The program will be provided in English, with future programming in Spanish and Russian, which will encompass a large portion of residents in the West Sacramento area. In the long-term, we expect this will improve the health, financial stability, and educational outcomes of our residents. | F | Yolo County Farm to School | Growing Yolo County Farm to School: Assessing Needs & Opportunities to Expand Farm to School Programming for All Yolo County Students. We are asking for \$35,000 to conduct a comprehensive needs assessment in all schools in Yolo County. We want to learn about existing programs and pinpoint gaps by 1) Identifying schools that have farm to school programs, describing the scope of their program, and determining how many students participate. 2) Identifying schools that do not have programs and determining how many students are missing out on a farm to school program. 3) Identifying schools that have experiential activities for students and describing them, such as school gardens, culinary arts, or farm field trips. | G | Meals on Wheels | <p>"Operation Accelerate: Driving Kitchen Capacity". Because the need for kitchen capacity is urgent, & because administrative, programmatic, & philanthropic functions at MOW Yolo remain more immature than ideal, a financial "bridge" is needed over the next 2 years to keep meals flowing & expanded to all seniors in need, while the fortitude is built for longer-term solutions & stabilized funding for appropriate permanent facilities & the infrastructure & staffing needed to propel them. This request for ARP support would provide the following toward that end:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -The ability to lease kitchen space to supplement the current location. The second kitchen is envisioned as providing for the production of 700 or more additional meals per day. -Infrastructure for the additional kitchen as needed to equip it to meet requirements of a robust senior nutrition program, as well as ensure the continuity of the existing kitchen. -Increase the budget for raw food and supplies related to food production & delivery & adequate storage, congruent with the continued service increase. -Supplement our staff – particularly kitchen management, chef, & aide positions – to support the increased activity. -The opportunity for a more focused vision & strategic planning to occur, setting forth a more solid trajectory for MOW Yolo's impact over the next 5-10 years. | \$500,000 | Yes | Yes | Seniors: 100% | 1250 | Fund Partially | \$473,290 | 95% | Yes |
| H | Davis Night Market | <p>The Davis Night Market. The Night Market is an environmentally sustainable and community-based initiative that recovers excess high-quality prepared food from retail establishments and restaurants and directly redistributes it to feed local communities in need daily, directly addressing both food waste and food insecurity. We lower the barriers involved in both food donation and collection, creating radically accessible community-level food redistribution networks. In contrast to other food recovery organizations, we do not require proof of need for community members to receive food donations, thus reducing social stigma and barriers associated with food access. Surplus cooked food, such as that produced by restaurants or supermarkets, needs to be quickly redistributed to remain high quality and meet local food safety requirements, therefore our strategy is to host an ongoing public event, the "Davis Night Market", where pre-packaged recovered food is distributed freely to anyone who attends immediately after collection.</p> | \$6,000 | No | No | Seniors: 30% Children:20% | 6500 | Fund in Full | \$0 | 0% | No Per AD HOC |
| I | Three Sisters Gardens | <p>Three Sisters Gardens Community Giving. To expand the reach of our programs throughout the Broderick area and beyond. This summer alone, TSG donated over 12,000 lbs of fresh, organic produce to the community through weekly Free Farm Stands, donations to Yolo Food Bank, and donations to Meals on Wheels. TSG is seeking funding to grow our team in order to grow our programs.</p> <p>TSG has been creating a Youth Leadership Development Program that provides living-wage part-time green job opportunities for "at-promise" youth. These youth are essential to daily farm activities from planting to running the weekly Free Farm Stands. TSG's Community Giving program would not be possible without the youth. In return, TSG provides job skills, work experience, a \$15/hour stipend, and community connection to the youth – a safe alternative to activities that could land them in trouble with the law. TSG has previously worked with the Yolo County Probation Department to provide paid work opportunities for paroled youth.</p> <p>TSG is expanding its Community Giving efforts to include two schools in the Broderick/Bryte area where most students participate in their school's free lunch program. By working with Riverbank Elementary School and Elkhorn Village Elementary School, TSG is able to provide farm fresh, organic produce to low-income students that would not otherwise have access to healthy food options. School meal programs are essential to meeting the nutritional needs of the students dependent on them since that may be their only guaranteed meal each day.
