

Roberto Zamarron was born and raised in Laredo, Texas. In this border town, there were not that many opportunities one could take in pursuing one's future. His adventure in the US Army would begin.

In high school, Robert was in the JROTC program and was the commander of the Color Guard, earning 12th place at the Nationals JROTC competition. He graduated from United South High School in 2014. where he immediately enlisted in the US Army, leaving for bootcamp just a few months after. It led him to the Armor School in Fort Benning, Georgia. Here he gained the skills to effectively become a Tank Crewman to graduate in 2015.

In the Summer of 2015, Robert would join the 2nd Infantry Division in South Korea with 2nd Battalion-9th Infantry Regiment for only 5 months before the unit deactivating. However, before deactivation, Robert would earn the prestigious Manchu Mile belt buckle for completing a 25-mile road march. Meant to honor the unit for their efforts during the Boxer Rebellion in 1900 in which the unit marched 85 miles during that conflict. This would be the last Machu Mile ever to be completed on the Peninsula.

Robert returned to be stationed in Fort Bliss, El Paso Texas with the 1st Battalion- 67th Armored Regiment, 1st Armored Division. Here he would attain multiple Army Achievement Medals, Tank Qualification Bar, and Distinguished gunnery ratings for achieving the highest level of combat marksmanship a crew can achieve. Eventually deploying to Kuwait in 2016 and being assigned to the Battalion Commanders Tank Crew. Culminating his deployment in 2017 and honorably discharged in 2018.

Post service, Robert wanted to challenge himself academically. He would enroll at Laredo College and Texas A&M International University in 2018 and 2020 respectively. He would be the first in his family to go to college. Graduating with a bachelor's degree in business administration in 2022.

After struggling to determine his career goals post college, Robert would find himself working at the Webb County Veteran Service Office in 2024. He decided he could use his experience in the US Army and be of service to many others. For the next 2 years Robert would go on to serve the Laredo veteran community as the Assistant Veteran Service Officer. Providing exceptional service and advocacy on veteran benefits.

In addition, Robert would also assist in the Transportation Grant Program. Which helped veterans and their spouses who require transportation to their medical appointments. In December 2025, Robert and the rest of the VSOs would be recognized by the City Council for their exceptional and crucial service to the Veterans of Laredo and Webb County.

Recently this July, Robert joined the Williamson County Veterans Service Office to further his skills as an Assistant Veteran Service Officer. Hoping to learn from Michael and the rest of the team. With goals not only to elevate himself but the rest of the office to go above and beyond for the veterans and their families.
