1. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Bennett called the Park and Recreation Commission meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

2. CITIZEN INPUT

Mr. Jeremy Zaller, 15600 Yakima Court, Ramsey stated he will be the contact person for Anoka Ramsey Athletic Association's Lacrosse program. He has been involved with athletics in Ramsey for many years. He stated field space has become a premium and asked if there are any upcoming projects ARAA would like to have some input. Parks & Assistant Public Works Superintendent Riverblood stated the city is looking at some large field expansions at Central Park.

5. COMMISSION BUSINESS

5.01: Consider Recommendation Confirming Existing Master Parks and Trail Plan Regarding the Sketch Plan of Harvest Estates Located at 15153 Nowthen Blvd NW; Case of N.I.K. Management, Inc.

Parks & Assistant Public Works Superintendent Riverblood reviewed the purpose of this case is to confirm the current Master Parks and Trail Plan as it relates to the Sketch Plan for Harvest Estates, a proposed 45-lot detached, single-family subdivision on the former municipal center campus located at 15153 Nowthen Blvd. NW. the topics of confirmation include the following:

Sketch Plan Review is a process outlined in City Code that provides an opportunity for the Planning Commission to review compliance with the Comprehensive Plan as well as Zoning and Subdivision Codes (City Code Chapter 117) before an Applicant spends resources on detailed civil engineering drawings. The Parks and Recreation Commission does not traditionally review Sketch Plans; however, given the significant policy topics, confirmation of direction is warranted before the Applicant proceeds with future review steps. This step is not required by Minnesota Statute Chapter 462; however, it provides for a more proactive and collaborative design approach in an effort to avoid issues at a later date.

Master Park and Trail Plan

As the redevelopment of the old municipal center has been discussed over a number of years and has taken a number of forms. A topic that routinely is raised is the potential for a new City Park. The City has routinely responded that it does not plan for a future City Park in this development. The area is well served by existing parks, connected through a series of pedestrian trails. Additionally, the focus of the Parks and Recreation Commission has shifted away from a series of smaller “pocket” parks to larger community parks with higher quality amenities connected through the City’s pedestrian trail system.

Alternatives

Alternative #1. Confirm the policy direction to not include a City park within the proposed development. This alternative would allow the proposed development to move forward as presented. Park Dedication and Trail Development obligations would be satisfied by cash contribution.

Alternative #2. Amend the policy direction to include a City park within the proposed development. This would require the Applicant to revise the proposed development as presented. The addition of a park in this area would reduce resources available for other future improvements already planned and would add to the City's ongoing maintenance costs. (The Park and Recreation Commission previously held that, there are adequate parks, recreation, and open spaces available to the proposed development within reasonable distance.) This alternative would reduce or eliminate the cash contribution to the Park Trust Fund to be utilized to enhance the existing, surrounding parks and trail connections.

Over the past years the City has looked at various options for the use of the property. It was decided to have a policy of not constructing pocket parks putting more focus on the community parks and trail connections to existing parks within the City.

Staff recommends that the City confirm the existing Parks and Trail Master Plan and not include a new City Park within the proposed development known as Harvest Estates.

Park dedication is suggested cash in lieu of land for Harvest Estates. Maintain the policy of not constructing pocket parks. Mr. Riverblood indicated the location of the property on a map. There is a great need for park improvements, as noted in the Park Improvement Plan, which reaffirms not constructing any pocket parks. The trail systems and sidewalks in the surrounding neighborhoods are complete. Solstice Park is disconnected from the trail system. The City does own a small parcel that could be used to connect the two cul-de-sacs to Soltis Park.

Chair Bennett stated he does not feel the Commission has changed their mind on the policy of not creating pocket parks and in taking cash in lieu of land to support improvements in other larger parks.

Motion by Commissioner Barr, seconded by Commissioner Fyten, to recommend that the City Council confirm the existing Parks and Trail Master Plan and not include a new City park within the proposed development known as Harvest Estates and reaffirm the Commission's Policy.

Motion carried. Voting Yes: Vice Chair Bennett, Commissioners Barr, Fyten, Chubb, Mobry and Trappen. Voting No: None. Absent:

6. COMMISSION/STAFF INPUT

Parks & Assistant Public Works Superintendent Mark Riverblood reviewed the following:

Winter Recreation – Some of the winter recreation activities are less than normal for the year due to the lack of snow. The sledding hill at Alpine Park is open. The ski trails are maintained at Rum River Central.

Mississippi River Trail and Tourism – A bike trip is planned for Itasca to Iowa Border and one of the stops they are looking at is the Comfort Inn.

Invitation for Public Engagement – Residents can see plans on the website and comments are welcome. Chair Bennett stated all three plans reviewed were outstanding and he invited residents to look at the website and provide their input.

Mississippi Skyway Project – The grant application was submitted today. A video was produced by QCTV and will be shown to the Commission in March. The video is also available on the website.

Commissioner Barr asked if there were updated counts on the skating rinks. Mr. Riverblood stated they have been disappointing. There was good ice over Thanksgiving. It has been a roller coaster season for the rinks. They will be flooded again tomorrow. February will most likely be the end of the skating season.

7. ADJOURNMENT

Recommend Certain 2015 Parks Capital Improvements

Purpose/Background:

On a annual basis, the Park and Recreation Commission makes recommendations to City Council for park and trail projects, based upon community need. For 2015 there are 9 potential projects identified within the Capital Improvement Program, with a wide scope - ranging from grates to secure stormwater pipes at The Draw, to the playground for Elmcrest Park, to a shared trail project with the City of Anoka. Three 2015 projects are ready to move forward for purchase, project development, and in one instance as a proposal for grant funding. These are listed below with the funding source and *estimated* project cost:

Selected 2015 Parks Capital Improvements

Monuments for The Draw and Elmcrest Park	Park Trust Fund	\$80,000

Observations/Alternatives:

As alluded to, staff is in various stages of project development for the nine park and trail related projects. For the three that are ready for Commission recommendation to City Council, the following is a summary of the work plan.

Monuments for The Draw and Elmcrest Park

The design work for the Kasota Stone monument for The Draw was completed in 2012, and is being investigated to 'upgrade' the proposed poster-type display panel element to an electronic display for advertising the concerts and other community events. The intention would be to have the monument and sign in place for the beginning of The Draw Summer Event Series in June of 2015. A proposed apartment building immediately south of the amphitheater is anticipated to move forward for approval and subsequent construction as soon as the spring of 2015. The Park Dedication due for this project in essence would be directed to fund The Draw's monument that is estimated at this time (with electronic display) at \$ 50,000.00. Additionally, staff will investigate if there is any revenue opportunities (concert sponsorships as an example), associated with the display element of the park sign and monument for The Draw.

As for a monument/sign for Elmcrest Park, this design work may occur as part of the planning for the playground project to occur in March and April of 2015.

Drinking Fountain for Woodland Green Park

This small scale project is fairly straight-forward with the purchase of the components, with staff installation as time permits during the spring or early summer.

Trott Brook Trail Connection

As the Commission will recall, the recommendation to satisfy Park Dedication for the Brookfield 4th Addition, was to accept approximately \$46,000 in cash, with the intention to construct a boardwalk connection from the existing trail in Brookfield to Variolite Street - if additional funding could be secured by a grant. (Details are included in the Park and Recreation Commission's October 2013 case, on the city's website.) The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources Local Trail Connections Program is accepting proposals in March 2015, for projects like the Trott Brook trail connection referenced herein.

The DNR competitive grant program matches 50% of project costs up to \$150,000. If staff can dedicate enough time to develop

a proposal, the intention would be to receive City Council approval on March 24th to apply, and then submit the application before the deadline on March 31st. Staff is in the process of developing the project's anticipated construction cost. Estimates at this time are between \$300,000 and \$400,000.

Attached is the City's Priority Trail Map, with the project area circled with a dotted line. Also attached is the proposed trail and boardwalk extension shown in a red and yellow dotted line in relation to the Brookfield plat.

Funding Source:

Funding would be from Park Improvement Trust Fund, and potential grant funds as shown in the table above.

Recommendation:

Staff recommends Commission concurrence with the work plan outlined above, and a recommendation to City Council on the three projects this case discusses.

Action:

Motion to recommend City Council approval of the Parks Capital Improvements consisting of the monuments for The Draw and Elmcrest Park, the drinking fountain for Woodland Green Park, and the Trott Brook Trail connection; consistent with 2015 CIP.

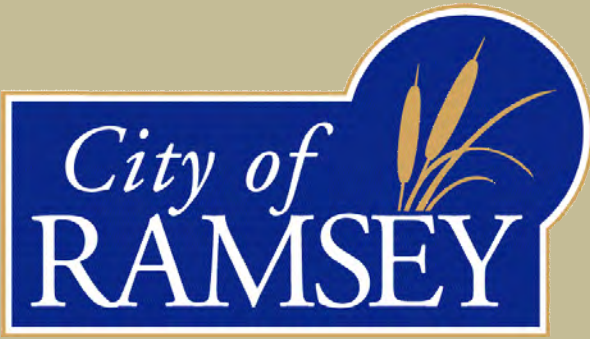

INTRODUCTORY SECTION

CITY OF RAMSEY
CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT/CAPITAL OUTLAY PLAN
2015-2019

Enclosed is the Ramsey Capital Improvements/Capital Outlay Plan (CIP) for the years 2015-2019. It has been prepared in an attempt to anticipate major capital expenditures in advance of the year in which they are budget requests. Further, several projects may interrelate or require other improvements prior to initiation, which would cause delays without prior planning. Additionally, projects may require budgeting over several years or receipt of funds from other sources (i.e. grants) requiring planning completion prior to the funding year. Finally, the plan enables a snapshot of the identified capital needs of the community allowing for continual prioritization of these needs.

Approval of the CIP by Council does not authorize spending or initiation of a given project. It does, however, provide a guide for the community for a whole array of private and public decision-making, impacted by public capital expenditures. Therefore, the CIP should receive ratification only if the Council perceives actions contemplated within the plan as reasonable and planned within justified time frames. It shall further be noted that initial project design of public infrastructure projects identified within this plan often begins two years or more prior to the date of construction.

The CIP is not intended to provide for precise budgeting. Capital costs are projected as estimates. Upon each update of the plan, deletions, additions, delays, or other revisions may occur, reflecting changing community needs. These changes allow for budget refinements as a particular project nears actual construction.

Capital improvements are improvements to land, streets, parks, utilities and buildings. This plan shows improvements with revenues projected from various funding sources. Improvements from the General Fund are those requiring a tax levy, referendum or similar other authority resulting in listed projects being less than certain. The other funding sources (except for intergovernmental revenue - grant funds) have increased stability over the general fund projects.

Specific information on the funding sources for each project is shown under the individual project. Cash flow projections are completed to examine the long-term stability of each fund and its ability to provide for planned expenditures.

The plan does not contain a specific designation which would denote project priorities. There is no weighting or matching of priorities between infrastructure types [streets, parks, utilities, building facilities] as each type of project generally has a funding source unique to the project type and from which funds cannot be reallocated.

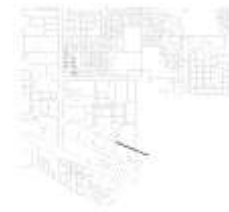

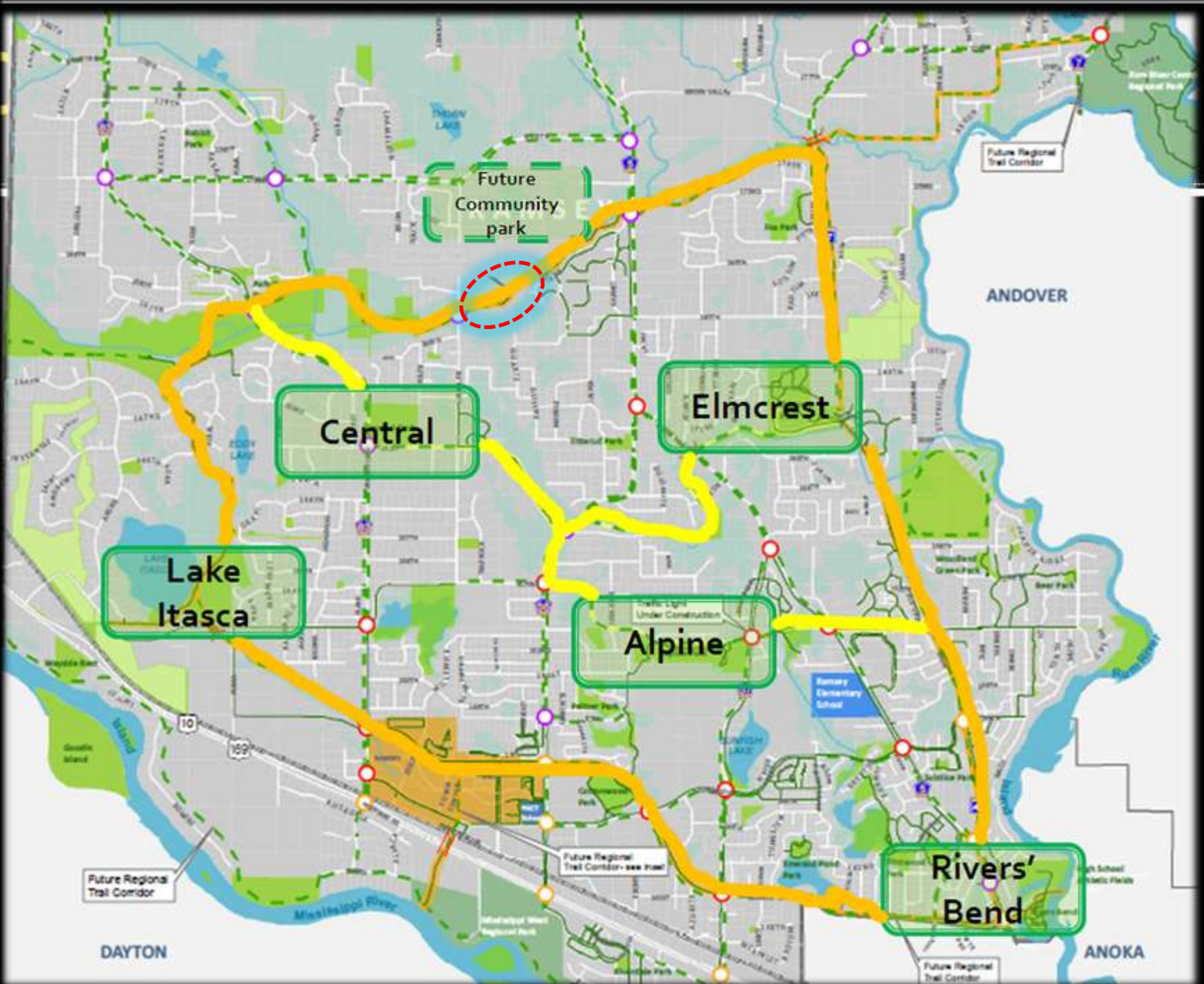

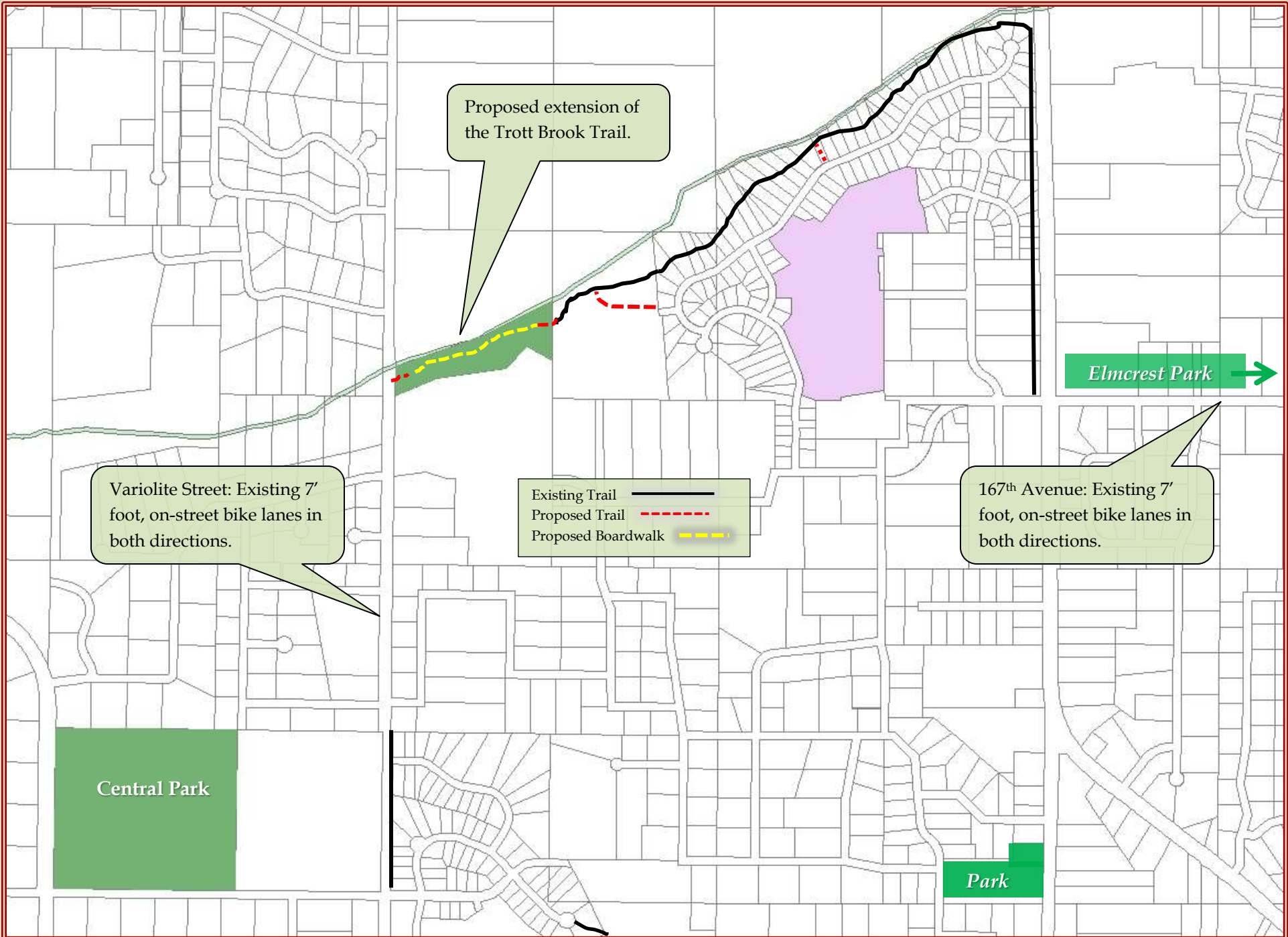
