# Recognizing National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month

WHEREAS, in March we recognize *National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month* to share knowledge about how to decrease the number of people diagnosed with cancer each year and spread the word and act to live better, healthier, and happier lives; and

WHEREAS, colon cancer is one of the top five common cancers in America; and

- WHEREAS, protecting one's health is important, but many people face hurdles in accessing life-saving resources to prevent, detect, and treat colorectal cancer; and
- WHEREAS, most colorectal cancers start as a growth called a polyp on the inner lining of the colon or rectum; and
- WHEREAS, understanding your family history can help guide your discussion with your physician of when you need to start cancer screening and whether to consider genetic counseling; and
- **WHEREAS**, this disease disproportionately impacts communities of color—and is particularly fatal among Black Americans; and
- WHEREAS, in addition to lifestyle factors, regular colorectal cancer screening is one of the best ways for preventing colorectal cancer; and
- WHEREAS, similar to so many diseases, the best defense against colorectal cancer is early detection; and
- WHEREAS, all people deserve to lead long, happy, and healthy lives, and nobody should be robbed of that promise due to the devastating impacts of colorectal cancer; and

WHEREAS, this month is our chance to improve public understanding of colorectal cancer risk, inform people about screen recommendations, and set our sights on broadening prevention strategies, improving treatments and finding a cure; and

WHEREAS, National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month is a chance to bring greater attention to this terrible disease and to offer what families living through it need most: hope.

# Acknowledging AMF Local 533 Honoring Dawoud Sabu Adeyola, Leslie Davis and Stanley Day and Recognizing Colored Musicians Club during Black History Month

WHEREAS, during African American History Month, we celebrate the vast contributions of African Americans to our Nation's history and identity throughout the month of February; and

WHEREAS, the observance of Black History Month calls our attention to the continued need to battle racism and build a society that lives up to its democratic ideals; and

WHEREAS, the 2025 Black History Month theme, "African Americans and Labor," is a powerful reflection on the pivotal role that the hard work of African Americans has played in shaping our country's history; and

WHEREAS, this theme underscores the diverse and significant ways in which laborwhether voluntary or involuntary, skilled or unskilled—has been at the core of the Black American experience; and

WHEREAS, the remarkable story of Buffalo's African American AFM (American Federation of Musicians) Local 533 is one of perseverance, visionary leadership and long-range strategic planning in a period of U.S. history marked by racial intolerance and legalized discrimination; and

WHEREAS, on February 3, 1917, the first wave of Buffalo's African American musicians joined the ranks of the labor union movement, when they received their AFM Certificate of Affiliation to form a Musicians Union; and

WHEREAS, 18 years later, Local 533 found a permanent home at 145 Broadway and incorporated The Colored Musicians Club, the only remaining African American musicians club in the country; and

WHEREAS, throughout its storied history, Local 533 offered free music lessons to the public on an informal basis, created an Emergency Fund for members in financial distress (1919), death benefits for the families of members (1926), elected a woman President (1928), and formed a Credit Union for its members so they could buy cars and homes, and truly live the American dream (1940); and

WHEREAS, Local 533's high standards of professionalism had other significant impacts on American music; and

WHEREAS, Local 533 became nationally known to all of America's most popular musicians, like Duke Ellington and Count Basie; and

WHEREAS, Local 533's significant national impact on the labor movement began when the AFM National Office recognized the excellence of its management and programs; and

**WHEREAS**, the impact of Local 533 and The Colored Musicians Club runs deep in Western New York, and we will forever remember the rich history and individuals who paved the way for so many Black and Brown individuals.

#### NOW. THEREFORE, BE IT

**RESOLVED**, that this Honorable Body hereby highlight and honor the legacy of AMF Black Local 533, recognizing the last 3 surviving Local 533 members, Dawoud, Leslie and Stanley and encourage all residents to learn and understand Black American history and culture.

# Acknowledging Roger I. Blackwell Black History Month Honoree

WHEREAS, during African American History Month, we celebrate the vast contributions of African Americans to our Nation's history and identity throughout the month of February; and

- WHEREAS, the observance of Black History Month calls our attention to the continued need to battle racism and build a society that lives up to its democratic ideals; and
- WHEREAS, Roger I. Blackwell was born in Boston, Massachusetts less than a year after Black Tuesday ushered in the Great Depression; and
- WHEREAS, following his service in the United States Army and some time working for Polaroid in Massachusetts, Blackwell found himself in Buffalo visiting an army buddy; and
- WHEREAS, Blackwell's political career in Western New York began with The Young Men's Democratic Club, a community organization of young black men with a mission to make political changes in local government through civic engagement; and
- **WHEREAS**, given his early experiences in politics, this was a natural progression in his story; and
- WHEREAS, Mr. Blackwell eventually secured a seat on the Erie County Board of Supervisors where he served from 1966 until it was replaced by the Erie County Legislature in 1968; and
  - WHEREAS, Mr. Blackwell was elected to Erie County Legislature in 1974; and
- WHEREAS, four qualities fundamental to Blackwell's success as a leader: resourcefulness, compassion, selflessness, and humility; and
- WHEREAS, Blackwell's political career in Western New York began with The Young Men's Democratic Club, a community organization of young black men with a mission to make political changes in local government through civic engagement; and

WHEREAS, Blackwell became the first African American Majority Leader (1982) and then the first African American Chairman (1988), resigning in 1993 to serve as Commissioner of the Erie County Board of Elections; and

WHEREAS, during his tenure as legislature chairman, Roger Blackwell sought to prevent impending transportation cutbacks; and

WHEREAS, Blackwell and other state and county officials worked to come up with a plan to solve this transportation problem; and

WHEREAS, due to the persistent work led by Mr. Blackwell, The Erie County Legislature was able to pass legislation to help fund the NFTA, thus avoiding layoffs and closures – ensuring access to transportation for city residents; and

WHEREAS, Blackwell also fought to keep Erie County Senior Services when faced with efforts to roll it into the Social Services Program; and

WHEREAS, even in his so-called retirement, Roger Blackwell has remained active; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Blackwell made Western New York his home over sixty years ago and has made it his life's work to uplift and defend his community at every turn.

#### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

**RESOLVED**, that this Honorable Body hereby highlight and honor the legacy *Roger I*. *Blackwell*, recognizing his hard work, dedication and strongly encourage all residents to learn and understand Black American history and culture.

WHEREAS, Mr. Richardson also served as Delegate to the last four Amalgamated Transit Union National Conventions by serving on the National Credentials and Balloting Committees; and

WHEREAS, due to his hard work and dedication of service, Jeffery Richardson Sr. became the first African American President/Business Agent of the Amalgamated Transit Union Local 1342 in Buffalo New York, representing approximately 1600 bus and train operators, mechanics, clerical employees and retirees; and

WHEREAS, during his first year as President/Business Agent, he secured Local 1342's first labor contract in eight years, including a four-year pact with a 17.25% wage increase; and

WHEREAS, he currently Chairs the Amalgamated Transit Union Local 1342 – Niagara Frontier Transit Metro Pension Fund; and

WHEREAS, Jeff faithfully serves as a member of the Edison Street Community Church under the leadership of Pastor Ted Howard Jr; and

WHEREAS, Jeff Sr. and his wife Alfrieda Richardson have been married for 25 years and are proud parents of 5 children and 10 grandchildren; and

WHEREAS, in his spare time, he runs a referee association and a promotion business and enjoys bowling as a hobby; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Richardson's significant advocacy on the labor movement deserves the utmost praise and recognition; and

WHEREAS, the impact of *Jeffrey Richardson Sr.* runs deep in Western New York, and we will forever remember his leadership that has paved the way for so many individuals.



# LOCAL LAW TO BE ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE IN THE COUNTY OF ERIE LOCAL LAW INTRO. – NO. \_\_2-1\_\_\_ - 2024 LOCAL LAW – NO. \_\_\_\_\_ - 2024

A LOCAL LAW requiring transparent, searchable databases for expenditures accessible and available to the public.

#### **SECTION 1. Title**

This law shall be entitled and known as "The Tax Dollar Disclosure Act."

#### **SECTION 2.** Legislative Intent

The Erie County Legislature recognizes that taxpayers should have easy access to details on how the county is spending their tax dollars and what performance results are achieved for those expenditures. It is the intent of the Legislature, therefore, to direct the Erie County Comptroller to create and maintain a searchable budget database website detailing where, for what purpose, and what results are achieved for all taxpayer investments in county government.

#### **SECTION 3. Definitions**

#### **AGENCY**

A county department, division, office, bureau, board, commission, committee, or unit. This includes individual county agencies and programs, as well as those programs and activities that cross agency lines. "County agency" includes all elective offices in Erie County government.

#### AUDIT OR REPORT

Shall include any audit or report issued by the state, county, legislature, legislative committee, comptroller or executive body relating to the entity or recipient of funds or the budget program/activity or agency.

#### COMPTROLLER

The Erie County Comptroller.

#### ENTITY/AND OR RECIPIENTS

- A. a corporation,
- B. an association,

- C. a union,
- D. a limited liability company,
- E. a limited liability partnership,
- F. any other legal business entity including non-profits,
- G. grantees,
- H. contractors, and
- I. a county, city, or other local government entity.
- J. "Entity/and or recipients" does not include an individual recipient of public assistance.

#### **FUNDING SOURCE**

The account from which the expenditure is appropriated, inclusive of all budgeted accounts.

#### FUNDING ACTION OR EXPENDITURE

Shall include details on the type of spending (grant, contract, appropriations, etc.). This includes tax exemptions or credits. Where possible, a hyperlink to the actual expenditure document (in a format that is, at a minimum, as searchable as a searchable PDF format) shall be provided.

#### **LEGISLATURE**

The Erie County Legislature.

#### SEARCHABLE BUDGET DATABASE WEBSITE

A website that allows the public, at no cost, to:

- A. Search and aggregate information for the following:
  - 1. the name and principal location or residence of the entity/and or recipients of funds,
  - 2. the amount of funds expended,
  - 3. the funding or expending agency,
  - 4. the funding source of the revenue expended,
  - 5. the budget program/activity of the expenditure,

- 6. a descriptive purpose for the funding action or expenditure,
- 7. the expected performance outcome for the funding action or expenditure,
- 8. the past performance outcomes achieved for the funding action or expenditure,
- 9. any audit or report relating to the entity or recipient of funds or the budget program/activity or agency,
- 10. and any other relevant information specified by the Comptroller.
- B. Programmatically search and access all data in a serialized machine-readable format (such as XML) via a web-services application programming interface.

#### **SECTION 4. Searchable Budget Database Website Created**

By October 1, 2024, the Comptroller shall develop and make publicly available a single, searchable budget database website including the required data for the most recent county budget. The website shall be given a unique and simplified website address. Each county agency that maintains a generally accessible Internet site or for which a generally accessible Internet site is maintained shall include a link on the front page of the agency's Internet site to the budget database website.

#### **SECTION 5. Updates**

The Comptroller shall provide guidance to agency heads to ensure compliance with this section. The searchable budget database website shall be updated as new data becomes available, if feasible, but no later than 30 days upon receipt of data from the agency.

The Comptroller shall ensure that all data added to the searchable budget database website remains accessible to the public for a minimum of six years.

#### **SECTION 6. Compliance with the Act**

The Comptroller shall not be considered in compliance with this act if the data required for the searchable budget database website is not available in a searchable and aggregate manner and/or the public is redirected to other government websites, unless each of those sites has information from all agencies and each category of information required can be searched electronically by field in a single search.

#### **SECTION 7. Severability**

If any part or provision of this chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision or application directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remainder of this chapter or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances. The County of Erie hereby declares that it would have passed this chapter or the remainder thereof had such invalid application or invalid provision been apparent.

#### **SECTION 8. Repealer**

All ordinances, local laws, and parts thereof inconsistent with this chapter are hereby repealed; provided, however, that such repeal shall not affect or impair any act done or right accruing, accrued, or acquired, or penalty, charge, liability, forfeiture, or punishment incurred or owing prior to the time such repeal takes effect, but the same may be enjoyed, asserted, collected, enforced, prosecuted, or inflicted as fully and to the same extent as if such repeal had not been effected. All actions and proceedings, civil or criminal, commenced under or by virtue of any provision of any County of Erie local law, ordinance or resolution so repealed, and pending immediately prior to the taking effect of such repeal, may be prosecuted and defended to final effect in the same manner as they might if such provisions were not so repealed.

#### **SECTION 9. Effective Date**

This Local Law shall take effect on October 1, 2024.

A LOCAL LAW requiring meetings of Erie County Boards and Advisory Committees to provide access to information to the public.

#### **SECTION 1. Title**

This law shall be entitled and known as "The Meetings Transparency Act."

#### **SECTION 2.** Legislative Intent

The Erie County Legislature recognizes that taxpayers should have easy access to details discussed and acted upon at public meetings. The Erie County Legislature prepares an agenda which it posts prior to session, streams and has available for replay video of the meeting and posts the minutes of meeting for review. Readily available technology should be used to increase access to similar discussions and actions of commissions and boards.

#### **SECTION 3. Definitions**

#### **BOARD**

Any government board, commission, council, committee, advisory committee, panel or similar group that is created pursuant to the Erie County Charter, Code or Local Law.

#### **SECTION 4. Meeting Minutes**

Boards shall keep written minutes summarizing all official actions, discussions, public comments, and votes taken at each meeting.

Draft minutes shall be made available to the public within 10 business days after each meeting.

Minutes shall be officially approved at the board's next public meeting and a final version posted publicly online within 5 business days after approval. The minutes also must be submitted to the Clerk of the Legislature to be included in the official record.

#### **SECTION 5. Notice and Agendas**

Boards shall give public notice at least 7 calendar days prior to any regular meeting by prominently posting the date, time, location, and agenda on the general Erie County website, as well as the website of the Erie County Legislature.

For special or emergency meetings, notice should be provided as soon as is practicable.

Meeting agendas shall include a list of topics to be discussed, a list of invited speakers, and indicate if any votes or official actions are anticipated.

#### **SECTION 6. Broadcast and Recording of Meetings**

To the extent feasible, boards should also provide a live stream of meetings for public viewing. Erie County is required to make appropriate accommodation for each board to make this possible. If a live stream is not possible, meetings should at minimum be video recorded and the recording should be posted on the general Erie County website.

#### **SECTION 7. Public Access to Records**

Boards shall maintain information to be posted on Erie County's website providing access to board member information, past meeting minutes, agendas, recordings, reports, resolutions, and other official documents.

Upon public request, boards shall provide copies or electronic access to such records in a timely manner as allowable by public records laws.

#### **SECTION 8. Public Comment**

Boards should provide reasonable opportunities for public comment at each meeting.

Any restrictions on public comment shall be viewpoint-neutral and clearly stated in the board's policies.

#### **SECTION 9. Compliance**

Originating governmental bodies shall establish procedures to monitor and ensure compliance with this law.

### **SECTION 10. Severability**

If any part or provision of this chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be adjudged invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision or application directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remainder of this chapter or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances. The County of Erie hereby declares that it would have passed this chapter or the remainder thereof had such invalid application or invalid provision been apparent.

### **SECTION 11. Effective Date**

This Local Law shall take effect on September 1, 2024.

### COUNTY OF ERIE

### LOCAL LAW INTRO. NO. 5-2-2024

LOCAL LAW NO. -2024

A Local Law amending Local Law 1-1959, constituting the Erie County Charter, as amended, in relation to the amending of Section 202.2 for the purpose of setting the terms of legislative office to four (4) years and limiting the number of terms for that can be held to three (3) four-year terms for all elected officials.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE AS FOLLOWS:

### Section 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT

The intent of this legislation is to amend the terms of office for the Erie County of Legislature to a term of four (4) years and to limit the number of terms for all elected officials that can be served to three (3) four-year terms.

### Section 2. CHANGING THE TERM OF LEGISLATIVE OFFICE AND LIMITING THE NUMBER OF TERMS FOR ALL ELECTED OFFICIALS

Erie County Local Law number one of nineteen hundred fifty-nine, as amended, constituting the Erie County Charter, is hereby amended as follows:

Article 2, Section 202.2. Election and terms of office. County legislators shall first be elected at the general election in the year nineteen hundred sixty-seven and shall assume office on January first, nineteen hundred sixty-eight. All elected County legislators shall hold their respective offices for a term of two years: provided, that legislators elected in the year two thousand twenty-six and in subsequent years shall hold their offices for four years. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County legislator if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof.

Article 3, Section 301. The County Executive; election; term; qualifications. The executive branch of County government shall be administered by the County Executive who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election and shall be for four years, except that the term of the County Executive elected in nineteen hundred sixty shall be for three years. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County Executive if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or

her office and shall hold no other public office, except as provided in section three hundred seven hereof.

Article 18, Section 1801. Election; Comptroller's Act repealed. There shall be a County Comptroller who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election and shall be for four years. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County Comptroller if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office. The Erie County Comptroller's Act, being chapter four hundred twenty three of the laws of nineteen hundred thirty-nine as amended, is hereby repealed, as of January first, nineteen hundred sixty-one.

Article 19, Section 1901. Election. There shall be a County Clerk who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election, and shall be for four years except as otherwise provided in this Charter. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as County Clerk if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office.

Article 20, Section 2001. Election. There shall be a District Attorney who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election, and shall be for four years except as otherwise provided in this Charter. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as District Attorney if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office.

Article 21, Section 2101. Election. There shall be a Sheriff who shall be elected from the County at large. His or her term of office shall begin with the first day of January next following his or her election and shall be for four years except as otherwise provided in this Charter. No person shall be eligible to be elected to or serve as Sheriff if that person had previously held such office for three or more four-year terms. For the purpose of establishing the term limit, term of office shall be calculated beginning the first day of his or her first full term of office after the effective date hereof. At the time of his or her election and throughout his or her term of office he or she shall be a qualified elector of

the County. He or she shall devote his or her whole time to the duties of his or her office and shall hold no other public office.

### Section 3. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Local Law shall take effect the first day of the first fiscal year after receiving an affirmative vote of a majority of the qualified electors of the County of Erie in a manner consistent with the provisions of New York State Municipal Home Rule Law Article 3 and upon its subsequent filing with the New York Secretary of State.

### Section 4. SEVERABILITY

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this Local Law or the application thereof, to any person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity or circumstance, shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional such order of judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this Local Law or in its application to the person, individual, corporation, firm, partnership, entity, or circumstance directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or order shall be rendered.

### **COUNTY OF ERIE**

### LOCAL LAW INTRO. NO. 7-1 -2024

LOCAL LAW NO. -2024

A Local Law, named the "STUNT Law", requiring Erie County to expand penalties for speed contests, stunt behavior, and other reckless driving behaviors that endanger Erie County residents.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE ERIE COUNTY LEGISLATURE AS FOLLOWS:

### Section 1. Title.

This Local Law shall be known as the "STUNT Law: Safeguarding Traffic, Unlawful Racing, and Noise Transgressions."

### Section 2. Legislative Purpose and Intent.

This Legislature recognizes that speeding has been a significant factor in numerous motor vehicle fatalities over the past decades, with motor vehicle accidents being one of the leading causes of death for individuals aged 1 to 54.

The Legislature acknowledges the rise in popularity of illegal vehicle sideshows, demonstrations, and contests; often shared on social media, which pose a great risk to participants and spectators, leading to severe physical injuries and even death.

Moreover, illegal vehicle sideshows, contests, street racing, and related stunt behavior not only endanger lives and property but also create excessive noise during night hours, causing disturbances for residents in neighboring areas.

The current penalties for these illegal activities are insufficient in deterring individuals from participating in them.

Therefore, the purpose of this Local Law is to protect Erie County residents by expanding and strengthening laws and penalties related to unlawful speed contests, sideshows, and related stunt behavior.

### Section 3. Definitions.

As used in this Local Law, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

"Burnout" – To spin a vehicle's wheel(s) while keeping the vehicle stationary, causing the tires to heat up and emit smoke.

- "Drifting" The intentional oversteering of a vehicle with loss of traction while maintaining control, resulting in a controlled skid or power slide through a turn.
- "Doughnut" A maneuver performed by rotating the rear or front of a vehicle around the opposite set of wheels, creating a circular skid mark pattern on the road surface.
- "Revving" To rapidly increase the engine speed while a vehicle is stationary or in neutral, producing loud noise and/or causing the vehicle to jerk or lurch.
- "Sideshow" An event in which vehicles gather and engage in reckless behavior, such as performing stunts, burnouts, doughnuts/wheelies, drifting, and/or other dangerous maneuvers.
- "Street Racing" The act of racing or competing with one or more vehicles on a public highway, street, or road, whether prearranged or spontaneous.
- "Stunt Behavior" Performing any maneuver with a vehicle that is not part of normal driving or exceeds the safe limits of the vehicle; including but not limited to stunts, revving, burnout, drifting, doughnuts, acrobatic maneuvers, jumps, and other similar actions.
- "Wheelie" -- Raising a vehicle to the degree that one or more wheels lose contact with the ground.

### Section 4. Prohibitions.

- (A) No person shall knowingly participate in, engage in, organize, facilitate, coordinate, plan, aid, or abet any street race, sideshow, contest, exhibition, or stunt behavior involving vehicles upon any public highway, street, sidewalk, public parking lot or area, or any other public property within Erie County.
- (B) No person shall knowingly obstruct or attempt to obstruct any public highway, street, or road with a motor vehicle, or any other object used as a blockade for the purpose of permitting any such race, sideshow, contest, exhibition, or stunt behavior.

### Section 5. Enforcement and Penalties for Offenses.

(A) Any person who violates any provision of this article shall be guilty of a violation, punishable by a fine not exceeding \$500 for a first offense, and a fine not exceeding \$1,000 or by imprisonment for a period not exceeding 15 days, or both, for each subsequent offense.

(B) Any person who causes physical injury to another person or damage to real or personal property while violating any provision of this article shall be liable for the payment of restitution, as determined by a court of competent jurisdiction.

### Section 6. Severability.

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, subdivision, or other part of this local law or its application shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of the local law which shall remain in full force and effect except as limited by such order or judgment.

### Section 7. SEQRA Compliance.

This County Legislature determines that this local law constitutes a "Type II action" pursuant to the provisions of the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA), and that no further action under SEQRA is required.

### Section 8. Effective Date.

This local law shall take effect immediately following its filing with the Office of the Secretary of State.

Any restrictions on public comment shall be viewpoint-neutral and clearly stated in the board's policies.

### **SECTION 9. Directory of Boards**

Erie County shall compile and maintain a directory of all Boards and Advisory Committees as defined in Section 3 of this Law on Erie County's website. The directory shall contain hyperlinks to a webpage on Erie County's website for each specific board or committee and provide the relevant information about that board or committee as required by this Local Law.

### **SECTION 10. Compliance**

Originating governmental bodies shall establish procedures to monitor and ensure compliance with this law.

### **SECTION 11. Severability**

If any part of this chapter or the application thereof to any person or circumstance be adjudged invalid by any court or competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision or application directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not affect or impair the validity of the remained of this chapter or the application thereof to other persons or circumstances. The County of Erie hereby declares that it

would have passed this chapter or the remainder thereof had such invalid application or invalid provision been apparent.

### **SECTION 12. Effective Date**

This Local Law shall take effect immediately following its filing with the Office of the Secretary of State.

Re: Increasing corrections staffing at New York State Correctional Facilities

**WHEREAS,** a recent incident at Collins Correctional Facility in Erie County led to three injured correctional officers and a lockdown of the facility for several days, highlighting staffing and security issues at New York State correctional facilities; and

**WHEREAS,** earlier this year, six officers and a sergeant were injured at Albion Correctional Facility in assaults by an inmate and eight officers were injured when an inmate attacked them in two separate incidents at Wende Correctional Facility that occurred in November 2024; and

WHEREAS, only days before the incident at Collins Correctional Facility took place, the New York State Correctional Officers & Police Benevolent Association (NYSCOPBA) issued a statement expressing concerns over staffing shortages and stated that 2024 resulted in a record number of assaults on staff; and

**WHEREAS,** in testimony given to state lawmakers during a Joint Legislative Public Hearing, the president of NYSCOPBA cited a reduction of over 5,000 security staff over the past five years, exponential increases in mandatory overtime including triple shift requirements, and many other failures by the NYS Department of Corrections; and

WHEREAS, year after year, more Corrections Officers are retiring than are being hired by the NYS Department of Corrections, further exacerbating staffing shortages and the subsequent effects; and

**WHEREAS,** due to unreasonable levels of mandatory overtime, a high stress environment, and a substantially dangerous work environment, NYSCOPBA is also reporting difficulty retaining corrections staff, many of which suffer from burnout and leave early into their careers; and

**WHEREAS,** in response to the state's apparent lack of concern for the dangerous work environment in state prisons, corrections officers at three state corrections facilities, including Collins and Wende, have gone on strike to demand improved security measures and working conditions; and

**WHEREAS,** these conditions are untenable and pose a significant risk to the safety and well-being of the corrections officers, their families, facility staff, the incarcerated individuals, and the community.

### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

**RESOLVED,** that the Erie County Legislature calls upon New York State lawmakers and the NYS Department of Corrections to enact measures to address the severe staffing shortages at state correctional facilities; and

Dear Chairman Meyers,

We respectfully request that the Legislature hold a discussion regarding the County Comptroller's audit of the Department of Real Property Tax Services prior to considering Director Bylewski's reappointment on the floor of the Legislature.

The Comptroller's recent audit identified concerning deficiencies in financial controls and oversight that merit careful examination. Of particular significance, per the Comptroller, these vulnerabilities are parallel to the conditions that enabled recent incidents of financial fraud within the county.

Key findings warranting legislative review include:

- Insufficient internal controls over financial transactions
- Inadequate security protocols for tax payments
- Absence of written procedures for critical operations
- Systemic issues with taxpayer refund processing

The differing interpretations of these findings between Comptroller Hardwick and Director Bylewski raise additional questions. While the Comptroller characterized the findings as "an accident waiting to happen," and noted the fact that nobody taking advantage of the weak financial procedures was good fortune, not good procedure, Director Bylewski publicly disputed their seriousness as "a large overstatement." This fundamental disagreement requires legislative attention before any reappointment vote. It is imperative we sit down with both parties to discuss.

The reappointment of a director responsible for significant public funds should not proceed without a complete understanding of these audit findings and the director's plan to address them.

### SUMMARY

It is recommended that the Erie County Legislature authorize the County Executive to enter into contracts for the purpose of implementing the 2024 Capital Budget project at H.E.A.L. International in the City of Buffalo.

### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The proposed funding of not-to-exceed \$250,000 will come from the approved 2024 Erie County Capital Budget. Funding is available in A.24061

### **REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION**

Helping Ensure Africa Looms International Inc. (d.b.a. H.E.A.L. International) is undertaking an expansion of its Economic Empowerment Center at 240 West Ferry Street in the City of Buffalo, which will add approximately 1800 square feet of new program and office space. The County also awarded \$60,000 in the 2022 Capital Budget for construction of an elevator tower to service the existing building and new addition. The project will enable the organization to enhance its programming and services for the refugee community in Erie County.

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

H.E.A.L. International is a non-profit organization established to provide post-resettlement services to the Western New York refugee community. The organization assists individuals with accessing essential services including healthcare, housing, legal services, and educational resources. The organization provides small business assistance, as well as a summer youth enrichment program in partnership with the City of Buffalo Division of Youth.

### CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If a resolution to enter into a contract is not approved, H.E.A.L. International will not be able to complete this work. The needed improvements will be delayed until additional funding is secured, and the timeline of this project will be extended until such time that additional funds can be raised.



### SUMMARY

The Department of Public Works is seeking authorization to enter into an agreement with the design firm of Erdman Anthony in an amount not to exceed \$300,000 for engineering design services. These services are for the replacement of Warner Gulf Road Culvert over Gears Gulf (CIN 405-03) in the Town of Holland. Erdman Anthony was selected in accordance with County policy using the County selection process.

### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The total cost of the engineering design phase of this project is \$300,000, including design contingency. The total budget is available in Fund 420, Funds Center 123, Project B.21156 – 2021 Capital Bridge Design.

### **REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION**

This project is necessary to advance the design in a timely fashion. Erdman Anthony is recommended as project design engineers because of their expertise, experience, and manpower to provide the County of Erie with the service required.

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The existing structure was built in 1931, and is 10' tall, 18' span and 60' long concrete frame. The culvert was rated a 3 in the last inspection with repeated Yellow Structural Flags being issued for the deterioration of the headwalls. The headwalls on both sides of the structure have severe spalling with exposed and 100% debonded reinforcement. The headwalls are no longer able to retain the earthen roadway embankment above the culvert, leading to sloughing of the embankment on both sides of the roadway and movement of the guide railing. The concrete top slab adjacent to the headwalls has also spalled and exposed reinforcement which has completely deboned. This structure has exceeded its useful design life and needs replacement. It is assumed that the replacement structure may be increased to over 20' span length based on current hydraulic, alignment, and construction needs. This increase in span would make the replacement structure a bridge rather than a culvert, per AASHTO criteria and definitions.

### CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If this project is not completed, the culvert will continue to deteriorate. The headwalls will no longer be able to support the embankment, roadway, or railing, and the number of lanes reduced, or the road fully closed to traffic.

### STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Upon the Erie County Legislature's approval, the County executive will enter into an agreement with Erdman Anthony. Once the agreement is fully executed design work will begin immediately thereafter.

### **COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE REVIEW**

The proposed legislation has been reviewed by the Comptroller's Office and is related to an authorized capital project for which there are sufficient appropriations for the action proposed.

#### SUMMARY

The Department of Public Works (DPW) is seeking authorization for the County Executive to enter into a Right of Way Agreement with the New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT) for the Reconstruction of William Street Project (PIN 5763.36).

This Right of Way Agreement includes the Right of Way incidental and acquisition funding necessary for the NYSDOT Right of Way efforts for the Reconstruction of William Street from Transit Road to Bowen Road in the Town of Lancaster. NYSDOT will assist Erie County to progress this project by administering the Right of Way phase of this project. The scope of this project includes pavement rehabilitation, areas of pavement widening, stormwater drainage replacement, and select areas of sidewalk installation.

### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The total cost of the Right of Way Agreement is currently estimated at \$785,000. The NYSDOT Agreement provides for 80% federal funding of \$628,000, a 15% NYS Marchiselli funding of \$117,750, and a 5% local share of \$39,250. The Right of Way phase is a State administered phase. As such, NYSDOT will retain the federal and state funding, and Erie County is required to advance payment of the local share to NYSDOT.

Funds for the project are currently available from Bond Proceeds in the approved Capital Budget, Funds Center 420, Fund 123, as follows:

#### REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

This resolution is necessary to advance the Right of Way acquisition of the Reconstruction of William Street project in a timely fashion. This project is eligible as a Surface Transportation Program (STP) Project which allows the County of Erie to benefit from minimal capital investment while leveraging Federal and New York State (NYS) funds towards the improvement of its infrastructure. The State will leverage up to the maximum of 80% in Federal funds and 15% in NYS Marchiselli funds on behalf of Erie County for the total Project phase cost under this agreement. It is desired to execute a Right of Way agreement with NYSDOT, as the administrators of the Right of Way phase of the project.

#### BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Project road section of William Street is narrow and the pavement shows signs of distress with longitudinal cracking. The road has received numerous patches due to pavement failures. The project objectives are two-fold. This portion of William Street has a Road Score of 6-7 out of 10 (2023), along with a daily traffic count of 8,900-14,000 vehicles. The desire to preserve the existing roadway pavement that exists today and address the needs of the increased economic and residential development in the area. The project will utilize prioritized pavement preservation to correct deficiencies in the road surface and to extend the useful life of the pavement.

The Project meets eligibility requirements for the Federal STP and is approved by the NYSDOT in their current Capital Program to be funded with Federal Aid and NYS Marchiselli funds. As the administrators of the Right of Way phase of the project, they will advance the Right of Way phase of the project upon approval of this resolution.

#### **CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION**

This action is required to ensure project advancement and financing through the Locally Administered Federal Aid Program using STP funds to pay for the NYSDOT administration of the Right of Way incidental and acquisition costs of the road resurfacing. Negative action would halt design and result in continued deterioration of the road surface, decreased rideability, increased maintenance responsibilities and cost, as well as jeopardize existing and future reimbursement funding available through this program.

#### STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Upon Legislative approval, the County Executive will enter into the Right of Way Agreement with the New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT). Once the agreement is executed and the local share is advanced to NYSDOT, Right of Way work will begin immediately thereafter.

#### **SUMMARY**

The Department of Public Works (DPW) is requesting authorization for the County Executive to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding between the County of Erie (County) and SUNY Erie Community College (ECC) for the reimbursement of college-wide network and server infrastructure and surveillance camera replacement work completed by ECC located at 6205 Main Street, Williamsville, NY 14221, 5885 Big Tree Road, Orchard Park, NY 14127, 50 Cobham Drive, Orchard Park, NY 14127 and 121 Ellicott Street, Buffalo, NY 14203.

This project involves the procurement and installation of new server and network equipment to replace aging equipment; surveillance camera system and related software at all three campuses using cooperative purchase agreements completed by ECC.

#### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Funds for the project are currently available from the approved Capital Budget, Funds Center 122, Fund 480, as follows:

## **REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION**

The replacement of existing core infrastructure network and server equipment will modernize the College's network and technology services while ensuring reliability and security.

The replacement of existing surveillance camera system and software will expand interior coverage of hallways and add exterior views, which are not covered in the current configuration.

These contracts will be procured by ECC using cooperative purchase agreements, and then reimbursed by the County under the MOU.

#### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The College's network is more than ten years old and supports many services including student learning, administration, community events, fire and safety, telephony, network security, client management and HVAC controls. It is no longer supported by the vendor as of October 2024. Replacing all the network at the same time will reduce the replacement cost and complexity of implementation. The virtual server infrastructure at North Campus is outdated and will no longer support newer versions of virtualized software. This infrastructure runs critical campus services, such as authentication, surveillance cameras and recordings, IP telephony, file storage and backup services

The current security camera system is 20 years old and failing. It is beyond its operational lifespan but still relied on as a critical part of protecting the campus community as well as the financial well-being of the College and County. The current system lacks exterior area coverage where most slip and falls occur. The new system would provide that coverage and greatly enhance our ability to defend the College against these negligence claims. Video is always the first request from the County Attorney or the insurance carriers. The system is also an essential tool for the College's campus security staff's daily duties.

#### **CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION**

If this project is not completed, this project cannot be completed resulting in operational deficits for the College.

Upon Legislative approval, the County Executive will enter into a Memorandum of Understanding between the County of Erie (County) and SUNY Erie Community College (ECC).

#### SUMMARY

The Department of Public Works (DPW) is seeking authorization for the County Executive to enter into a contract with Buffalo Engineering P.C. for the Erie County Health Lab – Building 17 RTU Replacement project, located at 503 Kensington Avenue Buffalo, NY 14214. The existing rooftop unit is beyond its useful life and requires a replacement to avoid constant costly repairs and maintenance and to maintain the tight environmental controls of the laboratory areas it serves. This project will include the analysis of a more energy efficiency unit and electrification of the existing reheat units, removing the necessity of a boiler replacement. An existing conference room will also be reconfigured to be a lab space to better suit the building's occupants as a lab space.

## FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Funds for the project are currently available from the approved Capital Budget, Funds Center 122, Fund 410, as follows:

## **REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION**

This project is necessary because replacement of the antiquated heating and ventilation system at the Erie County Health Lab will reduce maintenance and repair costs along with the operational cost and energy consumption. With a new rooftop unit to serve the existing lab spaces, the result of this project will allow the lab instrumentation and equipment to operate normally while providing optimal occupant comfort year-round.

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

The existing unit is at the end of its useful life and is in need of constant repairs which can result in lengthy down times. The lab spaces this unit serves conducts regular testing and these tests are delayed due to this inconsistent environment. Even during temperate times of the year, the unit struggles to maintain a steady temperature. The unit to be replaced in this project serves all of the laboratory space in the AA building, the primary clinical and environmental testing areas.

## **CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION**

If this project is not completed, the existing system will operate with reduced efficiencies and continue to require costly maintenance and repairs. If major components of the system fail, a portion of the building may be required to close to staff, impacting the laboratory function of the facility. The accreditation of the facility is at risk, since ambient temperatures are needed for testing and various instruments require specific temperatures to be maintained. These

fluctuations in temperature require technicians to document any results potentially affected. These reports lead to testing results not being released due the quality of the testing environment being questioned.

## STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Upon Legislative approval, the County Executive will enter into an Agreement with Buffalo Engineering P.C. to begin the design process.

## **COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE REVIEW**

The proposed legislation has been reviewed by the Comptroller's Office and is related to an authorized capital project for which there are sufficient appropriations for the action proposed.



#### SUMMARY

It is requested that the Erie County Legislature approve Change Order No. 4 to the GHD Consulting Services, Inc. (GHD) Agreement, dated January 22, 2019. The Change Order is for an additional amount of \$83,519.87, bringing the total to \$477,247.92.

#### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There will be no impact to the County's General Fund. The cost of the additional engineering work related to this communication will be paid from Erie County Sewer District No. 6 Capital Bond Account C.17601.

## REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The Division of Sewerage Management is requesting approval of Change Order No. 4 for GHD's agreement dated January 22, 2019 to compensate the consultant for additional engineering costs during the construction phase of the Lackawanna WRRF and ORF Disinfection Systems Improvements Project. This change will ensure that GHD's team will provide engineering and inspection services to cover the full estimated construction period, as modified by the contractors, as the construction duration is greater than anticipated at the time of bid.

## **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

On December 6, 2018, the Erie County Legislature passed a resolution [Comm. 21E-13 (2018)] authorizing an agreement with GHD for the Lackawanna WRRF and ORF Disinfection Systems Improvements Project. The budget for construction services within this agreement was based on the anticipated design scope at that time and a construction bid date in 2020. Since then, the scope of the project increased to incorporate additional items identified during detailed design and based on requests from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC). Specifically, additions were made to the design to facilitate improvements associated with the storage/management of disinfection chemicals, for a baffle wall to optimize dechlorination under all conditions in the disinfection process, and needed upgrades for HVAC systems. After discussions with the contractors regarding length of construction, GHD hours estimated in their original proposal were not sufficient to cover the full construction period,

which includes the additional design items and reflects global market conditions that have increased construction durations.

During construction, unanticipated conditions at the sites were encountered, such as concrete beds that were not removed in previous construction, undocumented electrical connections, SCADA system changes, and changes to facilities that occurred since design. These conditions caused construction delays and design changes or additions. GHD is requesting reimbursement for the associated design, construction administration, and inspection related to the delays and design changes.

The Division of Sewerage Management's engineers reviewed these requests and determined that the labor hours are commensurate with the expected level of effort. As a result, it is recommended that this change order be approved.

#### CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION

If this request is not approved, there will not be sufficient budget to provide construction inspection and administration for the remaining construction period. Lack of inspection and administration oversight may lead to deficiencies in construction and problems with the resulting facilities. Any remaining changes to design cannot be performed without violating the Professional Engineering license of, and agreement with, GHD.

#### STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The County of Erie will execute the change order and allocate \$83,519.87 from Bond Account No. C.17601 for this project.

WHEREAS, this collaboration will allow outreach staff to continue to meet people where they are at no cost to Erie County and continue its mission to protect public health.



## SUMMARY

The Department of Health is requesting to upgrade the Accountant position, JG 9, to Accounting Analyst, JG 11, for employee recruitment and better align the title with comparable positions within other Erie County Departments.

The Department of Health is also requesting the creation of a Juvenile Substance Use Services Coordinator position to connect Erie County's most at risk youth with treatment and service providers. The gap was identified by judges and lawyers working in the juvenile justice system and further investigation by the administration has found this gap to exist in other areas of youth not being connected to needed services.

The Department of Social Services will be deleting a vacant Community Resource Technician position within the Pharmaceutical Fund, as well, to better align with the needs of the program.

## FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There are adequate funds in the Department of Health 2025 Proposed Opioid Settlement 295 Fund Budget to cover the \$9,021 increase in salary for the upgrade from Accountant to Accounting Analyst.

# REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION/BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The Department of Health Fund 295 Opioid Settlement has gone through a restructuring of the needs of each position after the settlement has begun and established that an Accountant with audit experience and other skills is necessary to manage the funds.

The administration has worked closely with judges, lawyers, and county departments involved in the juvenile justice system to identify gaps in services reaching Erie County's most at risk youth. The Juvenile Substance Use Services Coordinator would help to fill such gaps by connecting youth offenders, juvenile defendants, and their families to substance use and mental health services. There are currently no positions within Erie County doing this work or being funded by OASAS and other grantors.

#### **CONSEQUENCES OF NEGATIVE ACTION**

The Department of Health's Accounting and Fiscal Management office would be forced to carry this workload, and the funds would continue to be spent without proper supervision.

Erie County's most at risk youth and their families could continue to be without substance use and mental health services without someone to help connect them with providers.

## STEPS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The Department of Health will work with Personnel and Budget and Management to effectuate these changes.

WHEREAS, the Department of Health Fund 295 Opioid Settlement Fund has identified a need to change an Accountant to Accounting Analyst and create a Juvenile Substance Use Services Coordinator; and

WHEREAS, the change in title and job grade from Accountant to Accounting Analyst would be a net increase of \$9,021; and

WHEREAS, the position is currently vacant due to an inability to fill at the current job grade and a restriction of the office's operations and department's need; and

WHEREAS, the administration was approached by various stakeholders and departments, including judges and lawyers involved in the juvenile justice system, that there is a significant gap in substance use and mental health services reaching juvenile defendants; and

WHEREAS, the administration has identified other gaps in substance use and mental health services for youth in Erie County and seeks to create a Juvenile Substance Use Services Coordinator to work with the juvenile justice system, juvenile defendants and their families, Departments of Mental Health, Probation, and Health, and local substance use and mental health providers to connect Erie County's most at risk youth to services; and

WHEREAS, the position of Community Resource Technician is currently vacant due to a lack of need by the Department of Social Services.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature hereby authorizes the deletion of one (1) full-time Accountant, Job Group 9, CSEA and creation of one (1) full-time Accounting Analyst, Job Group 11, CSEA within the Department of Health's Pharmaceutical Settlement Fund Budget (Fund 295, Funds Center 12700) (B100 #14706) effective February 1, 2025; and be it further

RESOLVED, that authorization is hereby given to create one (1) full-time Juvenile Substance Use Services Coordinator, Job Group 13, CSEA within the Department of Health's Pharmaceutical Settlement Fund Budget (Fund 295, Funds Center 12700) (B100 #14714) effective March 1, 2025; and be it further



#### Summary of Recommended Action

The Erie County Sheriff's Office requests that the Erie County Legislature authorize the Division of Purchase to create all necessary documents to purchase multiple training courses from Buffalo Scuba LLC necessary to certify members of the ECSO Underwater Recovery Team as Professional Association of Diving Instructors (PADI) certified Public Safety Divers. The cost of the training is not to exceed \$6,250.00.

#### Fiscal Implications of the Proposal

Sufficient funding is available in the 2025 Erie County Sheriff's Office, Police Services Division budget (Fund 110, Funds Center 11510) 510200-Training and Education.

#### Reasons for Recommendation

The Erie County Sheriff's Office Police Services Division includes an Underwater Recovery Team capable of responding to search and recovery calls within bodies of water across Erie County. As a 21<sup>st</sup> Century professional law enforcement agency, the Sheriff's Office's divers should be certified as Public Safety Divers by PADI. # A Resolution Submitted by the Erie County Clerk Re: Call to the New York State Legislature to Amend the Erie County Tax Act to Lower the Interest Rate on Delinquent Taxes

WHEREAS, the Erie County Tax Act (Chapter 812 of the Laws of 1942) established an initial twelve percent (12%) annual interest and penalty rate on delinquent property taxes; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to New York State Real Property Tax ("RPT") Law § 924-a, only the New York State Legislature may amend the Erie County Tax Act; and

WHEREAS, the New York State Legislature amended the Erie County Tax Act in August 1997 (A6587-A/S3884) to increase the 12% annual interest and penalty rate on delinquent property taxes to eighteen percent (18%); and

WHEREAS, one of the reasons given for increasing the interest rate was that "the relatively low penalty rate imposed by the County on late property tax payments serve as a disincentive to the timely payment of real property tax obligations"; and

WHEREAS, since the housing collapse of 2007, significant numbers of vacant and abandoned properties have plagued, and continue to plague, Erie County; and

WHEREAS, the 18% interest and penalty rate on delinquent property taxes is in excess of New York's 16% civil usury cap and far in excess of market interest rates; and

WHEREAS, the steep 18% interest and penalty rate on delinquent property taxes makes it significantly difficult for citizens to ever repay overdue taxes, resulting in even more vacant and abandoned properties, commonly referred to as "Zombie" properties; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Clerk's Office recognizes that grappling with the blight of Zombie properties transcends all communities and impacts all County taxpayers, regardless of the property location; and

WHEREAS, in June 2024 the New York State Legislature passed Senate Bill S967A sponsored by Senator Sean M. Ryan, which proposed setting the delinquent tax interest rate to the prime interest rate subject to a floor of two percent (2%) and a ceiling of sixteen percent (16%); and

WHEREAS, Governor Kathy Hochul vetoed S967A with a veto message indicating that the reduction to the interest and penalty rate for delinquent property taxes should be addressed in the State Budget Process; and

WHEREAS, if S967A was to become law, through the State Budget Process or otherwise, Erie County would be required to lower the 18% annual interest and penalty rate on delinquent property taxes to equal the prime rate, which is currently 7.5%; and

WHEREAS, the interest and penalty rate limitation in S967A would in any event not apply to real property that is vacant and abandoned as defined in the New York Real Property Actions and Proceedings Law, which would still be subject to an 18% rate; and

WHEREAS, it is clear that Erie County must now take action in its own right to show New York State that change is needed; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Clerk's Office has secured over five thousand (5,000) signatures from Erie County taxpayers in support of lowering the interest and penalty rate from the current 18%; and

WHEREAS, the Erie County Legislature, via Home Rule request, previously supported legislation in 2018, Senate Bill S8839A, which sought to reduce the interest rate on delinquent real property taxes from 18% to 12%, and thereby reduce barriers to repayment of back taxes for all properties, whether vacant and abandoned or otherwise; and

WHEREAS, said legislation did not pass the New York State Legislature, leaving the 18% rate in effect; and

WHEREAS, an interest and penalty rate of 12%, the rate that stayed consistent from 1942 – 1997, and which was supported by the Erie County Legislature in 2018, should be reestablished in Erie County for all properties, whether vacant and abandoned or otherwise; and

WHEREAS, amending the Erie County Tax Act to reduce the interest and penalty rate to 12% for all properties will decrease the impact of real property tax delinquencies and would not conflict with any potential further reduction for occupied properties in the event that S967A or any similar bill was to become law; and

WHEREAS, the New York State Legislature has requested that the Erie County Legislature adopt a Resolution such as this one before a State bill will be filed to reduce the interest and penalty rate in the Erie County Tax Act.

### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Erie County Legislature respectfully calls upon the New York State Legislature to introduce a bill to lower the interest and penalty rate in the Erie County Tax Act from 18% to 12%; and be it further

RESOLVED, that should the New York State Legislature file a bill to lower the interest and penalty rate in the Erie County Tax Act from 18% to 12%, the Erie County Legislature will either submit a Home Rule request or pass a Resolution in support of the filed State legislation; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Legislature shall forward certified copies of this Resolution to the Erie County Executive; the Erie County Attorney; the Director of the Division of Budget and Management; the Erie County Comptroller; and the Erie County Clerk.



# REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION



### SUMMARY

It is recommended that the Legislature approve the attached resolution prepared by the Department of Environment and Planning (DEP) to authorize the County Executive or Deputy County Executive to execute a four-year contract to accept \$1,034,940 in United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) grant funding for the Tifft Aquatic Habitat Enhancement Project, create a JG12 position within DEP, and execute a contract with Buffalo Society of Natural Sciences (BSNS), the grant sub-awardee.

The sub-awardee, Buffalo Society of Natural Sciences (BSNS), will install a water-level control pump and associated infrastructure, convert a 5-acre stand of cattail to a diverse assemblage of native marsh species, construct a turtle nesting beach, and remove 21.7 acres of invasive common buckthorn at Tifft Nature Preserve.

The project will focus on bringing the benefits of an enhanced healthy habitat to a federally designated disadvantaged community, which is in line with Erie County's Community Climate Action Plan.

A new position in DEP, Senior Environmental Compliance Specialist is almost entirely funded by this grant and another similar habitat grant held by the Parks Department.

# FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The half of the requested staff position and all program expenses will be funded by the USEPA grant in the amount of \$1,034,940 for a 4-year period. The grant covers half of the salary and fringe benefits for the Senior Environmental Compliance Specialist (JG 12) position. The remaining salary will be funded through County Share - Grants and ID Billing through a similar USEPA project in the Parks Department.

### REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The project addresses several key priorities from the Erie County Community Climate Action Plan (CCAP) and will increase climate resiliency and protect vulnerable residents in disadvantaged communities. The resulting diverse habitat and tree canopy will mitigate extreme heat, improve air quality, absorb stormwater runoff, and provide additional health, social, and environmental benefits.

### **BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

Tifft Nature Preserve was established previously in 1975 as part of a grassroots effort to protect the land and waterbodies once used for commercial shipping. It has since become an important part of Greater Buffalo's cultural landscape, serving a wide swath of the region's demographic. The preserve is located just three miles from downtown Buffalo and can be accessed via bike path and several bus routes. Fishing Lake Kirsty is an important pastime for many; Tifft's trails serve as a place of respite for those needing to unwind during lunch or after a day in the office downtown; the spring migration draws people from around the region and beyond to catch rare waterfowl and warblers as they stopover at the Preserve; and Tifft's location and its wide, flat, accessible trail system provide an opportunity for many people who otherwise would not have the opportunity to visit and experience a natural area, particularly underserved communities in the City of Buffalo.

Despite its recognition as an important functioning coastal habitat, the ecological communities at Tifft Nature Preserve appear to be on a trajectory of diminished biological diversity. Dense stands of invasive common buckthorn have become established in recent decades, replacing native tree and shrub species through suppressed regeneration driven by deer browse, competition from invasive plant species, and lack of seed emigration from plant species not currently found at Tifft. This trajectory also appears to apply to Tifft Marsh, where a lack of natural disturbance, due in large part to a stagnant hydrologic regime, has allowed common cattail to become entirely dominant over other marsh vegetation. Without intervention, Tifft is likely to continue to lose plant species, as well as its tree canopy. There are turtle species that are threatened within NYS and have been observed within the preserve. The lack of ideal nesting habitat within or nearby the preserve lowers the opportunities for these threatened species to reproduce.

Erie County would forfeit the USEPA grant funding, and the community would not receive the benefits of the habitat enhancement project.

A contract with the USEPA will be executed, a grant budget will be created for DEP, a position will be created in DEP, and a sub-award agreement will be executed with the sub-awardee.

WHEREAS, in 2022, Erie County completed a Climate Vulnerability Assessment that identified extreme heat and flooding as climate threats disproportionately impacting disadvantaged communities; and

WHEREAS, February 1, 2024 the Erie County Legislature adopted the Erie County Community Climate Action Plan that recommends prioritizing habitat restoration projects to increase connectivity, costal resilience, tree canopy and the associated benefits in disadvantaged communities (COMM 2E-19); and

WHEREAS, Erie County has been awarded a \$1,034,940 grant from the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) to manage the installation of a water-level control pump and associated infrastructure, conversion of a 5-acre cattail stand to a diverse assemblage of native marsh species, construction of a turtle nesting beach, and removal of 21.7 acres of invasive common buckthorn at Tifft Nature Preserve; and

WHEREAS, the USEPA award specifies the sub-awardee who is necessary to perform the project tasks: Buffalo Society of Natural Sciences (BSNS); and

WHEREAS, to proceed with the project it is necessary to execute a contract with the USEPA, establish a grant budget, create a position in the Department of Environment and Planning, and contract with the sub-awardee;

- 4. The claim arose in the afternoon on October 19, 2024 on the sidewalk adjacent to 538 and 554 Elmwood Avenue, Buffalo, Erie County, New York, which premises are under the care, custody and control of the respondents.

This Sentence officially started August 1, 2022, the first interview I had was with Sharade Aldinger, the date was February 2024 and at that time was offered the job at Erie County Sherriff's Office at a rate of pay of \$20.00 per hour

(41, 600 annually) which is below the average salary for the Job and my qualifications so at that time! declined the iob. I was called again in July by Sharade Aldinger and told that the position went to legislation and the rate of pay was increased with my years of experience and years of service within the county I would be able to start at a different rate of pay then first offered and if could I come in again to discuss further, I did meet with Sharade Aldinger again and I was at that time offered a different rate of pay \$29.00 with incremental raises, for the position and at the time I accepted that offer and was then hired at Erie County Sheriffs Office, after successfully passing background checks, drug screens, and other various testings. was hired as the Medical Records Administrator of both facilities, the holding center and the Penn out in Alden. Oπ 7127122. I received a welcome email from Sharade Aldinger which included my official 1st day to start (August 1st, 2022) with the hours of work being 8 am-4 pm, the number of weeks for training (a minimum of 6 weeks), and each person of contact to reach out to for support during the onboarding process to include Crystal Quinn and Vonda More (policies & procedures), Serita ( Employee ID and HR paperwork), Mary Armitage (computer access), Adam Manifredo (fobs for DUO and Healthetink), Abigail Armitage (introduction to staff at 134 and the holding center and the medical record process) Angie (training at the holding center) Cheryl (training at the Penn). On day 1, August 1, 2022, I was to report to 134 West Eagle and would spend most of my time there to complete the onboarding process. I was also told that during my training, I would be provided an office within 134 and that I would also be at the Holding center as necessary to obtain records that were still paper-based. by day 3, August 3, 2024, Abigail (Abby) Armitage (acting Medical Records Administrator, the person who was supposed to train me) stopped showing up (she would hide in her office, and could hear her working) at the time that was discussed by Sharade as well as Abby as per email also verbal discussion with Abby. Abby also stopped training me (she told me that she was working on something) I was only allowed to sit in the Education room and read policies all day, not preparing for the job I was going to be doing this went on for a few days before I asked if it was something I could help out with or something I could do because I wasn't scheduled to go to the holding center or the Penn at that time, no one ever had a definitive answer so I had to remain in the training room reading and rereading policies that had very little to do with my job and although I asked for a computer, desk, and office space to work in and get situated and to get acclimated in my new role I was denied (Abby who was the acting Medical Records Administrator had an office in 134 and not in the jail). Vonda Moore the Nurse Educator at ECSO was going over Policies and Procedures (which were mainly geared towards Nurses) and also asked if I could be provided with an area and a computer so I did not have to only sit in the training room and continue to go over Policies that did not pertain to my job and Vonda was also told no because she (meaning myself Danielle Green) is not going to be here at 134 by James Balys (although the current acting Medical Records Administrators office was at 134). The onboarding process continued, and I tried to keep myself busy, by organizing, refreshing myself with laws regarding disclosure, and researching correctional health processes about the Medical Records in a correctional facility on my own, when I found an EMPTY (not occupied by anyone, as the current employees started to move to different offices) office with a computer I would sit in that office and try to work on ROIS that were being requested, and not answered by Abby, and by the next day the computer would be removed by Mary Armitage. Within the second or third week, not after the 6 weeks I was supposed to receive I was thrown into an overcrowded file/ storage room where there barely any room to walk tet alone work within the holding center, the room was extremely cold, dirty, and had black mold coming from the vents, this also the same room were all the files were stored on large rolling file cabinets that were built into the floor unable to be moved, of every individual that was ever incarcerated and currently incarcerated, mental health records, med carts that were not in use, medical tables' bed not in use, as well as 15/20 large recycling bins that were being used for the upcoming destruction process, so in a very small coroner where there was still no room to sit or move and a door which Mental Health Staff would walk through on a daily basis to get to the bathroom or medical area and back to their offices, Mary Armitage and James Balys put a very small desk, computer, phone and scanner for me to stay there and work. The desk was very small and uncomfortable and the drawers were locked so I could not store anything on the desk, I was given a standard keyboard although I asked if I could have an ergonomic keyboard( due to carpal tunnel) and if I could have a larger desk or even one that rises (History of a back injury) all of which I was denied(but Amanda M and Adam M and a few other employees all had an ergonomic desk and keyboards and I was given whatever they could find all standard equipment). I was told via email by Sandra Amoia and Sharade Aldinger that they don't provide those things to anyone and when Sandra and Sharade responded to the email I stated no problem I would purchase my own, which I did although I have medically documented reasons (ADA = carpal and cubital tunnel, history of a knee injury, herniated disc in low back and neck) which is why I needed the things that ask for, then I was told that whatever supplies they receive are what they get, then in 2023 1 was told that when the budget opens they should be able to get the things that I need. Millington came out and measured a couple of offices, only to hear again at a meeting that the budget was exhausted on bills so nobody was getting anything (Sandra). Amanda M is the supply person and places the orders for things that are needed for administration and the simplest things I would need to perform my dally job duties at Erie County sheriffs I could not acquire them unless I brought them myself. As time went on I continued to have computer problems, problems such as the ability to log in, no access to the necessary programs needed to do the job, email not working, fax not working, expired log in less than the 90-day time frame, multiple people logged in under my name, things that I saved on my computer would be deleted and I knew that they were being deleted because I began to back my files up on my external drive I reported everything to Sandra Amoia and James Balys and nothing was done (supposedly James was looking into it and as of today I'm still awaiting a response although James retired). Things continued to get worse and more unprofessional on a regular basis Mary Armitage and her daughter Abigail Armitage created a hostile work environment including harassing me and not providing me with the things I needed to accurately and effectively perform my job duties, hiding things from me slandering me by saying during the time I was working at the Sheriffs office I was also working my per diem job at ECMC, not including me in meetings that pertained to Medical Records, and On several occasions, I could hear Mary tell Abby that she didn't have to train me, help me or show me anything and that I should know about the medical records process, so On 8/17/22 1 sent an email to Sharade Aldinger. who at the time was my supervisor to sit down and further discuss the situation I was going through and how stressful the work environment had become, again nothing was addressed, things would quiet down for a moment but would soon flair up again worse than before. On October 5, 2022, I came into the holding center and my area was in disarray, all of my stuff had been gone through (ransacked), things were missing off my desk, and legal and non-legal paperwork was written on (not by me) and this was not the first incidence of sabotage. On October 12, 2022, I received an email from James Balys that stated that Sandra Amoia wanted to sit down at 10 am and have a brief meeting with Mary, her daughter Abby, and Myself. on the way to the meeting Sandra and I were both walking down the hallway at the same time and she said "I can't help but feel this is my fault and I should have addressed this situation a long time ago, Abby will be going to the holding center as the Senior Medical Secretary and she has no choice". When we all entered the office for the meeting, James Balys started off the meeting with me by stating "Mary said that you don't speak to her" I said to him with all the confusion and unnecessar« stress that Mary is causing I feel that is best that I keep quiet, No response is a response! Mary then says ,hat "she didn't mean to make me feel unwelcomed but she has a lot going with her mom falling and that I had nothing to do with what is going on at the Sherriffs office it's a situation with her and someone else that has been going on for a while,

'F Abby also chimed in saying "Yeah sorry if I made you feel a certain type of way". James Balys then asked "Will you all be able to get along in 134?" I didn't have a response to this question as I was not the person who instigated or continued the harassment but what did have to say was that "work life and personal life should be kept separate I too am dealing with things but I don't bring them to work". That meeting ended and I was moved from the Holding Center to an office in the Administration (blue room). James Bayls tried to tell me that the night nurses were using that area back in the holding center (which was my office) to sleep in so that area needed to be closed and locked from now on, so that is why I was moved back to 134 and given a small office space to do my daily job duties and store medical records that required scanning, records that were subpoena, or under investigation by COC. Once I returned to 134 full-time. When I returned to the Administration Building 134 West Eagle, I spent the entire day in my assigned office concentrating on my job duties, and how I could Improve the medical record process, I also felt to keep the conflict that was created by Mary and Abby that was never really addressed would

be best. Most days stayed in my assigned office with the door closed, my door was closed to concentrate on my records, I also closed my door because my office was located in the main meeting area where all interviews and meetings were held so I also closed the door for privacy and quite and because my office door was closed most of the time again Mary started causing more problems by telling other co-workers that when I am in my office with the door closed I am working for Erie County Medical Center (which is my Per-diem job that I HAD disclosed to ECSO day 1), so daily Julie Cotton would come to my office (just to see what I was doing) with 1 lab result (daily) to be scanned into an individuals chart although she had a scanner right in her office. Time progressed and there was not much that changed except the approach to how things were done. For meetings that I was supposed to attend and that pertained to my job, Mary would withhold the time and location so I would not know when or where the meetings were or have them earlier so I would miss them and Julie would say "Oh it was nothing". I often had computer problems and although the Sheriffs office had real IT employees, I was still required to go through Mary Armitage who was a Nurse acting (did not have a degree in computer technology) as an IT person, also in charge of the Medical Records Destruction project (per James Balys) but yet when I was hired as the Medical Records Administrator and per Sharade Aldinger Medical Record Destruction was one of the main things she wanted me to be aware of that I would be working on, the transition of paper records to electronic and did I mind working the overtime to do so. Almost dally I was harassed, picked on, and treated unfairly by many of the people at the Sheriff's office, and at 134 and still, nothing was done each time something would occur, I would email Sharade or try to discuss it with Dr. McGee, I also communicated these Instantances to both Sandra Amoia and James Balys (who always sided with Mary and Abby) I discussed this situation with several higher-ups my un-comfortability and how I was being treated and it still continued, because not one of them did anything to resolve any of the issues or none of the proplems, conflict that was being created by Mary and Abby against me or even why there was issue everyone acted as if their hands were tied, so me feeling helpless and defeated I filed a complaint on September 25th. 2022, with the Division of Equal Opportunity in hopes that harassment, abuse, unfair treatment would stop, but the complaint was promptly responded to and closed by October 4th, 2022, stating no findings of alleged harassment without even an investigation, or a meeting to hear either side or to see what was going on. Sandy and James' resolution to problems that they knew were going on just ignoring, that I was not creating was to work with each other and try to get along. Time went on and nothing changed for the better, and continued to be professional in an unprofessional environment. As time went on Sara Coffe was hired as the Director ot Correctional Health (my new direct supervisor), Sharade resigned and Mary Armitage is now suspended pending investigation Iwas asked to cover the scanning project by Sara Coffey (all medical records that were in the holding center that were scanned and being scanned in needed to be verified) I agreed to do so. Sandra A came to my office (not asking, but with hearsay) "Mary Said that you are working for ECMC when you are here at the Sheriff's Office", I said to Sandra how ECMC is more advanced than you all are and it is impossible because I need to be Hardwired in on my home computer, but most of al' I wouldnt risk either of my jobs, or my credentials doing that, I also told her better yet reach out to my direct supervisor at ECMC and ask her for all my punch ins and punch out but also every account I touch will have a time-stamped digital footprint and please be careful with accusations. While Mary was out on suspension her daughter Abby resigned, and both Sandra and Sara asked me to learn and cover the MAT (Medically Assisted Treatment Program) once again I agreed to help out. A new Senior Medical Secretary is being hired for the Holding Center; Ashley started at the Holding Center at the end of 2023 and again I was asked to train her (I trained her) Sara asked if I would continue to do the MAT program until they hire someone else to help Ashley, again said yes. The Medical records process, the MAT process, and checking the status of the scanned records were all timeconsuming projects some of which was doing at home on my own time (without pay) I was doing it at home on my own FREE time (not being paid by Erie County Sheriffs Office) not because I wanted to but to keep up with all that I was doing and to stay current with everything. Sandra, in one Tuesday meeting, states there is no policy on working from home so please come in and do any work that needs to be done (but ironically there is a policy to work from home for only me when the county is closed due to weather). So once Sandra told me to come in to do everything I began to come in an hour / two hours early to work on Both

So once Sandra told me to come in to do everything I began to come in an hour / two hours early to work on Both the scanning and the MAT projects. In February 2024 a new Chief started David Franckowiak and once again during a Tuesday meeting the County is cracking down on overtime unless it is necessary, I didn't want to assume that alt the extra jobs Sanda and Sara asked me to do were necessary so I asked did they still want me to come in early and work? Sara Coffee sent an email stating "Stand down on OT and scanning project" I responded to her email and

stated "I was doing both the scanning project and MAT during OT as I previously discussed with you, Crystal, and Amoia each job is time -consuming and hindering me from staying current with my work ROI"

next, I got an email invite from both David F and Sara to discuss Overtime, February 9 there was supposed to be a meeting to discuss "Overtime "(overtime that everyone in 134 still to this day does but 1 was the only one called to a meeting about), we meet in Davids office the meeting was about everything except overtime, Sara started by saying "you seemed mad," I said why would ! be mad? you have given me several jobs to do and you expect them to be done in 7 hours that's impossible" I, barely got a lunch break, and she then handed me a very old job description stating that this new Medically Assisted Treatment program falls under my job duties when in fact I know it didn't, David went on with the rumors of me working for ECMC while I am there ( yet again ) because I have my laptop and why do I bring my laptop and I told him on my 1-hour lunch break I check my emails, he said well I think it's a good ideal if you don't bring your laptop to work (although there is no policy on that, and Amanda M is allowed to bring hers to work and make rhinestone cups that she sells) "and on my lunch break I should do whatever I want like go outside for a walk, or go in the basement to eat"(in 134 there is no breakroom in the basement and almost everyone ate in their office unless there was a gathering). During training Ashley, I was required to go over to the holding center, it was during this time I was encountered by Thomas Kline at the end of last year during the winter months because I walked from 134 to the holding center with a coat on. he asked who I was, why I was over there and that I needed to obtain a locker because coats are not altowed in the jail, I explained to him that I was administration and that I worked in 134 and we are not assigned lockers, he still gave me a hard time so I just left. To make sure I would not have a problem entering the holding center to trail ., help Ashley, I went to the United Uniform store and bought a Sheriffs office sweater and on June 25th of this year Kline again called the deputy at the desk had him call me back into the building, I come back not knowing who was looking for me as I just left the unit, Kline come to the desk and ask "where did you get that sweater and why do you have it" I told him that I report to Sandra and he should speak to her. It is July and Ashley resigned, Sandra says "I need you to help out at the holding center we interviewed and offered someone the job and PSD is doing the BGI" BGI can take 2 months so I meet with Jeff Dimartino to discuss times with him to ensure that I can help out and still do the job I was hired to do as it was important to stay timely, by July 5th I received an email from Sandra that stated she spoke to IT personnel and atl of my stuff was moved to the Holding center so I can access my files from there and she wanted me there fulltime, So I asked Sandra as a CSEA union member (Union-wise) and those positions in the holding center are Teamsters (Union-wise) how does that work and instead of half day you want me there from 7 am -3 pm she said yes never answering the union question. I was thrown back into the dirty, cold holding center again with triple job duties, no break, and continued harassment from T.Kline. I continued coming to the holding center as ordered by Sandra on my scheduled days to work my work began to pile up because the job of the Senior Medical Secretary is also demanding and requires 3 people and not 1, and there is little to no time to my Request for information on a regular basis so went to talk to Sara because she was my direct supervisor, she brushed me off and told me to talk to Sandra because she gave the directive she also brushed me off after she seen it was me so I filed a grievance with the union John Dimaffino in regards to doing out of title work (CSEA member doing a teamsters job) last response I received (August 15, 2024) from him was he was waiting for both job descriptions, in the midst of this going Thomas still harassed me daily, either by not letting me out of the Jail facility making me wait long times to get on an elevator or to get out the facility taking the elevator to other floors that never went on, calling the unit once I arrived to verify if it was me. I emailed Sandra and asked who Thomas Kline reported to because he continues to harass me, she claimed she had no idea that he was doing all of this but she knew he filed a grievance because I was coming over there to work and everyone in the Holding Center are in the teamsters union. Sandra once again put me in a hostile environment and reft me there and didn't care about my quality of life or health she was well aware of the fact that I feared my safety due to a recent DV situation with an OP on file so why continue to put me in the same environments. It is because of her poor judgment, lack of care and knowledge, and 2 years plus of harassment, stress, and increased migraines that was forced to resign on 8119/2024, I was treated like a dog while others were treated like royalty, and I had the most work, with the least amount of space in the most uncomfortable environments and I had to supply myself with the tools to do these jobs while others sat around in each others offices all day doing nothing. My last official day was not until 8/19/2024 but someone had already gone into my assigned office, went through my drawers, and taken what they wanted/needed for the new principal clerk (file cabinet and scanner)! am not

sure what else was missing I just took what important to me and what I purchased, but the scanner and file cabinet were given to the new principal clerk who is "covering at the holding center" like I was the only difference is she not forced to go over there or be there, the work is brought to her in her office at 134.

## **COMPLAINT AND DEMAND FOR GRAND JURY TRIAL**

Plaintiff, Dominique Calhoun, brings this action against Defendant/s
PHILLIP DABNEY JR. ESQ. et al., and alleges upon information, the record of
previous proceedings, and belief and hereby submits the following for
consideration by the honorable court.

#### **NOTICE OF CLAIM**

- 2. The 180-day time period may be subject to equitable tolling. See Pritchard v. State, 163 Ariz. 427, 430, 788 P.2d 1178, 1181(1990) (holding that filing a timely notice of claim is not a jurisdictional prerequisite to bringing suit); Kosman v. State, 199 Ariz. 184, 186-87, ¶¶ 10-11, 16 P.3d 211, 213-14 (App. 2000) (finding the 180-day period could be subject to equitable tolling or excusable neglect). Shakur v. Schriro at p. 6-7(Ariz. App., 2011).
- 3. Plaintiff, filed a timely notice of claim against the City in compliance with General Municipal Law Section 50 on April 10, 2015, which was within 90 days of the January 31, 2015 incident. By stipulation, the City held a 50-h examination of plaintiffs claim on June 11, 2015 at 11:47am.
- 4. This Plaintiff's action was not commenced within one year and ninety days after the happening of the events upon which these claims arise as the Plaintiff's Attorney PHILLIP DABNEY JR. ESQ. did conspire with the CITY OF BUFFALO to commit fraud by misleading the Plaintiff and purposely missing the deadline for the action to be filed by January 31, 2018. Conspiracy has a statute of limitations of 7 years. The Plaintiff has a reason for excusable neglect due to the direct interference for her to file action by The CITY OF BUFFALO.

For the record of the court the Plaintiff served another Notice of Claim to The City of Buffalo and Erie County within 30 days of filing this claim.

## **APPLICATION OF LIBERAL CONSTRUCTION**

5. Plaintiff DOMINIQUE CALHOUN appears here in her pro se status. As such, this Plaintiff respectfully requests that her pleadings herein will be liberally construed by this honorable Court, pursuant to the standards established by the Supreme Court of the United States in

<u>Haines v. Kerner</u>, 404 U.S. 519 (1972) (Holding that: "a pro se litigant's pleadings, "however inartfully pleaded," are held to the most liberal of standards because pro se litigants may be less capable of formulating legally-competent initial pleadings.)

#### JURISDICTIONAL STATEMENT

6. This Court has jurisdiction over these matters pursuant to 42 U.S. Code § 1983. A suit brought under 42 U.S. Code § 1983 is a civil action for deprivation of rights. ("anyone who deprives a United States citizen of rights, privileges, or immunities secured by the Constitution and laws is liable to the injured party. The injured party can take action at law, suit in equity, or other proper proceeding for redress.") (See:42 U.S.C. § 1983. Section 1983 provides in pertinent part: Every person who, under color of any statue, ordinance, regulation, custom, or usage, of any State or Territory or the District of Columbia, subjects, or causes to be subjected, any citizen of the United States or other person within the jurisdiction on thereof to the deprivation of any rights, privileges, or immunities secured by the Constitution and laws, shall be liable to the party.)

#### 28 U.S.C. § 1332; Diversity of Citizenship

- 7. This court has jurisdiction over these matter pursuant to U.S.C. § 1332, federal courts may hear cases in which a citizen of one State sues a citizen of another State or nation and the amount at stake is more than \$75,000. In that kind of case, called a diversity of citizenship.
- 8. The Plaintiff is a resident of Fulton County, GA. The Defendant(s) are residents of and/or work in of Erie County, NY. The Plaintiff is suing for 2.5 million dollars in damages. This Honorable Court has jurisdiction over this subject matter.
- 9. Jurisdiction and venue is proper here pursuant to 28 U.S. Code § 1391 which provides in relevant part that "28 USC §1391. Except as otherwise provided by law—(1)this section shall govern the <u>venue</u> of all civil actions brought in district courts of the United States; and (2) the

proper <u>venue</u> for a civil action shall be determined without regard to whether the action is local or transitory in nature." (See, e.g., <u>Monroe v. Pape</u>, 365 U.S. 167 (1961) (holding that officials acting in abuse of their authority who deprive an individual of a constitutional right may be liable under § 1983.)(See also, <u>Brown v. - 11. Venue is properly laid in the Western District of New York Pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1391(b)(2) because a substantial part of the events or omissions giving rise to the claim occurred, or a substantial part of the property that is the subject of the action is situated.
- 12. Article III of the U.S. Constitution provides Federal Courts can hear all cases in law and equity arising under this Constitution, [and] the laws of the United States. The Supreme Court has interpreted this clause broadly, finding that it allows federal courts to hear any case in which there is a federal ingredient, see *Osborn v. Bank of the United States*, 22 U.S. 738 (1824)
- 13. Under 28 U.S. Code § 1332 Diversity Jurisdiction this court can here the following actions; Breach of Contract, Legal Malpractice, Aiding & Abetting, Defamation, Perjury 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree, Forcible touching, Sexual Abuse 2<sup>nd</sup> degree, Kidnapping 2<sup>nd</sup> degree, unlawful imprisonment 2<sup>nd</sup> degree, importation or transportation of obscene material.
- 14. This court also has jurisdiction over these matters pursuant to United States Code 42 U.S.C. § 1983 provides an individual the right to sue state government employees and others acting "under color of state law" for civil rights violations. 18 USC § 1365(h)(4)- bodily injury. 18

U.S. Code § 371-Conspiracy to commit offense or to defraud United States. 18 U.S. Code § 2-Aiding and Abetting, the Deprivation of rights under color of law under 8 U.S. Code § 242. As per Section 6 of the Erie County Fair Housing Law, fair housing board positions were chosen according to the requirements shown below:

- (a) One member upon recommendation from the Buffalo Niagara Association of Realtors;
- (b) One member upon recommendation from the Western New York Law Center or Neighborhood Legal Services;
- (c) One member upon recommendation from Belmont Housing Resources for Western New York or the Rental Assistance Corporation of Buffalo;
- (d) The Erie County Commissioner of Public Advocacy or designee; and
- (e) The Erie County First Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Social Services or designee Family Independence.

Board members are listed above.

As per Section 10 of the law, entitled Education and Promotion of Fair Housing Goals, Erie County continued to take steps to affirmatively further and promote fair housing in 2024 by sharing educational materials and obligations within the law to housing providers and real estate brokers within Erie County.

Board of Director's met for their first meeting of 2024, on February 13th. The board meets quarterly with a HOLD meeting scheduled each month for housing discrimination cases that are brought to the board. Board meetings in 2024 were held in person. There were 4 meetings held during 2024- meeting minutes are attached.

Eight discrimination cases were brought to the board in 2024.

One case was also filed as a complaint with HUD and was referred to the NYS Division of Human Rights where a conciliation agreement was reached. One case was referred to the Erie County Attorney's Office after the Board found discriminatory actions had taken place and no conciliation agreement could be reached. This case is ongoing. The remaining six cases are being worked on through conciliation agreements.

As per Section 5 (A) of the law, Erie County has designated a not-for-profit fair housing organization, Housing Opportunities Made Equal (HOME), to assist with the implementation of the law. Services include, fielding fair housing discrimination complaints from residents of Erie County, referral services for residents with housing and human service needs and paralegal counseling to assist in resolving landlord/tenant disputes.

Results of HOME's work in 2024 are as follows:

**Housing discrimination complaints**- - 71 cases of potential housing discrimination were investigated. 63 cases were resolved, and 8 cases were brought to the Fair Housing Board in 2024. Of those 8 cases, 1 case was referred to the County Attorney's Office and the 7 other cases are in the process of being conciliated.

**Landlord/Tenant dispute cases**- 226 people were assisted with advice on resolving landlord/tenant dispute issues.

**Referral services**- 197 people were assisted with referral services regarding housing and human service issues.

## Top Ten Payors of Item Pricing Violation Fines in Erie County, 2024

### I.) Background

As part of enforcing the county's item pricing law, Erie County Weights and Measures sends Scanner Accuracy Examiners to retail outlets throughout the county for inspections.

Under that law, stores that have applied for a waiver from item pricing requirements, which are granted on a store-by-store basis at a fee of \$500, are to be the subject of two inspections on separate days before a waiver is granted.

During these inspections, at least 100 items are checked to ensure the price displayed on the shelf tag matches the price ringing up electronically. The total fine owed after an inspection is calculated based on a sliding scale – \$50 each for the first four violations, \$100 each for the next 12, and \$150 for each subsequent violation, capped at \$5,000. As long as the *number* of erroneous prices found does not exceed two percent of the total items checked, a waiver is issued and the store is exempt from individually pricing items for one year.

The appearance of stores on this "top ten" list is primarily a function of the large number of locations they have operating in Erie County. In other words, although these are the ten companies paying the highest fines, they should not be characterized as the ten "worst" or "poorest performing" stores in Erie County. In fact, when considering the scale of their operations, some of the businesses listed are among the stores *best* following current item pricing laws in the county. Further, certain industries adjust prices much more frequently than others, introducing a much greater opportunity for pricing errors to creep in. Note that the average fine per inspection for the data used to generate this list is just over \$200, suggesting that when an inspection looking at hundreds of items does find any issue, it is typically only around four or five mispriced items. Further, since hundreds of inspections are perfect – including many inspections at stores listed below – and result in no fine at all, overall accuracy across all inspection data is 99.4 percent.

(Note: 7/11 appears twice on this list, as most local 7/11s are part of one of two corporate parents, Speedway and Aplus. Individually owned-and-operated 7/11 franchises are not included here.)

- I don't want to meet just to be performative




