- WHEREAS, born and raised in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, *Richard Diaz*, is a fighter for racial and economic justice for Black, Brown, and working-class people everywhere; and
- WHEREAS, Richard Diaz proudly serves as Regional Field Manager for Water Infrastructure at the BlueGreen Alliance; and
- WHEREAS, BlueGreen Alliance unites America's largest and most influential labor unions and environmental organizations to solve today's environmental challenges in ways that create and maintain quality jobs and build a stronger, fairer economy; and
- WHEREAS, Richard works with BlueGreen Alliance's legislative, field, and communications staff to engage partners and allies within the Midwest to demonstrate support for advancing an economic recovery focused on manufacturing and infrastructure investments; and
- WHEREAS, Richard has extensive community organizing experience across labor, political, issue-based, and neighborhood campaigns; and
- WHEREAS, our nation's drinking water, wastewater, and stormwater infrastructure is vital to the protection, treatment, and distribution of clean water; and
- WHEREAS, since the passage of the Bi-Partisan Infrastructure Law, Richard has been focused implementing the \$15B investment in Lead Service Line Replacement ("LSLR"); and
- WHEREAS, his experience in building relationships, increasing civic participation, and advocacy efforts amongst marginalized groups, has resulted in numerous policy changes, newly elected officials, and partnerships between advocacy based and serviced based non-profits; and
- WHEREAS, his work has also included advocating at the federal level for a stronger Lead and Copper Rule, working at the local level with utilities and city councils to advocate for program efficiencies within LSLR programs, working at the state level to improve the distribution process of Drinking Water State Revolving Funds for LSLR, and creating cross sector partnerships between labor unions, environmental organizations, and community based organizations to optimize job creation and registered apprenticeship opportunities for under employed and unemployed populations; and

WHEREAS, within his 10-years as a community organizer, Mr. Diaz has been able to help create Milwaukee neighborhood association Amani United, increase member participation and achieve worker-oriented contracts for members of the Amalgamated Transit Union local 998, help thousands of voters register and get out to vote, and co-found the Coalition on Lead Emergency (COLE); and

WHEREAS, in addition, Richard is also an AmeriCorps alumnus and seeks to organize for change within volunteer and professional capacities; and

WHEREAS, today, it is with great admiration that this Honorable Body acknowledges and thanks *Richard* for his devotion as Regional Field Manager for Water Infrastructure at BlueGreen Alliance and for his efforts in injecting equity into our society as we work to rebuild our economy.

WHEREAS, in December of 2024 Richard shared his talents and experience in environmental workforce development with Upstate New York leaders at the inaugural FLOW Up Summit held in Buffalo N.Y.; and

WHEREAS, because of Richard's participation in the inaugural FLOW Up Summit, the residents of Upstate N.Y. will be better equipped to organize, advocate, and execute equitable workforce integration in their plans to comply with the federal Lead and Copper Rule by replacing lead water lines across the Upstate N.Y. region; and

Acknowledging and Honoring Dr. ANM Nazmul Hasan Khan

WHEREAS, today, The Bangladeshi American Social & Cultural Organization (BASCO) honors Dr. ANM Nazmul Hasan Khan; and

WHEREAS, outside of his personal life as a devoted husband and father, *Dr. Khan* has represented Erie County through his hard work and best served Western New York in multiple ways; and

WHEREAS, *Dr. Khan* attended the State University of New York at Buffalo, and graduated with a Doctorate in Immunology in 2005; and

WHEREAS, Dr. ANM Nazmul Khan joined the staff of Roswell Park Comprehensive Cancer Center (Roswell Park) in 2011 as a Scientist in the Division of Infectious Disease, Department of Medicine; and

WHEREAS, prior to joining the Department of Medicine he completed post-doctoral training in the Department of Immunology and Molecular Medicine at Roswell Park; and

whereas, Dr. Khan's research interests include the role of innate immune cells (e.g., neutrophils, platelets, macrophages) and damage associated molecular patterns (DAMPs) in tumor growth; overcoming myeloid cell-derived immunosuppression to enhance cancer vaccine efficacy; the mechanisms involved in modulating functional effects of innate immune cells against pathogens or tumor; development of immune-based therapy and prognostic biomarkers for ovarian cancer; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Khan advocated Roswell to be the site for the new cancer treatment he developed with others in Boston and other countries throughout the world which was approved last year by FDA for clinical trials; and

WHEREAS, through his work with BASCO, Dr. Khan reaches out to the university community, conducts blood drives, has many cultural events and started the citizenship test prep classes, which just started their third class; and

WHEREAS, in 2022, Dr. Khan was appointed as Research Assistant Professor of Oncology in the Department of Internal Medicine; and

WHEREAS, his assistance thus far is nothing short of outstanding, it is with great admiration that this Honorable Body acknowledges and thanks *Dr. Khan* for his devotion to serving our community and well-deserved praise throughout Erie County.

LOCAL LAW TO BE ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE IN THE COUNTY OF ERIE LOCAL LAW INTRO. – NO. __2-1___ - 2024 LOCAL LAW – NO. _____ - 2024

A LOCAL LAW requiring transparent, searchable databases for expenditures accessible and available to the public.

SECTION 1. Title

This law shall be entitled and known as "The Tax Dollar Disclosure Act."

SECTION 2. Legislative Intent

The Erie County Legislature recognizes that taxpayers should have easy access to details on how the county is spending their tax dollars and what performance results are achieved for those expenditures. It is the intent of the Legislature, therefore, to direct the Erie County Comptroller to create and maintain a searchable budget database website detailing where, for what purpose, and what results are achieved for all taxpayer investments in county government.

SECTION 3. Definitions

AGENCY

A county department, division, office, bureau, board, commission, committee, or unit. This includes individual county agencies and programs, as well as those programs and activities that cross agency lines. "County agency" includes all elective offices in Erie County government.

AUDIT OR REPORT

Shall include any audit or report issued by the state, county, legislature, legislative committee, comptroller or executive body relating to the entity or recipient of funds or the budget program/activity or agency.

COMPTROLLER

The Erie County Comptroller.

ENTITY/AND OR RECIPIENTS

- A. a corporation,
- B. an association,

- C. a union,
- D. a limited liability company,
- E. a limited liability partnership,
- F. any other legal business entity including non-profits,
- G. grantees,
- H. contractors, and
- I. a county, city, or other local government entity.
- J. "Entity/and or recipients" does not include an individual recipient of public assistance.

FUNDING SOURCE

The account from which the expenditure is appropriated, inclusive of all budgeted accounts.

FUNDING ACTION OR EXPENDITURE

Shall include details on the type of spending (grant, contract, appropriations, etc.). This includes tax exemptions or credits. Where possible, a hyperlink to the actual expenditure document (in a format that is, at a minimum, as searchable as a searchable PDF format) shall be provided.

LEGISLATURE

The Erie County Legislature.

SEARCHABLE BUDGET DATABASE WEBSITE

A website that allows the public, at no cost, to:

- A. Search and aggregate information for the following:
 - 1. the name and principal location or residence of the entity/and or recipients of funds,
 - 2. the amount of funds expended,
 - 3. the funding or expending agency,
 - 4. the funding source of the revenue expended,
 - 5. the budget program/activity of the expenditure,

- 6. a descriptive purpose for the funding action or expenditure,
- 7. the expected performance outcome for the funding action or expenditure,
- 8. the past performance outcomes achieved for the funding action or expenditure,
- 9. any audit or report relating to the entity or recipient of funds or the budget program/activity or agency,
- 10. and any other relevant information specified by the Comptroller.
- B. Programmatically search and access all data in a serialized machine-readable format (such as XML) via a web-services application programming interface.

SECTION 4. Searchable Budget Database Website Created

By October 1, 2024, the Comptroller shall develop and make publicly available a single, searchable budget database website including the required data for the most recent county budget. The website shall be given a unique and simplified website address. Each county agency that maintains a generally accessible Internet site or for which a generally accessible Internet site is maintained shall include a link on the front page of the agency's Internet site to the budget database website.

SECTION 5. Updates

The Comptroller shall provide guidance to agency heads to ensure compliance with this section. The searchable budget database website shall be updated as new data becomes available, if feasible, but no later than 30 days upon receipt of data from the agency.

The Comptroller shall ensure that all data added to the searchable budget database website remains accessible to the public for a minimum of six years.

SECTION 6. Compliance with the Act

The Comptroller shall not be considered in compliance with this act if the data required for the searchable budget database website is not available in a searchable and aggregate manner and/or the public is redirected to other government websites, unless each of those sites has information from all agencies and each category of information required can be searched electronically by field in a single search.

SECTION 7. Severability

If any part or provision of this chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision or application directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remainder of this chapter or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances. The County of Erie hereby declares that it would have passed this chapter or the remainder thereof had such invalid application or invalid provision been apparent.

SECTION 8. Repealer

All ordinances, local laws, and parts thereof inconsistent with this chapter are hereby repealed; provided, however, that such repeal shall not affect or impair any act done or right accruing, accrued, or acquired, or penalty, charge, liability, forfeiture, or punishment incurred or owing prior to the time such repeal takes effect, but the same may be enjoyed, asserted, collected, enforced, prosecuted, or inflicted as fully and to the same extent as if such repeal had not been effected. All actions and proceedings, civil or criminal, commenced under or by virtue of any provision of any County of Erie local law, ordinance or resolution so repealed, and pending immediately prior to the taking effect of such repeal, may be prosecuted and defended to final effect in the same manner as they might if such provisions were not so repealed.

SECTION 9. Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect on October 1, 2024.

LOCAL LAW TO BE ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE IN THE COUNTY OF ERIE LOCAL LAW INTRO. – NO. _______ - 2024 LOCAL LAW – NO. ______ - 2024

A LOCAL LAW requiring meetings of Erie County Boards and Advisory Committees to provide access to information to the public.

SECTION 1. Title

This law shall be entitled and known as "The Meetings Transparency Act."

SECTION 2. Legislative Intent

The Erie County Legislature recognizes that taxpayers should have easy access to details discussed and acted upon at public meetings. The Erie County Legislature prepares an agenda which it posts prior to session, streams and has available for replay video of the meeting and posts the minutes of meeting for review. Readily available technology should be used to increase access to similar discussions and actions of commissions and boards.

SECTION 3. Definitions

BOARD

Any government board, commission, council, committee, advisory committee, panel or similar group that is created pursuant to the Erie County Charter, Code or Local Law.

SECTION 4. Meeting Minutes

Boards shall keep written minutes summarizing all official actions, discussions, public comments, and votes taken at each meeting.

Draft minutes shall be made available to the public within 10 business days after each meeting.

Minutes shall be officially approved at the board's next public meeting and a final version posted publicly online within 5 business days after approval. The minutes also must be submitted to the Clerk of the Legislature to be included in the official record.

SECTION 5. Notice and Agendas

Boards shall give public notice at least 7 calendar days prior to any regular meeting by prominently posting the date, time, location, and agenda on the general Erie County website, as well as the website of the Erie County Legislature.

For special or emergency meetings, notice should be provided as soon as is practicable.

Meeting agendas shall include a list of topics to be discussed, a list of invited speakers, and indicate if any votes or official actions are anticipated.

SECTION 6. Broadcast and Recording of Meetings

To the extent feasible, boards should also provide a live stream of meetings for public viewing. Erie County is required to make appropriate accommodation for each board to make this possible. If a live stream is not possible, meetings should at minimum be video recorded and the recording should be posted on the general Erie County website.

SECTION 7. Public Access to Records

Boards shall maintain information to be posted on Erie County's website providing access to board member information, past meeting minutes, agendas, recordings, reports, resolutions, and other official documents.

Upon public request, boards shall provide copies or electronic access to such records in a timely manner as allowable by public records laws.

SECTION 8. Public Comment

Boards should provide reasonable opportunities for public comment at each meeting.

Any restrictions on public comment shall be viewpoint-neutral and clearly stated in the board's policies.

SECTION 9. Compliance

Originating governmental bodies shall establish procedures to monitor and ensure compliance with this law.

SECTION 10. Severability

If any part or provision of this chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision or application directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remainder of this chapter or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances. The County of Erie hereby declares that it would have passed this chapter or the remainder thereof had such invalid application or invalid provision been apparent.

SECTION 11. Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect on September 1, 2024.

LOCAL LAW INTRO. NO. 5-2-2024

LOCAL LAW NO. -2024

A Local Law amending Local Law 1-1959, constituting the Erie County Charter, as amended, in relation to the amending of Section 202.2 for the purpose of setting the terms of legislative office to four (4) years and limiting the number of terms for that can be held to three (3) four-year terms for all elected officials.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT

The intent of this legislation is to amend the terms of office for the Erie County of Legislature to a term of four (4) years and to limit the number of terms for all elected officials that can be served to three (3) four-year terms.

Section 2. CHANGING THE TERM OF LEGISLATIVE OFFICE AND LIMITING THE NUMBER OF TERMS FOR ALL ELECTED OFFICIALS

Erie County Local Law number one of nineteen hundred fifty-nine, as amended, constituting the Erie County Charter, is hereby amended as follows:

Article 2, Section 202.2. Election and terms of office. County legislators shall first be elected at the general election in the year nineteen hundred sixty-seven and shall assume office on January first, nineteen hundred sixty-eight. All elected County legislators shall hold their respective offices for a term of two years: provided, that legislators elected in the year two thousand twenty-six and in subsequent years shall hold their offices for four years. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County legislator if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof.

Article 3, Section 301. The County Executive; election; term; qualifications. The executive branch of County government shall be administered by the County Executive who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election and shall be for four years, except that the term of the County Executive elected in nineteen hundred sixty shall be for three years. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County Executive if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or

her office and shall hold no other public office, except as provided in section three hundred seven hereof.

Article 18, Section 1801. Election; Comptroller's Act repealed. There shall be a County Comptroller who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election and shall be for four years. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County Comptroller if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office. The Erie County Comptroller's Act, being chapter four hundred twenty three of the laws of nineteen hundred thirty-nine as amended, is hereby repealed, as of January first, nineteen hundred sixty-one.

Article 19, Section 1901. Election. There shall be a County Clerk who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election, and shall be for four years except as otherwise provided in this Charter. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County Clerk if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office.

Article 20, Section 2001. Election. There shall be a District Attorney who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election, and shall be for four years except as otherwise provided in this Charter. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as District Attorney if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office.

Article 21, Section 2101. Election. There shall be a Sheriff who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election and shall be for four years except as otherwise provided in this Charter. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as Sheriff if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of

the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office.

Section 3. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Local Law shall take effect the first day of the first fiscal year after receiving an affirmative vote of a majority of the qualified electors of the County of Erie in a manner consistent with the provisions of New York State Municipal Home Rule Law Article 3 and upon its subsequent filing with the New York Secretary of State.

Section 4. SEVERABILITY

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this Local Law or the application thereof, to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity or circumstance, shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional such order of judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this Local Law or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or order shall be rendered.

LOCAL LAW INTRO. NO. 7-1 -2024

LOCAL LAW NO. -2024

A Local Law, named the "STUNT Law", requiring Erie County to expand penalties for speed contests, stunt behavior, and other reckless driving behaviors that endanger Erie County residents.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Title.

This Local Law shall be known as the "STUNT Law: Safeguarding Traffic, Unlawful Racing, and Noise Transgressions."

Section 2. Legislative Purpose and Intent.

This Legislature recognizes that speeding has been a significant factor in numerous motor vehicle fatalities over the past decades, with motor vehicle accidents being one of the leading causes of death for individuals aged 1 to 54.

The Legislature acknowledges the rise in popularity of illegal vehicle sideshows, demonstrations, and contests; often shared on social media, which pose a great risk to participants and spectators, leading to severe physical injuries and even death.

Moreover, illegal vehicle sideshows, contests, street racing, and related stunt behavior not only endanger lives and property but also create excessive noise during night hours, causing disturbances for residents in neighboring areas.

The current penalties for these illegal activities are insufficient in deterring individuals from participating in them.

Therefore, the purpose of this Local Law is to protect Erie County residents by expanding and strengthening laws and penalties related to unlawful speed contests, sideshows, and related stunt behavior.

Section 3. Definitions.

As used in this Local Law, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

"Burnout" – To spin a vehicle's wheel(s) while keeping the vehicle stationary, causing the tires to heat up and emit smoke.

- "Drifting" The intentional oversteering of a vehicle with loss of traction while maintaining control, resulting in a controlled skid or power slide through a turn.
- "Doughnut" A maneuver performed by rotating the rear or front of a vehicle around the opposite set of wheels, creating a circular skid mark pattern on the road surface.
- "Revving" To rapidly increase the engine speed while a vehicle is stationary or in neutral, producing loud noise and/or causing the vehicle to jerk or lurch.
- "Sideshow" An event in which vehicles gather and engage in reckless behavior, such as performing stunts, burnouts, doughnuts/wheelies, drifting, and/or other dangerous maneuvers.
- "Street Racing" The act of racing or competing with one or more vehicles on a public highway, street, or road, whether prearranged or spontaneous.
- "Stunt Behavior" Performing any maneuver with a vehicle that is not part of normal driving or exceeds the safe limits of the vehicle; including but not limited to stunts, revving, burnout, drifting, doughnuts, acrobatic maneuvers, jumps, and other similar actions.
- "Wheelie" -- Raising a vehicle to the degree that one or more wheels lose contact with the ground.

Section 4. Prohibitions.

- (A) No person shall knowingly participate in, engage in, organize, facilitate, coordinate, plan, aid, or abet any street race, sideshow, contest, exhibition, or stunt behavior involving vehicles upon any public highway, street, sidewalk, public parking lot or area, or any other public property within Erie County.
- (B) No person shall knowingly obstruct or attempt to obstruct any public highway, street, or road with a motor vehicle, or any other object used as a blockade for the purpose of permitting any such race, sideshow, contest, exhibition, or stunt behavior.

Section 5. Enforcement and Penalties for Offenses.

(A) Any person who violates any provision of this article shall be guilty of a violation, punishable by a fine not exceeding \$500 for a first offense, and a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or by imprisonment for a period not exceeding 15 days, or both, for each subsequent offense.

(B) Any person who causes physical injury to another person or damage to real or personal property while violating any provision of this article shall be liable for the payment of restitution, as determined by a court of competent jurisdiction.

Section 6. Severability.

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of the local law which shall remain in full force and effect except as limited by such order or judgment.

Section 7. SEQRA Compliance.

This County Legislature determines that this local law constitutes a "Type II action" pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA), and that no further action under SEQRA is required.

Section 8. Effective Date.

This local law shall take effect immediately following its filing with the Office of the Secretary of State.

SUMMARY

It is recommended that the Legislature approve the attached resolution providing for the adoption of the 2025 mall district service roll transmitted herewith as required by Erie County Local Law No. 8-1984.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Mall district service charges for 2025 in the sum of \$1,869,106 as previously determined by the Legislature, plus payment in lieu of \$54,429, shall be assessed, due and be a lien upon properties within the mall district as of January 1, 2025. Service charges defray the cost of mall district services.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Adoption of the 2025 mall district service charge roll established by the Director of Real Property Tax Services is necessary for purposes of assessing and levying 2025 service charges for the downtown pedestrian/transit mall special district.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The downtown pedestrian transit mall special district was established pursuant to special act of the State Legislature (L.1983, Ch. 673) and by Erie County Local Law No. 8-1984. The said laws authorize the annual assessment of service charges against properties located within the mall district. Following a public hearing held October 29, 2024 by Buffalo Place Inc. and on due notice to property owners within the district, the Legislature by adoption of Intro. 20M-1, determined that the total amount to be raised by mall district service charges for 2025 would be the sum of \$1,869,106. Plus, a payment in lieu of taxes in the amount of \$54,429. The Director of Real Property Tax Services has now established a mall district service charge roll apportioning between benefited properties the total amount to be raised by mall district service charges for 2025. The mall district service charge roll must be adopted by the Legislature so that collections may take place during the ensuing fiscal year.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

The downtown pedestrian/transit mall special district would be without operating funds and would be unable to provide mall services during 2025.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Mall district service charge bills will be prepared and transmitted to property owners.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

If the Assessment Rolls are not affirmed and adopted, the Sewer Districts will not have the legal authority to raise sewer district levies for 2025.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

Pursuant to Article 5A of New York State County Law, the Legislature is required to adopt and affirm the Assessment Rolls.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Sewer District levies are raised from the various lots and parcels of land within the Erie County Sewer Districts.

In order to legally raise said levies, Article 5A of New York State County Law requires a Public Hearing be held prior to the Legislature adopting and affirming the Assessment Rolls. The Erie County Legislature held a Public Hearing for the Assessment Rolls on November 6, 2024. 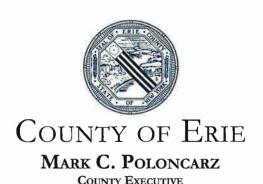

SUMMARY

Approval to enter into a 2025 Public Utility Work Agreement for improvement of Erie County Sewer Districts assets during certain New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT) projects is requested.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There will be no fiscal impact to the County's General Fund. Work performed on Erie County sewers and manholes during certain projects will be paid by the NYSDOT in accordance with Section 10, Subdivision 24, of the State Highway Law.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Certain NYSDOT highway reconstruction projects may impact Erie County Sewer District assets, requiring the adjustment of Erie County sanitary sewerage facilities to meet the proposed highway alignment and elevations. In these instances, an agreement is necessary for this betterment work to occur at the NYSDOT's expense, as well as to memorialize that the Erie County Sewer Districts will maintain these improved facilities into the future.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The NYSDOT periodically schedules improvement of State Highways and the design includes the adjustment of County sanitary sewerage facilities. An agreement with the NYSDOT is required so the NYSDOT will pay for these betterments to County sewer district assets.

Note – a separate agreement is required in instances where the Erie County Sewer Districts request betterments be made on their behalf in NYSDOT projects – i.e. where adjustment of Erie County sanitary sewerage facilities is not necessarily required to complete the highway work.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

The NYSDOT will require Erie County to adjust its own sanitary sewer facilities, at the Erie County Sewer District's expense, in advance of the NYSDOT highway reconstruction projects.

STEPS TO FOLLOW APPROVAL

The County of Erie will execute a NYSDOT Public Utility Work Agreement, which will allow the NYSDOT to make adjustments to Erie County sanitary sewerage facilities at the NYSDOT expense during a State highway project.

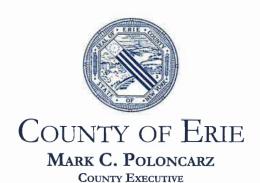

The Department of Public Works (DPW) is seeking authorization for the County Executive to execute an amendment, to the agreement with Bergmann Associates, Architects, Engineers, Landscape Architects & Surveyors, D.P.C. (Bergmann Associates) for design engineering services for the Rehabilitation of Borden Rd (CR322). The design agreement was originally authorized in COMM. 15E-12 on July 23, 2020. This amendment is for an agreed upon change in scope of the design of drainage along Borden Road in the third phase of the project.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Funding for this Amendment is not to exceed \$41,300, and is available in Fund 420, Funds Center 123, as follows:

Capital Project B.21162 – 2021 Preservation of Roads Design - \$41,300

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Bergmann Associates will engage the services of a qualified subconsultant for right-of-way incidentals. A permanent easement is required for accessing and maintaining a drainage ditch along Borden Road south of Buffalo Creek. Bergmann Associates will also engage the services of a qualified subcontractor for the video inspection and condition assessment of a 2.63' by 4.12' reinforced concrete storm sewer pipe which extends from Clinton Street to approximately 1,150 feet south along Borden Road.

SUMMARY

The County of Erie (the "County") is hereby recommending that the Legislature authorize the County Executive to enter into an agreement with the Erie County Water Authority (the "Water Authority") whereby the County will transfer ownership of the Sandridge Water Tank and appurtenant facilities (collectively referred to as the "County Facilities") and related underlying property to the Water Authority. As part of the conveyance, the County will transfer \$1,000,000 in American Rescue Plan Act Funding to the Water Authority in order to complete necessary capital repairs to the water tank. Upon transfer, the Water Authority will be responsible for any and all maintenance and repairs, as well as continuing to provide water services within the Town of Alden.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The County will transfer \$1,000,000 of American Rescue Plan Funding to the Water Authority to be used for necessary capital repairs to the Sandridge Water Tank.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Legislative approval is required for the County Executive to enter into an agreement with the Water Authority to transfer the Sandridge Water Tower and appurtenances, as well as any deeds or land agreements that may be required in order to effectuate the transfer.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In 1984, the County and the Authority designed and constructed the County Facilities to provide water to certain customers within the Town of Alden, including the State-owned Wende Correctional Facility and the County-owned Correctional Facility. Thereafter, pursuant to a Lease Management Agreement between the parties, the County agreed to own the County Facilities, and the Authority was responsible for operation and maintenance. To date, the parties still operate under that same Lease Management Agreement. Currently, the Sandridge Water Tank is the only water tank owned by the County, and it is in need of refurbishment. The Water Authority has agreed to assume ownership of the County Facilities and the County will provide \$1,000,000 to go towards the refurbishment of the Sandridge Water Tank.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

The County will continue to own the County Facilities and will need to undertake capital expenses related to the Sandridge Water Tank repairs.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Upon approval of the resolution, an agreement to transfer ownership of the Sandridge Water

Tank and related appurtenances will be executed after final review by the Department of Law as to form. The County will also enter into any conveyance agreements necessary to transfer the underlying real property to the Water Authority.

A RESOLUTION SUBMITTED BY: THE OFFICE OF THE COUNTY ATTORNEY

RE: Conveyance of Sandridge Water Tank

WHEREAS, in 1984, Erie County ("County") and the Erie County Water Authority ("Authority") designed and constructed the Sandridge Water Tank ("Sandridge Tank") with appurtenant facilities (collectively referred to herein as the "County Facilities") for the purposes of delivering water to parts of the Town of Alden, including the delivery of water to the State-operated Wende Correctional Facility and the County-operated Correctional Facility; and

WHEREAS, the County Facilities referred to herein specifically consist of the following: (1) a transmission main in the Town of Alden easterly along Broadway, from Town Line Road to Sandridge Road, consisting of approximately 14,042 linear feet of 16-inch ductile iron pipe and 328 linear feet of 16-inch prestressed concrete cylinder pipe; (2) a transmission main in the Town of Alden northerly along Sandridge Road and Wende Road from Broadway to Walden Avenue, consisting of approximately 18,725 linear feet of 20-inch ductile iron pipe and 460 linear feet of 20-inch prestressed concrete cylinder pipe; (3) a 1.5 million gallon elevated water storage tank, known as the "Sandridge Water Tank", located at the northwest corner of the intersection of Broadway and Sandridge Road, including approximately 412 linear feet of 16-inch ductile iron pipe; and (4) a transmission main in the Town of Alden westerly along Walden Avenue from Wende Road to the existing 12-inch main on Walden Avenue, consisting of approximately 3,473 linear feet of 12-inch PVC pipe and 3,760 linear feet of 20-inch ductile iron pipe; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to a 1993 Lease Management Agreement, the County Facilities are owned by the County and operated and maintained by the Authority; and

WHEREAS, the Sandridge Tank is currently in need of refurbishing; and

WHEREAS, the County Executive and Legislature have determined it would be in the County's best interests to convey the County Facilities to the Authority, in consideration for the Authority agreeing to directly supply water services to the above-mentioned water customers; and

WHEREAS, once the County Facilities have been conveyed to the Authority, the County will no longer have any obligation or responsibility to maintain, repair, improve, or oversee the water system property and facilities; and

WHEREAS, the County has agreed to help with the costs of the capital repairs needed to restore the Sandridge Water Tank and will commit \$1,000,000 of American Rescue Plan Act Funding for said purposes; and

WHEREAS, the project is determined to be a Type II action under SEQRA pursuant to NYCRR 617.5 and no further action under SEQRA is required; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Land Advisory Review Committee (commonly referred to as "ARC") has reviewed the matter and recommends that the County transfer ownership of the County Facilities to the Authority.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the County Executive is hereby authorized to enter into a contract, and any associated documents, deeds, or other necessary agreements, with the Erie County Water Authority in order to effectuate the conveyance of the following County-owned facilities and related underlying real property: (1) a transmission main in the Town of Alden easterly along Broadway, from Town Line Road to Sandridge Road, consisting of approximately 14,042 linear feet of 16-inch ductile iron pipe and 328 linear feet of 16-inch prestressed concrete cylinder pipe; (2) a transmission main in the Town of Alden northerly along Sandridge Road and Wende Road from Broadway to Walden Avenue, consisting of approximately 18,725 linear feet of 20-inch ductile iron pipe and 460 linear feet of 20-inch prestressed concrete cylinder pipe; (3) a 1.5 million gallon elevated water storage tank, known as the "Sandridge Water Tank", located at the northwest corner of the intersection of Broadway and Sandridge Road, including approximately 412 linear feet of 16-inch ductile iron pipe; and (4) a transmission main in the Town of Alden westerly along Walden Avenue from Wende Road to the existing 12-inch main on Walden Avenue, consisting of approximately 3,473 linear feet of 12-inch PVC pipe and 3,760 linear feet of 20-inch ductile iron pipe; and be it further

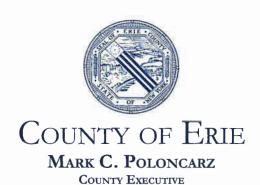

Date: December 13, 2024

SUMMARY

The Department of Public Works (DPW) is seeking authorization for the County Executive to enter into a contract with the lowest responsible bidder for the Interior Marble Column and Miscellaneous Repairs project, located at 1 Lafayette Square.

Various public portions of the library are in need of repairs to avoid further damage to the property. Included in this project is the reconfiguration of the existing column bases to better support the marble slabs adhered to the column. A few of the existing marble slabs have dislodged from their position and are currently strapped in place to prevent further damage to the slabs and prevent any injuries from a fall. Along the exterior of the building, along Clinton Street, above a doorway a caulk joint failed and water seeped in underneath. This project will dismantle the pieces above the doorway, epoxy them back together, and refasten them to the wall with a new sealant. The last item in this project is to repair the railing at the corner of Oak Street and William Street. This railing was damaged in a car accident on Oak Street and its concrete base is in need of repair. A bollard will also be added in this project to prevent further damage to the railing in any future potential collisions.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Funds for the project are currently available from a library state aid grant as follows:

Grant 420 NYS Construction CTR 2426

\$160,000.00

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

This project is necessary as it repairs various critical safety items throughout the Library's property. Two exit vestibules need new checker plates installed to replace the existing steel plates that show extensive damage from years of wear and tear. The railing on Oak Street was involved in a car collision that left the concrete base broken and the railing unstable. The railing must be stabilized to prevent injuries sustained from falling from the sidewalk down to the lower elevation of the parking area. The installation of a bollard in this project will reduce damage in future accidents and save the time and monetary cost associated with future repairs.

Marble slabs on various interior columns have shifted from their bases and are currently strapped in place with winch straps. Re-stabilizing the remaining marble columns would ensure that library patrons and employees are not in danger of unsecured marble slabs falling from their position.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In addition to removing a potential hazard to patrons, restoration of these aspects of the library will improve the Library's appearance and overall perception by the public as these pieces are in high traffic, publicly-accessible locations.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If this project is not completed, the library property will be a potential hazard for employees, patrons, and the public utilizing the sidewalks.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Upon Legislative approval, the County Executive will enter into a contract with the lowest responsible bidder.

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE REVIEW

The proposed legislation has been reviewed by the Comptroller's Office and is related to an authorized capital project for which there are sufficient appropriations for the action proposed.

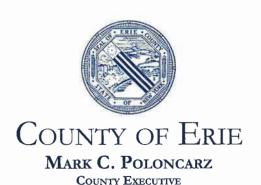

SUMMARY

It is recommended that the Legislature authorize the County Executive to enter into a contract with the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services ("ILS") to accept grant funding in the amount of \$2,910,255.00. In addition, the resolution requests authorization to subcontract with the Erie County Bar Association's Aid to Indigent Prisoners Society and the Legal Aid Bureau of Buffalo to deliver the services required through the grant. ILS is also seeking to issue a contract amendment to Distribution No. 14 combining the remaining grant funds under Distribution Nos. 12 and 13 for a total amount of \$4,365,384. By doing so, ILS will be able to issue a new 3-year contract for all distribution funding in the year 2027 and in an effort to streamline the process.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no fiscal implications to the operating budget. All services will be fully reimbursed through New York State.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

Legislative approval is required for the County Executive to enter into contracts, establish grant budgets and enter into subcontracts with community agencies.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

ILS has made \$2,910,255.00 available to Erie County to improve the quality of representation provided to indigent defendants. Erie County will utilize the funds to improve services through the Erie County Bar Association's Aid to Indigent Prisoners Society and the Legal Aid Bureau of Buffalo who contract with Erie County to provide mandated indigent defense services. These two agencies have provided said services for the County under contract for many years.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Failure to approve this resolution will serve to hinder the improvement of State mandated indigent legal services in Erie County.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Grant budgets will be established by the Division of Budget and Management. Contracts will be executed after final review by the Department of Law as to form.

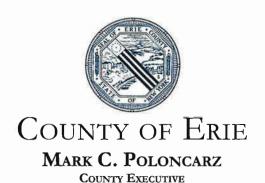

SUMMARY

Erie County Department of Senior Services is seeking approval to pay for the Going Places decals and County Seal wrapping of three new minivans to be entered into our transportation fleet. These new minivans will be added to our existing fleet and the wrapping adds to brand recognizability, which gives older adults a sense of additional security when the vans arrive for pick up. The wrapping also serves the dual purpose of promoting Live Well Erie, the County of Erie, and the Going Places program to the community-at-large while delivering the vital service of transportation to older adult residents.

These new minivans are an expansion of the current fleet of our Going Place transportation, which has not previously used this model of vehicle before. Expanding our fleet to include minivans was part of the recommendations of fleet diversification that our consultant. Having vehicles that stand out while driving through the community is essential to reaching community members who do not normally interact with the Department of Senior Services or are unaware of our services. It is our aim to use our Going Places Transportation Program vehicles as another way to promote not only the Department of Senior Services, but Erie County services and the Live Well Erie initiative as a whole.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

All funds used to wrap these new Department of Senior Services vehicles were budgeted in 2024. The budget for the wrapping and the grants to pay for them are listed below. Each wrap was \$3,200 for a total cost of \$9,600. Two wraps will be paid for out of the Department's Community Services for the Elderly Grant and one wrap will be paid by the Department's Benefit Enrollment Center grant.

REASONS FOR RECOMMEDATIONS

The Department of Senior Services recommends that your Honorable Body approve the wrapping of these new minivans. These wraps are similar to the wraps currently in our County fleet and will be highly visible to the public as they will be used to transport older adults and disabled residents daily, traveling from throughout the County. It is our aim to continue to wrap all new vehicles of our fleet in a similar manner to bring attention to the Department's programs and the County's Live Well Erie initiative.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Wrapping Going Places vans in branded decals is a longstanding practice of the Department of Senior Services. As this is a new vehicle type for our Going Places Transportation fleet, without

wrapping to match vehicles currently in fleet, older adults may feel less secure entering these vehicles because they appear different from the current vehicles. Additionally, the opportunity to promote our services in the community at large will be diminished.

Additionally, the Department of Senior Services has previously worked with Apex Graphics on van wraps. The Department and Apex Graphics discussed procurement and designs for the vinyl wrapping for these new minivan body type directly and proceeded with the work following a quote of \$9,600 before the County conducted a informal bidding process under the Erie County Purchasing Policies and Procedures. Without action by the Legislature, payment to the vendor would be limited to what the lowest bid price would have been, requiring the Division of Purchase to prepare and issue bid solicitations to at least three vendors for work that has already been done and with no intent to contract with any of the bidders, which would inefficiently divert Purchasing staff from their duties and risk a legal dispute if the bid price is lower than the vendor's quoted price.

STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Following approval, the Department of Senior Services will remit payment to Apex Graphics to for the van wraps. Thereafter the vans will be delivered to community partners to help assist with the daily transportation needs of Department clients.

WHEREAS, Apex Graphics has requested payment of the quoted price and the Department of Senior Services is satisfied with the work and cost, and desires to put the wrapped minivans in operation; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Legislature has established the Purchasing Policies and Procedures pursuant to its authority under Section 104-b of the General Municipal Law to set rules for procuring goods and services below the \$20,000 threshold for competitive bidding, and the Purchasing Policies and Procedures provide that purchases between \$5,000 and \$20,000 are made through an informal bidding process where the Purchasing Division solicits bids from at least three vendors; and

WHEREAS, without action by the Legislature, payment to the vendor would be limited to what the lowest bid price would have been, requiring the Division of Purchase to prepare and issue bid solicitations to at least three vendors for work that has already been done and with no intent to contract with any of the bidders, which would inefficiently divert Purchasing staff from their duties and risk a legal dispute if the bid price is lower than the vendor's quoted price.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature hereby waives the informal bidding process under the Purchasing Policies and Procedures as impractical and inefficient for procuring the custom vinyl wrapping; and be it further

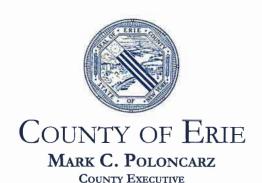

The resolution requests authorization to contract with Hexagon to install, configure, and replace Computer Aided Dispatch and the Records Management System.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Central Police Services currently has a total of \$7,000,000 in existing funds for phase 1 implementation, configuration, and replacement of Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and Records Management System (RMS) for Central Police Services with the expectation of \$4,800,000 in additional funding in to become available in 2025 for phase 2 implementation.

\$2,000,000 was reserved as part of the Central Police Services' E-911 (Fund 230, Funds Center 16500) Operating Budget that will be combined with \$5,000,000 in bonded proceeds located within Capital Project A.23009 - 2023 Police & Fire Dispatch & Record Management System Replacement.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The CAD and RMS systems, which are maintained by Central Police Services, are outdated and unable to keep up with modem technological advances.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Department of Central Police Services maintains a comprehensive law enforcement records management system, "CHARMS" that is utilized by all local Erie County law enforcement agencies.

CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

Failure to approve this request would restrict the ability of the CAD/RMS system to handle future emergency communications in Erie County, thereby not providing the citizens of Erie County with the most up-to-date emergency communication system.

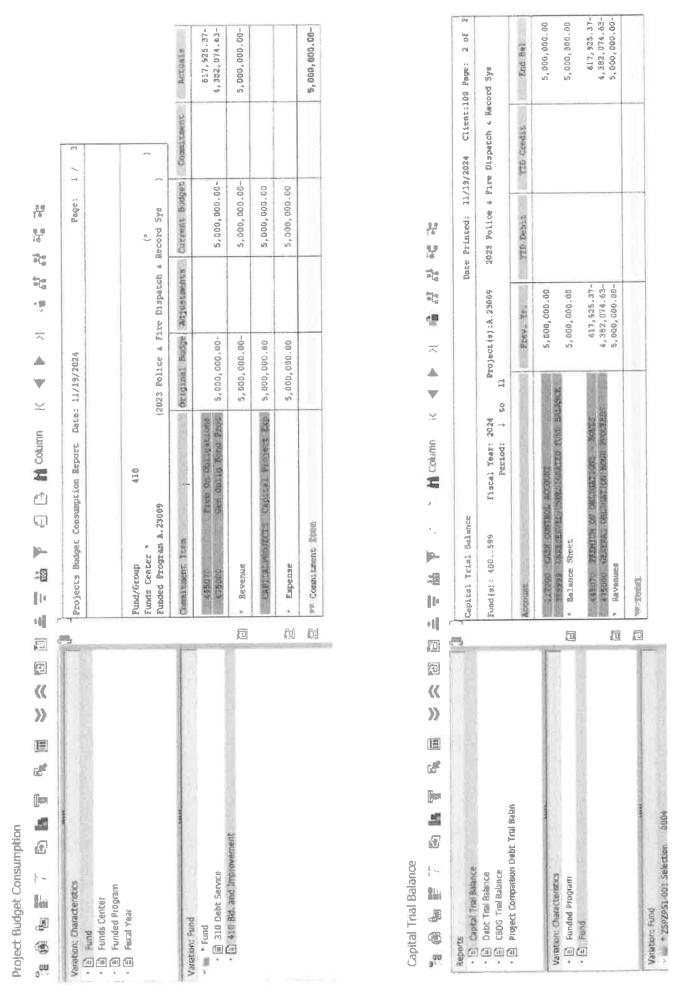

These positions will be funded by unanticipated 2024 revenues that will be carried forward to 2025 as a salary reserve.

Reasons for Recommendation

Section 400.00(4) of the New York State Penal Law states:

Before a license is issued or renewed, there shall be an investigation of all statements required in the application by the duly constituted police authorities of the locality where such application is made, including but not limited to such records as may be accessible to the division of state police or division of criminal justice services pursuant to section 400.02 of this article.

The Erie County Sheriff's Office presently conducts pistol permit investigations for the majority of Erie County (by both population and geography), including the City of Buffalo.

The Sheriff's Office needs to assign personnel to perform these duties on a part-time basis.

Consequences of Negative Action

The Erie County Sheriff's Office would not have adequate staffing to perform pistol permit investigations.

Steps Following Approval of Measure

STATE OF EMERGENCY DECLARATION

2. Nature of the claims: Claimant hereby makes claim for unlawful employment actions and violations of Claimant's civil rights including but not limited to false arrest, false imprisonment, malicious prosecution, abuse of process, assault and battery, intentional infliction of emotional distress, unintentional infliction of emotional distress, violation of civil rights pursuant to 42 USCA §1981, 1983 and 1985 (3), retaliation, defamation, libel, slander, violation of New York Civil Service Law §75, gross negligence, negligence in hiring and retaining of incompetent and unfit police officers, and investigators, negligence in the training and instruction of its police officers, and negligence in the systemic failures in the performance of its police duties. The time when, the place where and the manner in which the claims arose:

On or about October 2, 2023, Claimant was falsely arrested and wrongfully charged with multiple felonies by the Erie County Sheriff and Erie County District Attorney's office charging Claimant with false allegations including allegations of importing contraband into the Erie County Jail. At the time of his arrest Claimant was a Sheriff's Deputy employed by the Erie County Sheriff.

Upon information and belief, Claimant asserts that his prosecution was solely motivated by his prior complaint against a superior officer for creating a hostile work environment at the Erie County Jail. The officer engaged in a racially charged rant directed at African American inmates and made other derogatory remarks, which Claimant found highly inappropriate and in violation of the Erie County Sheriff's Department policies and procedures. Claimant also found the behavior personally offensive as he is a person of color.

The day after filing a complaint about the officer's racial language, the Claimant was effectively demoted and removed from his position. Despite this, the Claimant continued working at the Erie County Sheriff's department throughout July, August, and September 2023. During this period, various government agencies were actively seeking evidence against the Claimant through search warrants and subpoenas, in an apparent attempt to retaliate against Claimant for reporting the racist officer.

Before the Claimant's arrest, the Erie County Sheriff's Department obtained and executed multiple search warrants based upon the statements of an unreliable witness, an inmate at the Erie County Jail. However, no physical evidence was collected from any of these searches. The warrants were based on allegations from an Erie County Jail inmate who, it is believed, was promised favorable treatment by sheriff's deputies regarding his own criminal charges, as well as other forms of

compensation for his 'cooperation.' Throughout the investigation and prosecution of Mr. Carter, no contraband was ever recovered or presented as evidence, nor was there any corroborating proof of the crimes the Sheriff's Office was attempting to convict Claimant of. The indictment relied solely on the statements of an unreliable criminal who was being coached and influenced by the Erie County Sheriff's Department.

The investigating and arresting officers of the Erie County Sheriff's deputies and the Erie County District Attorney's Office did intentionally and/or negligently misrepresent and falsify facts and evidence and withheld information of facts in the following manner:

- a) Failure to conduct proper investigation of this matter;
- b) In failing properly to vet witnesses used in the prosecution of this matter;
- c) Failing to allow Claimant opportunity to present exculpatory proof prior to his arrest;
- d) Continued prosecution when it became abundantly clear continuation of prosecution continued without probable cause;
- e) Continuation of prosecution despite exculpatory evidence;
- f) In actively pursuing proceeding after learning it lacks merit;
- g) Proceeding in prosecution of matters after acquiring knowledge of intervening facts exonerating claimant;
- h) Failing in disclosing all matters within the knowledge that a person of ordinary intelligence would believe material on the question of guilt or innocence;
- i) Claimant believes these proceedings were commenced based upon a wrong or improper motive other than a desire to see the ends of justice served;

The Defendants herein purposefully retaliated against Plaintiff for complaining about the conduct of his superior officer.

On or about October 2, 2023, Claimant was arraigned on the original accusatory instrument and charged with at least one felony. On October 26, 2023, Claimant was arraigned before Erie County Court on a total of four (4) felonies.

On June 28, 2024, all criminal charges were dismissed against Claimant.

On August 19, 2024, Claimant was wrongfully terminated by the Erie County Sheriff's Office.

As a result of the action of the COUNTY OF ERIE by and through its ERIE COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE officers, agents, investigators and employees of these Defendants and the ERIE

COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S office, Claimant suffered shame, humiliation, indignity, damage to reputation and credit, violation of his civil rights, mental anguish, emotional distress and suffering and psychological injuries, all of which, upon information and belief, are permanent in nature. Claimant expended large sums of money for counsel fees and the cost of defense. Claimant also suffered lost wages. Claimant was detained, against her will, and deprived of her liberty. Claimant has also lost faith in his former employer and the government in administering justice.

The Claimant enjoyed a high reputation in the community in the business community and a high personal and social reputation in the community; and by reason of the premises, Claimant's reputation has been irreparably impaired, his good name and standing in the community and good name and reputation in connection with his business and occupation has been greatly impaired and damaged.

Claimant suffered and continues suffering great mental distress by reason of the said wrongful acts of these Erie County Sheriff's deputies.

Claimant was compelled to employ counsel for his respective defenses and incurred great expense for his counsel and incurred and paid other expenses by reason of said proceedings all to his damage for a monetary sum that exceeds the jurisdictional limitations of all lower courts.

As a result of the action of the County of Erie by and through its Erie County Sheriff's officers, agents, investigators and employees of these Defendants, Claimant suffered shame, humiliation, indignity, damage to reputation and credit, violation of his civil rights, mental anguish, emotional distress and suffering and psychological injuries, all of which, upon information and belief, are permanent in nature. Claimant expended large sums of money for counsel fees and the cost of defense. Claimant also suffered lost wages. Claimant was detained, against his will, and deprived of his liberty. Defendant has also lost faith in police agencies and the government in administering justice.

As a result of these failures, acts and omissions this case remained pending against the Claimant for nearly eight (8) months, and each and every day a feeling of anxiety race through Claimant about his fate in a system that he knew first hand was unfair and flawed towards him from the moment he was illegally demoted

and then falsely arrested and accused by the Erie County Sheriffs Department and Erie County District

Attorney's office.

The total sum claimed exceeds the jurisdictional limits of any lower courts.

This Notice of Intention to File a Claim is filed within the time constraints set forth in §50-e of

the General Municipal Code and §11(b) of the New York State Court of Claims Act.

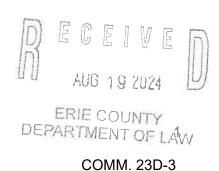

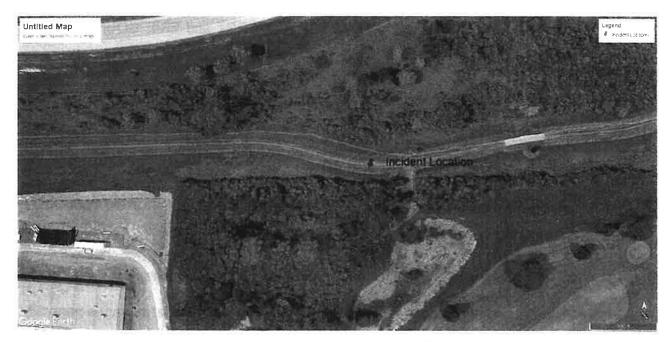

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE, that LYNNE M. LOGAN and GERARD J. LOGAN, have and hereby make claim against the TOWN OF AMHERST and ERIE COUNTY, and in support of said claim state the following:

- 1. The Post Office address of the claimants is 655 Hopkins Road, Williamsville, New York 14221.
- 2. The attorneys for the claimants are LIPSITZ GREEN SCIME CAMBRIA LLP, and their Post Office address is 42 Delaware Avenue, Suite 120, Buffalo, New York 14202-3924.
- 3. The claim of LYNNE M. LOGAN is for personal injuries, including without limitation, loss of income and medical expenses, and for consequential damages generally.
- 4. The claim of GERARD J. LOGAN is for loss of services, society, companionship and consortium as a result of his wife's accident, and for consequential damages generally.

- 5. The claim arose on a bike path commonly known as the Ellicott Creek Bike Path a/k/a Ellicott Creek Trail Way, located in the Town of Amherst, County of Erie and State of New York.
- 6. The claim arose in substance as follows: On the 15th day of June, 2024, between approximately 12:00 p.m. and 1:00 p.m., the claimant, LYNNE M. LOGAN, while lawfully riding her bicycle on the bike path was caused to contact a height differential between the bike path surface and the adjacent soil resulting in serious injuries to the claimant. The location of the incident was at approximate GPS coordinates 42°59'47.1" N, 78°46'35.7" W, and approximately 1,250 feet east along the bicycle path from that path's intersection with North Maplemere Road, and approximately 50 feet west along the path from an intersecting spur of the bike path, and on the south edge of the bike path as shown in the aerial photograph below:



- Upon information and belief, the incident herein described and the resultant 7. injuries and damages sustained were caused as a result of the negligence, carelessness, recklessness and/or unlawful conduct on the part of the agents, servants and/or employees of the TOWN OF AMHERST and ERIE COUNTY, and more particularly, among other things, in creating the hazard, in failing and omitting to make sure the pavement was even and contained a smooth transition from pavement to grass for individuals to traverse; in failing to give the claimant and others any notice and/or warning of the said dangerous and hazardous condition thereby created; in allowing and permitting the bike path to remain in a uneven, raised, hazardous and dangerous condition; in failing and omitting to reasonably anticipate that persons traversing the area could sustain physical injury by reason of the aforesaid hazardous condition; in failing and omitting to use proper maintenance and care of the bike path at the aforesaid premises; in failing and omitting to provide a safe means to traverse the aforesaid bike path and in failing and omitting to avoid the incident, which in the exercise of reasonable care, could and should have been avoided. Without limitation, Claimants may assert that the Respondents' use of the above premises constituted a special use. Without limitation, Claimants may assert that the Respondents created the hazardous condition or had notice, actual or constructive, of its existence.
- 8. Upon information and belief, as a result of the aforesaid incident, the claimant, LYNNE M. LOGAN, sustained severe bodily injuries and was painfully and seriously injured; was rendered sick, sore, lame and disabled; sustained pain and suffering and shock to her nerves and nervous system; and more particularly, LYNNE M. Contractors of the Respondents herein, the fault, neglect, and carelessness of the Respondents, their agents, servants and/or employees in that the Respondents, their agents, servants, and/or employees, and contractors, were negligent, wanton and reckless in failing to properly supervise, maintain, operate and control the medical treatment in question; that they allowed other agents, servants, employees and contractors to subject the Claimant to negligent medical care, thus creating a dangerous and hazardous condition, which they knew of, in the exercise of reasonable care, and should have known existed for some period of time; that they failed to provide sufficient and proper protection and safeguards for the Claimant, in hiring such emplyees that they knew or should have known to be incompetent, unskilled, and inexperienced; that the employees, so employed, were incompetent, unskillful and inexperienced; that the Respondents knew, or should have known of the negligent danger that they subjected the Claimant to; in failing to properly train their employees and enforce proper and adequate techniques for the care and treatment of a patient.

NINTH: a) That by the reason of the aforesaid, the Claimant, KAREN M. KOZIOL, became severely injured as a result of the medical treatment she received while under Respondents' care.

- b) Prior to the accident alleged herein, the Claimant was capable of performing, and did perform, all of her usual and customary duties. Solely as a consequence of the culpable conduct of the Respondents and their agents, employees, servants and/or contractors, jointly and severally, the Claimant had resultant injuries, pain and suffering.
- c) That as a result of the culpable conduct of the Respondents herein,
 THE CLAIMANT has suffered a pecuniary loss from the negligent caused injuries herein, in an
 amount that cannot be determined at the present time.

WHEREFORE, the Claimant respectfully prays and requests that these claims, as set forth herein, be paid and allowed by Respondents.

- 1. The claimant herein is Joseph Allegue, 49 Trinity Place, Buffalo, New York 14201.

- 3. The subject claim is for personal injuries, lost wages, and medical expenses sustained by the claimant, by reason of the negligence and statutory violations of the respondent, County of Erie and/or their employees, on June 30, 2024, at and near Route 33 Eastbound Best Street exit in the City of Buffalo.

- 4. The incident giving rise to damages occurred on June 30, 2024, as claimant, Joseph Allegue, was traveling East Bound on Route 33 within Buffalo, New York. At or around the Best Street exit he was hit head on by Isaiah Glover who was traveling West Bound in the East Bound Lanes. Mr. Glover entered on to East Bound traffic by using the Best Street exit which resulted in the head on collision between him and Joseph Allegue due to poorly maintained and/or no road markings, signs, caution tape, proper maintenance, and/or warning. Joseph Allegue sustained serious and permanent injuries as a result of this collision.
- 5. Attached as **Exhibit A** are photographs depicting East Bound exit to Best Street. Attached as **Exhibit B** is the MV-104A from the incident. Attached as **Exhibit C** are other MV-104As from Route 33 in Buffalo, New York proving that the City of Buffalo has been on notice regarding wrong way drivers and poorly signed entrances and exits.
- 6. The aforesaid injuries were caused as a result of the negligence of the respondent, County of Erie, by and through its agents, servants, and/or employees, in failing to properly design, construct, repair, and/or maintain said roads and/or exit, failing to properly sign the involved roads and/or exit with proper warning signature, failing to properly notify or warn motorists of oncoming traffic, failing to properly maintain and monitor proper sightlines and sight distances, failing to maintain and monitor vegetation and other obstructions, and failing to undertake any appropriate studies, surveys, repairs, modifications, or reconstruction of the roadway and

signage, and other appurtenances, despite knowing of previous instance of events similar to what is stated here along Route 33 in Buffalo, New York.

- 7. The claimant, Joseph Allegue, sustained conscious pain and suffering, including but not limited to, crushing injuries, severe trauma, internal injuries, and other severe and permanent injuries.
- 8. In sum, the said damages for which claim is hereby made arose in the following manner, to wit:

Since I started working at Erie County Detention, the environment has been consistently hostile, and it has become significantly worse since my return from paternity leave. I've experienced multiple forms of harassment, including being physically assaulted by staff, retaliated against, and intimidated by supervisors for reporting repeated misconduct. The tension is palpable, and anyone who speaks up is targeted and ostracized. Despite following proper channels, administration does little to address the hostile conditions, leaving me and others exposed to ongoing mistreatment.

A major issue has been the dangerous staffing ratios, especially in the Adolescent Offenders (AO) pods. Staff are frequently out of ratio, sometimes left alone with up to 16 youth when the standard calls for one staff member per six youth, with a minimum of three staff in each pod. I've personally been left alone out of ratio several times, including once with nine AOs.We are also left with 1 cuff and 2 shackles for up to 16 residents. This situation is incredibly unsafe, as these youths often display aggressive behavior. Staff are regularly assaulted, with incidents ranging from physical attacks to urine being thrown on them. Despite these assaults, youth face minimal consequences, often just two hours of room confinement or an early bedtime, which emboldens them further. This puts staff like myself at serious risk, with little support or protection.

Supervisors are largely unresponsive when staff request to be removed from dangerous pods, even after being assaulted. Staff are often forced to stay in pods with youth who pose a threat, despite formal write-ups warning of safety concerns. There is a clear lack of accountability and support for staff, which has created a demoralizing and unsafe work environment.

Staff are also being worked to exhaustion. Many of us are mandated to work shifts lasting up to 17.5 hours, five days in a row. Those who call off due to fatigue on the sixth day face consequences. One staff member, fresh out of training, was mandated for nearly a month and a half straight and eventually passed out on the job due to exhaustion. He had repeatedly informed supervisors about a pre-existing medical condition, but his concerns were ignored, leading to a serious health incident.

The handling of COVID-19 in the facility has only made things worse. Over 20 youth and numerous staff have contracted the virus, yet proper protocols to stop the spread are being ignored. Staff are regularly rotated between COVID-positive and non-COVID pods, causing the virus to spread. When staff, including myself, refused to release youth into common areas until they were tested, management only relented after confirmed positive cases were found—validating our concerns. In one pod, more than half of the 16 youth contracted COVID. Despite the clear danger, management refuses to address the situation, disregarding the health risks to staff and their families.

Supervisors are also ignoring staff members with compromised immune systems or those with family members who are vulnerable. I have personally informed supervisors that I cannot be around COVID-positive youth due to my family's health risks—my wife is recovering from complications from a C-section, and my newborn may need surgery. Despite this, I was still

placed in COVID-positive pods. One supervisor even said, "We're all just going to have to catch it for it to go away," showing a complete disregard for staff and their families' health.

The intake workers are adding to the chaos. They're rotating staff in and out of COVID-positive pods without considering safety, contributing to the continued spread of the virus. They're also mismanaging overtime, leading to missing hours on my overtime sheet, which means I may have been wrongfully mandated. Other staff with fewer hours should have been stuck instead of me.

Perhaps one of the most toxic aspects of this workplace has been the targeting and mockery of staff who use FMLA. On several occasions, intake workers have openly mocked FMLA users. On August 16 and September 20, intake workers were caught on camera mocking employees who use FMLA, referring to it as "Fake FMLA." There was even a tist made by an intake worker of all FMLA users, which they derogatorily referred to as a "Fake FMLA List." Staff who exercise their FMLA rights are punished by being stripped of awarded overtime shifts, and in some cases, like one staff member, they are even escorted out of the building by administration or told to leave immediately if it wasn't your scheduled time to leave for using their FMLA time. This behavior has created a culture of stigma around using FMLA, and staff are frequently penalized for utilizing the benefits they're legally entitled to. On September 20, I was verbally attacked by intake worker Don over the phone after I requested to be removed from a COVID pod due to my family's health risks or I would have to use FMLA and go home. He responded aggressively, saying, "You're going to stop talking to me like that in a minute, I'mma f--" and then hung up on me. When I later encountered him in the hallway, he ignored my request to leave and, along with another staff member, physically blocked my path. I wasnt aggressive at all over the phone or in the hallways.

I've been targeted multiple times for using FMLA, despite having approval. One supervisor told me it was okay to use FMLA, but I was later written up for doing exactly what was approved. This is not an isolated incident—other staff members have also reported similar retaliation. The accusation that I abuse FMLA is baseless, as I only use it when necessary to care for my wife and newborn, which is the entire purpose of FMLA. Despite this, I am consistently mandated for overtime, staying longer than scheduled, and being denied the time I need for my family's medical needs. So how am I abusing FMLA?

There are additional privacy concerns surrounding FMLA. Documents containing sensitive information about our medical conditions are often left out in the open at intake for anyone to see. On one occasion, a staff member approached me and mentioned they had seen my FMLA paperwork lying on the intake desk, which compromised my privacy. It's completely unacceptable that such sensitive information is not being properly handled, further adding to the hostile environment.

Intake workers also falsify records, pre-signing the logbook during night shifts so they can sleep instead of conducting mandatory rounds. Staff on the 11 PM to 7 AM shift are regularly out of

ratio, with doors left unsecured. I've personally experienced delays in being let back into the building after my break because central control, which manages all the doors, was asleep. This is not just a violation of protocol; it's a serious safety issue. If an emergency like a fire or a riot occurred, no one would be able to move or exit the building if central control was asleep.

Favoritism in overtime distribution is another major problem. While some staff struggle to get on the overtime list, one employee has accumulated over 600 hours of overtime, while others are denied opportunities. Management's claim that overtime goes to those with fewer hours is clearly false, as the same people keep getting the shifts. This favoritism, combined with retaliation for using FMLA, has made it nearly impossible for me and others to get fair treatment. I believe I am entitled to compensation for lost wages. Despite supervisors refusing to give me and other staff overtime shifts at times, certain employees are given excessive hours all the time. It's unfair and unethical, especially when other Youth Detention Workers (YDW) are actively requesting overtime but are constantly passed over.

.The problems within Erie County Detention are systemic and go beyond just a few bad actors. Supervisors and intake workers are not only ignoring the rules, but they are also actively creating a toxic environment by targeting staff who speak up or use their legal rights like FMLA. The harassment, unsafe conditions, and blatant disregard for both staff and youth's safety have made the work environment unbearable. When these issues are reported, they're either dismissed or treated as gossip, with little to no action taken.

Even when I reported instances of racism, harassment, and misconduct to the county's EEO office, my concerns were dismissed or laughed at. For example, when I reported being called racial slurs like "nigga," "African King," and "Little black man," the EEO officer attempted to justify the behavior instead of taking it seriously. These comments were particularly hurtful because I am not African, yet people assume I am due to the color of my skin. Being subjected to this kind of treatment on top of everything else has made it clear that no one at the administrative level is taking the necessary steps to correct the systemic problems in the building.

In addition to the emotional and psychological toll of working in this environment, U was assaulted by a YDW in Orange pod. When I walked in he grabbed me by my shirt and pulled me to his face and told me I was a, "bitch". I was also assaulted by the County Commissioner (Which is detailed in Attached documents).

The systemic failures at Erie County Detention, combined with the targeted harassment, especially over FMLA, have created a toxic and unsafe work environment. Despite reporting these issues through the proper channels, nothing has changed, and the harassment, unsafe conditions, and lack of accountability continue.

Federal Violations:

- 1. Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) 29 U.S.C. § 2615(a)(1) & (2):
 - Interference with FMLA Rights: I have been targeted for using my approved FMLA leave, including being written up and denied overtime. FMLA specifically prohibits interference with or retaliation against employees for using their leave.
 - Discrimination for Exercising FMLA Rights: Staff have mocked FMLA users, and I was verbally attacked by an intake worker for requesting leave. The retaliation violates the protections granted by the FMLA.
- 2. Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) 29 U.S.C. § 654:
 - Failure to Maintain a Safe Workplace: Staff are left out of ratio, placed in unsafe conditions, and assaulted by youth. OSHA requires that employers provide a workplace free from recognized hazards, which Erie County Detention has failed to do.
- 3. Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA):
 - Overtime Violations: Favoritism in overtime assignments and denying mandated breaks after working extended shifts may constitute violations of federal wage and hour laws.

New York State Violations:

- 1. New York Paid Family Leave Act N.Y. Workers' Comp. Law § 203 & § 204:
 - Interference with Paid Family Leave: I and other staff have been harassed for using FMLA leave. The mocking, retaliation, and stripping of overtime shifts for FMLA users violate New York's Paid Family Leave protections.
 - Failure to Provide Notice of Rights: New York law mandates that employees be informed of their Paid Family Leave rights, and the mismanagement of FMLA documentation and failure to process leave requests properly violate this provision.
- 2. New York Labor Law Article 19:
 - Overwork and Fatigue: Staff are mandated to work up to 17.5-hour shifts
 without proper relief. One staff member passed out from exhaustion after
 supervisors ignored his health concerns. This overwork violates state labor laws
 concerning rest periods and work hours.

County of Erie Violations:

1. FMLA Harassment and Retaliation (Section V of County Policies):

- Mocking and Retaliation: The behavior of intake workers mocking FMLA users and the "Fake FMLA List" violates the County's own rules prohibiting harassment and retaliation for exercising FMLA rights.
- 2. Failure to Ensure Adequate Staffing Ratios (Section IV of County Safety Policies):
 - Dangerous Staffing Ratios: Staff are left out of ratio in Adolescent Offender
 (AO) pods, directly violating the County's policies that require safe staff-to-youth
 ratios. This endangers both staff and youth, and management's failure to address
 these safety concerns violates county safety regulations.
- 3. Neglect of COVID-19 Protocols:
 - Negligent Rotation of Staff in COVID-Positive Pods: Management has
 disregarded basic COVID-19 safety protocols, rotating staff between
 COVID-positive and non-COVID pods, leading to the spread of the virus. This
 neglect violates public health guidelines and places staff and their families at risk.
- 4. Improper Handling of Medical Privacy:
 - Violation of Privacy: Sensitive medical information regarding FMLA usage is left out in the open at intake, violating both County and federal privacy standards under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA).

Specific incidents and Retaliation:

- August 16 and September 20, 2024: Intake workers were caught on camera mocking FMLA users, and on September 20, I was verbally attacked over the phone by intake worker Don when requesting leave. This harassment, coupled with management's failure to address repeated complaints, is a clear violation of my legal rights.
- Racial Harassment: I reported being subjected to racial slurs such as "nigga" and "Little black man," yet my complaints were dismissed by the County's EEO office, further contributing to the hostile work environment.
- Unsafe Work Conditions: The lack of proper safety measures has led to numerous
 assaults on staff. The minimal consequences faced by youth for these assaults, such as
 room confinement for only two hours, emboldens further violence and endangers staff
 like myself.

The Erie County Detention Center on Ferry Street has become a challenging and distressing workplace environment under the management of Kenneth Simmons, known as "Pastor Kenny." As an employee, I have witnessed and experienced numerous instances of misconduct, harassment, and unprofessional behavior by Mr. Simmons. His actions, which include using offensive language, promoting discriminatory narratives, and intimidating both staff and residents, have created a toxic atmosphere that undermines the integrity and safety of the facility. This introduction outlines the serious concerns and specific incidents that illustrate the deteriorating conditions at the detention center, highlighting the urgent need for intervention and corrective action.

Kenneth Simmons insists that things must be done his way or not at all. He's always boasting about his \$100,000 salary, often under the guise of giving a "motivational speech." However, during these speeches, he simultaneously belittles other staff members while addressing the youth. He frequently brags about his past criminal activities, claiming to have been a killer, robber, pimp, and involved in other illegal acts, and talks about carrying a big black 9mm gun that he locks in a box every morning. He uses these stories to try to connect with the youth, but they still feel a disconnect. He's even gone so far as to threaten to shoot a staff member or throw something at them while entering his office.

Kenneth openly refers to his employees using derogatory terms like "cocksuckers," "faggots," "niggas," "bitches," and "hoes," which is completely unprofessional. It's incredibly uncomfortable to have my boss constantly call me a "nigga" or "little black man," even through text messages. Being constantly referred to as 'African King' is uncomfortable for me, especially because it assumes my heritage based on my darker skin. This often happens in front of youth, which leads to them making African jokes. I find it embarrassing and disrespectful, particularly since my family's lineage in America goes back beyond slavery.

He brags about all the illegal activities he got away with and how he puts money on his former criminal friends' books because they never snitched on him when they went to jail. He hires ex-cons, like a certain YDW, who never betrayed him, almost as a quid pro quo. This individual got the job in exchange for not snitching and is now used to monitor other employees and report back to him. He also boasted about how his son got caught with a bunch of guns and drugs and he "Pulled some strings" to get them out of trouble

Kenneth constantly taunts staff about their race in a building predominantly filled with African American people or about their upbringing if he knows their background. For example, on April 20th, right before lunch, he targeted Darnell, who works the 7-3 shift, calling him out in front of everyone and accusing him of lying about being wealthy. It

was humiliating, and the kids kept talking about it. Darnell was visibly uncomfortable and angry after Kenny left around noon. This is not the first time he has done this.

He continues to harass my colleague, JJC Taylor, (The employee he threatened to shoot). She frequently tells me about his open criticism, where he calls her "soft." We both witnessed him yelling at Ms. Katy in his office about her and me questioning his decision to confine Anthony to his room. It's clear that he wants her gone and replaced with Todd, who is more lenient with the kids. He even removed Ms. Taylor from the pods and replaced her with Todd when he was just a trainee. Kenny constantly criticizes her for not being hard on the YDWs, even though that is the shift supervisor's responsibility. Additionally, he frequently undermines her by reminding her that she is a "white girl trying to fit in, or when a conversation comes up about black people he tells her to, "Close her ears".

He is in the building walking around all day everyday flexing his power and it's really intimidating to some employees to the point where they feel they need to hide or look super busy when he is around. For some reason he feels the need to call employees on off days from his personal cell phone to talk about work related errors, he comes off as very condescending. Tried to intimidate me on our phone call about write ups multiple times saying he is worse than the state when I said I didn't know the state comes to see our write ups. He even belittled me when I asked to have a meeting with him about threats made to my family in the pods, he referred and constantly still refers to me as, "Little Black Man".

When I reported Tina for her negative behavior towards me, he immediately got defensive. Ruby and I had aiready resolved the issue peacefully, but he sent an aggressive text saying, "Call me now!!!!" I felt uncomfortable calling him, so I didn't. He was CC'd in the email, and we ended up in a heated argument via email because he and other staff kept bullying me, and I was fed up with it. They seemed more concerned about how I reported it than the fact that I was being harassed, even though I followed protocol. He requested a meeting on April 4th, and during the meeting, he got physically aggressive with me in the hallway, constantly bumping into me and talking about how he fights and shoots, saying he's very confrontational. He even said, "We can take this shit outside if you want to." All of this happened because I reported someone for making me uncomfortable? The incident occurred on April 4th, 2024, at 7:00 am in the hallway, and all of this is recorded.

Kenny came into the pod very aggressively, saying, "Y'all better be glad the Lord is in my life." He brings a vibe reminiscent of Rikers Island, telling people to "get with the program," though it's more about mental manipulation than physical intimidation to make people fall in line. He said he "doesn't give a fuck about my rights" and threatened that if I don't stop speaking up about harassment, I'll be fired. He claimed the higher-ups

are all out to get me because I speak up. This is the second time in two weeks that he's brought this up, and he keeps reminding me that I'm provisional, and even If I wasn't it would be nothing to find a way to get rid of me. This all started because I exposed the supervisors in my complaint about another supervisor and my rebuttal to an unfair write-up (attached). On June 21st at 2:30, the situation ruined my entire day, leaving me feeling suicidal. I even had to call the suicide hotline because I can't afford to lose my job, but I'm exhausted from being treated like this. No one ever investigates the problems; they just tell me to stop reporting every time.

Kenny told me that the white employees sabotage others if they complain too much or step out of line. He said this on camera between 2:45-3:00 PM on June 14th walking out the pod. He also told me that I'm "flexing too much" by reporting people and that I'm still a "freshman." He keeps reminding me that just because I get good reviews doesn't mean anything and that I'm still provisional, meaning I could be fired at any time. He brings this up every time I complain about something. I didn't feel comfortable reporting workplace harassment to anyone in this building, so I went outside the organization, and now they're targeting me for it. Kenny was furious that I went over everyone's head to report a supervisor, just like he allows the youth to do with us. I was assured by Deidre Brown that I wouldn't face retaliation, but that's exactly what Kenny did when he found out. He's digging into my record, calling around to other pods forcing Admin Cynthia to do this without her knowledge on what's going on.

He also undermines the youth by reminding them that he has their judges on speed dial, even going so far as to tell one young person that "his life is in his hands" because he writes the recommendations for the judges. He boasts about his connections with specific judges, claiming they visit the jail frequently and know him personally. This behavior has led the youth to become too comfortable at Ferry Street, treating it like a dormitory. They enjoy being in jail, making it unlikely that the detention center will succeed in reducing recidivism. The youth often say things like, "Rob and kill a nigga, come to ECD and get a pizza party," and they brag to their friends on phone calls about how "lit" it is. He even vouches for known gang members in court, despite knowing they're unlikely to change, and many return with more charges.

Kenny knows about Jahod visitor being his guardian and lover. Jahod is 17 years old and has been groomed by this woman since he was 15, he feels on here sexually in the visit area and nothing was done about it. Jahod opening boasts in the pods about how he is sleeping with a 28 year old. It's to the point where Jahod doesn't even know he isn't being taken advantage of. Kenneth even came in the pod and boasted about how he was "young with an old joint too" making it seem to Jahod that it was okay to be molested. This situation contributes to a hostile environment, as Jahod frequently returns to the pod upset if his partner doesn't respond to his inquiries about potential

infidelity. On one occasion, he was visibly agitated and prepared for confrontation after making threats on the county phone. Additionally, the presence of multiple staff and residents engaging in sexual relations with the same individual exacerbates Jahod's distress, leading to frequent outbursts and a sense of unsafety within the facility

Moreover, he frequently talks about God and prays, and when someone doesn't share his beliefs, he tries to persuade them to follow his religion. It's EXTREMELY UNCOMFORTABLE to be pressured into praying at work, especially when I'm not a Christian, I am a Wiccan. On 03/29/24, he baptized kids, and I felt awkward and unsure whether I should participate because I'm at work, not at church. Is he acting as a pastor or a deputy commissioner? If I don't join in, will there be consequences? Being new and feeling uncomfortable I just went along with it. He needs to understand that not everyone shares his religious beliefs and that church and state should remain separate for this reason.

Kenneth consistently undermines the chain of command and disrespects staff in front of the youth. He rarely supports us, and there are residents who verbally threaten and attempt to attack staff on multiple occasions, with only an early lock-in as a response. Once the youth are out of lock-in, they often escalate their behavior. Some residents have even threatened to rob or kill certain staff members if they encounter them outside the center. When staff tries to discipline the youth, Kenneth frequently oversteps, either reversing disciplinary actions or completely ignoring the staff's input. Residents often have to physically attack staff before any action is taken to move them. The night before, they didn't support me; they allowed a resident to throw his entire lunch in a staff room and did nothing beyond an early lock-in, refusing to place disruptive kids in the behavior pod despite multiple fights and aggressive behavior (04/10/2024).

Kenneth makes my job incredibly challenging by constantly undermining staff and ignoring the chain of command. Youth frequently tells the staff things like, "I'll go to Pastor Kenny; I don't have to do anything you say." When Roberto reported me for writing him up for playing in the hall, Kenneth claimed he'd "handled it" and then pulled me aside the next day. He refuses to put kids in confinement because he doesn't want to affect his statistics. Which was stated on Camera when a youth got pink and went into his room. Staff joke that "I'm not Malik, my write-ups stick," making the youth feel they don't have to listen to me as a YDW. Kenneth took me out of the pod after taking my write-up back, letting the whole staff and pod laugh about me, which made me look powerless. This write up Is attached; it clearly says, "To be reviewed by deputy commissioner."

He removed resident Anthony B. from a management plan (on multiple occasions) JJC had said it should remain in place until Monday, violating the 7-day plan by allowing the youth a visit and phone call on 05/03-05/04. When the youth asked him about the

management plan he replied, "You ain't gotta serve that shit". The youth has since shown no respect for our authority, even making threats and acting aggressively after throwing chess pieces. This same youth is involved in gang initiation, forcing other residents to fight to join the gang. Whenever they act out, they call Pastor Kenny, who eases their consequences. He pretends to be supportive of staff but always sides with the kids. Kenneth also allows parents to disrespect JJC staff and lets them call him directly on his personal phone to handle staff issues, despite not being their direct supervisor.

Kenneth frequently interferes with administration, often bypassing three administrators to get his way. On May 4th at 11:00 am, when I asked about a resident's plan over the county phone, he reacted aggressively, making threats. He said, 'You know what, Malik? I'm going to come up there and lose my shit on the entire yellow pod staff included.' This was because I questioned his actions regarding Anthony's plan. He regularly undermines our team and reacts aggressively when we point out his actions.

Kenneth acts as if he can do whatever he wants, pressuring Chrissy to put AO and JD in the same pod and going over JJC's head to adjust levels for Messiah and Edris, making JJC so uncomfortable that she refused to sign the level B on the count sheet (7-3) on 04/17. Supervisors have expressed frustration with Kenneth, and on 05/02/2024, he told Val he does what he wants, even when it's against the rules. He admitted to smoking and drinking as a pastor. He took Edris off of room confinement after attacking YDW VAL and gave him a visit. He didn't tell anyone anything, just came in the pod and took him to the visit. JJC and staff were confused. (This is documented in the books dates to come.)

The handling of COVID-19 was also problematic. When a resident was diagnosed, Kenneth did very little to stop the spread, only locking down the pod instead of halting all movement. Staff were shuffled in and out of the pod, which could have caused further spread, and those who were never in the pod were forced to work there. Admin didn't consider staff with vulnerable family members or place staff who had nearly died during the pandemic in a safer environment.

There are also issues with security. Memos are issued about clothing, but nothing about the full magazine found in a locker or the break-in to Renika's car, with no sheriff on site. This building is one of the few county buildings without a sheriff. It took weeks to mail a letter about the buillets, but no alert was given to those who might be at risk. This lack of attention makes me question my safety.

In conclusion, the working conditions at the Erie County Detention Center have become intolerable under Kenneth Simmons' management. His unprofessional behavior, including using derogatory language and promoting a toxic environment, has created a

hostile workplace that endangers the well-being of both staff and residents. His actions undermine staff authority, promote unsafe practices, and foster a culture of fear and intimidation. The consistent neglect of proper procedures and the disregard for staff and resident safety, particularly during critical situations such as the COVID-19 pandemic, further exacerbate the situation. This environment not only compromises the integrity of the institution but also has significant negative impacts on staff morale and mental health. It is imperative that immediate and thorough action is taken to address these issues, ensuring a safe and respectful workplace for all employees and residents.

Re: October 2024 Budget Monitoring Report

Dear Honorable Members:

Please find attached the Budget Monitoring Report (BMR) for the period ending October 31, 2024. Additionally, please see a position vacancy report as of October 31, 2024.

The BMR shows that for the first ten (10) months of 2024 the County has a \$12,897,500 positive variance, which can be attributed to several key factors.

On the positive, total Interest Earnings revenue is nearly \$15.7 million over budget for the period and has exceeded the total budgeted amount for the year by more than \$13.8 million (\$21.9 million total earned; \$8.1 million budgeted). Given the County's strong cash position, the continuation of historic interest rates and the Comptroller's aggressive investment strategies, we should expect Interest Earnings to continue to be a significant source of overall positive variance within the 2024 Adopted Budget.

Also, the County has realized more than \$8.1 million in county-share savings for the period on total personnel related costs which can be mostly attributed to vacancy savings. This is despite being nearly \$4.7 million over budget on overtime expenses for the period, nearly two-thirds of which (\$2.8 million) is exclusively within the Sheriff's Police Services Division, which has now exceeded its annual budget (of \$6 million) by \$1.8 million (\$7.8 million expended) with two (2) months remaining in the year. Other relevant departments over budget for the period include: Sheriff's Jail Management (\$1.24 million), Buildings & Grounds (\$240,782), Youth Detention (\$173,480), Clerk's Auto Bureau (\$164,189), and Health Division (\$131,201).

On the negative side, sales tax receipts continue to be a concern. October-related payments were 1.41% (or -\$683,595) less than for October 2023. Year-to-date sales tax receipts remain roughly even (-.01%) through October (vs 0.11% through September) with 2023.

We still project a year-end sales tax shortfall of approximately \$22.5 million (from \$20.6 million last month). To meet the 2024 Adopted Budget for sales tax (\$639.3 million), it would require growth of 29% for the remainder of the year. With a next 3rd quarter reconciliation payment scheduled for December 28th, we remain optimistic that sales tax revenues will continue to rally through the 4th quarter of the year and close this year-end gap further.

The BMR also includes an initial projection for year-end 2024. It shows a projected year-end 2024 surplus of \$10,094,858. This is a projection, subject to change due to sales tax receipts, New York State or Federal actions, the timing of IGT payments or the impact to other key accounts.

As the year progresses, we will continue to closely monitor sales tax receipts and growth trends and report to your Honorable Body. I think it is also important to note that even though sales tax is among the largest individual variables in determining an overall budget variance, it is not the only variable. As you can see in this BMR, as of the first ten (10) months of 2024, we still have a modest positive variance and are projecting a slight year-end surplus, despite the underperformance of sales tax.

As always, I am available to attend a meeting of your Honorable Body's Finance and Management Committee to report on the March BMR or any other fiscal matters.

This collaboration drives visitor spending, benefiting local businesses and the community while allowing Buffalo to stay competitive by accessing industry best practices.

Continuing Recovery of International Inbound Travel and Tourism in the U.S. – Tourism Economics



As the summer season progresses, strong travel demand, growth in outbound trips, and a continued recovery in inbound international travel are boosting U.S. airport traffic.

Looking back at early 2024, Over 360 million travelers passed through U.S. airport security checkpoints from January to May, including over 10 million during Memorial Day weekend alone.

International arrivals to the U.S. through May were 14% below 2019 levels, despite a 20% increase over last year. Recovery rates varied by region, with Central America showing the strongest rebound, up 16% compared to the first five months of 2019.

This surge in U.S. airport traffic and the steady recovery of international travel directly support Visit Buffalo Niagara's global sales efforts. With growing inbound travel, there's an increased opportunity to attract international tourists to Buffalo as a unique U.S. destination. As more travelers seek diverse and authentic experiences, Visit Buffalo Niagara can leverage this momentum to showcase the region's cultural, historical, and recreational attractions to overseas markets. The recovery in key regions also highlights potential areas to target through marketing campaigns and partnerships, helping to position Buffalo as an appealing option for international visitors looking to explore beyond major U.S. cities. This alignment with rising travel trends aids in boosting Buffalo's visibility globally, ultimately driving economic growth through international tourism.

Q3 2024 Administration Highlights

Record-Breaking Visitor Spend In Erie County

According to the annual visitor spending study commissioned by New York State and conducted by the Oxford Economics Company, Tourism Economics, visitor economic impact in Erie County has continued to surpass pre-pandemic levels to reach a new high: Traveler spending rose 11.2 percent to \$2.4 billion in 2023, going above the previous \$2.2 billion high of 2022, according to the latest economic impact study.

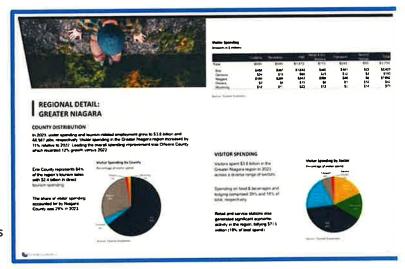
Spending in Erie County represents 64 percent of the region's 2023 tourism sales. Increases from 2022 by business category are:

- Lodging spending was \$455 million, up by 13.5 percent.
- Recreation spending was \$267 million, up by 16.1 percent.
- Food and beverage was \$1.03 billion, up by 11.1 percent.
- Retail was \$465 million, up by 5.2 percent.
- Transportation was \$181 million, up by 18.3 percent.
- Second home ownership was \$23 million, up by 4.5 percent.

The increase in tourism spending has also impacted employment: The number of people employed in tourism-related jobs is 28,650, up 4.6 percent.

Were it not for tourism-generated state and local taxes, the average household in Erie County would have to pay an additional \$648 annually, said Patrick Kaler, Visit Buffalo Niagara's president and CEO. This tax contribution is up nine percent from 2022, he said. "Buffalo and Erie County are fortunate to have an exciting visitor experience that continues to bring more visitors year after year," Kaler said. "Tourism has also proven to be a good job creator for Western New York. This is especially true in Erie County."





Kaler is also encouraged by the growth in leisure travel from New York City and other markets that he expects to see continued growth in: Boston, Chicago, Philadelphia, and Washington, D.C. "Visitors from those areas tend to stay longer and spend more money than people who drive to Buffalo from closer places like Central New York, Cleveland and Pittsburgh," said Kaler.

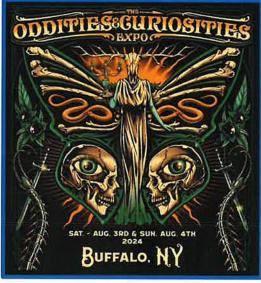

Total actual revenue was up by \$203,656 from the Goal Revenue in the third quarter. This increase is due to an increase in food and beverage revenue as a result of a couple groups exceeding their F&B projections; those groups include the American Cheese Society (\$33,768 over projection,), M&T Bank Meeting (\$44,716 over projection) and Black Achievers (\$24,438 over projection. Total year-to-date revenue continues to steadily increase, now reaching \$993,425 over 2023.

Opinion

We have audited the balance sheets of Buffalo Niagara Convention Center Management Corporation (the Center) as of December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Notes to Financial Statements

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

Organization:

Buffalo Niagara Convention Center Management Corporation (the Center) is a nonprofit corporation organized to operate, manage and promote a convention center facility located in the City of Buffalo, New York (the City) pursuant to an agreement with Erie County, New York (the County). The Corporation has one class of members which consists of the City and the County.

The Center grants credit to individuals, businesses and nonprofit organizations located throughout the United States.

Buffalo Niagara Convention and Visitors Bureau, Inc. (d/b/a Visit Buffalo Niagara (VBN)) and its affiliated entities are related to the Center through shared administration and common board members. The Center reimbursed VBN \$12,000 and \$19,400 in fees for shared administrative services in 2023 and 2022.

Governmental Support:

Under the terms of an annual public benefit services contract (service contract) with the County, the Center received subsidies for operations in 2023 and 2022 totaling \$1,981,286 and \$1,923,578, representing 32% and 35% of total revenue and support for each year. The service contract also requires the Center to repay the County any surplus funds at the end of the contract year, calculated as the excess of net assets over the 6 months average of operating expenses, based on actual expenses for the 36 months immediately preceding the current year. The Center had no calculated surplus funds for 2023 or 2022.

Funding by the County for the year ending December 31, 2024 will continue in the form of a subsidy to the Center totaling \$2,581,286 under the terms of an agreement executed on March 21, 2024. Funding beyond December 31, 2024 is contingent upon actions taken by the County that are consistent with prior years. The Board and management of the Center believe sufficient funding arrangements will be made timely, so uninterrupted operations will continue beyond that time.

During 2022, the Center recognized \$345,977 of refundable credits under the Employee Retention Credit program of the CARES Act in response to the COVID-19 pandemic declared by the World Health Organization in February 2020. These credits, which were received in December 2022, are included in revenue on the 2022 statement of activities.

Use of Estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Subsequent Events:

Management has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through November 12, 2024, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Cash:

At various times, cash in financial institutions may exceed federally insured limits and subject the Center to concentrations of credit risk.

Accounts Receivable:

Accounts receivable are stated at the amount management expects to collect from balances outstanding at year-end. Management provides for probable uncollectible amounts through a charge to bad debts expense and a credit to the allowance for doubtful accounts based on its assessment of the current status of individual accounts, historical trends, and existing and forecasted economic conditions. Balances still outstanding after management has used reasonable collection efforts are written off through a charge to the allowance for doubtful accounts and a credit to accounts receivable.

Inventory:

Inventory consists primarily of food and beverage products and is valued at the lower of first-in, first-out cost or net realizable value.

Property and Equipment:

The Center is operated for the County under a service concession arrangement, defined as an arrangement between a public sector entity grantor and an operating entity under which the operating entity operates the grantor's infrastructure. Consequently, property and equipment purchases are generally expensed as incurred. Property and equipment purchases expensed in 2023 and 2022 totaled \$7,050 and \$95,744.

Revenue Recognition:

Revenue is recognized when related events occur. Customer payment is generally due within 30 days of an event. Deferred revenue consists of deposits received in advance of scheduled events when required by contract terms.

Sales Tax:

Certain jurisdictions impose a sales tax on the Center's sales to nonexempt customers. The Center collects these taxes from customers and remits the entire amount accordingly. Taxes collected and remitted are excluded from revenues and expenses in the accompanying financial statements.

Functional Allocation of Expenses:

The costs of providing program and supporting services have been summarized on a functional basis in the statements of functional expenses. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. These costs include salaries and benefits, which are allocated on the basis of estimates of time and effort.

Income Taxes:

The Center is a 501(c)(3) organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code.

3. Short-Term Borrowings:

The Center has available a \$400,000 bank demand line of credit for working capital financing with interest payable at prime plus 1½%. The line is secured by essentially all assets of the Center. Amounts outstanding on this line at December 31, 2023 totaled \$200,000. There were no amounts outstanding at December 31, 2022.

4. Retirement Plans:

The Center maintains a noncontributory, defined contribution profit sharing plan covering essentially all nonunion employees. The Center can make discretionary contributions to the plan. Total expense under this plan was \$24,500 for 2023 and \$13,300 for 2022.

The Center also contributes to a defined contribution pension plan covering eligible employees of one union group. Contributions are determined pursuant to the collective bargaining agreement between the Center and the union. Total expense under this plan was \$4,781 for 2023 and \$3,024 for 2022.

The Center's other union employees are covered by defined benefit multi-employer plans pursuant to the terms of collective bargaining agreements. The risks of participating in these multiemployer plans are different from single-employer plans in the following aspects:

- Assets contributed to the multiemployer plans by one employer may be used to provide benefits to employees of other participating employers.
- b. If a participating employer stops contributing to a plan, the unfunded obligations of the plan may be borne by the remaining participating employers.
- c. If the Center chooses to stop participating in a multiemployer plan, the Center may be required to pay the plan an amount based on the underfunded status of the plan, referred to as a withdrawal liability.

The Center's participation in the plans for the years ended December 31, 2023 and 2022 is outlined in the table below. The "EIN/Pension Plan Number" column provides the Employer Identification Number (EIN) and the three-digit plan number. The most recent Pension Protection Act (PPA) zone statuses available in 2023 and 2022 are for the following plan year ends: December 31, 2023 and 2022 for the Service Employees Pension Fund of Upstate NY (Plan 1), and January 31, 2023 and 2022 for the Central Pension Fund of the IUOE & Participating Employers (Plan 2). The zone status is based on information that the Center received from the plans and is certified by the plans' actuaries. Among other factors, plans in the red zone are generally less than 65 percent funded, plans in the yellow zone are less than 80 percent funded, and plans in the green zone are at least 80 percent funded. The "FIP/RP Status Pending/Implemented" column indicates whether a financial improvement plan (FIP) or a rehabilitation plan (RP) is either pending or has been implemented. The last column lists the expiration date of the collective bargaining agreement to which the plan is subject.

5. Contingencies:

The Center is involved in legal proceedings, which in the opinion of management, will not have a material adverse impact on the financial position of the Center.

6. Financial Resources Available for Operations:

The Center obtains financial assets generally through a government grant, in-house catering services and rentals. The financial assets are acquired throughout the year to help meet the Center's cash needs for general expenditures. If necessary, the Center also has access to a \$400,000 bank demand line of credit (Note 3).

The Board of Directors

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the balance sheet of Buffalo Niagara Convention Center Management Corporation (the Center), as of December 31, 2023, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated November 12, 2024.

Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Center's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Center's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Center's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies, and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that have not been identified. However, as described below, we did identify certain deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses.

Financial Reporting

Our audit of the Center's 2023 financial statements revealed that key general ledger accounts, including cash, were not reconciled timely, which resulted in significant additional analysis and adjustments subsequent to year end. Additionally, we noted the Center did not timely record transactions to the general ledger during the year.

We recommend management implement additional procedures to ensure accounts are reconciled to the general ledger and activity of the Center is recorded in a timely manner.

Management Response

During 2023, the Center terminated its controller and hired a replacement. However, the replacement was not suited for the position and was terminated in May 2024. The Center hired a new controller in June 2024. Additional policies and procedures will also be implemented, including regular meetings between the controller and General Manager of the Center, specific training for the individual on the accounting software, and specific monthly closing procedures will be established, including reconciliation of key accounts.

Management's Response to Findings

Government Auditing Standards require the auditor to perform limited procedures on the Center's response to the findings identified in our audit, and is described above. The Center's response was not subjected to the other auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements, and accordingly, we express no opinion on the response.

Report on Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Center's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Center's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Center's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

We have audited the financial statements of Buffalo Niagara Convention Center Management Corporation (the Center) for the year ended December 31, 2023, and have issued our report thereon dated November 12, 2024. Professional standards also require that we advise you of the following information related to our audit.

Our Responsibility in Relation to the Financial Statement Audit

As communicated in our engagement letter dated February 2, 2024 our responsibility, as described by professional standards, is to form and express opinions about whether the financial statements that have been prepared by management with your oversight are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP). Our audit of the financial statements does not relieve you or management of its respective responsibilities.

Our responsibility, as prescribed by professional standards, is to plan and perform our audit to obtain reasonable, rather than absolute, assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit of financial statements includes consideration of internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Center's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, as part of our audit, we considered the internal control of the Center solely for the purpose of determining our audit procedures and not to provide any assurance concerning such internal control.

We are also responsible to communicate significant matters related to the audit that are, in our professional judgment, relevant to your responsibilities in overseeing the financial reporting process. However, we are not required to design procedures for the purpose of identifying other matters to communicate to you.

We have provided our comments regarding internal controls and other matters noted during our audit in a separate letter to you.

Planned Scope and Timing of the Audit

We conducted our audit consistent with the planned scope previously communicated to you in the engagement letter; however, delays were encountered during the performance of the audit.

Compliance with All Ethics Requirements Regarding Independence

The engagement team, others in our firm, as appropriate, and our firm have complied with all relevant ethical requirements regarding independence.

Qualitative Aspects of the Center's Significant Accounting Practices and Significant Risks

Significant Accounting Policies

Management has the responsibility to select and use appropriate accounting policies. A summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the Center are included in Note 1 to each of the financial statements. There have been no initial selection of accounting policies and no changes in significant accounting policies or their application during 2023. No matters have come to our attention that would require us, under professional standards, to inform you about (1) the methods used to account for significant unusual transactions and (2) the effect of significant accounting policies in controversial or emerging areas for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus.

Significant Accounting Estimates and Audit Risk Items

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's current judgments. Those judgments are normally based on knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ markedly from management's current judgments. The most sensitive and significant accounting estimates and audit risk items affecting the financial statements and our audits include:

- Collectability of accounts receivable
- Functional expense allocations

Management's estimates of the above are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. We evaluated the key factors and assumptions used to develop the estimates above and determined they are reasonable in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

Financial Statement Disclosures

Certain financial statement disclosures involve significant judgment and are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. We evaluated all disclosures in relation to the financial statements as a whole and determined they are reasonable.

Significant Difficulties Encountered During the Audit

Key general ledger accounts were not reconciled timely which resulted in significant audit difficulties.

Uncorrected and Corrected Misstatements

For purposes of this communication, professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audits, other than those that we believe are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Further, professional standards require us to also communicate the effect of uncorrected misstatements related to prior periods on the relevant classes of transactions, account balances or disclosures, and the financial statements as a whole. Uncorrected misstatements or matters underlying those uncorrected misstatements could potentially cause future-period financial statements to be materially misstated, even though the uncorrected misstatements are immaterial to the financial statements currently under audit. We discovered no uncorrected misstatements during our audit.

In addition, professional standards require us to communicate to you all material, corrected misstatements that were brought to the attention of management as a result of out audit procedures. The following material misstatements that we identified as a result of our audit procedures were brought to the attention of, and corrected by, management:

- Adjustments to reconcile operating and payroll cash accounts.
- Adjustments to reconcile accounts receivable and event deposits to supporting detail.
- Adjustment to increase salary expense and related accruals for payroll, vacations and bonuses.
- Adjustments to reconcile accrued service fee to amounts earned but not yet paid out.
- Reclassify revenues from miscellaneous to sales revenues, based on nature of revenue.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, professional standards define a disagreement with management as a matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, concerning a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, which could be significant to the Center's financial statements or the auditors' reports. No such disagreements arose during the course of the audit.

Circumstances that Affect the Form and Content of the Auditors' Report

For purposes of this letter, professional standards require that we communicate any circumstances that affect the form and content of our auditors' report. There were no modifications to the audit opinion.

Representations Requested from Management

We have requested certain written representations from management, which are included in the management representation letter dated consistent with the financial statement audit report date.

Management's Consultations with Other Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters. Management informed us that, and to our knowledge, there were no consultations with other accountants regarding auditing and accounting matters.

Other Significant Matters, Findings, or Issues

In the normal course of our professional association with the Center, we generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, significant events or transactions that occurred during the year, business conditions affecting the Center, and business plans and strategies that may affect the risks of material misstatement. None of the matters discussed resulted in a condition to our retention as the Center's auditors.

Additional Information

With respect to the additional information accompanying the financial statements, we made certain inquiries of management and evaluated the form, content, and methods of preparing the information to determine that the information complies with GAAP, the method of preparing the information has not changed from the prior period, and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to the audits of the financial statements. We compared and reconciled the additional information to the underlying accounting records used to prepare each of the financial statements or to each of the financial statements themselves.

This information is intended solely for the use of the Board of Directors and management of the Center. It is not intended to be, and should not be, used by anyone other than these specified parties.
