McMichael is currently Associate Vice Chancellor for Government Affairs at Texas State Technical College (TSTC) and was a recipient of the Chancellor's Excellence Award in 2014. She handles government relations at both the state and federal levels for the ten-campus, two-year technical college system. Marlene is also the author of a coffee table book commemorating TSTC's 50 years as a Texas teaching institution. Titled *Texas State Technical College: The Vision, The Leaders, The Heart*, the book was released in March 2015.

McMichael is a summa cum laude graduate of Texas State University and the William P. Hobby Center for Public Service. McMichael holds a national certification as a Certified Public Manager[®].
