positive impact helps hold down property taxes and spurs economic growth and job creation; and

WHEREAS, in 1977, the New York State Legislature enacted the New York State Tourism Promotion Act to enable counties in the state to draw down funds to support their marketing and advertising campaigns; and

SUMMARY

The resolution authorizes the County Executive to execute a PILOT Agreement extension with Packard Building Housing Development Fund Corp., Packard Building LLC, and the City of Buffalo.

The owner is seeking the extension of a PILOT from the City of Buffalo and Erie County consistent with the PILOT Policy adopted by the Erie County Legislature on December 16, 1999.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

In accordance with the PILOT policy, the proposed PILOT payment for the Packard Building project shall be based on a payment of \$21,712.96 in year 1 and would escalate by 3% each year for an additional fifteen-year term. The payment Schedule A lists the payments for the 15 years of the Agreement.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The City of Buffalo supports the PILOT and on October 15, 2024, the Common Council of the City of Buffalo approved the Packard Building PILOT Agreement extension. The project conforms to the provisions of Article XI of the New York Private Housing Finance Law.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The residential project is located at 1325 Main Street in the City of Buffalo, zip code 14209. The project consists of forty (40) existing apartment units. Units in the project will be low-income for households with at least sixty (60) percent of the tenants earning less than sixty (60) percent of the area median income (AMI). The original PILOT Agreement was approved in 2006.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Without the PILOT, it would not be economically feasible for Packard Building Housing Development Fund Corporation and/or Packard Building LLC to operate the project as it is currently structured.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The County Executive or Deputy County Executive will enter into a PILOT Agreement with the noted parties.

Dear Commissioner Rybicki,

I have received numerous complaints from residents and officials in the Town of Hamburg about neighborhood disturbances, including theft and trespassing, around area hotels that I am told the County is renting. Specifically, the complaints focus on the former Comfort Inn and Suites at 3615 Commerce Parkway and the former Holiday Inn Express at 3565 Commerce Parkway. It is my understanding that both hotels no longer operate under those national labels currently.

I am being told that the County is renting these hotels to house migrants that have ended up in our care. However, last year, your predecessor assured the legislature in a public meeting that no migrants or non-citizens are recipients of Erie County social services. At that time, we were told Erie County Social Services administers a program to house homeless people in hotels and they have been placed in Hamburg. I have relayed that understanding to those who have contacted me, but the frequency of complaints I receive on this matter forces me to seek clarification.

I would appreciate your answer to the following questions:

- Does Erie County Social Services provide any benefits to migrants or those who have entered our country illegally?
- Does Erie County Social Services provide any benefits to non-US Citizens?
- Is Erie County renting hotels in Hamburg, and for what purpose?
- If so, what state or federal program are these rentals related to?
 - o How many people are being housed in these hotels?
 - What is this program costing taxpayers?
- Is the county renting hotels anywhere else in the county, and if so, for what purpose?
- Does the county work with local police departments and town officials to help select these hotels and work with them to mitigate problems those we are housing cause?

I look forward to your response and hope to discuss this issue further at an upcoming committee meeting in the Legislature.

I am writing this letter in regards to the status of the post-foster care grant to be administered by the Department of Social Services. As you recall, the Legislature included a budget resolution in the 2024 Budget (Resolution #117 (2024)) to fund \$400,000 for a program to serve residents who have recently aged-out of traditional foster care programs, also known as foster care alumni.

The intent of the funding is to provide wrap-around services to assist these residents as they transition into fully independent persons. The resolution called for an RFP with a scope of work to provide a central hub of resources and referrals on life skill topics like, obtaining housing, job readiness, financial literacy, education, and other vital areas necessary for independence.

The Legislature was in contact with your Administration in August of this year requesting a status update on the release of the RFP for this initiative. We received a response that the RFP would be released in October. As of today, the RFP has not been released.

I understand that new, innovative programming can take time to develop, but it is vital to the success of this initiative that this process is initiated as quickly as possible to ensure that funding for the foster care alumni program is still available before we close out the 2024 fiscal year.

I am requesting that the release of the post-foster care program RFP be prioritized and expediated so we can get these important services implemented as soon as possible.

Please let me know when the RFP will be released. Thank you for your attention to this letter.

Steven Hawkins

Steve "Hawk" Hawkins is the owner of Capt. Bob's Outdoors on Main Street in Clarence. He is a Western New York native, born in Tonawanda, and has over 55 years of angling experience fish area waters - as well as throughout Canada and the Caribbean. Hawk is a NY State licensed fishing guide and has been managing small ponds and lakes (up to 50 acres in size) since 1994. He presently manages eight private ponds and lakes in Western NY and hopes to teach you how to best utilize your present resources to customize your goals for a better place to fish at your private lake. To date, Hawk has reeled in 102 different species of fish. His first fish was a bullhead from Chautaugua Lake back in 1966 using a bamboo pole that was 16 feet long. Back in the day, he won the Heim Middle School Outdoor Education Sixth Grade Fishing Camp contest with a one-day catch of 153 fish - narrowly beating the second place fisherman by two fish back in 1973. 

SUMMARY

This proposed resolution will allow the Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Services to enter into a multi-year contract with the Western New York Law Enforcement Helpline to provide a tailored and comprehensive peer-based support service for all first responders as well as their families. The goal of this project is to provide an evidence-based model of peer intervention that is inclusive of pre-crisis exposure training and provides direct access to services for all first responders and their families. The Western New York Law Enforcement Helpline was chosen after a request for public proposals was advertised.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

No additional County Funds are required as existing appropriations for year one is available in Fund 110, Funds Center 16700, Account-516020 Professional Service Contracts and Fees. Prior years will be budgeted for in the General Fund Budget.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION/BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Through the partnership between Eric County Departments of Mental Health, Central Police Services and Homeland Security and Emergency Services there is a strong focus on the mission to promote first responder wellness and support mental health. The goal of this project is to fund an evidence-based model of direct access for first responders and their families to peer intervention services that are inclusive of pre-crisis exposure and disaster-related training. This in turn will assist in the reduction of negative outcomes associated with poor first responder behavioral health.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Without this Legislation, the training and more robust access for first responders and their families will not occur, therefore the gap within the first responder community to address the emotional health needs of both responders and their families will not be addressed.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Services will complete the contractual process with the Western New York Law Enforcement Helpline and execute program goals.



SUMMARY

ECDOH's Children with Special Needs Division contracts with many Preschool Special Education Programs to provide related services to children, but are currently experiencing capacity issues. Children are waiting to receive mandated services listed in their Individualized Education Plans. New York State Education Department (NYSED) requires that if a school district within Erie County mandates therapy services for children, Erie County must contract with agencies to provide those services. ECDOH is looking to increase the number of contracted agencies available to meet these mandates. This resolution seeks waiver of the procedures in Section 26.08 of the Erie County Administrative Code because rates paid to providers are non-negotiable and are listed in the New York State Special Education Database.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Funding is currently available for the contract in the Health Department (Fund110, Funds Center 12750) 2024 General Fund Budget in Account 528000 - Services to Handicapped Children to cover the costs incurred. There is one rate listed in the New York State Special Education Database for all Related Services and providers are reimbursed per completed therapy session.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

NYSED Part 200 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education pursuant to special education programs and services for students with disabilities requires that counties contract with agencies to provide related services authorized by District Committee's on Special Education, funding is available, and Erie County is looking to increase the number of contracted agencies to address present capacity issues.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Erie County would not be in compliance with NSYED part 200 and children will remain waiting for mandated services.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

ECDOH will work with Budget and Management and County Attorney's Office on executing all terms of the contract.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

This agency is one of two agencies that have provided said services for the County under contract for many years.

This project is necessary because it is the optimal time to incorporate solar panels into the design of the new roof going on to the Downtown Library. While not included in the original scope, a grant from NYSERDA has been awarded that will fund the cost to install solar panels on to the roof of the building. There are several considerations that need to go into installing solar panels on the roof such as the evaluation of structural loads on the building, wind uplift, how to incorporate the energy created from the solar panels into the building, a setback from the edge of the roof and various other code and design requirements. Conducting this design now, while the consultant is still designing the roof replacement will ensure that the design is thorough and completely integrated and reduce the overall cost of implementing the solar panels.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Downtown Library is currently undergoing the design of a new roof and, thanks to a grant from the GIGP, is incorporating vegetative, or "green", roof elements. With the announcement of a NYSERDA Clean Energy Communities grant, the County has been awarded funding to put towards a project that incorporates clean energy. The Downtown Library is a great candidate due to the fact it qualifies for bonus funding because it is in a Disadvantaged Community; it has

a significant electrical load that will save money from generating its' own power; and DPW is already in the process of designing a new roof making this the perfect time to incorporate solar.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If this project is not completed, then the County will not be able to maximize the benefit from the NYSERDA grant. A significant amount of work will have to be redone and will cost the County more money in the long run.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Upon Legislative approval, the County Executive will issue a change order to authorize the design of a solar array on the roof of the Downtown Library.

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE REVIEW

The proposed legislation has been reviewed by the Comptroller's Office and is related to an authorized capital project for which there are sufficient appropriations for the action proposed.



SUMMARY

The Commissioner of Public Works advertised services for Erie County On-Call Fleet Electrification Consultant for assistance in projects Countywide as requested by the Public Works Department. After reviewing the submittals, WSP USA was selected to provide said consulting services. The Commissioner of Public Works is, therefore, recommending that the Erie County Legislature authorize the County Executive to enter a three (3) year term agreement with WSP USA, Inc. for on-call fleet electrification engineering services with the possibility of two (2) one-year extensions.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The \$241,591.51 in funding for this Term Agreement is made available by the Department of Environment & Planning as a transfer of from their Climate Action Fund (Account 516310) to the Division of Buildings & Grounds.

Consultant billing would be on an hourly basis according to the approved rate schedule per their proposal unless an agreed upon work scope and fee can be determined prior to beginning any services.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

As more electric vehicles come on to the market there are better options to replace legacy gas-powered vehicles. In order to effectively benefit from the inherent cost-savings of electric powered vehicles while still vetting the viability, a thorough assessment needs to be conducted. This assessment will evaluate the current fleet operations including vehicles properties, usage, timing and other important considerations. It will also assess the current electrical infrastructure at the relevant locations to determine the most effective placement and sizing of the equipment necessary to charge the vehicles. The consultant is contracting on an on-call basis so that various departments can electrify their fleet as funding allows.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Erie County is seeking to reduce the cost and carbon emissions associated with driving a fleet of vehicles. Electric vehicles tend to be much more cost effective to operate, requiring less maintenance and cheaper refueling versus gas-powered vehicles. And with more electric vehicle models on the market there are more opportunities to capitalize on the cost savings and emissions reduction. However, switching over to an electric vehicle requires a lot of planning including understanding how long a vehicle takes to refuel (charge) and how far a vehicle can go under different circumstances. Hiring a fleet electrification consultant will provide a comprehensive evaluation of which vehicles would be a good candidate now and in the future.

They will also develop a plan to install the infrastructure so that every vehicle will be able to conduct operations unimpeded.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If this project is not completed, the County will continue to spend excess funds on gasoline while a piecemeal approach to vehicle electrification will be conducted by the various departments.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Upon Legislative approval, the County Executive will enter into a contract with the WSP USA, Inc. with the necessary services being available shortly thereafter.

To distribute these funds OTDA created the Shelter Arrears Eviction Forestallment (SAEF) program to provide vital shelter arrears assistance to help eligible households retain permanent housing. Assistance provided through the SAEF program must not exceed a total of six months of arrears per household. However, the six months of arrears payments do not have to be consecutive or paid all at once; payments may be issued partially (less than six months of arrears assistance needed) or in full (all six months at once. Prior receipt of shelter arrears payments through the Emergency Assistance to Families (EAF) or Emergency Safety Net Assistance (ESNA) programs does not impact SAEF program eligibility. SAEF program payments are not countable as income or as a resource for PA, Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) or Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) eligibility of budgeting purposes. Financial eligibility for EAF is determined by the gross income immediately available to the household on the date of application. The household is financially eligible for EAF if the available income is at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines for the household size. Households that qualify for the SAEF program are not subject to a repayment agreement.



SUMMARY

This proposed resolution authorizes the Department of Social Services to accept 100% State funding in the amount of \$645,000 to provide Code Blue Services when temperatures are expected to fall below 32 degrees Fahrenheit with wind chill for at least two consecutive hours, based on the local forecast issued by the National Weather Service for the city, town or village within the district that is known to have the largest population of unsheltered homeless persons.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There is no fiscal impact to the 2024 Adopted Budget based on this resolution.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance has awarded Erie County \$645,000 to provide Code Blue Services when temperatures are expected to fall below 32 F.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance (OTDA) has appropriated \$20 million for district costs related to implementing emergency measures for the homeless during inclement winter weather (Code Blue). A Code Blue alert must be called when temperatures are expected to fall below 32 F with wind chill for at least two consecutive hours, based on the local forecast issued by the National Weather Service for the city, town or village within the district that is known to have the largest population of unsheltered homeless persons. When possible, the decision to declare a Code Blue alert should be made by 5:00 p.m. each day. The Code Blue should remain in effect until the temperature rises above 32 F with wind chill, but at least until 7:00 a.m. the next morning.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

These important services could not be provided.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The Department of Social Services will work with the Division of Budget and Management to amend the existing 2024 Adopted Budget amounts.

SUMMARY

The Erie County Legislature is requested to receive and file this correspondence pertaining to an amendment to the professional services agreement with Arcadis of New York, Inc. (Arcadis) for additional engineering scope related to Phase 2 of the Southtowns Advanced Wastewater Treatment Facility (AWTF) Expansion Project in Erie County Sewer District (ECSD) No. 3. The amendment reallocates \$859,040 as follows; \$465,600 from Phase 2, Task 3C – Resident Engineering to Phase 2, Task 2A – Design Documents, \$237,440 from Phase 2, Task 3C – Resident Engineering to Phase 2, Task 2B – Pre-Phase 2 Electrical Design, \$56,500 from Phase 2, Task 3C – Resident Engineering to Phase 2, Task 2C – Landfill Reclamation Design, and \$99,500 from Phase 2, Task 3C – Resident Engineering to Phase 2, Task 3B – General Services During Construction.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There will be no impact to the County's General Fund. This amendment constitutes a reallocation of budget under existing Legislative authorizations for the professional services agreement with Arcadis. No additional funds are requested.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

As part of the Southtowns AWTF Expansion Project – Phase 2 engineering effort, several additional out of scope items were required to address increased construction costs, provide supplemental analysis of facility improvements, institute changes in the design to address the long-term needs of the facility, manage regulatory requests, and more. An amendment to Arcadis's engineering services agreement is necessary to compensate the firm for this extra scope. The additional budget for this work will be funded by reallocating authorization designated for future tasks in Arcadis's professional services agreement.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Erie County Legislature passed a resolution [Comm. 15E-8 (2021)] authorizing an agreement with Arcadis for the Erie County Sewer District No. 3 Southtowns AWTF Phase 1 and Phase 2 Expansion Project. The Erie County Division of Sewerage Management (ECDSM) has been working with Arcadis to provide engineering services associated with the expansion project. Construction of Phase 1 improvements is well underway, and Arcadis is finalizing design documents for the Phase 2 improvements.

During the "additional facility needs evaluation" and Phase 2 design tasks for the project, several changes in scope were identified. These changes fall into four (4) different categories:

- Items to address increased costs: including landfill reclamation work for soils management, implementation of a project labor agreement, engineering related to prepurchase of long-lead time items, evaluation of clarifier construction alternatives, conducting a contractor "open house" to garner interest in the project, a pre-90% design workshop to value-engineer various project components, and optimizing control system programming implementation.
- Supplemental analysis of facility improvements: including hydraulic studies, computer modeling of key design elements, evaluation of scenarios both during construction and under future operations, UNOX mixer optimization studies, plant-wide heating evaluations, and UNOX influent design modifications to address grit.
- New design elements for the long-term needs of the facility: including the south tunnel connecting the existing facility to the new clarifier complex, deep foundation designs with rock anchors, pre-Phase 2 electrical improvements to address motor control centers and other infrastructure supporting the new facilities, and implementation of a new low flow influent pump based on supplemental data collected during the project.
- Regulatory driven items: including additional building code review services and development of additional reports for the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation.

These additional services were reviewed in detail with the ECSD No. 3 Board of Managers during their October 9, 2024 meeting. The scope of Arcadis's original agreement did not include design or construction phase services that may be identified as part of the "additional facility needs evaluation." Further, as design related data and information were gathered during the course of the project, changes were required in the interest of the long-term function of the AWTF. As a result, the ECDSM worked with Arcadis to re-scope the Phase 2 engineering services, shifting \$859,040 from Task 3C – resident engineering to other tasks in the agreement. When construction projects are bid and the contracts are awarded, requests for additional authorization for engineering work during the construction phases will be requested from Your Honorable Body as needed.



SUMMARY

The Erie County Legislature is requested to receive and file the enclosed Erie County Sewer Agency Report (hereinafter referred to as the "enclosed report") regarding an Increase & Improvements of Facilities (2024) for Erie County Sewer District (ECSD) No. 8.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no fiscal implications associated with receiving and filing the enclosed report.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Pursuant to Article 5-A of New York State County Law, maps and plans must be prepared for the creation of a new bond account to implement capital improvements for sewer district purposes. The enclosed report is intended to meet that requirement.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Your Honorable Body previously approved of an Increase & Improvements of Facilities for infrastructure improvements in ECSD No. 8. The enclosed report provides updated details on proposed water resource recovery facility and collection system improvements, including cost estimates and the various financial impacts.

The ECSD No. 8 Board of Managers approved the enclosed report during their October 8, 2024 meeting.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If the enclosed report is not received by Your Honorable Body, ECSD No. 8 may not proceed with the proposed infrastructure improvements. This could jeopardize the sewer district's ability to properly serve the customers of ECSD No. 8, protect public health and the environment, and meet applicable regulatory responsibilities.

STEPS TO FOLLOW APPROVAL

The Division of Sewerage Management will submit a resolution requesting that the Legislature call for the public hearing on the proposed Increase & Improvement of Facilities. It is a requirement of Article 5-A of New York State County Law to have a public hearing prior to approving the action.

ERIE COUNTY SEWER AGENCY REPORT ERIE COUNTY SEWER DISTRICT NO. 8 INCREASE & IMPROVEMENT OF FACILITIES (2024)

INTRODUCTION

Erie County Sewer District No. 8 (ECSD No. 8) was established in January 2008 to provide sanitary sewer service to the Village of East Aurora and a portion of the Town of Aurora (Exhibit A). The original Water Resource Recovery Facility (WRRF) was constructed in 1941 and upgraded to its current process in the early 1980's. Ownership of the WRRF and tributary collection system was transferred to the Erie County Division of Sewerage Management in March 2007.

BACKGROUND

The Erie County Division of Sewerage Management continually evaluates infrastructure as part of good asset management practices to maintain and improve the critical services provided by ECSD No. 8: protecting public health, enhancing the environment, and supporting the needs of the community. Necessary capital improvements have been identified that will address essential treatment facility processes at the end of useful life requiring rehabilitation/replacement to sustain efficient and effective treatment operations. These include upgrades to the existing filters and the plant wide electrical system. Further, ECSD No. 8 is in a continual process of renewing collection system assets to address aging infrastructure issues.

The Sewer District will require new bonding authorization to complete upgrades/replacement to existing infrastructure. The department's current bonding authorization will be depleted in the near future; thus, a new bonding authorization is necessitated.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

This new bonding authorization will provide funding for renewal of assets in ECSD No. 8. These improvements include the following:

1.	Filter System Replacement	\$3.7 million \$4.0 million
3.	Electrical System Upgrades Collection System Improvements	\$0.9 million \$8.6 million

Filter System Replacement

The sand filtration system at the WRRF has significantly deteriorated impacting its operational efficiency and ability to treat existing flows. The filtration system requires replacement to insure the WRRF continues to meet effluent water quality limits specified in the New York State Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (SPDES) permit.

Electrical System Upgrades

To increase reliability of the degrading electrical system at the WRRF, various components will be improved including upgrades to power distribution circuiting, lighting, communication, and security systems. Additionally, the incoming electrical service will be upgraded, and the emergency power generation system will be replaced to accommodate the increased power draw from newly installed equipment.

3 Collection System Improvements

ECSD No. 8 maintains and operates a collection system consisting of 33.6 miles of sanitary sewers and 13 pumping stations, portions of which date back to the 1940's, or earlier, when the WRRF was first activated. Cured-in-Place Pipe Lining (CIPPL), open cut pipe replacements, manhole rehabilitation/replacement projects, and other collection system improvement activities have been projected. Through the District's LT reduction program, projects are identified to repair defective assets and reduce wet weather flows on an ongoing basis. Additionally, repairs to pumping stations may be required to continue reliable operation of these facilities.

Estimated engineering, administration, and financing are included above. Any remaining funds, if available, would be utilized to make additional improvements that are deemed necessary and in the best interest of the District.

FUNDING SOURCES

This authorization is being prepared under the assumption that no Federal or State grants will be forthcoming. As a result, this report represents a worst-case scenario. However, should ECSD No. 8 be fortunate to obtain grant funding in the future, it would be used to lower the annual debt service cost of the project.

Presently, ECSD No. 8 has approximately \$2.7 million in capital reserves available to fund certain improvements. Therefore, approximately \$5.9 million would need to be financed.

The County's current bonding rate for a thirty-year term is 3.80% (Exhibit B). For the purposes of this report, the bond rate has been conservatively assumed not to exceed 4.00% for a 30-year period. The annual cost for borrowing \$1 million at 4.00% interest for 30 years is approximately \$58,400. Accordingly, the annual debt service payments for borrowing \$5.9 million have been estimated at \$345,000.

ANNUAL DEBT SERVICE COST

The annual cost impact to the average home in the District as a result of \$340,000 in additional bond debt would be \$62.77 (\$345,000/5,496), where 5,496 is the total equivalent dwelling units in ECSD No. 8. Note the entire increase would not occur at one time, but rather over several years as determined by the staging of capital projects and during a period in which existing debt will be retired. That said, the Office of the New York State Comptroller requires projecting cost impact on the ratepayer for the entire authorization exclusive of other existing bond debt either owed or being retired.

For informational purposes, in 2025 ECSD No. 8 expects to retire over \$380,000 in existing annual bond debt payment obligations to the Village of East Aurora, and an additional \$52,000 of obligations to the Town of Aurora in 2026.

CONNECTION FEES

There will be no additional costs to property owners serviced by ECSD No. 8 for items such as connection charges or fees. The project will benefit properties presently serviced by the existing sewer system, so costs for such items are not applicable. However, the Sewer District's existing charges for connection, inspection, and per unit fees will apply to any new construction.

SUMMARY & CONCLUSION

Portions of the ECSD No. 8 infrastructure have been in existence since the early 1940's and new bonding authorization is requested to complete upgrades to existing facilities at the end of useful service life.

The project costs are estimated at \$8.6 million to improve the Sewer District's infrastructure, with approximately \$2.7 million to be funded through capital reserves and the remainder through a proposed \$5.9 million bond authorization. It is estimated the average home in the Sewer District would be impacted by approximately \$62.77 annually after the total bond authorization of \$5.9 million is borrowed.

BOARD OF MANAGERS REVIEW

This matter has been discussed with the Board of Managers. On October 8, 2014, the Board of Managers moved to accept and adopt the Sewer Agency Report and to request the County Legislature approve a Bond authorization for the project in the amount of \$5.9 million pursuant to Article 5A of New York State County Law. (Exhibit C)

NEW YORK STATE (NYS) AUDIT & CONTROL

Submittal of an application to NYS Department of Audit & Control for approval is not required. Pursuant to Chapter 397 of the New York Laws of 1995, an application to the NYS Comptroller is only required if the increased cost to the typical property, as a result of this Increase & Improvement of Facilities, exceeds \$63.00 annually (Exhibit D). The estimated per home cost increase for this project is below this threshold and therefore, an application is not required.

RECOMMENDATION

The recommendations of the Eric County Sewer Agency are that the Legislature should:

- Accept and adopt this Sewer Agency Report;
- 2. Adopt necessary resolution calling for a public hearing:
- Adopt the resolutions necessary for an "Increase and Improvement of Facilities" pursuant 3. to Article 5 A of the County Law;
- Pursuant to Chapter 397 of the New York State Laws of 1995, file any required 4. documentation or application with the Office of the State Comptroller; and
- 5. Approve a Bond Resolution in the amount of \$5.9 million.



RESOLUTION BOARD OF MANAGERS ERIE COUNTY SEWER DISTRICT NO. 8

WHEREAS, the Eric County Sewer Agency has prepared a Sewer Agency Report for consideration by the Board of Managers calling for (A) an Increase and Improvement of Facilities (2024) for Eric County Sewer District No. 8 ("District"), at an estimated maximum cost of \$8,600,000 (B) the expenditure of \$2,700,000 from the District's reserve fund and, (C) the issuance of serial bonds in the aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$5,900,000, said amount to be offset by any State, Federal, and/or local funds received; and

WHEREAS, said Sewer Agency Report has identified certain improvements needed to improve service to the residents of Eric County Sewer District No. 8, which includes but is not limited to, the construction and/or rehabilitation of treatment facility equipment, sanitary sewers, and related necessary appurtenances; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Environment and Planning has presented information relative to the increase in cost and its effect on the tax structure for Erie County Sewer District No. 8.

SUMMARY

The Erie County Legislature is requested to receive and file the enclosed Erie County Sewer Agency Report (hereinafter referred to as the "enclosed report") regarding an Increase & Improvements of Facilities (2024) for Erie County Sewer District (ECSD) No. 1.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no fiscal implications associated with receiving and filing the enclosed report.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Pursuant to Article 5-A of New York State County Law, maps and plans must be prepared for the creation of a new bond account to implement capital improvements for sewer district purposes. The enclosed report is intended to meet that requirement.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Your Honorable Body previously approved of an Increase & Improvements of Facilities for infrastructure improvements in ECSD No. 1. The enclosed report provides updated details on proposed collection system / infiltration & inflow and pumping station improvements, including cost estimates and the various financial impacts.

The ECSD No. 1 Board of Managers approved the enclosed report during their October 11, 2024 meeting.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If the enclosed report is not received by Your Honorable Body, ECSD No. 1 may not proceed with the proposed infrastructure improvements. This could jeopardize the sewer district's ability to properly serve the customers of ECSD No. 1, protect public health and the environment, and meet applicable regulatory responsibilities.

STEPS TO FOLLOW APPROVAL

The Division of Sewerage Management will submit a resolution requesting that the Legislature call for the public hearing on the proposed Increase & Improvement of Facilities. It is a requirement of Article 5-A of New York State County Law to have a public hearing prior to approving the action.

ERIE COUNTY SEWER AGENCY REPORT ERIE COUNTY SEWER DISTRICT NO. 1 INCREASE & IMPROVEMENT OF FACILITIES (2024)

INTRODUCTION

Erie County Sewer District No. 1 (ECSD No. 1) was established on March 6, 1960 by an order of the Erie County Legislature. ECSD No. 1 is centrally located in Erie County and provides wastewater collection, transmission, and treatment services for the southern part of the Town of Cheektowaga and the northern part of the Town of West Seneca (Exhibit A).

BACKGROUND

The Erie County Division of Sewerage Management continually evaluates infrastructure as part of good asset management practices to maintain and improve the critical services provided by ECSD No. 1: protecting public health, enhancing the environment, and supporting the needs of the community. As ECSD No. 1 has existed for over sixty years, numerous sewers and pumping stations are approaching the end of their useful life and require rehabilitation/replacement to continue their ability to operate in an efficient and effective manner. Further, aging infrastructure is prone to extraneous flows entering the collection system as inflow and infiltration (I/I). Besides at times causing issues in the sewer system and increasing operation/maintenance costs, I/I experienced in ECSD No. 1 also contributes to the District's Overflow Retention Facility (ORF), which the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) recently placed under an Order on Consent to address.

The Division of Sewerage Management has completed an evaluation of ECSD No. 1's infrastructure and Order on Consent requirements. It has been determined additional capital funding is necessary for construction, improvement, and repair of ECSD No. 1 assets. Please see the "Project Description" below. Besides the related construction work, the needed funds would also be used for any costs for engineering. legal, financing, easement property acquisition, and/or related expenses.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

This new bonding authorization would provide funding for renewal of assets throughout ECSD No. 1. Generally, the improvements would fall into two (2) categories:

Collection System / Infiltration and Inflow Improvements I.

Pumping Station Improvements

\$10.2 million

\$22.1 million

I.) Collection System / Infiltration and Inflow Improvements

ECSD No. 1 maintains and operates 180 miles of sanitary sewers, many of which have reached or surpassed their design life. The final terms of ECSD No. 1's Order on Consent includes implementation of Corrective Action Plan (CAP) activities imposed within the Order's Compliance Schedule. Significant finding will be required to construct NYSDEC approved CAP improvements involving collection system and I/I mitigation improvements. Cured-in-Place Pipe Lining (CIPPL), open cut pipe replacements, manhole rehabilitation/replacement projects, and other collection system improvement activities have been projected. Through the District's I/I reduction program, projects are identified to repair defective assets and reduce wet weather flows on an ongoing basis. This saves ratepayers costs associated with pumping and treating extraneous flows.

II.) Pumping Station Improvements

After a review of the condition of ECSD No. 1's facilities, the following pumping station improvements are anticipated:

- Rebuilding of the Industrial Park Pumping Station (IPPS) discharge header and pumps —
 approximate cost: \$2.0 million. The project would involve separating wet and dry weather
 discharges to make the station operate more effectively under both conditions.
- IPPS and Cayuga Pumping Station roof and HVAC replacement approximate cost: \$3.2 million. The roofing systems and HVAC equipment at these facilities are approaching the end of their useful lives and may need to be addressed to protect the buildings and the critical equipment.
- Woodlands Pump Station Elimination approximate cost: \$750,000. It has been identified
 that this facility will be eliminated, as approved by the NYSDEC, through construction of a
 gravity sewer. Implementation of this improvement would decrease operation and
 maintenance expenses.
- Numerous projects have also been identified to improve operational reliability, including
 generator replacement and electrical upgrades at the Industrial Park, Cayuga, Union Road,
 Borden/Clinton, and Clinton/Transit Pump Stations approximate cost: \$4.25 million.

Estimated engineering, administration, and financing are included above. Any remaining funds, if available, would be utilized to make additional improvements that are deemed necessary and in the best interest of the District.

FUNDING SOURCES

This authorization is being prepared under the assumption that no Federal or State grants will be forthcoming. As a result, this report represents a worst-case scenario. However, should ECSD No. 1 be fortunate to obtain grant funding in the future, it would be used to lower the annual debt service cost of the project.

Presently, ECSD No. 1 has approximately \$8.3 million in capital reserves available to fund certain improvements. For the purposes of this analysis, it is assumed approximately 75% of the District's capital reserves will be used for the identified collection system and pumping station improvements. Therefore, approximately \$15.9 million would need to be financed.

The County's current bonding rate for a thirty-year term is 3.80% (Exhibit B). For the purposes of this report, the bond rate has been conservatively assumed not to exceed 4.00% for a 30-year period. The annual cost for borrowing \$1 million at 4.00% interest for 30 years is approximately \$58,400. Accordingly, the annual debt service payments for borrowing \$15.9 million have been estimated at \$930,000.

ANNUAL DEBT SERVICE COST

The annual cost impact to the average home in the District as a result of \$930,000 in additional bond debt would be \$48.08 (\$930,000/19,344), where 19,344 is the total equivalent dwelling units in ECSD No. 1. Note the entire increase would not occur at one time, but rather over several years as determined by the staging of capital projects and during a period in which existing debt will be retired. That said, the Office of the New York State Comptroller requires projecting cost impact on the ratepayer for the entire authorization exclusive of other existing bond debt either owed or being retired.

For informational purposes, the capital improvements associated with the Order on Consent are anticipated to be part of a 10-year program. By 2034, ECSD No. 1 expects it will retire over \$800,000 in existing annual bond debt payments.

CONNECTION FEES

There will be no additional costs to property owners serviced by ECSD No. 1 for items such as connection charges or fees. The project will benefit properties presently serviced by the existing sewer

system, so costs for such items are not applicable. However, the Sewer District's existing charges for connection, inspection, and per unit fees will apply to any new construction.

SUMMARY & CONCLUSION

ECSD No. 1 has been in existence since the early 1960's and new bonding authorization would provide funding to address the existing infrastructure as well as new projects that could arise within the Sewer District.

The project costs are estimated at \$22.1 million to improve the Sewer District's infrastructure, with approximately \$6.2 million to be funded through capital reserves and the remainder through a proposed \$15.9 million bond authorization. It is estimated the average home in the Sewer District would be impacted by approximately \$48.08 annually after the total bond authorization of \$15.9 million is borrowed.

BOARD OF MANAGERS REVIEW

This matter has been discussed with the Board of Managers. On October 1), the Board of Managers moved to accept and adopt the Sewer Agency Report and to request the County Legislature approve a Bond authorization for the project in the amount of \$15.9 million pursuant to Article 5A of New York State County Law. (Exhibit C)

NEW YORK STATE (NYS) AUDIT & CONTROL

Submittal of an application to NYS Department of Audit & Control for approval is not required. Pursuant to Chapter 397 of the New York Laws of 1995, an application to the NYS Comptroller is only required if the increased cost to the typical property, as a result of this Increase & Improvement of Facilities, exceeds \$63.00 annually (Exhibit D). The estimated per home cost increase for this project is below this threshold and therefore, an application is not required.

RECOMMENDATION

The recommendations of the Erie County Sewer Agency are that the Legislature should:

- Accept and adopt this Sewer Agency Report;
- Adopt necessary resolution calling for a public hearing;
- Adopt the resolutions necessary for an "Increase and Improvement of Facilities" pursuant to Article 5 A of the County Law;

- 4. Pursuant to Chapter 397 of the New York State Laws of 1995, file any required documentation or application with the Office of the State Comptroller, and
- Approve a Bond Resolution in the amount of \$15.9 million.







SUMMARY

The resolution authorizes the County Executive to execute a PILOT Agreement extension with AD Price II Housing Development Fund Corp., AD Price II LLC, and the City of Buffalo.

The owner is seeking the extension of a PILOT from the City of Buffalo and Erie County consistent with the PILOT Policy adopted by the Erie County Legislature on December 16, 1999.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

In accordance with the PILOT policy, the proposed PILOT payment for AD Price II project shall be based on a payment of \$20,728 in year 1 and would escalate by 3% each year for an additional fifteen-year term. The payment Schedule A lists the payments for the 15 years of the Agreement.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The City of Buffalo supports the PILOT and on October 15, 2024, the Common Council of the City of Buffalo approved the AD Price II PILOT Agreement extension. The project conforms to the provisions of Article XI of the New York Private Housing Finance Law.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The residential project is located at 450 Jefferson Avenue in the City of Buffalo, zip code 14204. The project consists of an existing development containing ninety-four (94) units of affordable housing. The project will continue to be used by low-income households with at least sixty (60) percent of the tenants earning no more than fifty (50) percent of the area median income. The original agreement was approved in 2009.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Without the PILOT, it would not be economically feasible for AD Price II Housing Development Fund Corp., and/or AD Price II LLC to operate the project as it is currently structured.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The County Executive or Deputy County Executive will enter into a PILOT Agreement with the noted parties.

Summary of Recommended Action

This resolution requests authorization to transfer \$116,000 within the Erie County Sheriff's Office, Jail Management Division operating budget (Fund 110, Fund Center 116) from 561410 – Lab & Tech to 561420 – Office Furniture & Fixtures.

Fiscal Implications of Proposal

There is no negative impact on county dollars. Sufficient funding for this transfer exists within 561410 – Lab & Tech.

Reasons for Recommendation

This transfer will provide sufficient funding within 561420 – Office Furniture & Fixtures for the purchase of 24/7-use chairs. These chairs will be utilized by deputies at the Erie County Holding Center. These posts must be covered 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, necessitating chairs that will stand up to that level of use over time. Additionally, we require chairs that are wider than standard office chairs, accommodating duty belts. The standard office chairs currently in use regularly need to be repaired and/or replaced.

Consequences of Negative Action





DSS HELP Program Appointments (2024)





Dear Minority Leader Mills:

The Department of Social Services does not have a contract with or make use of either the Comfort Inn and Suites at 3615 Commerce Parkway or the Holiday Inn Express at 3565 Commerce Parkway for any purpose.

The assurances made by Commissioner Cannon regarding the Department of Social Services assistance to non-citizens remain as true today as they were at that time. Federal law requires that some public benefits be issued to certain non-citizen applicants with legal immigration statuses. However, migrants without legal status such as the individuals and families that were bused to New York City are categorically ineligible for the Temporary Housing Assistance (Homeless) program and other public benefit programs because they do not have a qualifying immigration status.

The Department of Social Services has contracts with two hotels in the Village of Hamburg at 5442 Camp Road and 5440 Camp Road. These 126 rooms are for the Temporary Housing Assistance (Homeless) program. Currently we have 56 Family cases and 29 Single cases at that location. Family cases are federally reimbursed at 100% and Single cases are reimbursed by the State at 29%. In recent years a shortage of homeless shelters across the County has required the Temporary Housing Assistance program to rely on hotel providers to meet statutory obligations to provide shelter to eligible individuals and families. As a result, our department has established contracts for a fixed set of rooms with five hotels and on-demand use relationships with 13 other hotels across the Erie-Niagara region.

The Department of Social Services has worked collaboratively with local police and municipal leaders when issues are brought to our attention. Legislator Gilmour has facilitated numerous

meetings between our Department and the Village of Hamburg over the last year to address issues that have arisen from the need to use the hotels on Camp Road.

This week my staff and I have been attending the Shared Housing Conference in San Diego, CA with members of the Homeless Alliance of Western New York. We continue to seek out best practices and innovative solutions to responsibly meet our obligations to homeless households in the face of the ongoing housing shortage.

If additional follow-up is needed, I am happy to make myself available for further discussion on the next committee meeting day of the Legislature in November.

Dear Commissioner Bray,

The Erie County Comptroller's Office is performing an analysis of time entries, policies, and procedures of the Department of Personnel, Payroll Division for certain time entries and wage types.

The scope of the analysis will include examining the policies, procedures, and systems in place to grant, approve, verify, and process payments resulting from employee time entries related to work from home (WFH), offsite, shift differential, and related overtime premiums. The scope of the analysis will cover the period between January 1, 2023 and June 30, 2024.

The objectives will include testing and evaluating the systems in place to approve and process these time entries and review relevant policies and procedures to ensure compliance with County policies, labor laws, and the Civil Service Employees Association, Inc. (CSEA) Collective Bargaining Agreement. The analysis will also review County Departments' utilization of wage types, approval processes and time keeping records. In addition, a high-level trend analysis will be performed spanning from January 1, 2019 through June 30, 2024 – the period spanning 2019 through 2022 will only be considered for the purpose of establishing a baseline. This analysis will exclude departments and other administrative units established as 24-hour operations.

We will contact your office to arrange a meeting where we will review your policies and procedures while outlining our methodological process. We encourage you to bring any additional personnel to the meeting who would be assisting our auditor during the analysis. If there are any additional concerns that you would like us to examine, please feel free to bring them to our attention.

- One application requesting the inclusion of two parcels in the Town of Boston totaling 26.23 acres
- One application requesting the inclusion of one parcel in the Village of Springville totaling 9
 acres.
- One application requesting the inclusion of one parcel in the Town of Eden totaling 3.5 acres.
- Two applications requesting the inclusion of six parcels in the Town of Colden totaling 78.83 acres.
- One application requesting the inclusion of one parcel in the Town of Hamburg totaling 11.9 acres.
- One application requesting the inclusion of one parcel in the Village of Farnham totaling 11.8
 acres.

The Erie County Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board reviewed these requests and recommends that 13 of 17 parcels be added to existing Agricultural Districts. The Board does not recommend inclusion of four parcels on Grand Island, including SBLs:

- 12.15-2-34.2;
- 12.15-2-33.11;
- 12.15-2-32.1; and
- 12.15-2-16.1

These recommendations were based upon Agricultural District Law, which states that parcels to be included in the Districts must be "land highly suitable for agricultural production" and which continue to be feasible for farming if conditions remain the same. There is a report on 2024 open enrollment available at erie.gov/agriculture. The report is also available through the Erie County Legislature.

INTENT

The intent of this action is to modify existing Agricultural Districts in Erie County, NY pursuant to New York State Agriculture and Markets Law Section 303-b. Section 303-b requires an annual thirty-day period during which landowners may submit requests to include predominantly viable agricultural land into an existing certified agricultural district.


DESCRIPTION OF ACTION

During the 2024 Open Enrollment Period, Erie County received nine applications. One of these applications pertained to land already in an Agricultural District and was withdrawn. The remaining eight applications requested the addition of 54 acres to the North #1 District, 27.2 acres to the Southwest #8 District, and 114.1 acres to the Southeast #15 District. The Erie County Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board recommended the inclusion of 47 acres to the North #1 District, 27.2 acres to the Southwest #8 District, and 114.1 acres to the Southeast #15 District. This totals the inclusion of 188.3 acres.

ENVIRONMENTAL RESOURCES

- Land Use Plan or Zoning Regulations: Each application was analyzed for consistency with local land use plans and zoning regulations. In most cases each application was found to be consistent with such documents and agriculture was identified in each community's comprehensive plan as an industry to support and protect, and some degree of agricultural uses were permitted in each community's zoning ordinance and in the zoning district of each proposed enrollment. Application 8 for the inclusion of a 11.8 parcel (SBL 266.18-1-2) in Farnham conflicts with the underlying zoning district which does not permit agricultural activities.
- Intensity of Use of Land: Proposed enrollments encompass land that is already being farmed and/or land that has been previously developed and will not result in a significant change in the use or intensity of the land.
- Community Character: Each application's surrounding land uses were analyzed to ensure
 consistency with existing community character. In each case, enrollment into an
 agricultural district was found to be consistent with the rural, agricultural, and forested
 nature of the surrounding community.
- Critical Environmental Area: No significant impact on Critical Environmental Areas will occur because of these enrollments in an agricultural district.
- Transportation: No significant impact on transportation infrastructure will occur because of these enrollments in an agricultural district.
- Energy: These parcels are currently being farmed and/or have been previously developed and no significant impact on energy resources will occur because of their inclusion in an agricultural district.
- Water and Wastewater Supplies: These parcels are currently being farmed and/or have been previously developed and no significant impact on public/private water supplies and/or wastewater treatment utilities will occur because of their inclusion in an agricultural district.

- Historic, Archaeological, Architectural, or Aesthetic Resources: These parcels are currently being farmed and/or have been previously developed and no significant impact on historic, archaeological, architectural, or aesthetic resources of the community will occur as a result of their inclusion in an agricultural district.
- Natural Resources: These parcels are currently being farmed and/or have been previously
 developed and no significant impact on natural resources will occur as a result of their
 inclusion in an agricultural district.
- Erosion, Flooding, or Drainage: These parcels are currently being farmed and/or have been previously developed and no significant impact on erosion, flooding, or drainage will occur as a result of their inclusion in an agricultural district.
- Environmental Resources and Human Health: These parcels are currently being farmed and/or have been previously developed no significant impact on environmental resources and human health will occur as a result of their inclusion in an agricultural district.

Unifrax 1 (Facility) is a manufacturing facility that produces polycrystalline wool (PCW) fiber, a high temperature insulation used in automotive catalytic converters as a seal and insulator. The Facility is contained in two adjacent 94,000 square foot buildings in an industrial area next to Interstate 290 in the Town of Tonawanda. The applicable requirements that apply to the production of PCW fiber listed in the draft ASF permit are 6 NYCRR Part 200: General Provisions, 6 NYCRR Part 201: Permits and Registrations, 6 NYCRR Part 211: General Prohibitions, 6 NYCRR Part 212: Process Operations and 40 CFR Part 60 Subpart IIII - Standards of Performance for Stationary Compression Ignition Internal Combustion Engines.

This proposed permit modification would increase the allowable hours of operation for Lines 5, 6 and 7 at the aforementioned Unifrax 1 facility, which would result in an increase of total pollutant emissions from the facility. A Toxics - Best Available Control Technology (T-BACT) analysis under 6 NYCRR Part 212 was reviewed and approved. The T-BACT analysis showed that the increased dioxins/furans (D/F) emissions resulting from the increased hours of operation is within the acceptable risk management range identified in DAR-1: Guidelines for the Evaluation and Control of Ambient Air Contaminants under 6 NYCRR Part 212. The T-BACT analysis also showed that the AERMOD dispersion modeling demonstrated compliance with the annual and short-term guidance concentrations (AGC & SGC) for hydrogen chloride (HCl) emissions with a 97 percent removal efficiency. The permit modification proposes to change the required HCl removal efficiency to 97 percent.

This facility is located within an Environmental Justice area, as well as an area designated as a Disadvantaged Community. Accordingly, the applicant submitted information required as part of review under sections 7(2) and 7(3) of the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (CLCPA). Specifically, the applicant prepared an enhanced public participation plan in accordance with DEP Program Policy 24-1, "Permitting and Disadvantaged Communities". Documentation is available online at https://tinyurl.com/AlkegenAirPermit. The Department is seeking public comment on the application prior to making a final decision on permit issuance.

Of these above expenses, approximately \$4,700,000 are expenses to be reimbursed through the ILS Contracts with NYS and the County, for the 3rd quarter, and not part of the \$20,322,433 appropriated funds.

Please note that the figures for payments made to attorneys, year to date, are payments actually made and do not include liability incurred for legal work performed but either not yet billed or billed and not actually paid as of the end of the quarter.

A list of all attorneys who have received payments during the 3rd quarter of this year for legal services rendered is enclosed with this letter.
