And at said meeting, among other business, the Court considered the following:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Texas counties act as a functional arm of the State of Texas, with the duties of counties specifically authorized in the Texas Constitution and statutes; and

WHEREAS, Texas counties provide important services in a cost-effective manner, including providing law enforcement and jails; justice and court system; maintenance of vital records; maintaining roads and transportation infrastructure; conducting elections and voter registration; emergency management; and indigent healthcare; and

WHEREAS, the Texas Legislature may enact laws or promulgate rules that have unintended consequences, often which may impose mandatory financial obligations upon Texas counties; and

WHEREAS, the Williamson County Auditor's Office calculated that county taxpayers were responsible for approximately \$87 million in 2018 in unfunded mandates, as defined by the Texas Association of Counties; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Williamson County Commissioners Court supports the bipartisan House Joint Resolution (HJR) 30 and Senate Joint Resolution (SJR) 10, proposing a constitutional amendment to restrict the power of the legislature to mandate requirements on a municipality or county, unless it comes with full funding and request that the Williamson County legislative delegation support and work for passage of HJR 30 and SJR 10.
