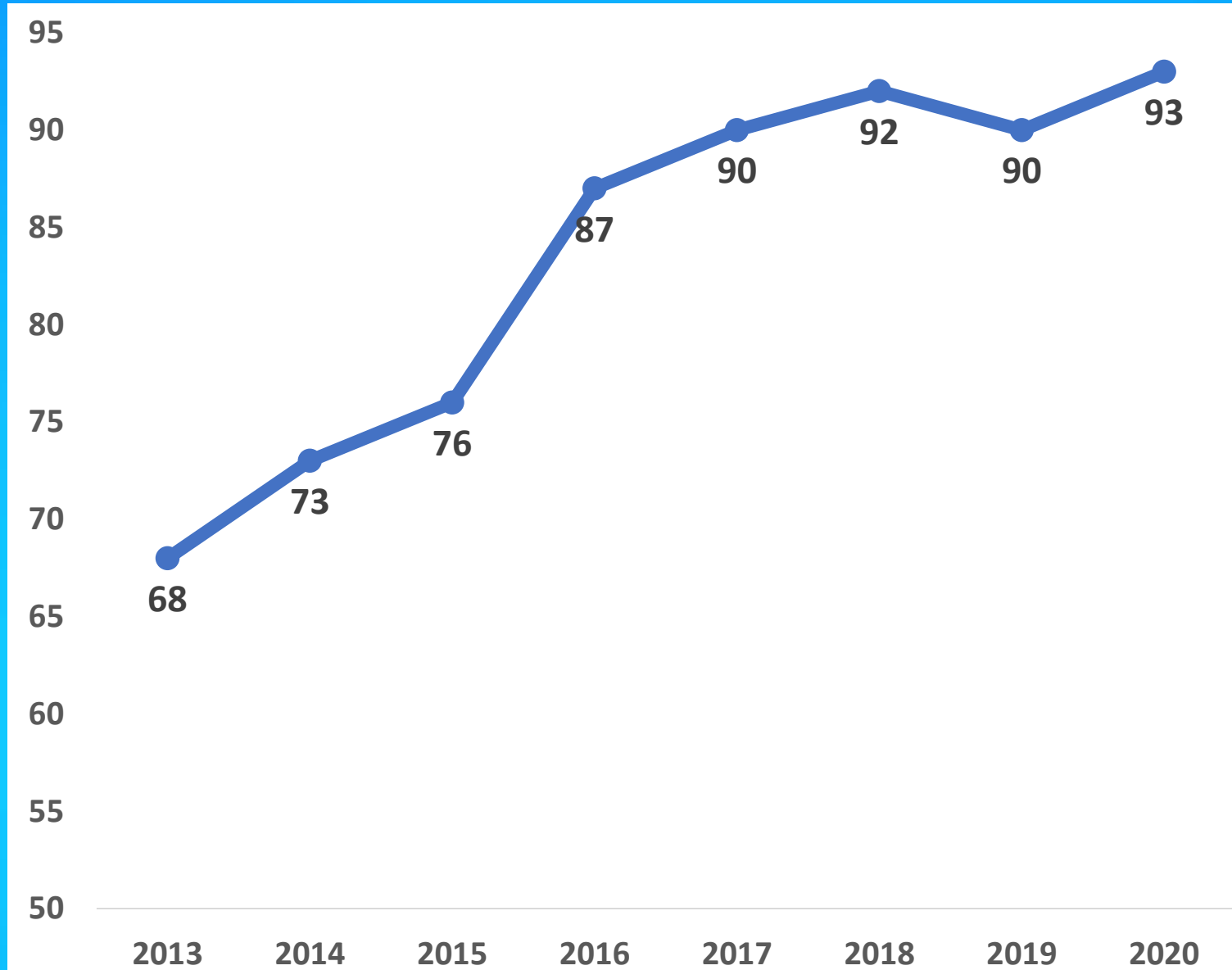

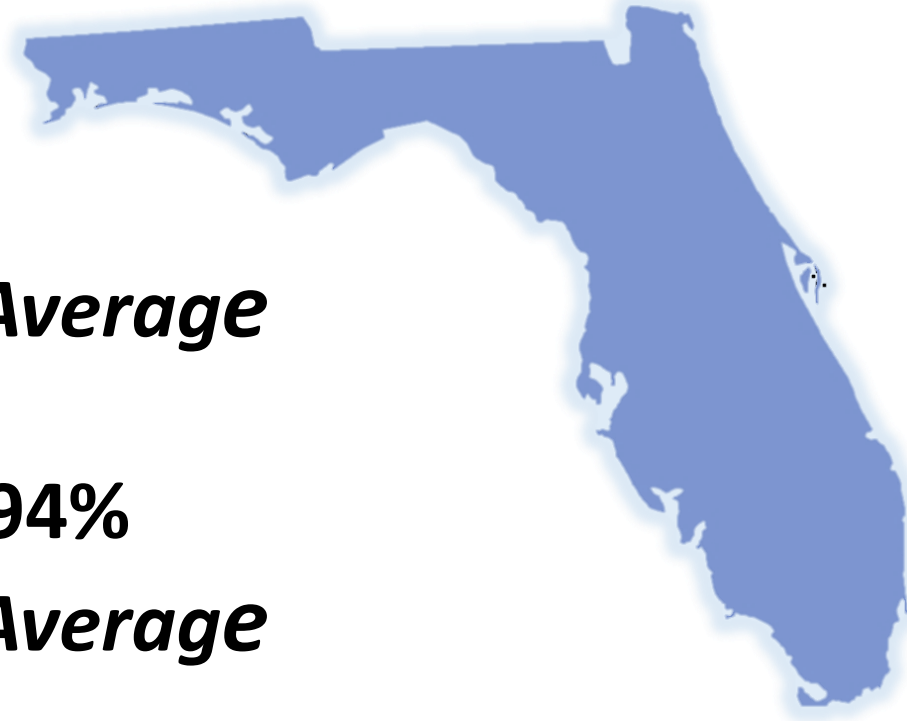

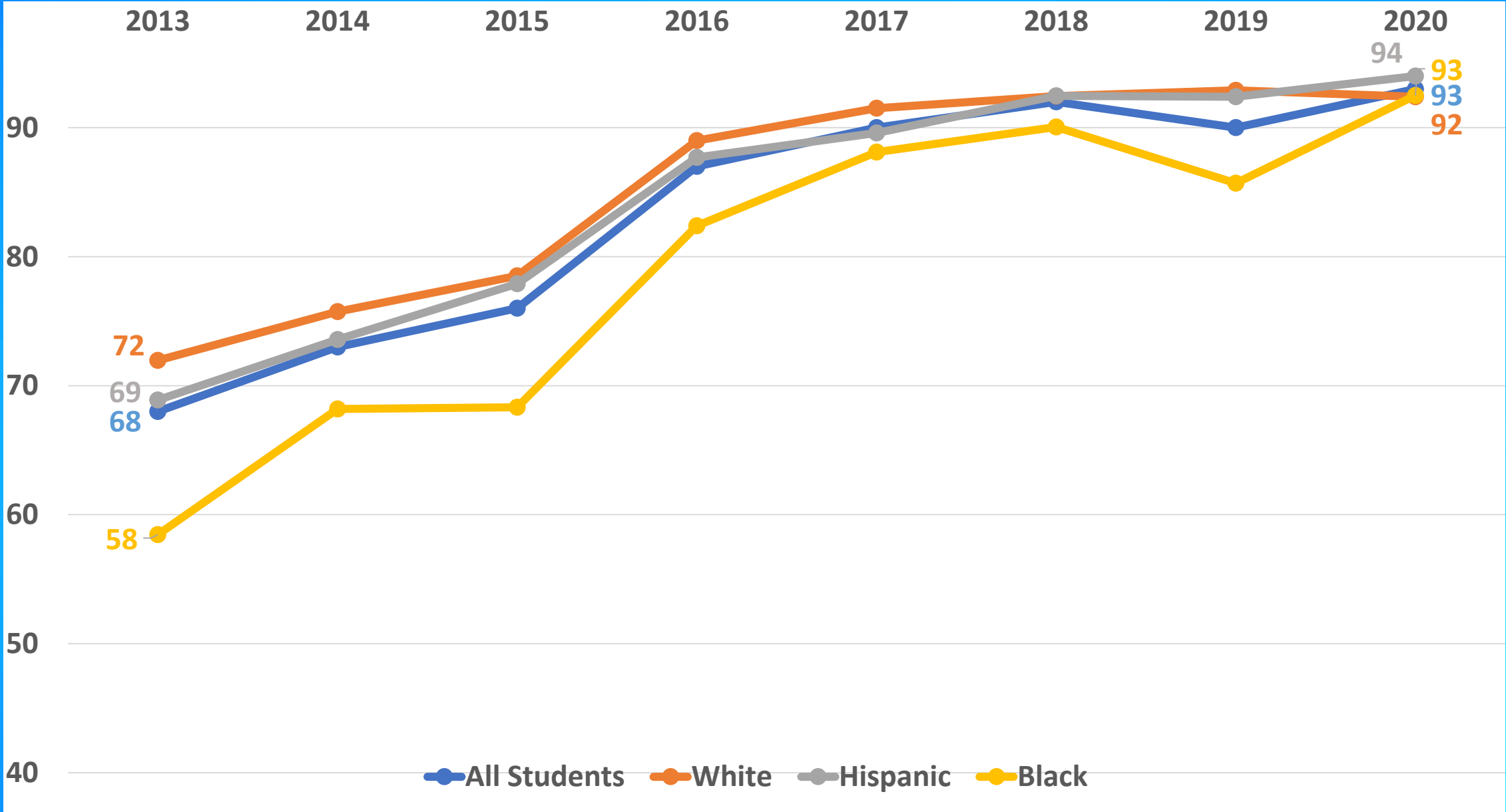

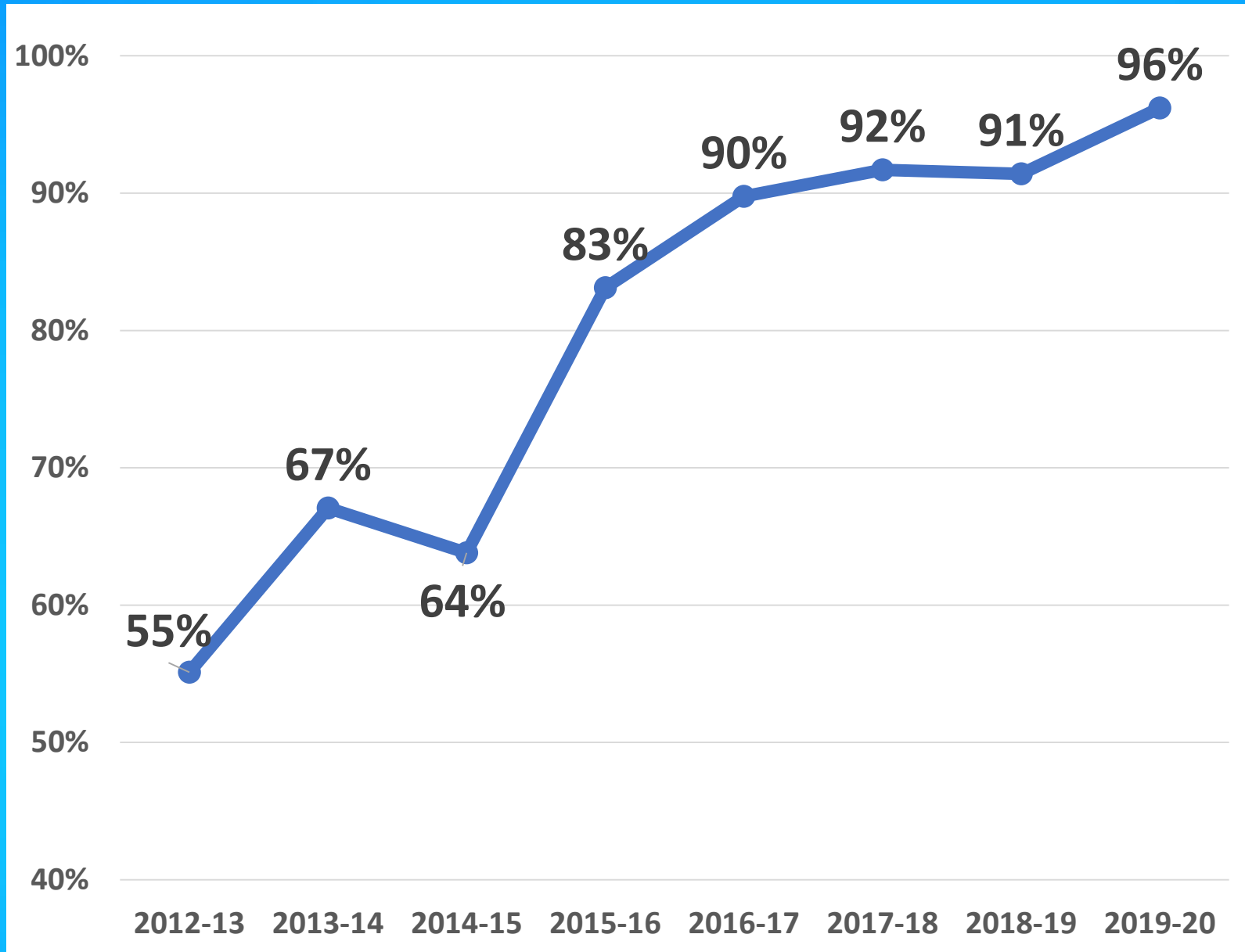

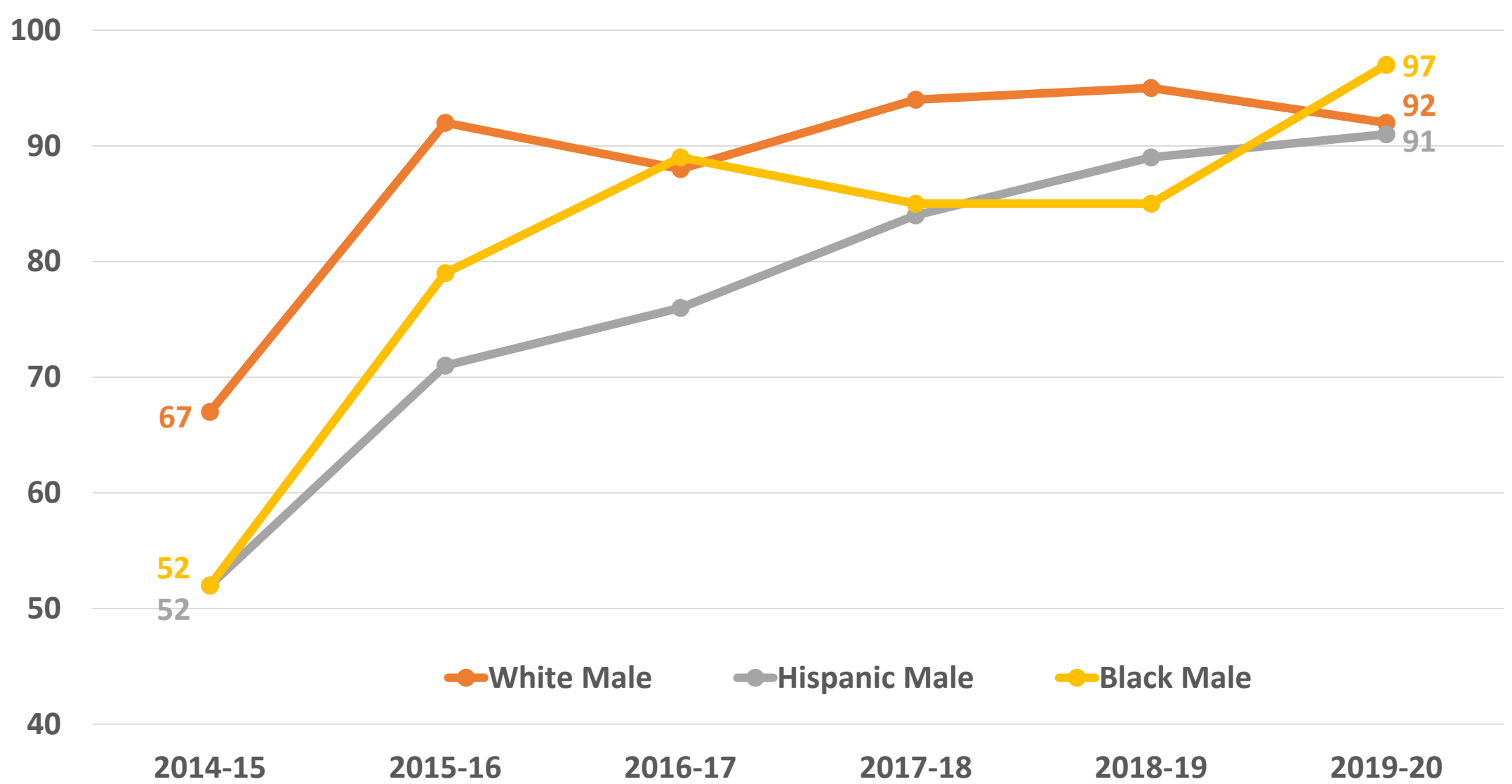

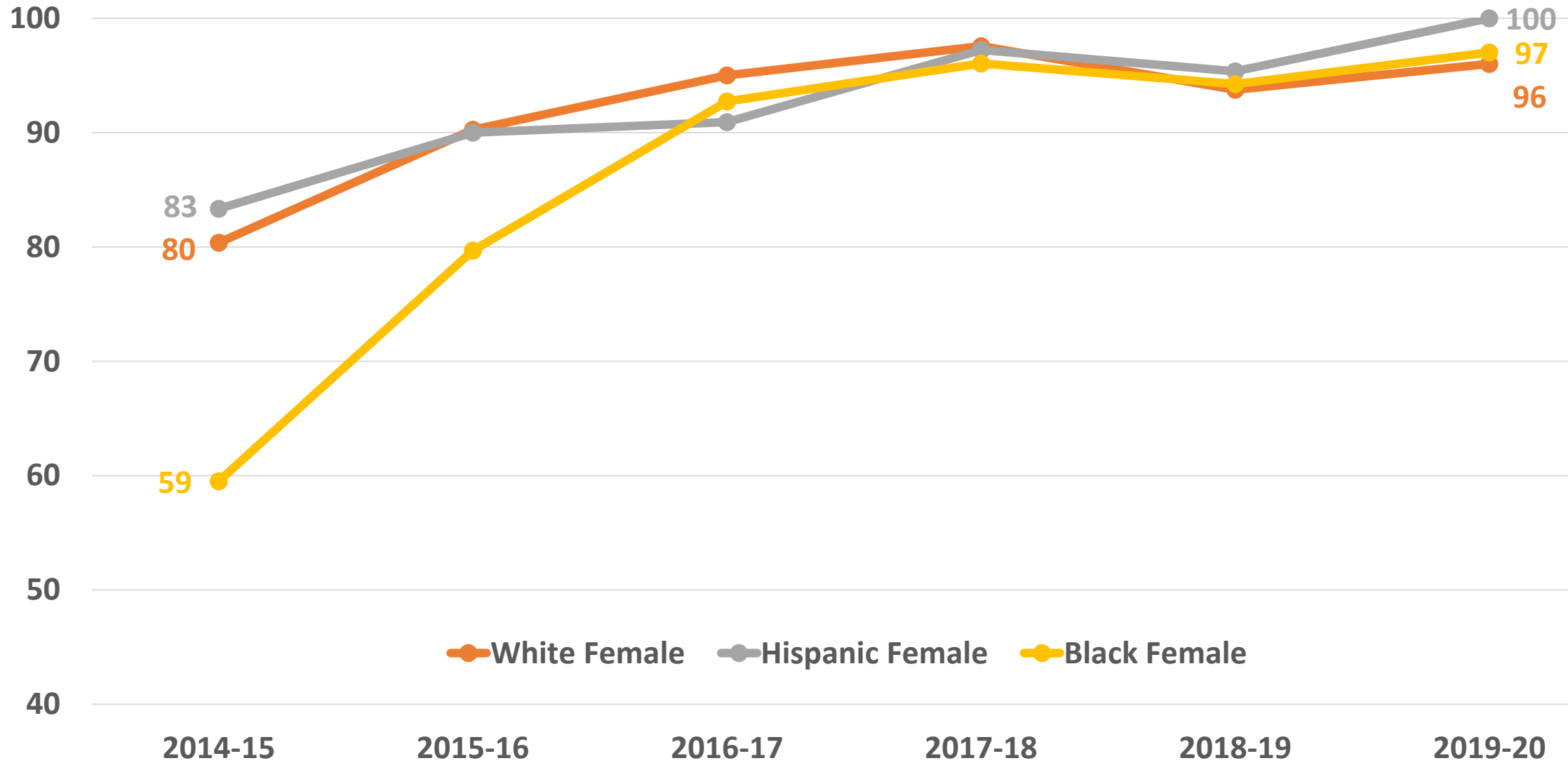

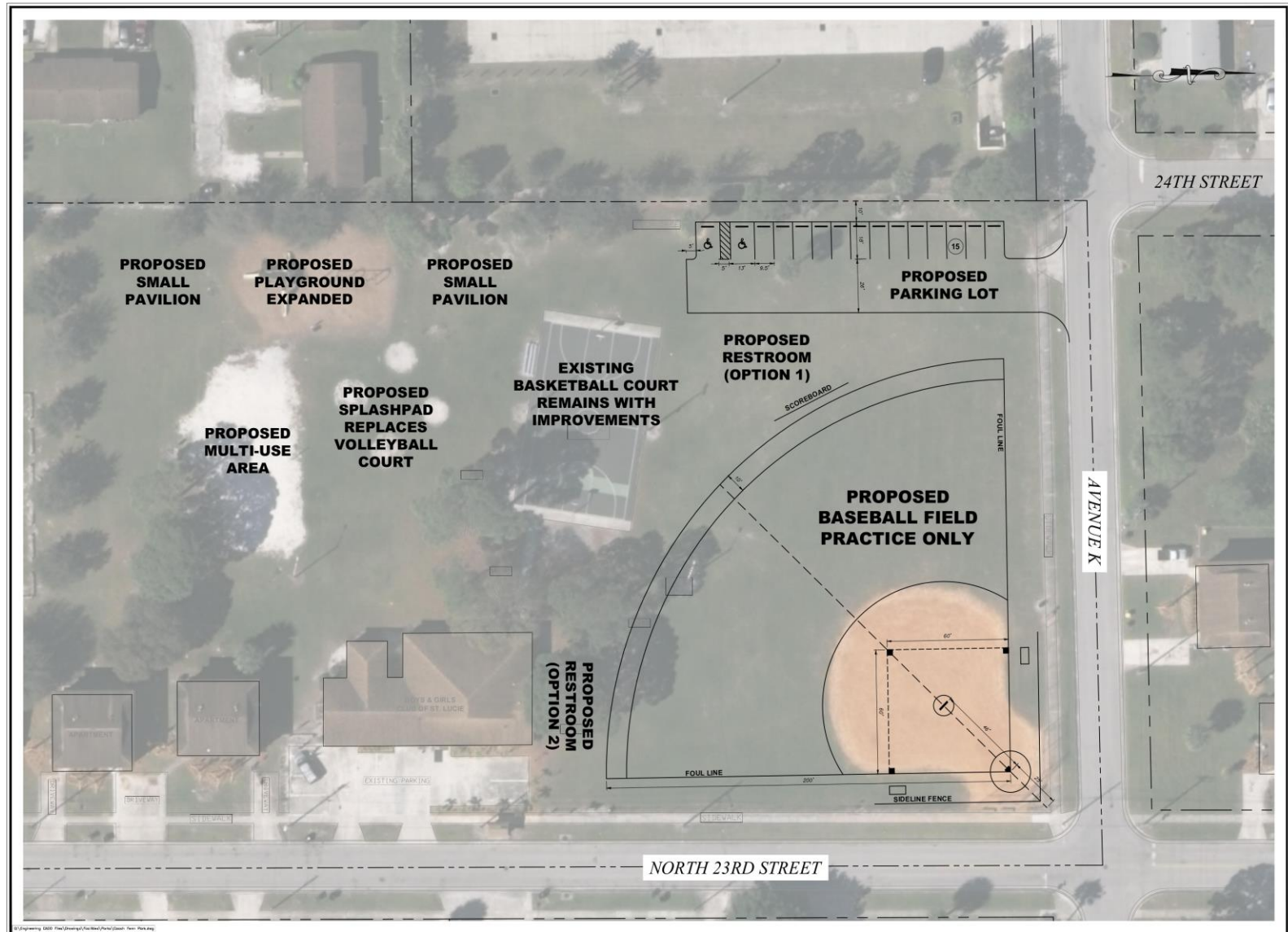
Coach Fenn Park Redesign (23rd & Avenue K)

- **Assigned to the Parks Advisory Committee in December of 2019 and provided two initial draft conceptual site plans and cost opinions created earlier in 2019 based on input from the Youth Council. Our assignment is to provide a conceptual design for this park.**
- **The Committee strongly supports the improvement of this park, which is surrounded by residences with children who can benefit from having more activities here.**
- **We began a list of priorities for park amenities and furthered this list with surveys from several community meetings prior to shutdown.**
- **A special meeting of the Committee was conducted on site 11/5/20 to gather data for a new layout of the park considering preferences stated by citizens. Draft drawings were created.**

Coach Fenn Park Redesign (23rd & Avenue K)

- **Given all this information, we created a prioritized list of amenities that include the following:**
 1. **Basketball Court – resurface and provide new backstops.**
 2. **Practice Baseball Field – add/repair fencing, benches, restore proper clay surfacing or create grass field with cutouts for plates and bases, allowing for other multi-use sports as well.**
 3. **Small pavilions with picnic table close to playground.**
 4. **Playground – replace swings and add more.**
 5. **Splash pad/Interactive water feature – in area of volleyball court, which would be eliminated.**
 6. **Multi-Use area – south end, grass already there.**
- **The following overall improvements are also recommended:**
 - **Parking and restrooms are required by the City. We feel that this is a neighborhood park, not a community park, and, therefore, there is limited need for parking.**
 - **Fencing should be repaired, replaced, and added along the perimeter.**
 - **Paths would be highly desirable.**
- **Funding will drive schedule and priorities. Funding sources identified are Parks Impact Fees, MSVU, Kaboom, FPUA, Boys & Girls Club, other Grants, etc. Some funding is dependent on being a part of the City Capital Improvement Plan.**

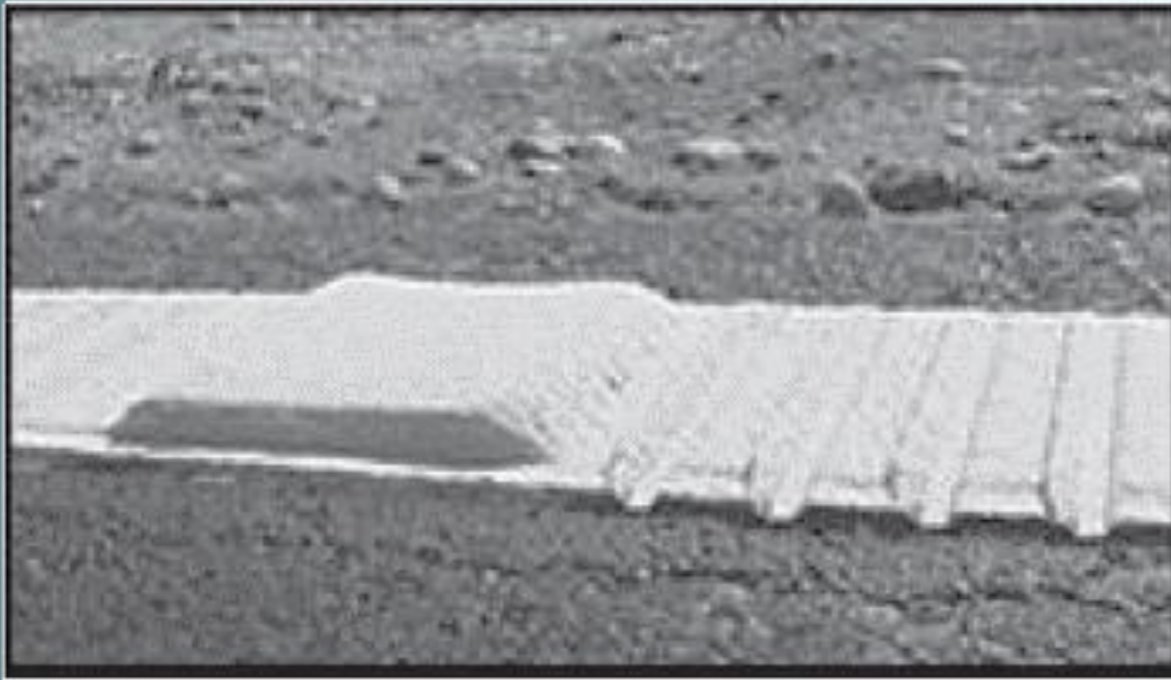


Proposed Traffic Safety Strategies

- The Kimley-Horn Study for Indian River Drive provides recommended strategies that can improve traffic safety along the corridor. The County is proposing to implement the recommended strategies in a phased approach, using the approved funding.
- The Indian River Drive - Phase 1 Project will involve implementing the safety strategies along the corridor between Walton Road Intersection and Midway Road Intersection. This 6.2 mile segment was chosen as Phase 1 because of the field measured speed data in the Kimley-Horn Study.
- The proposed improvements include:
 1. Raised audible pavement markings along the centerline and outside edges of pavement
 2. Radar speed feedback signs
 3. Speed reduction markings at selected locations.
- Currently we have \$250,000 budgeted for the Phase 1 Project. Subsequent phases will involve extending the safety improvements further north along the corridor, up to the Citrus Avenue Bridge in the City of Ft. Pierce. According to the 1982 Interlocal Agreement, the City has responsibility for roadway striping and signage north of Savannah Road.
- The Board authorized additional funding at the February 23, 2021 BOCC meeting in the amount of \$500,000 to help with implementing the subsequent phases. The total project budget is now \$750,000.

Additional Traffic Safety Improvements

- County Staff implemented a pilot project in 2019 to install 3-Way stop signs at the intersection of Walton Road & Indian River Drive. This project has been successful and we have performed traffic field measurements on the remaining 2 major intersections:
- Midway Road & Indian River Drive.
- Savannah Road & Indian River Drive.
- The Savannah Road Intersection falls under the jurisdiction of the City of Ft. Pierce for traffic control, traffic signage and pavement striping, per the 1982 Interlocal Agreement. We have coordinated with the City with the intent to install 3 Way stop signs at the Savannah Road Intersection.
- At the February 23,2021 Board meeting , the BOCC approved 2 Resolutions that provide a basis for installation of the 3 Way stop signs at the 2 intersections. We are currently ordering the materials to install the 3 Way stop signs.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT

County Roads Located within the Municipality of Fort Pierce

WHEREAS, St. Lucie County currently maintains certain roads heretofore designated as State Highways;

WHEREAS, portions of said roads are located within the corporate limits of the municipality located within St. Lucie County;

WHEREAS, certain streets currently maintained by the municipality have been designated by the State to be reclassified as County roads by July 1, 1982, to-wit:

WHEREAS, certain streets previously maintained by the State have already been reclassified by the State as County roads, to-wit:

WHEREAS, it is necessary that a uniform system for the operation and maintenance of all County roads within the municipality be established.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

1. The County will maintain the roadbed, bridges,

curbs, culverts, and storm sewers within the right-of-way. The City will issue permits for driveways in accordance with standard County specifications for width, spacing, etc.

2. The City will maintain and provide necessary operation of traffic signals, street lights, street signs, sidewalks, and pavement markings.

3. Utilities and cablevision will be maintained by the owners, agents, or designated agencies thereof. The City will issue permits but when pavement cuts are required the County shall be notified and the County concurrence shall be required before the permit is issued.

4. This agreement shall be effective from July 1, 1982, and shall continue thereafter from year to year, subject, however, to amendment by mutual consent.

National POW/MIA Flag Act Signed into Law

Warren and Cotton Led Bipartisan Group of Senators to Ensure the POW/MIA Flag is Displayed Alongside the U.S. Flag on Prominent Federal Properties; Representatives Chris Pappas and Jack Bergman Led the Bill in the House

Washington, DC - United States Senators Elizabeth Warren (D-Mass.), Tom Cotton (R-Ark.), John Thune (R-S.D.), Kyrsten Sinema (D-Ariz.), Maggie Hassan (D-N.H.) Pat Toomey (R-Pa.), Marco Rubio (R-Fla.), and Jack Reed (D-R.I.), today applauded the passage and signing into law of the National POW/MIA Flag Act, their bipartisan bill to require the POW/MIA Flag be displayed whenever the American flag is displayed on prominent federal properties to honor the [more than 82,000](#) Americans who are listed as Prisoners of War (POW), Missing in Action (MIA), or otherwise unaccounted for from our nation's past wars and conflicts.

“All three of my veteran brothers came home safe after their service, but many do not,” **said Senator Warren**. “This bipartisan law ensures that the POW/MIA Flag is consistently and prominently displayed and that we never forget those servicemembers who have not returned home.”

“There’s no better time than Veterans Day to honor those who left our shores only to be held captive, and those who have still not returned,” **said Senator Cotton**. “Over 82,000 Americans remain missing from past wars and prominently displaying the POW/MIA flag will help remind all Americans of their service and sacrifice.”

“Today and throughout the history of our country, our men and women in uniform have valiantly chosen to serve in defense of freedom and the security of the United States,” **said Senator Thune**. “I’m glad this legislation is now law. Displaying a POW/MIA flag to honor those who have not returned home is the least we can do to recognize these heroes and the sacrifice of their families.”

“Especially as we approach Veterans Day, I am ever grateful for our service members—and in particular my thoughts are with Prisoners of War or those Missing in Action and their families,” **Senator Hassan said**. “But it is not nearly enough to honor these heroes just on national holidays. I’m very glad to have worked with Members of Congress on both sides of the aisle to ensure that the POW/MIA flag is displayed alongside the American flag, and it is a fitting tribute that President Trump signed our bill into law ahead of this year’s Veterans Day.”

“More than 82,000 American service members have been listed as POW/MIA or unaccounted for as a result of our nation’s wars and conflicts,” **Senator Toomey said**. “Permanently displaying the POW/MIA flag at certain federal landmarks is a small but important way to honor these heroes while serving to remind their families that we, as a nation, will never forget.”

“This is about honoring U.S. service members who were prisoners of war or those missing in action, and ensuring they remain front and center in our collective hearts. We can never repay our profound debt to them, but we should recognize their service each and every day. And we must support their families and uphold the American values they fought so hard to defend,” **said Senator Reed**.

The National POW/MIA Flag Act will ensure that the POW/MIA Flag is displayed whenever the U.S. flag is displayed, effectively ensuring that both flags are displayed concurrently and every day at federal locations already designated under existing law. Those locations include the U.S. Capitol, the White House, the World War II Memorial, the Korean War Veterans Memorial, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, every national cemetery, the buildings containing the official offices of the Secretaries of State, Defense, and Veterans Affairs, the office of the Director of the Selective Service System, each major military installation (as designated by the Secretary of Defense), each Department of Veterans Affairs medical center, and each United States Postal Service post office.

Before the lawmakers' bill became law, the POW/MIA Flag was required to be displayed by the federal government on certain prominent federal properties [only six days per year](#): Armed Forces Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day, Independence Day, National POW/MIA Recognition Day, and Veterans Day.

Representative Chris Pappas (D-NH-01) and Representative and U.S. Marine Corps Lt. Gen. (ret.) Jack Bergman (R-MI-01) sponsored the House version of the bill.

"I am pleased that President Trump has signed the bipartisan National POW/MIA Flag Act into law," **said Congressman Pappas**. "This legislation, which I was proud to introduce and work to pass in the House, honors those service members who were prisoners of war and the over 80,000 individuals who remain unaccounted for. This legislation reaffirms our country's commitment to them and ensures that the words emblazoned on the POW/MIA flag continue to communicate a clear message of our unwavering support and commitment to our nation's heroes and their families. That message is this: you are not forgotten."

"Over 82,000 men and women who've served our nation in uniform are unaccounted for or listed as POW/MIA, including many Michiganders. I'm thankful President Trump signed this significant legislation into law," **said Congressman Bergman**. "Flying the POW/MIA flag at federal properties 365 days a year is just a small way that we can ensure their sacrifice and devotion to our nation is never forgotten."

The legislation had the support of Rolling Thunder, Inc. National; Rolling Thunder Inc. Massachusetts Chapters 1 and 2; the National League of POW/MIA Families; Veterans of Foreign Wars; The American Legion; American Ex-Prisoners of War; and the National Alliance of Families for the Return of America's Missing Servicemen.

"The American Ex-Prisoners of War is grateful for the efforts made in the House of Representatives and by Senator Elizabeth Warren leading in the Senate to pass the National POW/MIA Flag Act," **said Cheryl Cerbone, Chief Executive Officer of American Ex-Prisoners of War**. "The stirring symbol of those who suffered the tortures of imprisonment as well as those still missing and whose family members grieve will now fly with the American Flag every day on prominent Federal properties."

"Rolling Thunder Inc. National appreciates Sen. Elizabeth Warren for her dedication to the POW/MIA issue, and for her effective assistance in helping our organization to introduce legislation in the Senate, and in the House through Rep. Chris Pappas," **said Gus Dante, Rolling Thunder Inc. RESOLUTION NO. 21-RXX

A RESOLUTION BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FORT PIERCE, FLORIDA, **AMENDING MEMBERSHIP REQUIREMENTS OF THE CITY OF FORT PIERCE KEEP FORT PIERCE BEAUTIFUL ADVISORY BOARD**; RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE BOARD, ELECTION OF PRESIDING OFFICER, MEETINGS, AND QUORUM; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, on March 19, 2001, Keep Fort Pierce Beautiful was officially certified as an affiliate of the Keep America Beautiful organization; and

WHEREAS, the City of Fort Pierce recognizes the goal of Keep Fort Pierce Beautiful is community awareness and responsibility for litter prevention, to beautify and improve the community, minimize waste, and to empower individuals to take greater responsibility for enhancing the community environment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Commission of the City of Fort Pierce, Florida as follows:

SECTION 1. The City of Fort Pierce, Florida hereby establishes a Keep Fort Pierce Beautiful Advisory Board as an advisory committee to the Mayor and City Commission.

SECTION 2. Membership and Qualifications: Term of Appointment; Vacancy

A. The Committee shall consist of seven (7) members. All members shall have the following qualifications:

1. Members shall be a resident of the City of Fort Pierce;
2. One member shall be appointed by each member of the City Commission;
3. Two members shall be appointed at large;
4. Members shall not be elected officials or City staff members;

B. The term of each member of the Committee appointed by an individual City Commission member shall coincide with the term of the City Commission member that appointed the member of the Committee. At-large members shall serve a term of four years.

C. All Committee members appointed by an individual City Commission member shall serve at the pleasure of the City Commission member who appointed the Committee member.

- D. At-large Committee members shall serve at the pleasure of the majority of the City Commission. A majority is defined as three (3) members of the City Commission.
- E. Committee members shall be automatically removed for lack of attendance. Lack of attendance means failure to attend three (3) consecutive regularly scheduled meetings or failure to attend at least two-thirds of the regularly scheduled meetings during a calendar year. Participation for less than three-fourths of a meeting shall be the same as a failure to attend a meeting. Absences shall be entered into the minutes of the Committee meeting. Absences may not be excused.
- F. Vacancies occurring for any reason during the term of office by a Committee member shall be filled within ninety (90) days from the date of the vacancy.

SECTION 3. Responsibilities and Duties:

- A. The Committee shall act solely in an advisory capacity to the City Commission on matters relating to keeping Fort Pierce beautiful. The Committee shall have the following responsibilities and duties:
 - 1. Provide input to the City Commission on beautification related activities.
 - 2. Recommend policies related to beautification.
 - 3. Provide research on tasks assigned by the City Commission.
 - 4. Educate the public on Commission directed initiatives.
 - 5. Other duties as assigned by the City Commission.

SECTION 4. The Committee shall elect one of its members as a Chairperson, one as a Vice Chairperson, and one as a Second Vice Chairperson. Elections shall be held at the first regularly scheduled meeting, or as soon thereafter as practical, after appointment of the Parks Advisory Committee. The Chairperson shall preside and conduct meetings of the Keep Fort Pierce Beautiful Advisory Board. The Vice Chairperson shall act in the absence of the Chairperson. In the absence of both the

Chairperson and Vice Chairperson, the Second Vice Chairperson shall act as the Chairperson. The term of the Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, and the Second Vice Chairperson shall be for one year. A vacancy in the office of Chairperson or Vice Chairperson shall be filled at the earliest possible date by the Committee by the election of one of its members to fill the unexpired term.

SECTION 5. The Committee shall meet at least once per month unless there is no business to transact by the day before the regular meeting date. Special meetings may be called by the City Manager or as requested by City Commission.

SECTION 6. All meetings of the Committee shall be open to the public. City staff shall be responsible for recording minutes for all meetings of the Keep Fort Pierce Beautiful Advisory Board. Minutes of the meetings and records shall be filed in the appropriate offices of the City and shall be public records.

SECTION 7. A majority of the Committee membership shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; providing, however, that no official action shall be taken by the Committee without the concurring vote of a majority of all members present at such meeting.

SECTION 8. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.
