## F. PUBLIC HEARINGS

1. Public hearing regarding a request for a Specific Use Permit for an Impound Vehicle Storage Facility use at 1921 Crockett Road. Susan Davis, Planning Technician

Staff received a request for a specific use permit to operate a towing and vehicle impound facility at 1921 Crockett Road, which is zoned for Retail Commercial use.

Mayor Jordan opened the public hearing at 5:42 p.m. and invited anyone who wished to speak for or against the request. Kayla Doolittle spoke in favor, and no one spoke in opposition. Mayor Jordan closed the hearing at 5:44 p.m.

2. Public hearing regarding an ordinance providing for a change in zoning classification to Urban Residential for a recently annexed tract described as an approximately 18.63-acre tract of land out of the Joseph Jordan Survey, A-33, Block 1226, Tract 17, 17A, 17B, and 17C; amending the Official Zoning Map of the City of Palestine, Texas; and providing for an amendment to the Comprehensive Plan. Susan Davis, Planning Technician

Planning Technician Susan Davis informed Council that any land not designated within a district on the Zoning Map is automatically classified as part of the Residential Estate zoning district until a different classification is approved by City Council. The newly annexed property is adjacent to areas zoned as urban residential, which is the classification recommended by City staff.

Forty-five notices were sent to property owners regarding the zoning change. Of those, one was in favor of the zoning change, while eight were opposed. In response to concerns raised by neighbors of the newly annexed property during the Planning and Zoning Commission meeting on February 6, 2025, City staff held an additional meeting with these individuals on February 20, 2025. During this meeting, staff explained the zoning process and addressed concerns.

Mayor Jordan opened the public hearing at 5:47 p.m. and invited anyone who wished to speak for or against the request to do so. Diane Davis and Cynthia Castleberry spoke in favor of it, and no one opposed. Mayor Jordan then closed the public hearing at 5:55 p.m.

3. Public hearing regarding a Final Plat for the Hidden Hills Addition, Unit 1. Susan Davis, Planning Technician

Ms. Davis reported that City Council approved the preliminary plat on December 9, 2024. She mentioned that the first unit will consist of eighteen lots and is currently undergoing civil plan review. Additionally, the Planning and Zoning Commission approved the final plat on February 6, 2025.

### SUMMARY:

On January 31, 2025, Governor Abbott issued a proclamation adding two new applications, Lemon8 and RedNote, to the list of apps banned on all government-owned or leased devices. This action is part of the state's ongoing efforts to enhance cybersecurity and protect sensitive information. It follows the enactment of Senate Bill 1893, which prohibits the use of TikTok on government devices due to concerns about data privacy and security risks associated with foreign-owned applications.

The Prohibited Technologies Policy (Document No. 3.16) in the City of Palestine Employee Handbook has been revised to comply with the proclamation issued by Governor Abbott.

- WHEREAS, the Employee Handbook outlines procedures and guidelines for employees; and
- WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Palestine desires to amend the City of Palestine Employee Handbook by amending Document No. 3.16 Prohibited Technologies Policy; and
- **WHEREAS**, the City Council of the City of Palestine, Texas, finds that it is in the public interest to make these amendments to the City's Employee Handbook.

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PALESTINE, TEXAS, THAT:

- **SECTION 1.** The foregoing recitals are incorporated into this Resolution by reference as findings of fact as if expressly set forth herein.
- SECTION 2. 3.16 Prohibited Technologies Policy of the City of Palestine Employee Handbook is hereby amended to read in accordance with *Attachment "A,"* which is attached hereto and incorporated into this Resolution for all intents and purposes.
- SECTION 3. Should any of the clauses, sentences, paragraphs, sections, or parts of this Resolution be deemed invalid, unconstitutional, or unenforceable by a court of law or administrative agency with jurisdiction over the matter, such action shall not be construed to affect any other valid portion of this Resolution.
- All resolutions, or parts thereof, that are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Resolution are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Resolution shall be and remain controlling as to the matters regulated, herein.
- **SECTION 5.** This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage and publication.
- SECTION 6 It is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this Resolution was passed was open to the public and that the public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meetings Act, Texas Government Code, and Chapter 551. Notice was

also provided as required by Chapter 52 of the Texas Local Government Code.

#### **ATTACHMENT A**

#### Document No. 3.16 – Prohibited Technologies Policy

#### **Purpose and Scope**

This implements the City's Prohibited Technologies Policy in compliance with Chapter 620 of the Government Code, added by Senate Bill 1893 of the 88th Texas Legislature. In addition to the State-directed prohibited technologies, the City of Palestine may add other software and hardware products with security concerns to this policy. Throughout this Policy, "Prohibited Technologies" shall refer to the list under Addendum A.

This policy applies to all City of Palestine full and part-time employees including, paid or unpaid interns, and/or any user of the city's network. All City of Palestine employees are responsible for complying with the terms and conditions of this policy. This policy shall be incorporated into the Employee Handbook.

#### **Policy**

#### A. City-owned Devices

The download and/or use of prohibited technologies is prohibited on all city-owned devices, including cell phones, tablets, desktop and laptop computers, and other internet-capable devices.

The City of Palestine shall identify, track, and control city-owned devices to prohibit the installation of or access to all prohibited technologies.

The City of Palestine shall restrict access to "app stores" or non-authorized software repositories to prevent the install of unauthorized applications and shall deploy secure baseline configurations, for mobile devices, as determined by City Manager.

The Finance Director shall inventory City devices to identify prohibited hardware/equipment manufacturers are in use by the City and report to City Manager with options to transition from these devices.

#### B. Network Restrictions

The City of Palestine shall configure all firewalls to block access to prohibited technologies, including local networks (LAN), internet access (WAN), virtual private networks (VPN) and on public Wi-Fi operated by the City. This block of network traffic applies to City- owned devices, personal devices of employees and personal devices of the public who use city public Wi-Fi.

#### **Compliance**

- A. All employees shall acknowledge and confirm their understanding of this policy as a part of the City's Employee Handbook review.
- B. Compliance with this policy will be verified through various methods, including but not limited to, IT/security system reports and feedback to agency leadership.
- C. An employee found to have violated this policy may be subject to disciplinary action, including termination of employment.

#### **Exceptions**

- A. Exceptions to the ban on prohibited technologies may only be approved by City Manager.
- B. Exceptions to the policy will only be considered when the use of prohibited technologies is required for a specific city business need, such as enabling criminal or civil investigations or for sharing of information to the public during an emergency. To the extent practicable, exception-based use should only be performed on devices that are not used for other city business and on non-city networks.

Consider authorizing the City Manager and the Palestine Public Library to join the Carnegie Libraries of Texas Coalition. The City of Samford Mayor James M. Decker and the Samford Carnegie Library director Ann Pippin have formed a loose coalition. They are inviting the Palestine Public Library, one of the five remaining Carnegie working libraries in Texas, to join and be a partner in the submission of an appropriations bill to the Texas Legislature. The appropriation bill requests an additional budget rider of \$5 million. If funded, each Carnegie library may apply for up to \$1 million towards renovation and preservation efforts. There is no cost involved in joining the coalition. Included is the Carnegie Coalition's Final draft of the Bill Proposal.

#### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

Staff recommend authorizing the City manager and the Palestine Public Library to join the Carnegie Libraries of Texas Coalition.

To whom it may concern:

In the late 19th century, Scottish-American industrialist and philanthropist Andrew Carnegie began funding community libraries across the United States. Carnegie had risen from humble beginnings to be one of the wealthiest men in history. He valued the power of self-improvement and believed that a public library was the best gift for a community, as it gave all of the community's people the opportunity to improve themselves. Andrew Carnegie's generosity would change the nature and accessibility of public libraries forever.

Carnegie would ultimately help fund over 2,500 libraries around the world. 32 Carnegie Libraries were built in Texas. Many have been demolished, and a few are left standing for other purposes, but a remarkable five communities continue to operate their Carnegie property as a community library. Ballinger, Franklin, Jefferson, Palestine, and Stamford each built their library between 1906 and 1913 and continue to operate them over 110 years later.

Today, our communities are all working to renovate our Carnegie Library or otherwise ensure it remains a viable community library for years to come. Our communities value their libraries and we cherish our unique status as keepers of the Carnegie Library heritage in Texas. This mission is important but challenging. Our communities are small and have limited budgets to spread between infrastructure, essential city services, and quality-of-life projects. We must be good stewards of our citizens' money while also remaining good stewards of our heritage and the heritage that we possess on behalf of the entire State of Texas. With that challenge in mind, we formed a loose coalition in late 2024 to discuss a proposal with each Carnegie Library.

Today, we request the addition of a budget rider on the upcoming state budget in the amount of \$5 million, solely devoted to the preservation and renovation of the remaining Carnegie Libraries in Texas. We propose that this rider be incorporated into an education or historic preservation bill, as appropriate. If funded, these resources could be held by a suitable state agency, and, in cooperation with our coalition and other state stakeholders, parameters could be developed by which each Carnegie Library may apply for up to \$1 million towards renovation and preservation efforts.

This is a small sum in the grand picture of the state budget, but it would be enormous to each library and the communities that they serve and uplift. This investment would be transformative for each of our facilities. For decades, we have upheld this unique piece of Texas heritage with limited resources, shouldering the responsibility alone. In many ways, we have done incredible work to keep our facilities alive on our limited budgets. Today, we have an opportunity for the State of Texas to recognize and invest in our heritage so that we can serve as an example for the next 110 years of community libraries in Texas.

#### SUMMARY:

This item proposes awarding ETEX Broadband a three-year contract for Internet service at the Palestine Public Library. We currently have a contract with ETEX for the same price and duration, and we are satisfied with the service provided.

The Library conducted a bidding process in conjunction with E-Rate Central, which assists libraries in securing federal funding for internet access. This program will cover a significant portion of the Internet costs through federal grant funds.

The Library received two bids for internet service through E-Rate, and ETEX submitted the lowest bid by a considerable margin. As current customers of ETEX, we feel confident in choosing them again.

ETEX's bid is for 36 months at a rate of \$249.95 per month.

# CASE STUDY

Etex engineered and constructed a 210 mile \$7.6M fiber and equipment project. This offers a minimum of 10G service to each school and has redundant data router connections and outage protection.

In 2020, the Palestine Economic Development Board identified broadband as a key economic development issue. They evaluated several providers before selecting Etex. "They (Etex) not only had experience in this arena, but were very open to discussions and thinking outside the box when it came to forming a partnership that would be beneficial for all parties," said Lisa Denton, Economic Development Director for Palestine. Etex constructed a \$2.2M fiber network to the business corridor of Palestine.


Etex has over 6,000 customers on old copper plant with slow internet speeds under 20Mbps. Etex has prepared preliminary plans to serve these areas and will seek federal and state funding to support the estimated \$40 million in construction costs.

Etex plans to expand our targeted communities list pending development of statewide broadband mapping that will guide us in identifying unserved and underserved areas.



### CITY OF PALESTINE MURAL SERVICES CONTRACT

This Mural Services Contract ("Contract") is made and entered into by and between the City of Palestine, Texas ("City"), Deanna Pickett, ("Artist") and Richard Farris, Jr. ("Sponsor").

#### I. RECITALS

WHEREAS, CITY seeks to promote Palestine to residents and visitors; and

**WHEREAS**, the City is promoting public art projects in the form of murals to assist in bringing visitors to Palestine and to promote visitors to the city for extended periods of time; and

**WHEREAS**, the City seeks to enhance the image of the community by promoting public art projects and partnering with public and private property owners to sponsor art projects accessible to the public, specifically, the City encourages the placement of murals in locations visible and accessible to the public; and

**WHEREAS**, such murals can serve to beautify individual buildings and neighborhoods and will discourage graffiti and add to the unique charm and character of the City; and

**WHEREAS**, the goal of this Agreement is to attract visitors to the City, thus directly enhancing and promoting tourism as outlined in Chapter 351 of the Texas Tax Code and the City's Hotel Occupancy Tax Use Policy; and

**WHEREAS**, the City Council of the City of Palestine wish to provide a portion of its Hotel Occupancy Tax revenues fund certain mural projects to enhance and promote tourism within the City.

**NOW**, **THEREFORE**, it is mutually agreed by the City, the Artist and the Sponsor as follows:

#### II. TERMS OF AGREEMENT

- 2.1. <u>Creation of Mural</u>. The Artist and the Sponsor shall diligently, expeditiously and satisfactorily perform the activities proposed for the creation of a mural (the "Project") as described in Exhibit A and made a part of this Contract for all purposes. The Artist shall provide services and meet his/her obligations under this Contract in a timely and workmanlike manner, using knowledge and recommendations for performing the services that meet generally accepted standards in the community and region for similar projects.
- 2.2. <u>Project Location</u>. The Project shall be located in an area determined by the City to be visible from a public street, sidewalk, right-of-way or in a location that attracts, or will attract by virtue of the mural, visitors and tourists, as described in Exhibit A.
- 2.3. Execution of Project. The Project shall start on or before the Effective Date and shall be completed on or before May 8, 2025. The City Manager of the City may approve extensions of time for delays due to unforeseen circumstances such as, but not limited to, inclement weather, unavailability of materials, illness or disability of the Artist or medical issues involving relatives of the Artist.

- 2.4. <u>Maintenance after Completion</u>. The Sponsor and the Artist shall be responsible for maintenance, repairs, and restoration of the mural, including graffiti abatement, for a period of <u>60</u> months after the date the City issues a Letter of Acceptance to the Artist and the Sponsor. After the end of such <u>60</u>-month maintenance period, if Sponsor desires to undertake any activity that would result in the removal or alteration of the mural, or that involves the sale of the Sponsor's property where the mural is installed, the Sponsor shall first notify the City of such proposed undertaking in writing and provide the City an opportunity to make recommendations to the Sponsor concerning such undertaking within 30 days of the City's receipt of the Sponsor's written notice. The Sponsor shall also provide a copy of such written notice to the Artist. After the end of said maintenance period, the Sponsor shall continue to be responsible for compliance with applicable ordinances regarding graffiti abatement and property maintenance.
- 2.5. Project Cost and Payment. The amount awarded for the Project is \$12,750.00 ("Project Award"). The City will pay the Artist the Project Award in two separate, but equal payments as provided herein. The City will tender the first payment equal to fifty percent (50%) of the Project Award, said amount being \$6,375.00, within 30 days after the effective date of this Contract. The City will tender the second payment equal to fifty percent (50%) of the Project Award, said amount being \$6,375.00, within 30 days after the completion of the Project as evidenced by a Letter of Acceptance issued from the City. The City's payment of the Project Award shall be funded solely from the City's Hotel Occupancy Tax revenue to the extent allowed by law, although the City retains the right but not the obligation to pay the Project Award from any legally available source of funds.
  - a. <u>Budget</u>. All Artist expenditures shall be in accordance with the Budget section of the Mural Arts Application Form.
  - b. <u>Accounting</u>. The Sponsor and the Artist shall maintain complete and accurate financial records of each expenditure of the funds and, at the request of the City Manager or his designee, shall make the records available for inspection and review during normal business hours.
  - c. <u>Unspent Funds</u>. Any funds allocated (and tendered to the Artist) by the City which are unencumbered or unexpended due to Artist's failure to complete the Project in accordance with this Contract shall, upon request of the City (to the Artist), be remitted by the Artist to the City within 30 days from the date of such request.
  - d. <u>Supplies</u>. The City will not be responsible for purchasing or otherwise providing any materials or supplies to the Sponsor or the Artist for the completion of the Project.
- 2.6. <u>Preservation and Access to Project Records</u>. The Sponsor and the Artist shall be responsible for collecting and preserving all records, documents, files, invoices, digital media (i.e., email, text messages, photographs, etc.) and other written or digital material (collectively, the "Project Records") related to the Project and this Contract for 60 months from the date the City issues its Letter of Acceptance. The Sponsor and the Artist agree to allow the City to inspect all Project Records related to this Contract. The Sponsor's or Artist's failure to provide access to the Project Records when requested by the City may be deemed a breach of this Contract by the Sponsor and/or the Artist.
- 2.7. <u>Subcontracts</u>. The Sponsor and the Artist agree not to subcontract any part of this Contract to any other person or organization without the prior written consent of the City Manager of the City.
- 2.8. Reproduction of Mural. Notwithstanding any claim of ownership or copyright interest in the mural by either the Sponsor or the Artist, the Sponsor and the Artist hereby grant a permanent license to the City to reproduce or utilize photographs and images of the completed mural and the names of the Sponsor and the Artist in any form of publicity, marketing materials, publications, brochures, internet websites, social media or similar fora. The Sponsor and the Artist further agree the completed mural, being supported by public funds, is intended for the enjoyment and benefit of the public and that they shall not charge any fee for viewing or photographing the mural or restrict its visibility.

- 2.9. Ownership. By signing this contract, the Artist is waiving his/her right to ownership of the Project. A "work of visual art", which is a painting, drawing, print, sculpture or still photograph must be signed by the artist.
- 2.10. Political Activity. The Sponsor and the Artist agrees not to use any of the funds received under this Contract for any political activity, including any activity to further the election or defeat of any candidate for public office or any activity undertaken to influence the passage, defeat or final content of legislation.
- 2.11. <u>Obscenity</u>. The Project shall not include any material that is obscene as defined by Section 43.21 of the Texas Penal Code.
- 2.12. <u>Tourism Impact</u>. The Sponsor and the Artist agree to notify the City of any scheduled activity, program or event related to the mural that could enhance or promote tourism.
- 2.13. <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. In executing the Project, the Sponsor and the Artist agree to comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, codes and regulations of the local, state and federal governments including those pertaining to equal employment opportunity and discrimination against participants.

#### 2.14. Termination.

- a. <u>Termination for Cause</u>. If the City Manager of the City determines that the Sponsor and the Artist are not executing their performance duties in accordance with this Contract, or that either has breached any provision of this Contract, the City Manager may provide notice in writing of the deficiency. The Sponsor and the Artist shall have 10 business days from the date of the City's written notice to correct the deficiency. If the deficiency is not appropriately corrected in the opinion of the City Manager of the City within the prescribed time, the City Manager may terminate this Contract by providing written notice of termination to the Sponsor and the Artist.
- b. <u>Remedies and Refund</u>. If the Contract is terminated under this subsection (a) of this section, the City may pursue any remedy available at law or in equity against the Sponsor and the Artist, including an action to recover all sums paid by the City to the Sponsor and the Artist. Upon termination of this contract under subsection (a) of this section, the Sponsor and the Artist shall remit all funds allocated to it by the City within 30 days from the date of termination.
- c. <u>Termination for Convenience</u>. Either party to this contract shall have the right to terminate this contract for convenience before work on the Project has begun or any funds of the City have been expended by providing written notification to the other party at least 30 days prior to the effective date of termination.
- 2.15. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. It is understood and agreed between the parties that the Sponsor and the Artist are independent contractors. The City assumes no liability or responsibility to the Sponsor or the Artist or any third parties in connection with this Contract or by virtue of the City's issuance of any permits or approval of any plans, specifications or improvements related to the activities under this Contract.
- 2.16. <u>Joint and Several Liability</u>. For purposes of this Contract, the Sponsor and the Artist shall be deemed to be a joint venture. Accordingly, with regard to the performance obligations of the Sponsor or the Artist, each is jointly responsible for the failure of the other to comply with the terms of this Contract. Thus, breach of this Contract by either the Sponsor or the Artist may be grounds for termination or pursuit of any other remedies available to the City against the Sponsor, the Artist, or both.
- 2.17. <u>Indemnification</u>. The Sponsor and the Artist shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend City, its employees, officials, and agents from and against any and all obligations, claims, suits, demands and liability or alleged

liability, including costs of suit, attorney's fees, damages, judgments, or settlements and related expenses arising in any manner from the activities under this contract.

- 2.18. <u>Immunity; No Consent to Suit.</u> Nothing herein shall constitute the City's waiver of its sovereign immunity nor be construed as the City's consent to suit.
- 2.19. Assumption of Risk; General Release. The Sponsor and the Artist assume all risks associated with the Project, including but not limited to (i) property damage to the Sponsor's building, facility, structure, or other related improvements where the Project is to be installed, and (ii) bodily harm and injury to the Sponsor and/or the Artist, or their agents, employees, or associates, arising from or relating to the Sponsor's and/or the Artist's performance of the terms of this Contract and the Project. Furthermore, the Sponsor and the Artist expressly waive any claims against the City of Palestine for personal injury or property damage, and expressly release the City of Palestine from any and all liability for damages from any alleged personal injury or property damage arising out of the Sponsor's and/or the Artist's performance of his/her (their) obligations under the terms of this Contract.

#### III. MISCELLANEOUS.

- 3.1. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Contract contains the entire agreement between the parties. Any oral understandings or agreements in conflict with the written provisions of this contract shall be of no force or effect.
- 3.2. <u>Amendments</u>. Any amendments to the terms of this Contract must be made in writing and executed by all parties, subject to the approval by the Palestine City Council.
- 3.3. <u>Authority</u>. The Sponsor and the Artist each warrant that they possess the legal authority to enter into and perform this Contract.
- 3.4. <u>Audit</u>. The City may provide for or conduct an independent audit of the funds received under this contract at any time during the effective term of this contract and for twelve months after Project completion. The Sponsor and the Artist agree to maintain all records related to the activities funded by the City under this Contract for at least twelve months after Project completion.
- 3.5. <u>Advertising</u>. The Sponsor and the Artist agree to include the statement "Funding provided by the City of Palestine" with any advertising of the mural or the Project.
- 3.6. <u>Applicable Law; Venue</u>. This Contract shall be construed under the laws of the state of Texas. Venue for any disputes arising under this Contract shall be in the state courts in Anderson County, Texas, or, if in federal court, the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Texas, Austin Division.
- 3.7. Force Majeure. If performance of this Contract or any obligation under this Contract is prevented, restricted, or interfered with by causes beyond any of the parties' reasonable control ("Force Majeure"), and if the party unable to carry out its obligations gives the other parties prompt written notice of such event, then the obligations of the party invoking this provision shall be suspended to the extent necessary by such event. The term "force majeure" shall include, without limitation, acts of God, fire, explosion, vandalism, storm or other similar occurrence, order or acts of military or civil authority, or by national emergencies, insurrections, riots, wars, strikes, lockouts or work stoppages, epidemic or pandemics. The excused party shall use reasonable efforts under the circumstances to avoid or remove

such causes of non-performance and shall proceed to perform with reasonable dispatch whenever such causes are removed or ceased. An act or omission shall be deemed within the reasonable control of a party if committed, omitted, or caused by such party, lor its employees, officers, agents, or affiliates.

- 3.8. <u>Prohibition on Contracts with Companies Boycotting Israel</u>. Pursuant to Chapter 2270 and 808, Texas Government Code, Sponsor and Artist certify they are not ineligible to receive the award of or payments under this Contract and acknowledge that the Agreement may be terminated and payment may be withheld if this certification is inaccurate. Failure to meet or maintain the requirements under this provision will be considered a material breach.
- 3.9. <u>Section 2252 Compliance</u>. Section 2252 of the Texas Government Code restricts the City from contracting with entities that do business with Iran, Sudan, or a foreign terrorist organization. Sponsor and Artist each hereby certify that they are not ineligible to receive the award of or payments under this Agreement. Failure to meet or maintain the requirements under this provision will be considered a material breach.

#### Exhibit A

The purpose of the project is to create an interactive mural to beautify our downtown/Main Street District. The mural must include the following features:

- Dogwood flowers or trees
- A swing or other interactive theme to encourage people to exit their vehicles and take a photograph with the mural.
- A colorful and/or geometric motif.
- Must include the hashtag #PalestineTX and the Visit Palestine logo
- The artist may include the artist's signature and social media handles

The majority of the subject matter should begin at a minimum height than 3 feet or greater. This mural will be located on a wall with parking spaces directly in front of it, and that should be considered in the design process. All negative space must be finished and included in the mural.



The Canvas measures approximately 850 square feet.

The process by which the artist must complete the project includes:

- Preparing the base of the canvas with primer or appropriate mural material (city will coordinate cleaning the canvas prior to project start.
- Complete design and painting of the mural
- Film the process and provide video of project from start to finish.
- Sealing the mural

The artist stipend for this wall is \$18,000.00. Artists should consider this in their design, materials, and time to be spent on the project. The artist will be responsible for obtaining **ALL** the materials necessary to complete the project. All murals must comply with the City of Palestine Code of Ordinances.
