What is 4-H?

Scholarship

Each year, the Texas 4-H Youth Development Program awards an estimated \$2.2 million in scholarships to high school seniors. In 2021, 36 youth from the Central District 8 earned \$421,500 in scholarship money for advanced education.

The youth from Bell, Bosque, Coryell, Ellis, Hamilton, Hill, Hood, Johnson, Leon, McLennan, Milam, Navarro, and Robertson Counties are seek-

ing advanced degrees in fields such as Interdisciplinary Studies, Business, Marketing, Food Science, Agribusiness, Agricultural Leadership & Development, Poultry Science, Mechanical Engineering, Bilingual Education, Culinary Arts, Social Work, Agricultural Economics, Agricultural Education, Business Management, Welding, Animal Science, Environmental Science, Kinesiology, Finance, Art Education, Psychology, Physics, Biomedical Sciences, Electrical Engineering, Equine Science, Public Health, Agricultural Commu-



nication, Pre-law, Electrical Power & Controls, Chemistry, Early Childhood Education, and Nursing. Upon completion of their advanced degrees, many of the youth have indicated they would like to return to give back to the communities that helped make their futures possible.

The Texas 4-H scholarship program began in 1959. At that time, the Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo awarded youth with scholarships in the amount of \$1,000. Today the largest scholarships are \$20,000 presented by the San Antonio Livestock Exposition & the Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo

In 2022, the scholarship program will celebrate 65 years of providing college scholarships to Texas 4-H members and continues to be the largest 4-H scholarship program in the United States.

4-H Project Work and Contests



4-H projects are the educational experiences in which youth who are 4-H members participate. A project is defined as consisting of 5-6 new learning experiences, leadership, community service, and exhibition of their project work. Youth engage in learning experiences through a variety of methods such as project meetings, workshops, tours, interviews, research, and more. All youth are encouraged to teach others about what they have learned to gain leadership skills

and are also encouraged to help give back to their community. In addition, youth can engage in competitive events such as presentations, speeches, demonstrations, and/or recordbooks. Adult volunteer leaders will help youth in setting and reaching their goals through their project work.

District 8 4-H SURGE (Leadership Lab)

The 4-H Youth Development Program prides itself on teaching leadership life skills to its youth members to grow into successful, contributing members of society in adulthood. One even that teaches and helps youth develop the life skills of our 4-H members is District 8 4-H SURGE (formerly known as Leadership Lab). It is a three-day, two-night program targeted at 4-H members in grade 8-12. District 8 boasts of having the largest participation in the state for the last several years.





Each year, we put a significant emphasis on learning life-skills through hands-on activities. At this year's camp, youth were challenged to push out of their comfort zone through the Ropes Course. They were then challenged to find their inner scientist and solve the mystery of the STEM Escape Room & their inner grill master with our Grilling & Outdoor Cooking workshop. Finally, our youth were given the opportunity to explore Longhorn Caverns and learn about the history and science behind those caverns.



Agriculture and Natural Resources:

- *Tri-County Cow-Calf Workshop* was held Jan 6, 2022 and included sessions on marketing cattle, pasture weeds, livestock nutrition, and producer-owned processing facilities (135 attendees).
- The Small Grains and Cover Crops Field Day was held on April 27, 2021. Topics included new wheat and oat varieties and cover crop choices, and winter weed management (12 attendees).
- The 1st Annual *Fiber Hemp Variety* Grower Field Day. Topics included: agronomy and performance of varieties, legal issues, sourcing seedstock and the best management practices (50 attendees).
- The *Blackland Income Growth Conference* was held in Waco on January 11. The Grains Session held a market/fertilizer updates, pest management in corn and sorghum, and a CEU-supported session on sprayer design and managing sprayer drift (28 attended).
- *D8 Farm and Ranch Seminar*: This 8-CEU event was held on December 9 2021. Topics included Pesticide Laws and Regulations; Pasture pests; Feral Hog Programs, Weeds and Brush management; Vectors, and pesticide handling (38 attended).
- *Master Naturalists*: The *Goodwater Branch* has 143 active members who logged 10,397 volunteer hours in 2021.

Family & Consumer Sciences:

• Wellness Wednesday: weekly social media posts to inform community on healthy topics and recipe video demonstrations. 13 total posts with 2,044 engagements.

Better Living for Texans (BLT)

As of February 2022, there were 11,458 SNAP recipients and 27,186 SNAP-eligible residents in Williamson County. The BLT Program provides free nutrition education classes for adult and youth SNAP-eligible audiences.

- Get the Facts is an on-going series with Foster Grandparents (12 participants).
- Walk N Talk is an on-going series with Boys & Girls Club of Georgetown (20 participants). Learn Grow Eat Go series anticipated start April 2022 with Boys & Girls Club of Georgetown.
- A Fresh Start to a Healthier You is an on-going series with San Gabriel Apartments-Liberty Hill (3 participants).
- Get the Facts is an on-going series with Annunciation Maternity Home (5 participants).
- Walk N Talk (2 different series) & Choose Healthy with Bartlett ISD BARK CAMP to be completed in June-July 2022.

Horticulture:

- Lawn & Garden 101 is a seven week series to teach basic home lawn and garden topics for new residents in Williamson County. (89 participants)
- Green Thumbs Up Gardening is a monthly series held at three locations in the county: Round Rock Public Library, Cedar Park Public Library, and Brushy Creek Community Center
- Hands on in the Garden is a monthly gardening class held at the Master Gardener demonstration garden
- Vegetable Conference was held on April 6, 2022. Topics included weed and pest management, organic vegetable production, high tunnels to extend the season (50 participants)
- •The *Pecan Field Day* was held on March 22, 2022. Topics included strategies for new pecan disease, terminal leaf dieback, pecan scab, pest control, and orchard management (22 participants)
- 32 interns completed the Master Gardener Volunteer Certification program in the Fall of 2021. The volunteers will complete 50 volunteer hours to become certified volunteers.

4-H and Youth Development:

- •Youth enrollment 492; Adult volunteers 108; 16 Clubs
- •Curriculum enrichment is a large part of the youth development program. This year we have reached **782** Williamson County youth in public schools, private schools, and homeschools through curriculum enrichment. The most popular program is the Egg to Chick program, which allows students to observe and learn about the life cycle of a chick through the incubation and hatching process. We have also provided lessons on horticulture, and hope to soon add STEM-related programs.
