# BUILDING SAFETY MONTH

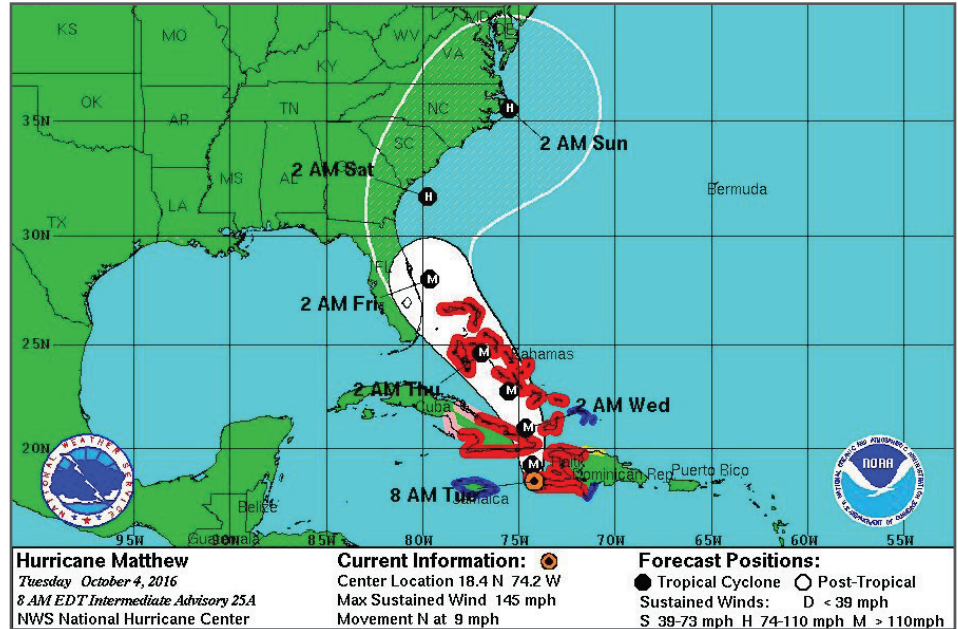
Building Safety Month was first observed in 1980 with the goal of raising public awareness of critical safety issues - from structural issues to fire prevention, to plumbing and mechanical systems, and also energy conservation. In honor of Building Safety Month, here are 5 facts that you should know:

**1. FLOOD PROTECTION** - The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) is a program that provides flood insurance protection to properties that are in flood-prone areas where flood insurance was previously unavailable. Extensive studies of watersheds, rivers, and coastal areas, which include statistical data for river flow, storm tides, sea-level rise, hydrologic/hydraulic analyses, rainfall and topographic surveys have been conducted.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) uses this data to determine the flood hazard which the Building Department uses to enforce the guidelines required for compliance with the NFIP program.

The Community Rating System (CRS) is an incentive program within the NFIP that communities can voluntarily participate in that gives communities discounts on their flood insurance policies. The Building Department provides Floodplain Management and Community Rating System Coordination that has allowed the City of Fort Pierce to be a Class 6 within the program, which provides flood insurance premium discounts of 20% for properties within a special flood hazard area, and a discount of 10% for properties outside of a special flood hazard area.

**2. NATURAL DISASTERS** - Florida is the most hurricane-prone state in the country. The Building Department is involved in hurricane protection from pre-construction to post-storm assessment. The Florida Building Code has specific codes for different wind zones. The Building Department ensures compliance with these requirements during construction.



Following a storm, the Building Department coordinates with the Emergency Operations Center, other City Departments, County Departments and State Departments to submit storm damage evaluations to the Governor's Office. The Governor uses this information to request the assistance of additional federal aid from the National Guard and FEMA. The Building Department also conducts storm assessments to determine substantial damage within flood hazard areas to be in compliance with the NFIP guidelines and FEMA requirements.

**3. UNLICENSED CONTRACTORS** - Unlicensed contracting is mostly enforced by the Building Department with civil citations. However, this is a misdemeanor of the first degree pursuant to Florida Statute 489.127 and could result in arrest by the Police Department, Sheriff's Department or the Department of Business and Professional Regulations (DBPR).

Following a natural disaster, many unlicensed contractors take advantage of our residents promising cheaper prices and faster work than what the licensed contractors can provide. To combat this issue, whenever a state of emergency has been declared by executive order of the Governor, unlicensed contracting is escalated to a felony of the third degree. For more information or to find out if a contractor is properly licensed, contact the Building Department.



**4. HOUSE FIRES** - According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), there are between 350,000 to 400,000 house fires every year in the US. Smoke inhalation is the leading cause of death in house fires. Keep all floors and pathways clear and uncluttered to allow fire fighters quick access to rescue people and animals that may be trapped.

Most common causes of house fires:	Tips:
Cooking related incidents	Never leave cooking equipment unattended.
Kids playing with fire	Teach kids about fire safety.
Smoking	Don't smoke in the house, especially the bedroom.
Heating equipment	Keep portable heaters at least 3 feet away from anything that could easily catch fire and use caution to not overload the electrical outlets.
Improperly used electric equipment	Don't overload extension cords and replace frayed cords.
Candles	Never leave a candle unattended.
Fireplaces	Never leave a fireplace unattended and be sure to open the damper/flue.
Dryers	Never leave a dryer unattended and clean the lint trap often.
Flammables in the house	Keep flammables contained and away from the house when possible.
Christmas Trees	Never leave a lit tree unattended and keep the tree watered.

**5. CHANGE OF BUSINESS** - Did you know that the Building Department conducts an inspection for every new business opening within the city? To protect the employees, customers and the public in general, an inspection is conducted by the Building Department and the Fire Department every time a new business opens.

The purpose of the inspection is to ensure there aren't any conditions in the building or equipment in the building that are unsafe; that proper

accessibility, fire extinguishers, exit lights, exit signs and means of egress have been provided; and, to verify that the business is appropriate for the location. An inspection may cause additional work to be done to ensure the safety of the public and to bring the property into compliance with the Florida Building Code and the Fort Pierce Property Maintenance Code.

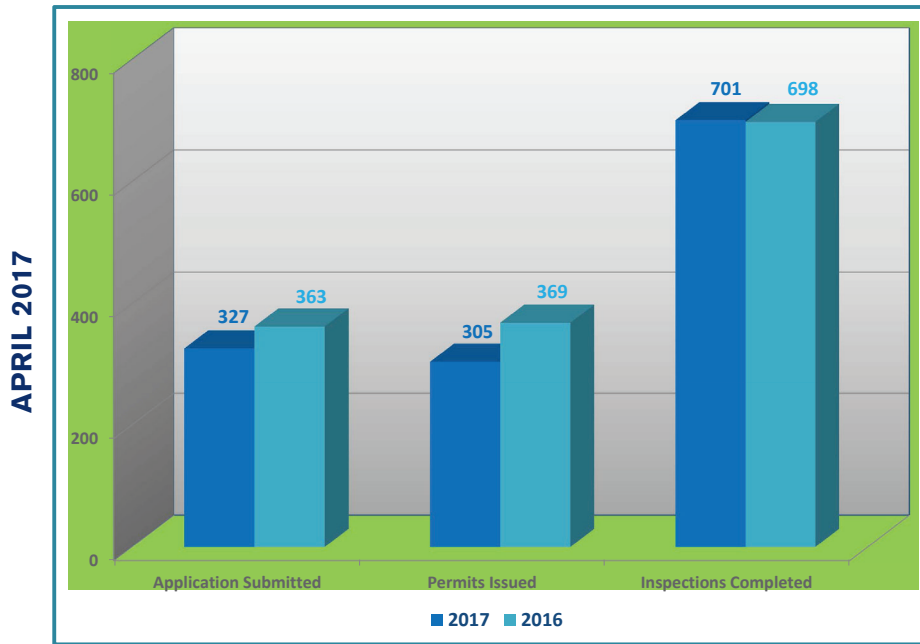

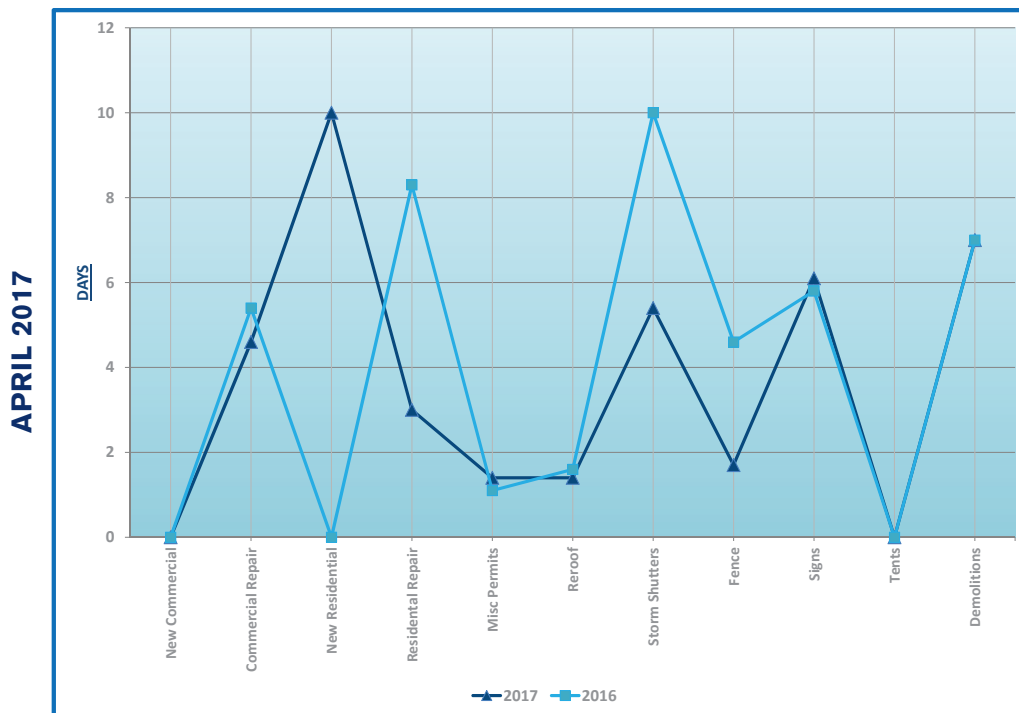

The day began with a general prayer for our city, civic leaders, citizens, businesses, and various organization followed by activities exemplifying faith, family, friends, and fun!

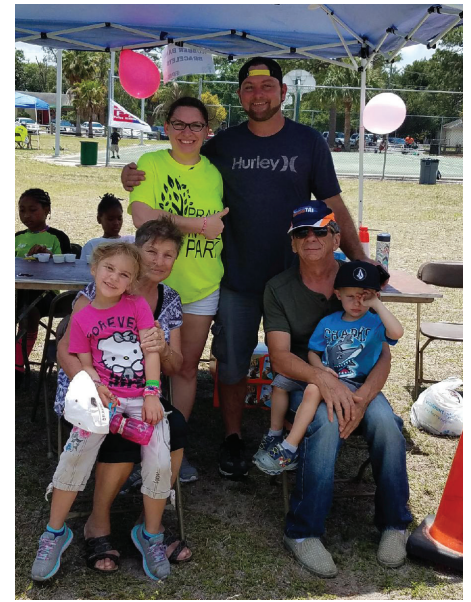

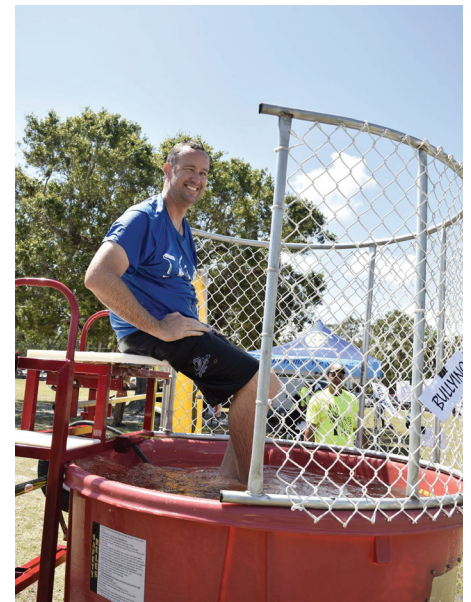

## A place that feels like home



**K**NOWN AS the Sunrise City because of its eastern perch on Florida's Atlantic shore, Fort Pierce has worked hard to preserve an old-fashioned appeal. That's not always easy in ocean-side regions where relentless development may wipe out traces of the past. But Fort Pierce is nationally recognized for its historic ambiance.

Its origins date to an 1838 Seminole War fort, but its 21st-century downtown is

where history speaks. Several walking tours interpret events that happened in or near the central city, and special trails honor author/folklorist Zora Neale Hurston and the group of African-American painters known as the Highwaymen. A third trail will feature A.E. "Bean" Backus, who has been called the dean of Florida landscape art.

Art history is just one aspect, though. Outside Fort Pierce is the Navy Seal Museum, the only such museum in the nation dedicated solely to preserving Seal history. And Main Street Fort Pierce, an organization devoted to reviving downtown, has raised more than \$15 million and renovated three historic buildings, says Doris Tillman, Main Street manager.

The star of the show is the Sunrise Theatre, a 1923 building once considered a major Florida cultural center. Renovated and seating 1,200, the entertainment venue has been host to such performers as Willie Nelson, Dave Brubeck, 3 Dog Night, Itzhak Perlman, and Tony Bennett. Protective ordinances and careful planning help maintain

America." That same year, a community advocacy group called

Top Value Reviews put Fort Pierce at No. 1 on its list of the 50 Best Small Town Main Streets in America.

Said Tillman: "All of this adds up to feeling this is your home, your heritage, and where you bring your family to raise. It is not a sterile environment of buildings, but a place where so many life paths have crossed."

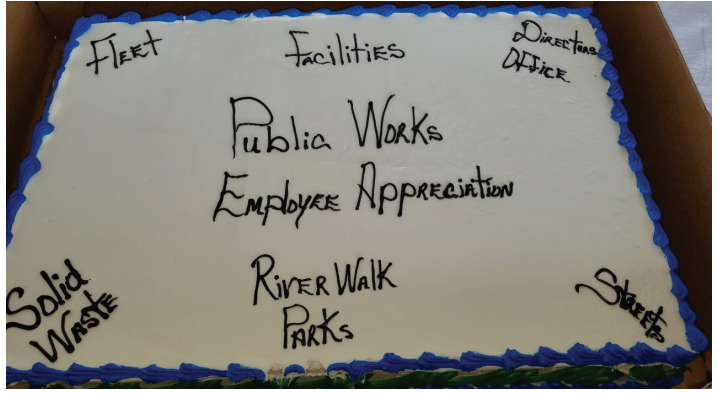







The Department of Urban Redevelopment kicked off registration for the 2017 Summer Jam Basketball Camp. The camp will include weekly trips to the Zora Neale Hurston Library and other field trips, crafts, life-skills and other fun activities and of course, basketball!

The Public Works Department celebrated National Public Works Week during the week of May 14-20, 2017. The Public Works Team looks forward to participating every year and it gives them an opportunity to educate the public about the important role their Public Works Department plays in the community.



Oftentimes the work that these dedicated men and women do goes unnoticed. The Public Works Department provides, maintains, and improves the structures and services that assure a higher quality of life for our community. 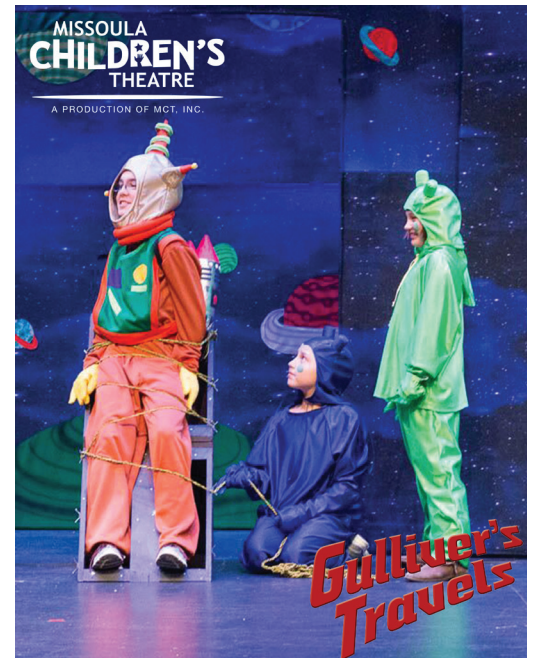
