In the summer of 2016, Fort Pierce City Manager Nick Mimms was contacted by the Career Source Research Coast in reference to meeting their goal in a grant, in which they aspired to employ 120 students between the ages of 16 and 21. Mr. Mimms immediately took the opportunity to partner with Career Source to help the students. The program started with an orientation on June 20, 2016, and the City received 26 students for 6 weeks to offer them real life working experiences. The students worked in IT, Human Resources,

Engineering, Finance, Indian Hills Golf Course, Public Works and the Police Department. The Police Department took the opportunity to include their young Explorer group who were already familiar with the the department. Public Works received students who had a passion for being outside beautifying the City, and one student who showed an amazing knack for automotive repair in the Fleet Division. Students in IT learned how to disassemble computers, repair and reassemble them. Many of them learned office

skills, such as filing and organization, as well as time management.

The students gained first hand experience using office equipment and answering telephones, learning all about customer service. They were also very helpful to many departments by taking on extra assignments as needed. They garnered valuable work experience and forged relationships with employees of the City. The students earned wages from Career Source and expressed great gratitude to Mr. Mimms and the Department Heads for the opportunity to work with the City of Fort Pierce.

THE HIGHWAYMEN HERITAGE TRAIL

1 SEVEN GABLES HOUSE
482 North Indian River Drive
Fort Pierce's Water Center and the beginning of The Highwaymen housing trail and the location of a new home. Features Dan Thacka Storage Trail information book.

2 A.E. BACKUS STUDIO
122 A.E. Backus Avenue
Former art studio of Albert Street "Boss" Backus, a talented and revered Florida landscape artist. Backus is remembered for his impressionistic paintings of Florida and his Caribbean and his responsibility to begin the story of the Florida Highwaymen. He was honored with the Florida Artists Hall of Fame in 1986. Many of his art pieces purchased the property for their offices in 2005.

3 PINE GROVE CEMETERY
1005 Street and Avenue K
Location of deceased graves of three Highwaymen – Albert Backus, Vincent "Coco" Adams, and Johnny "Black" Daniels. When Pine Grove Cemetery was owned, black and white were self-segregated, even at death.

4 LINCOLN PARK ACADEMY
1806 Avenue I
Many of the Highwaymen attended Lincoln Park Academy where they received an education from Charles Jefferson, who introduced future Highwaymen Albert Backus to A.E. "Boss" Backus. The school was made back to 1911 which became the area's first four-year high school. When Lincoln Park Academy was established in 1928, it was one of only four accredited black high schools in Florida.

5 THE DUNBAR HOUSE
2804 Dunbar Street
The former home of Albert and Dorothy Hale, first four children and a pioneer painting class for several Highwaymen artists and their progeny. Hale often painted scenes at great Florida scenes in a late home.

6 EDDIE'S PLACE
1907 Avenue D
Eddie's Place was a juke joint where several Florida Highwaymen congregated, and it was the site and killed here in a bar fight by John Funderburk, a local coach built in August 1976.

7 HIGHWAYMEN OBELISK
Avenue D and 15th Street
This great landmark 1934 Florida Highwaymen monument of Highwaymen pastimes, it was designed to mark Florida artist Highwaymen John Brown.

8 MARY ANN CARROLL
Moore's Creek Linear Park
Avenue B and 15th Street
Mary Ann Carroll is the only "Highwayman" – the daughter of an original Florida Highwayman painter, Bill of Rose, executed here in 1951, for health of chemotherapy received in Fort Pierce after she was 8. Honored by Highwaymen District Women, Mary Ann sold her first painting at 14.

9 HAROLD NEWTON
Moore's Creek Linear Park
Avenue B and 15th Street
Harold Newton (1924-1996) was a central and founding member of the original group known as the Florida Highwaymen. Despite his lack of formal training, Newton had exceptional ability to reproduce reality and convey of Florida's conditions and methods. His oil paintings, now sold for thousands, depending on the size, composition, and quality.

10 INTERMODAL TRANSIT STATION
North 8th Street and Avenue D
The new rail and intermodal transit station project is expected to open here in the course of each year 2016. It is a landmark of a Florida Highwaymen artist, which was painted by many of the Highwaymen artists in their backstage homes.

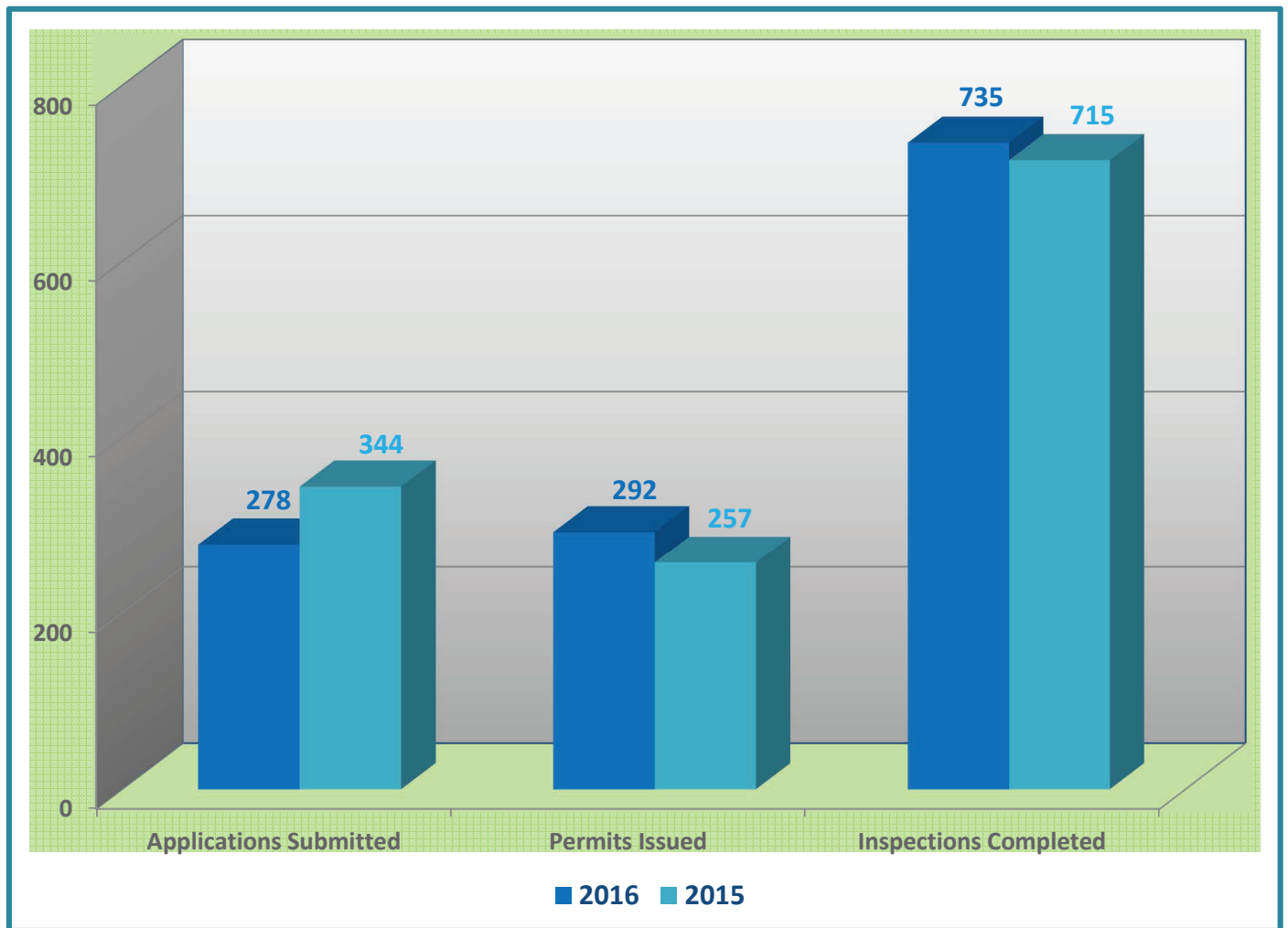

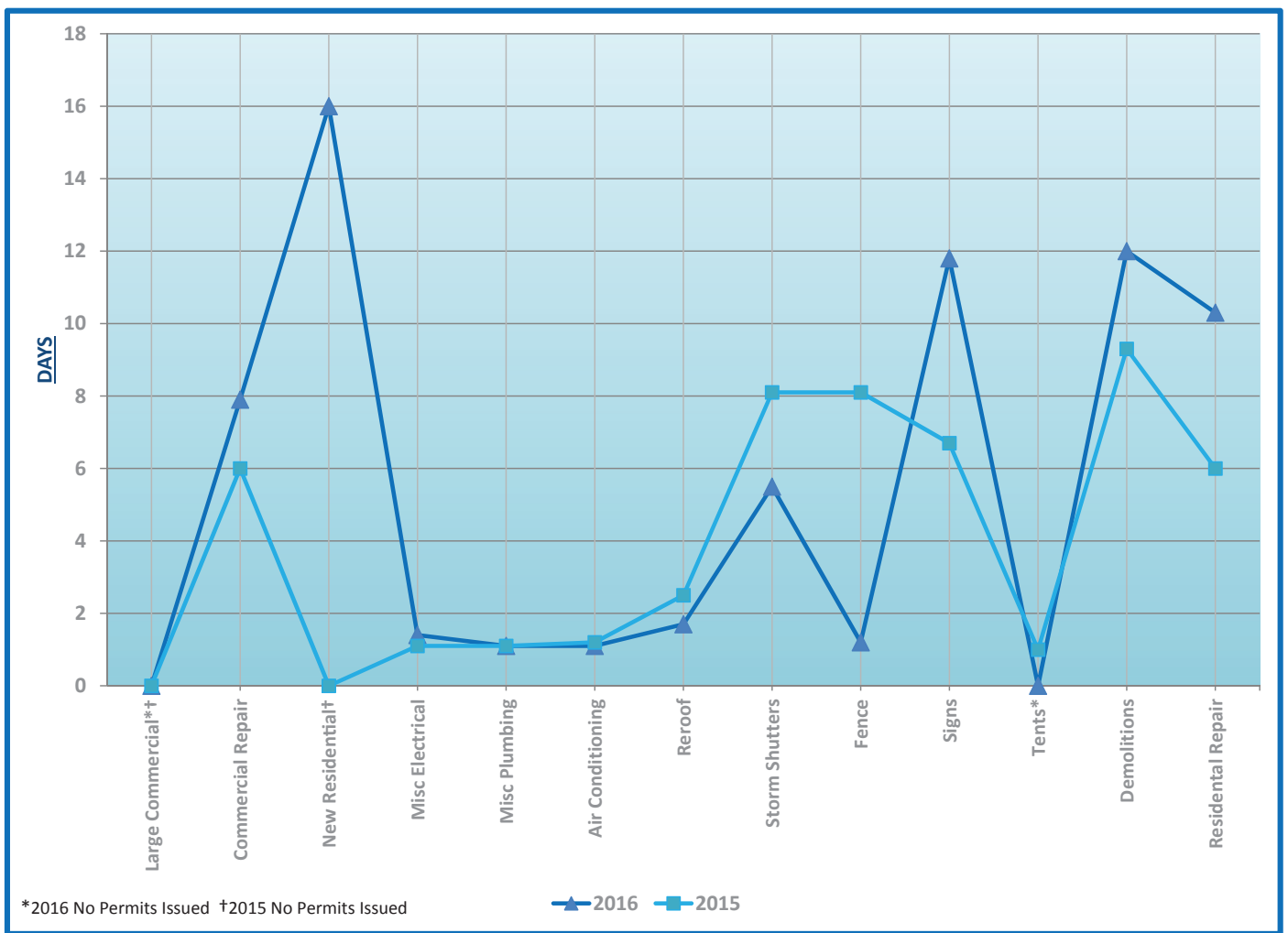
This grant award will be dependent on the City meeting all permit requirements for the two projects by September 27, 2016.

CLEAN-UP – The contractor mobilized on 6-13-16. Anticipated work completion date is scheduled for 7-13-16. Currently reviewing and evaluating 60% design plans for Moore's Creek seawall replacement. Recommendation to City Commission will be presented at second meeting of July.

13TH STREET AND 17TH STREET RECONSTRUCTION

– Guettler Brothers declined the contract, so Engineering contacted the second bidder and they are interested in doing the work. A meeting was scheduled with Pav. Co. to discuss their bid on July 27, 2016. 17th Street under design.

STREET RESURFACING

– Resurfacing started on 12th Street on July 12, 2016. Streets to be resurfaced include 12th Street (Ave. H to Ave. M), 21st Street, Birch Street, and 23rd Street from Georgia Avenue to Virginia Avenue.

CITY MARINA DINGHY DOCK

CONSTRUCTION – The City is still awaiting the executed BIG grant contract to proceed with the project advertisement which the City was awarded in March 2015. RFP anticipated advertisement in August and construction start anticipated September/October due to the delay from FWC delivering the grant agreement. The executed FIND documents for incorporation into the RFP documents in March 2015 has been received.

STORMWATER RELATED ISSUES

– Monitoring of private development construction including erosion and sediment control measures, construction site inspections, and stormwater facility inspections. Investigate drainage issues pre/ during/post storm event and conduct final inspections for certificates of occupancy. The BMAP Annual Update Report for the 3rd year was sent to the FDEP.

INDIAN HILLS RECREATION

AREA PHASE II – Pervious paver parking area is under construction. Landscaping approximately 95% complete. Project's ID sign has been installed at the park's entrance. Engineering is working jointly with St. Lucie County Environmental Services Department to secure funding for the connection of the Indian Hills Recreation Trail with the Savannas Recreation Trail. Consultant, Kimley Horn and Associates has been tasked to provide a rendering of the possible connection point at the FEC rail crossing.

VETERANS MEMORIAL PARK PHASE II IMPROVEMENTS

– Construction over the past two weeks centered on the Memorial Plaza area. Work completed includes flag pole base construction, memorial wall foundation finish work, and stone work installation.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

JETTY TEMPORARY PARKING LOT- Construction of the temporary parking area is complete and being utilized by the public as of July 22, 2016. This project adds just over 100 much needed parking spaces.

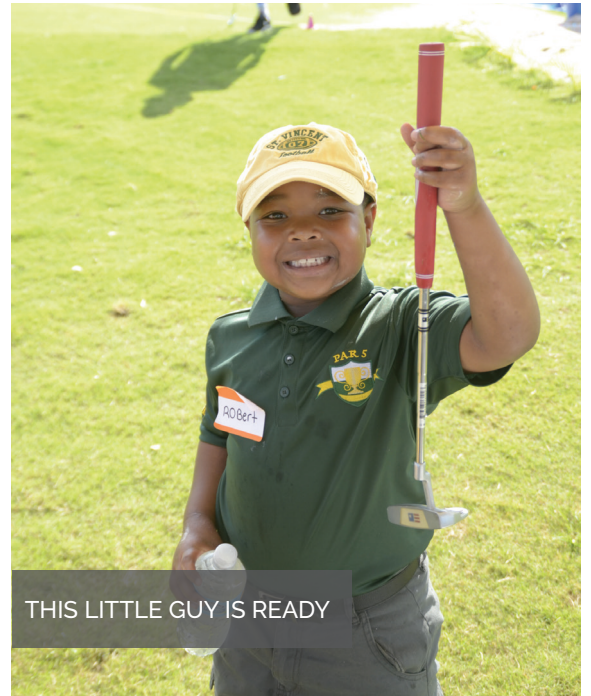
