These donations have helped create welcoming, nurturing environments for countless children.

Our collective efforts reflect the power of community collaboration to promote literacy, comfort, and care. The continued support and enthusiasm of all involved ensure the FRED program will keep growing, inspiring more children to embrace the joy of reading.
