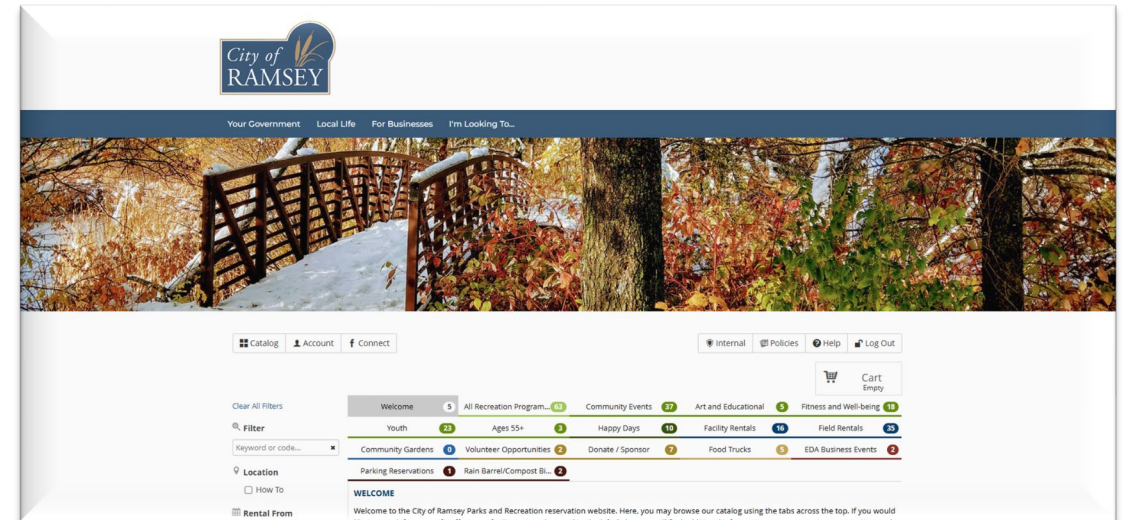
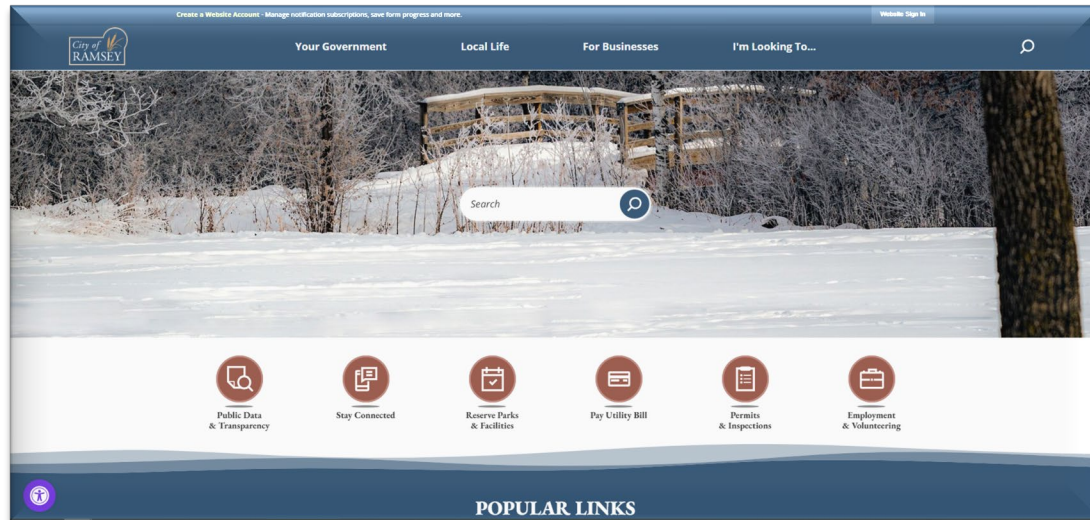
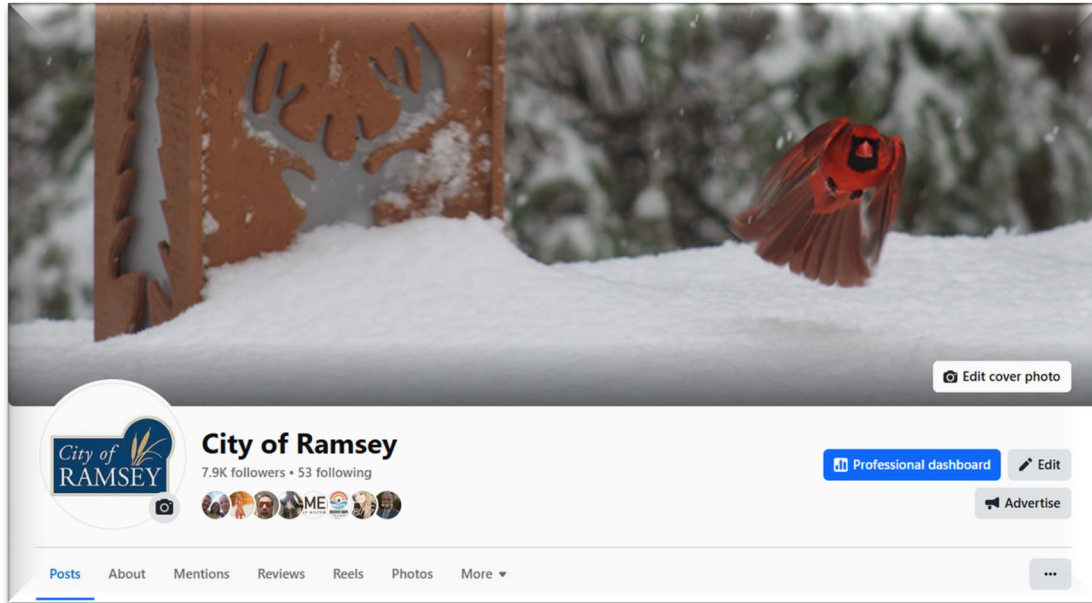

Clues in the Clouds

Clouds come in all shapes and sizes, from puffy cotton balls drifting lazily across the sky to wispy streaks that point the horizon. Their unique forms inspire creativity—how often have you spotted an animal or a familiar object in the clouds above?

We even use clouds in everyday sayings:

- "Head in the clouds" means feeling distracted.
- "On cloud nine" describes sheer happiness.
- "Every dark cloud has a silver lining" reminds us to find the good in tough times.

Clouds aren't just beautiful; they hold clues about the weather ahead. Look up and see what secrets they reveal today!

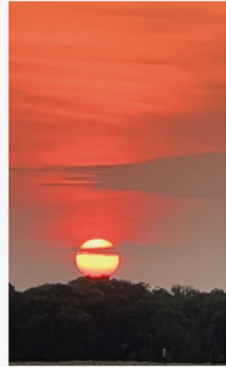

Parade of Clouds

Clouds can be big or small, thin or thick, high or low. Different clouds form under different conditions, and those conditions affect what they look like.

Puffy clouds form when the sun hits objects on the surface of the earth, heating them up. The heated air rises into the sky until it gets to a zone cool enough for droplets to form from the moisture it holds.

Stringy clouds form when wind, rather than warmth, carries air skyward. The direction of the strands that make up the cloud can tell us something about the wind that was blowing when the cloud formed.

Water on Wings

When you think of water, you probably think of a liquid. But water exists in other forms, too. When it gets cold, it turns into a solid—ice. And when it gets really warm, it turns into a gas—water vapor. Invisible water molecules are in the air all around us in every breath we take.

When those warm water molecules cool enough, they can change again. With the help of tiny bits of dust or other particles, they can condense, or turn back into liquid. Suspended in the air, the tiny drops (or, if it's really cold, ice crystals) form floating objects we know as clouds.

What causes water molecules suspended in the air to cool down so they can condense into clouds? Earth's atmosphere is made up of layers. Most clouds are in the bottom layer. They move with the air masses that bring different types of weather. Sometimes they run into each other. When they do, one slides up and over the other. The air mass closest to the ground is warm and moist. As the air rises, it cools, and water vapor condenses and forms clouds that we can see.

Sometimes the water droplets that make up clouds stay suspended in the air. When clouds get too crowded, or cool down enough, they can form larger clumps and fall to Earth in the form of rain, snow, or another form of precipitation.

Why is the City Removing So Many Boulevard Trees?



In Ramsey's urban areas, particularly in the City's southeast quadrant, thousands of boulevard trees enhance neighborhoods with their beauty and shade, while also providing benefits such as noise reduction, traffic calming and increased property values. However, the boulevards present challenging environments for these trees. They are exposed to threats from stray vehicles, damage caused by mowers and weed trimmers, as well as harmful effects from road salt and pollutants. Additionally, ash trees are now at risk due to the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB). You may have noticed that Public Works crews are removing trees in parks, along boulevards and possibly even from your yard that are near the street. The trees being removed from your yard are located within the 15-foot right-of-way and have been confirmed to be infested with the EAB. This invasive insect is responsible for killing ash trees throughout the eastern Midwest. The beetle was first discovered in Ramsey a few years ago and has since caused significant damage across the entire City. When an ash tree becomes infected, adult beetles lay their eggs inside the tree. The trees have little defense against the burrowing larvae and they typically die completely by the second season.

Dead ash trees are notorious for their brittle limbs and dropping branches during windy conditions. For community member safety, Public Works crews continue to remove dead and infected ash trees in areas with the greatest concern for people being hit by falling limbs—especially boulevard trees over the sidewalks and in parks.

The City will increase its boulevard tree planting program in 2025. Still, unfortunately, for the next few years, ash trees will be removed from the City's landscapes faster than they can be replaced.
