2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Council Member Maria Cecilia Cruz led the Pledge of Allegiance.

3. INVOCATION

The invocation was performed by Ms. Elida Valenzuela, Police Chaplain.

4. CALL TO THE PUBLIC

Ms. Sofia Rodriguez, Member of the Senior Center Board, stated that she has a petition regarding several unanswered questions. On Friday, during their Father's Day celebration, an incident occurred involving Mr. Meño, their musician. He was not allowed to enter, and no explanation was provided. Prior to this, they have had various complaints, and they feel they have no one to turn to, as the people they have approached have not resolved anything. Her priority, however, is the incident with Mr. Meño, because he dedicates his time to the seniors, helping them enjoy themselves and relax. Staff owes the seniors respect and should inform them about what is happening. Seniors are not included or considered in the decisions being made. It would have been only fair to inform them that Mr. Meño would not be allowed to enter, regardless of the reason. They might have understood, or maybe not, but at least they would have been taken into consideration. They are unhappy, and she, like the rest of the seniors, needs a place where they can go to have fun, feel comfortable, and enjoy recreational activities without fear of being threatened or told something without explanation. The seniors want answers, attention, and respect.

Mayor Nieves Riedel invited Ms. Rodriguez to schedule an appointment with Ms. Olivia Jenkins, Acting Assistant City Manager, to discuss their complaints with the City Manager and herself, who is best positioned to listen to them. If changes are needed, they will be made, as she wants the seniors at the Senior Center to be happy and in harmony.

Mr. James Allen Jr., United States Navy (Retired), 1549 E. Babbitt Lane, San Luis, AZ, stated that he learned about an issue affecting residents who live on Merrill Avenue. The homes are next to the canals used for irrigation. About two (2) weeks ago, he was told that the Yuma Water Association charges them a yearly fee because the canals are near their homes. The problem is that they do not have access to that water. The water sources are not connected to their homes. They are connected to the city's water source. They pay for city water, trash, and sewage. Maybe this occurred because that area used to be farmland and was a way of making sure everybody paid their fair share for irrigation. However, to this day, if that area has been rezoned for citizens with families who are not using irrigation water, something needs to be discussed with the city and the water folks, or some type of solution needs to be put in place. This individual built their home 15 years ago and, over that time, never received a bill. But in the last three (3) to four (4) years, they started receiving bills. This bill has climbed to about \$5,000.00. Common sense to him is: why is this still going on? This is an issue for the city, county, or the Water Users Association to solve, because does someone pay for something they did not get?

5. B. Presentation of Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting to the City of San Luis Finance Department for the City of San Luis' Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025. (Jenny Torres, City Manager)

Ms. Jenny Torres, City Manager, stated that the city received a letter from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) confirming that the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025, qualifies for the GFOA Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting. This certificate is the highest form of recognition in government accounting and financial reporting, and its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management. Ms. Torres presented that certificate to the Finance Department.

Ms. Roula Encinas, Director of Finance, thanked the Mayor, City Council and staff for the support provided to her department.

5. D. A Presentation by Gadsden Elementary School District No. 32 on the Official Announcement of Southwest Junior High's Ranking Among the Top 10 Schools Worldwide. (Lizette Esparza, Gadsden Elementary School District Superintendent)

Ms. Lizette Esparza, Gadsden Elementary School District No. 32 Superintendent, formally invited the Mayor and City Council to what will be a historic moment for the Gadsden School District and the City of San Luis. Over the past two (2) years, the district has been recognized not only in the city and county but also nationally, and now Southwest has been named a contender for the top ten (10) in the world. This is global recognition by T4 Education. T4 Education is a global digital platform and movement connecting hundreds of thousands of teachers and school leaders across over 100 countries. Southwest Junior High is one of two schools that will be representing the United States of America. Tomorrow at 1:00 p.m., she invited all to be present. The nominations will start at 1:00 p.m. They have been selected because of their partnerships with universities and their ongoing commitment to their students, as well as support from parents. Last year, a student graduated from 8th grade with an Associate of Arts (AA) degree, and another 8th-grade student graduated from Arizona Western College (AWC). They have a partnership with AWC, and throughout the day, their students receive dual credits. They have 200 students every year going into different internships at different universities throughout the United States, which is why they have been selected as a contender for a top ten (10) school. If unable to be present, it will also be available live online.

7. DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ITEMS:

Mrs. Sonia Cornelio, City Clerk, indicated that, at the request of city staff, Item No. 7.J. will be next if there was no opposition from the Mayor and City Council; there was none.

7. J. Discussion and possible action on any and all matters regarding Resolution No. 2406. A Resolution of the Mayor and City Council of the City of San Luis, Arizona, adopting the City of San Luis 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for Fiscal Years 2027-2031. (Tomas Sanchez, City Engineer)

Mr. Tomas Sanchez, City Engineer, explained that this Resolution adopts the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for Fiscal Years 2027-20231. The 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is a planning document that identifies and prioritizes the city's capital infrastructure needs over the next five (5) fiscal years.

He added that the CIP serves as a guide for the planning, financing, and implementation of major public infrastructure projects, including transportation, water, wastewater, drainage, parks, public facilities, public safety facilities, and other municipal improvements. Additionally, this is the city's first comprehensive CIP to be developed and adopted with Consultant Engineering Inc. (CEI), in collaboration with other city departments, which facilitated the city's new CIP process throughout the fiscal year. The team evaluated the city's current infrastructure needs, projected growth, regulatory requirements, asset conditions, and community priorities to develop the proposed CIP. The adoption of this CIP establishes a formal process for evaluating, prioritizing, funding, and annually updating the city's capital infrastructure needs.

Retired Judge Manuel Figueroa has agreed to help the city with this task if approved by the Mayor and City Council. Additionally, Superior Court Judge Haws has supported the city in this process.

7. C. Discussion and possible action on any and all matters regarding the engagement of legal services from Pierce-Coleman to serve as the contracted prosecutor on an interim basis. (Jenny Torres, City Manager)

Ms. Jenny Torres, City Manager, described this as the same situation as previously discussed regarding the on-call Assistant City Magistrate. The current City Magistrate previously served as the City Prosecutor. Due to the vacancy, staff requested approval of a contract for Pierce-Coleman to serve as the contracted prosecutor on an interim basis until an in-house prosecutor is hired. She added that, if approved, Mr. Joe Estes, City Attorney, and Ms. Kate Cox, Associate Attorney at Pierce Coleman PLLC, will serve as the City's Prosecutor.

7. D. Discussion and possible action on any and all matters regarding procurement of water main materials, supplies, and fittings necessary for water distribution system improvements. (Eulogio Vera, Director of Public Works)

Mr. Eulogio Vera, Director of Public Works, indicated that this project includes both a purchase and a budget transfer. They have a project in their Capital Improvement (CIP) to pave and widen 4th Avenue between Cesar Chavez Boulevard, where Valleyview Apartments are. As part of the preparatory work, they are extending water services to the vacant parcels adjacent to the roadway. This way, when development comes in the future, streets would not need to be cut to provide services to those parcels. They are also doing a connected waterline loop from San Luis Lane, east of 24th Avenue, next to Los Mezquites 4 and 5, and east along the north property line of the detention center, then along Avenue D to the wastewater treatment plan, to improve circulation and water quality in the area for the compliance test with the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ); these project will be done in-house.

7. E. Discussion and possible action on any and all matters regarding the approval of the Lighting and Retention Basin Assessment Districts Budget for Fiscal Year 2026-2027. (Angelica Roldan, Director of Parks and Recreation)

Ms. Angelica Roldan, Director of Parks & Recreation, noted that the assessment districts were established to provide street lighting and retention basin maintenance services within the developments. The County of Yuma requires the City Council's approval of the budget before it can levy the assessments. The amounts are based on the estimated cost the city will incur to provide these services. She added that historically, this item has been presented by the Finance Department; however, moving forward, it will be presented by the Parks Department.

Questions, responses and comments were exchanged among Council Members Esteban C. Rosales, Tadeo Azael De La Hoya, Luis E. Cabrera, Mayor Nieves Riedel, Ms. Roldan, and Mr. Eulogio Vera, Director of Public Works.

Ms. Jenny Torres, City Manager, said that at a previous Council meeting, Council Members requested a work session on the improvement districts. This item was on the agenda because the county needs a council-approved budget so the assessments can be levied. Rather than having a work session, staff can provide a presentation at a future Council meeting.

Mayor Nieves Riedel stated that staff provided a good presentation and they do not have any choices, but if the City Council feels that they need a work session, she does not have a problem with that.

The new state law requires cities to have a set of standard construction plans beginning July 1st, therefore, it will assist the City of San Luis in complying with this regulation. This means anyone from the community can come to the office and choose one of the plans. They will not have to pay for a design, so they can use those plans to build their house. The cost for the city will be \$28,549.40 based on population.

Usually, the SSP funding available fluctuates, but staff estimates it will be \$500,000.00; therefore, the project's total cost will be \$985,488.00, with a match amount of \$485,488.00.

A Resolution of the Mayor and the City Council of the City of San Luis, Arizona, authorizing the submission of an application to the USDA Rural Business Development Grant to develop a 5-Year Economic Development Strategic Plan. (Armando Esparza, Director of Economic Development)

Mr. Armando Esparza, Director of Economic Development, explained that his department has been preparing an application to the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Business Development Grant Program to fund the development of a 5-Year Strategic Plan. The plan proposes analyzing current market conditions, community priorities, and the city's long-term economic development goals. It will also provide a roadmap for activities such as business attraction, business retention and expansion, workforce development, entrepreneurship, downtown revitalization, and quality-of-life initiatives. His department is seeking \$60,000.00 from USDA for this application, as that is the target amount per application. He requested the allocation of \$40,000.00 to cover the remaining portion of the proposed strategic plan amount, to be budgeted in fiscal year 2028.

He was also there to see the motion on the floor for the bill that passed the road to home ownership affordability act, which passed that same day almost unanimously. When he spoke to Senator Mark Kelly, Kelly said he would specifically do a video for San Luis for the Cesar Chavez Boulevard. U.S. Representative Adelita Grijalva said that San Luis would be able to get the funding, which was for parks worth \$2.5. He added that great things are coming to the City of San Luis. On a separate note, he reported that he was selected for the 20 under 40 by Yuma Biz.

Mayor Nieves Riedel reminded everyone about the 4th of July festivities at 7:00 p.m. and to stay hydrated because it is hot. She thanked Department Heads for taking care of staff working outdoors.
