1. Introduction

The Williamson County Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program currently has ten participating cities. The cities include Cedar Park, Coupland, Georgetown, Granger, Hutto, Jarrell, Leander, Liberty Hill, Taylor, and Weir. A five year Consolidated Plan was developed in 2014 in an effort to address needs of low to moderate income persons living within Williamson County.

2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

The County has been awarded CDBG funds in the amount of \$1,231,067 for Fiscal Year 2016. In accordance to the priorities identified and outlined in the County's Consolidated Plan, four infrastructure projects, one public facility project, one housing rehab project and one homeownership assistance project were identified for FY16 allocations. The projects will serve low to moderate income areas and households throughout the County. The Action Plan covers the period of October 1, 2016 through September 30, 2017. The projects meet national goals and supports ongoing efforts in the community to address the growing population.

3. Evaluation of past performance

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

The Williamson County CDBG Program identified priorities and needs during the 2014-2018 Consolidated Planning Process, which is utilized in identifying projects to be funded.

The Williamson County CDBG program is currently utilizing funds allocated to projects that are in line with past and current priorities. These projects are monitored as they are being implemented as to ensure progress and eligible spending. In administering a CDBG program, an entitlement community must meet a timeliness threshold of not more than 1.5 times its annual allocation in its line of credit 60 days prior to the end of the program year. The Williamson County CDBG program has met the timeliness threshold over the last several years and expects to do the same in upcoming years.

A 2016 Single Audit was conducted on the Williamson County CDBG Program. Internal Audits have been conducted in 2010, 2013, 2015 and 2016 with favorable reports. HUD conducted a remote monitoring on open activities in 2011. All projects identified during this monitoring have been completed and closed in IDIS.

HUD conducted program monitorings in 2012 and 2015. Two findings were identified in 2012 with regards to administrative documents. The County now has policies in place that ensure that proper documentation is on file. No findings were identified in the 2015 HUD monitoring.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

The CDBG citizen participation plan indicates that all federal regulations regarding public comment periods and participation will be followed by the Williamson County CDBG Office. The CDBG Office encourages the public to review documents concerning the CDBG program and provide feedback when desired and needed.

Representatives of participating cities, County Commissioners, and other stakeholders were notified of funding and information was posted on the Williamson County web site at www.wilco.org. Notification was also posted in local newspapers. Notices were published in both English and Spanish. A public hearing was held on February 2, 2016 to gather input regarding the CDBG program and potential projects.

Project funding was approved by the Williamson County Commissioners' Court on June 7, 2016. The FY16 Annual Action Plan was made available for public comment June 17, 2016- July 18, 2016. An announcement of the the notice of a 30-day comment period was published in local newspapers and on the County website.

The final draft, along with any public comments was presented to the Williamson County Commissioners Court on July 26, 2016.

Concerns regarding public housing include inconsistencies regarding available programs within the County, limited information regarding the current status of available subsidized housing, and lengthy waiting lists.

The County will collaborate with the public housing authorities and other social organizations to compile accurate information regarding public housing and distribute the information to current residents and others who are eligible for assistance. The County will also continue to support organizations that promote affordable and descent housing. CDBG funds will be utilized by the Georgetown Housing Authority to rehab existing units. The Taylor Housing Authority will utilize funds to provide homeownership assistance. The program will provide pre and post purchase counseling and homebuyer assistance to income qualified individuals and families.

Introduction

Low-income residents largely depend on local housing authorities for access to affordable housing and related services. The purpose of public housing authorities (PHA) is to ensure safe, decent, affordable housing and to create opportunities for resident's self-sufficiency and economic independence. There are currently four public housing authorities managing almost 400 public housing units and over 450 housing choice vouchers throughout Williamson County. In consultation with Williamson County's public housing authorities, data has determined the needs of residents to include access to transportation and affordable child care. Affordable housing is the greatest need throughout the County with over 500 applicants on the public housing waiting lists and well over 600 applicants waiting to receive assistance through the housing choice voucher program. The need for additional affordable housing units is crucial for Williamson County residents, but the lack of developable land and contractors willing to develop affordable housing is a barrier.

Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing

The County will award the Taylor Housing Authority Home Ownership Program \$100,000. The project will provide pre and post purchase counseling and homebuyer assistance to ten income qualified individuals and families. The Georgetown Housing Authority will utilize \$166,610 to rehab approximately 28 units.

Williamson County's public housing authorities will continue to seek additional funding to address public housing needs and will apply for additional housing choice vouchers when available. Lack of funding is a barrier in addressing public housing needs and has created lengthy waiting lists and long waiting periods to be housed. Housing authorities will continue to provide housing assistance and social service needs to residents and will maintain efforts to implement more programs if funding allows.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

Williamson County will support the Taylor Housing Authority in a Home Ownership Program. The program will provide counseling and assistance to potential homebuyers. The County will encourage the local public housing authorities to continue its current programs and collaborate with other agencies that assist with homeownership. Also, Georgetown and Round Rock Housing Authorities have Resident

Commissions on their boards in an effort to encourage participation.

If the PHA is designated as troubled, describe the manner in which financial assistance will be provided or other assistance

Georgetown Housing Authority, Round Rock Housing Authority, Taylor Housing Authority, and Granger Housing Authority are all standard performers and not considered troubled.

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The County supports the efforts of the Balance of State Continuum of Care (CoC) to simplify and broaden outreach and assessment efforts for homeless persons in Williamson County. The Continuum will work to create a better communication system for service providers to stay in contact with both schools and hospitals to avoid homeless persons (or those at risk of homelessness) from falling through the cracks of the system. As part of the annual point-in-time count, the CoC conducts outreach. Not only are homeless people counted, particularly unsheltered persons, but representatives from various agencies are available to answer questions and provide information about available resources.

Over the next annual action plan period, the County will continue to support local social service agencies, such as Capital Idea, San Gabriel Crisis Service Center, Bluebonnet Trails, MHMR and the Georgetown Project that provide a wide array of support services for homeless persons.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

While Williamson County is not a direct recipient of Emergency Solution Grant funds, the County will continue to partner with the Balance of State CoC to support emergency and transitional housing needs of homeless persons in the County.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were

recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The Balance of State CoC works to ensure that homeless individuals make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, is prioritizing safe and stable housing and making affordable housing options more accessible to homeless individuals. Many homeless that struggle to transition into permanent housing and independent living suffer from mental illness and substance addiction. Recent trends through the Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-housing program and Housing First model prioritize placing homeless individuals and families in permanent housing quickly, and then linking them to supportive services in the community. During this consolidated plan period, Williamson County will continue to support local organizations, such as the Georgetown Community Service Center to assist homeless person with transitional and permanent housing.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

While Williamson County is not a direct recipient of Emergency Solution Grant funds, the County will continue to partner with the Balance of State CoC to support efforts made to implement local coordinated discharge policies for individuals or families who are being discharged from a publicly funded institution.








City of Granger Sewer Project




Annual Action Plan 2016

City of Liberty Hill Sidewalk Project




City of Coupland Roadway Renovation Plan (Alternate Project)


