

SECOND AMENDMENT
(BOS Agreement No. ____ - ____)

This Second Amendment (“Second Amendment”) to Agreement No. 20-244, otherwise known as PO 3778 (“the Agreement”), is made and entered into as of the last date signed below, by and between the County of Yolo, a political subdivision of the State of California (“County”), and The Regents of the University of California, a corporation described in California Constitution Article IX, Section 9, acting for and on behalf of University of California, Davis Health (“Contractor”), jointly referred to as the “Parties” herein and who agree as follows.

WHEREAS, on or about September 30, 2020, the Parties entered into the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, on or about July 12, 2021, the Parties amended the Agreement via the First Amendment; and

WHEREAS, the Parties would now like to amend the Agreement, as previously amended to:

1. Revise **Paragraph I.A.** to add two (2) option years; and
2. Revise **Paragraph III.B.** to add funding in the amount of \$427,642 for Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-22 with a new contract maximum of \$534,977 and add option year language; and
3. Revise **Section IV.** to update language and add delegated authority for option years; and
4. Revise **Exhibit A** to replace the Scope of Work; and
5. Revise **Section I. of Exhibit B** to update the Budget and add budgets for option years; and
6. Revise **Exhibit E** to update Performance Measures based on new scope of work starting in FY 2021/22.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

1. **Paragraph I.A.** of the Agreement is hereby amended to read as follows:

I. TERM

A. The term of this Agreement shall be **July 9, 2019 through June 30, 2022** unless sooner terminated as provided in this Agreement. At the County’s option, this Agreement may be extended for two (2) additional twelve (12) month periods on the same terms and conditions as set forth in this Agreement upon written notice to the Contractor by the Yolo County Health and Human Services Agency Director or her/his designee (“Director”).

2. **Paragraph III.B** of the Agreement is hereby amended to read as follows:

B1. Any other provision of this Agreement notwithstanding, the maximum payment obligation to Contractor through **June 30, 2022** shall be no greater than **FIVE HUNDRED THIRTY-FOUR THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED SEVENTY-SEVEN DOLLARS (\$534,977)**, specified as follows:

*Any unspent CRRSAA or ARPA funding in a fiscal year may be rolled over to the future fiscal years including any option years, based on expenditure deadlines of each funding sources outlined below.

B2. Option Years: The County may exercise its option to extend the term of the Agreement pursuant to Section I.A. above. Upon request of the County, Contractor shall provide a contract budget for each option year in conformance with the requirements of this Agreement. The option year contract budgets shall be sent to HHSAContracts@yolocounty.org for review and approval by the Director. In the event that the County elects to exercise an option, County shall notify the Contractor in writing. The notice shall include the revised agreement term, approved funding amount to be added to the Agreement; and revised agreement maximum payment obligation, subject to the maximums set forth below:

In no event shall the term of the Agreement extend beyond **June 30, 2024** nor shall the total contract maximum exceed the amount of **ONE MILLION THREE HUNDRED NINETY THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED SIXTY-ONE DOLLARS (\$1,390,261)**, unless otherwise agreed to in writing by the parties and in conformity with the then-current Yolo County Procurement Policy approved by the Yolo County Board of Supervisors.

3. **Section IV.** of the Agreement is hereby amended to read as follows:

IV. OPTION YEAR AND AMENDMENT AUTHORITY

A. Director’s Authority: The Director may exercise the option year(s) and execute related option notices in conformance with the conditions of Section III of this Agreement

B. Purchasing Manager’s Authority: The Yolo County Procurement Manager (“Procurement Manager”) may approve and execute amendments regarding allocation of funds between categories of services, scope of services, billing rates, and other contract language changes set forth elsewhere in this Agreement provided the modifications are generally consistent with the original approved scope of the contract. This authority includes the ability to approve and execute amendments to increase to the maximum payment obligation, provided the increase is within the Procurement Manager’s Authority, as prescribed in the Yolo County Procurement Policy.

C. Yolo County Board of Supervisors’ Authority: All other authority to approve and execute amendments or exercise option year(s) related to this Agreement is reserved by the Yolo County Board of Supervisors

4. **Exhibit A** to the Agreement is hereby amended to read as attached.
5. **Section I. of Exhibit B** to the Agreement is here by amended to read as follows:

I. BUDGET

A. Contractor has submitted the following contract budget. Contractor shall adhere to this Budget in performing services that have been authorized and provided in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement.

Contractor shall provide a revised budget to the Director for approval. Budget amendments must be approved pursuant to Section IV. of the Agreement.

CRRSAA funding must be spent by 12/31/2022 at the latest.

ARPA funding must be spent by June 30, 2025 at the latest.

*Contingent on increased MHBG ARPA funding for FY23/24. MHBG FEP Regular Set Aside allocation for option years is contingent on approval of annual MHBG DHCS Yolo Application approval.


6. Exhibit E is hereby replaced in its entirety and hereby amended to read as attached.



EXHIBIT A – SCOPE OF WORK
(Fiscal Year 2021-2022)

I. STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

County will be utilizing MHBG funds to serve Transition Age Youth (TAY ages 12-30) who are experiencing the symptoms of early psychosis with a serious emotional disturbance (SED) or serious mental illness (SMI), and have limited and/or no resources to secure the continuum of mental health and substance use treatment services needed to live safely and thrive in the community. The purpose of the funds will be to provide the following:

A. WORK ACTIVITIES

Contractor shall be responsible for the following:

1. PREVENTION STRATEGIES

a. Community Outreach and Education:

- i.** Contractor shall conduct education and outreach activities within the Yolo County community to heighten awareness about early signs of psychosis, and to reduce stigma related to mental illness
- ii.** Contractor shall attend or host at least one outreach event for FY 2021-22. The event will provide opportunity for the Contractor to distribute information about the Early Onset Psychosis Program.

b. Linkages to Care:

- i.** Provide appropriate referrals to care and support for individuals referred to the program that did not meet the threshold for a screening.

2. EARLY INTERVENTION STRATEGIES

- a.** Contractor shall conduct phone screenings to determine whether referred individuals meet the criteria for a comprehensive assessment to determine a diagnosis of a psychotic disorder.
- b.** Provide treatment services to clients who meet the threshold for the program. Evidenced-based models such as Cognitive Behavioral Therapy for Psychosis (CBT-P) will be used. Treatment services include but are not limited to: individual treatment and psychotherapy; Multi-Family group therapy, peer support groups, and psychiatric medication management.
- c.** Provide peer support services including engagement of clients in the peer support and psychotherapy groups, participate in peer-related groups, and peer advocacy activities.
- d.** Provide family support services including engagement of families in the Multi-Family group, provision of family support groups and family advocacy activities.
- e.** Provide education and employment support services, for individuals with the early onset of psychosis.

- f.** Provide referrals and linkage to appropriate care for: clients assessed that do not meet the threshold for the treatment program; clients assessed that require a higher level of care; or clients that have been engaged in treatment and are ready to be discharged from the program successfully or referred to a higher level of care.

3. GENERAL STRATEGIES

- a.** Provide mental health services that are strengths-based, person-centered, safe, effective, timely and equitable; supported by friends and the community; with an emphasis on promoting wellness and recovery.
- b.** Ensure that service frequency is individualized and based upon the need of each client.
- c.** Provide culturally and linguistically appropriate services to meet the needs of individualized clients.

Program Information	<p>Yolo County is contracting with the University of California Davis Early Psychosis Program, EDAPT to serve Transition Age Youth (TAY) ages 15 – 30, who are the most at risk for chronic homelessness, repeat hospitalizations and incarceration due to the severity of their illness. The mission of EDAPT is to bring hope and wellness to individuals and families who are struggling with psychosis. To reduce stigma and increase help-seeking, there is an education component addressing the nature of mental disorders and the positive impact of early intervention. The program staff’s unique training and expertise in cutting-edge assessment techniques allow for identification of at-risk individuals early in their illness. The team provides comprehensive evidence-based treatment, focusing on consumer self-determination and family support on the path toward recovery.</p> <p>The EDAPT program has a strong and diverse interdisciplinary team of physicians, clinicians, support staff, consumer and family advocates with unique expertise in state of the art assessments and evidence based practices for early identification and intervention for psychotic disorders. The team will provide basic and comprehensive screenings, referral coordination, comprehensive clinical and psychiatric evaluations to include record review, direct assessment, report writing, and feedback to client/family and clinical team. EDAPT will complete a clinical evaluation to determine if a client meets criteria for FEP services. If the FEP criteria are met, the client will have a comprehensive psychiatric evaluation and the EDAPT team will then connect that person/s with the Yolo County HHSA Transition Age Youth team for on-going services utilizing the EDAPT model.</p> <p>UCD EDAPT will provide comprehensive training in the EDAPT/FEP model to the Yolo County HHSA TAY staff so that the provision of services can take place within the Yolo County HHSA agency. The services provided by Yolo County and as recommended by an individual’s treatment plan will be, but not limited to the following: on-going medication management, clinical therapeutic services, rehabilitative services, and case management. EDAPT will also provide general community-based education sessions for Yolo County families, caregivers, residents and HHSA staff. Training topics will include Community Outreach, Understanding Psychosis, Assessments, Treatment, and Medication.</p>
