1. Describe your organization and list your Mission Statement.

Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. is committed to excellence in athletics while supporting the educational mission of our students. The goal of the Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. is to develop and promote the ideas of responsibility, hard work, sportsmanship, teamwork and fellowship within a safe and positive environment. The individual growth of our community's children is enhanced through the spirit of competition, discipline and fair play. Our goals are accomplished by providing a structured program designed to educate participants in all aspects of the football. Treasure Coast Elite, Inc is committed to providing youth programs that maintain the highest standards. Football may not be the end goal for all participants; however, it is an effective tool to gain trust, attention, and respect of the participants.

Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. is a 7v7 football, and enrichment program which includes mentoring, college camps, and college visitation. The concept for 7v7 football is as an off-season workout program for high school players to promote and improve the quality of quarterbacks, receivers, secondary players and linebackers. The 7v7 format is popular among high school football teams as a method to keep players in shape during the summer months. For Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. football is one area of focus, additionally and more importantly, we provide an opportunity to introduce low income, under served, and under recruited players college exposure. In 2018, Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. began sponsoring the Mega Tour (a college introduction experience). In 7v7 football Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. serves 70 players annually, we want to offer the Mega Tour to all our participants, the support. In 2018, 12 young men were a part of the TC Elite Mega Tour. Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. wants to offer the tour to as many participants as possible. Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. has a goal to sponsor and support up to 35 students on the Mega Tour through incremental growth. For summer 2019, the program grew to 40 participants. During the summer of 2019, Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. visited 12 colleges in 7 days offering participants opportunities to engage first hands with institutions for higher learning. Summer 2021, we decrease to 35 participants due to the pandemic, but we were still able to service kids from our community.

2. Describe your organization's history and prior experience, including a description of programs/projects similar to the one you are applying for in this application.

Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. began in 2009 when Jabari Williams had the epiphany to serve young men in the Fort Pierce community in a greater way. Treasure Coast Elite started as a 7v7 football team in Fort Pierce. The team was eventually expanded to serve the entire Treasure Coast and include a college experience for athletes to learn about the college admission process and showcase their talents to collegiate coaches. Jabari's desire was to offer young men the resources and opportunity to do something positive with their time and talents. "I do not believe that society should expect any more from our children than we are willing to invest into them" – Jabari Williams. As a coach for 20+ years, Jabari has passionately motivated and pushed athletes to be their best and excel not only in athletics but in life as well. This allowed him to celebrate success on the field, but also witness very talented players miss the opportunity to engage in sports on a higher level, based on geographic location, lack of opportunity and lack of exposure. Football is a tool that Jabari utilizes to get the players' attention to coach and instill the ideals of ethics, hard work, and determination both on and off the field. Beyond the expansion of the college experience tour, Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. is working with professional, gainfully employed family men, in the community to become mentors and life coaches for the students. As an organization, we believe it is important to be strategic in the implementation of the mentoring and positive role models. The mentoring program is a safe outlet for our participants to share their challenges, desires for the future and have an objective person to provide guidance that will benefit them. Thus, the program is an impactful experience for both participants. All funds Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. expects to receive from the 2021-2022 Public Service Grant are to support the Mega Tour.

Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. received funding from the city of Fort Pierce in 2020-2021 grant year. Funds were utilized to sponsor 24 players to participate in our 3rd annual Mega Tour. The players visited 11 Colleges/Universities in 7 days.

5. What is your organization's annual budget? Describe how your organization is currently funded.

The annual budget for Treasure Coast Elite, Inc. (TC Elite) is \$29,884.00
The annual budget has expanded with the addition of the Mega Tour. Currently TC Elite receives funding from membership dues, special events, un-restricted cash contributions and grants.

There is no other agency in Fort Pierce providing the same services as TC Elite. TC Elite was designed to afford individuals with the greatest need, with options for advancement. TC Elite provides a platform to not only develop athletic skills, but to assist underserved young men to improve their social skill, be exposed to higher education possibilities, and engage in positive activities. Young men immersed in this program have the opportunity to attend college campus tours, audit college classes, and directly interact with athletic coaches and recruiters.

The persons who will benefit from this program will be underserved, at-risk males from the Fort Pierce area who are considered to be at or below the federal poverty guidelines. According to the 2013-2017 St. Lucie Community Healthcare Report, there is a need to improve academic outcomes and reduce violent crime within in the county, especially the Fort Pierce area. TC Elite's program serves a two-fold purpose. 1) Engaging youth in positive programs such as athletics and mentoring increase discipline and improve academic outcomes (Mentoring.org, 2013); and, 2) Keeping children and youth engaged in afterschool activities to reduce violence and crime. Thus, our program will have a positive impact in the lives of youth who reside within the Fort Pierce community. These youth will be exposed to the college campuses in which they will learn the path to college and career readiness by visiting college campuses and engaging in dialogue with college recruiters, athletic coaches, guidance counselors and be able to compete at a high level via the game of football. This program aims to produce a true student-athlete and a productive citizen of our city and society. The participants of this program are identified through self-referral by the family, outreach in the community via social media and collaboration with faith-based networks. TC Elite will collaborate with local high school coaches and administrators for students who show promise in the game but who seem to lack the social skills and character needed to be college ready. The participants will have the opportunity to learn the vast history of each college, learn about college majors, high needs career paths and receive artifacts from each college to help with school tips such as note taking and time management. The application process will include income verification, so families in the poverty threshold are being served.

11. Describe the existing problems or needs to be addressed by this program/project.

The community in which we reside, has always been a community for those that struggle to get by day to day. Many families are entrenched in widespread poverty, violence, crime and unemployment that sucks the life out of the community. We aim to curb that, due to the fact that more than 65% of the crimes committed in our area, are within the target area of age 12-19 and usually committed by males more than 77% of the time. We want to be able to channel that same energy towards a more positive avenue to create a better outcome. We strive to create a better well-rounded person, that views the community as a loving and caring place that we all can be proud to call home. Treasure Coast Elite College Tour will expose youth to a better opportunity of how to further their education in addition to being engaged activities that will ensure better outcomes for their future. The participants will have a life changing experience and we predict that this tour will motivate them to be more and do more to create a community that we all can call home.

12. Describe your proposed project's activities and how they will address the problems/needs you listed in #11 above.

The objective of the TC Elite Mega (College) Tour is to place higher education and the attainment of a college degree within the reach of participants. The experience will expose youth to the world of college education as well as life as a student-athlete – with the priority of being a student first. The participants will engage in the history of the colleges (12) and will be provided a seminar about the college entrance requirements of incoming freshman and college expectations. The participants will also be allowed to visit campus residence halls, eat at cafeterias, and see college amenities firsthand. The participants will also have a private tour provided by the colleges where they can dialogue with other students and faculty on college life. The participants will also be able to engage in the football aspects of the college tour in which they will be able to visit the athletic facilities and fields as well as engage in the football camps in hopes that they can highlight their talent and earn a football scholarship to those respective schools. All activities will be under the supervision of mentor leaders and other approved adults. The experience has been designed to create a memorable experience and to motivate the participants to course correct any negative behaviors, in an effort to position himself for college readiness. Forbes states, "Individuals with a bachelor's degree earn \$400 more per week than individuals who do not hold a degree." These young men need mentors to become effective husbands, fathers and employees. If we are able to continue to encourage youth to be responsible citizens within our community, then we are changing not only a way of life but a better tomorrow for everyone, mentors make the difference. Two findings from a new national study reveal the power of mentors, particularly those in the teaching profession: For all teen students, having an adult mentor meant a 50 percent greater likelihood of attending college, for disadvantaged students, mentorship by a teacher nearly doubled the odds of attending college.

Each participant will be provided with a diagnostic questionnaire that will ask specific questions about the tour and what the benefit of the tour was to them.

Participants will be provided a Pre/Post Survey to gather their knowledge on the requirements to enter college; maintain during college and a takeaway from the tour.

Volunteers will conduct personal interviews with parents to collect data on college entrance strategies.

TC Elite will serve 35 players, in which 80% will be low to moderate income participants.

18. Describe your contingency plan in the event this grant request is not fully funded, or not funded at all by the City of Fort Pierce:

If this grant is not funded by the City of Fort Pierce, the Mega Tour would continue. TC Elite would limit our impact on the community by serving just those students whose parents could subsidize the tour. Participants, parents and caregivers would have to pay the balance of expenses not covered by grants, and other fundraising activities. Based on summer 2021 costs to potential participants would be \$800.00 to cover the cost of the college tour program. If TC Elite is not able to secure the additional funding, we could not meet our growth plan of 40 participants in 2022. In addition, TC Elite must remove some of the college locations the funds needed to replicate the event would be too great. TC Elite has every intention to continue our solicitation efforts to make this program and experience a success for the college tour participants. The request for \$5,000.00 would support lodging, food and travel expenses for college bound young men from Fort Pierce.

TC Elite will grow the Mega Tour to achieve our goal of serving 35 young men annually, 2018 was the inauguration for this event. In 2022, we continue to grow and have more interests. TC Elite is working with current board members to make a financial commitment to the young men, and to grow the board to increase awareness and giving. TC Elite is moving towards corporate sponsorships in the future for support. TC Elite will move to diversified funding streams to support its growth. TC Elite will incorporate a participation fee for the families on a sliding scale and ask students to participate in fundraising to offset some of the expenses.

The ability to be a part of a college tour program such as this will enhance the participants chance to be able to be exposed to the possibility of college life and promote intrinsic motivation to see education as a way to a path of success.

Promote cultural diversity

The students that will attend this tour, will be from all walks of life including different ethnic groups, schools, and counties and from different socio-economic groups as well. This will teach the participants to learn the cultures and customs of their peers when traveling within a bus from city to city and schools. The students will also have to be able to collaborate in effort in which they will be required to be housed in the same rooms and have motivational conversations to help with the which they will need in school as well as within our community which will over flow into the work place.

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Promote outdoor activities and a healthy lifestyle

The 7v7 format is popular among high school football teams as a method to keep players in shape during the summer months. The game emphasizes passing using a 40-yard field and a one-hand touch for a tackle. All players, except the center, are eligible receivers. The games are 20 to 25 minutes long. Uniforms consist of shorts and T-shirts with no pads. The combination of practices and tournaments participants will spend ample outside engaging in physical fitness and creating a healthy lifestyle.

Further, the Organization shall have all powers conferred by Florida Statutes, including but not limited to the following powers: to provide research for aforementioned purposes; provide service to the underprivileged customers; to provide leadership training; to develop projects, locate grants, and to aid and assist in its expansion; to provide adult literacy education; to provide and assist in the obtaining of suitable housing; to provide funds whenever possible for training; to provide funds whenever possible for training and assisting targeted groups;; to assist social service programs; to participate in, to the fullest extent practical, all governmental programs as passed by the Congress of the United States of America; to acquire funds from any source for all of the foregoing purposes, such as foundations, state and federal agencies, but not limited to, in support of the foregoing purposes, and to expand the same with the full discretion of the Board of Directors as created hereinafter on a non-profit basis; to participate in such charitable and philanthropic projects and activities as shall from time to time be feasible, and to do any and all manner of things as may be necessary to carry out the above activities in the Florida and such other states as the Board of Directors may determine.

SECTION 2

In order to promote the purposes of this Organization, it may acquire property by grant, gift, purchase, devise or bequest, and hold, mortgage and dispose of such property as the Organization shall require for the furtherance of the agency's purposes and not for the benefit of any individual member(s).

ARTICLE III - DUTIES OF THE BOARD

SECTION 1

The affairs of the Organization shall be administered by a Board of Directors elected by the Organization as outlined in these Bylaws. The Board shall have the responsibility of seeing that the purposes outlined in these By Laws are achieved.

The Board is authorized and empowered to delegate and assign the task of administering and implementing its decisions to an Executive Director, whose actions and activities shall be at all times subject to limitation and direction by the Board of Directors.

SECTION 2

The Board shall be responsible for employing an Executive Director who shall manage the daily operations of the agency, subject to the Supervision of the Board, in pursuit of the objectives established by the Board. The board shall be responsible for the supervision of all employees of the Organization, subject to the policies and procedures adopted by the Board of Directors. Additionally, the Executive Director shall be responsible for the day to day operation and administration of the Organization subject to limitations and restrictions imposed by the Board of Directors.

SECTION 3

The Board shall have fiduciary responsibility for all assets of the Organization. Expenditures and disbursements of organization funds may be made upon such terms as established by the Board.

SECTION 4

The Organization shall indemnify the members of the Board for all acts taken in good faith, within the scope of the Board's responsibility, and on behalf of the Organization.

SECTION 5

The Board shall be responsible for ensuring that the activities carried out under its direction are in conformity with the organizations By- Laws and Articles of Incorporation and that its tax exempt, nonprofit status is maintained.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

SECTION 1

The officers of the Board of Directors shall be elected from the membership of the Board and shall be Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Secretary and Treasurer, and such other officers as the Board of Directors may by resolution create.

SECTION 2

The election of officers shall take place following the annual meeting in January, or as soon thereafter as reasonably possible.

SECTION 3

All officers of the Board of Directors shall be nominated and elected by a majority vote of the Board of Directors present at the meeting where the election is held. The officers and members of the Executive Committee can succeed themselves once elected by the organization. The term shall be held unless he/she resigns, is removed or is otherwise disqualified to serve. All officers elected shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified.

SECTION 4

Any officer may be removed, for cause, by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Directors at any regular meeting thereof, provided that written charges against her/him shall first be presented to the Board of Directors, and the officer informed of such charges and be given an opportunity to answer and rebut such charges. Once removed, a member will not be able to again be seated on the Board of Directors without a review from the Board. Any officer may resign, by giving written notice to the Board of Directors, the Chairperson or the Secretary. Such resignation shall take effect on the date specified in the notice provided the board approves it.

A vacancy in any office shall be filled by election of a majority vote of the Board of Directors present at a meeting except that in an event of a vacancy in the office of Chairperson, the Vice-Chairperson shall automatically become Chairperson until next election is held. The elected officer shall serve for the remainder of the term of the officer she/he replaces.

SECTION 6

The duties of the officers are as follows:

- a. **Chairperson** - The chairperson shall preside at all meetings of the Board and shall see that orders and resolutions of the Board are carried out. The Chairperson is authorized to co-sign checks along with either or the Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer or Executive Director.
- b. **Vice-Chairperson** - The Vice Chairperson shall act in the absence of the Chairperson and shall exercise and discharge such other duties as may be required of her/him by the Board. The Vice-Chairperson is authorized to co-sign checks along with the Chairperson, and or Secretary, Treasurer or Executive Director.
- c. **Secretary** - The Secretary shall be responsible for seeing that the minutes of all meetings and proceedings of the Board are kept; shall have the authority to co-sign with the Chairperson, Treasurer or Executive Director on all checks of the Board; and shall perform such other duties as required by the Board.
- d. **Treasurer** - The Treasurer shall have the authority to co-sign with the Chairperson, Secretary or Executive Director all checks of the agency. The Treasurer may be bonded; ensure an annual audit is made by a certified public accountant (if possible) at the completion of each fiscal year and at such other times as requested; and shall assist in an annual budget and a statement of income and expenditures to be presented to those in attendance at each board meeting including the annual meeting.

Conflict of Interest

SECTION 7

Each Board Member shall sign a copy of the "Conflict of Interest Disclaimer" promulgated by the Board prior to being seated to the Board of Directors. In order to ensure fair and unbiased business transactions, all Board members shall comply with the "Conflict of Interest" provisions Promulgated by the Board, prior to being seated to the Board of Directors. Conflict of interest policy reads: No director shall serve on the board in which he/ she has a member of their immediate family and or each board member must disclose any potential conflicts of interest in any venture, property or any other transactions associated with in which the board of directors shall vote on act upon. If there is a potential conflict of interest said member of the board must disclose it to the full board and recuse themselves from voting on the matter. Once disclosed the board shall determine the actions that must be taken to keep the conflict of interest out of the business of the organization by whatever means necessary to correctly dispose of the conflict.

ARTICLE V - MEMBERSHIP, TERMS OF OFFICE, ELECTION

SECTION 1

The membership of the Board of Directors shall be not less than three (3) nor more than seven (7) unless changed by resolution adopted by the Board of Directors. In no event shall the Board consist of less than (3) nor more than seven (7) voting members.

SECTION 2

All Board members will be those persons who subscribed to the purposes of this Organization and who shall have been elected or appointed to membership in accordance with these Bylaws.

SECTION 3

No two family members' shall serve on the board simultaneously. Immediate family is defined as follows: Husband, Wife, Mother, Father, Step Mother, Step Father, Daughter, Son, Mother-in-Law, Father-in-Law, Sister, Brother, Grandmother, Grandfather, Grand Daughter, and Grand Son.

SECTION 4

No employee of the agency may serve on the Board of Directors. Former employees of the organization shall not be eligible to serve on the Board of Directors for three (3) years after the last date of their employment by the organization. Former board members must be out of service for at least three (3) years before becoming eligible for employment with the organization.

SECTION 5

Each Board member elected or appointed shall serve a Five (5) year term on the Organization's Board of Directors and is eligible for re-election or re-appointment for a single successive Five (5) year term. After three (3) successive Five (5) year terms, each such member may not be re-elected or re-appointed to the Board of Directors for a period of One (1) year from the date of his/her last service on the board. Notwithstanding the foregoing,

SECTION 6

The Board of Directors shall have the authority to appoint all members, Elections shall be held, in accordance with state regulations, to fill vacancies as needed.

SECTION 7

The Board may, at its discretion, declare the office of a member of the Board vacant in the event such member shall be absent from three (3) consecutive regular board meetings. An excused absence is obtained when such board member provides written notification to the Chairperson or Secretary of the Board, within 72 hours prior to the meeting. The Secretary will notify the Board Member by letter of this impending action after the first unexcused absence.

SECTION 8

In the event of death, resignation or removal of any Board member, her/his successor shall be replaced in accordance with these By-Laws and said new member shall then serve for the unexpired term of her/his predecessor.

SECTION 9

Committee Chairpersons shall be a Board Member and shall be appointed by the Chairperson of the Board. Each committee shall have no less than three (3) members including its Chairperson.

SECTION 10

Allowances and Reimbursements

No Board Member shall receive any compensation, for any service, that she/he may render as a Board Member. Members shall, upon request, be reimbursed for her/his actual expenses, including mileage, travel, etc., incurred in the performance of her/his duties at the option of the Board.

ARTICLE VI - EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1

The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer.

SECTION 2

The Executive Committee will be responsible for conducting the business of the Board when the Board is not in session and all actions taken must be ratified by the full Board of Directors.

SECTION 3

The Executive Committee shall not have the non-emergency authority to:

- a. remove an officer or member of Board of Directors;
- b. dispose of tee assets valued in excess of \$500;
- c. approve the agency's annual budget; or

- d. remove, hire or discipline the Executive Director;
- e. Elect officers of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VII - MEETINGS

SECTION 1

The Board of Directors shall hold public meetings not less than four times a year or quarterly, inclusive of the annual meeting, at such place, date and hours as may be fixed by the Board. Notice of all meetings shall be provided not less than three (3) days prior to such meeting.

SECTION 2

Special or emergency meetings of the Board shall be held when called by the Chairperson of the Board, or by any three (3) Board Members. Notice of all such meetings shall be provided in accordance with Article VIII, Section 1 of these Bylaws except that said notice will be provided not less than twenty-four (24) hours prior to such meeting.

SECTION 3

A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of at least one-half plus one of the then seated membership. The vote, of a majority of the votes, entitled to be cast by the members present at a meeting, at which a quorum is present, is necessary for the adoption of any matter voted on by the members, unless a greater proportion is a requirement by law, the Articles of Incorporation or any provision of these By - Laws.

SECTION 4

The Board may, from time to time, create Committees which may be standing or ad hoc. The Chairperson of a Committee shall be appointed by the Board Chairperson, with the consent of the Board of Directors. Non-Board members may be selected to serve on Board Committees, but may not serve as chairpersons. No Board member may assign her/his voting responsibilities. Proxy votes of Board members shall not be allowed.

SECTION 5

All minutes of Board meetings will be transcribed and provided to the Board of Directors prior to any subsequent Board meeting. Upon reasonable request, the minutes shall be made available to the public.

SECTION 6

All meetings shall be conducted in accordance with the most recent edition of "Roberts' Rules of Order."

ARTICLE VIII - COMMITTEES

SECTION 1

All standing or ad hoc committees may be deemed necessary to carry out the business of the Organization thus may be created from time to time. The Chairperson of a committee shall be appointed by the Board Chairperson.

SECTION 2

The Standing Committee of the Board of Directors shall be as follows:

- a. Executive Committee
- b. Finance Committee

The members of the Finance Committee shall review all fiscal programs and activities of the agency and make recommendations to the board based on their findings. The committee will consist of three (3) members.

ARTICLE IX - AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1

These By-Laws may be amended by a two-third (2/3) vote of the Board of Directors at any regular meeting of the organization, 14 days written notice of the proposed changes to the Board of Directors must be given.

SECTION 2

Nothing contained in these Bylaws shall be in conflict with the Articles of Incorporation.

ARTICLE X - DISSOLUTION OF CORPORATION

SECTION 1

Upon the liquidation, dissolution, or winding up of the organization, whether voluntarily or involuntarily, the assets of the Organization purchased with State or Federal funds will be disposed of in accordance with regulations set out by the funding source of the program(s) administered by TCEI, the Articles of Incorporation and the laws and regulations governing the organizations tax exempt status.

ARTICLE XI - TCEI INFORMATION

The Articles of Incorporation, By- Laws of the Board, books, records, and papers of the Board, shall at all times, upon reasonable request, during working hours, be subject to inspection by any member of the Organization, the public, or any other organization or governmental entity; whereas a reasonable fee may be charged.

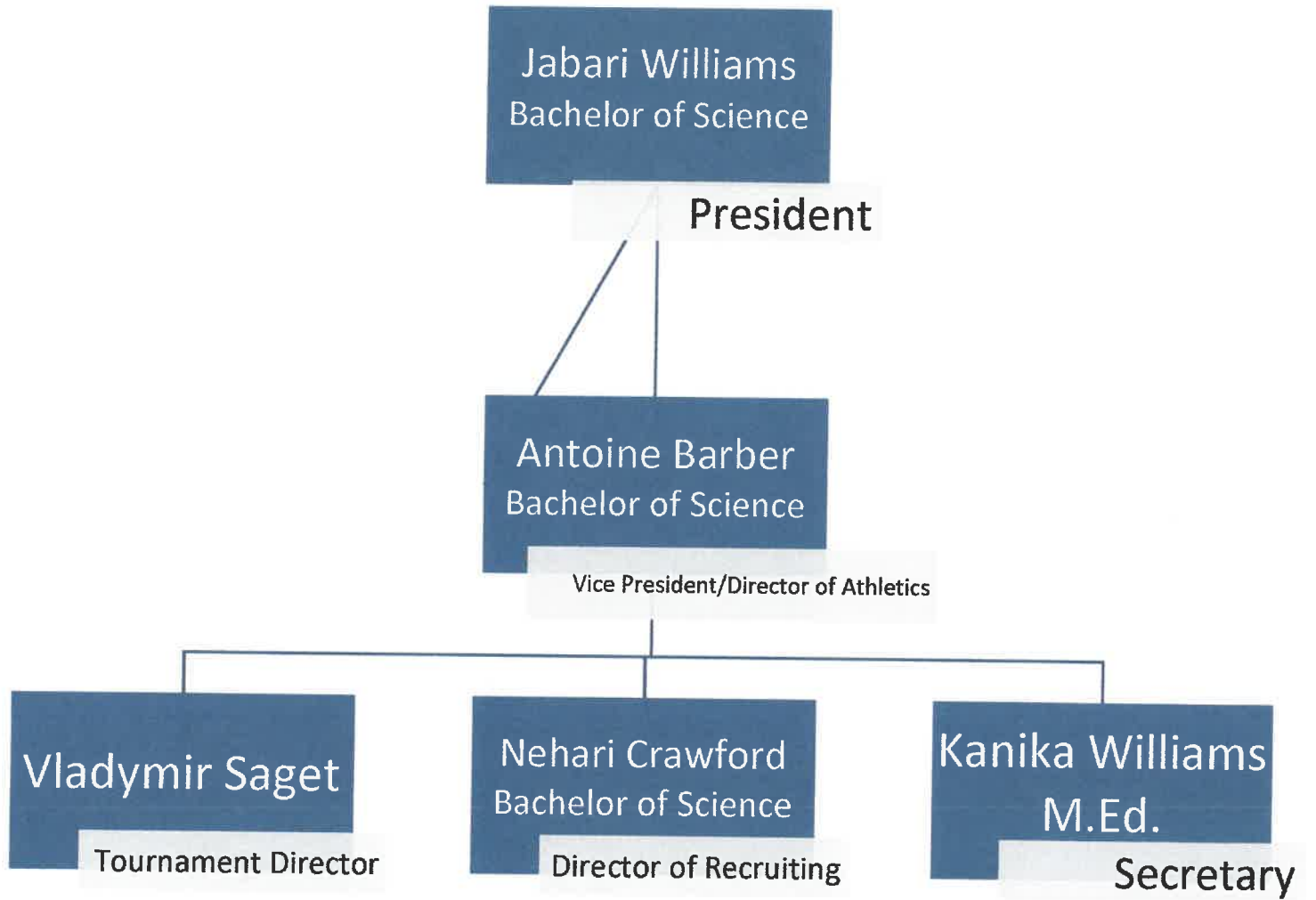



Forty Treasure Coast college football players hitting the road to visit colleges this week

St. Lucie West Centennial defensive end/outside linebacker Jamari Stewart is hoping to get some clarity on his college future this week.

The rising senior, ranked No. 3 on the TCPalm Super 11, is one of 40 area high school football players going on the Treasure Coast Elite Bus Tour, which will visit 12 college campuses and participate in four camps.

"I'm ready," Stewart said. "Most of the schools we're going to see, I've got offers from. It's a good way to see what they have to offer.

"That's the most important part. You can't just commit if you've never been on campus. Even if it's just a short amount of time, I feel like it's going to help my decision at the end."

The bus leaves the Treasure Coast on Monday and is set to return Sunday. Treasure Coast Elite coach Jabari Williams has scheduled several college stops, including Florida, Auburn, Georgia Tech, North Carolina and South Carolina.

It's the second year Williams has scheduled the bus tour, which stopped at 10 colleges in 2018.

"The reason we do it is to get our kids as much exposure as possible and get them in front of as many coaches as possible," Williams said. "You want the kids to see their environment — that can enhance their recruitment. You want them to see the culture and they might not see that campus unless they are on an official visit or just going with their parents or a family member.

"The kids last year, they loved it. They loved the experience and getting to meet all the college coaches that they worked out in front of. They were ecstatic about that."

Several area players picked up college offers on last year's tour; Williams is expecting similar results this year.

The players are attending camps at Mercer, LaGrange College, North Carolina A&T and North Carolina.

Going to camps on campus allows players the opportunity to be seen by more coaches, as opposed to spring football practices when a college might send a position coach to see what a high school has to offer.

"It's pretty awesome being able to have an opportunity like this and to be able to experience some of these schools and get exposure and have coaches willing to help us like that," Jensen Beach rising senior safety Liam Zaccheo said. "It's pretty awesome and I'm excited.

"It is kind of like an audition. For me, I just want to continue to play football. That's the biggest thing."

Williams gave TCPalm his thoughts on the tour, the colleges that made the best impressions and which players made a statement during workouts.

Q: Overall, how did it go?

A: I think the tour went great. The reason being, my goal was to get at least 15 kids to get an offer. You know not everyone is going to get an offer, but we networked with a lot of coaches and I think by the end of their senior year that goal will be accomplished.

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You have to move around at these camps and network for these kids. If you're not standing out and standing next to those coaches saying, 'Hey coach, this is my kid,' you're missing out. It was a lot of that. That's the main thing is networking with the coaches and get those kids looked at. I think it was very successful.

Q: You visited several Power 5 programs, which one made the best impression?

A: The kids, as far as touring the schools, the kids really liked Georgia Tech and they were in awe with South Carolina on Sunday. GT was the No. 1 school. When we got off the bus, the whole entire staff was there waiting for us. They were in a line and they were shaking our hands. Everyone on staff was there.

The energy that they had in the meeting room was amazing. You may have seen the tweet of us dancing there. That's how they start their meetings every day – music, kids dancing, coaches dancing. It was by the best with the energy.

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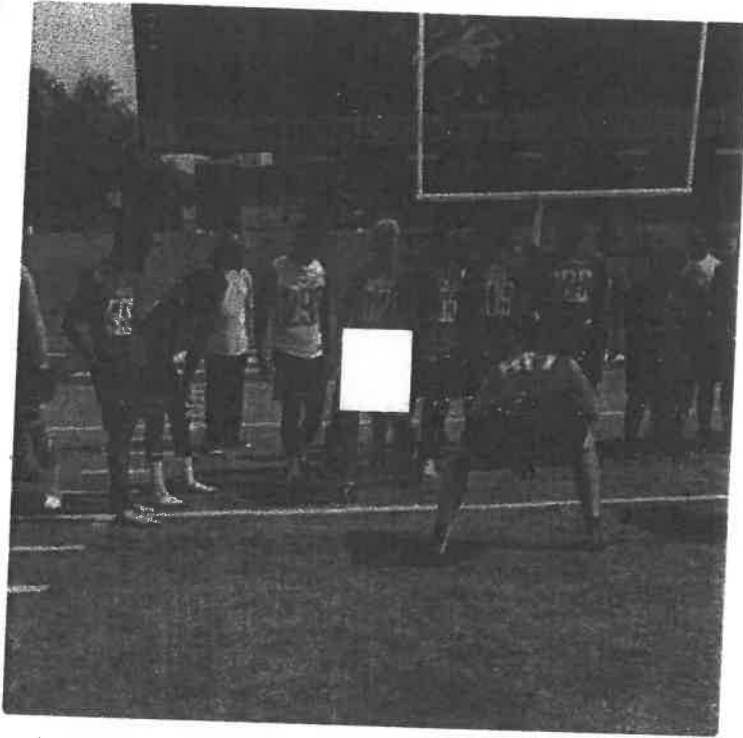

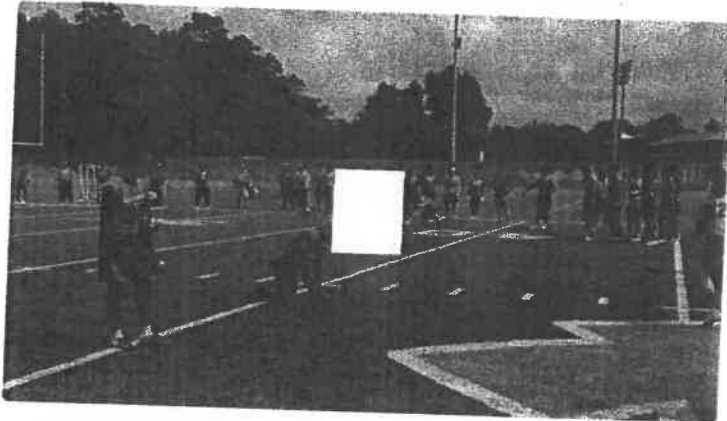
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Q: Vero Beach defensive end Keanu Koht and Kamari Wilson both picked up SEC offers, but was there another underclassman that did well for himself?
