KEEP FORT PIERCE BEAUTIFUL

■ PAUL BERTRAM, PARKS & RECREATION

Saturday April 14, 2018 started out as a cold rainy morning. We were all a little concerned about the weather, but as luck would have it, the rain cleared and a beautiful rainbow appeared in the sky. Approximately two hundred volunteers arrived bright and early to show their support of community volunteerism for the Fort Pierce's Great American Cleanup. After a few short announcements and breakfast, the volunteers of all ages loaded into the busses and headed out to our five projects.



GARDEN CLUB/ARBOR DAY CELEBRATION:

The volunteers painted the Garden Center and also landscaped the surrounding grounds. The Arbor Day Celebration was kicked off at 10am at the Garden Center with Mayor Linda Hudson and Commissioner Jeremiah Johnson presenting long time (24 years) Tree Board President Mrs. Shirley Walker and the Garden Club with a Tree City USA Flag. The City of Fort Pierce is celebrating the 29th year as a Tree City USA recipient. The Arbor Day project consisted of installing a new irrigation system and planting nine new trees (live oaks and royal poinciana's) in the area which will provide much needed shade and flowers to enhance the surrounding neighborhood.

CAUSEWAY PARK:

Volunteers painted and removed ropes from all of the bollards in the beach parking areas. New informational signs were installed at both entrances to the park to help inform guest and residents of our rules and regulations. Previous storms have pushed sand from the inlet further up into the parking areas making parking difficult in some areas. Heavy equipment was brought in to push back the sand from the parking areas to allow for easier parking.

***EDGARTOWN:***

The volunteers installed sod and shrubs around the City's newly designed sign on Indian River Drive. The new sign will welcome all of our visitors and residents to Historic Downtown Fort Pierce. At 9:30 am the new sign was completed and unveiled for the public to view. This year we were joined by the new Downtown Business Alliance who participated with volunteers working downtown spreading mulch, picking up debris and pressure washing.

GRAFFITI ABATEMENT:

The volunteers were picked up by the Fort Pierce Trolley and taken to different sites throughout the city to remove and paint over graffiti. Keep Fort Pierce Beautiful started this program 8 years ago as a teaching tool to our younger generation. The goal is to show the young adults what's involved with removing graffiti and the cost that's incurred in the process. The program is working very well. Every year, we have fewer reports of graffiti from our Code Enforcement Department. We also received reports that this project team seemed to have the most fun while working in the field.

COMMUNITY GARDEN:

Volunteers planted flowering shrubs on the east side of the garden (confederate jasmine vines). This will add color and a wonderful fragrance throughout the year. Mulch was added to the beds and volunteers picked up debris in the surrounding areas.

If you have not visited the Community Garden on North 9th Street in a while, please stop by and take a look. The garden is vibrant and full of vegetables and flowers, and looks great! At the end of the day, the kids enjoyed games and activities, and the Fort Pierce Utilities Authority provided a barbeque lunch.

I would like to thank all the Departments and our volunteers involved with the Great American Cleanup. We could not have done this without everyone's support in our events. Volunteerism is a vital part of our city's success.







FLORIDA TOUR *de* FORCE

The Fort Pierce Police Department is proud to once again be a rest stop for this year's 21st annual Florida Tour De Force bicycle ride. Police Department personnel played host to nearly 200 cyclists participating five day, 270 mile ride from Miami to Orlando, which passed through over 40 law enforcement jurisdictions. The Florida Tour De Force ride's mission is to bring awareness and raise money for families of law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty in 2017. Shortly after the cyclists departed the Fort Pierce Police Department, the convoy passed retired Palm Beach County Fire Rescue firefighter Tom "Bull" Hill who was walking from Key West to Tallahassee to raise awareness of the lack of benefits for the families of firefighters that pass away due to job-related cancer. "Bull" took on this 640 mile walk after he promised two of his late firefighter friends that he would do so.



PASS *the* TORCH

Every year, the Flame of Hope is carried by law enforcement officers throughout Florida to the Opening Ceremony of Florida's Special Olympic State Summer Games held in Lake Buena Vista.

On Saturday, April 21, 2018, law enforcement officers in St. Lucie County took to the streets to participate in the county's leg of the 2018 Law Enforcement Torch Run for the Special Olympics Florida. The run, organized by the Fort Pierce Police Department, St. Lucie County Sheriff's Office and Port St. Lucie Police Department, raised awareness and funds for Special Olympics.

The local route began at Fort Pierce Central High School located at 4101 South 25th Street, Fort Pierce and ended at the Publix located at 5473 NW St. James Drive in Port St. Lucie. The distance for the relaxed-paced run was 3.7 miles.





In Her Honor

In March, Martin Correctional Institution held a Women's History Celebration for their staff in Indiantown. Officer Elizabeth Louis sang the National Anthem and Mayor Linda Hudson was the guest speaker. Their theme was "Nevertheless She Persisted: Women Who Fight All Forms of Discrimination Against Women." Palms is designed to have six, privately gated, luxury townhomes surrounded by the beautiful clear waters of the Atlantic Ocean.



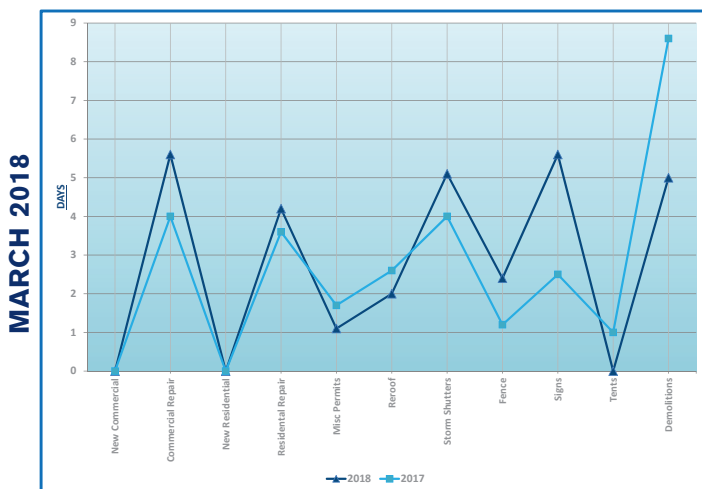


CHICK-FIL-A

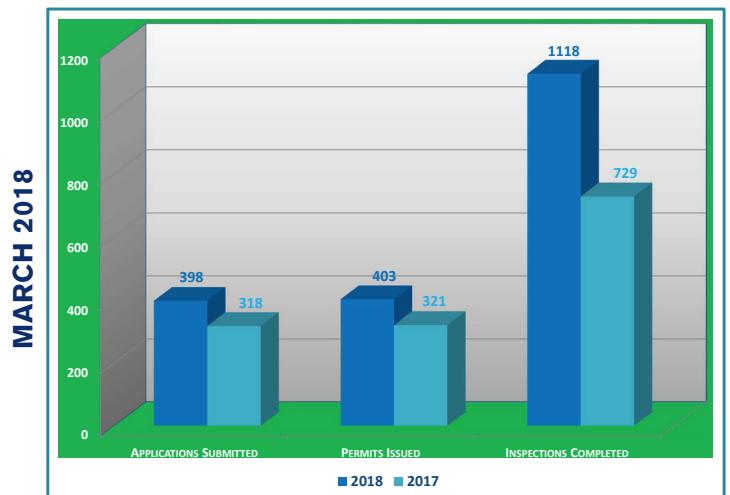

Shaping Up!

US 1 ADAPTIVE TRAFFIC SYSTEM – Construction has been completed for the project. 30 new cameras and 6 new TS2 type I traffic cabinets and new traffic server were installed under this project. The final software and adaptive system control are scheduled for activation the first week of May. The overall goal of the project is to reduce travel time by 25% throughout the US 1 corridor.

CITY MARINA DINGHY DOCKS –Brothers Construction Services started design work for the project and should complete the final design in the next 2 weeks. Once designs are approved, the fabrication of the floating sections of the project should be completed in 6-7 weeks. Onsite work activities should commence mid June.



AVALON DRAINAGE REPAIRS – Construction activities commenced on March 26, 2018. The roadway will be closed to through traffic when required, but local traffic will be maintained at all times. Current construction activities have included drainage pipe installation, replacement of all structures, sidewalk, and driveways installation. Next month, Johnson Davis Construction will be performing sodding activities and roadway resurfacing. Project estimated completion is June 2018.
