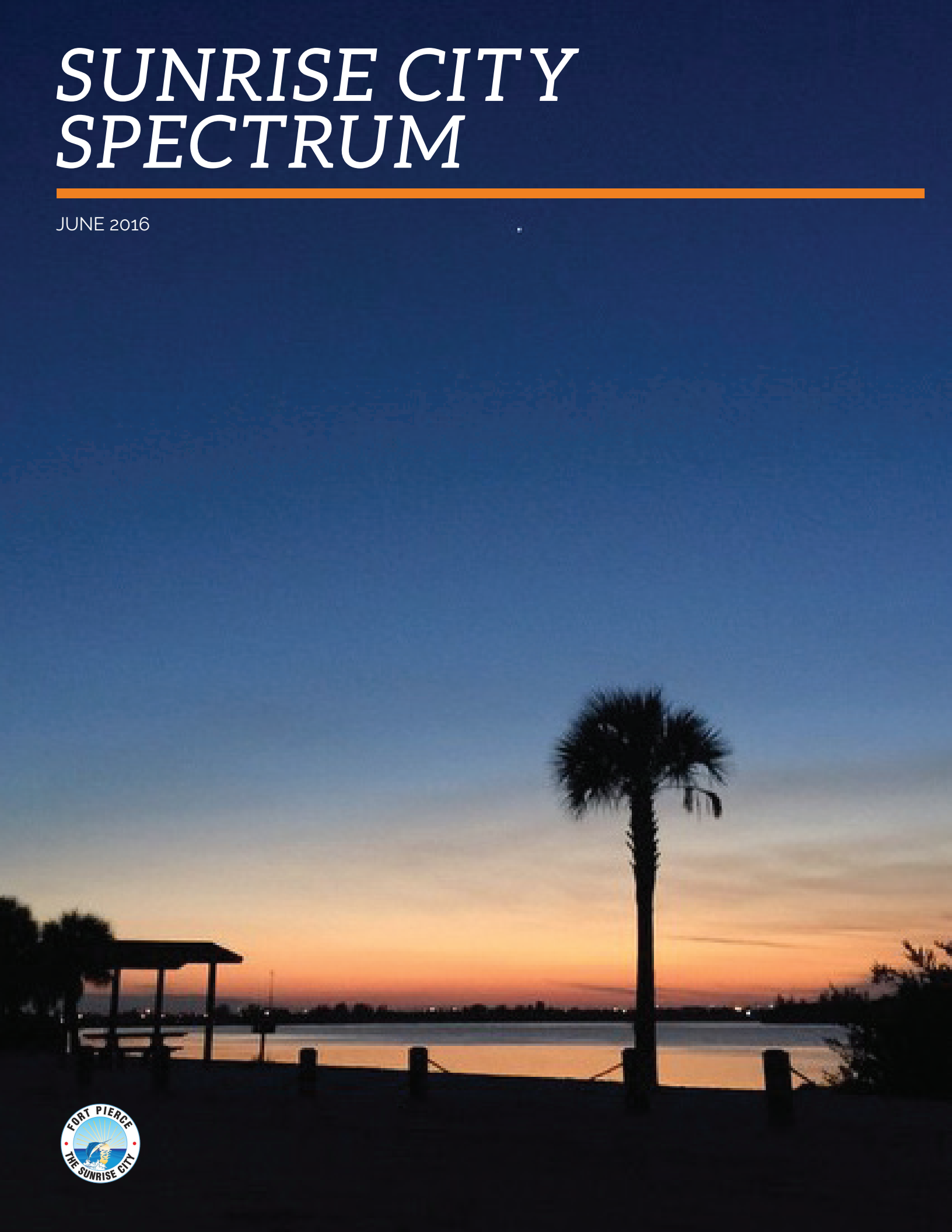

GREAT AMERICAN CLEAN UP

Keep Fort Pierce Beautiful, which builds and sustains a clean, green and a more beautiful Fort Pierce, announced the launch of the 2016 Great American Cleanup. Entering its 18th year, the Great American Cleanup is the country's largest community improvement program that kicks off in more than 20,000 communities each spring.

This year's event took place on Saturday, May 14, 2016 from 8:00 a.m. to noon at PAL Park located at 903 S. 21st Street in Fort Pierce. All volunteers were assigned to one of the following teams: graffiti removal, a painting project at Jetty Park and landscape beautification at the Fort Pierce Police Department which will be part of the Arbor Day Celebration. Each volunteer received a free T-Shirt, goody bag and safety supplies. Volunteers also enjoyed a FREE grilled lunch and refreshing drinks provided by the sponsors.

"It is extremely important to have our Fort Pierce residents come out and volunteer to keep Fort Pierce beautiful. We had several hundred volunteers last year and we are looking to increase the number of volunteers this year," said Paul Bertram, Executive Director of Keep Fort Pierce Beautiful.

Each year, the Keep America Beautiful Great American Cleanup engages more than 4 million volunteers and participants across the country to take action in their local communities to create positive change and lasting impact.

We had over 250 volunteers Saturday for the Great American Cleanup. Solid Waste used four grapple trucks citywide to remove debris on the right-of-ways, landscaped Hayes Park with new trees, shrubs and sod, Lincoln Park Theater received new landscaping and the Jetty Park boardwalk was

painted. We also had volunteers doing a beach clean up.

Arbor Day at the FPPD went well. We gave away 75 trees to the public.

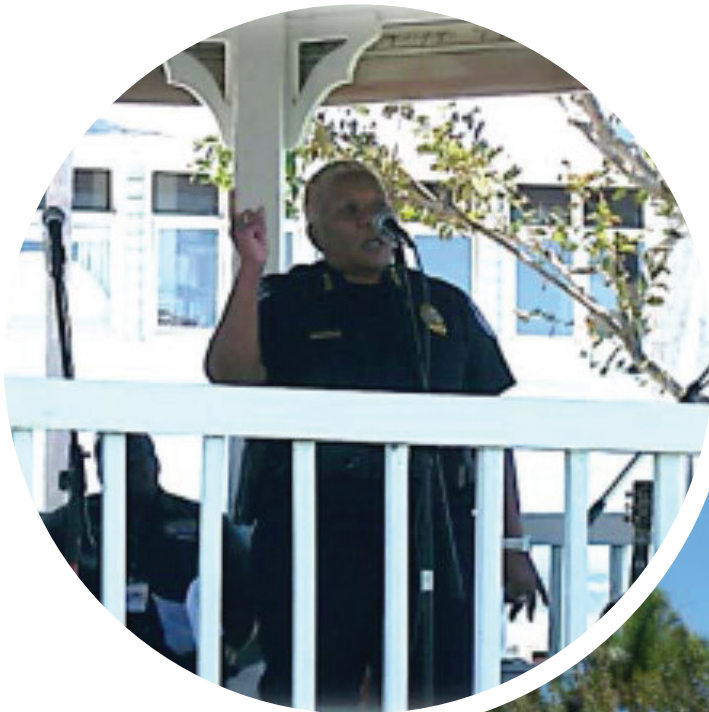

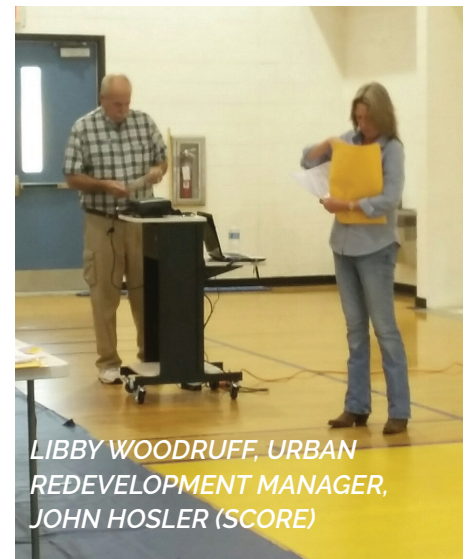
This is the 3rd small business workshop held at the Percy Peek. Previous workshops were held November 18, 2015 and February 3, 2016.

The next small business workshop is scheduled for August 18, 2016 from 9am-11am. The topic for the workshop will be Small Business Law.

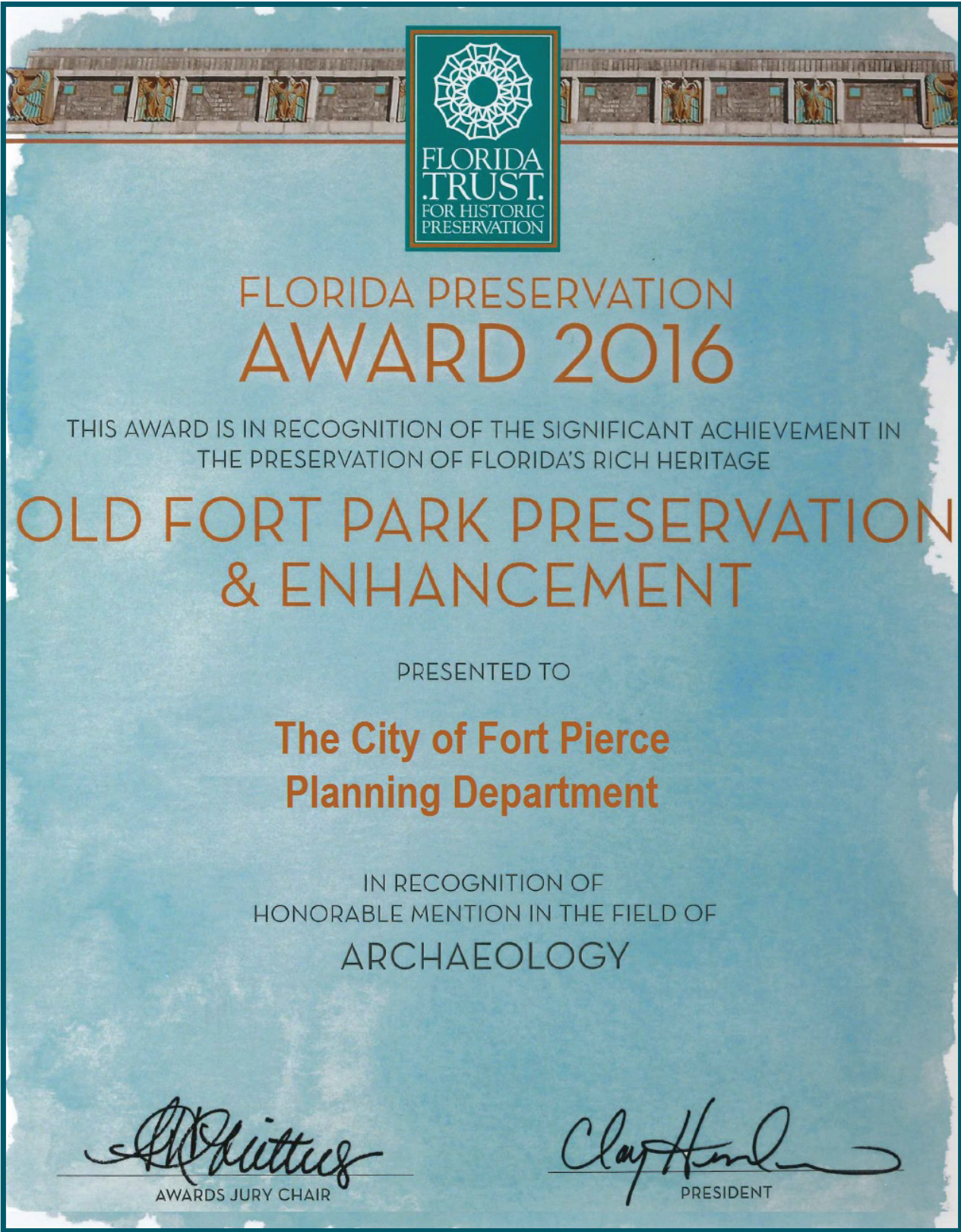
To date, representatives from more than 40 small businesses have attended the workshops.

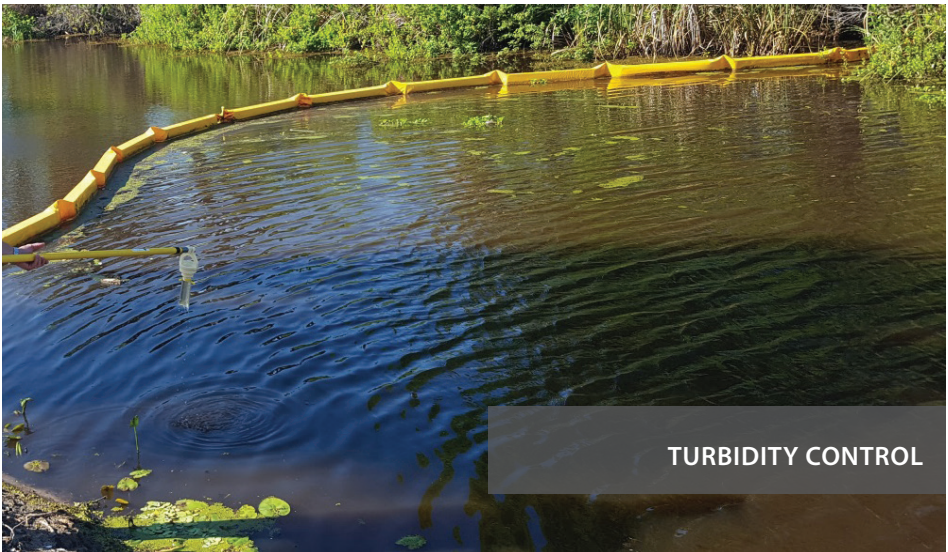

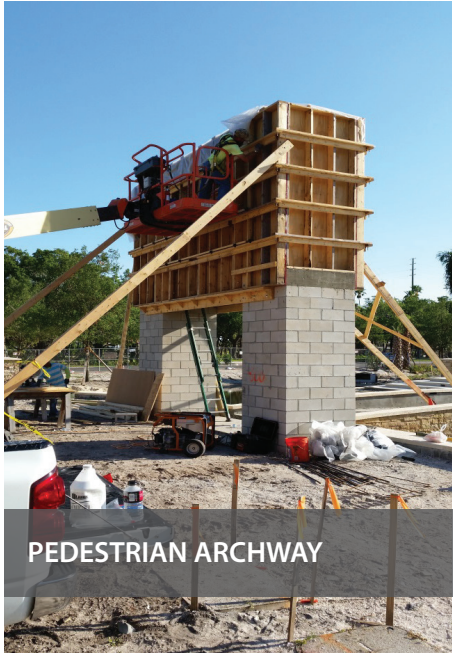


TURBIDITY CONTROL

– Continuation of recreation area construction.

H.D. KING POWER PLANT CLEAN-UP

– Cardno set to remobilize upon closing of revolving loan fund agreement. Sixty percent design plans for seawall replacement nearing completion. Anticipate guarantee maximum construction cost to be submitted by Cardno during the month of June.

13TH STREET AND 17TH STREET RECONSTRUCTION

– Bid opening for 13th Street was held on 4-20-16. We received two bids with the low bid being submitted by Guettler Brothers Construction. We are currently reviewing the bids. 17th Street expected to go out for bid in June 2016.

STREET RESURFACING –

Contract has been executed by the City and notice to proceed forwarded to Contractor. Anticipate starting resurfacing 12th Street within 2 weeks. We have asked the Contractor to wait until end of school (May 27th) to start the resurfacing areas between Virginia Ave and Georgia Ave. Streets to be resurfaced include 12th Street (Ave. H to Ave. M), 21st Street, Birch Street, and 23rd Street from Georgia Avenue to Virginia Avenue.

CITY MARINA DINGHY DOCK CONSTRUCTION

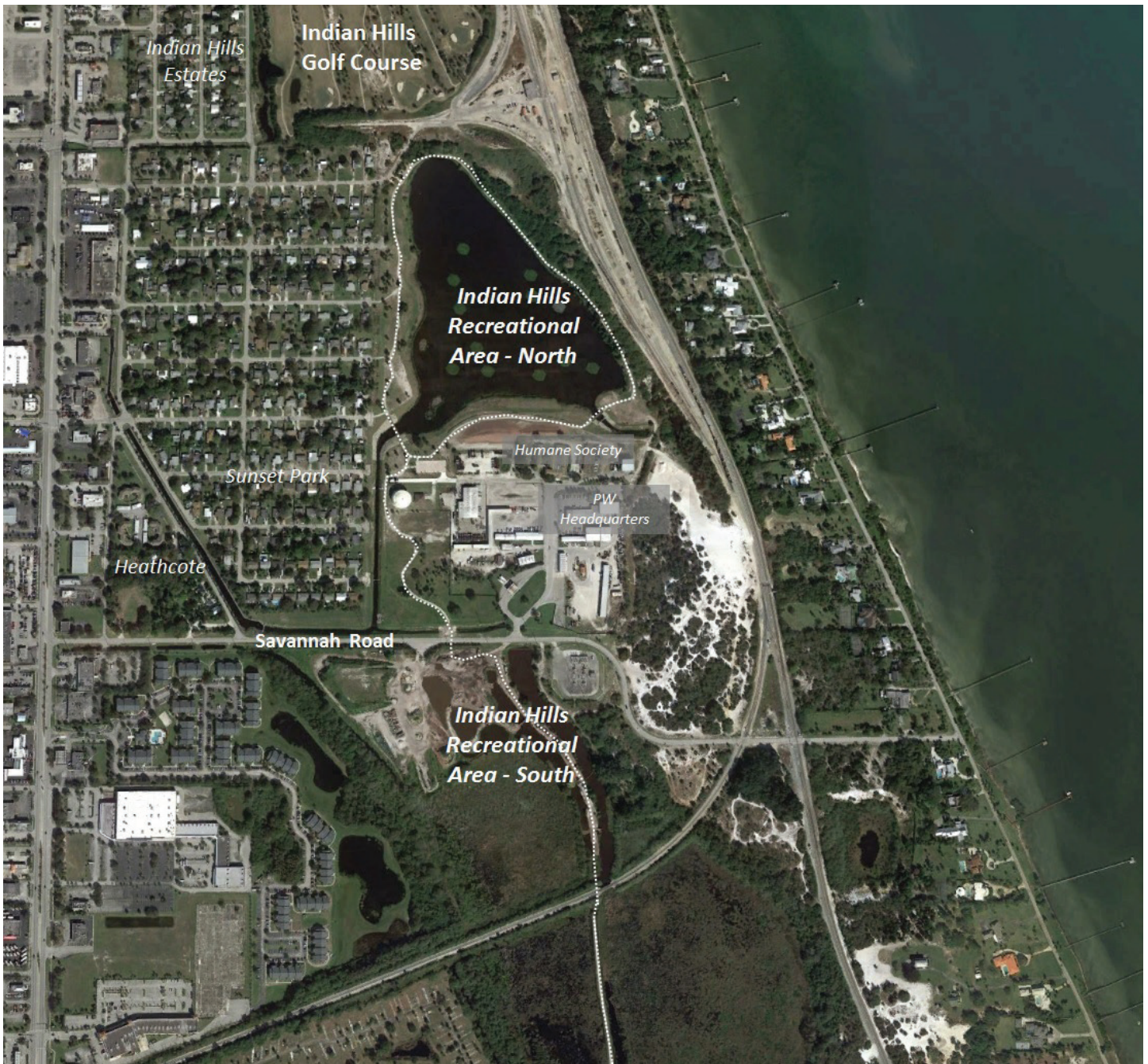
– The City is still awaiting the executed BIG grant contract to proceed with the project advertisement which the City was awarded in March 2105. RFP anticipated advertisement in June/July and construction start anticipated July/August due to the delay from FWC delivering the grant agreement. We received the executed FIND documents for incorporation into the RFP documents in March 2015.

CITY MARINA PHASE I ISLAND CONSTRUCTION –

City/Tetra Tech had submitted the Phase I project for a possible national award. We have been notified that the project has won the 2016 Project Excellence Award in the Large Project category through the Coasts, Oceans, Ports and Rivers Institute (COPRI) an Institute of the American Society of Civil Engineers. The award is to be presented at the PORTS '2016 Convention held in New Orleans in June.

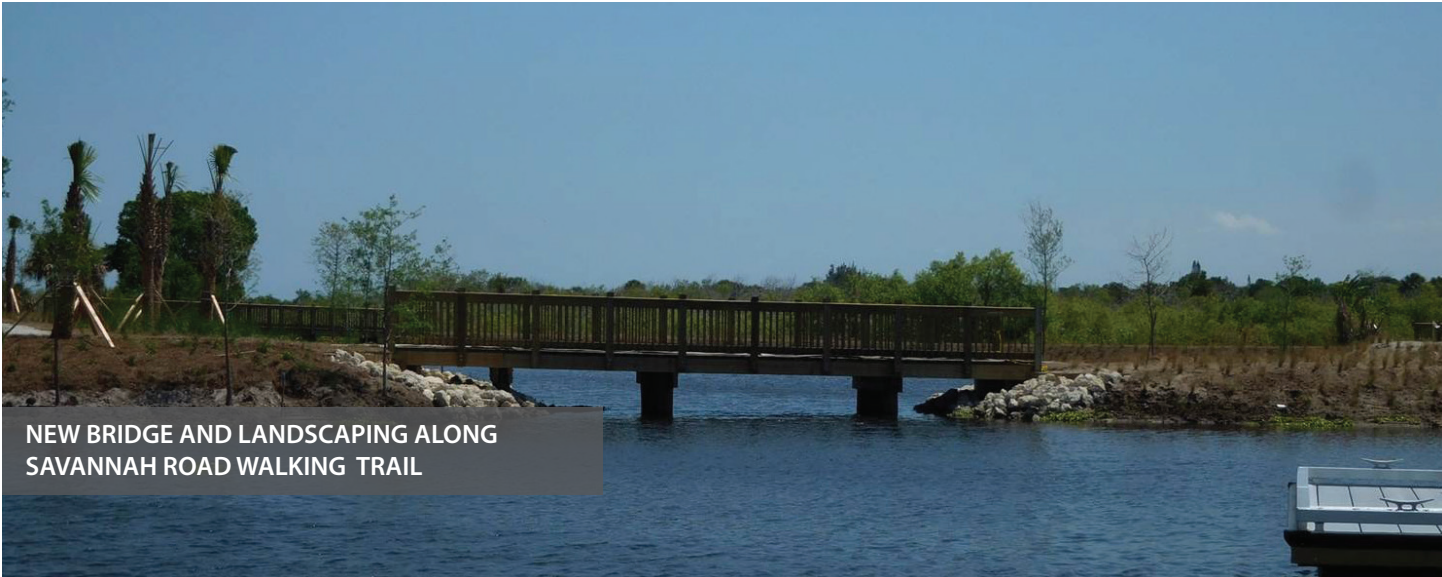
INDIAN HILLS RECREATION AREA PHASE II - Stormwater Improvements

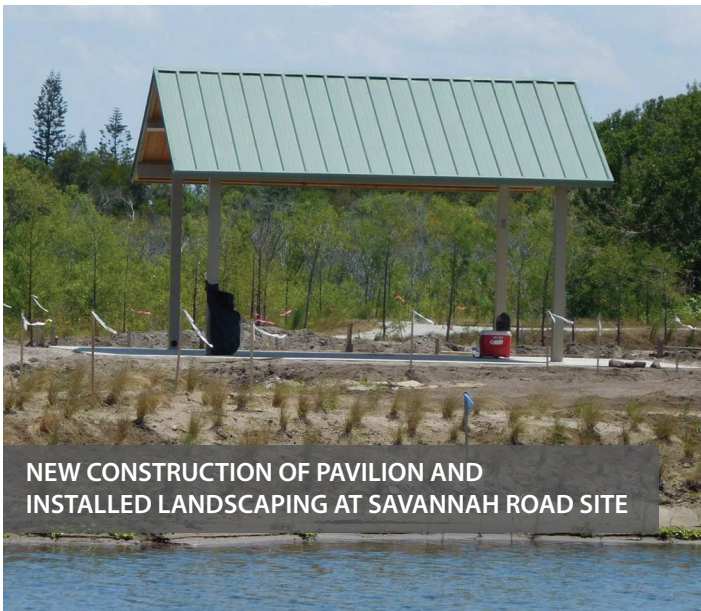

NEIGHBORHOOD CLEAN-UP

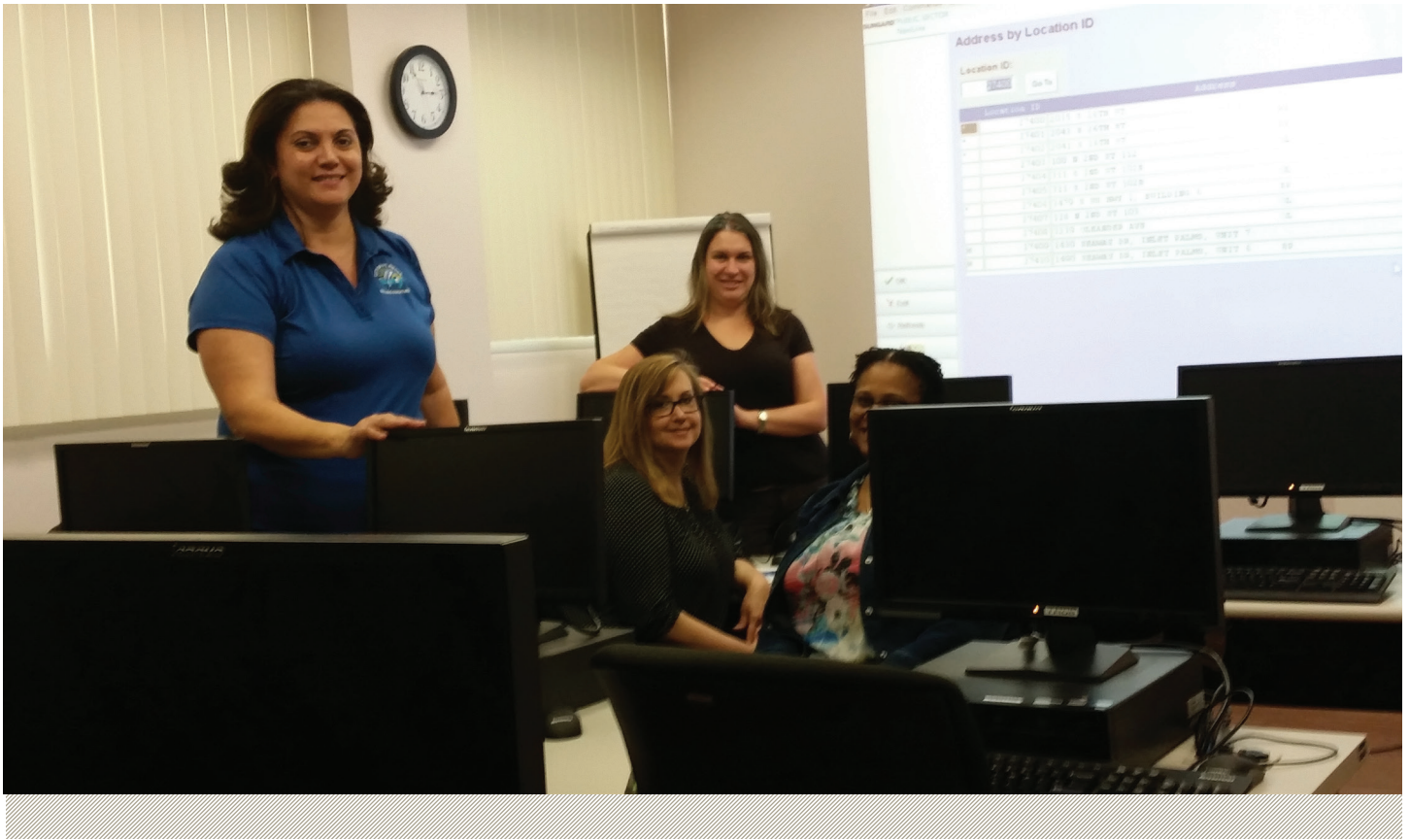

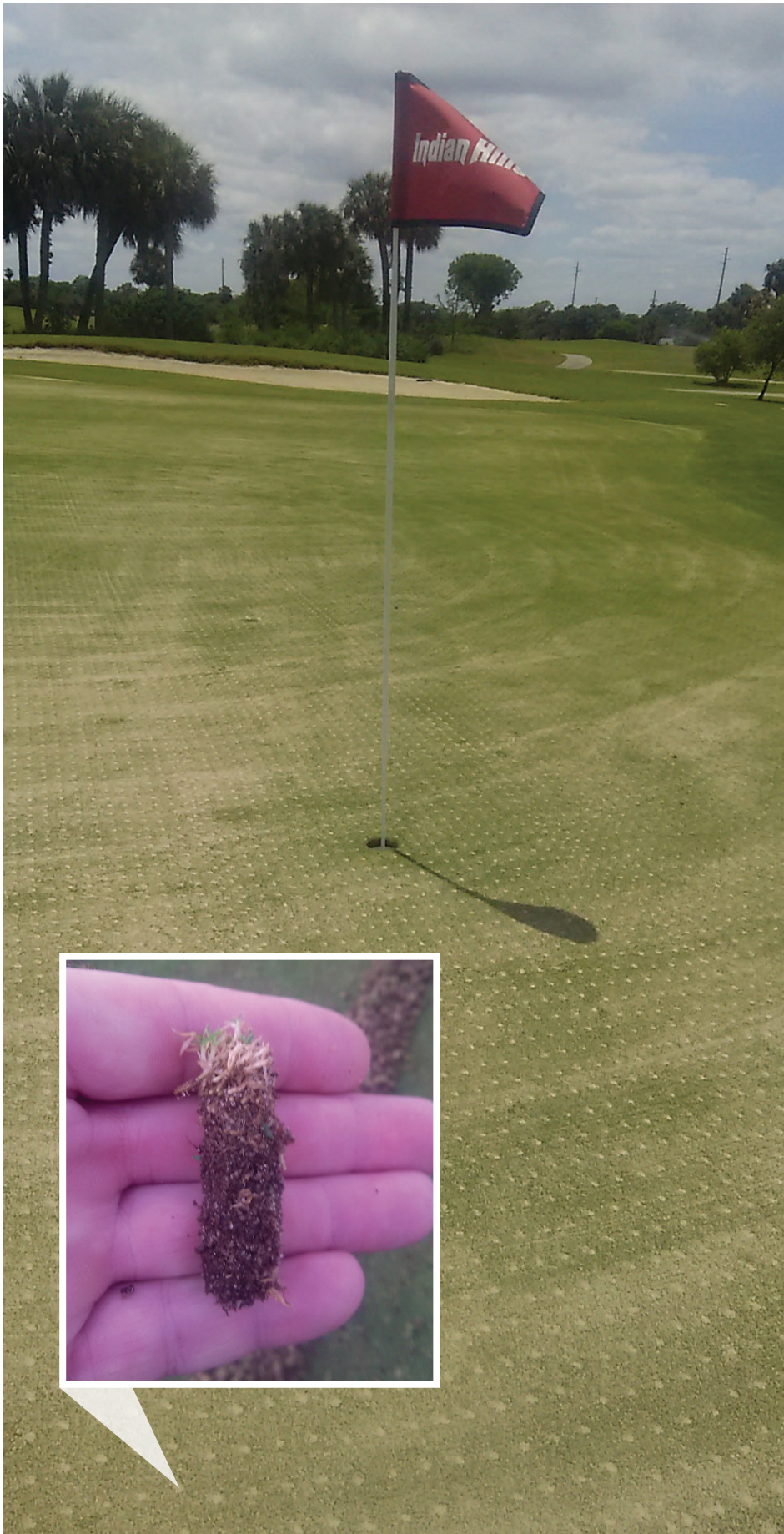

AERATION

Aeration of the greens is necessary to maintain healthy greens through the year. Small cores are extracted to soften compacted ground caused by golfers during play and also allows the roots to get the oxygen they need.

Top dressing sand is spread over the green. After drying, the sand is brushed in to fill the holes with a soft compact that allows the roots to breathe and the turf to recover.

The last step is to water in the sand to give the green consistency.

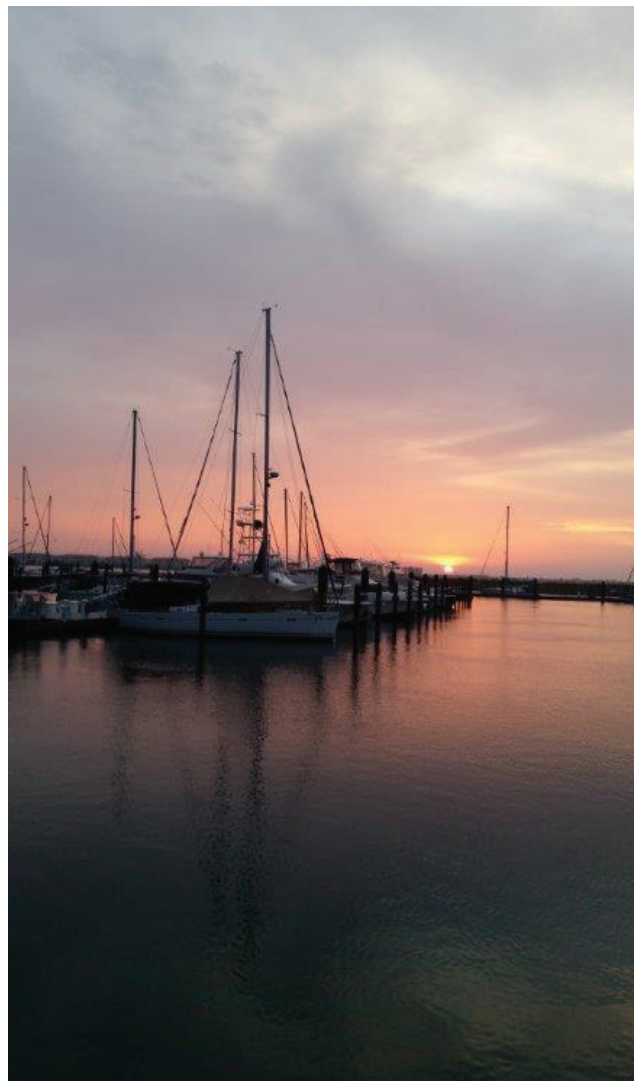
Marina staff installed the new metal art work of a sailfish last week in front of the Marina. Lights were installed to highlight the art work at night. The concrete base was poured by Public Works.

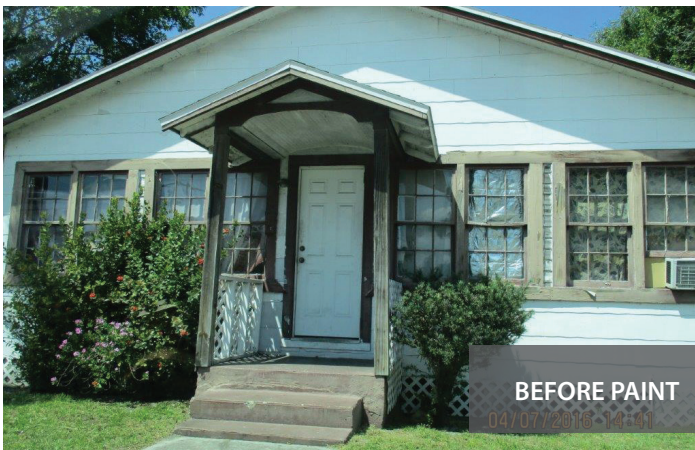
