Proudly serving the communities of Williamson and Burnet counties since 1966

Williamson-Burnet County Opportunities, Inc. (WBC Opportunities) was designated and recognized by Williamson County as the County's official Community Action Agency in 1968. WBCO administers a wide range of social service and economic opportunity programs benefiting many thousands of low and moderate income persons. These programs currently include Head Start, senior activity centers, Meals on Wheels, energy assistance, homelessness prevention, and affordable housing programs. Williamson County currently supports the agency \$37,600 annually in operation funds for the County's Senior Nutrition program, and provides the agency \$34,000 annually in support for administration; namely assisting in defraying costs for the central office.

About Head Start 0-5

Head Start 0-5 is a comprehensive child and family development program that prepares children from birth to five years of age to become successful school students and members of society. Families must meet eligibility criteria. In 2009, 1091 disadvantaged children ages 0-5 were enrolled in our 13 Head Start cam-

2009, 1091 disadvantaged children ages 0-5 were enrolled in our 13 Head Start campuses where they received quality early childhood education preparing them for school, medical and dental assistance, and 2/3 of their daily nutritional needs.

About Senior Activity Centers/Meals-on-Wheels

This program provides hot, nutritious meals to seniors at Senior Activity Centers Monday through Friday at noon. Additionally, meals are delivered five days per week to those who, due to illness, age or disability are unable to provide proper nutrition for themselves. In 2009, 157,000 meals were served through our Meals-on-Wheels program and six senior activity centers, helping 1845 seniors remain in their own homes, avoid isolation, and maintain a healthy nutritional diet.

About Community Services

Neighborhood Centers are the focal point for a wide variety of services to residents throughout Williamson and Burnet counties. Services range from utility and rental assistance to information and referral, budget counseling, and energy conservation education. In 2009, 6230 people received utility assistance, rental assistance, financial budgeting counsel, and guidance navigating through the system of services to best meet their needs and help them achieve independence. About Affordable Housing WBCO develops and manages



WBCO develops and manages affordable single and multi-family housing for income-eligible households. WBCO owns and manages a 152-unit affordable apartment complex, Cedar Ridge Apartments in Leander. 152 families are living in our affordable housing complex. Every one of them are employed, pay rent and are living as responsible residents. Since we keep the rent as low as possible, many are able to enroll in college and save towards buying a home.

WBC Opportunities Q & A For

- 1. What is the \$71,600 spent on?
 - \$34,000 Administrative Office space in Georgetown
 - \$37,600 Meals on Wheels and Noon Congregant Meals at Williamson County Neighborhood Centers.
- 2. What would be the impact if funding was stopped?

Meals on Wheels impact:

- Implementation of waiting lists
- Reduction in services
- Nutritional risks
- Safety risks
- Depression/Isolation risks

Texans Feeding Texans Impact:

• In order to receive Texans Feeding Texans funding for Meals on Wheels/Sr. Nutrition from the Texas Department of Agriculture, WBC Opportunities must receive funding from Williamson County. The agency received \$68,652 in 2010 for Williamson County. Note: Burnet County receives a separate allocation.

Office Space Impact:

- WBC Opportunities receives very little unrestricted funding. Funds would have to be diverted from Community Service Block Grant (CSGB) funds which currently are utilized to pay for Emergency Assistance Outreach Workers.
- 3. Is the program required by statute?
 - WBC Opportunities is the designated <u>Community Action Agency</u> for Williamson and Burnet Counties.
 - The agency was started by a Resolution of the Williamson County Commissioner's Court on June 14, 1968.
 - Community Action Agencies were established under Section 201 of the Economic Opportunity Act/Green Amendment: "If the state, county, or local government wishes, it may designate a qualified public or private non-profit agency to serve as the community action agency."
 - The United States Code Annotated Section 9910, Chapter 106 Community Services Block Grant Program further defines the requirement of Tripartite Boards for Private Nonprofit Entities under (a) (2): 1/3 of the Board are elected public officials or their representatives
- 4. What services are provided in Williamson County?
 - Head Start/Early Head Start, Senior Nutrition/Meals on Wheels, Emergency Assistance, Homeless Prevention, Adult Education, Case Management for self-

- sufficiency, Affordable Housing and Adult Education are provided to all eligible residents in Williamson County with the exception of Jarrell which does not have a Head Start/Early Head Start Program or Meals on Wheels. The Jarrell area is eligible to receive Country Meals (frozen meals).
- In 2009, 3,679 people in Williamson County received utility assistance and 1,642 seniors received meals. Approximately 800 families had children enrolled in Head Start at Williamson County centers and over 165 families utilized the Cedar Ridge affordable housing complex in Leander.
- Head Start Expansion The agency received approximately 5.3 million in competitive Head Start/Early Head Start Expansion Grants that will add two additional Head Start and two additional Early Head Start programs in Williamson County.
- WBC Opportunities is the only social service agency with multiple programs serving all of Williamson County.
- Head Start Services were expanded to Hutto this fall and a grant has been submitted to the City of Hutto to expand Meals on Wheels to Hutto.

5. Who receives services from WBC Opportunities?

- Families unable to afford the high cost of day care for pre-school children.
- Parents who need to work and/or attain the schooling and training needed to achieve self sufficiency
- Seniors who are homebound and unable to prepare food for themselves
- Elderly persons who want to age in place in their homes and eliminate or delay placement in a nursing home
- Homebound seniors look forward to seeing the Meals on Wheels volunteer on a daily basis. For many, the volunteer is the ONLY person they see on a daily basis.
- Children from disadvantaged families who need pre-literacy & pre-numeracy skills, nutritional assistance, health assistonce, social services and language enrichment for Limited English Proficient children
- Parents who learn that they are their child's first, best teacher
- Families in need of affordable housing
- Individuals/families in need of utility or rental assistance
- Elderly on fixed income needing utility assistance during very hot summers or cold winters.
- Single moms needing assistance with childcare, educational opportunities, housing and/or emergency assistance.
- Families/individuals in need of case management to transition out of poverty to attain self-sufficiency
- Families/individuals that need a <u>hand-up</u>, not a <u>hand-out</u>
- Families/individuals breaking the cycle of poverty
- Individuals who are the FIRST person in their family to attend college

From dropout to valedictorian

This time of year, we celebrate the many graduates from our area educational institutions. And while we are proud of them all for their great accomplishments, some stories stand out that make us especially proud of our community.

Angela, 31, of Georgetown is proud to be the first person to graduate from the WBC Opportunities Adult Education Assistance Program. A high school dropout and single mother of two young children ages 2 and 3, Angela was struggling. After getting laid off from her hotel job in late 2008, Angela enrolled in school to become a Dental Assistant. Toward the end of her schooling and the beginning of her internship, she and her husband separated. So she found herself in school full-time, working a required yet unpaid

a history

internship, raising two young children in need of childcare, and having no income.

Things quickly spiraled out of control and Angela was soon to be evicted from her rental home, had utilities disconnected and was on the edge of being kicked out of her education program. That is when she contacted WBC Opportunities for help.

"They welcomed me with open arms and said 'Let's see what we can do to help you graduate and stay in your home."," Angela said. "They enrolled me in their Adult Education Assistance Program and my life took an immediate change."

The Adult Education Assistance Program at WBC Opportunities is for qualified residents of Williamson of Burnet

counties.

"The goal of the program is to help individuals with short-term educational opportunities that allow them to gain employment which stabilizes their income, enables self-sufficiency and moves people into careers that provide a livable wage," said Michael Campbell, program coordinator,

The program, funded through an American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (aka: stimulus) grant, help with educational expenses such as books, fees, equipment, and tuition, as well as transportation expenses to get to and from school, rental and utility assistance, and childcare assistance.

"We want to make sure we help people overcome any barriers that are likely to cause them to drop out of school," Campbell said.

Angela recently graduated as valedictorian of her class at Everest Institute in Austin.

"The support was unreal. I had financial aid for tuition, but WBC Opportunities helped with rent, utilities and childcare. They helped me with job interviewing skills and my resume. They even taught me how to give my vale-dictory speech in front of 3,000 people!" Angela said.

Having been out of the program and employed for the past three months, Angela comments on how her life is completely different.

"I have independence for the first time in my life. I don't have to worry

anymore. I am paying my own bills, going to work and being productive. For the first time, I was able to help provide for a nice birthday party for one of my kids. I have been able to enroll my three-year old in a sports program. I have freedom," she said.

Currently, the WBC Opportunities program has 170 participants enrolled in programs such as: Certified Nursing Assistants, GED, ESL, Medical Assistants, Dental Assistants, Cosmetology, and Phlebotomy, 100 Martin

Eligibility is based upon income level and residency in Williamson or Burnet counties and willingness to enroll in an educational program that will be completed in no more than four months.

In addition to the Adult Education Assistance program, WBC Opportunities also manages 6 Senior Activity Centers, serves as the Meals-On-Wheels provider throughout Williamson and Burnet counties, operates 13 Head Start campuses, manages 2 affordable housing complexes, and runs Community Services Centers with utility assistance programs, homelessness prevention programs, and budget throughout counseling Williamson and Burnet counties.

Program Purpose

- Provide hot, home-delivered meals, five days a week to those who, due to illness, age, or disability are unable to provide proper nutrition for themselves
- Enable the homebound to live independently as long as possible
- Relieve the isolation and loneliness of the home-bound
- Provide hot nutritious meals to seniors at Senior Centers Monday through Friday at noon.

How it Works

Home delivered meals are provided to those who live in the area and qualify, because they are homebound and over 60. Please contact your local site leader for an assessment.

People over 60 are invited to eat meals at the center s and fill out paperwork for funding. The Center also offers social and educational activities for seniors.

Meals on Wheels and congregate meals are provided at no cost to recipients. Each person receiving meals is asked to make a monthly "cost share" contribution to help cover the costs if they can.

A cost share donation is \$2.00 per meal. No one will be turned away who can not contribute.

Donations help to cover the cost of the program that is not funded by federal or state dollars.

Because of funding shortfalls, there may be a waiting list for homebound services.





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Comprehensive Energy Assistance Program

CEAP is designed to assist low income households in meeting their immediate energy needs and to encourage consumers to control energy costs through energy education. This program consists of four components.

I. Energy Crisis: This component provides short term assistance in weather related and energy supply shortage emergencies. A utility disconnection notice may constitute an energy crisis if client demonstrates a history of good faith in paying prior utility bills.





II. <u>Co-Pay:</u> This component may assist a household in developing goals for meeting energy needs over a period of time through advice and a utility co-payment plan. Client will be making partial payments to utility company. Client must meet with the outreach worker once every month and follow the program guidelines. If client does not follow the program procedures, Co-Pay services may be terminated.



III. Heating and Cooling Systems This component addresses inefficient home heating and cooling appliances through retrofit, repair, or replacement of equipment. The program includes home heating and cooling appliances, water heaters and refrigerators. Client should be a homeowner and willing to relinquish old appliances. Assessment will be made to determine outcome and can take up to 6 months.



IV. <u>Elderly/Disabled</u>: This component targets relief to households comprised of low income elderly and/or disabled persons, primarily to address their vulnerability to the high cost of home energy. Other

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What is Head Start?

Head Start and Early Head Start are comprehensive child and family development programs that prepare children from birth to five years of age to become successful school students and members of society. Head Start was started in the mid-1960's and has grown into a multi-faceted partnership involving the federal government and local education, social service and health organizations. Children and families participate in the program on the basis of eligibility criteria.



Why Does Head Start Work?

There are many reasons that Head Start works, but most important is the involvement of parents with their children in pursuing the educational, social, and life skills necessary to be successful and self-sufficient participants in society. Not only do parents take advantage of education, training, and social services offered through Head Start, but they also become involved in the day-to-day operations of the program. Parents are particularly encouraged to participate in the development of academic and social skills by their children and to volunteer in the classrooms.



What Specific Services Does Head Start Provide?

The Head Start program, in cooperation with parents and its community partners, provides children with the care and attention they need to grow and learn. These services include:

- Medical and dental assessments
- Assistance to families in following up with medical and dental care
- Daily nutrition equivalent of 2/3 of daily dietary needs
- Educational instruction with an emphasis on acquiring pre-literacy and numeracy skills
- Physical activity with emphasis on gross motor development
- Training in communication, self-discipline and other social skills
- Services for children with disabilities
- Parent education, training, and social services
