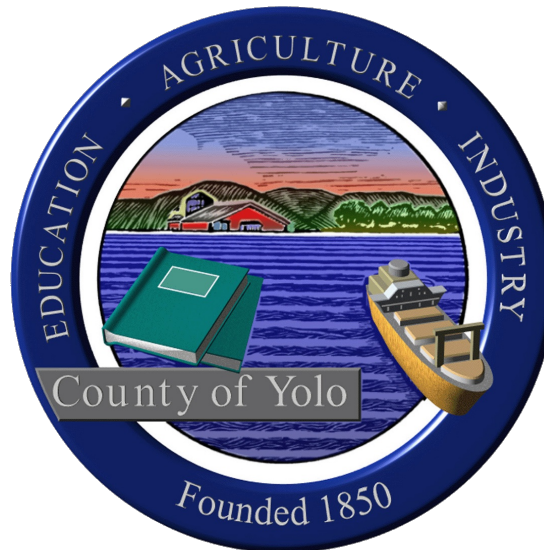

Background

During the October 11, 2021 meeting, the CCP formed an Outcomes & Metrics Ad Hoc Subcommittee to develop CCP budget policies to implement effective and feasible outcome measures and metrics. The Subcommittee was charged with coordinating with the CCP analyst and CCP fiscal support to develop monthly, quarterly and/or annual procedures associated with implementing these policies, and with recommending amendments to the CCP Bylaws as they pertain to the budget outcomes and metrics.

Additionally, the 2023-2025 CCP Strategic Plan includes a strategy to “[d]evelop metrics and common methods to measure success for CCP funded programs” by June 30, 2023.

On November 14, 2022, the CCP voted to reauthorize the Subcommittee until June 30, 2023 with the below membership:

Background

The composition of the CCP is established in Penal Code section 1230 and includes “a representative from a community-based organization (CBO) with experience in successfully providing rehabilitative services to persons who have been convicted of a criminal offense.” In January of 2021, the CCP adopted bylaws that noted the CBO representative would be selected by the CCP. The approach taken for such appointments is entirely within the CCP’s discretion, as State law is silent on the topic.

At the August 22, 2022 meeting of the CCP, member Marc Nigel resigned from the CCP, leaving the CBO representative position vacant. To fill this vacancy, the CCP voted to establish a Community-Based Organization Member Selection Ad Hoc Subcommittee at the November 14, 2022 meeting with the below membership:

- Jonathan Raven, District Attorney
- Tracie Olson, Public Defender
- Karleen Jakowski, Health & Human Services

Candidate Selection

The Subcommittee was tasked with soliciting applications and selecting a candidate to bring for approval at the January 9, 2023 meeting. Applications were solicited and accepted through December 21, 2022, and then reviewed by the Subcommittee on December 27, 2022. After deliberation, the Subcommittee selected a candidate for the CCP’s consideration: Christina Andrade-Lemus, Associate Director of Substance Use and Latinx Services with CommuniCare Health Centers.

Background

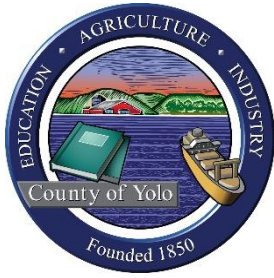
The Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) is the leading federal source of criminal justice funding to state and local jurisdictions. In 2018, the Yolo County District Attorney's Office was awarded a JAG grant to support the expansion of the Neighborhood Court Restorative Justice Program. The Neighborhood Court program offered diversion to low level misdemeanants, but the JAG expansion includes those who committed felonies or have more extensive criminal histories. JAG uses a restorative justice approach to promote accountability in a non-punitive manner through a robust community engagement process. Further details on the program can be found in Attachment B.

Request

The District Attorney's Office is applying for a new round of grant funding through JAG. If awarded, the new grant will start on June 1, 2023, but there will be a funding gap between March 31, 23 and then. CCP funding in the amount of \$40,704.83 is being requested to cover the cost of a Social Worker Practitioner and a Social Services Assistant until the new grant begins.

Approve one-time gap funding in the amount of \$40,704.83 for the Neighborhood Court Restorative Justice Program.

EDWARD BYRNE MEMORIAL JUSTICE ASSISTANCE GRANT PROGRAM

The Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) is the leading federal source of criminal justice funding to state and local jurisdictions. In 2018, the Yolo County District Attorneys office was awarded a JAG grant to support the expansion of the Neighborhood Court Restorative Justice Program. The Neighborhood Court program offered diversion to low level misdemeanants, but the JAG expansion includes those who committed felonies or have more extensive criminal histories. JAG uses a restorative justice approach to promote accountability in a non-punitive manner through a robust community engagement process. The restorative justice facilitated conference process is outlined below:



A critical component to the JAG expansion is the addition of a Social Worker Practitioner and Social Services Assistant who provide the necessary supports needed to engage participants in the restorative justice process, but also provide linkage and supports to needed services. Staff complete the self-sufficiency matrix that address these four domains: criminal justice involvement, housing stability, physical health, mental health, substance use and self-sufficiency. The matrix score drives which types of services will go into the participant case plan.

Overall Program Participation:

- 274 individuals total have been referred to the JAG program
- 111 participants have successfully completed the program
- 93 are currently being served
- 6 are on a waitlist
- 64 individuals discontinued their participation in the program

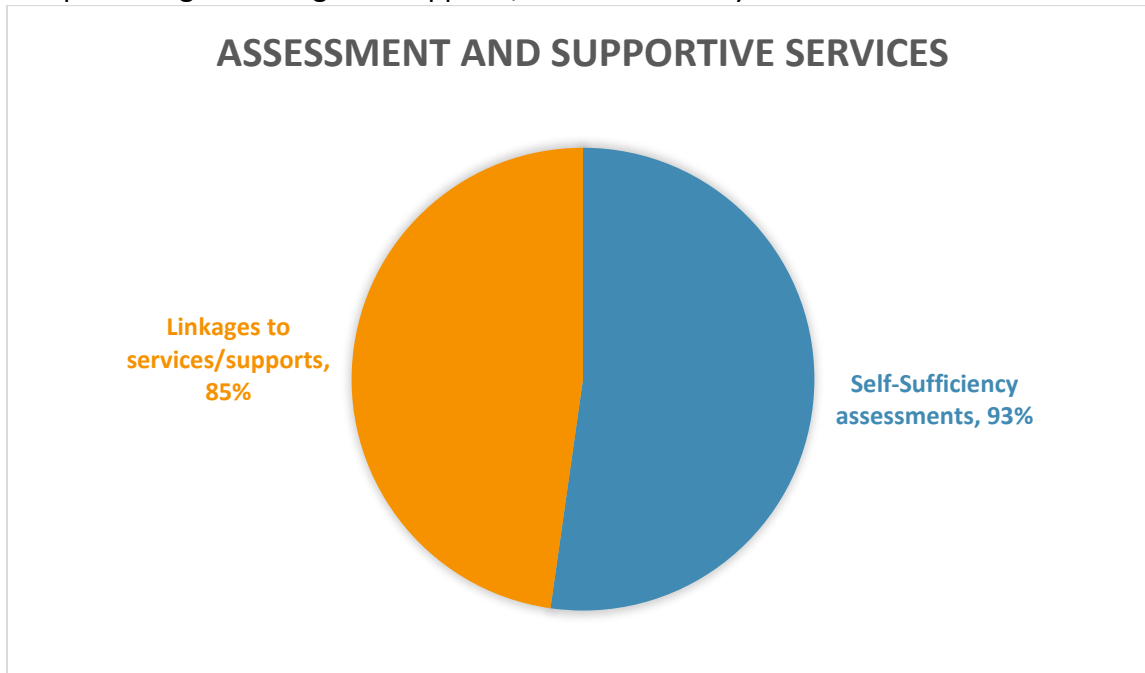

Subject: Consider approval of \$215,000 in gap funding for the Transitions of Care program for a six-month period.

Background

The Transitions of Care (TOC) program provides case management and peer support to clients with chronic medical and mental health conditions. The purpose of the program is to transition these individuals back into their communities after exiting incarceration or hospitalization. With the support of the TOC program clients access the following services, resources, and supports: enrollment in health coverage or other benefits (Cal Fresh/SSI/SSDI/establishing payee), healthcare navigation (primary/specialty care, therapy, psychiatry), accessing vital documents (birth certificates, driver's licenses, identification), basic human dignity essentials (food, hygiene, laundry), transportation, employment search or job training/education, and peer support. Further program details may be found in Attachment B.

Request

Current funding for the TOC program ends in March 2023. Funding from California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal (CalAIM) or Reentry Enhanced Care Management (ECM) will become available in July 2023, but will not be available in sufficient amounts in time to transition the program. CCP funding is being requested for April to September 2023 in the amount of \$215,000.

Recommended Action

Approve one-time gap funding in the amount of \$215,000 for the TOC program.



TRANSITIONS OF CARE PROGRAM SUMMARY

July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022

Assisting individuals with chronic medical and mental health conditions to transition and integrate back into their homes and community from medical and mental health hospitalizations and those exiting incarceration.

Each client works alongside Transitions of Care (TOC) team members to identify their current strengths, resources, and needs (including those needs related to the social determinates of health known to contribute health disparities, compromised functioning, reduced quality of life, and legal involvement). All those who choose to participate are offered case management and peer support.

While the primary goal of Transitions of Care is to provide linkage to resources, much more is often needed. The following services, resources, and supports are accessed: enrollment in health coverage or other benefits (Cal Fresh/SSI/SSDI/establishing payee), healthcare navigation (primary/specialty care, therapy, psychiatry), accessing vital documents (birth certificates, driver's licenses, identification), basic human dignity essentials (food, hygiene, laundry), transportation, employment search or job training / education, and peer support.



TOC has provided 1, 972 case management visits with 188 unique individuals.

The following are a few highlights of some of our case management service and linkage outcomes:



Transportation was provided for 188 Medical Specialty and 123 Primary Care visits, 65 Behavioral Health/Substance Use services, 180 Specialty Mental Health appointments including lab and pharmacy, 93 grocery and food bank trips.



75 individuals established a medical home and 41 have received help accessing prescription medications for physical health conditions.



209 visits to address housing needs, applications, and related linkages.



83 visits related to SSI/SSDI application completion and linkage to related appointments and resources.

Transitions of Care Team

Transitions of Care team members receive specialized training in trauma-informed care, crisis response, substance use disorders, mental health, cultural humility, and the social/occupational/housing/health related adversities experienced by those exiting incarceration.

1. **BH Manager (CMSP funded ends 3/30/23)** – Provides clinical oversight and leadership of program; conducts routine case consultation and care planning meetings, engages with individuals at time of referral; data collection, reporting, and advocacy.
2. **Case Manager (CMSP funded ends 3/30/23)** – Supports individuals experiencing chronic homelessness coupled with a chronic physical and/or mental health diagnosis access needed resources in the community with the goal of stabilization. Also serves individuals who are exiting incarceration to promote a healthy integration back into the community.
3. **Case Manager (CMSP funded ends 3/30/23)** – Supports individuals with chronic medical conditions (55+) accessing medical appointments, specialty appointments and resources in the community. Also supports individuals exiting hospitalizations and incarceration with establishing a medical home, follow-up care and stabilizing in the community.
4. **Case Manager (CMSP funded ends 3/30/23)** – Specializes in serving individuals (monolingual Spanish speaking) with chronic medical conditions access vital primary care and specialty care services and linking them to community resources. Also serves individuals exiting hospitalizations to access follow-up-care and stabilizing in the community.
5. **Team Lead (MAT/HHSA funding ends June 2023)** – Supports individuals exiting incarceration with linkage to MAT and support with stabilization and accessing resources in the community. Specializes in working with those who are diagnosed with a severe and/or chronic mental health diagnosis(s).
6. **Community Health Worker (HHSA funded ends 9/30/23)** – Supports individuals exiting incarceration to establish a medical home and/or mental health care in the community. Supports with accessing resources that will support in the transition and stabilization of the individual back into the community.

Request for Funding:

CMSF funding (the bulk of our TOC program) is ending in March. There is a Reentry ECM component to CalAIM that starts in July 2023, that we intend to capitalize on that would hopefully fund our TOC Reentry services long term. However, the ECM Reentry scope doesn't start until July (it was delayed) and we will need a few months of transition/ramp-up. Ideally, we would receive financial support for the program April- September (6 months) and then ECM (hopefully) will be enough to sustain long term.

The total funding request is: \$215,000.

\$107,500 for July through September.
