
Established in 2021, STEP UP Texas is a partnership between The University of Texas at Austin, Bluebonnet Trails Community Services, and Williamson County Juvenile Services. Funded through a grant from the U.S. Department of Justice (Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency & Prevention) the project aims to reduce Disproportionate Minority Contact with the local juvenile justice system. STEP UP Texas will build on the shared vision of a comprehensive trauma-informed and equitable system of care designed to improve outcomes for all youth with a particular focus on racial and ethnic groups who are overrepresented.

Texas Juvenile Justice Department ACEs Data

Our Charge in Williamson County

Williamson County and Texas juvenile justice data show that most youth engaged in the justice system have experienced high incidences of trauma (Adverse Childhood Experiences or ACEs). In addition, youth who are African American and Hispanic are disproportionately engaged with the justice system. STEP UP Texas aims to disrupt the negative impact of trauma and to reduce disproportionate contact with the justice system by working alongside community partners to build knowledge and skills around trauma, diversity, equity, and inclusion.



STEP UP Texas would like to build upon this progress through integrating similar practices within our community.









Training and Support at No Cost to Local Organizations

STEP UP Texas offers nationally recognized training opportunities and newly designed training curriculums in N.E.A.R. Science (Neuroscience, Epigenetics, Adverse Childhood Experiences, Resilience), Trauma-Informed Care Certification, and Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) to professionals and key decision-makers in the school, legal, court, and juvenile justice systems. These training opportunities are designed to increase awareness around racial equity and the impacts of trauma while introducing keys to fostering individual and community resilience.


WCJS Youth Reductions In Commitment to Texas Juvenile Department
