Executive Summary

1. Introduction

Williamson County is a federal entitlement community under the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program. The County is required to prepare an Annual Action Plan to implement its federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and Emergency Solution Grant (ESG) programs. The program funding allocation of \$2,220,130 is to be used to successfully support community development and affordable housing efforts in low and moderate income areas throughout the County. The County will also receive ESG funding in the amount of \$185,910 that will be used for rapid rehousing.

The Williamson County consortium consists of ten participating cities and the unincorporated areas of county. The participating cities included Cedar Park, Coupland, Georgetown, Granger, Hutto, Jarrell, Leander, Liberty Hill, Taylor and Weir.

Williamson County's current Five-Year Consolidated Plan covers 2024-2028. Williamson County CDBG 2025-2026 Annual Action Plan covers the period from October 1, 2025 to September 30, 2026 and is the second Annual Action Plan of the five year period.

The county will allocate \$440,026 (20%) of the CDBG allocation to program administration and oversight. The remaining funds will be allocated to infrastructure, public facilities and social services. All projects are a high priority as identified in the current Consolidated Plan.

The County will use the ESG allocation of \$185,910 to Bluebonnet Trails for rapid rehousing. ESG administration costs will be \$13,943.25 (7.5% of the ESG allocation).

2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

The FY25 funded projects were selected to address one or more of the following performance objectives:

- Provide Decent Affordable Housing
- Create Suitable Living Environments
- Create Economic Opportunities

Projects funded in FY25 will address one or more of the following performance outcomes:

- Improve Availability/Accessibility
- Improve Affordability
- Improve Sustainability

Project selection is guided by the 2024-2008 funding priorities:

Public Facility and Infrastructure Improvements

- Fund non-housing community development proposals that eliminate a threat to public health and safety to include water/sewer projects, drainage projects, sidewalks, and street improvements.
- Fund public facility improvements that benefit low income households and persons, and persons with special needs to include senior centers, neighborhood facilities, youth centers, homeless facilities, childcare centers, parks and recreational facilities.

Increase Access to Affordable Housing

- Fund activities that expand the supply and improve the condition of housing affordable to lower income households.
- Fund activities that leverage other public and private resources such as Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) projects.
- Extend the useful life of existing affordable housing through weatherization, repair, and rehabilitation programs.

Decrease Homelessness

- Provide funds to support shelter operations and transitional housing.
- Provide funding to increase permanent supportive housing opportunities and work to create a stronger network of providers of supportive and mainstream services to homeless clients.

Public Services

- Fund projects that provide supportive services to low- and moderate-income household as well as persons with special needs.
- •Support efforts to develop a regional social service collaborative to coordinate the work of social service organizations, disseminate information, and eliminate duplication of effort.

Affirmatively Further Fair Housing

- •Support improved access to community resources.
- Continue to operate in compliance with protected class definitions found in federal regulations.

3. Evaluation of past performance

The Williamson County CDBG Program identified priorities and needs during the 2024-2028 Consolidated Planning Process, which is utilized in identifying projects to be funded. The Williamson County CDBG program is currently utilizing funds allocated to projects that are in line with current priorities. These projects are monitored as they are being implemented to ensure progress and eligible spending.

The County did not meet the required timeliness ratio in 2023 or 2024. Delays in projects are due to supply chain demands, increased costs, and meeting the requirements needed when combining multiple sources of funds (Federal and State). Williamson County is completing a HUD approved work-out plan to ensure funds are being utilized.

A summary of past performance is reported in the attached document "Past Performance Evaluation". Information was taken from the county's most recently completed Consolidated Annual Performance Evaluation Report for fiscal year 2023 and submitted to HUD.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

The CDBG citizen participation plan indicates that all federal regulations regarding public comment periods and participation will be followed by the Williamson County Community Development Office. The Community Development Office encourages the public to review documents concerning the CDBG and ESG programs and provide feedback when desired and needed. Representatives of participating cities, County Commissioners, and other stakeholders were notified of funding and information was posted on the Williamson County web site at www.wilcotx.gov. Notification was also posted in local newspapers. Notices were published in both English and Spanish. A public hearing was held on March 12, 2025 to gather input regarding the CDBG program and potential projects. Representatives from local agencies attended the meeting and discussed community needs and potential projects.

Project funding was presented to the Williamson County Commissioners' Court on July 1, 2025.

A public hearing was held on July 16, 2025.

The FY25 Annual Action Plan was made available for public comment July 3, 2025-August 4, 2025.

5. Summary of public comments

Four participants attended the March 12, 2025 public hearing. An overview of the CDBG program was discussed along with potential projects and funding.

During Commissioners Court on July 1, 2025, one comment was received that indicated the County should return the funding to the Federal Government. Another resident provided support for the American Legion projects, which are identified as alternate projects in the Action Plan.

No comments were received during the July 16, 2025 public hearing.

During the comment period, a meeting was held with Bluebonnet representatives to discuss additional funding to support the costs associated with the rapid rehousing program.

It is standard for Williamson County to address comments received and take them into consideration prior to final approval.

1. Introduction

In accordance with 24 CFR 91.115(e) Williamson County has adopted a Citizen Participation Plan describing the citizen participation requirements of its CDBG program. This document describes the process for preparation of the Consolidated Plan and each Annual Plan. It outlines the outreach efforts that will be taken to coordinate these planning documents with public and private sector interests in the County.

A public hearing was held on March 12, 20225 to gather input on affordable housing and community needs in Williamson County. Stakeholders consisted of organizations that are familiar with, or interested in, Williamson County's housing and community development needs.

Project funding was presented to the Williamson County Commissioners' Court on July 1, 2025.

A public hearing was held on July 16, 2025.

The FY25 Annual Action Plan was made available for public comment July 3, 2025-August 4, 2025.

All notices were posted in local newspaper and on the Williamson County website.

Provide a concise summary of the jurisdiction's activities to enhance coordination between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies (91.215(I))

Williamson County encourages public communication and agency consultation to demonstrate its commitment to identifying priority needs and engaging the participation of citizens, public agencies, and nonprofit organizations in a positive and collaborative manner. A list of stakeholders and affordable housing providers was developed and included public agencies and private nonprofit organizations whose missions include the provision of affordable housing and human services to low- and moderate-income households and persons. These stakeholders were invited to participate in public hearings held for the purpose of developing the Annual Action Plan.

The County is supporting Bluebonnet Rapid Rehousing with ESG funding. This entails also working with local agencies and the Texas Homeless Network to develop a Homeless Management Information System (HMIS).

Williamson County is a member of the Williamson County Homeless Coalition. The group meets with other local non-profits and social service agencies to discuss the needs of homeless and those at-risk of becoming homeless. The goals of this group are to form a homeless coalition and attempt to find resources to fill the gaps within the community regarding homeless and at-risk homeless. Agencies

include food pantries, mental health agencies, neighboring local units of government, housing agencies, local and neighboring housing authorities, local not for profit health clinics, and Texas Homeless Network staff. The coalition also assists in the point in time count to identify needs and to secure additional funds needed.

Williamson County will continue to support the efforts of the Williamson County and Cities Health Districts to address lead based paint (LBP) hazards. The County will also continue to notify CDBG subrecipients of LBP requirements and ensure compliance with CDBG requirements.

Williamson County's CDBG policies and procedures comply with the federal lead-based paint regulations at 24 CFR Part 35.

In accordance with lead-based paint requirements, the County will incorporate the following factors to refine and narrow the communities that are at highest risk with lead-based paint hazards as related to housing rehabilitation activities:

- Age of housing (pre-1978 housing units)
- Condition of housing
- Tenure and poverty levels
- Presence of young children
- Presence of lead poisoning cases

All contractors, sub-recipients, and other community partners are advised of the lead-based paint regulations. Additionally, the County's CDBG Office will continue to distribute information and literature on lead hazards to households who may be at risk of exposure.

Calls from residents regarding affordable housing options are directed to the local public housing authorities in Austin, Georgetown, Taylor, Granger and Round Rock. Those looking for assistance are also encouraged to contact the Capital Area Housing Finance Corporation to discuss affordable housing options and home buyers' assistance.

Williamson County has a community resources website that allows people to search online for needed resources such as health care, mental health services, housing, food, and other community resources. The Williamson County Community Resources website is designed to empower residents with information about resources in the area so that they can connect with available services. The site is www.wilco.org/communityresources.

At this time, the CDBG office does not directly coordinate with corrections programs and institutions. However, Bluebonnet MHMR coordinates with corrections programs and institutions in an effort to assist those who are experiencing a mental crisis. The program allows for mental health support in an effort to avoid incarceration.

All agency types are encouraged to participate in the Williamson County CDBG program.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

Williamson County participates in the Balance of State Continuum of Care (BoS CoC). With the reestablishment of the Williamson County Homeless Coalition in 2019, service providers collaborate as they work with persons experiencing homelessness or who are at risk of experiencing homelessness participated in the process. Bluebonnet Community Services will utilize \$185,910 in ESG funds toward Rapid Re-Housing Williamson County expects that similar initiatives will be funded in future years of the Con Plan. The County is also working with the Texas Homeless Network to develop a HMIS system to assist in tracking residents experiencing homelessness.

Emergency financial assistance is made available to Veterans who live in Williamson Count through the Veteran Services Office. Funding is provided through a Texas Veterans Commission grant and can be used for emergency assistance with rent/mortgage, burial services, utilities and food.

Williamson County accepted ESG for the second time in FY2025. The county has previously worked with the Texas Balance of State CoC (TX BoS CoC) in conducting the Point-In-Time Count for the area since 2020 through the WilCo Homeless Coalition. The County will continue cooperating with the TX BoS CoC to determine best practices for allocating ESG funds and develop written standards, policies, and procedures and in implementing HIMS.

1. Summary of citizen participation process/Efforts made to broaden citizen participation Summarize citizen participation process and how it impacted goal-setting

The CDBG citizen participation plan indicates that all federal regulations regarding public comment periods and participation will be followed by the Williamson County CDBG Office. The CDBG Office encourages the public to review documents concerning the CDBG program and provide feedback when desired and needed. Representatives of participating cities, County Commissioners, and other stakeholders were notified of funding and information was posted on the Williamson County web site at www.wilco.org. Notification was also posted in local newspapers. Notices were published in both English and Spanish. A public hearing was held on March 12, 2025 to gather input regarding the CDBG program and potential projects. Four representatives attended the March 12 public hearing.

Four participants attended the March 12, 2025 public hearing. An overview of the CDBG program was discussed along with potential projects and funding.

During Commissioners Court on July 1, 2025, one comment was received that indicated the County should return the funding to the Federal Government. Another resident provided support for the American Legion projects, which are identified as alternate projects in the Action Plan.

No comments were received during the July 16, 2025 public hearing.

During the comment period (July 3-August 4, 2025), a meeting was held with Bluebonnet representatives to discuss additional funding to support the costs associated with the rapid rehousing program.

Participating cities and agencies are encouraged to submit applications to the Williamson County CDBG office for projects that meet the priorities and goals outlined in the Consolidated Plan. Project applications are determined via the use of comprehensive plans, public input and/or city staff/management. During the planning process, cities may hold public input meetings as well as post information for review by the public. County Commissioners receive input from constituents and discuss potential projects with the CDBG Administrator. The CDBG Administrator guides potential applicants in the application process and is available to meet to discuss processes, projects and funding.

During FY 2025, Williamson County will fund the following:

• Funding to Georgetown Housing Authority to rehab low income housing units. Approximately 52 dwellings.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

Georgetown Housing Authority (GHA) offers various services to residents in an effort to improve their living environment. Services include classes and activities for families such as nutrition and health classes; exercise groups; medical, hearing and prescription medicine screenings; defensive driving; financial literacy as well as classes about protection from identity fraud/theft. Computer labs and tutors are available to residents for job search activities, resume building, and personal use.

GHA offers the Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) Program, a HUD program that encourages communities to develop local strategies to help families obtain employment that will lead to economic independence and self-sufficiency. In partnership with welfare agencies, schools, businesses, and other local partners, GHA has developed a comprehensive program that gives participating FSS family members the skills and experience to assist them in obtaining employment that pays a living wage and focus on self-sufficiency.

The Resident Opportunities and Self-Sufficiency (ROSS) program is another essential service provided through GHA. This program allows residents to receive one-on-one assistance and support from a ROSS Coordinator to identify goals and current needs and to find free or low-cost resources to assist residents in achieving their goals.

The Taylor Housing Authority was awarded \$100,000 in FY16 CDBG funds for their Home Ownership Program to assist income eligible families with purchasing a home. The down payment assistance available to families was increased in an effort to make home purchases affordable to income qualified households. Remaining funding has been reallocated to a home repair program. The County is currently working with administration to complete this program.

The County has also provided CDBG funding to both the Granger and Georgetown Housing Authorities for housing improvements. While these projects don't directly affect homeownership, they do provide needed support to residents.

The Community Development office participates in the Williamson County Homeless Coalition. The coalition meets to discuss housing options and funding. Representatives from multiple agencies

participate in the meetings including, but not limited to the Round Rock Housing Authority, Georgetown Housing Authority and Taylor Housing Authority.

The Housing Authorities have resident representatives on the board for representation and to encourage residents to become more involved in management.

The County supports all efforts of the Housing Authorities to encourage home ownership and management.

If the PHA is designated as troubled, describe the manner in which financial assistance will be provided or other assistance

None of the PHAs in Williamson County are designated as troubled.

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The WilCo Homeless Coalition was established in 2019 to create a collaborative approach to planning and funding services related to homelessness. The coalition represents the county in the Texas Homeless Network, the host agency for the Texas Balance of State Continuum of Care. While outreach is not funded in FY 2025, participating homeless service providers in the coalition will continue to conduct outreach activities, including Point-In-Time counts, awareness campaigns, surveys, and local assessments.

Williamson County is also working with the Texas Homeless Network in implementing a HMIS to track and provide services to those experiencing homelessness.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

Operation Liberty Hill is expected to provide emergency shelter for a period of 1-2 weeks for 50 people in FY 2025. Use of the emergency shelter includes a number of situations, such as:

- Extreme weather events
- Living in a place not meant for human habitation
- Exit from emergency shelter
- A need transitional or supportive housing
- Discharge from a hospital or other institution without housing
- Eviction
- Fleeing domestic violence

The Georgetown Project will support homeless, unaccompanied and at risk students with variety of potential needs.

The Williamson County Crisis Center and Yesterday's gone will provide services to victims of domestic

violence. Key2Free will provide services to victims of human trafficking.

Additionally, Bluebonnet Trails Community Services (BTCS) will provide Rapid Re-Housing through behavioral, medical, housing and employment support along with care coordination through the BTCS Diversion Center in Georgetown connecting persons with appropriate supports in the community. The BTCS crisis respite program offers temporary residential care for persons recovering from mental illness in need of housing. A a partnership with Pecan Gardens, the newest program in Williamson County, will provide housing for individuals exiting homelessness.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

There is a need for additional housing and shelter for homeless persons and persons at-risk of homelessness, especially for families and survivors of domestic violence. In FY 2025, the following agencies will address these needs:

- The Georgetown Project \$50,000
- Williamson County Crisis Center \$50,000
- Key2Free \$50,000
- Operation Liberty Hill \$20,000
- Yesterday's Gone \$20,000

Bluebonnet Trails Community Services will use \$185,910 in ESG funds for rapid re-housing.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

Impact Counseling Services will provide mental health services at no cost to students, families and school staff during the school day at no cost. Hope Alliance will provide support and intervention services for victims of domestic violence. Similarly, Yesterday's Gone will provide medical and counseling support to survivors of domestic violence throughout the county. Services include intake services, emergency counseling services including transportation to appointments, coaching, and referral

coordination. The Georgetown Project will provide services to homeless, unaccompanied and at risk high school students.			

AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing – 91.220(j)

Introduction:

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

Habitat for Humanity (Habitat) is the only nonprofit housing developer in Williamson County. Habitat must look for low-cost land as high taxes and insurance make much of the land cost prohibitive. Even with Homestead caps, valuations are increasing and hurting mortgage affordability while low-cost land is increasingly difficult to find.

As stated in the 2019 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice, "the State of Texas grants authority to municipalities to create zone districts and regulate land development in those zone districts. This includes setbacks, lot coverage, building height, and density. However zoning powers are not granted to counties, with a few exceptions for specific listed areas of counties in specific areas of the state." As such, Williamson County has limited power to guide development but will continue to encourage inclusive ordinances and initiatives within the county's authority and within municipalities throughout the county. Additionally, the County is looking to alleviate barriers to affordable housing by funding activities that serve to reduce cost burden such as housing rehabilitation, home repair programs, and rental and utility assistance for low- to moderate-income households.

AP-85 Other Actions – 91.220(k)

Introduction:

Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

The primary impediment to Williamson County's ability to meet underserved needs is limited availability of funding to address identified priorities; the need exceeds the availability of resources. The County will continue to seek public and private resources to leverage its entitlement funds in assisting with implementation of policies and programs. By making mental health services more accessible, the county hopes to alleviate cost burdens on poverty-level families.

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

Williamson County is committed to fostering and maintaining affordable housing. In FY 2025, Williamson County has committed CDBG funds for home repairs to Habitat for Humanity to assist 40 income-eligible homeowners in the county (\$250,000). Additionally, rehabilitation and improvements will be made in public housing units in Georgetown (\$425,044).

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

Williamson County will continue to support the efforts of the Williamson County and Cities Health Districts to address lead based paint (LBP) hazards. The County will also continue to notify CDBG subrecipients of LBP requirements and ensure compliance with CDBG requirements.

Williamson County's CDBG policies and procedures comply with the federal lead-based paint regulations at 24 CFR Part 35.

In accordance with lead-based paint requirements, the County will incorporate the following factors to refine and narrow the communities that are at highest risk with lead-based paint hazards as related to housing rehabilitation activities:

- Age of housing (pre-1978 housing units)
- Condition of housing
- Tenure and poverty levels
- Presence of young children
- Presence of lead poisoning cases

All contractors, sub-recipients, and other community partners are advised of the lead-based paint regulations. Additionally, the County's CDBG Office will continue to distribute information and literature

on lead hazards to households who may be at risk of exposure.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

Impact Counseling Services is expected to assist 88 students, families, and school staff in need of mental health services at no cost. Beneficiaries will have access to mental health professionals to support with individual, group, and family counseling services, crisis support, case management, and psychiatry services.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

Because Williamson County has relationships with public housing authorities and agencies such as Habitat for Humanity and Hope Alliance, there are opportunities for continued dialogue and support for advancement of institutional structure. Additionally, as a sub-recipient of CDBG funds, the receiving entities must maintain a high level of reporting which requires a strong institutional structure. Williamson County will provide technical assistance as needed to ensure that sub-recipients are in compliance with CDBG regulations.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

Williamson County will continue to support and encourage efforts of the four public housing authorities and agencies such as Habitat for Humanity to collaborate to increase and preserve the number of affordable housing units. Williamson County will also encourage public housing authorities to offer services to residents in financial literacy and planning and to encourage residents to participate in programs designed to increase self-sufficiency.
