NATIONAL POLICE WEEK

Local residents were excited about showing their support for the Fort Pierce Police Department during National Law Enforcement week, held May 13 through 19, 2018. Numerous individuals and organizations took the opportunity to remember our fallen heroes and honor those who continue to protect and serve. Department personnel were grateful for the outpouring of prayers, kind words and thoughtful gestures they received. The Treasure Coast Law Enforcement Officer Wives group kicked the week off by delivering meals for both shifts of the Fort Pierce Police Department. On Tuesday, Brownie Troop 40306 from St. Andrews Episcopal Academy, paid a special visit to the Main Station to deliver gift bags for the officers. Because of their thoughtfulness and generosity, Chief Diane Hobley-Burney held a swearing-in ceremony and made Troop 40306 an honorary Specialized Unit of the Fort Pierce Police Department. Each of the 15 second and third graders were ceremonially pinned by a member of the Police Department. Early Wednesday morning, Parkview Baptist Church delivered a smorgasbord of sweet treats for our officers



that were prepared by the congregation. Before leaving, Pastor Doug Saunders led the group in prayer and left an encouraging message from the church to the officers. The week wrapped up on Friday with a special delivery from Haisley Funeral & Cremation Service, who surprised the department with a big basket of snacks, which went along well with the meals provided by the Treasure Coast Law Enforcement Officer Wives group. In addition to the activities occurring at the police department, two county memorial services were held to pay tribute to all agencies officers, who gave their lives to protect others.

Every year since 1962, the United States has set aside a week in May to honor all fallen law enforcement officers and their families. By doing so, President John F. Kennedy proclaimed May 15 as National Peace Officers Memorial Day and the calendar week in which May 15 falls as National Police Week. Established by a joint resolution of Congress in 1962, National Police Week pays special recognition to those law enforcement officers who have lost their lives in the line of duty for the safety and protection of others. On May 7, the Fort Pierce City Commission joined many other communities throughout the nation in adopting a resolution designating May 15 as National Peace Officers Memorial Day and May 13-19, 2018 as Police Week in the City of Fort Pierce. Fort Pierce Chief Diane Hogley-Burney said, this annual tribute reminds residents of the ultimate sacrifice made by our officers, many of whom they may not have known. The duty of a police officer is to serve and protect, and we will always do that, she said. Since 1966 when the first officer was killed in the line of duty, the Fort Pierce Police Department has honored its fallen officers:



Officer Willie B. Ellis was the first Fort Pierce police officer killed in the line of duty while responding to a neighborhood disturbance on July 17, 1966. He was promoted to sergeant, posthumously. On Saturday, November 4, 2000, the Avenue D Substation was dedicated to the memory of Sergeant Willie B. Ellis.

Lieutenant Grover Cooper and Detective Jimmy Wouters were the second and third officers killed in the line of duty on January 12, 1987 while working a Fort Pierce Police Special Investigations involving drugs. On January 12, 2012, exactly twenty-five years after Lieutenant Grover C. Cooper III and Sergeant James A. Wouters made the ultimate sacrifice to Protect our community, the Fort Pierce Police Department Main Station was dedicated in their honor.

On January 18, 1991, Officer Danny Parrish was shot after stopping an 18-year-old driver for going the wrong way on a one-way street. Grabbing the officer's gun, the perpetrator fired 13 shots into Officer Parrish. Currently, there are plans to honor his sacrifice.

HYPOWER

Fort Pierce is pleased to welcome Hypower to the community. They opened a facility in Fort Pierce that will complement their south Florida offices. Hypower is an electrical and utility contracting company with over 400 employees, of which approximately 50 employees will be working through the Fort Pierce office. They offer airfield, electrical construction, energy infrastructure, power infrastructure, emergency electrical, disaster, communications, and security services. The company serves commercial corporations, government agencies, and utilities all across the United States. They have purchased their site along Old Dixie Highway, just east of US 1 and are making some upgrades to the property and will be open in the next few weeks.

LAWNWOOD PAVILIONS

The Lawnwood Pavilion Facility is undergoing a renovation/expansion to its existing facility to provide an additional 12 beds. The addition will add 11,150 square feet. This facility serves as a satellite location for the Lawnwood Regional Medical Hospital. The addition allows the facility to better serve the community. Along with the extension, improvements will be made to the parking area, storm water system, landscaping, and lighting on the property.



BARK AVENUE

Bark Avenue located at 2305 S US Hwy 1 is now occupied after being vacant since Blockbuster Video closed. Bark Avenue Healthy Pets will be opening in the Sabal Palm Plaza in June. This is their third locally owned and operated pet store in St. Lucie and Indian River Counties. The store has a wide variety of merchandise to compete with the national chain stores.



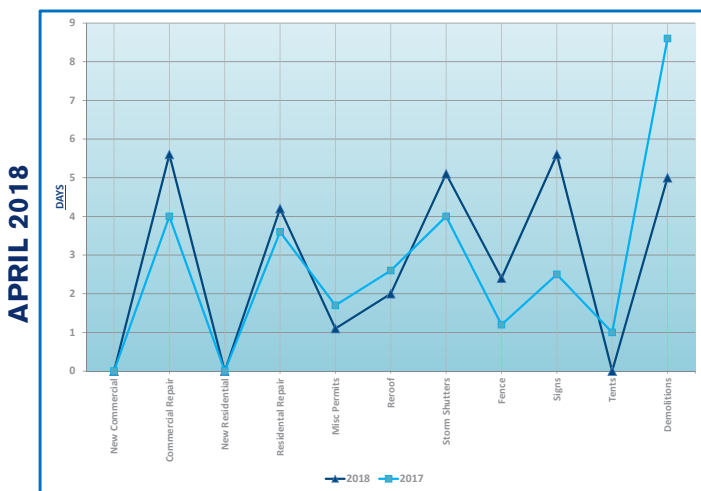


SANDHILL SHORES MOBILE HOME PARK

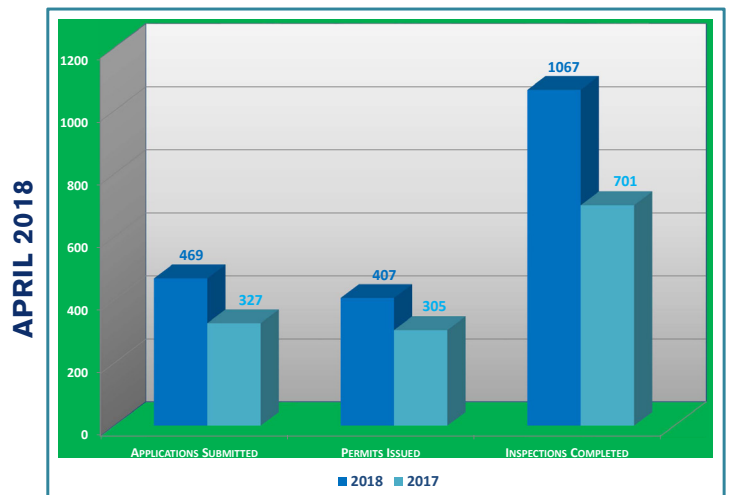
Sandhill Shores Mobile Home Park, located at 3200 S US Hwy 1 is now under new management. Sandhill Shores will be installing approximately 40 new units in the immediate future. Nine units are being installed currently and are at various stages of completion. In addition to the State of Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles, the Building Department also performs inspections to ensure compliance with the applicable codes.

2009 Canal Stabilization Gabion Basket Construction

Outfall Canal Stabilization

Mayflower Canal and Virginia Avenue Outfall Canal Stabilization – The Mayflower Canal drains from the south to the north between Edwards Road and Virginia Avenue. This canal is responsible for conveying stormwater run-off from 129 acres of residential and commercial properties draining through twin 60” RCP storm drains crossing under US Highway 1 and then outfalling into the Virginia Avenue Outfall Canal.

The Virginia Avenue Outfall Canal is situated along South 3rd Street at Osceola Avenue and flows south to Savannah Road and then easterly along Savannah Road into the Indian Hills stormwater treatment system prior to discharging 1,242 acres of commercial and residential run-off into the Indian River Lagoon.

As you may recall, Tropical Storm Faye caused severe bank erosion along a portion of the Virginia Avenue Outfall Canal and the City was able to acquire grant funding for 75% of the construction cost from the USDA National Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) Emergency Watershed Program. With this funding the City proceeded to provide stabilization for a portion of the canal that

runs along South 3rd Street between Osceola Avenue and Gardenia Avenue and then from Heathcote Drive to Savannah Road.

In September 2017, as a direct result of Hurricane Irma, both the Mayflower Canal and the unstabilized portion of the Virginia Avenue Outfall Canal received substantial bank sloughing and erosion sedimentation within the bed of the canals. Applications for funding were immediately sent to NRCS and after much anticipation we recently receive notification that we were awarded grant funding in the amount of \$3,296,283 to be utilized for canal bank hardening of these two important canal banks.

The Virginia Avenue Outfall Canal will be stabilized with gabion baskets mirroring the 2009 work and the Mayflower Canal will be stabilized with natural rock rip-rap.

Construction commencement for both canals is expected in July/August 2018 with final completion in February/ March 2019.



CONTINUED PROJECTS

US 1 ADAPTIVE TRAFFIC SYSTEM – Construction has been completed for the project, 30 new cameras and 6 new TS2 Type I traffic cabinets along with a new traffic server were installed as part of this project. Econolite is completing the final software updates and input of intersection specific parameters. System control originally scheduled for activation in May has been pushed back to June. The overall goal of the project is to reduce travel time by 25% along the US Highway 1 corridor.

CITY MARINA DINGHY DOCKS – Brothers Construction Services has completed design work for the project and design has been released for construction. Onsite work activities should commence mid to late June.

AVALON DRAINAGE REPAIRS – Construction activities commenced on March 26, 2018. Currently the roadway is open to the traffic, but will be closed during the roadway resurfacing scheduled for next month. Current construction activities include drainage pipe installation, replacement of all structures, sidewalk and driveway construction, and sodding. Project completion is scheduled for June 2018.



PAY IT FORWARD

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is committed to the eradication of homelessness among Veterans. We strive for all Veterans to have safe, high-quality, personalized, and timely care wherever they receive their health services. Toward this end, on Thursday, May 17, 2018 the West Palm Beach VA partnered with the Career Source – Treasure Coast and other community partners to host a Veterans Stand down event.

This event featured a ‘one-stop shop’ of local resources to include a full day of services such as medical screening, housing assistance, access to residential treatment programs, legal, Social Security Administration, employment services, haircuts, showers, hot breakfast, clothing, and health and welfare items and much more.

Finally, our Junior Camps and Clinics will begin in June! Please contact the Golf Shop or check us out on Facebook to inquire about dates and times.

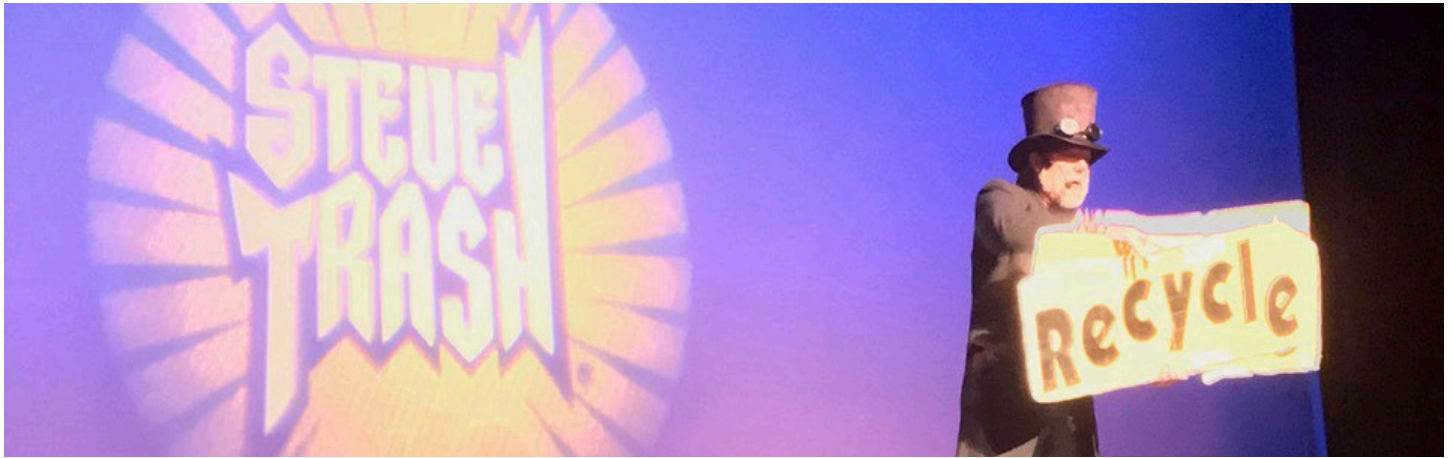

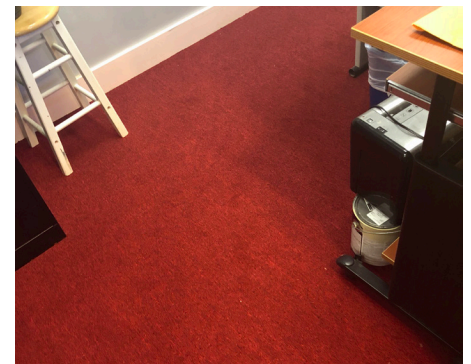
