Mary Merrell, daughter of Captain Nelson Merrell, married John "Mack" McLemore Jester and purchased land north of where the original Merrell settlement in Williamson County was located. Captain Merrell built his first log home in WC near Kenney's Fort about one-half mile above Joseph Barnhart's cabin on Chandler's Branch. The family lived on this property their whole lives. The last grandchild of Captain Merrell to live in the house was Susie Jester Fouse (1887-1966), daughter of Mary and Mack Jester. (The Merrell House is listed on the NRHP.)
