Breathwork Facilitation	Breathwork for Mental Health Recovery	As a registered nurse, working in a local hospital in this district during the Pandemic, I have watched my peers and people in my community slowly declining in their work satisfaction and overall well-being. Therapists are becoming harder to obtain or even gain access to due to limited supply and ineligibility through insurance. This funding would be for my continuing education in the area of Breathwork Facilitation (which includes trauma response, navigating mental crises, emotional release, and self-healing without use of medications), in order to provide community access to an alternative, and much more affordable resource that aids in mental health recovery. We are extremely limited in mental health resources that are available to a wider range of citizens in our community, and it is time that we seek substitutions for the flawed health care system that is currently in place. My plan is, after completing this 9 month program, is to use this education to open a breathwork facilitation program that is trauma-informed, open to all, and gives individuals the tools to access the parts of themselves that allow them to heal from crises. Co-op Home Care	Co-op Home Care	This funding proposal requests funding to help this local business to recover from the deep, negative impacts of the pandemic and redirect funds towards providing sustainable wages for caregivers while providing essential homecare services for seniors and the disabled throughout Yolo County. Co-op Home Care is a worker-owned, fully licensed and insured home care agency that provides home care services to Yolo County's increasingly aging population. As a worker cooperative, it is owned and controlled by the caregivers, rather than a single person or shareholders. There is currently a critical lack of Home Care services for the elderly and disabled because of irregular hours, low wages, and poor working conditions, making caregiving an unappealing profession. The cooperative model addresses all of these by placing caregivers in control of the business. The industry-wide caregiver turnover rate is over 64% which hurts clients because they are unable to get a consistent caregiver with whom they have built trust. Yolo County Court Appointed Special Advocates	Capacity Building for Yolo CASA	The mission of our organization is to provide Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs) to foster children. These CASA volunteers are trained by our organization for 30+ hours and then are assigned a child in the dependency system with whom they form a one-on-one, long-term relationship. This relationship enables them to spot red flags and provide support and advocacy for foster children and youths in court, school, and life. Unfortunately, 2021 has seen the cost of training a CASA volunteer increase to \$3,500 per volunteer. We envision an expansion of our current programming from a standing Team of 15 to a Team of 20 volunteer Team Members (un-housed or marginally housed volunteers) to clean and maintain West Sacramento's West Capital corridor, as designated by the City Manager.
