Is 5G cellphone service the next cancer scare?

The next generation of cellphone service is just over the horizon. 5G — or fifth generation — promises to be able to connect 100 times as many devices at 100 times faster speeds and usher in an era of new capabilities that were, until recently, science fiction.

So, what's not to like?

Well, what if 5G was hazardous to your health, as a growing group of alarmed citizens and scientists believe?

And what if the new transmission towers that will deliver such amazing inter-connectivity will be smaller and unobtrusively located on light poles and condo rooftops, in streets and neighborhoods — physically closer to humans?

Stephanie Austin from Vero Beach and Shari Anker of Port St. Lucie are both concerned about the proliferation of radiation-causing devices, for different reasons.

Austin admits she is no scientist. She has a fine arts degree and was an interior designer until retirement. Her interest in the dangers of cellphone radiation has intensified over the last seven years, she said. Austin is a member of the Electromagnetic Radiation Awareness Group, made up of more than 20 professionals in four counties from Palm Beach to Vero Beach.

Anker, who is president of the St. Lucie County Conservation Alliance, discovered she is especially sensitive to radiation.

"I'm disabled," Anker said. "While working on my PhD in environmental sciences, I was diagnosed with a severely under-active immune system" as a result of working in a mold-infested building. Anker said she is more susceptible to chemicals, particularly pesticides, exposure to which can land her in hospital.

Anker later discovered she also is electromagnetic sensitive. She suffered from tremors when the city of Port St. Lucie installed radio-read water meters a few years ago. She refused to have a Florida Power & Light "smart meter" on her property. Wifi "hot spots" cause her excruciating headaches.

Anker is concerned 5G availability could make life even more unbearable.

"5G is personally threatening to me. It is a human rights issue that threatens to deprive me of my civil rights," she said.

Yet, as Anker fully realizes, "there's a reluctance — even among environmentalists — to talk (badly) about a technology we love."

Part of the problem is the sway the telecommunications industry and its lobbyists have over lawmakers.

Anker and Austin point to Florida's Advanced Wireless Infrastructure Deployment Act of 2017, which was rushed through the state legislature at, well, 5G speed, despite reservations from doz-

ens of counties and municipalities.

The act restricts local governments' ability to refuse "small cell" 5G transmitters (some as small as a pizza box) located on poles in rights of way.

The Federal Communications Commission seems to view the rapid roll-out of 5G as a national imperative that will ensure America's continued technological dominance. FCC Chairman Ajit Pai implied in a June 2018 announcement that slowing the advance of 5G is akin to being unpatriotic. The FCC only last week banned, among other examples, 44 Florida municipalities' moratoriums on 5G projects.

Yet a growing number of scientists have strong views about the technology. In 2017, according to the Environmental Health Trust, more than 180 scientists and doctors called for a moratorium on the increased use of 5G cell antennas. They cited human health effects and the impact on wildlife.

An International EMF Scientist Appeal signed by more than 225 scientists from 41 nations urged the United Nations to develop more protective policy and guidelines.

And yet, the U.S. National Cancer Institute

continues to refute such objections. The institute acknowledges cellphones emit non-ionizing radiation, but maintains that form has never been proven to cause cancer or damage to DNA.

Gary Larson, a radiation oncologist quoted by Forbes.com, is adamant that "I have treated patients with cancer for over 30 years. ... I'll tell you with absolute certainty that radio waves cannot harm you ... there is no credible evidence that non-ionizing radiation (as emitted by cellphones) has any adverse effects at all."

The jury, of course, is

still out. Any adverse effects might take a generation to appear. Anker suggested that Big Wireless might be the 21st century version of Big Tobacco, reassuring us their products are perfectly safe.

Austin wants a moratorium on 5G.

"Slow down and study it more," she counsels.

Sounds like sensible advice.

The City Commission of the City of Fort Pierce, Florida, pursuant to Chapter 171 of Florida State Statutes, and of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Fort Pierce, will on Monday, August 20, 2018, and Tuesday, September 4, 2018 hold Public Hearings on the enactment of the following proposed annexation ordinance on first and second readings, respectively, in the City Hall Commission Chambers, 100 North U.S. #1, Fort Pierce, Florida, at their meeting which begins at 6:30 p.m.; said ordinance entitled:

ORDINANCE 18-028 AN ORDINANCE EXTENDING THE TERRITORIAL LIMITS OF THE CITY OF FORT PIERCE, FLORIDA, TO INCLUDE 3030 SOUTH 25TH STREET IN FORT PIERCE, FLORIDA AND SHOWN ON EXHIBIT A; DIRECTING THE ST. LUCIE COUNTY PROPERTY APPRAISER TO ASSESS SAID PROPERTY AND PLACE IT ON THE CITY TAX ROLLS AS OF JANUARY 1, 2019; DIRECTING THE ST. LUCIE COUNTY TAX COLLECTOR TO COLLECT TAXES ON THE HEREIN DESCRIBED PROPERTY; ESTABLISHING THE ZONING DESIGNATION; ESTABLISHING THE LAND USE DESIGNATION; DIRECTING FILING OF THE ORDINANCE WITH THE CLERK OF THE CIRCUIT COURT AND CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER OF ST. LUCIE COUNTY; DIRECTING REVISION OF THE CHARTER BOUNDARY ARTICLE TO BE FILED WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE AND SUBMITTED TO THE OFFICE OF ECONOMIC AND DEMOGRAPHIC RESEARCH; PROVIDING FOR A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS THEREOF IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.
