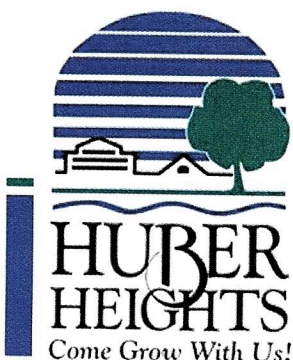

1. **Call Meeting To Order/Roll Call**

Mayor Jeff Gore convened the Council Work Session at 6:01 P.M.

Anthony Rodgers took Roll Call.

2. **Approval of Minutes**

The following minutes were approved unanimously at the beginning of this meeting:

- March 8, 2022

There were no changes or corrections to these minutes as submitted. This Council Work Session was recorded by the City and the recording of this meeting will be posted to the City's website and will also be maintained by the City consistent with the City's records retention schedule.

3. **Work Session Topics Of Discussion**

City Manager Report/Water Infrastructure Update

Bryan Chodkowski said City Staff will have an internal kickoff meeting for the 2022 Comprehensive Development Plan next week. He said Hampton at The Heights, the proposed development at the former Lehman Farm, has been going through the Planning Commission process and the proposed development will come before City Council for review in April, 2022. He said the developer has garnered some interest in the commercial out lots for the development. He said City Staff have been working to identify site locations for a new Public Works Division facility and City Staff will bring this item for discussion at a Council

Work Session in the near future. Bryan Chodkowski said the work on the pump track at Monita Field Park will begin after Easter and will take approximately five to six weeks for completion. He said Water Distribution System Integrity Study is underway and the next check-in meeting with the consultant and City Staff will take place on June 7, 2022. He said the wellfield expansion is underway in preparation for drilling a new well. He said the East Water Main Extension Project is 90% designed. He said the design work for the East Sanitary Sewer Extension Project is in progress as well. He said City Staff are working with the contractor to repair the water line on Chippingdon Drive. He said the repair work involves the installation of a temporary water line, but he said the work will be completed as soon as possible.

DOJ Bulletproof Vest Grant Application – Police Division

Bryan Chodkowski distributed information and proposed legislation to authorize the application and acceptance of grant funds from the Bureau of Justice Assistance Bulletproof Vest Partnership to purchase replacement protective body armor for the Police Division (see attached). He said the City supports the need for additional police related equipment, specifically bulletproof vests for replacement upon expiration and the purchase of new vests for new hires. He said the U.S Bureau of Justice Assistance provides the allocation of funding in the form of the Bulletproof Vest Partnership program for purchasing new or additional replacements. He said the Huber Heights Police Division has been a past recipient of Bulletproof Vest Partnership funds which provide for a 50% reimbursement to the City for the purchase of bulletproof vests.

After discussion, the City Council agreed to recommend approval of the proposed legislation to authorize the application and acceptance of grant funds from the Bureau of Justice Assistance Bulletproof Vest Partnership to purchase replacement protective body armor for the Police Division and requested that the proposed legislation be placed on the agenda at the March 28, 2022 City Council Meeting for a first reading as non-emergency legislation and adoption of the legislation at the March 28, 2022 City Council Meeting.

Increase Not To Exceed Amount – Landscape Structures/Penchura – Parks and Recreation

Bryan Chodkowski distributed information and proposed legislation to authorize an increase in the 2022 not to exceed amount for Landscape Structures/Penchura for the purchase and installation of playground equipment (see attached). He said this legislation would increase the not to exceed amount to \$100,000 for 2022 for Landscape Structures/Penchura for playground structures and equipment for the Parks and Recreation Department.

After discussion, the City Council agreed to recommend approval of the proposed legislation to authorize an increase in the 2022 not to exceed amount for Landscape Structures/Penchura for the purchase and installation of playground equipment and requested that the proposed legislation be placed on the agenda at the March 28, 2022 City Council Meeting for a first reading as non-emergency legislation and adoption of the legislation at the March 28, 2022 City Council Meeting.

2022 Street Program – Award Contract

Russ Bergman distributed information and proposed legislation to award contracts for the 2022 Street Program (see attached). He said this legislation authorizes the award of contracts for the 2022 Street Program. He reviewed the bids and the contract awards for the 2022 Street Program. He said the Street Improvement Fund and the Gas Tax Fund will be utilized for the construction of the different sections of this program.

Mark Campbell requested that Russ Bergman provide information on the amount of street paving completed by the City for the last five years.

After discussion, the City Council agreed to recommend approval of the proposed legislation to award contracts for the 2022 Street Program and requested that the proposed legislation be placed on the agenda at the March 28, 2022 City Council Meeting for a first reading as non-emergency legislation and adoption of the legislation at the March 28, 2022 City Council Meeting.

Brandt Pike Revitalization Project

Bryan Chodkowski distributed information regarding the Brandt Pike Revitalization Project (see attached). He said the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission (MVRPC) put together a conceptual improvement project for the area based on the original 2017 Brandt Pike Revitalization Study and had requested more detailed plans from the City for possible funding and grants. He said City Staff are working to provide this information to the MVRPC. He said the City closed on the sale of one acre of land to Dogtown at the former Marian Meadows shopping center and that transaction is complete. He said City Staff are planning to bring the proposals for the façade/construction improvements from LWC Incorporated for the former CR Dayton property before the City Council in May, 2022.

Comprehensive Development Plan Steering Committee

Anthony Rodgers distributed information regarding the 2022 Comprehensive Development Plan Steering Committee (see attached). He described the makeup of the 2022 Comprehensive Development Plan Steering Committee. He said he had only received three applications from citizen volunteers for the seven openings on the 2022 Comprehensive Development Plan Steering Committee from Matt Shomper, Herman Karhoff, and Steve Zbinden. He said it would be necessary to complete background checks on all of the applicants through Human Resources prior to appointment.

There was a discussion about extending the posting deadline for citizens or residents to apply for the remaining openings on the 2022 Comprehensive Development Plan Steering Committee.

Don Webb suggested maybe some of the residents that are currently serving on City boards and commissions might be also interested in serving on the 2022 Comprehensive Development Plan Steering Committee.

Anthony Rodgers said there was also a need for the City Council to appoint Mayor Jeff Gore and two City Councilmembers to the 2022 Comprehensive Development Plan Steering Committee.

Mayor Jeff Gore asked the City Council if any Councilmembers were interested in being appointed to the 2022 Comprehensive Development Plan Steering Committee.

Don Webb, Anita Kitchen, and Nancy Byrge expressed interest in being appointed to the 2022 Comprehensive Development Plan Steering Committee.

Mayor Jeff Gore said that a motion to appoint two City Councilmembers to the 2022 Comprehensive Development Plan Steering Committee would be on the agenda at the March 28, 2022 City Council Meeting.

After discussion, the City Council agreed to recommend approval of a motion to appoint Matt Shomper, Herman Karhoff, and Steve Zbinden pending the completion of background checks to the 2022 Comprehensive Development Plan Steering Committee and a motion to appoint Mayor Jeff Gore and two City Councilmembers to the 2022 Comprehensive Development Plan Steering Committee and requested that the necessary motions be prepared and placed on the agenda at the March 28, 2022 City Council Meeting with adoption of the motions at the March 28, 2022 City Council Meeting.

Board and Commission Appointments

Anthony Rodgers distributed information regarding an appointment to the Culture and Diversity Citizen Action Commission (see attached). He said it was the recommendation of the City's interview panel to appoint Carla Staigl to the Culture and Diversity Citizen Action Commission for a term ending on December 31, 2024. He said a background check on Ms. Staigl was completed by Human Resources.

After discussion, the City Council agreed to recommend approval of the appointment of Carla Staigl to the Culture and Diversity Citizen Action Commission for a term ending on December 31, 2024 and requested that the necessary motion be prepared and placed on the agenda for approval at the March 28, 2021 City Council Meeting.

Nancy Byrge seconded the motion. On a call of the vote, Ms. Baker, Mr. Campbell, Mrs. Byrge, Mr. Otto, Mr. Lyons, Mrs. Kitchen, Mr. Webb, and Mr. Shaw voted yea; none voted nay. The motion passed 8-0. The Council Work Session went into Executive Session at 6:24 P.M.

AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO APPLY FOR AND ACCEPT GRANT FUNDS FROM THE BUREAU OF JUSTICE ASSISTANCE BULLETPROOF VEST PARTNERSHIP FOR THE PURPOSE OF PURCHASING REPLACEMENT PROTECTIVE BODY ARMOR.

WHEREAS, the City of Huber Heights supports the need for additional police related equipment, specifically bulletproof vests; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Bureau of Justice Assistance provides the allocation of funding in the form of the Bulletproof Vest Partnership program for purchasing new or additional bulletproof vests; and

WHEREAS, the Bureau of Justice Assistance Bulletproof Vest Partnership Act of 2000 requires that funding priority be given to jurisdictions with populations under 100,000; and

WHEREAS, the Huber Heights Police Division has been a past recipient of Bulletproof Vest Partnership funds which provide for a 50 percent reimbursement to the City for the purchase of bulletproof vests.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of Huber Heights, Ohio that:

Section 1. The City of Huber Heights hereby endorses and supports the submission of an application for the Bulletproof Vest Partnership program and authorizes the necessary actions to implement said grant, if approved by the U.S. Bureau of Justice Assistance.

Section 2. The City Manager is hereby authorized to apply for and, if awarded, enter into an agreement with the U.S. Bureau of Justice Assistance to administer the grant to implement the Bulletproof Vest Partnership program.

Section 3. Reimbursement made to the Police Division under this grant will be re-appropriated to the Police Fund.

Section 4. It is hereby found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this Resolution were adopted in an open meeting of this Council and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its Committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public and in compliance with all legal requirements including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

WHEREAS, the playground equipment at Community Park was vandalized and needs replacement and playground equipment is also needed at the Eichelberger Amphitheater in the City of Huber Heights; and

WHEREAS, the City Charter requires that City Council approve all work performed by a single vendor in excess of \$25,000.00 in any given year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of Huber Heights, Ohio that:

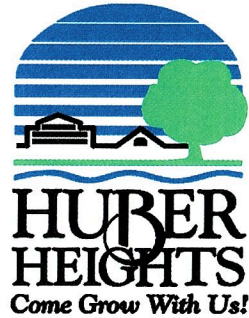

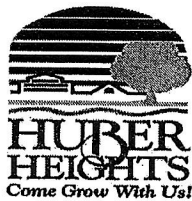
