Dear Chief Hobley-Burney and Sgt. Flaherty,

We just wanted to take this opportunity to commend Det. Jesse Streeter on the wonderful job he did on State of Florida v. Javari Stovall. This was a drive-by shooting case that proceeded to trial the week of April 11th. This trial was of the driver of the vehicle, Javari Stovall. From the beginning Det. Streeter did an outstanding job investigating this case. He made sure the victim's statements were recorded both by audio and in reports by the officers that spoke to him. Det. Streeter also had Det. Eason do a lineup where the victim identified the suspects and wrote on the lineup their street names. That piece of evidence ended up being essential in our case.

Substantially similar to the circumstances of the co-defendant's trial back in 2014, the identifying victim, victim one once again, completely refused to testify. Victim one took the stand and just simply said he did not remember anything. Det. Streeter once again asked us what he could to help us. He stayed with us working late into the evening. He took on the additional responsibility of contacting fellow officers and making sure they made it to the court house. Never once throughout the whole process did Det. Streeter even complain. Detective Streeter was with us in court until almost 10pm and was back at our office helping deliver witnesses at 8am. At all times, we felt that we were a team working together to make our best efforts to get a bad guy off of the streets. His encouragement and assistance made it easier for us to do our jobs in prosecuting one of the most violent gang members in the county. I personally relied on him to insure that I was making the most effective points for closing arguments.

On April 15th, 2016 the jury did convict Javari Stovall of two counts attempted manslaughter. The Defendant, Javari Stovall, a known IBC gang member has been arrested several times for drive by shootings, but the cases have always been dropped. Without Detective Streeter this case never would have even made it to a jury. Since the victim refused to ID the defendant in court, the lineup ended up being a key piece of evidence. The fact that the victim wrote the street names of the two people who shot him on the line ups was an essential way we were able to tie the victim's statements to the police to the person we had on trial.

Det. Streeter worked tirelessly on this case. He never complained instead he just asked "what else can I do to help you guys." This attitude is refreshing and is not something we come in contact with often. In a city where we are plagued with uncooperative victims, witness tampering, victim/witness fear of retaliation, and violent crime, Detective Streeter is an invaluable asset to your department in the pursuit of justice and in the ongoing desire of both of our agencies to protect this community.
